BUILDING BRISK AT SQUAMISH

Home building in Squamish as well as business building has increased this year. Already there are three new business buildings in the process of construction on the Main street: B.C. Telephone building which will be officially opened next month, the new post office, which is waiting for the arrival and installation of equipment, and the Del Mar Coffee shop.

New houses being constructed are those of Buzz Downer in the lower end of Squamish and the addition to the Stockman home. The Paul Powell's are building near the Russell Lamports, and on Second street the dentist has moved into his new home, while Mr. Reid is building one next door. Also being built is the home of the S. Hinde's close to the Squamish hotel.

There are several new homes being built in the Dentville area, that of the Dibben's being well advanced while the Allot's have made a good start on theirs.

Along the road the Marsh Hurren's home is nearly completed, while Johnny Humer is adding to his. Further up Ramsay McCullough has nearly finished his and the new home of the Brian Buckley's is done.

Perhaps the biggest development is at the shops where Jimmie Neil's field has been subdivided with two homes. Sparrow's and Riley's completed and two more being built.

NEWCASTLE DISEASE STOPS POULTRY SHOW

Plans for the Poultry Show which was to be held at the Fall Fair in September have had to be cancelled due to the request by the Department of Agriculture that all such show be called off this year because of the prevalence of Newcastle disease.

The bulletin the Fair committee received from the Department stated that while there may be none in the district in which the Fair is held there is a possibility that outside birds may bring it in.

The Committee would like exhibitors to notice that the Poultry and Livestock Section will have only three classes, one for saddle horses, one for rabbits and one for child's pet, exclusive of a dog or cat, the latter not to contain any bird.

It is hoped that next year we will be able to have poultry classes again.

BOY SCOUTS OFF FOR CAMP

Eleven wildly excited Boy Scouts climbed on the way freight at 7 a.m. headed for Adventure. With their Scoutmaster C. C. Marchant they were off for a week's holiday at Black Tusk Meadows in Garibaldi Park. In the group were Dan Munro, Jimmie Buchanan, David Caldwell, Leonard Marchant, Tor Halverson, George Johnson, Sonny Davis, Bob and Allan Dent, Ray and Don Brownell.

The boys, ranging in age from 12 to 16 will put into practice all they have learned in the past winter. The Scouts have only camped out once this year at Alice Lake, and for some of them it will be the first long camping trip in their lives.

"They will take turns at cooking and cleaning up the camp," Mr. Marchant said, "and some of the boys are planning to keep us supplied with fresh fish." Dan Munro, the only one of the boys who has visited the park before, is one of those who plans to fish. "Dad and I caught some beauties in Garibaldi lake about five years ago," he said, "and I've got to show the rest of the kids I wasn't fooling when I told them about the big ones."

The boys will leave the train at Garibaldi station and will be met by Frank Lacer, who will take them over the first few miles of the trail in a jeep. After that it will be shank's mare for the next six miles. The boys will pack in all their own supplies and some of the packs weigh as much as 40 pounds.

"Some of the boys have made their own pack boards," Mr. Marchant said, "and the rest of them spent several evenings at Dr. Kindree's repairing some they had borrowed. I'm sure they raided the town searching for sleeping bags and tents," he added.

The boys plan to do some climbing, the more ambitious ones hope to reach the top of the Black Tusk, but most of them will confine their mountaineering to the lower ridges.

The boys would like to thank Messrs. J. A. Kennedy, general manager of the PGE, Stewart, Gibson and Bailey, who personally donated the amount necessary for the boy's fares to Garibaldi station and back. They also want to thank Dr. Kindree, who helped them plan their supplies, and McKenzie's Ltd. who made a substantial reduction in the cost of their supplies.

RAILWAY STRIKE

The threatened railway strike was real Tuesday morning when some 125,000 railway men walked off the job.

It was stated the freight barge service between Squamish and Vancouver stopped Tuesday, while the Union Steamship service which carries the mail from Vancouver to Squamish will stop Friday afternoon. The Bonabelle between Squamish and Horseshoe Bay still is running but nothing definite has been ascertained as to its future operations. The PGE continues to operate as usual, but it was also unknown locally how long it will continue to do so.
