TWO NEW BUSINESSES STARTED IN SQUAMISH

Two new businesses have come to Squamish.

Mr. Ernest A. Topham is now occupying the office above the Howe Sound Timber Co. He is a lawyer and notary public and is acting as village clerk for the time being.

The former Newport Grill will be reopened on Saturday, December 16 under a new name and new management. Now known as the Newport Inn, it will be operated by Mrs. Dorothy Harris, who has a great deal of experience in the restaurant business.

Request Phone Service to Dock

The December meeting of Squamish and Howe Sound Board of Trade was held last Wednesday.

The board received an answer to their query concerning the expansion of long distance telephone service and were advised that the local switch-board can handle up to 81 calls per day, but at the time of enquiry found that they were handling 120 per day. The B.C. Telephone is making efforts to include recommendations that this service be increased up to 150 messages a day in their 1951 estimates.

The B.C. Telephone had also been approached concerning a telephone at the Squamish dock and had agreed on its installation if the Squamish Stages would build a shelter for it. This has been done and the line laid, but now the company is asking the Squamish Stages to guarantee a certain revenue as well as taking care of the instrument, shelter and line. The taxi company see no reason why they should do this, so the board has decided to request the installation of the phone.

Christmas Seal Sale Over Quota

The annual T.B. Christmas Seal Sale, sponsored in the Howe Sound district by the Squamish Nurses Club is doing very well.

Committee chairman, Mrs. A.H. Ottman reports that they have already taken in more than five hundred dollars, one hundred and fifty more than last year, and have raised their quota from one thousand to twelve hundred dollars.
