LOCAL SHOPS RE-BUILD NEEDED ROLLING STOCK

A baggage car and the first all-mail car on the railway, have just been completed at the PGE shops at Squamish.

The all-steel cars are converted from American army cars, used during the last war to transport troops. They have been completely rebuilt, with windows filled in, refloored and insulated and paneling and heating installed.

The baggage and express car contains a small diesel light plant and is all steel equipped. It has been completely rewired and baggage racks have been installed.

In the mail car, built to government specifications, all equipment except the bag racks and letter boxes have been built at the shops. There are removable stanchions in one half of the car, separating the bags, which hold the mail for the various communities on the line.

The car, smart in its red exterior paint, with khaki and white inside, contains sleeping and eating quarters for the two man crew who handle the mail.

"We have fifteen cars of the type used as a base for these cars," Mr. Stathers told *The Advance*. "Six of them will be used for baggage and mail cars and the balance for other types of equipment."

He showed the writer one which was being converted into an outfit car for use with a work train. Half of the cars will contain bunks and the remainder will be cooking and eating quarters. Each car is individually designed for the purpose for which it will be used.

When the two new cars go out for their first run this week, the PGE will have every reason to be proud of the job done by the local shop.

On Saturday, December 2nd, Jim Eadie brought the passenger train to Squamish on his final trip. It marked the end of thirty-six years service with the PGE.

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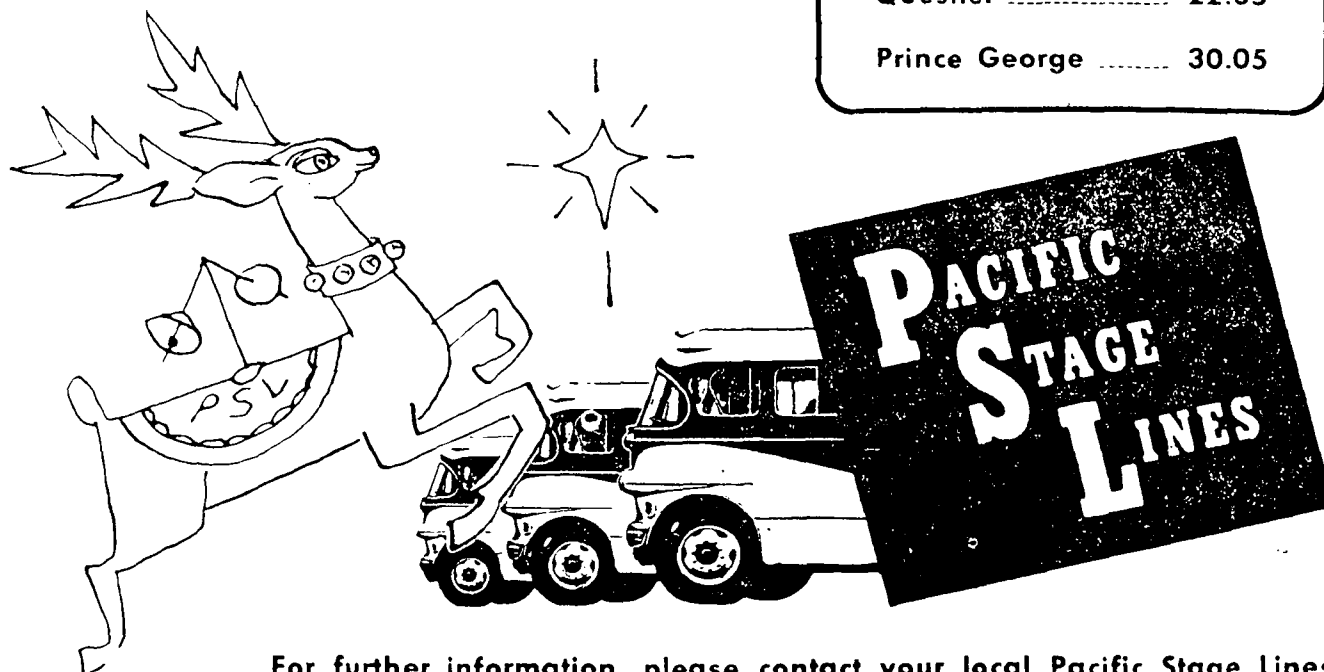
