## Earl Watt in Bad Accident

Earl Watt suffered severe back injuries yesterday afternoon when a logging donkey overturned and he was thrown to the ground.

The donkey had been loaded in a truck and trailer and was being moved to a new setting when the rear spring of the trailer broke, causing the donkey to lurch and turn over.

Earl was standing on the donkey skids at the time. He was taken to Squamish and Dr. Kindree sent him to the Royal Columbian hospital by air ambulance.

At the time of going to press his condition was reported as fair.

## Mrs. J. McRae Named 1950's Good Citizen

Mrs. Jean McRae was presented with the award for the "good citizen of 1950" at the annual meeting of the Squamish Recreational Association last Friday.

In the presentation speech Mr. Hayes, the retiring president of the group, commented on her service to the community over a period of many years. She was cited for the great amount of nursing she had done in the valley, taking over at times in the absence of a doctor, and always giving her knowledge and experience whenever her help was needed.

She has served on the school board for many years and is also a member of the village commission. In this capacity she has done a great deal for the betterment of the community and much of the success of achieving our new junior senior high school is due to her constant interest in the advancement of education in the district.

Mrs. McRae has been a resident of the valley for more than forty years and as a member of church, hospital and fraternal organizations she has helped to make Squamish a better place in which to live.

By receiving the 1950 good citizenship award, Mrs. McRae takes her place among those who have been publicly recognized for their service to the community.

"The whole job is going very well," Jack Konus, the superintendent of construction for Bennett and White told the Advance "and we are very pleased with it."

## Squamish Hospital Certainty

—Work Starts in June

Hospital construction will start early in June as soon as plans can be prepared. This was the welcome news brought back by the hospital delegation which visited Victoria early this week.

The delegation consisting of Dr. L. C. Kindree, B. H. Brown and G. S. Clarke, reported that the government, in cabinet, has decided to proceed with construction of a 20 bed frame hospital. Working plans are available but will have to be adjusted to suit our hospital site.

## Beautiful Gardens On Display Here

Perhaps the most noticeable is the brilliant color Mrs. Clarke's garden has shown in the past few weeks. The vivid colors of spring bulbs and rock plants are really beautiful and one has to see what she has done with a slough to appreciate how attractive they can be made to appear.

In the lower town, Mrs. Lew Brooks' garden has long been a beauty spot and the brilliant display of tulips in her rockery are well worth going to see.

The quiet, cool charm of the Harold Graham's garden is another that is off the beaten track and unless you visit that section of the village you'd never dream that it existed.

Along Cleveland Avenue we find the attractive blue viola and yellow primrose border in one of the PGE row gardens worth commenting on as are the scarlet and gold tulips in the garden next to the Star Theatre. Across the street, the Johnny Drenka's window box is really something to see with the tulips taking over after the hyacinths finished blooming.

There's another beautiful display of tulips at the Gerry Dent home in Dentville and a week or so ago Mrs. Barnfield's daffodils were well worth seeing.
