PLANS MADE FOR OPERATION MAY DAY NEXT WEEK

The May Day committee headed by Hap Allott, hopes this year's May Day events will exceed all past years both in enjoyment to the public and financial benefit of the swimming pool, whose construction is the sole object of this year's May Day activities.

Festivities will commence as usual with a parade, starting at the school and travelling down Cleveland Avenue to Victoria and thence to the grounds adjoining the Community Hall, where the crowning of the 1951 May Queen, Beverley Bazlev will take place.

The committee hopes that everyone with a car or truck will decorate it and compete for the prizes offered.

BRITANNIA WINS FIRST AID MEET

Britannia Beach made a clean sweep of the fourth annual First Aid competition held in the Community hall here last Saturday. In the Junior meet the girls team, captained by Dolores Alexander took first place with the other girls team placing second. In the Senior class the Beach team, captained by I. Rowed was first, followed by the Mines team, headed by L. Allan.

In its second year of competition Squamish placed third in both classes, while Woodfibre was fourth in the men's group and Britannia Townsite fourth in the juniors. The meet was held in Squamish for the first time, with the PGE playing hosts and the St. John's Ambulance association supervising the event. A crowd of about three hundred and fifty people attended. "We were very gratified with the turnout and the interest shown," Eric Stathers who organized the meet said. "We only counted on about half the number."

Awards were presented to the senior teams by Hon. E. C. Carson, minister of public works and president of the B.C. branch of the St. John's Ambulance association, and W. A. Matheson, district School Board head gave the juniors their cup. Other presentations were made by G. G. Edwardson, secretary of St. John's Ambulance association; J. Thompson, deputy minister of labor; E. C. Roper, general manager of Britannia Mining and Smelting Co.; W. A. Bain, chief engineer for Alaska Pine; and John Guthrie, resident manager, B.C. Pulp.

Assisting Dr. L. C. Kindree in the judging were: W. E. Darknell, S. Cain, A. Noble, and J. Smith, all of Vancouver, while E. Stathers announced the events and G. Dubberly, safety supervisor at Woodfibre served as commentator, and R. M. Alexander, personnel manager at Britannia was timekeeper.

J. A. Kennedy, general manager of the PGE railway, made the opening address and welcomed the competitors to Squamish and his comments concerning the railway were very amusing. CANCER UNIT FORMED HERE

At a meeting of representatives of the various organizations in the Howe Sound area in the Community hall on May 10, the 53rd cancer unit in Canada, the East Howe Sound Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society was formed.

Mr. E. Haves, as chairman of the meeting, introduced Mrs. Dawson of the Cancer Society who was in Squamish to organize the Unit.

She outlined the aims of the Society, whose functions are to educate the public in the early symptoms of those forms of cancer which respond to effective treatment. They also raise funds for the welfare of cancer patients and for the work of the National Institute.

The welfare program of the society provides assistance to all needy cancer patients where such assistance is not available from any other source. This includes transport services to and from the treatment centres, special services at cancer clinics, including social service workers, boarding home care and house keeping services.

Dr. L. C. Kindree proposed the formation of a unit in the Howe Sound area; the unit to consist of a committee and a Board of sixteen which would have a monthly meeting and three public meetings a year.
