

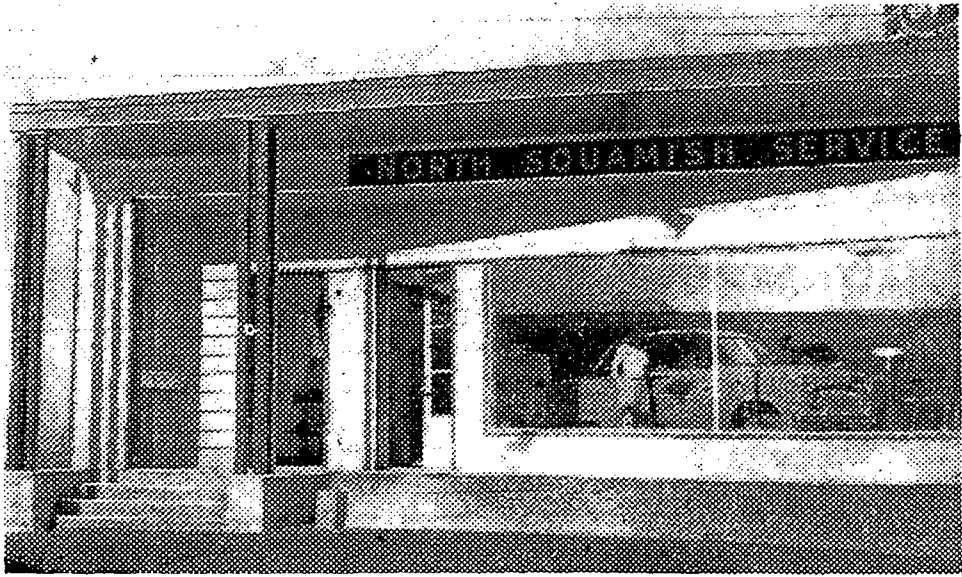

## NEW SHOWROOM AND OFFICES OPENED BY FORD DEALERS HERE



North Squamish Service now occupying new, modern edifice

Bright lights, colored lighting and beautiful flowers were the background for the brief ceremony which marked the opening of North Squamish Service's new automobile showroom and offices.

At 5 p.m. on Saturday afternoon last, Mrs. G. R. Denny cut the ribbon and officially opened the new building. Brief speeches by Ford and Standard Oil officials, the local contractors who worked on the building, and Ken Richardson, the manager of North Squamish Service followed, and Graham Valde was the lucky winner of the fifty dollar credit note. An interesting sidelight and a clever piece of advertising occurred when the flash bulb failed to work as pictures of the opening were taken. "Now if that was a Ford camera," Mr. Richardson said "with Standard lubrication, it would have worked."

The new building is one of the most modern, if not the most modern showrooms in B.C., and combines many features never seen in Squamish before. In the showroom the mahogany panelled walls and creamy white ceilings made a beautiful background for the new English Ford, the Consul, which

was mounted on a revolving turntable to be suitably displayed. A glass and mahogany movable panellied screen can be used to conceal any part of the showroom. The offices are panelled and decorated in the latest style, the North Squamish with etchwood panelling and rubbed to a soft green and the Squamish Towing's with mahogany panelling. Lighting throughout the building is all fluorescent, flush type and is recessed.

The building is radiant electrically heated throughout, with panels inserted in the ceilings of all rooms. Each room can be heated separately and is individually controlled by a thermostat. The heating and lighting was specially designed for the building by Ricketts Sewell Electric Ltd. of Vancouver and Mr. Sewell says it is the first time this type of heating has been used outside of Vancouver.

Sufficient main service has been installed to handle all the lighting needs for the new building and garage and to allow for future expansion.

The parts department will be able to supply any car parts from a washer to a rear end and a com-
