This is the subjective view by the U.S. as the time war peak production will be reached in the country.

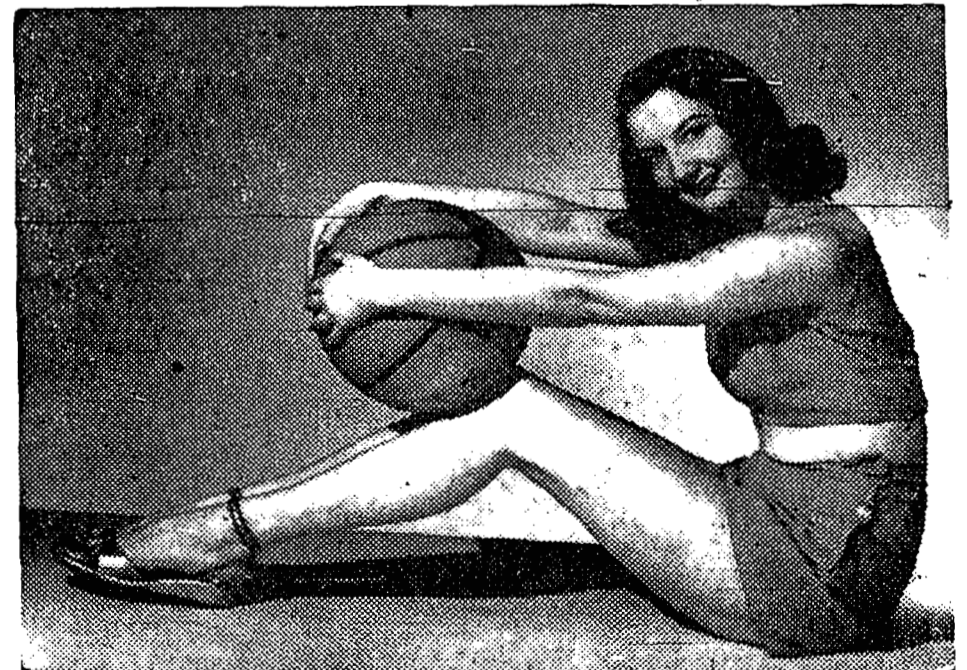
At present Canada's defence spending is getting a little more money now, after having been bogged down for some months.

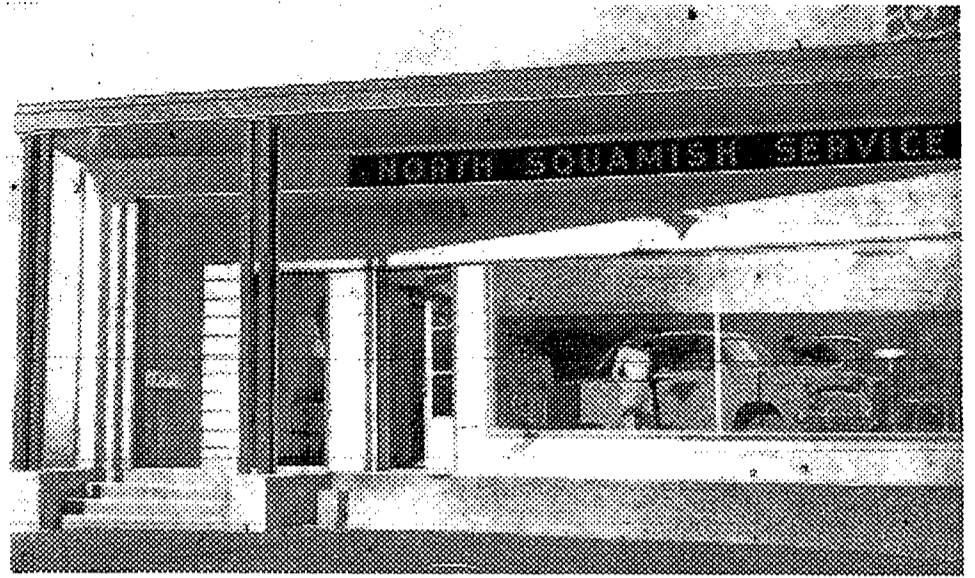

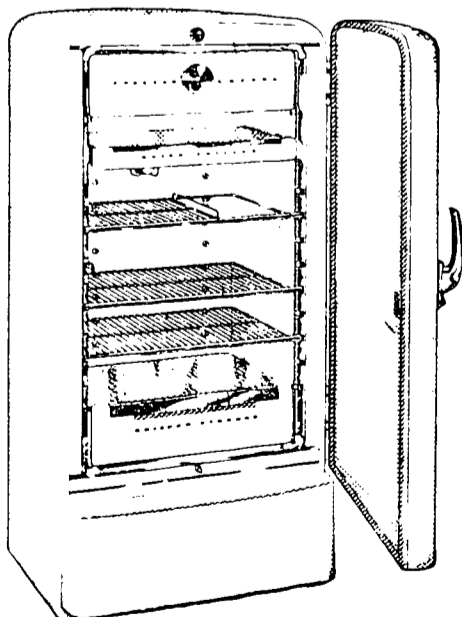

B.C. Joined Confederation Eighty Years Ago

Victoria—Friday last marked the 80th anniversary of the entry of B.C. into Confederation. It was on July 20, 1871, that the Crown Colony was admitted into the Dominion.

Progress made in the period was noted by Premier Johnson, who said it was a matter of congratulation to the province and to the Dominion as well because the relationship has been mutually happy and beneficial.

While there have been slight misunderstandings from time to time in the past, the wonder to me is that in a nation of such vast territorial extent they have not been greater, the Premier remarked.
