Tot Narrowly Escapes Death

Prompt action on the part of the engine crew saved a small child from instant death on Monday morning.

David Patterson, 21 month old son of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Patterson at Mile 34½ was playing with two older children, aged 7 and 11, when unknown to his mother, he attempted to cross the railway track, in pursuit of his playmates. A triple-header north-bound freight rounded the sharp curve, and Engineer Don Robinson immediately threw the train into emergency. Before the heavy train could come to a full stop the front engine had passed over the child, who, fortunately, was between the rails.

Pilot J. E. Boak of Charter Flight Service was radioed while enroute from Squamish to Vancouver. He immediately flew to Alta Lake where he picked up the injured child. David is now in St. Paul's hospital, suffering from a mangled left arm and a fractured hip.

SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED BY SCHOOL BOARD

Margit Teret of Britannia Townsite is the winner of the \$150 University Entrance Scholarship offered by the Howe Sound School Board.

This scholarship is awarded annually to the student in Grade 12 who achieves an average of 80% or more in the junior matriculation examinations. Margit, who attended Britannia Mines High School, made an average of 87%.

School Building Showing Progress

In spite of recent delays, due to the lumber shortage, work on the new Junior-Senior High school is again progressing rapidly. Lumber is now on hand and more is expected this weekend.

The roofers are taking full advantage of the fine weather and hope to finish their job this week. The plasterers, too, are working rapidly on the final coat of stucco. As soon as their work is done the painters will take over. Another week or so should see the removal of the scaffolding and the completion of the exterior of the classroom wing.

Inside, the individual rooms are rapidly taking shape. The equipment is being put into position in the library and science rooms; and blackboards have already been installed in some of the rear classrooms. On the main floor the commercial and domestic science rooms are yet to be finished. Every effort is being made to have the main section of the building ready for occupancy in time for the opening of school on Sept. 4.

The shortage of material has slowed the work on the industrial arts division and the auditorium block. However, as no further delay is anticipated, the School Board hopes to see the whole building completed before the end of October.

With the arrival of more lumber, Mr. Kobus hopes to have work on the new hospital in full swing by next week.

Loses Forearm In Rail Mishap

Stanley Green, a brakeman on the beach railway at Britannia Beach lost a forearm on Tuesday. He was operating the switch part way up the hill when he slipped with his arm across the track. Before the car could be brought to a stop it passed over Mr. Green's arm. He went to Vancouver via Union Steamships and is reported in good condition in Vancouver General Hospital.

Improvements To Local Streets

Each passing month sees further improvements in the village streets and sidewalks. Plans are now under way for the opening of the lane between Fourth and Fifth sts., north of Victoria. This will be followed by a concrete sidewalk on the west side of Fifth street from Victoria avenue north.

The completion of the lane between Cleland avenue and Second street answers a long felt need in the business life of the community. In order to open this section to traffic a concrete pipe had to put into place and then a part of the slough had to be filled in and gravelled.

Perhaps the day is not too far distant when the remaining section of this slough will also be covered, to the great delight of nearby residents.

Many citizens have noted with pleasure the bright new appearance of the Anglican church and vicarage. The old, drab, brown shingles have been replaced by shining, white aluminum ones.

Elks New Home Moved to Site

Citizens on Victoria avenue had a ringside seat for one of the largest moving jobs ever undertaken in Squamish.

Last Thursday the newly acquired Elks building was moved from its original site on the corner on Victoria and Fourth to the new location on Second street. Two days were spent in preparatory work before the moving actually began. A sleigh made by Bud Moore and Ivor Hurst was used for the operation. Two big "cats," a D8 belonging to Empire Mills and a D6 belonging to Behrner and Marks, with the use of a winch, carried out the actual task of moving the building. Due to the size and weight of building, approximately 18 tons, two large Diamond T trucks belonging to the Howe Sound Timber company, also took part in the job. From the time the heavy machinery first began to move the structure, only two hours elapsed until it was properly located on the new lot. Johnny Drenka was in charge of the actual moving job. Both he and his helpers take pride in the speed and efficacy with which the task was accomplished.

No sooner was the building in place than men showed up to plan needed changes. Over the weekend work was started on the new concrete blocks for the foundation the digging for the septic tank was completed and a start made on a new concrete walk from the street to the building. As soon as these basic jobs have been finished the interior will be renovated.

The Elks are confident that all the work can be done by means of voluntary labor. The whole undertaking is a credit to the men taking part in it. Only by who-hearted co-operation and a willingness to lend a helping hand can such tasks be accomplished.
