ILL CHILD RUSHED TO CITY HOSPITAL

Ken Quest, a former PGE employee, who worked in the office here, was the daring pilot who flew little six-year old Gloria Urdal of Pemberton through a blinding snowstorm to hospital in Vancouver last Thursday.

The child, who was in a coma during most of the trip was to Squamish in an ambulance speeder and after Dr. Kindree saw her condition requested that a plane be sent here for her.

The snowstorm twice forced the pilot to land on the waters of Howe Sound before he finally reached the airport. She was rushed to hospital in the city where she is progressing favorably.

WIND HAMPERS UTILITIES HERE

The strong southeast wind which brought the rain and milder weather to Squamish on Tuesday night also played havoc on Wednesday with the communication system.

Radio telephones between Squamish and Vancouver were not working, nor was the one between Woodfibre and Vancouver. The landlines between Squamish and Britannia were up but there was a break below Furry creek so there was no phone communication with Vancouver.

The power was off for about five hours Wednesday morning from 3 a.m. till after 8.

Heating systems dependent on electricity were not operating but the insulation in the new school was so successful that despite no heat for several hours the temperature was little below normal.

Chalet Snowmobile Arrived Today

The long awaited snowmobile for Diamond Head Chalet arrived to-day. The machine, a fifteen passenger Bombardier, was built in Quebec and will be the first of its type on the Pacific coast.

The machine, which will be on display here for several days was purchased by a group of forty Squamish people who banded together under the leadership of Dr. L. C. Kindree to finance the purchase.

The arrival of the new machine will make trips into the park much easier and skiing slopes in the lower meadows will be accessible to anyone who cares to make the trip.

The chalet enjoyed its best Christmas season these last few weeks and many of the guests have already made reservations to return at Easter. Mr. and Mrs. B. Harrison of Duncan, who, with their two children have visited most of the skiing centres in the northwest, including Sun valley, were impressed with Diamond Head and said it was what they had been looking for. They considered it an ideal place for a family holiday and plan to return at Easter.

Favors Capilano Highway Route

Alderman Halford Wilson of Vancouver told members of the city council's parks committee on Monday that the government is ready to start immediately on construction of a scenic highway from North Vancouver to Garibaldi Park if the municipalities will approve a routing through the Capilano watershed.

The government will provide adequate protection for the water supply. Protective measures will include fencing of the highway, constant patrols and heavy fines for those who break the no stopping regulations.

The alderman, who recently interviewed Works Minister E. C. Carson in Victoria said that the cost of the highway via the Capilano would be much less than one along the coast from Horseshoe Bay to Squamish.

Squamish Is Back In Banana Belt

The weather still continues to make news. A seven-inch snowfall last weekend was followed by sleet and snow Monday. The weather was milder though and rain accompanied the high winds on Tuesday night.

Yesterday the weather man gave the district a sample of all his weather except snow. Rains and high winds were followed by hail and sunny intervals. Continuation of the mild weather should remove some of the snow and reduce traffic hazards.

Roads Very Dangerous

The dangerous condition of the roads in Squamish was partly relieved on Wednesday when Empire Mills in co-operation with the Public Works Department spread gravel on the stretch of road between the drug store and the government dock. The road above McRae's corner was also gravelled and portions of the road near the red bridge.

The rain, following the big snow fall has left the roads and sidewalks in a hazardous condition—some of the side roads being covered with glare ice making driving very difficult.

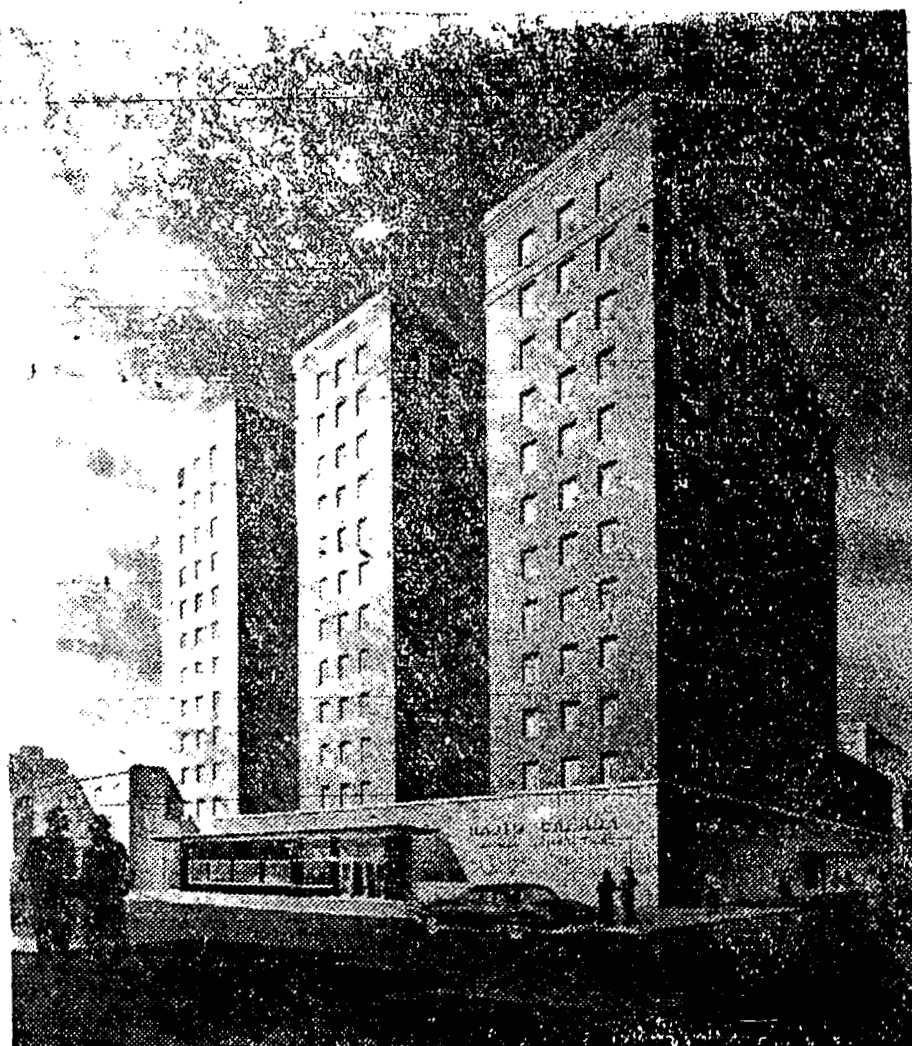

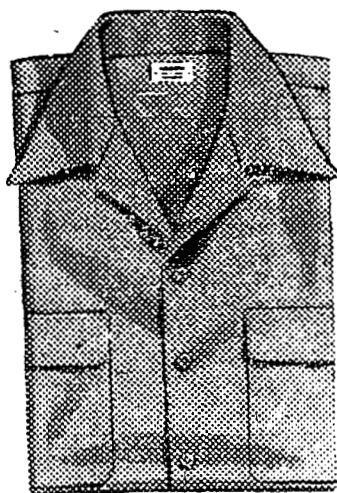
