Mild Weather Speeds Logging

The mild weather has given the logging industry in the valley an early start. B & M, who were logging on the Stawmus are now back at work. They didn't expect to start till next month, but when the snow left so early they started logging last Friday.

Weather permitting, H & W are planning to re-open next Monday. The road to the setting is now being plowed. The Howe Sound are still logging and Empire Mills are doing some road building.

Squamish Towing are concentrating on their road building at Paradise valley. The Mamquam is high and they had to stop logging there.

Rock Slides Delay Passenger Trains

Rock slides in the vicinity of Anderson Lake have delayed rail traffic between Squamish and Lillooet.

Friday's train didn't arrive here until 10 p.m. because of a rock slide at Mile 88. A further slide delayed Sunday's down train, then scheduled to leave Lillooet on Monday afternoon. The slide was expected to be cleared at that time but more rock falls in the same place on Monday afternoon and on Tuesday morning held this train at Lillooet.

Monday afternoon's train left here on time but was held at D'Arcy till the slide was cleared.

The slide was finally cleared by noon on Tuesday and the northbound train left D'Arcy as soon as possible. The southbound train reached Squamish late Tuesday evening and the passengers waited here for the boat on Wednesday afternoon.

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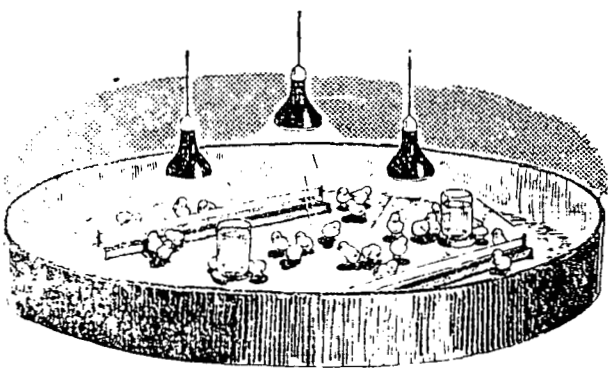

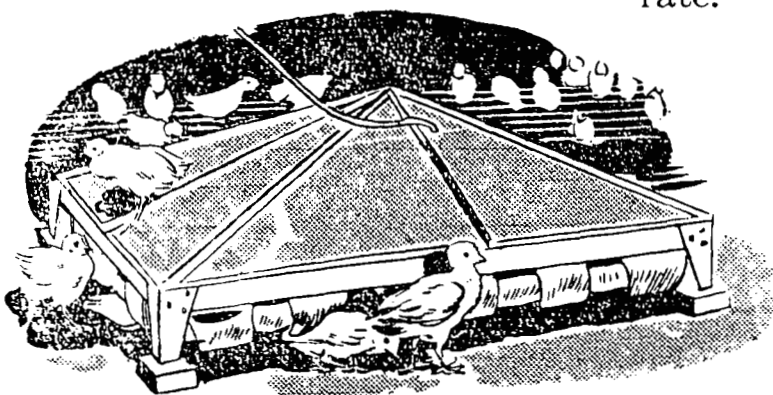

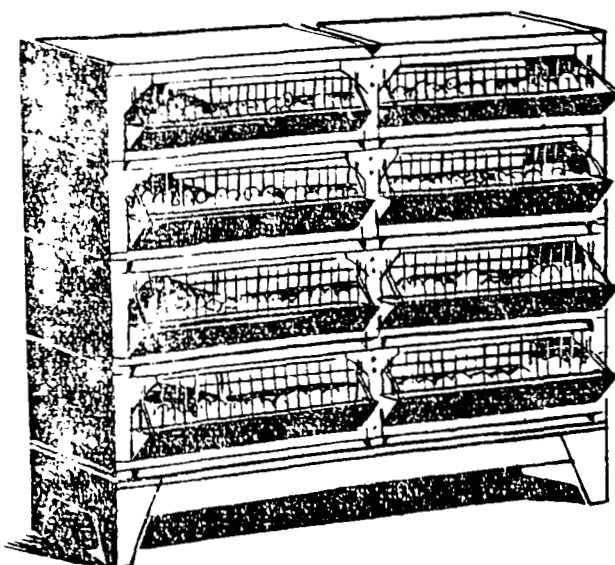

Canada Shows Population Gain

OTTAWA—(CP)—Canada's population topped the 14,000,000 mark as of June 1, 1951, official census figures revealed today.

This represented a 21.8 per cent increase over 1941.

The Bureau of Statistics said final tabulations of last year's census show population for the 10 provinces and the northland's two territories was 14,009,429.
