## TO BUILD NEW FORESTRY OFFICE

A new forestry office and ranger station will be built on the Squamish Britannia highway between the Empire Mills logging road and Indian Lake. Work on the building will start as soon as possible.

Empire Mills are clearing the lot, blasting the stumps and levelling the ground in preparation for construction.

### New Fishing Regulations

The new fishing regulations prohibit the use of fish eggs, and the possession of them by any angler fishing in the Cheakamus River or any of its tributaries.

The new rulings also set the limit for steelhead at two per day.

## Another Nice Sum For Hospital Fund

Saturday night's Klondyke Night was a great success. Bearded miners and dance hall girls along with belles of the nineties, as well as modern folk enjoyed an evening of fun and dancing.

Phoney money was in circulation and the many booths did their best to extract it from the crowd. Prices were really inflated too: coffee at one hundred dollars a cup and photographs at a thousand dollars apiece really were expensive.

A capacity crowd of over four hundred, many of them, in costume, attended and the net result will realize a sizable sum for the hospital. Among the money raised from various items were the coffee table which brought in almost a hundred dollars, a quilt that raised over fifty and the fines for the non-bearded men present which netted over one hundred and twenty five dollars. In addition the various booths all took in considerable sums.

The beard growing contest of course, created the most interest. Jim Leech took the prize for the best one and Mac McCullough the prize for the funniest. Another interesting feature was the gym display by the senior and intermediate boys under coaching of Tor Andreasson.

Reports have it one of the most interesting affairs ever held in Squamish and suggest it should be repeated every year.

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## MORE IMPROVEMENTS TO TELEPHONE SYSTEM

The B.C. Telephone company has announced that a second section of switchboard has been installed in the Squamish exchange to provide facilities for service to many waiting applicants.

The Squamish system had approximately 60 telephones when the B.C. Telephone company took over from the federal government in December, 1949. Today the total is more than 300—made possible after the company had spent approximately \$50,000 rebuilding the system. This project included erection of a new exchange building and installation of new central office and outside plant equipment.

Last December the company installed an additional long distance circuit between Squamish and Vancouver. Squamish exchange is now handling an average of more than 1200 local calls per business day.

## LIBERAL CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE FORMED

At an executive meeting of the Squamish Liberal association last Friday evening, Mr. Wm. O'Kell the Liberal candidate in Lillooet riding asked for a campaign committee to handle his campaign in this end of the riding.

His request was accepted and after the committee was named Mr. O'Kell gave a short address. He wanted it clearly understood that the committee were to make sure that the people of Squamish realised he was there to serve them and that their problems were the ones he intended to carry to Victoria.

This policy is so obviously different from that of former procedure that the committee expressed their delight and assured Mr. O'Kell they would do their utmost to put this information before the people of Squamish.

## CONSERVATIVES CHOOSE CARSON

The Progressive Conservatives at their nominating convention in Lillooet last week named E. C. Carson as their candidate in the provincial election on June 12.

More than forty delegates from all parts of the riding, from Squamish to Clinton, Bridge River, Lytton and Pavilion attended. Mr. Carson and Mr. D. Fulton, Federal MP for Kamloops spoke at the public meeting held in the evening.

 Dear Sir:--

Because there seems to have been some mis-understanding regarding the contagious period for measles, I wonder if the following information could be printed in the next edition of The Advance.

"The period during which measles is contagious extends from approximately four days before the rash appears to five days after appearance of the rash. Although a child is not infectious after this time, it is advisable that the child's activities be curtailed for a further five days to avoid complications arising. As a rule, children recover so rapidly that there is some danger that they may be permitted to do too much before their full strength has returned.

The incubation period for measles is ten to fourteen days therefore contacts of the patient are not-infectious and cannot spread the disease until ten to fourteen days after the date of contact. During this time they are permitted to carry on as usual."

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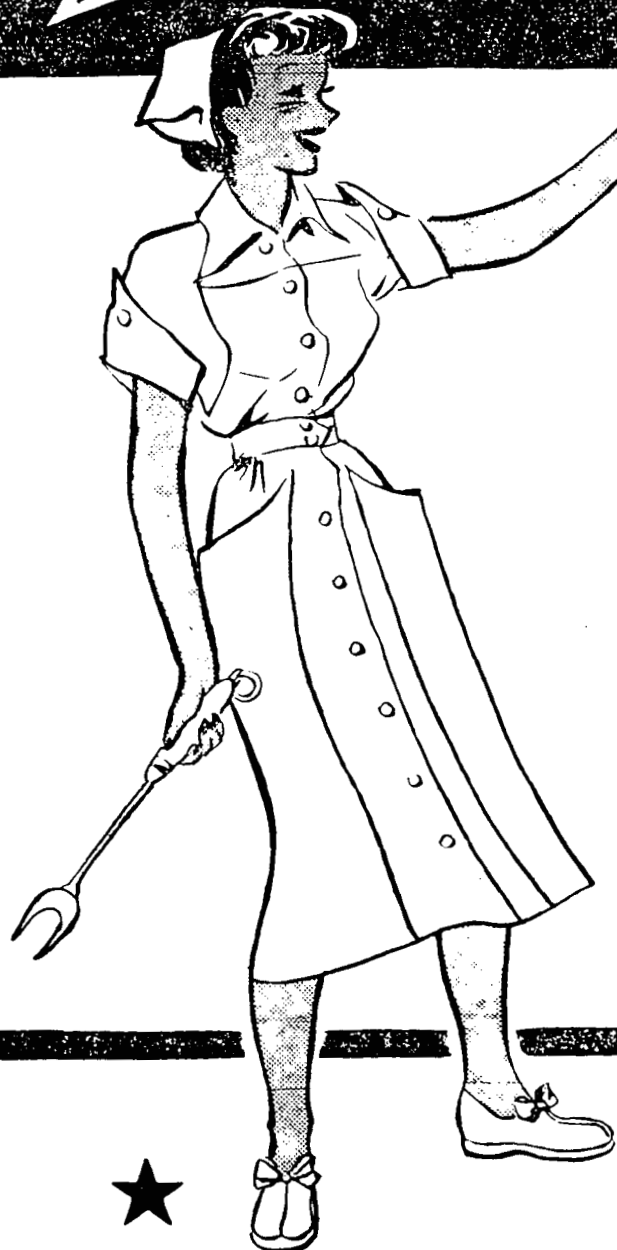

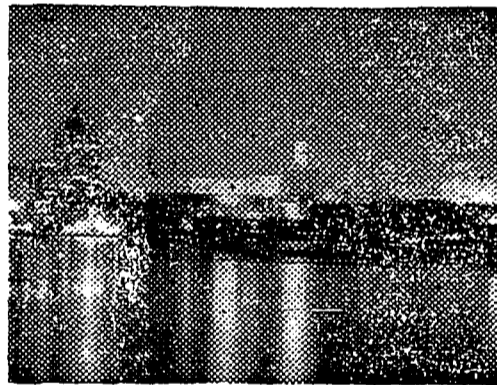
Mr. Martin Neilsen of Gold-bridge, a former candidate in Saanich riding, spoke to the meeting on items of provincial interest.

### Tot Drowns In Slough Near Shops

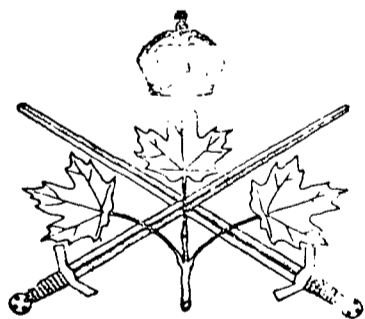
Michael Tinney, the five year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Tinney drowned in a slough near his home at the shops yesterday afternoon.
