Communications

Editor, Squamish Advance, Dear Sir:--

Because there seems to have been some mis-understanding regarding the contagious period for measles, I wonder if the following information could be printed in the next edition of The Advance.

"The period during which measles is contagious extends from approximately four days before the rash appears to five days after appearance of the rash. Although a child is not infectious after this time, it is advisable that the child's activities be curtailed for a further five days to avoid complications arising. As a rûle, children recover so rapidly that there is some danger that they may be permitted to do too much before their full strength has returned.

The incubation period for measles is ten to fourteen days therefore contacts of the patient are not-infectious and cannot spread the disease until ten to fourteen days after the date of contact. During this time they are permitted to carry on as usual."




