In your issue of May 8 there was a letter signed by K. J. Robinson in which he attempted to show that the Squamish to Vancouver highway would be superior to the PGE Squamish to Vancouver link.

It is indeed regretable that ridiculous letters should be answered but fallacious statements and reasoning must be exposed.

Mr. Robinson states that "everyone knows that the offhand estimates of cost ... of the railway have been grossly understated and costs for the improvement of barge service have been grossly exaggerated." Can such a remark be very clever or honest? 'Everyone' does not know and the writer of this letter is one person belonging to the everyone class who refuses to believe that the engineers who estimated the above projects are deliberately trying to hoodwink 'everyone' with gross exaggerations and gross understatements, especially when the cost of barges and tugs is information readily accessible to anyone interested. These gentlemen own little if any property around Squamish and Squamish real estate values would have had little or no influence on their estimates

"A great many people in Squamish know the following facts. Is it possible that Mr. Robinson knew them when he wrote the letter?

1. Prince George and Prince Rupert would be 232 railway miles closer to Vancouver

A difference of over \$16.00 and on last years handling of 15600 cars a saving of close to one quarter of a million dollars. In fact one of B.C.'s weeklies makes out a good case to show a saving of about three quarters of a million dollars in 1953, and all this saving would probably not adversely affect the majority of Squamish real estate values.

3. Average time Vancouver to Lillooet for freight cars:

By barge and tug, 2 days. By rail all the way, 1 day.

There is a charge of from \$1.75 to \$6.50 a day on foreign cars and this two-day reduction could mean a saving from \$25,000 to \$50,000 a year with traffic on the 1551 volume.




