GARIBALDI, ONE OF FINEST MOUNTAIN PARKS ON THE AMERICAN CONTINENT

VICTORIA.—Plans for development of Garibaldi Park as a great playground and scenic wanderland will be pushed ahead rapidly now that the mountain area, close to Vancouver, has been placed under the control of the park and recreation division of the Forest Service.

Hon. R. E. Sommers, minister of lands and forests, announced the formal taking-over by the crown of Garibaldi and Mount Robson parks.

Now that the two parks have been returned to the crown, definite long-range plans for their development may be made and the crown may provide the money to carry these plans into effect.

A trained park man will be placed in Garibaldi Park as soon

as possible to make an intensive examination and close study of not only the terrain but of the flora and fauna and all other features that may be of value in laying down a long-range, progressive scheme of development.

Trail routes to the various places of interest, the camping accommodation, resting place and all possible facilities to open Garibaldi to public access

SUFFERS BROKEN LEG IN SKIING ACCIDENT

Allison Law of Vancouver suffered a broken leg in a skiing accident at Diamond Head chalet last Sunday.

Miss Law was skiing about half a mile from the chalet

when the accident occurred at about 3:30 pm. The snow was fresh and powdery and definitely not fast. Mrs. Norman Mackenzie, wife of the president of UBC, was the first person to reach the injured girl, closely followed by Al Hall.

The Brandvolds contacted Okanagan Airways at about 4:15 pm and Don Poole piloted the helicopter which reached the chalet about an hour later after combatting tricky flying conditions.

The injured girl was taken to hospital in Vancouver.

TRADE BOARD IN REGULAR SESSION

The Board of Trade in its regular meeting last week decided to combine the May 24th celebration and Cornation Day celebrations into one affair to be held June 2.

The revised by-laws received their reading and will be voted on at the next meeting.

The board decided to write letters to the parties involved endorsing these requests.

A letter regarding drivers tests which will be held here this year was read, and there will be further information on this later.

The board voted a donation to the Boy Scout group and also decided to allot twenty-five dollars for a display at the Sportmen's Show in Vancouver next month. They also planned to suggest that interested groups also send displays to this event.

PTA IS VERY ACTIVE IN SQUAMISH SCHOOLS

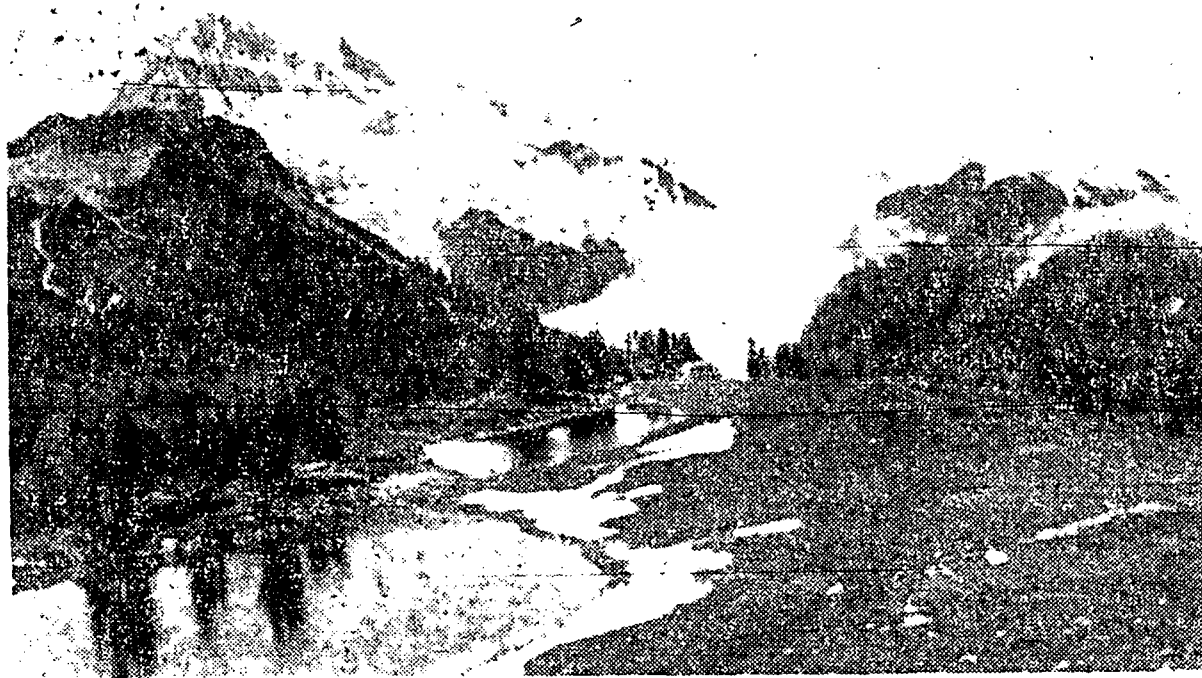
The PTA held their regular meeting last Wednesday, April 1, and heard reports from the various committees.

HOSPITAL GIVES YEAR'S REPORT

The Squamish General Hospital has released the figures stating the number of patients and use of hospital facilities to Dec. 31, 1952.

There were two hundred and seventy-eight adult patients in the hospital since May and thirty babies were born there during that time. There were twelve hundred and twenty three laboratory tests and one hundred and eighty three X-rays taken in those eight months.

Blood transfusions given numbered twenty, eighteen using Red Cross blood plasma, and two with local donors. The adult patients' average stay in hospital was 9.5 days, for babies, 4.5 days.

Ivan Smith said that people both in Squamish, and particularly throughout the district from Pemberton to Britannia are using the hospital and its facilities more and more as time goes on. He felt that the hospital had particularly proved that it was needed during last fall's polio epidemic.

Hon. Eric Martin, Minister of Health, and Railways Minister Chetwynd toured the hospital yesterday afternoon when they passed through Squamish on their way north. The Health Minister said he considered this a very well-equipped hospital for its size and the short time it had been operating.

The hospital, in the year it has been operating, has saved the people of Squamish and the surrounding district a considerable amount of money, by removing the need for cost-
