Empire Mills For 1953 Essay Contest

Mr. R. Chapman presented the prizes at the graduation ceremonies, and in addition to their cash prizes, the five top winners each received a book on trees, given by the Canadian Forestry Association.

Excerpts from the judges' reports were read commending Miss McCormack and Miss Farquharson for the amount of research done and their approach to the subject. Ellen's essay was also said to be outstanding for one in her grade at school.

Alan Dent presented a spotlight to the school from the graduating class and this was used to good effect during the latter part of the program.

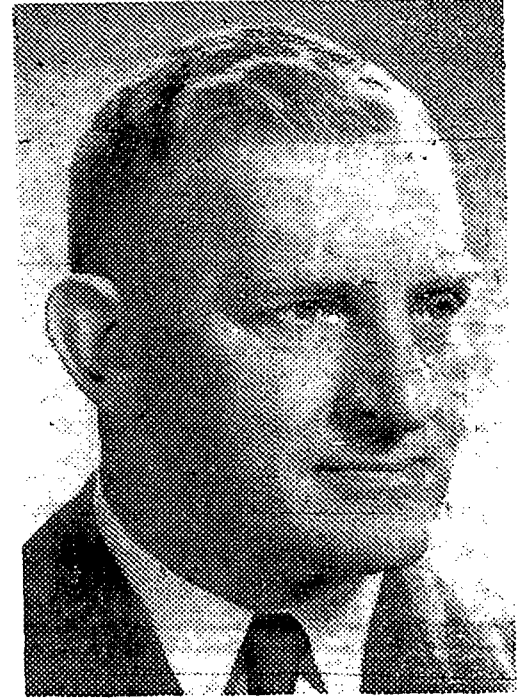

More than sixty children, along with parents and teachers attended and enjoyed the sports and games. Lemonade and ice cream were provided for the children.

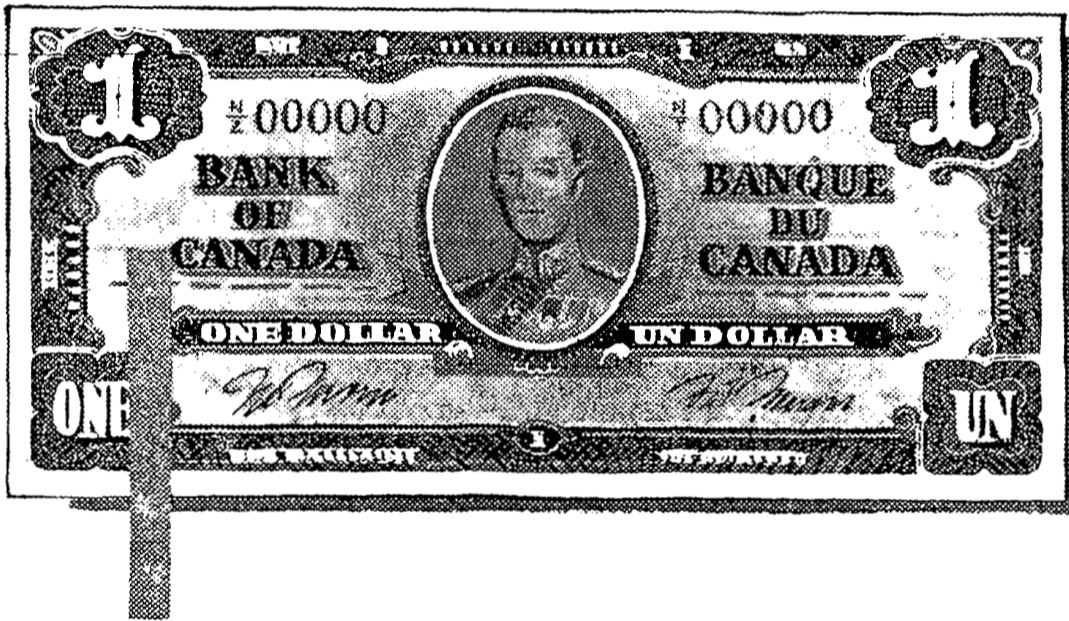
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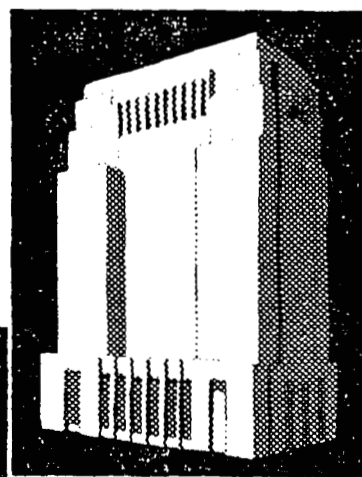
