BUILDING PIER AT BOAT HARBOR

W. Greenlees, a contractor from Vancouver, has a six-man crew here working on the small boat harbor pier and floats.

They are driving piles and most of those for the pier have been driven. Decking of the one hundred and eighty foot long wharf is now being done.

A ramp will then be built down to the floats, which will extend upstream for two hundred and sixty feet, parallel to the shore. Boats will be able to tie up on either side of this float.

STILL WORKING ON HYDRO SURVEY

The B.C. Electric survey crews who are working on the proposed dam-site on the Cheakamus River are still working at Garibaldi. A crew have completed a line survey across the mountains from the Cheakamus to the Squamish rivers and are now working in the Upper Squamish area.

Mr. Fletcher of the Hydraulics department of the B.C. Electric recently made the trip across the mountain between the two rivers.

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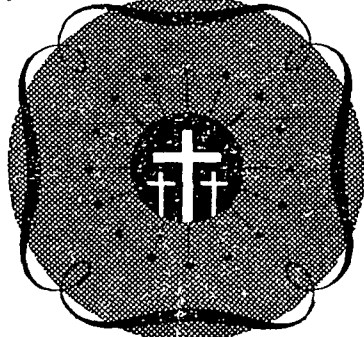
LOCAL FISHING AND HUNTING REPORT
