PREMIER GOES NORTH ON PGE

Premier W. A. C. Bennett, president of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, and a party of seven, which included Mr. Bowman, general manager of the railway, passed through Squamish yesterday on their way up the line.

They made the trip in a special car, "The Cariboo" attached to the regular train, and went through to Prince George. The premier then planned to go over the John Hart highway into the Peace River district.

MAKING CHANGES TO LOG DUMP

Changes are being made to the Squamish Towing's log dump on the old Mamquam River channel. G. M. Behrner is driving piles, on which the guy lines supporting the gin pole, will be anchored. A new gin pole will be raised.

The company, which has been concentrating on logging along the river during the past few weeks, will start trucking logs again by the end of this week. At present they are taking advantage of the water and towing logs down the Squamish River.

ZONING PLAN FOR SQUAMISH

The commissioners have been working on a "Community Plan and Zoning By-law" for the village, and a copy of the plan may be seen at the village office. At the village meeting next Tuesday evening any person who feels this bylaw will affect him, will be granted a hearing.

The plan designates certain areas of the village as residential, industrial or business, and if it is passed, all future building in these designated areas will have to conform to the plan.

A delegation from the Retail Merchants Association attended the village meeting on Tuesday evening regarding a 'Shops Closing Regulation By-law'. This by-law would establish the closing periods for various types of local businesses.

JUDGES NAMED FOR FALL FAIR

Plans for the seventh annual Fall Fair, to be held in the Community hall on Labor Day, September 6th, are well under way. Gordon Gibson, MLA for Lillooet, will officially open the Fair at 2 p.m.

Judges have been secured for most of the sections in the Fair. Mr. G. Thorpe, District Agriculturist of New Westminster will judge the vegetables, fruit and dairy produce. Mrs. Florence Craigie of the B.C. Gardener's Council, will judge the flowers, as she has done for the past few years and Mrs. Winnie McLearn of the Daily Province Modern Kitchen staff will do the judging in the cooking and canning sections.

Many attractive prizes have been donated and the committee is busy allocating them. In the knitting classes, Mary Maxim has offered special prizes for sweaters knit from heavy wool for both adults and children. Other special cash prizes are offered in the cooking section. The prize lists have been printed and can be obtained at the Advance office. A supplementary sheet, listing the special prizes will be issued the week before the Fair.

A feature of this year's Fair will be the section devoted to riding and horses. The Riding Club is co-operating to make this part of the day's program particularly attractive and ribbons will be presented to the prize winners during the evening. A children's sports day will be held during the afternoon.

There will be a dance on the Friday evening preceding the Fair and another one on the night of the Fair. The first will be held in the Community hall and the latter in the Parish hall.

Despite the weather, which has held back some of the garden produce, the indications point to a bigger and better Fair.

NORTH END OF ROAD PAVED

The long awaited black-topping of Cleveland Avenue and Government Road from the dock to Buckley's Crossing is nearing completion.

The northern portion of the road has been completed, from Cowdell's corner to Beckley's Crossing, and a short stretch of Pemberton Road on either side of Cleveland Avenue was also done.

The workmen are now busy on the stretch from Victoria Street to the wharf and it will probably be done by the end of the week. Adanac Construction Co. of Vancouver is doing the job.

New traffic signs, limiting speeds on the black-topping to fifteen miles an hour, have been installed, and these will be rigidly enforced. Reason for the speed limit is that the paving is a "slow-cure" type which will require about three months to set properly. High speeds on the road, especially on the curves, will crack the paving and eventually leave potholes. Sudden starts and quick application of brakes will have the same effect. In order to give the pavement a chance to set, and to reduce the danger of damage, it will be necessary for all motorists to obey these speed limits.

Government Road from Cowdell's Crossing to the school was closed on Sunday while the black-topping was done and all traffic was rerouted via River Road. Residents along the road complained about the dust problem created by the heavy traffic and felt that calcium chloride should have been put on the road before the traffic was detoured over it.

CONTRACT LET

The contract for the first seven miles of PGE sub-grade from Squamish to Britannia Beach was awarded to Emil Anderson Construction Co. last week. Einar Gunderson, vice-president of the line, said the tender of \$1,255,567 was the lowest submitted.

Work on the grade is expected to start next week.

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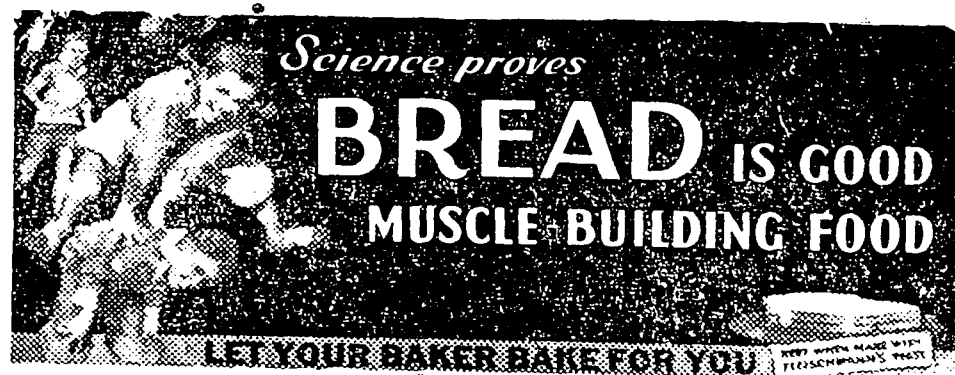

catching fish. Most of the fish were caught on Lucky Louie plugs.

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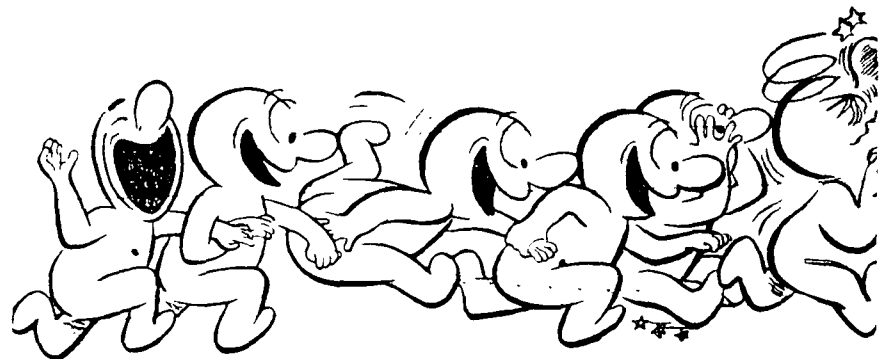

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SNOW DELAYS OPENING OF CHALET

Diamond Head Chalet which was supposed to open last weekend, has been forced to postpone the opening of the summer season until September 1st. Guests who had made reservations for the weekend were turned back and all August reservations were cancelled. Heavy snows on the upper levels has spoiled what would have been the best season in years.

Emil Brandvold, who has just come down from the Chalet said they couldn't take the tractor above the shelter hut in the lower meadows and that there is still some eight to ten feet of snow along the ridges. Suow depth outside the Chalet is approximately four feet and it was so cold the other night that ice was forming on the edges of Elfin Lakes.

They expect to start working on the road to Base Camp this week, using the three thousand dollar grant from the Public Works Dep't for culverts, ditches and general maintenance work.


