



Proclamation of Returning

Province of British Columbia IN LILLOOET ELECTORAL DISTRICT

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given to the electors in the polling divisions listed below, of the Lillooet Electoral District, that I have received Her Majesty's Writ to me directed, and bearing date the 11th day of January, 1955, commanding me to cause the following questions, namely:

Are you in favour of the sale of beer, ale, and stout only under a public-house licence for consumption on licenced premises? *NOTE A public house licence will be similar to the present beer-parlour

B. Are you in favour of the sale of beer, ale, stout, and wipe only under a diningroom licence for consumption with meals on licensed premises.

(NOTE-Dining-room licenses will be granted to hotels, restaurants, clubs, railway-cars, steamships and resorts.) Are you in favour of the sale of liquor under a dining-lounge licence for con-

sumption with meals on licensed premises? (NOTE-Dining-lounge licences will be issued principally to what are commonly known as cabarets, and to clubs.

Are you in favour of the sale of liquor under a lounge licence for consump (NOTE--Lounge licences will be issued to cocktail-bars. They will be granted

only to clubs, hotels, resorts, railway-cars and steamships.) to be submitted according to the "Liquor-control Plebiscites Act" to the said electors in the polling divisions herein listed; and, further, that in obedience to the said Writ a poll shall be opened at 8 o'clock in the forenoon and shall be closed at 8 o'clock in the afternoon on the 3rd day of February, 1955, for taking and receiv-

Electric Power

Progressive expansion of hydro-electric power facilities, notable during post-war years, was dwarfed by 1954 accomplishments. About 50% increase in developed horsepower over the previous year made 1954 significant by any standards. New generating units of the Aluminum Co. of Canada at Kemano near Kitimat now account for 20% of HP to the Bridge River develthe province's installed capa-

city.

Metallurgical and chemical plants of Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. of Canada in the Kootenays still account for the largest share of electrical installations, being 32% of the whole, and scene of the newly completed Waneta Dam with its first stage 210,000 HP installation.

The B.C. Electric Company added a fourth unit of 62,000 opment. Early in 1955, two bell River.—B.C. NewsLetter. or so.



CHEAKAMUS

FOR BUSINESS MOVING TO B. C. work has started on the Cheakamus Power Development in the rugged country 50 miles north of Vancouver, where \$25,000,000 will be spent to make sure there will be plenty of electrical power in the areas served by the B.C. Electric.

The project will involve damming the Cheakamus River and drilling a seven mile tunnel through the mountains to the west, dropping the water 900 feet through penstocks to an automatic generating station on the banks of the Squamish River.

The two new 95,000 horsepower Cheakamus generating units will be the 9th and 10th built by the B. C. Electric since 1948. When they go into operation in 1957, the Company's Mainland hydro generating capacity will have increased from 253,700 horsepower to 915,000 horsepower in 10 years.
