## SCHOOL BOARD NEXT SUNDAY SEEKS PROPERTY IS 'KID'S DAY'

At the last meeting of the Howe Sound School Board, resignations from several teachers were received, Mr. H. Bentley and Mr. R. Charlesworth are leaving the Squamish High School, Mr. Zaichkowski has resigned from the Creekside school Mr. McLennan is leaving Birken, and Mrs. G. M. Guthrie has resigned from Pemberton Superior school.

Mr. J. Thomas has been appointed principal of the Brackendale School and Mrs. Fairbanks will teach there. Mr. Wagner will teach at Alta Lake next year and Mr. Brown will be at Garibaldi. Mr. R. Tinney will teach at the elementary school here.

The board has approved a student accident insurance policy for next year in the high school. A standard fire hydrant will be installed between the schools.

A delegation attended the meeting requesting that Grade 13 be held in Squamish next year. The board regretted that the number of pupils desiring the course was not sufficient to justify the extra class.

Mr. Smith explained the new system of fire drill now practiced in the school. All students are checked off from master lists in the school office instead of the classroom attendance rolls. The pupils can be out, records checked and if necessary the building searched in four minutes.

## OPERATORS AND IWA AGREE CHURCH BURNS LOAN NOTE

The IWA and coast forest operators reached a temporary agreement of a five cent an hour wage increase and a package deal of fringe benefits.

The benefits are believed to include portal to portal pay, fare allowances between hiring point and camp, a medical plan and holiday concessions.

A conciliation board has been meeting with IWA and Forest Industrial Relations, representing the 168 operators since it completed official hearings more than a week ago.

The private talks were continued in the hope of reaching a settlement before submitting a conciliation report without agreement and consequently risking strike action.

Negotiations opted nearly three months ago and twice broke down before a conciliation board was appointed.

The union originally demanded a 10-cent across the board increase, portal pay, fare allowances, medical plan and three additional holidays. Special rates for fallers and buckers and other contract revisions also were included.

## GUARANTEED ANNUAL WAGE

Significance to British Columbia of the Ford strike settlement terms in the United States whereby supplementary unemployment compensation will be paid from a fund set up by industry, may be difficult to appraise for some time. The province is one in which seasonal influences on employment are pronounced. It is probably the least able to support such a policy of all the major industrial provinces of Canada but the one most highly organized and likely to press for action.

It is at once apparent, however, that the settlement in Detroit will greatly affect the trend of organized labor's thinking in Canada. Along with any advantages of sustained purchasing power that may eventuate from such settlements will be a new and strong incentive to hold em-

Congratulatory messages were received from Rev. and Mrs. C. Addyman, Mr. and Mrs. J. Kennedy, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Quick and Rev. and Mrs. R. Henderson.

In recognition of the faithful service Rev. Hewitt had rendered the community, Mr. Valde presented him with a cheque, to be used to buy an easy chair as a gift from the congregation. Refreshments were served by members of the church board.

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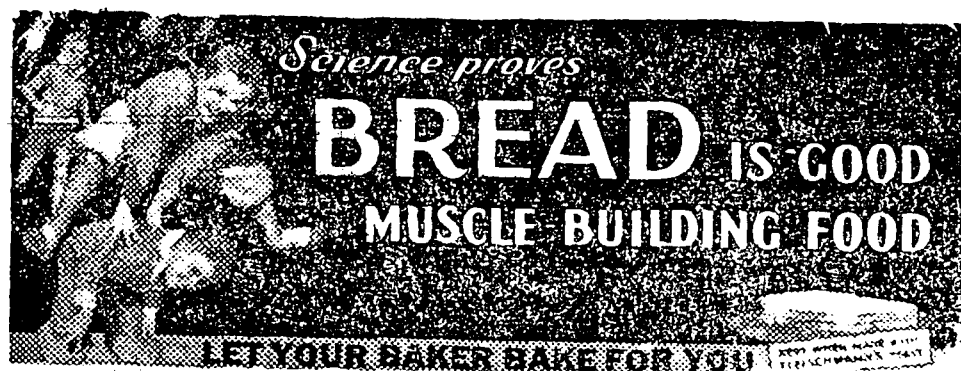

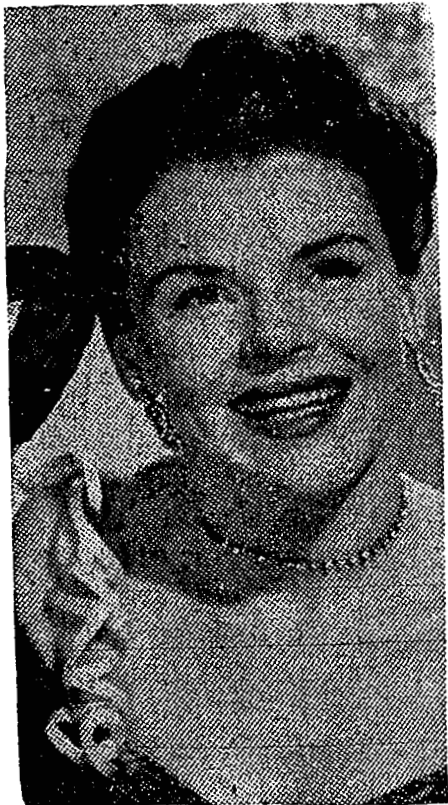
Tickets for this trip will be available early next month.

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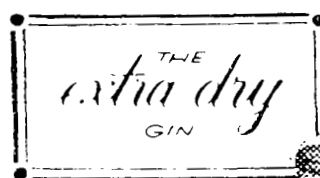
