SALMON DERBY NEXT SUNDAY

The Rod and Gun Club will hold its annual Salmon Derby on Sunday, July 31, starting at daybreak and lasting till 4:30 p.m. the latest hour at which the fish may be weighed in at the small boat harbour.

There are three cash prizes, and a special ladies prize. In addition, a special prize will be added to the first prize if the winner is a member of the club.

G. Aalten won last year's derby with a 28 pound 14 oz. salmon. More than a hundred people entered last year and over thirty fish were caught.

The spring salmon run is beginning here and several large fish have been caught in the past week. M. C. McKay of Britannia Beach caught one weighing 51 pounds, 5 ounces; Johnny Wutzke brought home a 31 pounder and Gerry Dent landed a 26 pound one.

ANOTHER POWER PROJECT?

B.C. Engineering is preparing to do some work in upper reaches of the Squamish river presumably in the Elaho area. A Bristol helicopter will be working between the end of the government road in the Upper Squamish valley and the above area for about two months.

Squamish Towing and Contracting Co. has cleared an area suitable for a helicopter landing base at the end of the road and the aircraft will be making daily trips up the river. Boyle's Bros. will do the drilling and will have five men working there. The aircraft is expected to arrive this week.

SCOUTS ENJOY CAMPING TRIP

Fifty Boy Scouts, tired but happy, returned to Squamish late Monday afternoon from a camping trip at Pear Lake. During the trip, in which they enjoyed perfect weather, except for a thunderstorm the day after they arrived, the boys had hiked, fished and swum, as well as learned a great deal about camp-life.

Members of the Britannia, Mount Sheer and Squamish troops made a trip down the Fraser Canyon to the abandoned Big Slide mine, and some of them hiked to the top of Pavilion Mountain. Six of the boys made overnight hikes to this spot, trying for one of their badges. While on the trip, Fred Behner qualified as a First Class Scout, the first local boy to achieve this.

District Commissioner Les Hobby of Woodfibre attended the camp for one day and arranged a Camporee competition between the four troops in which the boys competed in camp cleanliness, starting fires and boiling water, cooking meals and washing up, and other forms of Scout activity. On the last evening in camp they all met around the campfire, and the boys entertained each other with skits and a sing-song. At this time the Lions Patrol was presented with a camp cooking outfit for making the most points of either Spuamish patrol during the past year. Scoutmaster C. Tatlow presented Jim Antosh with an award for being the most co-operative Scout during the past three years.

The boys broke camp on Saturday and hiked to Kelly Lake to catch the train early next morning, only to discover that it would be late due to a wash-out at Quesnel. However their coach and box-car were waiting at the siding and on Sunday afternoon they were taken to Lillooet by a passing freight train. This was a highlight of the trip and the boys enjoyed the views of the Fraser canyon. They stayed overnight in Lillooet and finally arrived in Squamish late Monday afternoon behind a freight train, as the southbound passenger was still delayed and didn't arrive till Tuesday afternoon.

FIRE MENACES PGE OIL TANKS

A raging grass fire threatened the PGE oil storage tanks here on Thursday afternoon of last week before it was put out with boiling water piped from a steam locomotive.

The fire ate its way through the tinder-dry grass to within a thousand feet of the forty foot high tanks at the railway's oil storage depot before being brought under control.

The Squamish volunteer fire department was called to the scene but the hoses couldn't reach the blaze from the nearest fire hydrant, so a steam engine was quickly shunted to the scene and pressured live steam from its storage tank and extinguished the fire in twenty minutes.

PGE officials said they would have had a 'bad' fire on their hands if a light wind, which slowed the flames' advance, had not been blowing.

Before it was halted the fire covered a 450-foot area and had eaten its way to an oil-soaked section of ground near the tank. Cause of the blaze has not been determined.

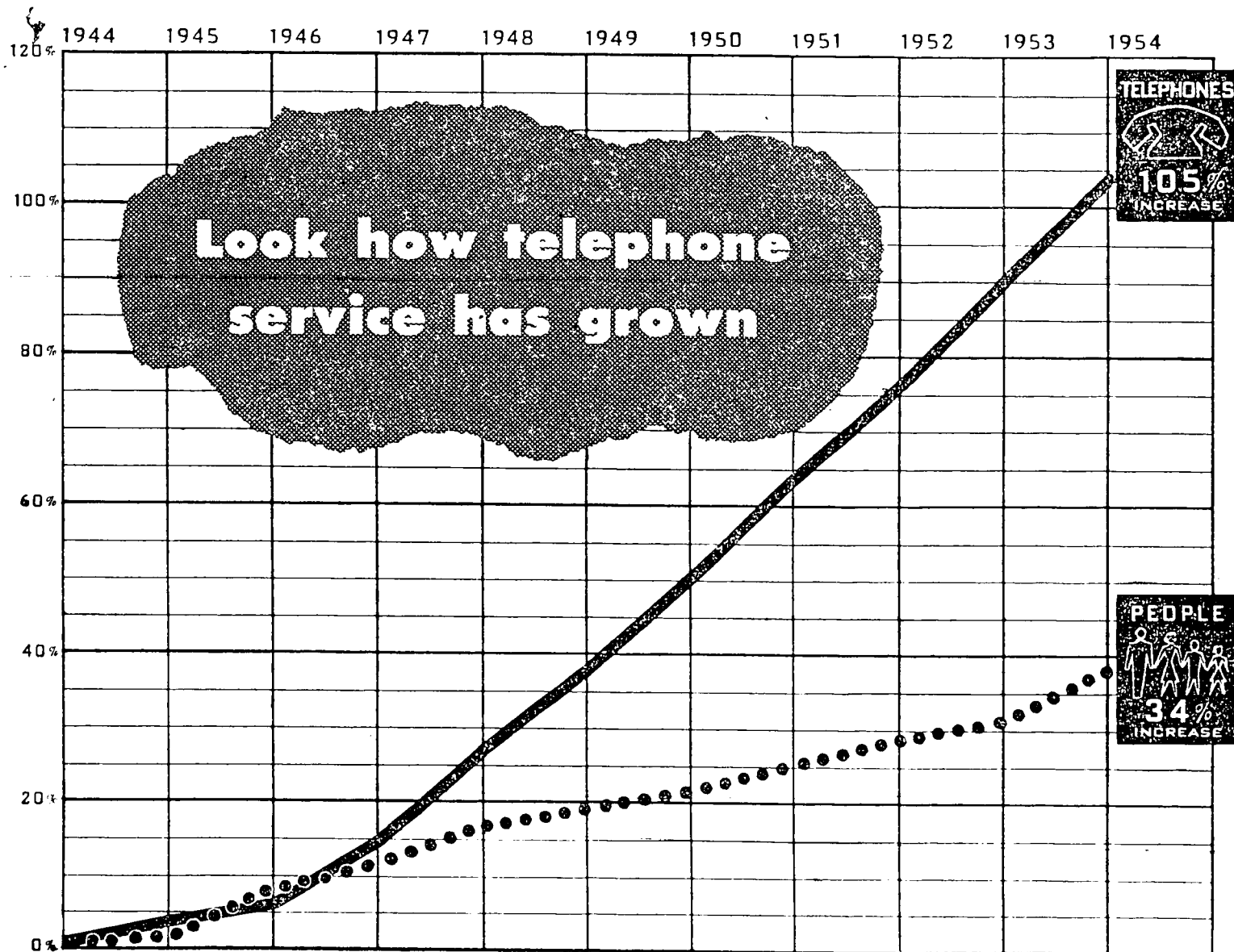

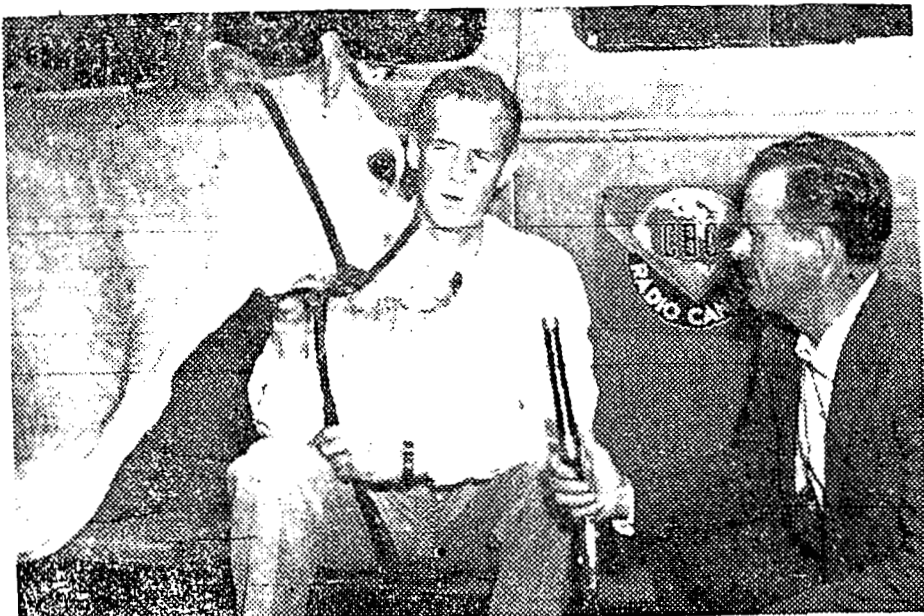

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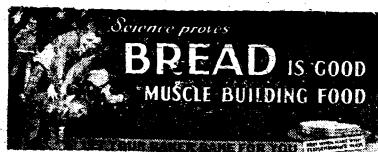
