FIRE MENACES PGE OIL TANKS ...

A raging grass fire threatened the PGE oil storage tanks here on Thursday afternoon of last week before it was put out with boiling water piped from a steam locomotive.

The fire ate its way through the tinder-dry grass to within foot high tanks at the railway's oil storage depot before being brought under control.

The Squamish volunteer fire department was called to the scene but the hoses couldn't reach the blaze from the nearest fire hydrant, so a steam engine was quickly shunted to the scene and pressured live steam from its storage tank and extinguished the fire in twenty minutes.

PGE officials said they would have had a 'bad' fire on their hands if a light wind, which slowed the flames' advance, had not been blowing.

Before it mas halted the fire covered a 450-foot area and soaked section of ground near the tank. Cause of the blaze has not been determined.


