## BY-ELECTION ON SEPTEMBER 12

Provincial Secretary Black announced yesterday that the by-election would be held in Lillooet riding on Monday, September 12. Two candidates have already been nominated to contest the election, Don Robinson, Social Credit; and Jack Thomas, CCF. The Liberals will hold their nominating convention here next week on Friday, August 19.

The voters list will close at 5 p.m. on Thursday, August 18, and the local registrar is H. H. Bailey. Nineteen year olds are eligible to vote in this election.

The campaign gets under way in Squamish to-night with a Social Credit meeting in the Parish hall. Mr. Thomas and Frank Howard are now visiting the north end of the riding.

## HINTS FOR FALL FAIR EXHIBITORS

Here are some suggestions for those who will be entering exhibits in the Fall Fair on Labor Day. If you intend to show fruit or vegetables whatever the variety, see that they are fresh, firm, unblemished, clean and true to type. Where several of a variety are called for, be sure of their uniformity. Apples are polished but plums are not. Tender fruits must be handled very carefully to prevent bruising.

Flowers need a great deal of care. The stems should be diagonally cut the night before and kept in a cool place in deep water. Roses should be dethorned. Flowers

## PROGRESS MADE ON PGE TUNNEL

Northwood Construction Co. of Vancouver is sub-contracting the tunnelling on the PGE road bed from Squamish to Furry Creek, from Emil Anderson Const. Co. They are working on a six hundred foot tunnel north of Britannia Beach. The tunnel is sixteen feet wide, twenty six and a half feet high and six hundred feet long and is situated just below the high rock cut on the highway. A thirty five man crew is working on the project.

Four other tunnels will be built between Squamish and Furry Creek. The longest, a sixteen hundred foot one, is at Furry Creek and another one, two hundred and fifty feet long, is just north of this. The remaining two lie between Shannon Bay and the one now under construction. One is two hundred and fifty feet long, the other, six hundred feet long.

Mr. W. J. Grieve, superintendent of the project, says that the work is progressing favorably.

## SOCREDS CHOOSE DON ROBINSON

Donald Robinson, a 36 year old engineer from Squamish was chosen at a Social Credit nominating convention in Lillooet Saturday August 6th to contest this riding in the forthcoming by-election. He won the nomination on the first vote, defeating Len Bjorkman of Mount Sheer and J. A. Kennedy.

Premier W. A. C. Bennett, who attended the convention, indicated that he would announce the date of the by-election sometime this week.

Seventy-three delegates attended and heard the premier speak at length on the PGE extension to the Peace River and on the extensive hydro projects being developed in this area. He also stated that the provincial debt had been reduced by six and a half million dollars in the past three years.

Noel Murphy, president of the Social Credit League, conducted the meeting and complimented the delegates, saying it was the greatest turnout he had seen at a convention in a long time. Mrs. Evelyn M. Fingarson, vice-president of the league spoke to the ladies. Hon. R. Chetwynd, minister of railways was also present.

Six delegates attended from Squamish, seven from Brackendale and three from Mount Sheer. Squamish delegates were G. Aalten, H. H. Bailey, R. Chapman, C. V. Long and Mr. and Mrs. Reiderer. Attending from Brackendale were Mrs. G. Lipsey, W. Loren, P. Mahoney, L. A. Moule, Mrs. D. Robinson, Clayton Thorne and M. Zack. Other Squamish people at the convention were Mrs. R. Chapman, G. Lipsey, K. Richardson.

Following the convention an executive council was selected for the Lillooet constituency. This will consist of Terry Campbell, Clinton, president; L. Bjorkman, Mount Sheer, 1st vice-president; W. Pascal, Creekside, 2nd vice-president; J. Auld, Shalalth, 3rd vice-president and Paul Sharron, Cache Creek, sec.-treas., as well as the presidents and secretaries of all Social Credit groups in the riding.

## ANDERSON TO BUILD BCE DAM

Emil Anderson Construction Co. has been awarded the Daisy Lake dam in the Cheakamus River, was recently announced by Jack Steede chief engineer of B. C. Electric.

Contract price, one of four submitted, was \$2,438,355.50. Job involves construction of a 500,000 cubic yard earth and rock fill dam, 2000 feet long and 90 feet high, together with a 3000 foot long diversion channel and a tunnel intake.

Dam will be a major component of the 190,000 h.p. Cheakamus hydro project, which got underway at the end of 1954 and is scheduled for completion in 1957.

Situated 23 miles north of Squamish, the dam will back up waters of the Cheakamus River to combine Daisy Lake and the surrounding low-lying swamp land into one storage basin covering 1,060 acres.

Jobs for some 175 men will be created by the contract at peak of construction, and Mr. Steede said work will get underway within 10 days. First step will be to build work camps and bring in bulldozers, trucks and other earth-moving equipment.

It was the second construction contract to be let in the \$25,000,000 project.

First contract was awarded to Mannix Construction Co. to drive a six mile tunnel connecting the Cheakamus with the Squamish River. Over one mile of tunnel has been driven to date, Mr. Steede reported.

Contract for construction of a powerhouse at the Squamish end of the tunnel will be let before next spring, Mr. Steede said.

This will house two 95,000 h.p. turbines—largest machines yet installed in the B. C. Electric system.

A 14-mile-long transmission line carrying power at 230,000 volts, will transmit power from the station to the Bridge River circuit at Cheekeye for delivery to Vancouver.

The plant will be entirely automatic and will be controlled by carrier impulses from B. C. Electric's load control centre in Vancouver.

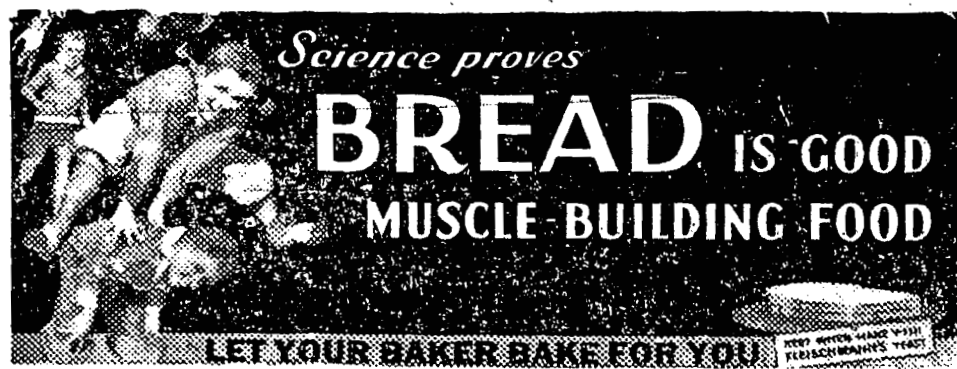

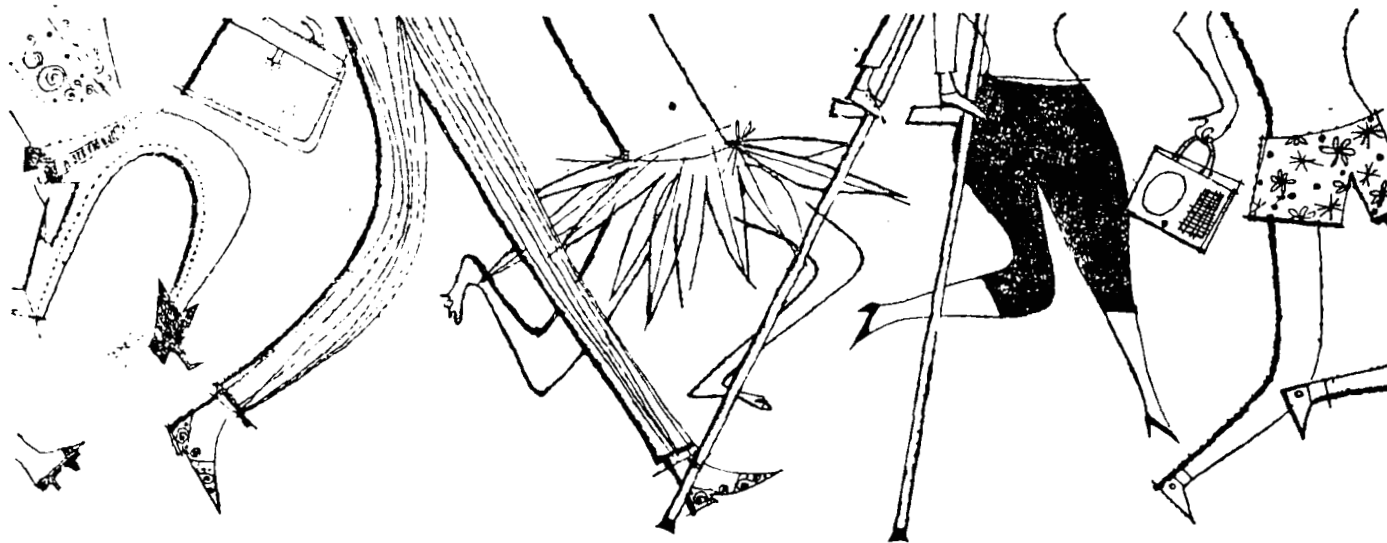

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## VILLAGE BOUNDARIES

The plans for the waterfront boundaries of the village of Squamish, to clear up some confusion regarding high water marks, and to make and to create a clearer boundary, has caused some confusion in other ways. The village will still comprise the original area, plus the former North Squamish Light District and the area on the west side of the Red Bridge which was added about two years ago. There is no foundation to the reports that it will be including the portion known as the hospital hill.
