BY-ELECTION NEXT MONDAY

With the election scheduled for next Monday, Sept 12, the campaign is moving into high gear this week. Meetings have been scheduled for the last three evenings of this week.

DRY SPELL CLOSES FORESTS

The unexpected warm temperatures last weekend have resulted in a complete forest closure in the Vancouver district. This prohibits all logging, fishing, hunting, hiking, etc., and will remain in effect until the weather breaks and a rain results. The closure became effective at midnight on Monday, Sept. 5.

A high temperature of 90 degrees on Sunday was followed by 87 degrees Monday, and at present there are no indications of a break in the weather. The warm spell followed an unusually dry August in which only .65 inches of rain fell and .6 of this was on Friday, August 19. The highest temperature in August was 81 degrees on the 29 and the lowest 40 degrees on the 13. The month's rainfall brings the year's total to 41.35 inches, well below last year's.

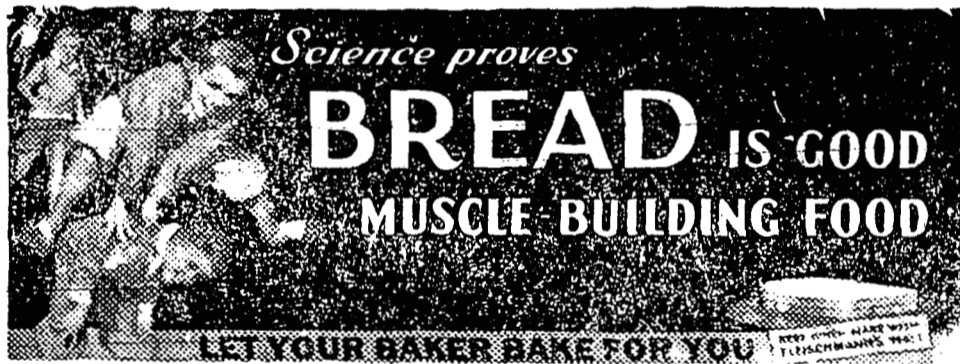

BONNER SPEAKS AT MEETING

Hon. R. A. Bonner, Attorney-General, spoke here last week in support of Don Robinson, Social Credit candidate for the coming by election. He said that all contracts for the PGE's southern extension had been let and that the government expedited to build it within the estimated ten and a half million dollars.

Speaking on government policy he said that "our basic object of is to provide access throught the province by means of roads, rail bridges and public buidings When the Squamish-Vancouver road is completed it is the interest of this government to carry it on to Pemberton. We are pro-

viding access by rail, and it is my hope that we shall do it by road as well."

He charged Gibson with resigning, not because of forest management policy but because he had made charges against the government which were not supported before the Sloan Commission.

Don Robinson spoke briefly and said that he would support a federal-provincial health insurance program.

Railways minister Ralph Chetwynd and J. A. Kennedy also spoke in support of Mr. Robinson.

At a meeting in Brackendale the following evening, Mr. Bonner said that "because of

its financial stability the Social Credit government could pay for roads faster than the contractors could build them and the engineers could plan them.

Mr. Robinson said that the road to Vancouver would be completed in eighteen months. He also said that he was opposed to strikes as long as we

have men like Sloan and Haloran to go to for advice.

Herbert Bruch, MLA for Esquimalt, spoke on forest management policy. He said that it was impossible for the small logger to operate on the West Coast of Vancouver Island as it costs between ten and fifteen thousand dollars a mile to build logging roads.

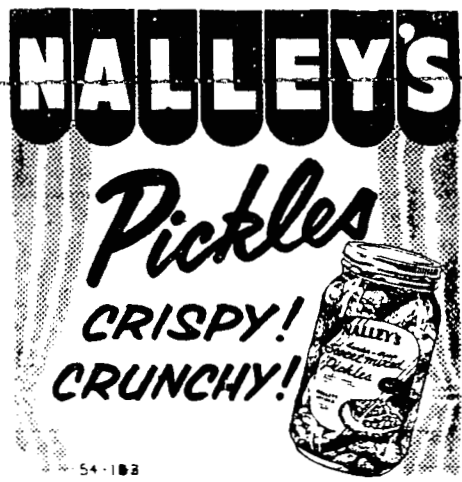
