### INJURED MAN FLOWN TO CITY

Ronald Simpson, aged 28, an Construction Co. was injured in an accident on the railway, that it is officially recognized tannia Road between 7:15 a.m. grade just south of Squamish at 8:50 on Monday morning.

Simpson, who is a dumpster operator, was working on the grade near the Indian Reserve. Two 'mules' were stuck and one was trying to pull the other out when its brakes failed and Simpson, who was trying to hook a chain between the two vehicles, was pinned between them.

He suffered a fractured pelvis, severe lacerations and possible internal injuries. He was taken to hospital here for emergency treatment and then flown to hospital in Vancouver. At latest reports his condition was better than had been expected.

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
