## INJURED MAN FLOWN TO CITY

Ronald Simpson, aged 28, an employee of Emil Anderson Construction Co. was injured in an accident on the railway grade just south of Squamish at 8:50 on Monday morning.

Simpson, who is a dumpster operator, was working on the grade near the Indian Reserve. Two 'mules' were stuck and one was trying to pull the other out when its brakes failed and Simpson, who was trying to hook a chain between the two vehicles, was pinned between them.

He suffered a fractured pelvis, severe lacerations and possible internal injuries. He was taken to hospital here for emergency treatment and then flown to hospital in Vancouver. At latest reports his condition was better than had been expected.

## PGE Buys Land Along Sound

The PGE has paid \$125,000 for a 2200 acre estate on the shores of Howe Sound for right-of-way and townsite purposes. The land is at Porteau, a few miles south of Britannia Beach.

The purchase was of the Glen Eden Estate and from H. K. Whittler of Seattle.

The purchase was revealed last week after an order-in-council transferred three crown-owned lots from the lands and forests department to the PGE. These lots totaling 119 acres are adjacent to the Glen Eden Estate.

## SCHOOL BUS SCHEDULES

Because of the increased attendance, three school buses are now operating in the Britannia Road between 7:15 a.m. and 9:15 a.m. and from 3:15 p.m. to 5 p.m.

In the morning the first bus leaves Britannia Beach at 7:45 a.m., arriving at the school at 8:10 a.m. The second bus leaves Minaty Bay at 8 a.m., and picks up pupils at the Stawamus Reserve, arriving at school at 8:30. The third bus, which leaves Mt. Sheer at 8 a.m., picks up pupils at the Hospital hill and arrives at school at 8:45 a.m.

Afternoon buses leave the school at 3:15 p.m., 3:30 and 3:45 p.m., with students for Mt. Sheer, Britannia Beach and Minaty Bay respectively.

Two bus runs are made each morning and afternoon to Brackendale. The first bus leaves Brackendale store at 8:30 a.m. arriving at the school at 8:45, and the second leaves Armstrong's corner at 8:40, arriving at the school ten minutes later. Afternoon runs are at 3:10 p.m., to both Armstrong's corner and the Brackendale store.

A total of 112 pupils are brought to Squamish school from Britannia and Mt. Sheer and more are expected. One hundred and nine pupils are coming in from Brackendale and twenty one from the Forestry station, Hospital hill and Stawamus Reserve.

A total of two hundred and forty two pupils are using the school buses.

## Deer Season Opened Last Week

The deer season opened in the Squamish valley last Saturday but, to date no hunters have reported killing any. Several hunters have been successful in getting blue grouse since the season opened.

Fishing is still the popular sport here. Some coho have been caught in the small boat harbor and there have been several good catches of grilse.

Some fishermen have been catching salmon in the rivers but, as yet, the big run has not reached the local streams.

## OFFICIALLY OPEN MUNICIPAL HALL?

The fire equipment has been moved into its new quarters in the municipal hall. A black topped lot for the easier maneuvering of fire equipment has been built beside the hall and also serves as a parking space for cars.

## BAKERY INSTALLS NEW EQUIPMENT

Work is rapidly proceeding on the conversion of the former Squamish general store into the Squamish Bakery. The front portion of the building has been partitioned off with walls of striated plywood to make the store part of the building and a small office. This will completely redecorated before the store opens.

In the rear, large roomy baking quarters house the baking equipment. A new Nicholson oil burning, electrically controlled oven has been installed. This oven has a capacity of 500 loaves per hour. A steamer for raising the bread will also be installed here, and other equipment such as the mixer and slicer, now crowded into the small quarters at the present store will be here. A storeroom for supplies will be at the rear of the building.

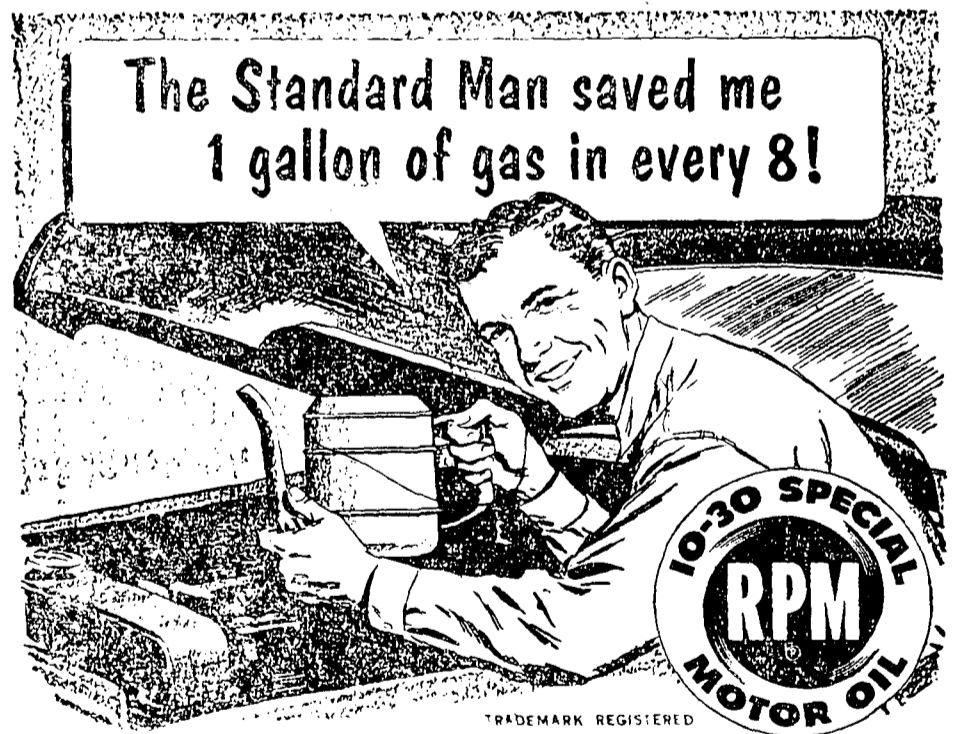

## Britain and British Columbia

Travelling via the new Vancouver-Amsterdam air route via Canadian Pacific Air Lines' new polar route with a single stop at Sondrestrom Fjord, a member of the reporting staff of the British Columbia News Letter recently visited Britain. He was previously there in 1950. Some observations relative to British Columbia are:

1. Although by no means out of the woods, the pound sterling is being given more freedom to move and seek profitable employment.
2. Interest in Western Canada as a field for investment is growing, with some restlessness at what is considered an "unimaginative" attitude by the British Treasury in discouraging investment money export unless it is in "mortgage" type risks rather than in the more speculative but higher return fields of equities.
3. British companies would like to have more funds cleared for investment in natural resource industries in Western Canada.
4. British business men are not looking for early convertibility of the pound, thinking

- it will be a slow process.
5. Recent strikes hurt Britain and may be prophetic of more trouble if drive develops for restoration of wage differentials between skilled and unskilled workers after a long trend towards equalization.
  6. Whereas five years ago many British industrialists said privately they would leave Labor-governed Britain if they could get their money out, to-day morale is high and yet if money were freely convertible, many would hedge against the future by getting funds in the dollar area.
  7. British imports of coal are likely to continue for some

years, helping materially to stiffen freight rate costs on ocean-shipped exports of British Columbia. — B. C. News Letter.

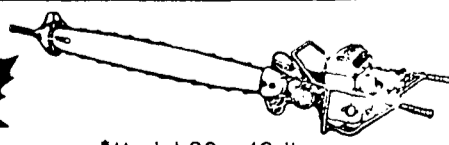
