TWO MEN DIE IN SPEEDER CRASH

Two men died and two were injured last Thursday afternoon when a PGE speeder hit a rock and jumped the track twenty miles south of Prince George.

The dead men are Frank Vi dinic and A. J. Kerr, who had only been working for the It was expected that consid-PGE for about a month. Injured were Gordon Ross, B & B foreman and K. Roman.

The men were members of the B & B crew number 4 and were returning to Red Rock after their days work.

The speeder hit the rock and was flung sideways on the track and the men who were killed were run over by the speeder and the tool car it was towing.

One of the injured men was able to contact railway officials at Prince George with a portable telephone and an ambulance was on the scene within an hour. The injured men were taken to hospital in Prince George and their condition is not serious.

WORK PROCEEDS ON NEW SCHOOL

The new two-room Brackendale school now under construction is rapidly reaching the final stages The building is made of prefabricated panels with windows across the south side. An extension at the rear of the building contains storage rooms, a heating plant and two washrooms. The building has been designed so that two extra rooms may be added when necessary, using the same heating plant.

Exterior work has been com pleted and finishing touches are being given to the interior. As soon as water is available and the electricity is hooked up, the building will be able to be finished. Tile floors will be laid, and painting will be done, both inside and out. The school will be oil-heated.

Trouble has been encountered trying to get water. The well is down fifty seven feet already and there is still no sign of water. It may be necessary to bring in a well drilling crew if water is not reached soon.

Of great interest locally are the proposed changes in the municipal act, which will give village municipalities authority to collect school taxes, which are, at present, paid to Additional changes will have to be made to bring tax due dates together as village taxes are now due by the end of June and school taxes by the end of October. The government will do the assessment work but the village will col lect the taxes.

NEWPORT HOTEL HOLDS OPEN HOUSE


