VLA Plan Sub-division Housing Development For Squamish

\$500,000 Shopping Center For Lions Bay Subdivision

Half a million dollar shopping centre is being planned for the new residential development at Lions Bay, six miles north of Horseshoe Bay on Howe Sound. Construction of the \$10,000,000 development starts immediately.

The project, controlled by Lions Bay Developments Ltd., a group affiliated with Robt. A. Nelson Construction Ltd., will consist of 360 homes located on a 193-acre site.

Engineers for R. A. Nelson Ltd. are presently surveying the area.

Shopping centre will consist of a Super-Valu food market, a service station, cafe and coffee bar, post office, drug store and PGE station.

It is expected that 360 homes will be completed but about 50 ready for occupancy in the first year. Price range for homes is from \$15,000 to \$35,000.

As the community is two miles from West Vancouver boundaries, police services will be provided by Squamish R.C. The townsite.

Maximum population is set at 1350. There will be a volunteer fire brigade setup.

Also on the plans are provisions for a boat basin, motels, wharf, beach club and swimming facilities.

Lions Bay is about 16 miles from Ambleside and both the PGE and Upper Levels Highway will bisect the property.

Mr. Nelson president of the parent construction firm, has had many years in the subdivision business and was one of the principal parties in the Glenmore district. He lives in British Properties.

Public Meeting With Premier Sought by Board of Trade; More Details Needed

Premier W. A. C. Bennett will be asked to attend a public meeting sponsored by the Board of Trade to give the people of Squamish an opportunity to find out first hand where to go from here.

Alarm over the uncertainties of possible dislocation of the present business section of town, was expressed by Bernard Brown, of Yarwood Drugs, at the last meeting of the Board of Trade.

Mr. Brown said that though most of the local businesses were "relatively small potatoes" compared to the pending money deal, their future direction was stymied until details of the development plan announced earlier by Premier Bennett are known.

Bob Lasser, president, asked if this public meeting might not be misconstrued as a political meeting sponsored by the board of trade which is a non-political organization.

He felt that it might be used as such even though that was not the intention of the board.

"After all," he said, "there is an election coming up."

However, the other members of the Board seemed quite calm in the face of such a prospect so Mr. Lasser dropped the subject.

NSF CHEQUE BRING FINE, JAIL TERM; TEST CASE BROUGHT BY LOCAL DEALER

A local man, who had been warned against issuing cheques against a non-existing bank account, was fined \$75 in police court today and a jail term for the time he has served in custody since last Thursday.

This constituted a test case brought by a local dealer who has been plagued with cheques returned N.S.F.

Courts deal harshly with offences of this nature, termed "obtaining goods by false pretenses." It is punishable by fines and jail terms, and usually include both.

The accused had been warned previously to discontinue this practice.

He was given one week to pay the fine.

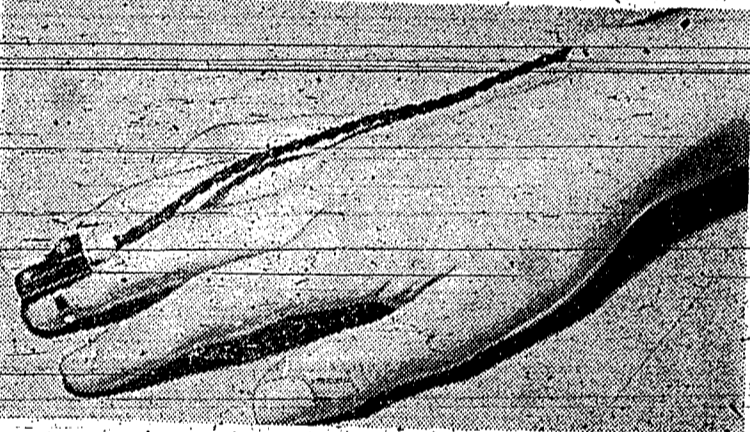

ELECTRONIC EYE FOR THE BLIND



—Central Press Canadian

This experimental gadget, worn on the tip of the finger, is an electronic eye designed by telephone engineers to aid blind operators of private switchboards. It went on trial this week at the Toronto headquarters of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind. At present switchboards are modified for use by blind operators, but if the trial proves successful, operators will be able to use this "phototransistor" device at standard boards.

Sinclair and B. of T. Get Better Mail Service on P.G.E.

The greatly improved mail service to this area, provided now by the P.G.E., is largely the result of two months' effort by three members of the Board of Trade, Bernard Brown, Lloyd Ingraham, A. Jeffries, with James Sinclair, M.P. for Squamish.

Under the present system the second class mail comes up from Vancouver every night and is in the post office in the morning at opening time for sorting.

First class or registered mail comes into the office at noon on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

All outgoing mail in the office by 4 p.m. is in Vancouver the following morning in time for the first delivery. Connections are also made the same morning with eastern air-mail flights.

Mr. Brown said that letters to the chief of postal services in Vancouver and to the P.G.E. seemed to have no effect until a letter was sent to Hon James Sinclair, M.P. (Coast Capital.)

Mr. Sinclair notified the Postmaster General of the unsatisfactory postal service here and it was changed forthwith.

Another Squamish angler, Norm Cowdell, took second prize, a spinning rod, for landing one weighing 13 lbs. 5 1/2 ozs.

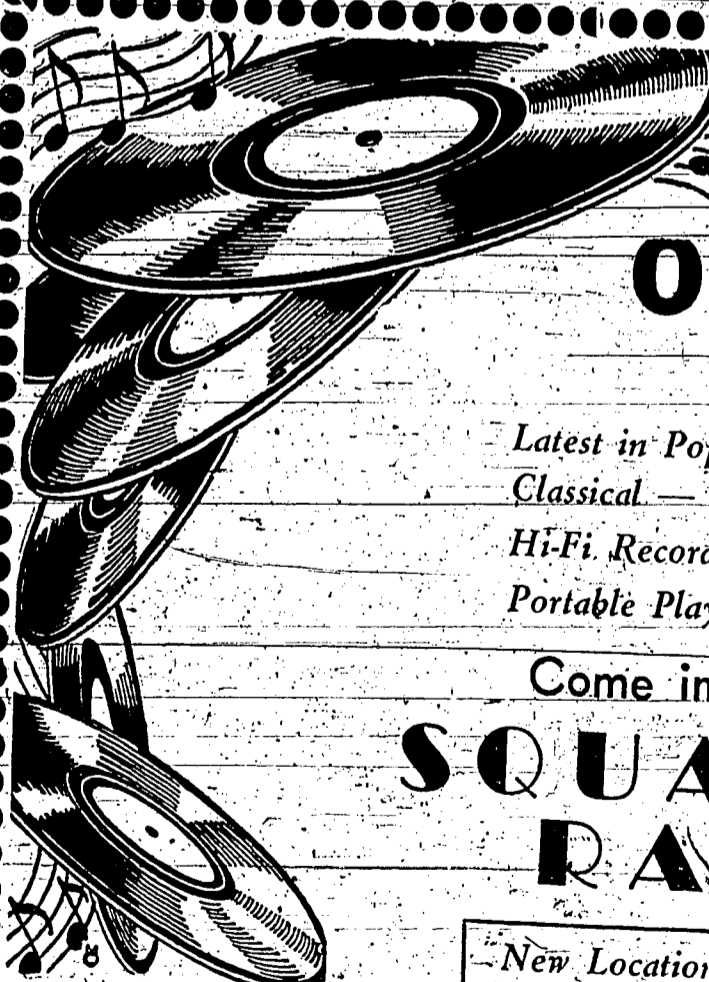
The third prize went to Dave Maw of Vancouver, for two steelhead weighing in at 11 lbs. 6 ozs. and 8 lbs. 7 ozs.

TRAFFIC CONTROL NEEDED FOR BUSY STREETS

More cars and more people on the village streets are causing a traffic problem, according to the Board of Trade.

Cross-walks at the main intersections on Cleveland Avenue was one remedy suggested.

Improper parking, defective lights, and speeding along the paved stretch of Government Road were particular hazards mentioned. These, it was felt, should be corrected by the police force.

Stipendiary magistrate, Ken Richardson, was asked by the president, Bob Lasser, if there had been any noticeable increase in the number of arrests made by the police for traffic offences. Mr. Richardson said he didn't think so, but he thought that the greatest danger existed at the railway crossings.

It was decided to advise the PGE of these danger spots and crossing were extremely difficult to see at night," said Mr.

Richardson. "The crossing at Cheekye was a definite hazard to logging trucks and other heavy transports."

"At Cheekye the railway approaches the crossing at a curve, and even if the driver stopped and checked both ways before proceeding, a speeding train could round the curve and be at the crossing before the truck was clear. The noise of the motor under the increased power necessary to haul the load up the grade at the crossing would drown out the sound of a train whistle," said Mr. Richardson.

A wigwag signal was suggested, and Lloyd Ingraham said the signals now in use consisting of alternately flashing red lights were proving very effective.

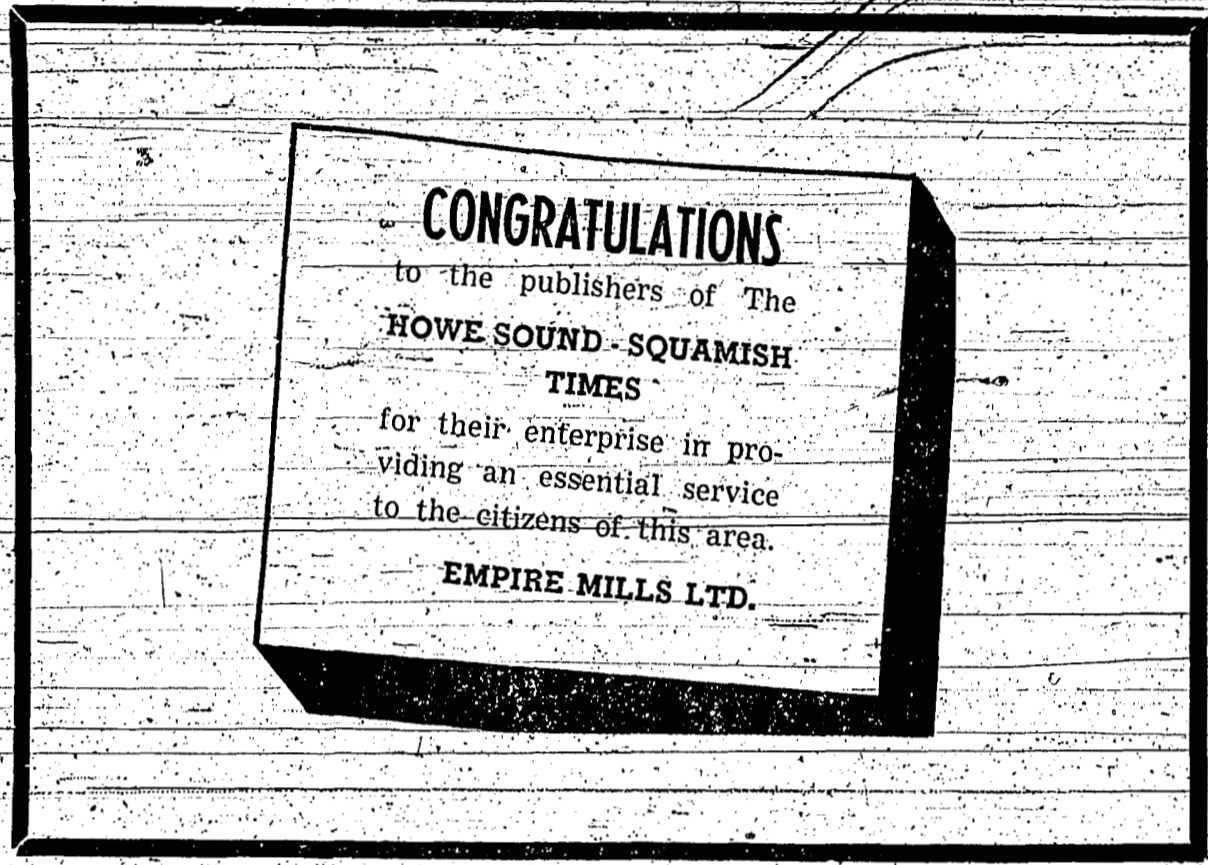

Port revenue from 207 foreign vessels for importations in the last fiscal year was \$400,000 as reported by W. Tinney, Britannia Beach collector of customs and excise for the 3 upper Howe Sound ports of Squamish, Woodfibre and Britannia Beach.
