NSF CHEQUE BRING FINE, JAIL TERM; TEST CASE BROUGHT BY LOCAL DEALER

A local man, who had been warned against issuing cheques against a non-existing bank account, was fined \$75 in police court today and a jail term for the time he has served in custody since last Thursday.

This constituted a test case brought by a local dealer who has been plagued with cheques returned N.S.F.

Courts deal harshly with offences of this nature, termed "obtaining goods by false pretenses." It is punishable by fines and jail terms, and usually include both.

The accused had been warned previously to discontinue this practice.

He was given one week to pay the fine.

Representatives of the Canadian Legion Branches in the Greater Vancouver area will attend a zone meeting at the Squamish and District Branch 115, June 15, 1957.

W. P. Read, secretary, said - There have also been inquiries from Woodfibre, Mt. Sheer and Britannia Beach, from veterans who are interested in the small holdings development planned by the Veterans Land Act for this area.

On Saturday, April 27, 1957, the V.L.A. qualifying committee will be at the Legion Hall

to examine the qualifications of those who have already applied.

A member of the V.L.A. construction staff will also be present to deal with house plans.

The area reserved for this development is in the vicinity of Armstrong's Corners and will accommodate up to 80 veterans. Mr. Read said the size of their holdings would determine the number of residents.

\$500,000 Shopping Center For Lions Bay Subdivision

Half a million dollar shopping centre is being planned for the new residential development at Lions Bay, six miles north of Horseshoe Bay on Howe Sound. Construction of the \$10,000,000.00 development starts immediately.

The project, controlled by Lions Bay Developments Ltd., a group affiliated with Robt. A. Nelson Construction Ltd., will consist of 360 homes located on a 193-acre site.

Engineers for R. A. Nelson Ltd. are presently surveying the area.

Shopping centre will consist of a Super-Valu food market, a service station, cafe and coffee bar, post office, drug store and PGE station.

It is expected that 360 homes will be completed but about 50 ready for occupancy in the first year. Price range for homes is from \$15,000. to \$35,000.

As the community is two miles from West Vancouver boundaries, police services will be provided by Squamish R.C.M.P. Squamish School Board has already approved a school for the townsite.



Marsh Hurren Jr., Government Road, topped the list with a 15 lb. 6 oz. steelhead and picked a pair of hip waders for his prize.

Another Squamish angler, Norm Cowdell, took second prize, a spinning rod, for landing one weighing 13 lbs. 5 1/2 ozs.

The third prize went to Dave Maw of Vancouver, for two steelhead weighing in at 11 lbs. 6 ozs. and 8 lbs. 7 ozs.

The luck of the local "Waltons" in the heavyweight division was shadowed by some happy angling talent from Vancouver. To that city these fishermen took such catches as Bill Barden's 9 lbs. 6 1/2 ozs., Jackie Mitchell's 9 lbs. 4 1/2 ozs. and Gordon Looney's 8 lbs. 6 1/2 ozs.

The unluckiest man on the river, prize-wise, that is, was Eric Anderson of Mt. Sheer. He landed the largest fish of the day, a 16 pounder, but it was a "dirty" fish (one about to spawn or spawning and badly discolored).

But then there was the president of the Squamish Rod and Gun Club, Len Gorsuch of Cheekye Lodge, who fished from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and caught nothing.

TRAFFIC CONTROL NEEDED FOR BUSY STREETS

More cars and more people on the village streets are causing a traffic problem, according to the Board of Trade. Cross-walks at the main intersections on Cleveland Avenue was one remedy suggested.

Improper parking, defective lights, and speeding along the paved stretch of Government Road were particular hazards mentioned. These, it was felt, should be corrected by the police force.

Stipendiary magistrate, Ken Richardson, was asked by the president, Bob Lasser, if there had been any noticeable increase in the number of arrests made by the police for traffic offences. Mr. Richardson said he didn't think so, but he thought that the greatest danger existed at the railway crossings.

"Empty flat cars at Castle's crossing were extremely difficult to see at night," said Mr. Lasser.

It was decided to advise the PGE of these danger spots and urge the company to take remedial action.

Port Revenue

Port revenue from 207 foreign vessels for importations in the last fiscal year was \$400,000 as reported by W. Tinney, Britannia Beach collector of customs and excise for the 3 upper Howe Sound ports of Squamish, Woodfibre and Britannia Beach.

Lumber exports for the same period have been approximately 3 million board feet per week. Shipments of this product will expand, said Mr. Tinney.
