In the recent civic election in our village you chose to re-elect to the Village Council commissioners Antosh and Dr. Kindree. Therefore, the council will remain the same in 1959 as for the last two years.

During the six years that I have served on the council it has been a rare occasion when someone of the people has appeared at council meetings unless he or she came as a petitioner or member of a delegation. This is regretable, as all regular meetings of the council are open to the public. The regular meetings are held on the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of every month from 8 p.m. to 11 p.m.

As the village grows the demand for services grows with it. The work of the council therefore has been increasing steadily over the years. Be assured that the council is keenly interested in finding the best solution to all problems that it has to face; and they are numerous. As far as local improvements are concerned the village has always been on a pay-asyou go basis. So far this policy has been sound, and will be continued. The village owes no money to anyone, and that is a sound position to be in. Compared to many other communities the mill rate is low in Squamish. That too is sound.

It would be nice if you would take more interest in the work of the council in the years to come. I wish-you the very best for Christmas' and the New Year.
