Jury Rules Two Death Accidental: Make Safe

Accidental death in the drowning of Gary Price and John MacDonald Dec. 1 when the car in which they were riding plunged off the end of the Squamish wharf, was the verdict of a coroner's jury, Dec. 17.

The jury recommended certain precautionary measures be taken to warn motorists of the danger.

Reflectors on the bull rails at the edges of the wharf were proposed and a dead end sign at the approach. A speed trap composed of an elevated plank every 50 feet on the approaches to the wharf was also recommended.

If this work could not be done immediately the jury advised closure of the wharf to regular traffic.

Foreman of the jury was Jim Elliott and the coroner was Dr. L. C. Kindree.

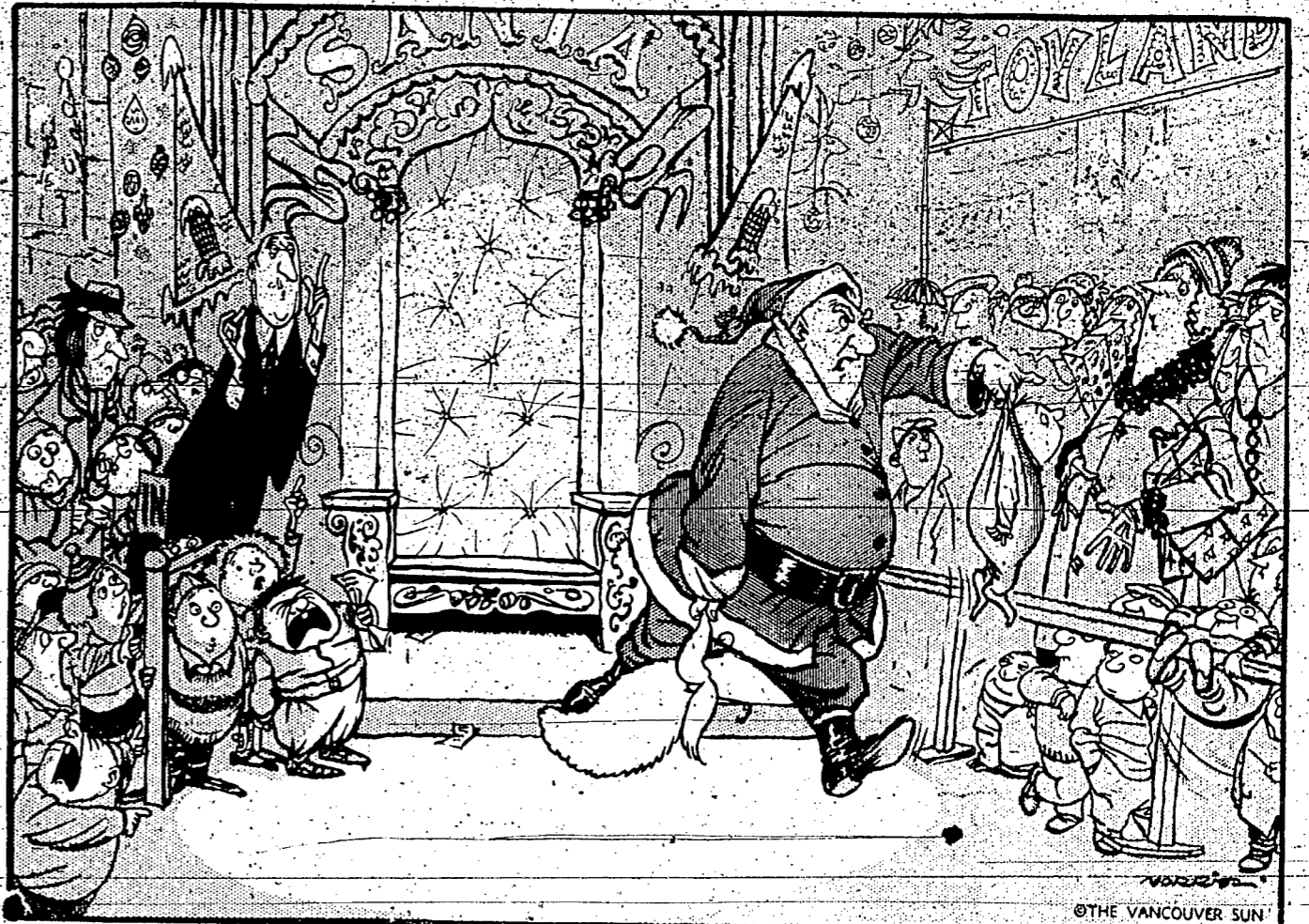
Some hunting was done by two members of the group who had licences.

FEMININE TOUCH

My Christmas cards have all been purchased and are sitting in their pretty boxes waiting for me to sign them and send them on their way. With just a little effort, I could be really early with them this year.

There's just one drawback. If I send out cards early, I can't use my System, which has painfully evolved after many years of trial and error. Sending out Christmas cards is always a major operation at our house, because we have lived in many different parts of the province, and over the years have acquired a long mailing list of friends to remember. And we get a lot of cards. When we finally got tired of seeing them around, I used to stuff them all in a box and put it away somewhere, to be produced in time to make up our mailing list the next season, but this wasn't too satisfactory, as half the time I couldn't find the box again, and the other half the children had found it first. So I got a scribbler and ruled columns for names of friends and their addresses, and scored off Cards Sent, and Cards Received, in a very businesslike manner for a couple of years, but then the scribbler got lost too, and that was the end of that.

Then one Christmas I was so late sending out cards that our cards from friends had all arrived before I got started. We had them lined up across the piano, hanging on ribbons above the bar, toppling down all over the window sills and bookcase. So I gathered them all together, and to every person who had sent us a card, I sent one back.

Thus, quite by chance, the System came into being. Simple, isn't it?

You just wait until every-

body has sent you a card then you send each one a card right back. That way you don't have to worry about forgetting anybody. The System's infallible—that is, almost.

Last year I ran into a slight snag. We had a new neighbor on our street, so I wrote a little note on her card, saying: "Be sure to come in and see us on Christmas Day." Christmas Day came, but not the new neighbor.

Three days after Christmas, when I had forgotten all about it, in she came.

"I would have come sooner," she explained gravely, "but I just got your card in the mail."

It is remarkable, really, that of all the Christmas cards people receive from their friends, seldom are any two alike. I remember one year, however, when it did happen at our house. We were looking over the day's quota of incoming cards, and I passed one to my husband, showing a typical winter scene, snow-laden trees bending over a frozen brook.

Son of Pioneer Settlers

Lawson Rae Dies In His 65th Year

Long time resident of the Squamish Valley and its only farmer, Herbert Lawson Rae, died in Squamish General hospital, December 17, after an illness of several months.

In his 65th year, Mr. Rae was born in the North Yards area of Squamish of pioneer parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Allen Rae, who came to this valley in 1889.

The funeral was held in Squamish United Church, the Rev. N. J. Penrose officiating. Interment followed in Squamish Cemetery at Brackendale.

His wife, Clara Lillian, survives him, and two daughters, Mrs. Jim Riis, Brackendale, and Mrs. Betty Loren of Whalley; and three sons, Herbert of Ashcroft, Donald of Brackendale and David at home.

There is one sister, Mrs. Minnie Armsrong, and five brothers, Wilfred of Keithley Creek; Jimmy and Bert of Vancouver, Ed. and Lawrence of Squamish.

A veteran of the First War, Mr. Rae acquired the property on Judd Road in 1918 and farmed it until his death.

He was a pupil of the first school in the valley which was located where Finter's duplex is now near Armstrong's Corner. With the exception of a

short period in Vancouver Mr. Rae lived all his life in the Squamish-Brackendale district.

A farmer most of his adult life he was active in the Brackendale Farmer's Institute. Dairy farming in recent years, Mr. Rae sold whole milk to local customers. In earlier years he raised beef cattle on the farm.

For some years in the 1920's he was the government road foreman. At the time of his death his farm was the only one in active use as such in the valley.

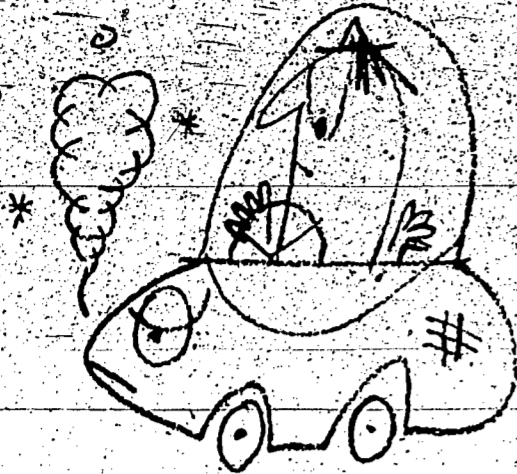

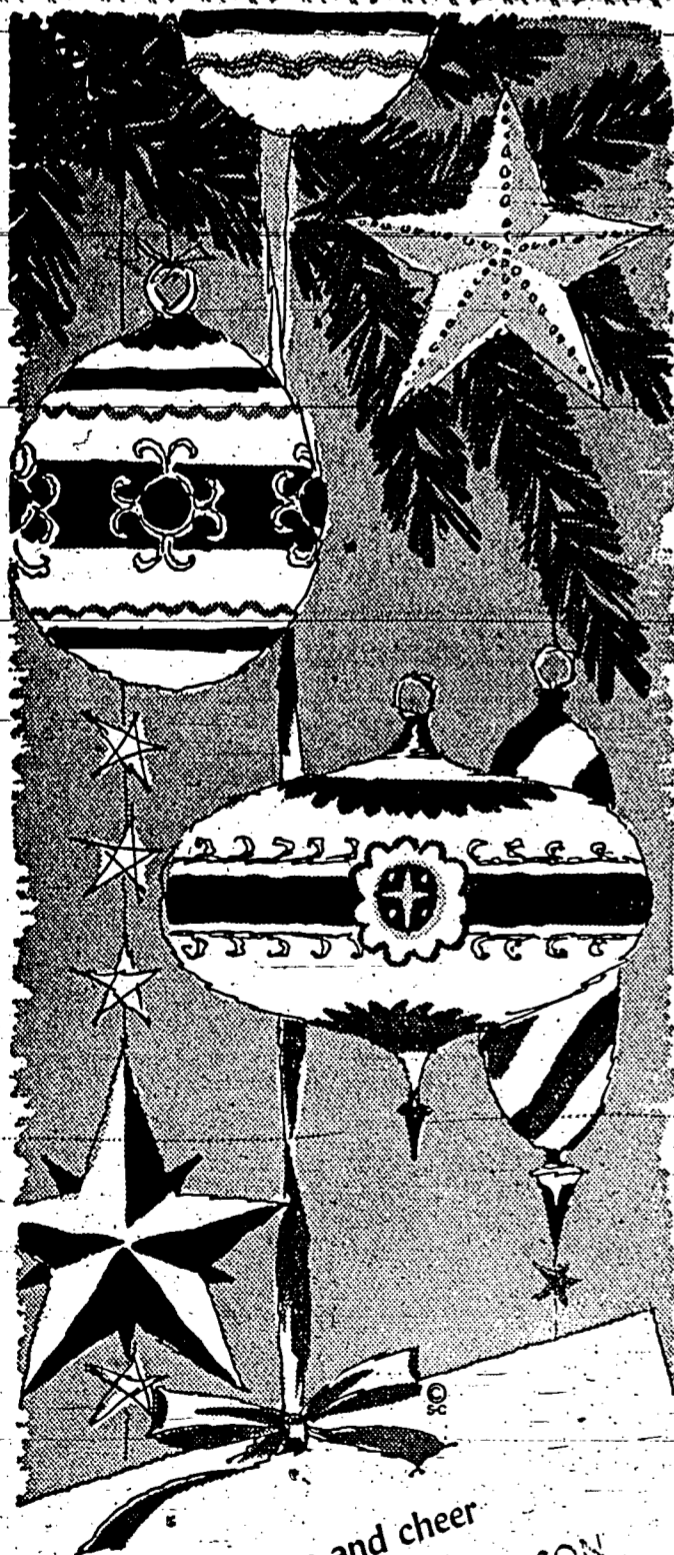

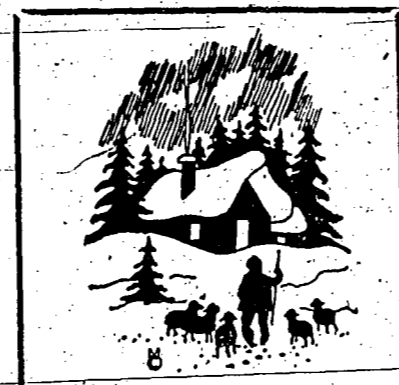

True Love Affair With Diamond Head

By JOAN BRANDVOLD

(Ed. Note: During this Christmas season skiers by the thousands will seek recreation on the snow-clad mountain slopes of the Pacific Northwest. We in Squamish are so close to one of the magnificent skiing areas of the world as yet undeveloped, except through the efforts of three people, the Brandvolds; Joan, Ottar and Emil. Fourteen years ago they fell in love with the Diamond Head area. They built roads, they built a base camp and a chalet, and they also built a reputation for hospitality that nurtured in others a love for Diamond Head that draws them back year after year. Snow to them is something beautiful and useful. They have learned to work with it, not against it. The following is written by one with a very personal feeling for Diamond Head.)

At least part of the interest in skiing and mountaineering comes from contrast in surroundings. Here on the Coast the contrast is very great.

Even at this season, the lower hills are often green, water certainly flows freely, and it's annoying one way or another if a few inches of snow happen to clog the ground.

Now imagine that you are on your way into Garibaldi Park from the "banana belt", as we affectionately nick-name Squamish. You are moving up toward the five thousand foot level and in an hour or two you are in a world of hills and peaks without a trace of green. The clusters of alpine trees are fantastic frozen monuments. They grow in tight groups with the taller trees in the centre and young ones around the base. In no other way could the young trees survive the full blast of winter gales and enormous weights of snow. Year after year the old trees carry this load, losing tops and limbs as if blasted by lightning. In time they will die and rot, raising the ground level below

the ground until it resembles an isolated island.

And how will you have that water; flowing or solid? In this alpine world you have entered there is not much choice. It will be solid. Call it ice or call it snow, and don't shovel it too much. The ground is a long way down. Basically it's still water but we can use it here in many new ways.

It will make our road both for skis and snowmobiles. It helps to forecast weather because the snow surface reveals wind direction and air temperature. The surface will also tell you the many adventures of the animals, from the mice to the mountain goats, and even trace the delicate tracks of the birds. The snow's depth and density predict next year's sea level water supply.

At Diamond Head Chalet, we stand on it to paint the highest window trim and oil the log walls. Or we cut it away outside the windows and use it to reflect light inward. We take endless photographs of it, and practice making igloos! We chop it, making steps in the

snow tunnel exit from the top floor.

Snow cools our food and keeps us warm. Ah, that pineapple frappe, that long cold drink. Skoll! And it really does keep us warm. How would you like to have a hundred tons of insulation on your roof? Let the wind howl inside the chalet you can hear nothing of the wind. The Christmas and New Year gang will soon be merry-making, quite unaware of what hangs over their heads. The sod roof itself weighs about thirty tons and two hundred and fifty or more tons of ice and snow, ten feet deep, will pile on the sod. Luckily for us, the snow bridges the roof. As it builds up higher, it forms an arch, partly resting on the banks on either side. So tune up the music, on with the dance! Gledelig Jul og Godt Nyttar!


