Universities should not foster dissen for the sake of dissent, but rather they should contribute to the improvement of the society which gave them the oppor tunity to dissent in the first place

A non-intellectual approach such as blanket disagreement with matters as they are without doing anything more than raise "slogans" or protest marches; rendering lip service to dissent but offerto the world today

A civilization must adapt if it is going to survive and that adaptation can only come through dissatisfaction, with the dissatisfaction which offers ideas or solu tions for the problems which beset tions.

Protest for the sake of protest is no enough. It must be protest with ment, facing the challenges it meets and
They may be unavailing, but at least they offer an answer; and often in some orm they can be adapted or modified to bring about an improvement.
Youth must continue
uthority, but not by sit-ins or sit-down or violence, but rather by looking into the causes which create the situation they deplore and
remove them.
