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## Highway relocation

Two queries regarding relocating Government Road north of Squamish were turned down by the highways department. Council had asked that the highway be straightened out in the vicinity of the Marmquam School and just north of Paradise Valley Horse Ranch.

The negative answer to the first request was sparked by the fact that some of the property is Indian Reserve and their permission would be necessary before any changes could be made.

Mayor Brennan said this could be obtained but previous attempts to get the road straightened at that spot had been cancelled after the owner of private property in the area asked a price which the district felt was too high.

The second problem area, just north of the horse ranch, could be corrected but the department said the cost would be \$19,000 and this was felt to be more than they were willing to spend at this time.

Council, decided to ask the Loggers Transportation Association if they would be prepared to contribute to straightening out the road at this spot.

If so, discussions with the highways department could be held and something might be resolved. A. W. Hendrickson was instructed to take the matter up with the group.

## Applications approved

A number of applications for land for various purposes were discussed at the last regional district meeting and the department of lands was advised the board had no objection to a number of them.

These included a request from the Squamish Valley Rod and Gun Club for land for rifle and trap shooting purposes; and one from A. L. Greba and A. C. Starks for a residential site at Devine.

A small farming area north of Kwoltenemo Lake was approved as was an application by B.C. Hydro for request to purchase an unsurveyed portion of land at Tisdall. Director T. B. M. Fougberg objected to the latter.

A request for grazing land at Moha and one for pig farming in the same general area were both approved.

A request by Rayonier for renewal of a lease for logs storage and booming was also approved.

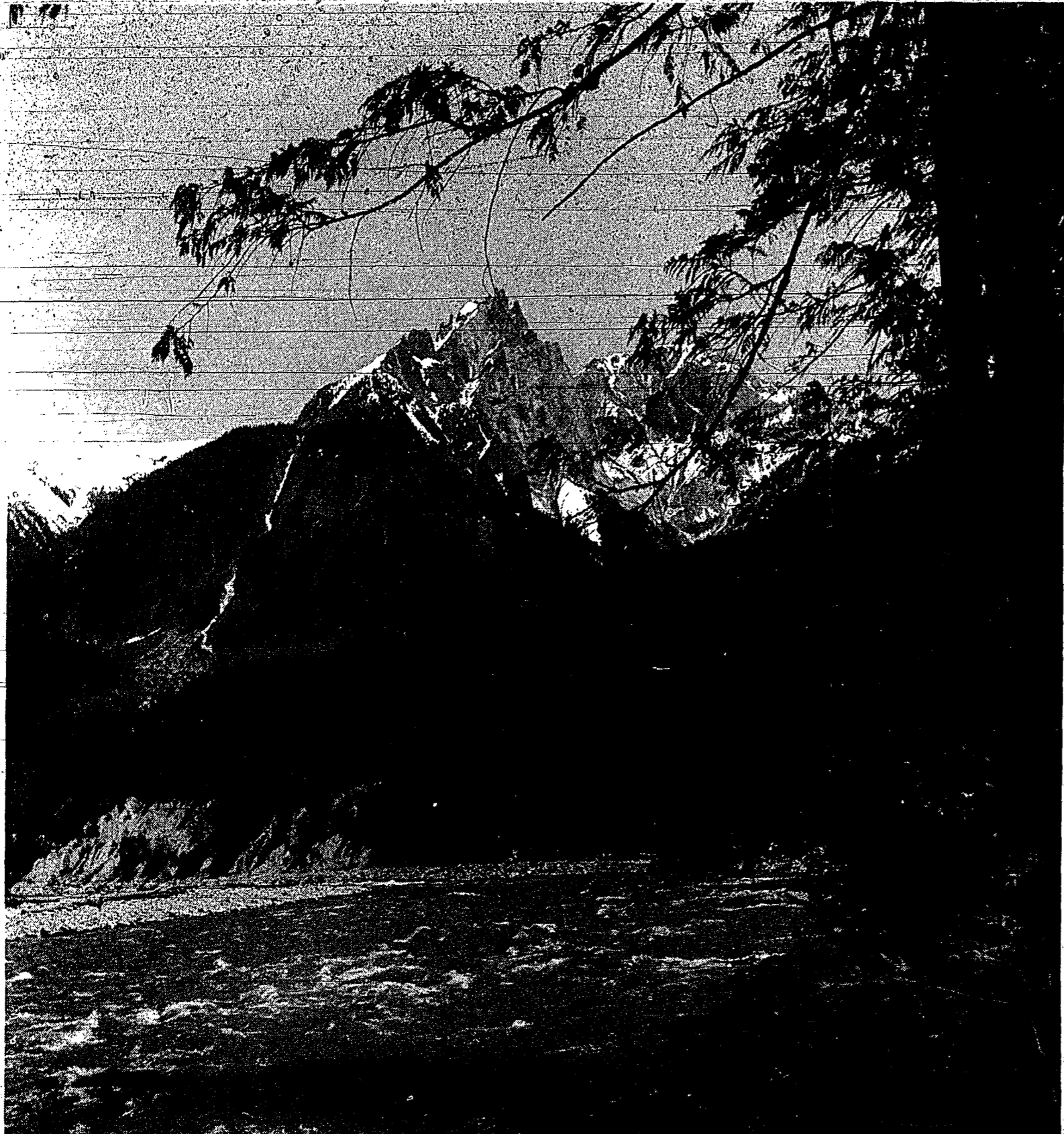
## Approval for signs

## Planning under way for luxury Whistler Mt. hotel

Planning is underway for another major resort hotel development at Whistler Mountain. Andrew Finneran, president of Sheritt-Lee Mines Ltd., announced today that his company has obtained an option on a 9.5-acre plateau that looks directly down on the gondola complex. A feasibility study has been commissioned.

The option was confirmed by Garibaldi Whistler Development Co. Ltd., owners of the site.

Mr. Finneran said preliminary investigation had indicated a 200-room convent-on-hotel, with substantial dining and lounge facilities, year-round swimming pool, tennis courts and underground parking. Cost would reach \$4 million he said.

"This is the choicest resort property I have ever seen", Mr. Finneran said. "It would be unthinkable to use it for anything but a large and luxurious hotel. Guests could walk out of the hotel and ski right down to the gondola base", he said. "An elevator would bring them back up. No driving or parking problems."

Mr. Finneran said the possibility that the Winter Olympics would be held at Whistler Mountain in 1976 was only a minor consideration.

"With or without the Olym-

pics, that whole area is a resort developer's dream. Many people have failed to recognize the year-round potential. The magnificent skiing tends to overshadow the area's other excellent recreational attributes", he said.

Mr. Finneran said Sheritt-Lee was anxious to diversify. It controls Silver-Lee Mines Ltd. which has a silver prospect now under exploration and development on Wallace Mountain southeast of Kelowna.

Garibaldi Whistler Development Co. Ltd. recently completed and successfully marketed a 34-unit condominium complex

immediately north of the hotel site. The company has subdivided 21 cottage sites. It is developing a further 30 acres and will create a small lake.

Principals in the Garibaldi Whistler Development Co. are Walter Zebrowski, Frank Stanzel. The site is being evaluated in terms of economic trends in the Geoff Massey, John Frazee and Gary Watson.

## Council startled, residents don't want lane opened up

Mayor Pat Brennan told a delegation of residents from Britannia Ave., that council was stunned to find there was a group in town which didn't want them to spend some money.

The residents, headed by A. E. Bird, objected to the opening of a lane which would bisect their property. Residents at either end of the block favored the move, so these portions would be opened up but the

properties lying in the middle of the block would be left without the lane.

The delegation also asked that council bend its efforts to having Mr. Newman clean up the property he owns on Britannia Ave. as the old vehicles and other material were unattractive.

A request concerning the blacktopping of the street brought the answer that this was in the plans. The street will be

brought up to grade this year with blacktopping to be done in 1970.

Mr. Bird also told council the residents were concerned with water lying in the ditches and wished to know if a line could be run on the ditches to improve the grade and have them opened up so the water will drain. The delegation, consisting of A. E. Bird, Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Allott, Ian Hamilton and Mrs. K. Green, also expressed concern about the condition of the unfinished duplex belonging to R. Stammers, which is considered unsafe for the younger children who continue to play around the area.

Mr. Bird said there is about two feet of water in the basement of the unfinished building and also in the hole which has been dug for the septic tank. It is virtually impossible to keep the youngsters from the building and the hole and he is afraid someone may be seriously injured.

There have already been injuries to the children in the area who have been playing around the property.

Council decided to ask the health inspector to have a look at the property and come up with a recommendation.

## Very little rain fell in June

June was a warm month with very little rain. Harold Bailey reports that only 1.06 inches fell during the month, less than a fifth of 1968's recorded 5.47 inches.

This brings the year's rainfall to 27.25 inches or with snow added, the total precipitation to 37.69 inches, well below average for the first six months of the year.

The highest temperature, 83 degrees, was recorded on June 9 and 18, while the low of 47 degrees was recorded on June 1.

Both are well above average for this month.

The July 1 weekend ended in brilliant sunshine on the Dominion Day holiday with sheet lightning followed by rain during the night climaxing a warm sunny day.

Hordes of holidayers from the lower mainland crowded into the Alice Lake park area, Whistler Mountain and Alta Lake and as far north as possible.

Campers were taking advantage of every available area along the highway.

Eleven years after the opening of the Seaview Highway the section from Britannia Beach to Squamish is to be paved. Columbia Bithulic of Vancouver has been awarded the contract to carry out the job.

According to Mr. George Zacharias, president of the company, the work will begin on or about the 21st of July and take three months to complete. "We will get on with it as quickly as we can," he said, although he pointed out that the company is on a very rigid schedule with their paving contracts and has to arrange the work carefully. Paving is only possible during certain months of the year and their work has to be arranged so as to get as much as possible done always keeping local conditions in mind. Cost of paving the 6.6 miles will be approximately \$315,000.

Mr. Zacharias does not expect that the customary traffic will slow up the job to any extent. The width of the road makes it quite possible to work on one half while traffic moves over the other half.

The awarding of this contract after so many years of waiting will be most welcome to local residents whose most recent complaint has been the cloud of dust enveloping the highway. Last week motorists drove through swirling dust and this will be repeated as soon as the current wet spell comes to an end. Looking south from Hospital Hill a pall of dust hung over the road continuously.

Motorists have displayed varying degrees of frustration, impatience, anger and resignation since the beginning of the final phase of construction just over three years ago. It now appears that their problems will be resolved by the end of October.

## Harry Cullis named new superintendent

Harry E. Cullis, who was formerly principal at Sentinel Secondary School in West Vancouver, has been named by the Department of Education to take over as school superintendent of the Lillooet and Howe Sound School districts, with headquarters in Squamish.

He replaces D. H. Campbell, who will take over the Kere-meos and South Okanagan Districts.

Today Premier Bennett, chairman of the Treasury Board also announced that approval had been given by the Board to the Department of Education to call tenders for the Howe Sound Secondary additions and renovations to the sum of \$388,000.

Mr. Cullis had been principal at Sentinel for the past five years. He holds his B.Sc. degree from the University of Durham and M.A. from UBC.

## Garibaldi gets electricity

Power from B.C. Hydro will be available to residents of the Garibaldi-Brandywine area as soon as possible — probably by October — was the announcement made by Dr. Gordon Shrum at a luncheon meeting held with district representatives at the Christiania Inn last Friday.

The full cost of installations is estimated at \$110,000. Major contributions will come from the PGE and B.C. Telephone; the former had anticipated spending \$2,000 for a propane generator to provide signal lights at Brandywine and this sum could be turned over to B.C. Hydro.

A contribution will also be forthcoming from B.C. Tel as they will probably use the same poles as B.C. Hydro.

Thirty-two applications for power have been received from this area no doubt more will be received with the prospect of electricity. A building boom is likely to follow with an increase in the number of users. Each applicant for power will pay a maximum installation fee of \$200; this amount will be lowered if sufficient additional applications are received. Following installation a minimum monthly fee of \$7.50 will be levied for sixty months, after

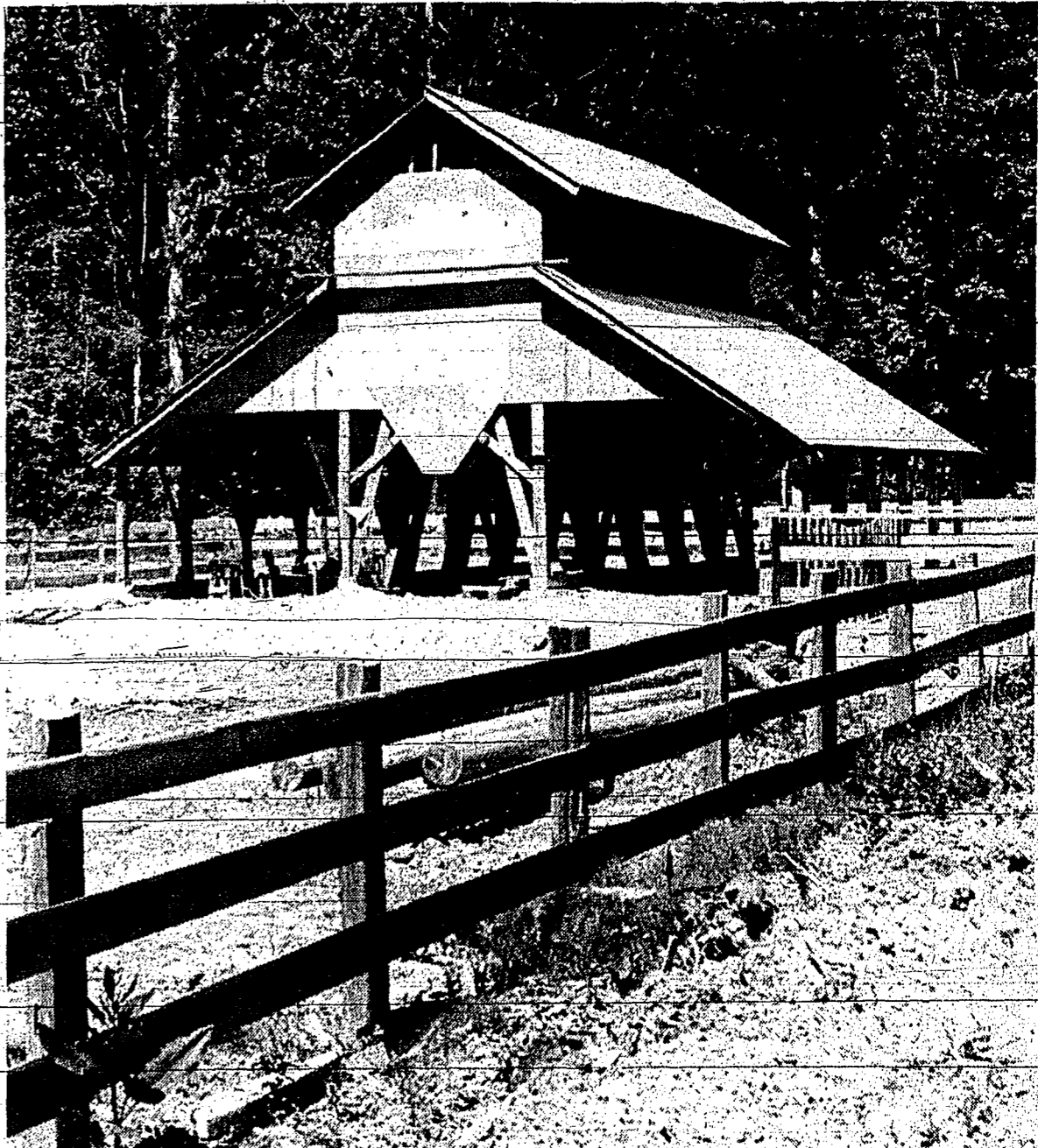
that date users will pay the regular consumer rate.

Rumours have been circulating in the area that the International Olympic Committee was to be notified of the lack of power in both Garibaldi and Brandywine. As all available facilities at these places will be taxed to the utmost if Whistler hosts the Olympics such information could well have brought about the loss of the event.

The meeting was called on a day's notice by Dr. Shrum who met with about twenty representatives of the district as well as four members of the Vancouver dailies. Allen White as

president of the Mount Whistler Chamber of Commerce was present as were Allen Williams M.L.A. for West Vancouver, Don Gow who is chairman of the Squamish Lillooet Regional District, Doug McDonald of the Regional Planning Board, Ray Gallagher of Brandywine Resorts, Alex Greenwood of Rainbow Lodge and Ken Stockdale of the Garibaldi Ratepayers Association.

Regarding the re-location of the power line in the Brandywine area, Dr. Shrum made it very clear that B.C. Hydro was making no change in the present location plans.

### Bridge condemned

The bridge over the Lillooet, between Pemberton and Mount Currie was condemned by Highway officials a week ago. The pilings holding the center of the bridge have become loose and the bridge center has dropped one and one-half feet.

At present gravel fill is being prepared for the construction of a temporary bridge. Meanwhile, Mount Currie, Birken and D'Arcy are cut off by road because the bridge is labeled unsafe and closed.

## Men jailed for defrauding three Squamish residents

Gerald Leslie McLeod and James Leonard Harker were each jailed for two years less a day and their company Vancouver Armour Coating Ltd. was fined \$5,000 after being convicted of defrauding three Squamish residents.

The case appeared in Vancouver last month and the jury convicted the two men, the president and secretary of the firm.

In two of the cases the company had stop-work notices placed on the buildings they were to work on when they had failed to obtain a business licence nor had they posted the required \$200 bond with the municipality.

Early last year Mrs. Ellen Louise Vickers and her son Andrew had agreed to let the two men carry out renovations to a house to the value of \$2,640. Mrs. Vickers signed the contract, made a down payment and the work was to be done within three weeks.

A few days later she gave them a further \$640 for materials but when an unpaid truckload of supplies arrived at Squamish, she had the cheque stopped but paid the trucking firm for the materials. Meanwhile the stop-work order was issued.

Little work was done on the property and no money was returned.

On the second charge, Mrs.

Myrtle Herndl, signed a contract for an addition to her home and made a down payment for materials. Work was to be done in six weeks.

After about a day's work she was asked for additional money for materials which she refused to pay. Some unpaid materials arrived and this was followed by a company official from a Vancouver firm to repossess the materials which were still not paid for. A stop-work order was placed on her building also.

Mrs. Herndl attempted to find the home improvement firm in Vancouver but there was no such address as that listed on the contract.

On the third count Ronald Turner of the Garibaldi Motor Hotel paid the two men a sum of money for rugs for his motel. The firm from whom the rugs were to be supplied said they had not received an order and that they did not sell rugs at the price quoted to the motel owner. Turner never got his money back nor did he receive the rugs.

In sentencing the two men Judge Schultz said homeowners, often widows and the elderly with limited financial means, are subject to victimizing by operators in the home improvement field.

He added that in one contract before him in the case there was no date for work to be started, no date for required

completion and no clause to say when the contractor was entitled to receive progress payments.

The contract thus binds the homeowner to pay the price but still enables the contractor to press the owner for money and to exert pressure.

The judge described one of the printed contracts used by the two men as "impressive to the unwise."

Both men admitted to a previous record.

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## Giant new engine for PGE railway

The Pacific Great Eastern Railway is expecting delivery of four giant new locomotives each rated at 3,000 horsepower. Originally expected to arrive in June they were still in Montreal last week and J. S. Goold said they would be in Squamish in July.

### Senior Citizens hold tea and bake sale

An unusually large and varied display of home baking was the highlight of the Senior Citizens' Tea and Bake Sale held in the Elks Hall last Friday afternoon. There were large fruit loaves, pies, tarts, cakes, cookies, fresh raspberries and jams. Obviously cooking is a talent which is never lost.

The tea tables were decorated with small bouquets of dark blue delphiniums. A refreshing cup of tea and slices of rich fruit loaf made a fine accompaniment to friendly conversation. Mrs. W. Ridgley was in charge of selling tickets for the tea while Mr. J. Castle did a brisk business with raffle. Mrs. Daisy Barnfield were in charge of the home baking table.

The present fleet includes 57 locomotives, of which 29 are in the 1,800 hp. class, 25 in the 1,600 hp. class and three in the 1,000 hp. class.

The new equipment will permit the PGE to use the "slave unit" concept which permits a locomotive at the front of the train to remotely control by radio link, locomotives placed near the centre of the train.

Additional power in the middle of the train provides smoother operation and faster braking.

Expansion of the PGE railway shops is also foretold by the awarding of a \$750,000 contract to Canon Ltd., Western Bridge Division, for the building for a new car shop to handle heavy maintenance work on the PGE's growing fleet of freight cars.

Completion of the new car shop is scheduled for November 30 of this year.

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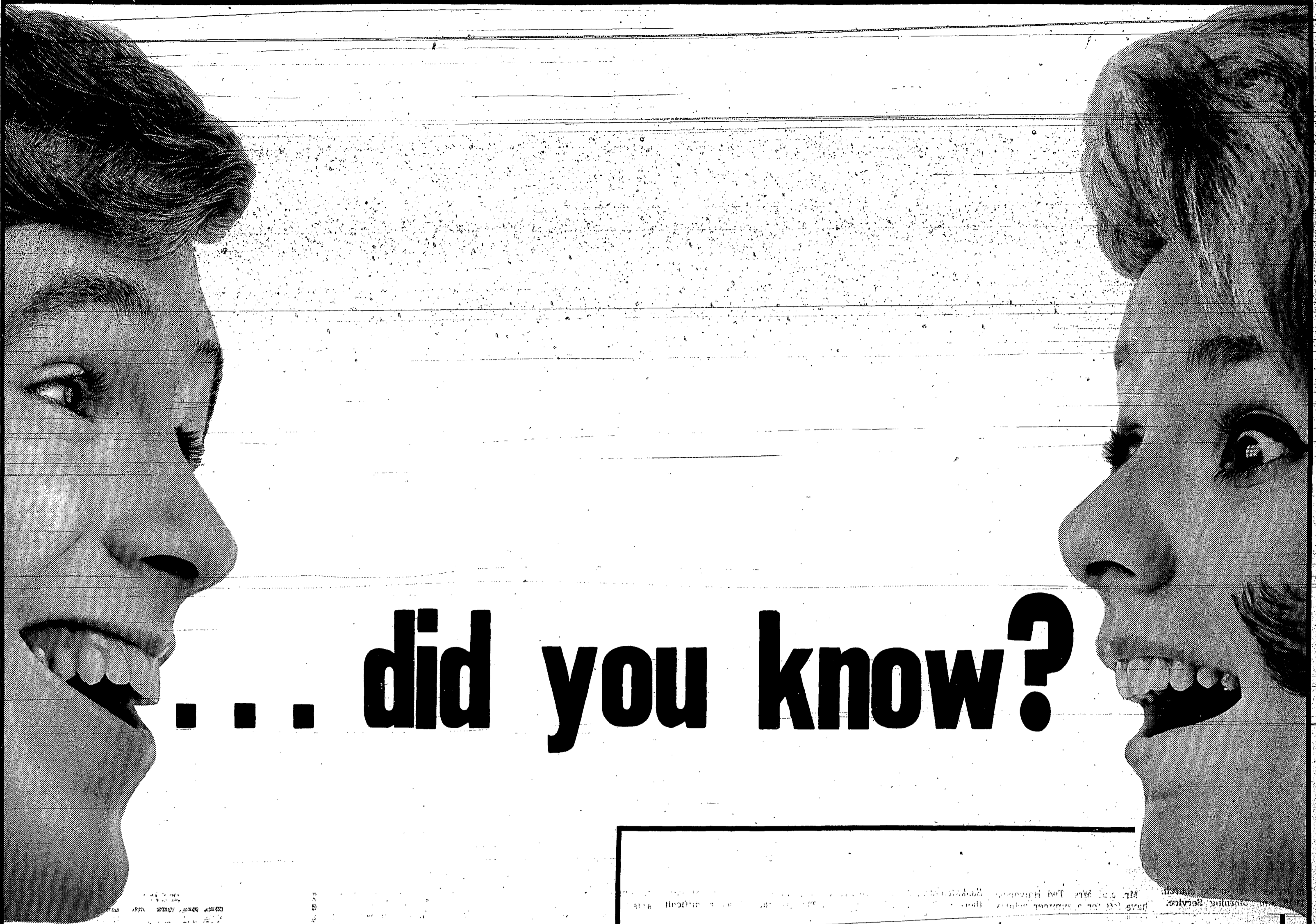

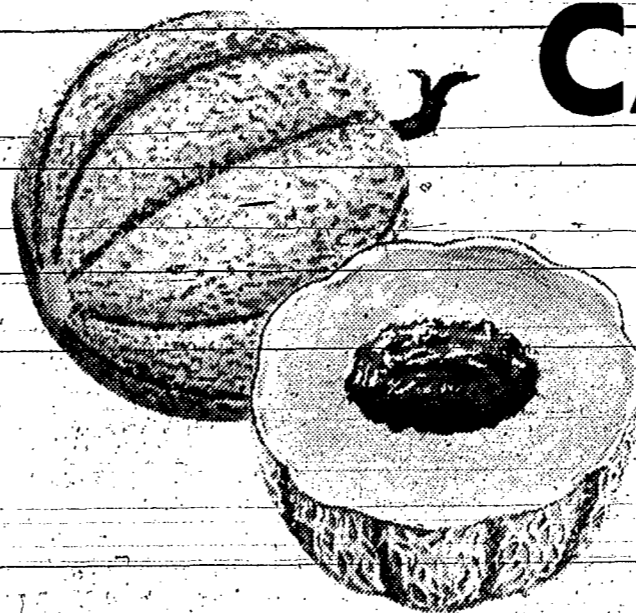

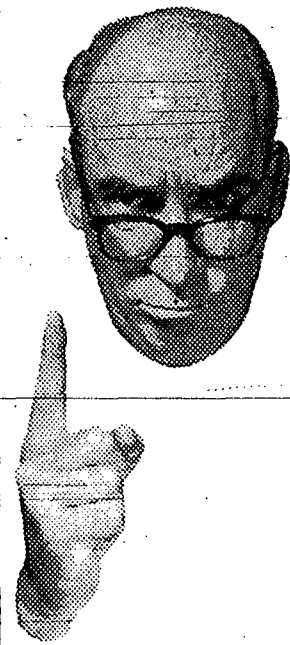

## Fishing regulations brought up to date

The following information is released for the benefit of all commercial and sports fishermen in the area.

Sportsmen are warned that the sale of salmon caught in tidal waters is strictly forbidden. As of April 22, 1969, all commercial salmon fishing is barred in Howe Sound and Burrard Inlet. The prohibited area includes all waters inside a line from Gower Point to the most southerly point on Popham Island; thence in a straight line to the most southerly point of Worcombe Island; thence in a straight line to Cape Roger Curtis on Bowen Island; thence in a straight line in a southeasterly direction to Fairway Gas and Bell Buoy; and thence in a straight line to the most westerly point of Point Grey.

Native Indians of B.C. are allowed to catch fish for their own personal use but any fish caught may not be sold, bartered or given away. Store owners and managers are advised to exercise caution when purchasing fish as they are liable to a fine if they purchase fish caught under a permit issued to a native Indian.

## Build washrooms by August 31
