## Additional \$200,000 river program planned this fall

### FINAL COST OF NEW WATER MAIN

Cost of the new water main from Stawamus to the Garibaldi Highlands area exceeded the amount budgeted for by about \$33,000 for a total cost of \$413,000. The clerk reported that the money can be found in the general revenue and water works surplus. The mayor reported the system was working well; indeed it was even better than had been anticipated. Installation of a pressure reducing valve was discussed and it was decided that one would be placed on the line.

### Fire hazard climbs with warm weather

The fire hazard in this district is climbing with the warm weather, local Forest Ranger Tag Neighbor said last week. The hazard is rated as high but there had been some recovery at night. "The recovery rate has been reasonable," he said, "with some heavy dew but it fades fast during the day as the temperature rises."

Neighbor said there had been a number of small fires in the past few weeks, with five recorded in the immediate past week. He pointed out that each of these had a man-made cause. At least three fires are attributable to cigarettes, he said, and one was caused by a campfire which had been smoldering for almost two weeks before it finally broke out. Another fire was discovered on a survey line and one was possibly incendiary in origin. He stressed that each fire had been man made and pointed out that campfires are banned for the month of August. The largest of these fires, about half an acre in size, was the one which had been smoldering for weeks and finally burst into flame. Neighbor said the fire fighting costs this year were the highest since he had been stationed in Squamish. Patrols were to be made along Howe Sound during the weekend of the Sun salmon derby as the preceding weekend nine small abandoned campfires had been found on the shore but fortunately had not spread. They were believed to have been started by people taking part in the B.C. Salmon Derby. Neighbor said the fire hazard can still be considered serious for at least six weeks or until the end of September when the fire season ends. September is often a month of high hazard in the coastal areas of B.C., especially after a summer and spring which has been as dry as this year.

### Work planned on two river basis

A further \$200,000 will be spent on river protection this winter with work scheduled to begin as soon as possible, Mayor P. J. Brennan said last week. He reported the provincial Minister of Lands, Forests and Water Resources had made a further provision for two hundred thousand dollars for dyking and river control.

This year's program will also include some work on the Mamquam River as well as the Squamish with some four thousand feet of dyking done on the south bank of the Mamquam River. Completion of this year's river work on the Squamish would see the east side of the Squamish River protected by rock fill from Judd's Slough area to Buckley's Crossing with dyking along much of it as well as the work on the Mamquam.

Other work will include completion of the dyke construction along the left bank of the Squamish River below the confluence of the Mamquam and Squamish Rivers and completion of the protection of the south bank. Mayor Brennan said the work would again be carried out under the direction of the municipality which has done so effectively a job in the past two years when monies were made available.

If this work proceeds as it has in the past, provincial government engineers would plan the work and the district would carry it out, using local men and equipment wherever possible.

The planned winter program would see the completion of last year's work where the river was rippedrap from the Mamquam to below the Big Bar. Plans at that time called for additional dyking above the riprap and this would be done. Dyking of the south side of the Mamquam River would also be done.

Further work will have to be done if harbor development in Squamish is carried out as planned. Part of the requirements for harbor development was containment of the river above the mouth in order to protect the docks and other installations. This will be the third winter in which river work has been done and containment is being carried out under the plans for protection of the valley from possible flooding.

### Vaccination program

The question of vaccination for rubella (German measles) came up at council last week as a result of a letter from the U.B.C.M.

The letter urged all municipal councils to co-operate with the provincial government in the German measles campaign. The clerk was asked to write to Coast-Garibaldi Health Unit director Dr. Gemmill concerning the cost of such a plan.

### Alta Lake Regatta

The annual Alta Lake Regatta will be held at Cypress Point on Sunday, Sept. 5 commencing at 1 p.m.

Sailing races will be a feature of the day with a kiddies carnival, adult antics, a decorated bicycle contest, and a funny hat prize.

This annual event is one of the highlights of the year.

## Lillooet group seeks region's support for road

The Clinton-Yale - Pemberton-Lillooet Economic Development area is seeking support from the Squamish - Lillooet Regional District in their request for a road link between Squamish and Cache Creek via Lillooet.

The group, whose brief for development of the area had been approved by the Honourable Dan Campbell, Minister of Municipal Affairs is asking for three things.

Completion of the road link between Squamish and Cache Creek with federal - provincial cost sharing agreement to Trans - Canada standards; designation under the Special Area Incentives Act for forestry, mining and tourism and other aims including ARDA agreements and an area co-operative manpower plan.

At present the committee has to convince the province that this particular economic unit

must be given first priority on a federal-provincial designation. Until that time federal officials will not carry out their portion of the plan.

The economic committee is vitally interested in the road link which would unite the whole area. Lack of the road hinders back development in the northern section of the region and contributes towards the present inequity in the area's assessment base resulting in excessive monies paid out by the District of Squamish for regional functions.

It also means the recreation complex at Alta Lake cannot take advantage of the interior tourist flow in summer or winter.

J. Basran, mayor of Lillooet and chairman of the group, urged support for the road link which would be of benefit to the entire area.

The region supports any road development which would bring both extremities of the region which stretches from south of Squamish to north and west of Lillooet closer together.

The proposed road from Squamish to Cache Creek would offer a third link to the interior and to the east. It would also be much shorter than the present one through the Fraser Valley and would open up the area for further development.

### Meetings at Pemberton?

A letter from Pemberton was read at a recent meeting of the Squamish - Lillooet Regional District suggesting that meetings be held in that community, the centre of the district, where room is available at the municipal hall.

After some discussion it was decided that, since the validity of the present boundaries of the regional district is still in doubt, the question of moving the meetings to Pemberton should be tabled.

The district also decided to write to the Minister of Municipal Affairs to look into the matter of the meeting with him regarding boundaries of the district and to decide when the meeting will be held.

## May increase library grant

L. C. Minchin, chairman of the Library Board, appeared before council to discuss the soon to be introduced requirements for small libraries such as the one in Squamish where the municipality is supposed to provide a per capita grant of \$1.50. At present the municipality grants \$1,200 per year to the library and this is supplemented by a grant of \$1,000 from the provincial government.

Additional support comes from the municipality which owns the building and maintains it to the tune of several hundred dollars per year. Minchin pointed out that in numerous letters to the library commission he had outlined the work done by the volunteer staff some thousand hours per year, all at no cost, which could be estimated at several thousand dollars. However this was not taken into consideration.

Minchin said the alternative would appear to be a choice of making a grant of \$1.50 per person or well over six thousand dollars, or matching the existing government grant of one thousand per year.

Mayor Brennan said there was no alternative, certainly council could see no justification for spending six thousand dollars to obtain an extra one thousand when the library gets along well on the present grants. Council assured him it would take the new proposal into consideration when the budget is being made up next year.

### Bible school

A Vacation Bible School will be held in the Mamquam Elementary School during the week of Aug. 31 to Sept. 4, commencing at 6:30 p.m.

The daily vacation Bible School will be open to all children from five years of age and up.

It will be sponsored by the Squamish Baptist Church.

## Guilford Industries plans further subdivision

Guilford Industries, whose subdivision in the Valleycliffe Park area has been successful with almost all the existing lots sold, is preparing to open up a further twenty acres for homes.

The company, represented by Peter-Lektman and George Mirus, presented a plan for preliminary approval. It covers 20 acres of developable land and showed the proposed layout of drainage as well as the location of the lots.

The company representatives said clearing has been done and engineering should be completed within three weeks. WEB Engineering is doing the engineering for the project.

If approval is granted the company hopes to be able to undertake some building before fall.

Approval in principle was given pending the submission of an engineering plan and final subdivision plans to the approving officer.

The company also discussed the possibility of placing a sign at the entrance to the property on Highway 99. This would contain the same format as the existing sign located near the subdivision.

Council decided that the sign be approved pending application for a sign permit.

Council expressed pleasure at the progress of building within the subdivision and when the company stated they had further plans which they would like to discuss with council the mayor appointed a committee to deal with any matters which would come up in the balance of the year.

Aldermen Dr. L. C. Kindree, I. L. Boscarol and T. H. Burt were appointed to the committee.

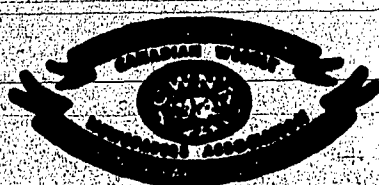

## Where is the "Good Life"

With the number of people unemployed in British Columbia reaching a new high and with the mounting numbers of people idled by strikes and industrial problems, people in this province must really be wondering what happened to Premier Bennett's vaunted "Good Life".

Last summer we were being bombarded with advertisements, propaganda and publicity concerning the future of B.C. and our own. We were urged to vote for the Social Credit government, to return them to power to keep our province from being bedeviled by strikes and labor problems.

Well, what have we one year later? Certainly the labor outlook in this province is one of the worst, if not the worst in Canada. Construction workers have been on strike for months and some are still striking or threatening to; there is a pulp strike with a possibility of an even wider one and B.C.'s forest industry, the bell wether of industrial health, is teetering on the verge of what could be a long, costly strike.

By the end of last week the men were being told to turn down the offer recommended by Justice Nemetz, for sixty cents over two years; an offer which the premier and Labor Minister Peterson have both hailed as being excellent.

However they are neither paying for the wage increase, nor on the receiving end. Their comments might be different if they were.

Not only are we plagued with strikes in our own industries in the province but the federal postal strike, accelerated last week, is now three months old and there appears to be no end to it. Last week Squamish, was one of the few post offices in B.C. open but only for local mail. There had been no mail from Vancouver for several days.

We are not sitting in judgement on the postal strike or the people involved but this new type of strike when the employees work when they feel like it and stay away when they want to is completely irresponsible. Certainly if they struck completely both the union and the postal authorities might come to an agreement more quickly.

And a complete closure would be scarcely more confusing than this partial one.

Certainly it is fortunate the Social Credit government is not running for office this summer. It could not use the threat of strikes as the club to hold over the heads of the electorate. And it just could be defeated if an election took place.

Perhaps Premier Bennett and his advisers had an excellent crystal ball and called the election when the time was ripe and people could be deluded by promises of a continuing "good life".

Certainly we, and a good many others in B.C. are wondering where it is and if it is still around, how long will it last!

## Let's try slashing

One of the arguments B.C. Hydro uses to justify the spraying program is that it is much cheaper than slashing. We can see the argument but still feel most people would be more willing to see slashing than spraying, even if it did cost more.

But Don Gow, chairman of the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District, says this argument is no longer valid.

Apparently individual contractors have assured him they would be happy to slash the power line for the same cost per acre which the utility is now paying to have it sprayed.

If this is so, and if his informants will back up their statements, someone ought to tell Hydro about it. We are sure Dr. Shrum would be happy to give a contract to anyone who would do it for the same price.

Incidentally we'd like to know how much it costs to spray an acre of power

line. At the cost of the Tordon 101, and the cost per hour of helicopters, it must be quite a sum. In addition the spraying must be done very carefully if they are not going to dump the herbicide into streams, etc. And who pays for the time the helicopter stands idle when it is too windy to spray?

We understand that, as a rule, spraying can only be done early in the morning in some areas as the wind is too high during the rest of the day for it to be effective.

At any rate, Hydro should check with Don Gow and find out who these people are who are willing to slash; give them the price they now pay for spraying and let them go ahead.

Certainly everyone in the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District would be happy to see the right-of-way slashed instead of sprayed.

## Ecology bridges gap

The study of man and his environment, sparked by interest in pollution, has brought many things in its train which were not envisaged by the early protestors against pollution.

One of these benefits may be a closer rapport between young and old as they join in the battle against damaging the environment.

Ecological study is something we should all be interested in since a working knowledge of it is necessary for our survival on this planet. It is a study we can share with our children for young people these days are taking an active interest in their environment.

In Squamish we have noticed the interest in pollution and the fight against it is shared between adults and the young people and even the elementary school pupils are very conscious of pollution and litter problems.

Recently a group of citizens tried to stop their city's public works department from cutting down some sturdy shade trees on a street marked for widening. The adult verbal protests had little effect until a boy in the group shinnied up one of the trees and refused to budge. The

result was the mayor called a halt to the whole project.

This group was taking constructive ecological action to protect the trees which not only provide shade and beauty, but purify the air and add oxygen and moisture to it for man's benefit.

As individuals we need to study our environment and see that we are not adding to or subtracting from it in a negative way. If we garden, instead of being trigger happy with the pesticide spray, let's delve into alternative methods of pest control such as those of organic gardening. Let the earthworms work for you — don't kill them with heavy chemical fertilizers. Learn how to use your table left-overs, (formerly garbage destined) to make compost to enrich your garden soil.

On Oct. 14, Canada will observe Survival Day to co-ordinate all groups across Canada who are concerned with environment. Find out about projects planned for your locality through radio or press and plan to participate with your family.

Your interest in ecology and pollution may help to bridge the generation gap between the young and old.

## Alderman Makowichuk reports

(Any views which may be expressed in this column are mine and are not necessarily the views of the Squamish Municipal Council as a whole or any individual alderman.)

Mr. Minchin appeared before Council representing the Squamish Library Association to advise that the Community Programs Branch had seen fit to refuse a grant of \$1,000 to the public library, for the ensuing years, on the grounds that the municipality did not pay the \$1.50 per capita to the library. It was decided that an additional \$1,000 to cover the grant lost, should be put in the 1971 budget for the next year.

A request from Gerry Kennedy, although he was not present to personally represent his case, had been received, to store a trailer on property in Brackendale for a period of three weeks. Since this was in keeping with the present council policy, it was approved. The trailer will not be occupied.

The Public Works Committee met on July 14th to consider the installation of a crosswalk below the curling rink for the school children on the Stawamus Reserve. It was therefore decided that the old road to Squamish should be continued and used as a foot path to the Stawamus Elementary School and the crosswalk, which should be patrolled, be installed at the junction of the old road and the new road.

A letter was read from the PGE Railway, which advised that every precaution was being taken to ensure safe handling of propane tanks in the Squamish area and detailed the procedures of such handling. This letter is a follow up of safety precautions taken regarding the shipments of propane and chemicals after the accident the P.G.E. had this spring where one tank was punctured.

A letter was read from the Squamish Lions Club which asked for donations with respect to running the ambulance service in Squamish for 1970. After some discussion it was decided that council, although sympathetic to the cause, could not agree to donate money to this service at this time.

A letter was received from the Squamish Valley Rod & Gun Club, which advised that circulars had been posted in strategic locations throughout the valley with the areas in question shaded in color and keyed for easy reference, distinguishing areas for shotgun only, rifle etc. The clerk was instructed to write to the Squamish Valley Rod and Gun Club and thank them for their actions.

Good news for the District of Squamish. The government has allotted \$200,000 more to continue the river control project for the area. The left bank of the Squamish River below the Mamquam bridge will be raised to standard and if any monies are left over, 4,000 feet of the left bank of the Mamquam River will be done. I would like to see this done in late fall with local help as previously and keep the money here.

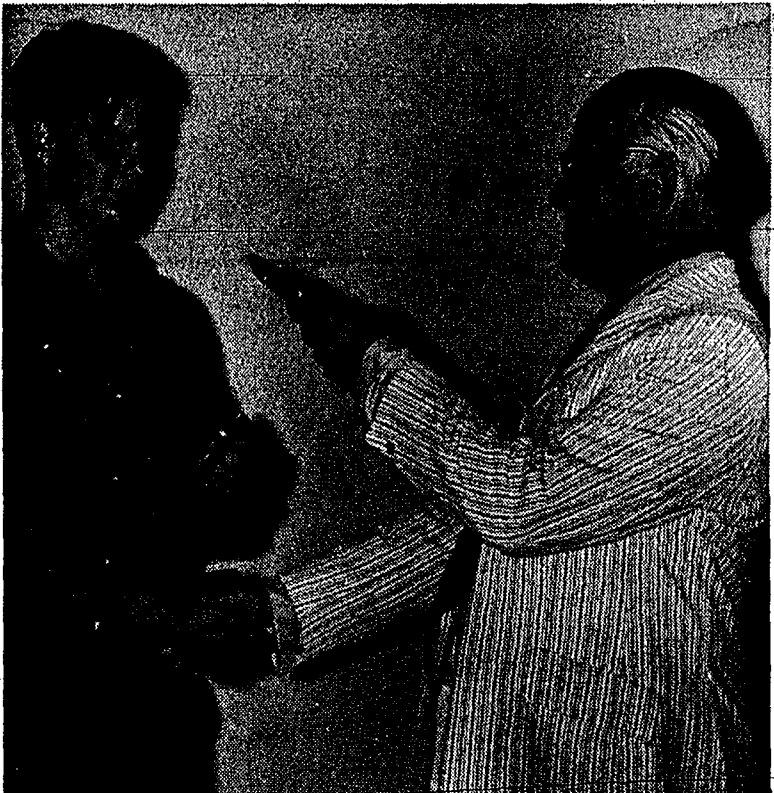

L. C. Minchin spoke briefly to the boys, complimenting them on their effort and Alderman Makowichuk presented each of them with a gag gift which ranged from dish towels to a chef's hat. Following this Mr. Goode presented each of them with a small gift.

Jim Sawatsky, the leader of the local group, presented Mr. and Mrs. Goode with a beautiful carved wooden head done by native carver Howard Williams and, in keeping with the gag gifts of the evening, Lyle Fenton presented them with a huge mosquito in a cage of small twigs. The "insect" was made of pipe cleaners with acrylic resin wings and was supposed to represent the huge ones which the boys had encountered on their trip.

Attending the dinner with their parents were Dave Dawson, Lyle Fenton, Mike Goode, John Krzanowski, Rick Mercier and Jim Sawatsky. Lance Goss and Ray Sandberg were out of town and could not be present.

## Centennial Fields will need fill

The Squamish centennial committee told council last week that fill would be needed for the fields which they are building in the large park as a centennial project.

L. C. Minchin, advised the chairman, Mrs. J. Makowichuk, that the PGE railway has fill which may be used for this purpose.

Mrs. Makowichuk also reported that the proceeds from the sale of the cottonwood property being cleared for the centennial ball fields be donated to the centennial committee for their project.

On a recent weekend quantities of alder were removed by people who took advantage of the offer to cut firewood on the site. The committee was anxious to have the material removed so work could proceed.

Representatives of the Magnum Car Club, the Loggers' Sports group and the Centennial Committee appeared before council to discuss the status of property which the first two groups had been developing and

which apparently had not been surveyed for them.

Apparently the first two groups were working from a drawing, not a plan. Wayne Boyd, speaking for the loggers said he thought the centennial group was encroaching on property planned for the loggers' sports-car club use.

The mayor asked if the centennial committee could clear the property south of their site for the other two groups and thus effect a change of property but the question of fill arose as the southern site would need more fill.

A surveyor will be asked to prepare a map of the property showing the sports ground and car club site in conjunction with the playing field site. WEB Engineering was to be asked to lay out parking for these two projects.

B. B. Greenlee said his equipment would be available to work on the centennial project where they hoped to be able to clear and develop an additional two fields.

## Airport site at Lillooet Lake

Pemberton is seeking a site for an airport at the north end of Lillooet Lake. A letter from the Board of Transport erroneously mentioned the site as being at the south end of the lake but the district was to advise the board of the error.

The board stated that possible development of the site would be assisted by the Regional Superintendent of Airways. However the financing to the granting of the public assistance to publicly elected bodies could only be done after title to the land had been acquired.

Pemberton is interested in a site at the north end of Lillooet Lake where accredited land has

created an ideal site for an airfield.

However the property is adjacent to the Indian Reserve and claimed by the Indians although it is land which has been built up through the action of the river depositing silt at that location.

The board will approach the Mount Currie Indian Band through the Indian agent about the possibility of re-negotiating land for airport purposes at the north end of Lillooet Lake.

With the airfield under construction at Squamish and another planned for the Pemberton area it would add two more to the chain of small fields in the province.

## PHONE RATES TO RISE SEPTEMBER 1

A new rate grouping has been approved for the Squamish-Brackendale telephone exchange, to become effective September 1, the B.C. Telephone Company announced this week.

New rates will be applied, bringing increases of up to 25 cents in monthly telephone rates for residential services and up to 90 cents monthly for businesses.

Since March, 1965, the Squamish exchange was in group three, between 1,001 and 2,000 telephones. The number of phones in service has increased from 1,250 at that time to almost 2,200. This places it in the group four range, from 2,001 to 5,000 telephones.

Road access to the Valleycliffe subdivision from close to the tourist booth and down the hill was discussed. In the absence of Alderman Hendrickson, Alderman Kindree was asked to negotiate with B. J. Keely on this matter.

The Valleycliffe subdividers are anxious to have the new road approved and built as it will make access to their property shorter.

No reply has been received from P. N. Goode regarding the renewal of several roads in his subdivision which have not been approved by the municipality.

Alderman Burt was asked to contact Mr. Goode regarding these roads and bring a report back to the next meeting.

The question of a road dedication prevented subdivision of property in the area of the Diamond Head Road leading to the golf course and Alderman I. L. Boscarion was anxious to have the matter clarified.

The clerk said he would look into the matter of the dedicated road to speed the subdivision.

## Pollution concern at Alta Lake

The Alta Lake District Ratepayers Association has been concerned about the possibility of pollution in the area and carried out a survey of effluent discharge in the Alta Lake Green Lake area.

The committee then prepared a report which had been sent to the Coast Garibaldi Health Unit.

Dr. D. L. Gemmill, director of the Coast-Garibaldi Health Unit, stated in a letter that the systems which the committee listed had been investigated. He said all but one have been inspected and the unsatisfactory ones have been ordered to repair their systems.

He stated that he hoped to have all the failing systems rectified as soon as possible.

In a further statement he said he hoped to see a regional sewage system and a regional water

supply for the Alta Lake-Green Lake area as soon as possible.

The question of a sewage system for this portion of the regional district is one which has been considered by the planning department and a number of submissions have been made by developers and others concerning sewage disposal which is of prime importance to the growth of the area.

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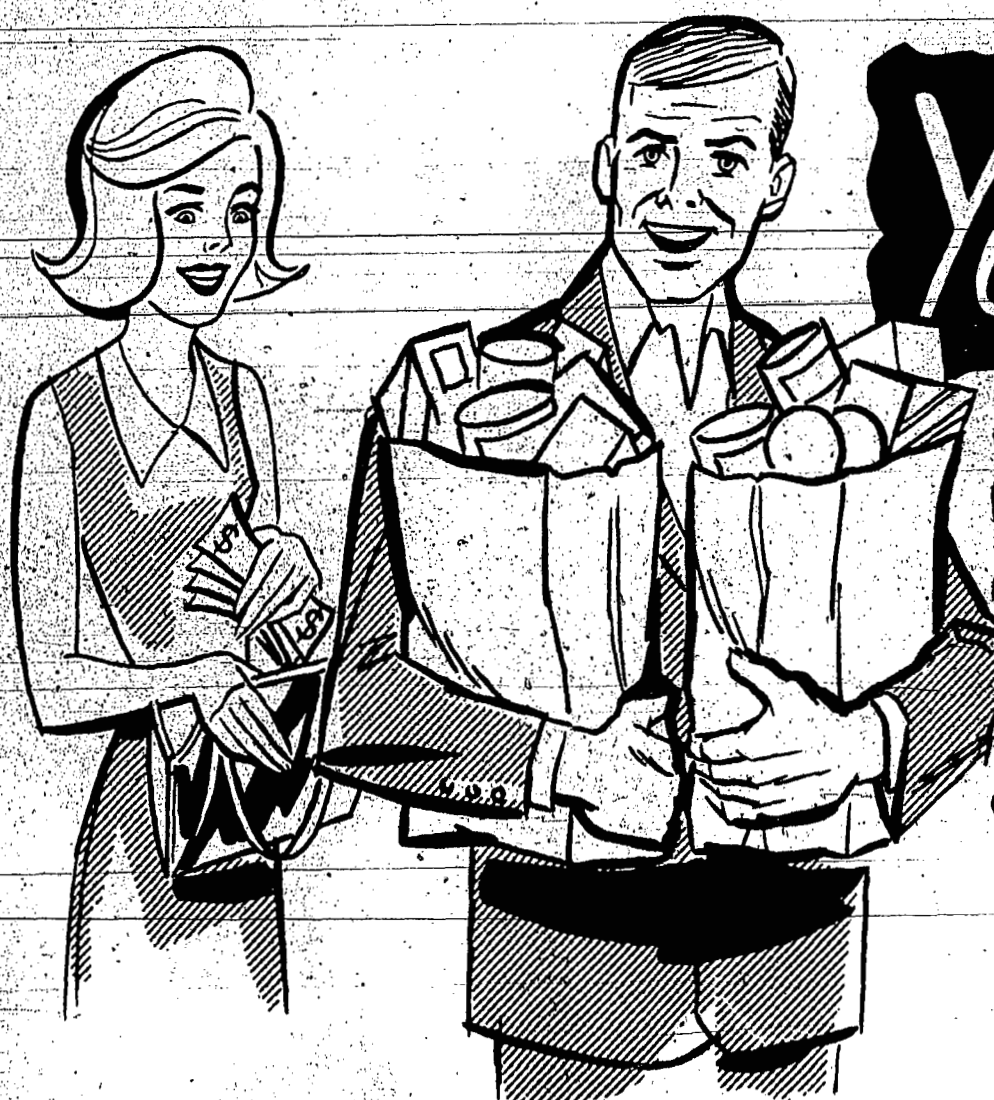

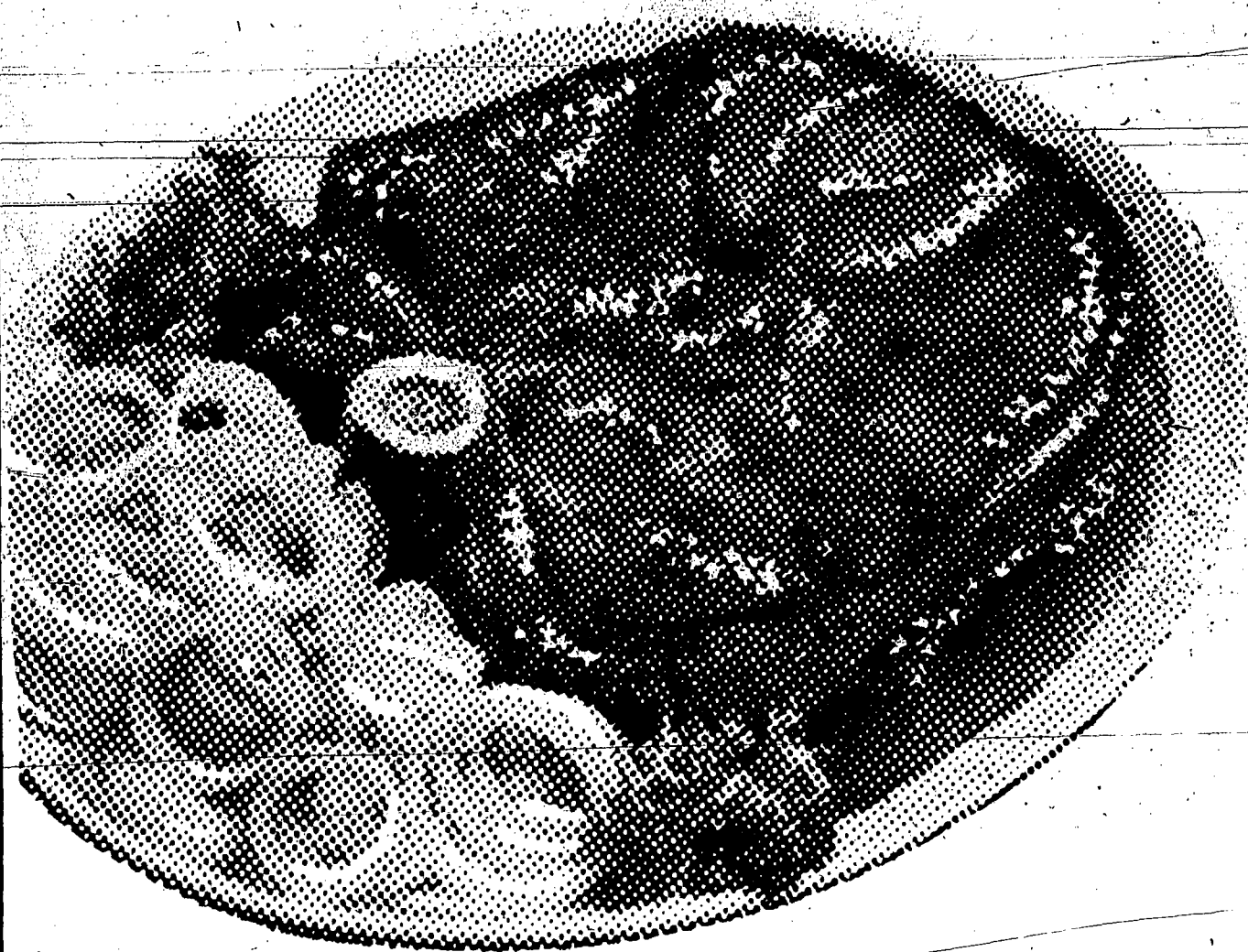

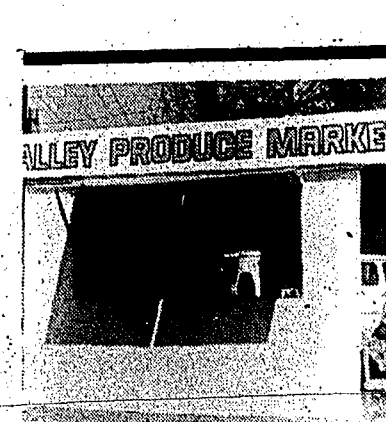

Park.

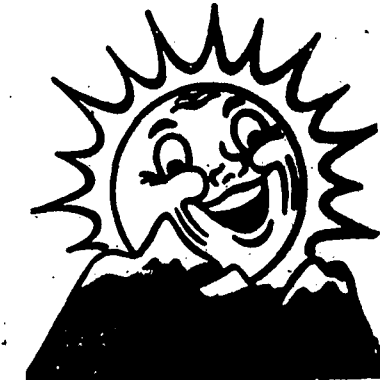
The town of Presbyterian

## Children enjoy Vacation Bible School

The Squamish Pentecostal Assembly Hall is a busy place these days, with youngsters taking advantage of the daily Vacation Bible School and joining in some religious instruction, handicrafts and fun with others.

A group of boys were busy painting some of these and the junior girls were also working on the project. In fact they presented me with one of the plaques which they had made and it now sits in a place of honor in my office.

There are also pencil holders with plaster of Paris bases to be painted and the baby food cans which will hold the pencils, will be covered with macaroni in various shapes and painted. A matchstick cross, to be made with safety matches, was another project and Pastor Rankel said the older boys were working on three different projects, pictures to be placed on ovals of wood, trays and bird-houses.

The work which the children have been doing will be displayed at the open house to be held at the church on Thursday, Aug. 27 at 7:30 p.m. Everyone is welcome to attend.

The teachers enjoy working with the children and the rapport between them is beautiful. Mrs. H. Wulff takes charge of

the nursery group, both boys and girls; Mrs. M. Vroom and Mrs. Toombs have the beginners. Mrs. G. Wilson is in charge of the primary girls and Mrs. N. Candy the primary boys while Elsie Voth, who came from Kamloops to help with the school, has the junior girls. Pastor Rankel works with the junior boys.

There's time for fun too and each morning the youngsters take a fifteen minute break while the girls go for a walk, the boys exercise and the small ones play games. This gives them a chance to blow off excess steam and settle down to the quieter portions of the program.

Last week the school had a visitor with "Snoopy" coming in to visit them. He was popular with the children, particularly the wee ones and the little ones just clung to him.

He would answer their questions by nodding or shaking his head and to see him cover his eyes when he was confused or didn't know what to say or do, was priceless.

There's something for nearly every child at Vacation Bible School and if you want to see what they accomplished, drop in to see their work tomorrow night.

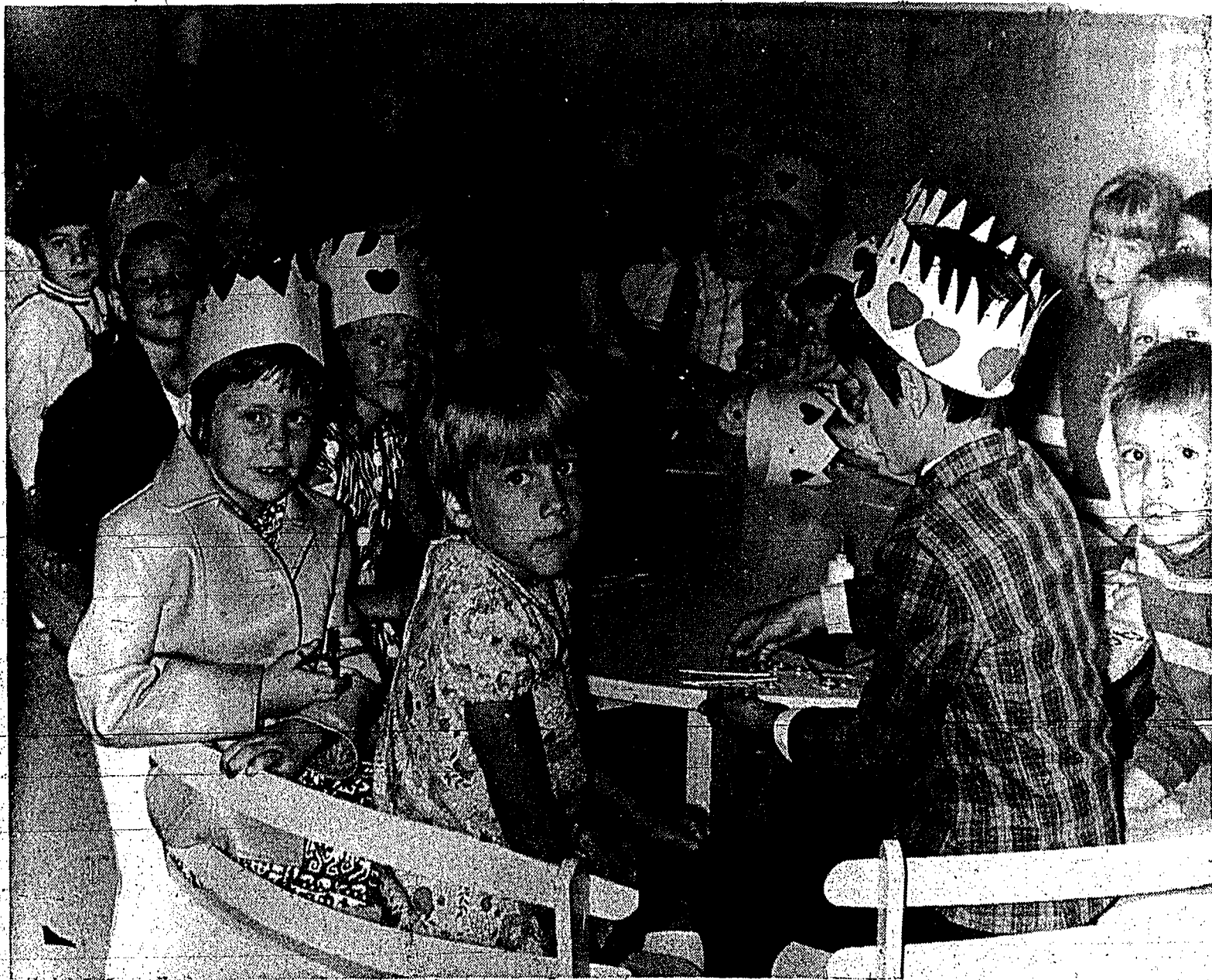

## Ice floes in the North Atlantic

Ed. Note: Mr. and Mrs. G. S. Clarke left for Europe in mid-June, planning to visit England and the continent. She has sent back some impressions of her visit to England and Europe and they will be appearing in the paper from time to time.

### ART II

Have you ever seen an iceberg or steamed your way slowly through miles of ice floes? The Empress of Canada was the first ship to sail through the Straits of Belle Isle this year and the promise of icebergs got me out of bed at 7 a.m. to see them towering in the distance on either side of the ship. Even in bright sunlight it was chilly at that hour.

After breakfast and the ship's French lesson, I went back for a pre-lunch snooze. I was rudely awakened by two gentle thumps; footsteps hurried through the corridors and questions were heard. I could feel the rhythm of the ship's engines but curiosity got the better of me.

Up on deck I went to find that we were steaming through a mass of ice floes. In the distance they appeared to be an impenetrable wall but blue—as blue as can be; wherever we looked at the submerged part of an ice floe, the sunken part was deeply tinged with blue.

They were fantastic shapes; many like enormous snowflakes, others like a miniature castle and one, fairly square had a central depression like a swimming pool.

In the mid-morning, the ice-pack was left behind and we were in the grey ocean and it stayed that way until we docked in Liverpool where England gave us a chilly welcome. Would you believe that the Boss' first purchase in England was a pair of long underdrawers? Not only that but he later bought a second pair!

After visiting numerous relatives and finding the young people so changed after six years we decided to rent a car. After driving an automatic for six years, my attempt at driving a car with a manual shift can only be described as ludicrous or disastrous.

I needed an extra brain, an extra foot and an extra hand. Finally, after a brief delay, we obtained an automatic Morris 1100 and I was right at home. Short of getting slightly lost in cities and once entering a one-way street the wrong way all went well.

The town of Ely, with its magnificent cathedral on the hill was our first stop. At one time Ely was an island, its height of land completely surrounded

by the lakes and marshes of the Norfolk fens.

Here Hereward the Wake held a Saxon stronghold and in spite of drainage and reclamation, the town is still referred to as the "Isle of Ely". The tall Norman cathedral has a unique octagonal lantern tower which features stained glass windows still near by there is a beautiful Lady's Chapel, so much more intimate than the high Gothic ceiling and tremendous length of the central nave.

There was supposed to be a Cromwell House in Ely so I sent our party to search for it. Cromwell Road I found easily but it was simply a semicircle of dwellings, each end of the road entering St. Mary's Street.

The gentleman I questioned on St. Mary's twinkled at me and said, "There 'tis across the road." Right in a timbered two-storey house, still used by the parish church, Oliver Cromwell lived from 1636 to 1637 while he was the collector of the tithes. Then it was on to Cambridge, that loveliest of university cities, even in the rain. The river Cam flows quietly past the smooth green lawns sloping gently to the college buildings. In spite of cloudy skies a visit to King's College Chapel was a must; a beautiful dream forever held in stone, its wooden rails glowing with the patina of age.

Beside the Chapel one archway after another leads to quadrangles surrounding the buildings. Small bridges, one named "The Bridge of Sighs" by discouraged students, cross the narrow waterway.

Wouldn't you know it? I had parked in a section reserved for bank customers, which every Cambridge knew. The kindly traffic policeman went off muttering to himself about stupid colonials.

Welwyn Garden City was our next stopping place for a visit with a niece of the boss. In nearby Ware I had my first Cornish pastry and a tasty morsel it was. At the city we were welcomed by a huge Nabisco sign. The town was begun fifty years ago in an effort to bring industry away from London and it has been carefully planned with large central gardens with an enormous fountain and all buildings of red or mellow yellow brick.

The next morning we visited the ruins at St. Albans, where the Romans built a city in honour of the first Christian martyr in Britain early into the fourth century. The excavations have yielded the foundations of a theatre, a series of shops and a town house, complete with drains and underground shrine. Line tiles and mosaics have also been unearthed and work is still continuing.

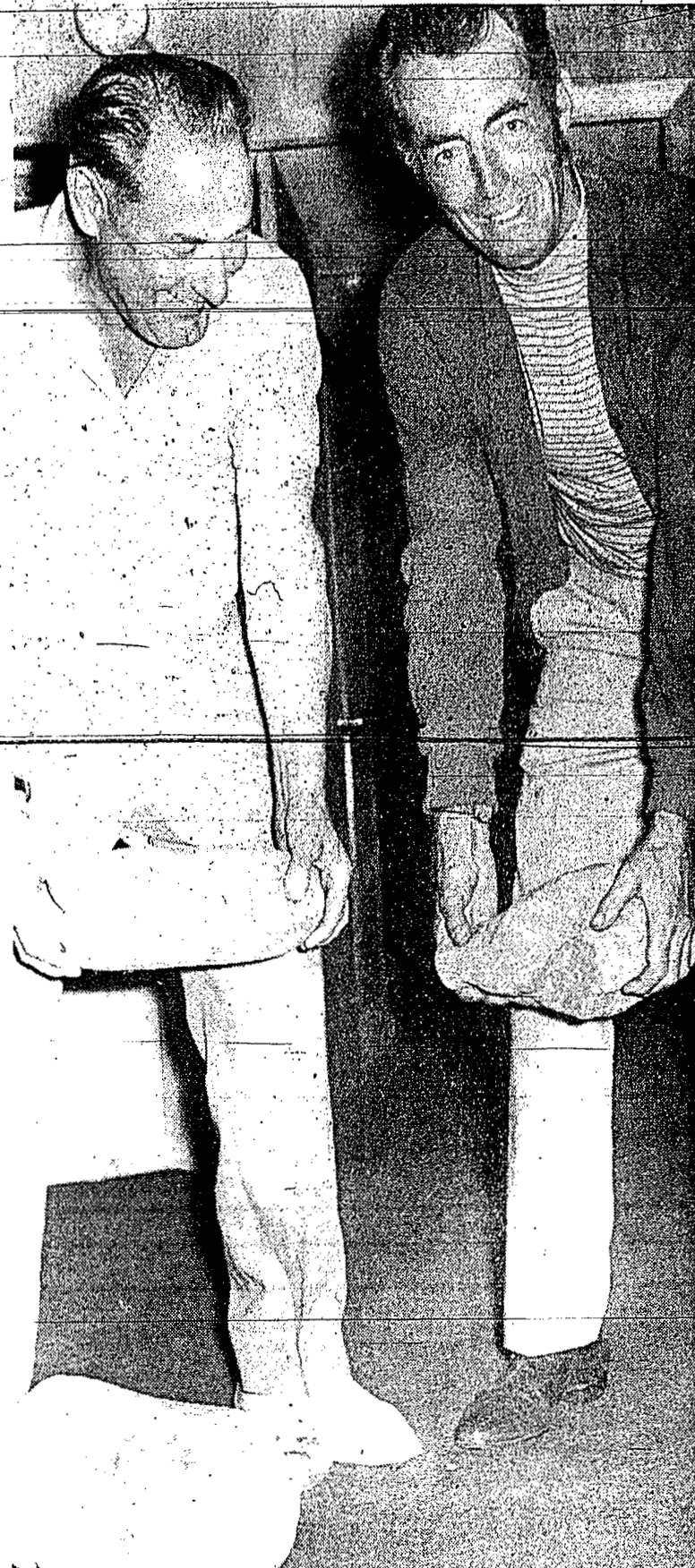
