More problems over Happy Cooker licence

Not every one likes success is what Bob Moffat, Operator of the Happy Cooker Chip Wagon, found out at the last council meeting.

Moffat was there applying for an extension of his peddlers licence to purchase another truck.

"We want to be able to expand," Moffat told council Tuesday. He says he has been overwhelmed by his success and is having groups requesting them to attend various events to provide food services. The truck currently sits on a lot owned by Chevron across from the Burger Baron, just before the train crossing, and says he must stay there if customers are going to know where to find him.

Alderman Corrine Lonsdale says she has had two complaints from local food vendors that the Happy Cooker is taking away business. Lonsdale shares their concerns saying council should look after its tax paying businesses first because the peddlers only have to pay for a \$50 licence.

Alderman Chuck Harvey defends the Happy Cooker application saying, "if it wasn't suc-

cessful we wouldn't have a problem."

Harvey says a fruit peddler, working the same lot as the Happy Cooker (also across from Overwaitea store) is not very successful and council have not received any complaints from other fruit vendors in the city nor objections from council members.

"If you are going to stop one,

you should stop them all," says Harvey. "You can't leave that fellow selling fruit in front of Overwaitea if you deny this fellow a licence."

He says denying them a licence, because of complaints from local businesses that they are taking away business, amounts to "running a protection racket for the local businesses."

The Happy Cooker's application passed with Aldermen Lonsdale and Ron Barr voting against it.

Moffat says he can now go out and buy a truck which, he estimates, will take eight weeks to convert over to their uses. When finished he says they will be hiring two people to run the truck through the summer.

Easement for dollar not an issue

It's been going on since 1969. That was the year the dyke was built across the Armstrong property beside the Mamquam bridge and the year an easement (allowing access to the dyke) was signed, but not fully lived up to, (by the district), with Bob Armstrong one of the land owners.

Armstrong is holding off signing the easement agreement recently redrawn by the district, until several outstanding grievances are resolved.

The council has offered a dollar for the easement and have stated they are not willing to pay more for the easement fearing it will set a precedent for the more than 50 easement agreements still outstanding.

Armstrong says the one dollar payment for the easement is not the issue but that he wants compensation for trees taken from his land during recent work by the district on his land, back taxes for the land the dyke is built on, and compensation for land left outside the dyke.

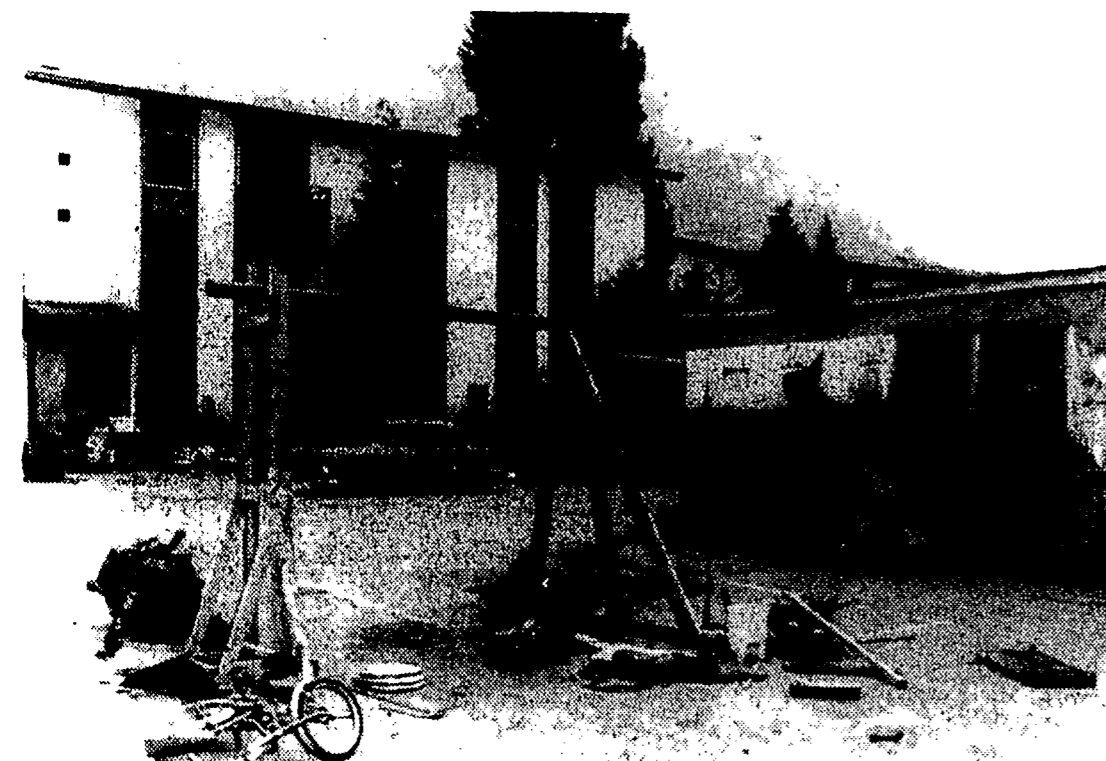
Armstrong originally wanted \$12,581 for compensation before signing the Easement agreement, with the district offering him \$2,500. But the council only wants to pay a dollar.

Alderman Chuck Harvey feels Armstrong has been wronged by the district and should pay him some compensation.

Mayor Jim Elliott disagrees and says council is not responsible for the mistakes of past councils and therefore should not pay him.

Armstrong says most of his problems have been with the current and previous council and he will continue attempting to secure compensation.

Armstrong is invited before council tonight to discuss the issue further.



What a mess!!

Southpark apartments a mess

"It certainly isn't very attractive any more," said Alderman Egan Tobus of the boarded up, over grown, auto graveyard the Southpark Apartments have become since shutting down a year and a half ago.

Council is giving notice to the owner, Jim Barr of Vancouver, to clean up the apartments or the city will do it for him, at Barr's expense.

Barr is reportedly preparing to bring the buildings up to stan-

dards so he can strata title them and sell the apartments piece by piece.

Southpark has not been lived in since a dispute arose between Barr and the people who were to purchase the apartments from him, but couldn't keep up the payments. Hydro and gas bills were also left unpaid with the heat being cut off in December 1982. The tenants withheld their rents and started moving out.

All of the windows in the

buildings are now either broken or boarded up. The remains of two old buses, a trailer home, and several junk cars in various states of disrepair now litter the central courtyard. The swimming pool in the rear has tadpoles swimming between discarded tires, branches and garbage. In this, Squamish's answer to urban blight, kids play.

The owner now has a few weeks to clean up the mess before the district moves in to do it for him.

No injuries

38 residents were ready to move in by the anticipated opening earlier in the month, and 24 staff were ready to start work, but all

Dillabough says he doesn't know when that word will be coming but says some more parts for the station would be arriving (last) Monday.

Police report lack of seatbelts

The survey conducted by the RCMP in Squamish, Whistler and Pemberton for a month earlier this year revealed some interesting statistics.

According to Cst. Dolahn the number of charges for lack of seat belts showed a sharp increase over the past year with 137 violations recorded compared to 62 in 1983. However, the checking this year

was over a longer period and a larger number of hours were spent on the program.

A pleasant factor of the report was that in both years there were no fatal accidents and the increase of accidents and numbers of people involved in accidents did not show a corresponding rise in comparison to the number of vehicles checked each year.

Police in the three years spent a total of 108 hours checking vehicles with 5581 checked.

There was a sharp increase in the number of charges laid, from 318 in 1982 but only a slight increase in the number of incidents of impaired driving, from 15 to 19.

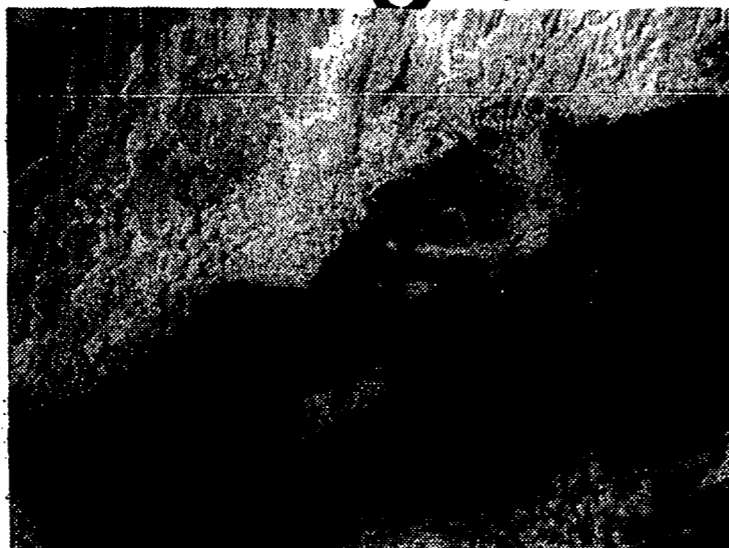
Successful health fair

Teachers, staff feted at retirement party

Two teachers and two other employees of the Howe Sound School District were honored at a retirement party in the Wagon Wheel on Wednesday, June 6.

Retiring teachers were Al Bird, who had come to Squamish 33 years ago to teach in the new Howe Sound Secondary School when it was first built, and Kay Pickard, who taught kindergarten at Britannia and later at Squamish.

Staff employees were Ethel Bertola, for ten years secretary of the Pemberton Secondary School and Geoff Pickard who had worked as bus driver for 19 years.

Following the delicious smorgasbord dinner, a feature of the restaurant, board chairman Don Wilson read a congratulatory telegram to Bird from former principal Bill Baldry and his wife Kathy.

Norman Rutherford, principal of Howe Sound Secondary and former principal of Brackendale Secondary where Bird taught since its inception, spoke on the courses which they could offer because of his capabilities and skills. He mentioned that Bird had been one of the "trekkers" who marched from Howe Sound to Brackendale when the latter high school opened and wished him luck in his summer trip, a search for gold in the Yukon.

Former principal of Howe Sound Secondary, Gordon Greenwood remarked that Bird had four trade certificates and was always an able and competent teacher.

Audrey Rhodes presented Bird with a gift from the Howe Sound teachers' Association and trustee

Margaret Marchant spoke on his years of service to the community and the many positions he had held during his life here. She also recalled some moments during his career and amusing anecdotes, before presenting him with a gift from the board.

Bird commented on the fact that 40 years ago he had been busy on a mine sweeper off the beaches of Normandy. "The day before we sat in Portsmouth harbor waiting for D-Day. When it arrived we swept the beaches for a solid month."

He gave a history of the schools in the district, from the first one at Brackendale to the modern one which stands there now. He presented the board with the old Mashiter school bell, a copy of the first annual, the program for the opening of Howe Sound Secondary and the key to the clock which hung in the Mashiter School, as well as the clock, which he had restored to working order.

Ellenore Ross commented on the years of devoted service to Pemberton Secondary from Ethel Bertola, stating that she was a member of the pioneer Ronayne family and had gone to the old Pemberton Meadows school.

"Tonight must also have memories for Ethel," Ross said, "as she served for a number of years in the Canadian services before coming back to Canada. She later came back to the valley and I can remember how she hated gum-chewers!"

Ross presented her with a gift from the board and a few minutes later Loretta Cloutier presented

her with a gift from C.U.P.E.

Kay and Geoff Pickard came to Britannia in 1950 and she served for a term as a school trustee, later starting the kindergarten at Britannia Beach, and then coming to Squamish. Geoff worked at Britannia for the mining company but came to the school board in 1965 as a bus driver and custodian. He also did grounds work and delivered parcels to the school from the resource center.

Trustee Jim MacDonald commented on their years of service to the school district and presented a gift from the board while Audrey Rhodes gave Kay a gift from the teachers. C.U.P.E. president Loretta Cloutier made a presentation from the group and the staff at Garibaldi Highlands, where Kay taught kindergarten and sang a song in her honour.

Little to change with new leader

John Turner is in and Martin Goldfarb is on the go. A summer election is possible, as is a re-election of the Liberals. But does it really matter?

No matter what happens this summer Canada will have a right wing government.

For those who wait in the record long unemployment lines, many empty promises will be given. For those in the West, greater representation will be promised despite the stronger Eastern influences of both major parties. For most we will see little change as we perform our democratic ritual of choosing leaders Tweedle-dum or Tweedle-dee.

Squamish Times Cartoonist tours Ottawa

Recently I had the opportunity to travel to Ottawa to participate in the 32nd Annual Adventures in Citizenship programme, sponsored by the Rotary clubs of Canada.

The four-day programme was originated in order to give young Canadians a better sense of what their country stands for, the rights and privileges it represents, and an opportunity to find out what it means to be a Canadian citizen.

Our itinerary had us visiting such places as the Court of Canadian Citizenship, various foreign embassies, the National Headquarters of the RCMP, the Bank of Canada, the Supreme Court of Canada, and several other spots of political and social interest.

And, in the off-chance that some of the participants might be

bogged down in such activities as a discussion on Canada's place in

the world (peacemaker or valuable ally) or an address on the upside down pyramid system of Canadian economics, the wise organizers of the program included in the itinerary, evening dances featuring live bands that even played Rock n' Roll.

The trip opened my eyes a bit, and I think I know more about what it means to be a Canadian citizen, how our country stands on an international level, and maybe, as I carry this information into adulthood, the trip will become worthwhile in that sense.

But in every other sense, the trip was more than worth taking, and I'm grateful that the Rotary club of Squamish gave me this opportunity to have the kind of fun and to meet the kinds of interesting people I did in Ottawa.

Although we are deep into non-summer, there has been the odd day when the sun has been shining and the days are warm and sunny. But unfortunately the ones when the wind blows chill and the rain clouds race across the sky are more prevalent.

It has certainly affected the gardens. Things that don't mind the cool weather are doing well but the sun and heat loving plants are having their problems. I noticed the sweet peas, although they were planted late, come up as thick as the hair on a dog, and the radish and lettuce are doing fine. But the nasturtiums have only produced one plant from all the seeds I planted while the tomatoes are just standing still.

There are no cucumber plants yet and maybe they will have to be replanted or maybe we should just decide that summer has been cancelled this year and reschedule it for next year. I know that my rose bushes were a mass of blossoms in early June last year but, while there are fat buds on the bushes this year there are no blossoms yet.

Some of the new roses I planted have buds and there are two climbers which should be beautiful. However it will depend on how good the weather is and how much sunshine we have. The old bushes are strong and healthy but do need a bit of pruning so this will have to be done. Also there can't be a more tedious job than picking the dead blossoms off the rhododendrons but it has to be done to keep them blooming. The new yellow azalea planted in front of the evergreens is beautiful and I must get one or two more.

As soon as I can get a place ready for them I want to plant another few roses because they do bloom so prolifically and they are so beautiful. As soon as possible I want the south forty cleared of all the weed trees and shrubs and then maybe it will be possible to cut the grass and keep it looking like a yard instead of a jungle. If I every get around to having the low white fence I want built and have the climbing roses spilling over it, it should make an attractive edge to part of the yard. Then all that will remain will be to get the house painted. That's if I can afford it. It has never been painted and

I'm scared to death at the possible cost of getting those old weathered shingles painted. But it would look nice if it was white with a green trim.

Inside it's just about what I wanted. Of course you always want to add something new and I'm no different from anyone else. I would like a nice dark wood wall unit and perhaps a new color TV to replace the old black and white Dad had, but that can wait. Right now I'm revelling in new drapes, new rugs and all the nice fresh paint and stuff.

Have you noticed that the wild roses are blooming along the roadsides? There are some lovely ones in a corner of the yard by the river bank and I want to leave that clump there for their color and the lovely red rose hips they have in the fall. They are a favorite food of many of the birds and attract some of them. The cork tree has leaved out and should soon be in bloom. This is one of the trees which came from the site of the former fish hatchery at Owl Creek, and along with the small one, provide a decorative tree. It is flourishing on the river bank where Dad moved it to a few years ago and last year it bloomed for the first time.

The bark of this tree is rough and ridged just like cork and while it is not one of the famous cork trees from Portugal, it is a cork elm and the bark is very decorative.

There are also some forsythia bushes and a beauty bush locked up somewhere in the jungle of trees and shrubs in the south forty and once they are able to breathe when the weed shrubs are removed, they will be able to bloom freely. The kerria bush was a magnificent show this spring, the branches looped and arched over the grass and presented a veritable golden shower of blossoms. I know I was impressed with them and really admired the flowers.

This year I planted an incarvillea or garden gloxinia and they are lovely! Large pink blooms something like a giant monkey flower with pale feathery foliage. But such a lovely color. It has been blooming for several weeks now and looks as if it will be blooming for some time yet. But it's one of a new and different type of plant for me.

Noticed some buds on the mock orange the other day. This is the one I dug up on the lower slopes of Brohm Ridge and this is early for it to be blooming. But it is lovely and I really like it even though it does not have the double blossoms and heavy scent of the cultivars. These wild shrubs transplant quite easily and as they are native to the area one does not have any trouble with them.

Also noticed two small oak trees under the one I have on the river bank. They must be fairly new because I have never seen them before and it is the first time any of the acorns from the tree have produced seedlings. Must transplant one of them and see if someone wants the other one!

By the time you read this I will have just returned from a trip to Elkford to visit my granddaughter and Gary. I have been looking forward to it for quite some time and was so pleased to get away in spring when all the flowers are blooming. The southern transprovincial highway is so lovely and while there are lots of ups and downs on it as it snakes over several mountain ranges, there's certainly no chance to get bored. Income tax information & the Privacy act

If you have a dispute with the Department of National Revenue over how much income tax you should be paying, the Privacy Act legislation might be a useful source of information for you.

By applying to the Federal Government through the Privacy Act, you can obtain copies of your full tax file - the one used by Revenue Canada when assessing your income tax. The file contains your old tax returns, correspondence between you and the department, and departmental notes used in preparing your return. By reviewing your own file, you can determine whether or not Revenue Canada is assessing your tax on a basis of the most accurate and up-to-date information available.

I heard from a few farmers and

ranchers in the Cariboo-Chilcotin who, because of disputes over income tax reassessments, have applied for and received their files. They have found a number of mistakes which lead them to believe that they are being taxed incorrectly, and they hope to use these inaccuracies to support their arguments during an appeal.

In most cases, Revenue Canada officials are very thorough and take great care to ensure accuracy. However, with millions of taxpayer files passing their desks each year, mistakes are bound to occur. You can ensure that the information being used in your case is accurate by looking over your own income tax file.

I spoke recently with a tax lawyer who is familiar with the powers of Revenue Canada. Not

long ago, he defended a taxpayer on an income tax appeal using information the taxpayer had received through the Privacy Act. In this case, the taxpayer's paycheques had already been garnished by the department. By pointing out inaccuracies that were found in the taxpayer's file, the lawyer argued that the department's audit was faulty and the reassessment was incorrect.

The taxpayer won the case. If you think that your tax bill is wrong, you should have a look at your file.

In future years, when the sixth annual Legion Branch No. 277 men's fastball tournament will be looked back upon it will not be remembered as a large or prestigious event as far as B.C. sports is concerned.
