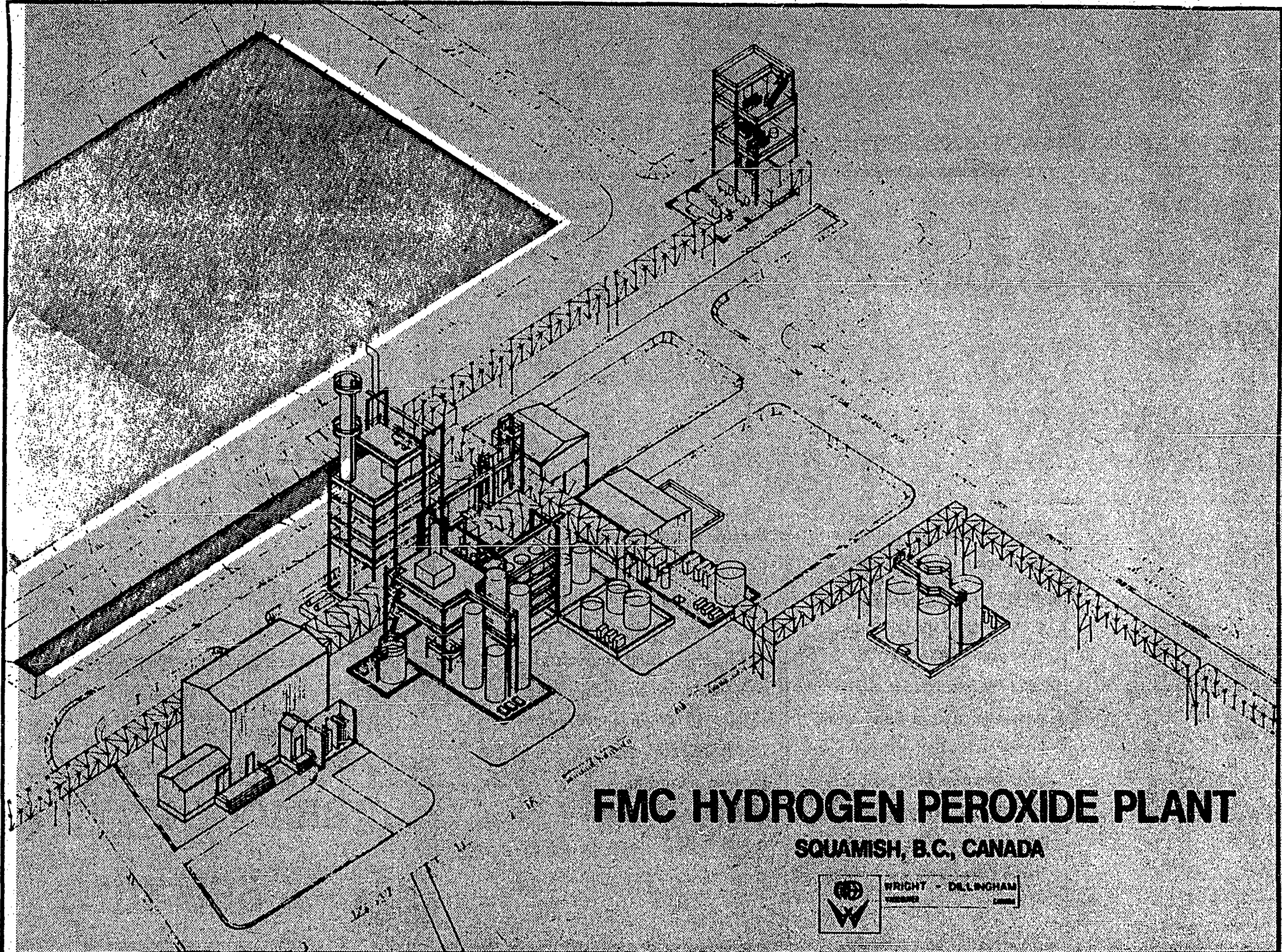

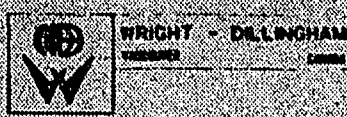


BENNETT SETS FMC PLANT IN MOTION

B.C. Premier Bill Bennett arrived by helicopter July 18 to turn the sod at the groundbreaking ceremony for FMC's new \$35 million hydrogen peroxide plant in Squamish.

of FMC's Specialty Chemicals Division, announced the completion of the new plant to be in later 1986. "The technology we are using in this sophisticated new plant allows us to significantly increase capacity without increasing the size of the physical plant," Harris said.

"I'm proud of our plans for the plant here," Harris added.

FMC of Canada Vice President and Resident Manager Jack Selby said the plant marked a "new era of growth."

"This new plant would not be possible were it not for the hard work and dedication of our employees, the special assistance and support of local and provincial governments and the loyalty of our customers, many of whom have been with us since we began making chlorine and caustic here almost 20 years ago," Selby said.

Acting Mayor Wilf Dowad praised the new development by FMC and called the company a "good corporate citizen."

The company has operated a chlorine/caustic soda plant in Squamish since 1966. Preparation of the new hydrogen peroxide site began earlier this year. FMC awarded the engineering and construction contracts to Wright Engineers Ltd. and Dillingham Construction Ltd., a joint venture, both from Vancouver.

The plant will be located adjacent to the existing chlor-alkali plant on the north end of FMC's property. It will occupy 10,000 square metres and will cost about \$35 million to construct. The plant will employ FMC's latest organic technology.

FMC Corporation, headquartered in Chicago, is a major international producer of machinery and chemicals for industry, agriculture and government with 1984 sales of \$3.4 billion. Worldwide, the company has 27,000 employees located at 107 manufacturing facilities and mines in 26 states and in 14 other nations.

FMC officials have said that a major motivating factor to locating the new plant in Squamish is Squamish's decision to enter into the Provincial/Municipal Partnership Agreement with the Province.

B.C. Premier Bill Bennett took the controls of a bulldozer and broke the ground at the site of FMC of Canada's new \$35 million hydrogen peroxide plant in Squamish on July 18th.

Bennett was flown into Squamish by helicopter to participate in the ground-breaking ceremony, also attended by cabinet officials, executives from the pulp and paper industry, FMC representatives from both the U.S. and Canada, and local dignitaries.

Before taking control of the bulldozer, Bennett told guests at the "invitation only" ceremony that similar new industry will continue to stabilize and broaden the economic base in B.C.

Bennett thanked representatives of the industrial sector for their continued development.

"Thank you for expressing confidence in not only Squamish, but B.C. as well," Bennett said.

"We've been through some tough times but we've met our challenge," Bennett added. "I feel very optimistic. We will have a better way of life."

William McMinn, FMC Vice President, said his company "was committed to the continued growth of the Canadian pulp and paper industry where hydrogen peroxide plays a major role in pulp bleaching."

"We believe construction of this new facility will help Canada to eliminate the need for hydrogen peroxide imports and become self sufficient in this increasingly important raw material to the manufacturing of pulp and paper," McMinn added. Robert Harries, Manager

Minister signs Agreement with Squamish

Municipal Affairs Minister Bill Ritchie was in Squamish July 17th to sign the Provincial/Municipal Partnership Agreement with Squamish.

Acting Mayor Wilf Dowd co-signed the agreement with Ritchie.

The signing followed a June 4th decision of council to enter into the government program at the 50 percent level.

The agreement provides for property tax breaks of 50 percent for new industries and the expansion of existing companies. The province will give equivalent breaks.

In signing the agreement, Ritchie commended Squamish's decision to participate in the program saying it demonstrated a change in attitudes of municipal councils.

Ritchie added that 78 municipalities have either signed the agreement or are ready to sign. He said the spin-off of the agreement is approximately \$1 billion in announced investments.

"These people were on the verge of making a decision," Ritchie said, pointing out that the Partnership Agreement had been a decisive factor for many of the new investments.

Ritchie told guests at a reception to honour the agreement signing that the program had already shown to be a success.

"The program is working extremely well," Ritchie said. "It's an old-fashioned idea. We need industrial development because we need jobs."

Ritchie said the concept of the agreement was born when representatives from labor, industry and local government in Trail approached the Ministry with ideas to improve the industrial and economic situation in that municipality by easing taxation.

The program will allow the municipality of Squamish to offer special tax incentives and reduced fees to new or expanding industrial businesses.

The agreement also gives Squamish exemption from the Municipal Act which will allow for a reduction in municipal property taxes on all new improvements in industrial property.

As part of the partnership agreement, the province will reduce the provincial non-residential school tax by 50 percent for new industrial improvement.

In a press release, Ritchie referred to a number of new industrial developments that have resulted from the incentives offered under the program.

These include a \$35 million hydrogen peroxide plant to be built by FMC of Canada Ltd. and the \$300 million Makin Corporation paper mill at Britannia Beach.

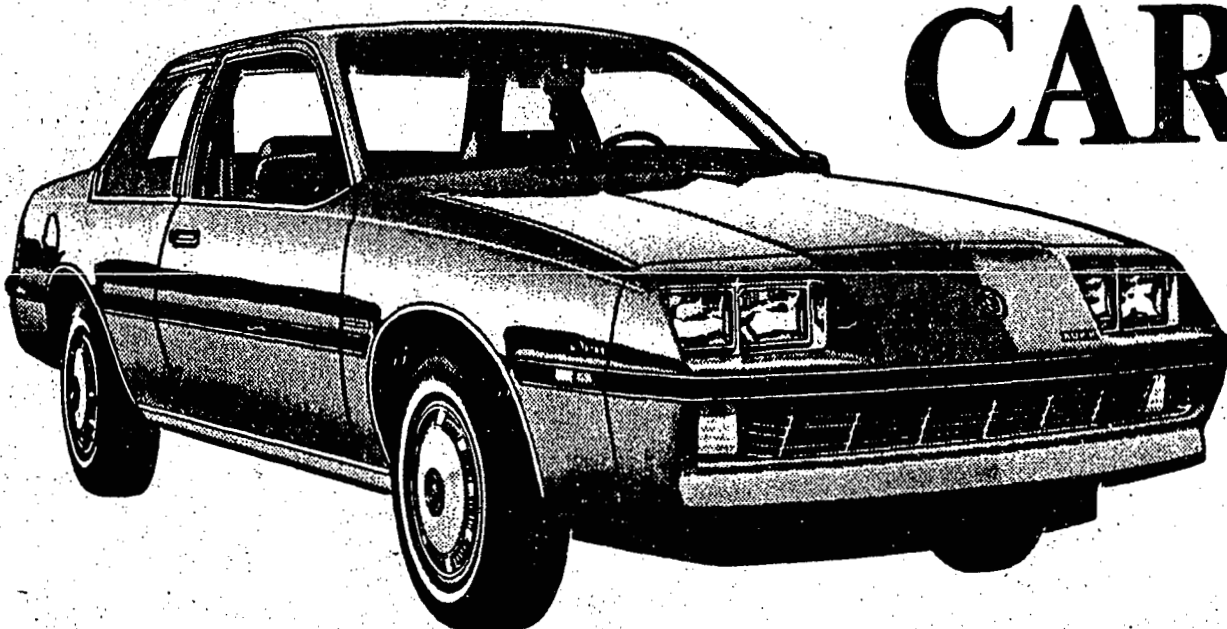

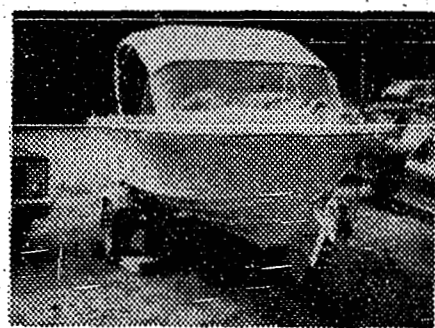

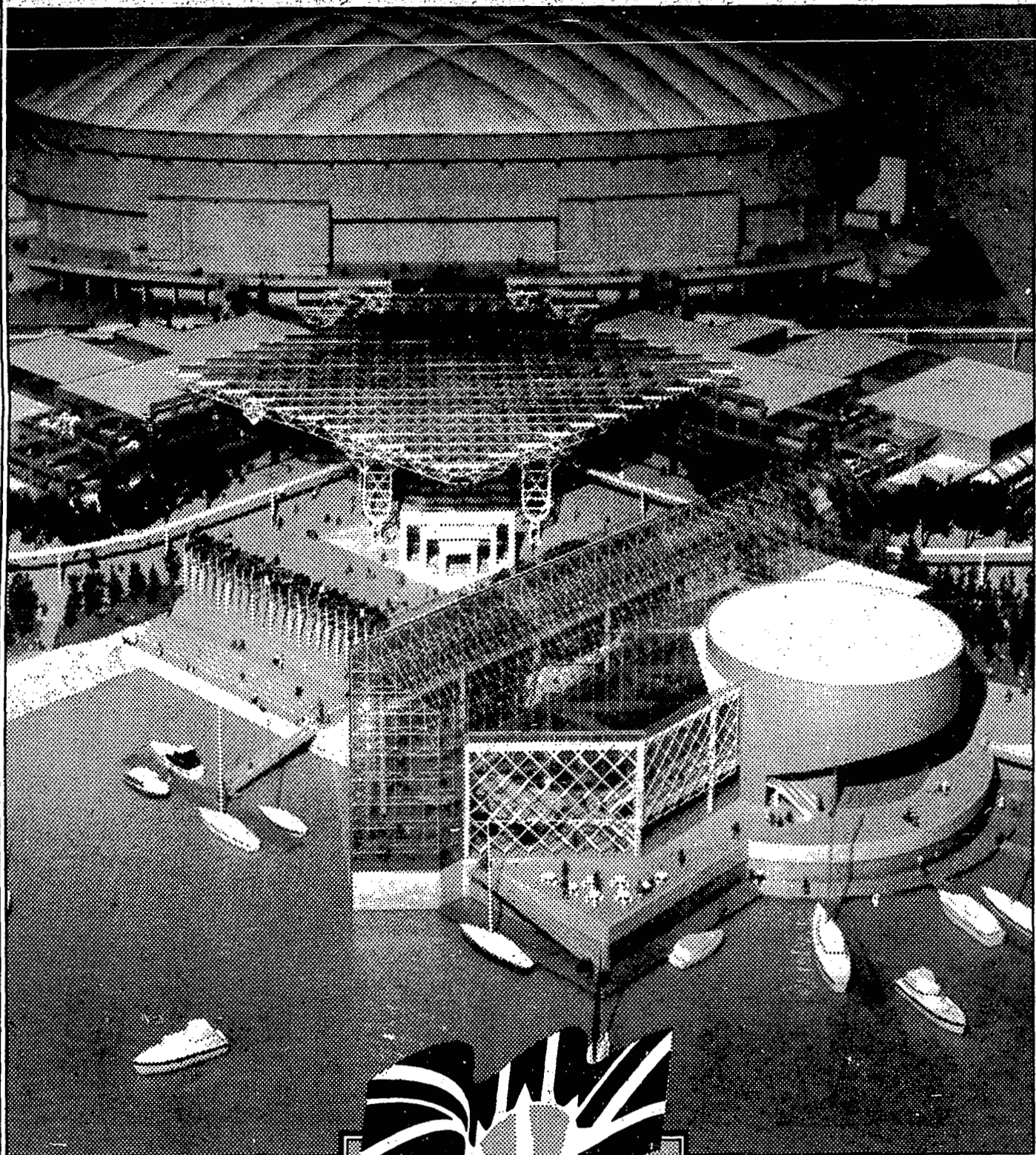
The highlight of the evening was a quick turn behind the wheel of the fire engine (under the watchful eye of Fire Chief Pat Hampson).

The contestants still have a busy schedule of activities remaining before one of them is crowned Miss Timber Queen during Squamish Days.

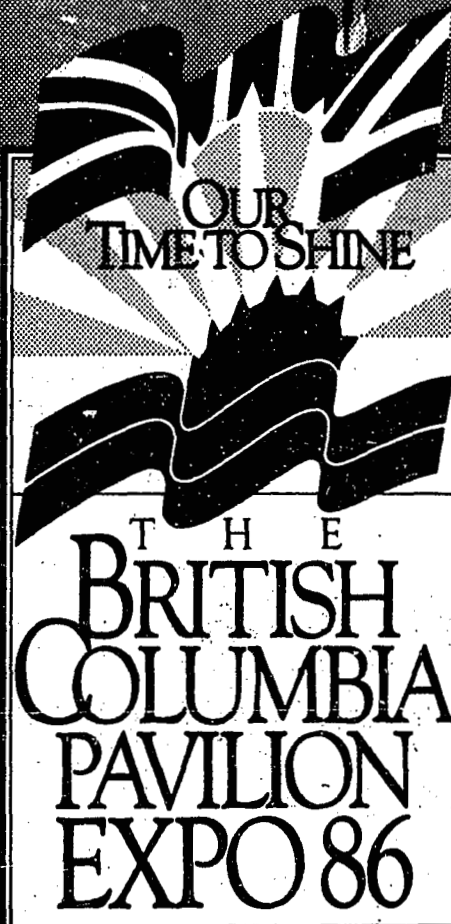

Squamish area has great tourist potential

John Jennings, from the Tourism Association of Southwestern B.C. told the Chamber of Commerce at its luncheon meeting last week that this area of the province has great potential as far as increasing the number of tourists visiting is concerned.

Jennings said the southwestern area is divided into a number of regions, mainly by the geographical boundaries. These are: the Lower Mainland to Hell's Gate to Manning Park, the Vancouver area, the Sunshine Coast and the Horseshoe Bay to Pemberton area.

"People come to you by car, by sea, by train and by air. You are just scratching the surface of the tourist potential," he added.

"In southwestern B.C. you generated \$710 millions through tourism alone in 1983."

He told the chamber that the SW Tourist Association is mainly interested in marketing the area and that working together a great deal could be accomplished.

One part of tourism is looking after customers once they get here but another one is bringing them here in the first place.

This can be done by know-

ing who the visitors are, where they are coming from and why.

He has also said that people come here to do things and we should have lots of things to offer them.

"Marketing should be done on a regional basis," he said. "In order to do this we need an identity. In the Fraser Valley one area is identified as Rainbow Country, Sechelt and Gibsons are known as the Sunshine Coast and this area is identified as Sea to Sky Country. These all identify which part of the area we occupy."

He also said Southwestern B.C. would help various areas in taking part in trade shows and other marketing activities.

"One suggestion is for hotels to offer a 50 percent reduction in rates. This coupled with the difference in the Canadian and American dollar could give visitors as much as an 80 percent discount," he stated.

He mentioned some programs which could be instituted such as a co-op ad program, a brochure program, a trip around Southwestern B.C. and a new visitor's guide and possibly an audio-visual presentation.

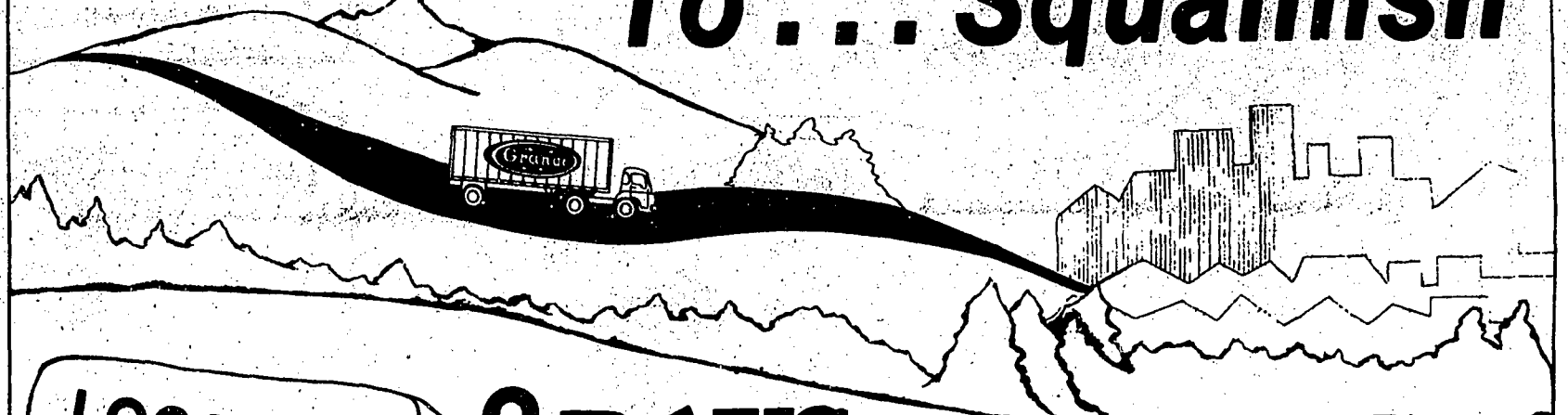

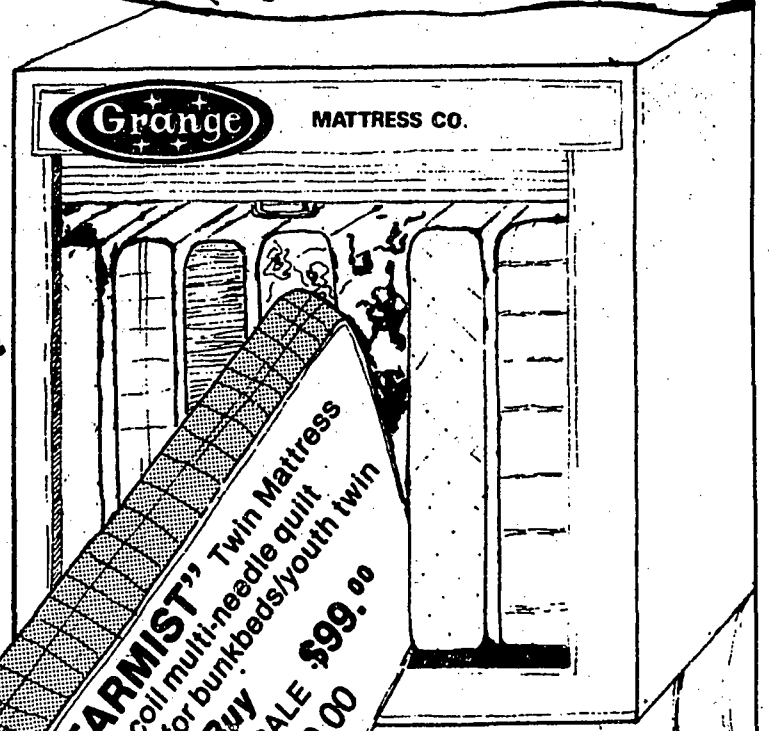

Alternate source is needed

The sprinkling regulations, recently initiated by the municipality, resulted from the heavy drain on the municipal water supply engendered by the unusual spell of hot weather.

The prolonged heat caused local homeowners to use more water than usual and as a result the reservoirs were depleted and some almost ran dry. With water levels in the Stawamus River at an unprecedented low, there was grave concern about the amount of water available for the community.

For some time an alternate source or we should say an additional source of water for the district had been investigated and one has been found in the Mashiter Creek, which could augment the present supply. This would relieve the fear that reservoirs would run dry or there would not be an adequate supply of water in case of a fire.

Perhaps it would be a good time to look at the feasibility of the implementation of an additional supply of water from Mashiter Creek. Then there would be no danger of the community running short of water.

At one time a dam on the Stawamus to impound water to provide for dry

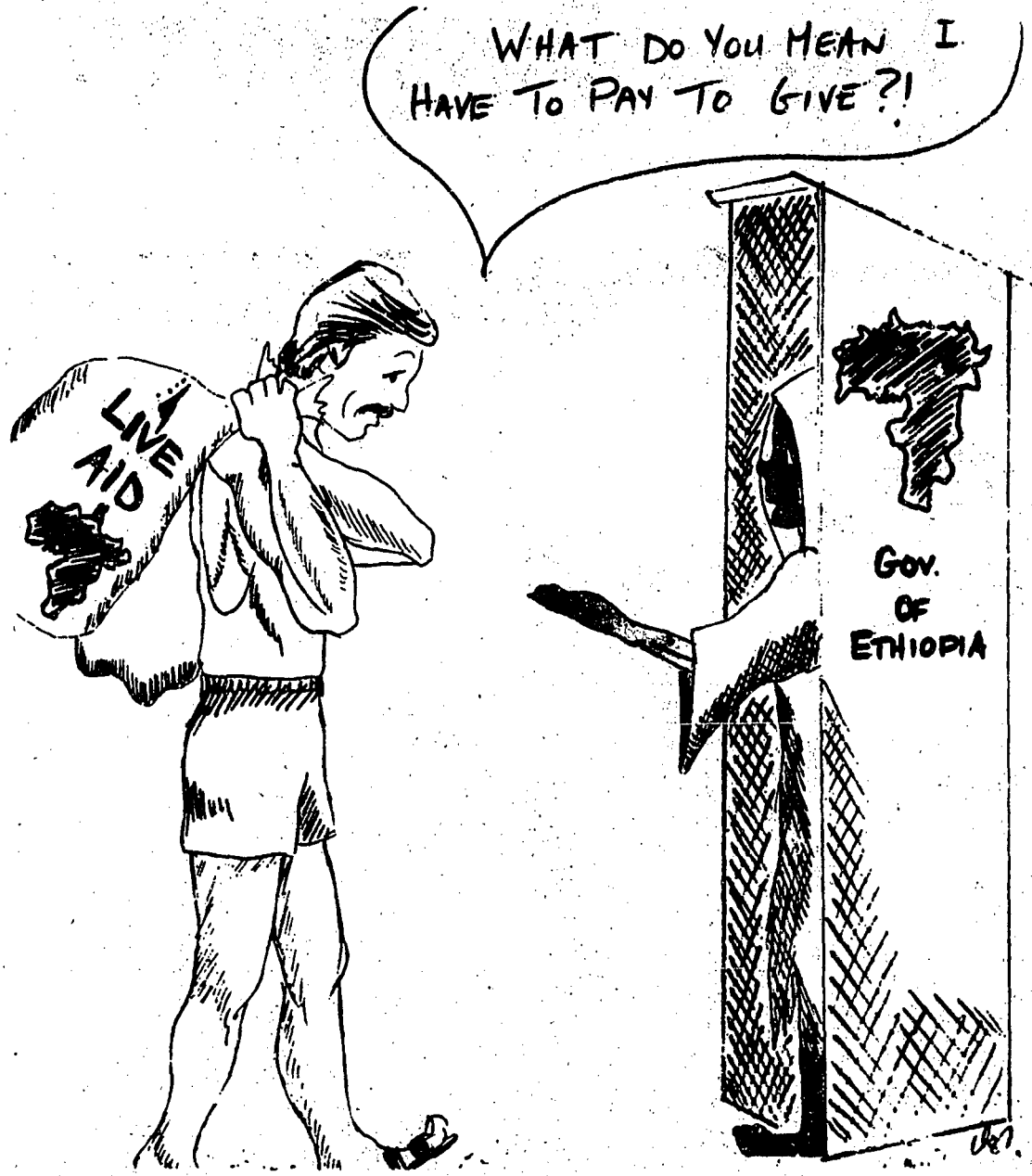
periods, was discussed and perhaps this could also be looked at. There is room for a dam and even raising the structure a few feet would provide a large amount of additional water. However, the capacity of the stream would have to be considered as well as the suitability of the site for a dam.

One advantage to the use of the Mashiter is that it is closer to the areas where the residential development is greatest and where the greatest expansion can be expected. This would mean that it could be fed into the present distribution system without too much additional expense.

But whether the municipality decided on a dam at the Stawamus or using Mashiter Creek for an additional water supply, some planning should be done to increase the water supply for the district before another hot spell like the present one occurs.

In our area, where we expect to have a constant and never-failing source of water for all our needs, including lawns and gardens, we should make sure that we have sufficient water at all times of the year, even if there is an extraordinary dry spell.

On the rocky cliffs leading to Whistler, you can find clumps of the sweet briar roses whose scent is even more overpowering. The ponds along the highway are full of golden water lilies and in damp spots you can find the delicate ladies-tresses orchids, one of our native orchids with tall spikes of sweetly scented white flowers.

The delicate orange hawkweed thrives in dry spots along with the dogbane, you can find pyrola and prince's pine while the delicate rein orchid lives in the deep cool forests. On sunny banks, the dwarf dogwood has almost finished blooming and the delicate four pointed starry flowers will soon be sporting the clusters of bright red berries so dearly loved by the birds.

In the moist wood, the delicate flowers of the linnea borealis, the flower so beloved by the great Swedish naturalist Carl Linneaus, creeps over the mossy vine, the twin pink flowers studding the evergreen vine. My children used to make wreaths of the vines and I have always loved the perfume of these flowers. A member of the honeysuckle family, the twin trumpets exude a delicate fragrance which epitomizes summer to me.

Often alongside the twinflower, you can find the slender tendrils of the clubmoss which seems to like the same conditions, and there are sometimes clumps of the dwarf salal and everygreen huckleberry in the vicinity.

But perhaps the particular delight of this time of year is the abundance of wild berries. Starting with the wild strawberries, no bigger than a little fingernail, the parade of summer berries leads to the blueberries and huckleberries, the tart sweetness of the dwarf wild blackberries, through the salal berries to the high blackberries and each of them has a distinctive taste and flavour.

The wild strawberries are gems. They are scarce and it takes hours to get even a small pail full, but when you do you have the essence of summer in a bowl. I remember one year, when I found a patch of them growing in semishade and each succulent crimson drop of concentrated sweetness was delicious. I managed to pick enough of them to have wild strawberries for an ice cream sauce and even to make some jam from them.

The wild blueberries aren't as big as their tame counterparts, but they have a distinctive tart flavour that makes the most delicious pies and adds a tang to muffins. The girls used to love them and after a berry picking expedition, their lips would be stained blue with the juice from their pickings.

But my special favorite was the tiny wild blackberry or dewberry as it is sometimes called. Growing in logged off or burned over areas, the berries are sometimes as long as a little finger and have a tartness that is part of its appeal. It makes the most delicious pies, as well as jelly or jam, and while many people don't like the seeds, it is still delicious. I used it as a sauce for ice cream and we loved it.

Later in the summer come the other "wild" blackberries, the cultivated ones which have run wild and can be found along roadsides and in fields or waste places. They make a delicious pie with apples, or by themselves, are great for jelly and, if you strain out the seeds, they make a beautiful jam.

Some other wild berries are blackcaps which make a beautiful syrup for pancakes, and the saskatoon berry, so popular in the prairies, but seeming somewhat flat here on the coast where we have so many other berries to choose from.

I've also found a few wild cranberries, but there don't seem to be any cranberry bogs here like there were in Olsen Valley where I was born. There we could pick them by the bucketfuls. The Oregon grape, which grows profusely near D'Arcy, also makes a delicious jelly to use with meats and game. It is tart and goes well with the taste of deer and moose. It can also be combined with apples to make a delicious jelly.

I also tried to make jelly with the high bush cranberries, but it seemed to be a losing proposition.

However, it might be worth another try if I could ever find enough of them.

This is also the season for salads and with the fresh vegetables and fruit on hand, there are dozens of delicious fruit or vegetable salads which can be made. From the first crisp radishes and onions in spring, mixed with the lettuce thinnings from the garden, to the delicious slaws made with cabbage, apples and nuts in the fall, there are a succession of delicious salads and you never need to make the same one twice!

One of my favorites is cucumbers in sour cream and I have a recipe for a jellied cucumber salad which is lovely. Fresh tomatoes, sliced and sprinkled with salt, pepper and snipped basil is another favorite. But you can take any combination of fresh vegetables and make a salad, or for a change, take an assortment of fresh vegetables, place them on a platter along with a number of dressings and garnishes and let everyone make up their own.

On the night of July 1, I was coming home from visiting friends, when the moon, almost at the fullest, was rising in the notch of the Stawamus River valley. It may have been a trick of the lighting, or the way the moon hung so low in the sky, but it was enormous, just like an inflated football. I was wishing I had a camera and the equipment to take a picture of it because it was so beautiful.

You sometimes get the same effect in fall when the hunter's moon seems to be engorged and enormous. It was lucky there wasn't much traffic on the road because I kept looking up to watch it. Made me think of the poem by Shelley about the moon when he talks about "that orb'd maiden with white fire laden."

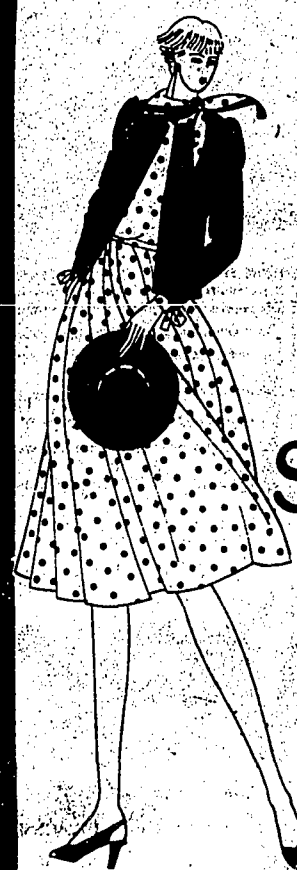

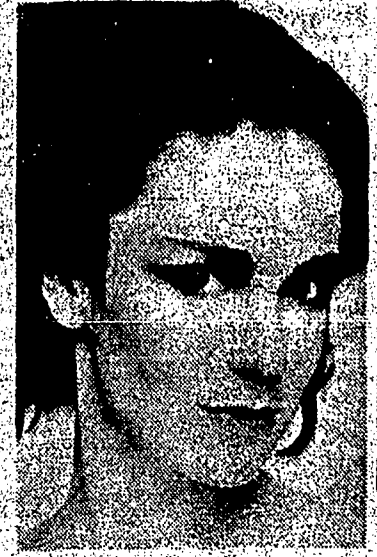

Stuart stings Skagit to put K&M on top

The drought is over, finally.

It has been so long since the last time a local men's or ladies' softball team has won a tournament on home turf that nobody can remember when that last time was. Dave Morris, a dedicated, though often with too little credit, man who has been putting together baseball events for five years could only come as close as "God, I don't know, several years ago, I guess," in determining the exact figure.

Anyway, Dave, it is all past history now.

Island Jetfoil looks at tours from Seattle

Island Jetfoil, which is presently operating a service between Seattle and Victoria, is interested in the possibilities of expanding its service to include ski tours from Seattle to Whistler, using Squamish as the point of entry.

Representatives of the firm were in Squamish on Wednesday, July 17th to look at the possibility of bringing the vessel in to Squamish, possible docking sites, and to see if there was any interest in arranging ski trips from Seattle to Whistler.

Rick Carter, assistant to the president of the company, said the feasibility

study being made was to find a base for their ship, the possibilities of fueling it in Squamish and other necessities.

They are interested in extending their schedules and operations to Squamish and Whistler.

"The capacity of the vessel is 200," he told a meeting of members of the Squamish and Whistler Chambers of Commerce and the WRA, "and we are looking at a price of about \$250 for a three day ski package from Seattle to Whistler."

The vessel needs a depth of 10 feet of water with 25 feet preferred. Carter said they had looked at the barge slip at Squamish Terminals and there is also a possibility that a small dock adjacent to the offices at the Terminals could be adapted to the needs of the company.

The small boat harbor was looked at but there would be problems with this as the tide drops below the vessel's requirements. Another possibility would be the wharf at Darrell Bay and this was going to be looked into. The latter would be advantageous because of its sheltered position.

If the service is to be provided, a customs and immigration facility would also be needed but spokesmen for the company felt this could be arranged.

Carter also said that, if the service became a reality and was a success, there was every possibility that the firm would have an office here employing ticket agents and dock workers. There could also be a spin off from people servicing the vessel or providing supplies.

Some discussion on the possibilities of interesting cruise ships in coming to Squamish also took place. John Horne, a Master Mariner, former ship's captain and pilot, said there are many problems regarding the tight itinerary of cruise ships, the need to get through Seymour Narrows at a designated time and the desire to get to Ketchikan as soon as possible.

He also said the turning around time in Vancouver is very tight and to add another port to the itinerary might be impossible.

However, the committee working on this will continue to explore the possibilities of having cruise ships come to Squamish.

Spraying near schools concerns trustees

The principal of Blackwater Creek School, R.E. Miller wrote to the School Board regarding the spraying of the highway right of way with a substance called Tordon 22K (picloram), in an attempt to kill knapweed. The spraying was done by a contractor hired by the Highways Department. Miller said the spraying came from a tanker truck and a gadget that looked like a fire hose which resulted not only in the right of way being sprayed, but also the school ground. No advance warning was given to the school.

There was potentially dangerous situation to the children as: all herbicides and pesticides are considered hazardous chemicals to children; children were advised not to play in the sprayed areas for from two to three days; the children were advised not to eat any of the wild strawberries along the roadside.

After discussion of this letter, the Board decided to draft a letter to the Department of Highways, B.C. Hydro and Municipalities asking them to advise them of any intended spraying into the future in lands adjacent to school property.

The Board will also ask an authority on pesticides to appear at a meeting and to explain the dangers related to the spraying of these hazardous chemicals.
