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
When burning the forest is good



The controlled burn of 44 hectares of cleared forest was originally planned for last fall, but very strict weather and soil conditions must be met for a safe and effective burn. These conditions were satisfied only as late as Wednesday, August 6.



The controlled burn by the B.C. Forest Service of 44 hectares of forest was specifically done to slow the regrowth of vegetation. Once the land is burned the planting of conifer seedlings can be begin.



On August 6, 44 hectares of logged and cleared forest in the Ring Creek Drainage were methodically set afire by spreading a semi-solid form of gasoline from a specially out-fitted helicopter.

Last summer's heat wave created a grave situation in local forests for forest fire hazards. The wildfires that swept B.C. last summer were costly and devastating. But the Professional Foresters in B.C. may soon be advocating forest fires of a different sort - prescribed burning.

Prescribed fire plays a key role in reforestation and protection. Some of the reasons for prescribed burning include reducing the fire hazard and risk of wildfire, facilitating tree planters or for natural regeneration by removing debris and exposing the soil, lessening the need for herbicide use, and improving nutrient availability.

In addition, prescribed burning is used to reduce costs. Such burning is usually less costly and less environmentally damaging than mechanical removal of logging slash.

Prescribed burning may also reduce disease. Prescribed burning may be essential to eliminate future sources of infection from diseases such as mistletoe.

Prescribed burning is strictly controlled to avoid damage to soil, or threat of fire spread or health hazard. A permit which specifies conditions of fire must be obtained from the Ministry of Forests. These permits are suspended when smoke

builds up.
Therefore, properly managed and controlled, prescribed fire is an important part of forest management.
It greatly reduces the chance of wildfires and promotes the establishment of a healthy new forest.

New volunteer deputy chief appointed

Council approved the appointment of Captain Christopher French as Volunteer Deputy Chief of the Squamish Fire Department.

Council gave its approval upon recommendation from Fire Chief Pat Hampson, who along with the Officer's Board, made the appointment.

French was a former member of the District Fire Department from 1975 to 1977 and since then has been a volunteer firefighter.

In a memo to council, Hampson praised French, saying he enjoys the respect of his peers and subordinates.



About 300 employees at the Squamish division of Weldwood of Canada Ltd. are continuing in their strike action started July 31 as part of an expanding job action taken throughout the province by the International Woodworkers of America.

The Squamish division joined other Weldwood operations across B.C. as targeted companies included in the IWA strategy.

Weldwood strikers say they will continue to picket the site until a negotiated settlement is reached. Principle issues in the dispute are pensions and contracting out-of-union work to non-union contractors.

"It's the employer's move now; we're waiting for them," said Walter Kosiz, spokesman for IWA Local 1-71.

"The Weldwood operation is the only Squamish one down now, but if talks don't get started again soon other operations in the Squamish area could be shut down." Kosiz added.

But according to IWA President Jack Munro, industry solidarity is cracking.

Munro said small sawmill operators are circumventing the company negotiators by signing separate letters of memoranda with the union.

"F.I.R. is very upset with these signings, and have gone to the Labour Relations Board. We know it's a futile move, so we're not worried about it," Kosiz said.

Kosiz added the companies that have signed will not be picketed.

"It's not just the small operator that's signed," he continued. "Doman Industries, a large company, a member of F.I.R., signed Tuesday (Aug. 5)".

The 31,000 - member union currently has 14,000 members on strike throughout the province, but the union remains somewhat optimistic.

"We are hopeful because the number of companies breaking ranks is slowly increasing," Kosiz said.

Three injured in head-on collision

Three people were injured in a head-on collision involving a motor home and motor vehicle just two miles north of Culliton Creek on Highway 99 Aug.

The driver of the southbound vehicle, Christopher Bruce Allen, 50, of Vancouver, and passengers James Megannety, 36 of Niagara Falls, Ont., and Trevor Bergh, 15, of North Vancouver, were taken to Squamish General Hospital with undisclosed injuries.

The driver of the northbound motor home. Stanley Noga, 64, of Port Coquitlam, and his family, were taken to Squamish Hospital and later released.

Members of the Squamish Fire Department were called to the scene of the accident where they used the "Jaws of Life" to extricate one passenger.

Investigation into the accident is continuing. No charges have been laid.

Council responds to airport distress

Council voted at the Aug. 5 meeting to take \$7,000 from the contingency account to repair the runway at the Squamish Airport which is threatened with losing its licence due to the ill condition of the facilities.

The money will be used to fill cracks in the runway's blacktop and clear brush and small trees at the end of the runway.

Council made its decision to bail out the airport after receiving a plea for aid from the Squamish Flying Club. According to Kerry Brown, president of the Club, the airport was inspected last December by the federal Air Navigation Standards and Procedures Branch who indicated that although the deficiencies in the condition of the airport are relatively minor, if they are not corrected the airport could lose its operating licence.

In a letter to council, Brown said the runway suffered considerable deterioration over the winter.

"The Squamish Flying Club is of the opinion that the damage is such that we might not pass the next airport inspection."

Brown added that the Club, which works to maintain the airport, does not have sufficient funds to repair the runway. Brown appealed to council to come to the airport's assistance. adding, "The loss of the airport licence would adversely affect the running of the airport."

Brown appeared before council Aug. 5 to further request council's assistance in repairing the runway.

Members of council unanimously spoke in favor of coming to the airport's aid. "I would be supportive of council helping out," Alderman Ron Barr said. "It is a municipal airport."

Said Alderman Norm Verner: "It's not just a rich man's hobby; it's a service to the community."

Added Mayor Egon Tobus: "We have shunned spending any money there. choice is whether to spend some money or see it sink.

Alderman Corinne Lonsdale concurred with Barr.

"The three have the experience," Lonsdale said. "I would feel uncomfortable asking any of them to step down."

Added Alderman Dave Stewart, speaking against the motion to expand the commission by one member: "We're doing fine; just leave it alone."

It seems Squamish Days and Loggers Sports partygoers enjoyed a great weekend without getting into too much trouble.


St. Sgt. Dan Leroux of the Squamish Detachment of the RCMP said residents and police members alike enjoyed a "fairly quiet weekend."

It would seem to me that with some remodelling and alterations the present hospital could be the answer to this long term care need in our community, and at a relatively low cost compared to a new facility. I realize the need for in-

termediate extended care

beds is not peculiar to Squamish alone, but the need is desperate-the building is there. What a shame it would be not to take advantage of this situation. 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

Recently I received a fascinating document about a survey in the Upper Squamish Valley. The writer, William S. Jemmett, had been commissioned to make a survey of the valley starting where the former survey had terminated and laying out in lots any portions adapted to the requirements of settlers, in other words any arable land.

He made up his survey party and came to Squamish on the S.S. Iona on June 4, 1894. On the following day he took the wagon road to the Indian Reserve about five miles up, the valley and after a great deal of trouble, made arrangements for Indians and canoes. The Indians promised to be at the landing early on Monday morning, June 19.

The morning came and no Indians arrived. He went up to the Reserve and the Indians refused to go up the river because of the rough water. They were afraid because an Indian and a canoe had been lost by a previous survey party. However one Indian promised to get some Indians from Vancouver who would go up the river.

Jemmett heard of a Mr. Judd, a rancher who lived in the valley, who had a canoe and was a first-class canoe man so Jemmett made arrangements for him to take him up the river. They started off the same day, the canoes taking up a load of food and the party proceeding on foot, joining the canoe party at a place agreed upon each evening.

"We sometimes struck some pretty good trails but much of the way was through fearfully thick devil's clubs, which here grow to a height of nine to twelve feet or more. On the afternoon of the 25th of June we made camp, about half a mile above our starting point, a pretty good tramp. The canoe had to be towed a great deal of the way up."

Jemmett started work on his survey on June 26. He noted the left bank of the river had been much washed away since the previous survey and he found an Indian Reserve post and blazed a line from it. He noted the closest lots were a pre-emption for a William R. Sarrey, dated May 21, 1892. He noted that the land was a very good sandy loam with some large trees on it but was not heavily timbered. However, he said there were a lot of devil's clubs and they had to bridge a lot of slough, which were too deep and rapid to wade.

On the 5th of July he hurt his foot badly on one of these bridges when a tree broke in the middle from the force of the water. Luckily, he was able to get medical aid and was not delayed long. After he returned from having his foot attended to, he started surveying again and discovered a small piece of good land.

He mentioned the trees on both sides of the river as being cedar, maple, cottonwood, alder, hemlock, fir, spruce, a small quantity of dogwood and crabapple, pine and maple. The land was light sandy loam and alluvial deposit and pretty well covered with various kinds of berry bushes and devil's club.

About half a mile further up the river he found some good, flat land and islands, extending about 10 miles up the river which he subdivided. There were some large trees but the lots were not heavily timbered. He noted that a large fire had passed through the islands a great many years ago as all the very large cedar trees had been burned out with only the large stumps remaining.

The present growth of large trees didn't show any signs of fire.

He then crossed to the left bank of the river and laid out a number of lots containing good land. He noted that there was a small Indian graveyard on one of the lots.

The traverse was at the foot of a very steep rocky mountain and there were a number of low islands, chiefly covered with scrub alder and cottonwood, sand bars and sloughs.

On the right bank he found some good land low and flat with a steep bank along the river. He noted several waterfalls on the west side with some large trees. He also noted some white pine trees about two feet in diameter.

For the month of July the Squamish Fire Department responded to 17 calls.

These included: one residential fire on Zenith Road causing estimated damage of \$30,000, one chimney fire, three false alarms, four

misc./outdoor fires, (one grass fire caused by children playing with matches), two rescue/extrications (one fatal MVA), two vehicle fires, and four alarms with no fire.

A mile farther north he found some good land which he divided into four lots. Above this he found some steep rocky bluffs. It was here that he ran into some trouble when he was moving camp. One of the canoes, in charge of Indians, was completely smashed up and the entire kitchen outfit and some provisions gone. It took two canoes nearly the whole day to get from camp to camp. Two canoes were lost a short distance up river. Jemmett had to send the other canoe to the mouth of the river and the party had to pack the balance of provisions from Camp 4. One of the Indians left after this but the other stayed with Jemmett.

Once he had completed the survey to this point, he found that he was unable to proceed any further up river because of the state of the water and the number of boulders in the river. He crossed to the left bank, cached his canoe and packed his provisions along the side of the mountain which was steep and rocky. Jemmett had previously blazed the trail to Camp 6. Here, he found the ground very broken up and the timber poor. The bedrock at this site was a kind of sandstone, which he was told was a quartzose sandstone, nearly all silica with a trace of alumina and iron.

had been some large slides, appeared to be of the same kind of stone. He noted that the ordinary rock along the river was hard and bluish in color.

About a mile north he found some fine cedars for canoes and the Indians immediately made up a couple of shovel-nose canoes. He found a number of good areas of land here and laid out a number of lots. This became the site of Camp 7.

This is the first part of his report and the second part will appear in another column. Jemmett identified the areas by lot number and it might be possible to pick up the numbers from a map but I found it fascinating to try to identify the areas he was speaking about.

Obviously, the one area where he mentions the large waterfalls on the west side of the river must have been opposite the gate to the Tree Farm. That is where Madden's Falls drop down from the mountain tops in a series of long waterfalls and the distinctive crooked shape of Anderson's Falls comes from the entrance to the Clowholm Valley. The other area where he speaks of several islands must have been up by Schoonover's slough and island. He is certainly right about the amount of devil's club. The island and the valley bottom are literally covered with it!





The only thing they had to fear was sunstroke.

For the 47 skippers and crew entered in the Squamish Open Air Regatta (SOAR) held Aug. 9, the hot sunshine, moderate winds, and calm seas meant ideal racing conditions.

And race they did.

This year's seventh annual regatta, hosted by the Squamish Yacht Club, kicked off shortly after the 11 a.m. starting gun at the imaginary starting line just opposite the Squamish Terminals. Sailboats in all five classes jockeyed nervously for position, awaiting the short blast that would signal the start of the day-long race.

First off the mark were the two multihull entrants, Tardis, skippered by K. Uthoff, and Three Beaches, skippered by S. Martin. They were quickly followed by the rest of the pack, all entrants in the PHRF and Cruising classes.


From aboard the press boat, Sand Dollar, skippered by Earl McEwen, Howe Sound soon became awash with white triangular sails, each symetrically bowed to the wind.

The competitors proceeded unusually quickly southwards along Howe Sound, some lazily tacking from side to side; others experiencing momentary lapses of breeze and frantic seconds of sailshifting. Crews obeyed their skippers' orders attentively, and shouts of directions echoed the Sound.

After seeing the last boat over the starting line, the Sand Dollar cruised along with the competitors towards Defense Island, the mid-point of the race for the competitors in the Cruising Class.

From an optimal position just yards from the marker at Defense Island, members of the Cruising class competition could be seen rounding the marker and adjusting their sails for the return trip to the finish line, while the remainder of the pack plodded on for Anvil Island, their half-way point.

As these racers approached the Anvil Island marker, crew members could be seen scurrying to ready the sails for the crucial turning manoever. As each boat cleared the marker, brightly colored

BC Parks PDATE

The hills are alive with vibrant colours. Everywhere you look, there are splashes of purple, red, white, cream, pink and yellow. So where can you see this display of colour? At the Black Tusk meadows in Garibaldi Provincial Park.

In high elevation parks such as Garibaldi, snow falls in October (although it can fall in any month of the year) and remains until mid-July. Flowers take advantage of this short growing season by rushing into bloom. The result are spectacular displays of colour.

Usually there are two major "bloom waves", with the second being most colorful. These blooms vary each year according to climatic conditions.

Right now the two bloom waves are merging together. Later on in August, you won't see the white, cream, or yellow flowers that you see in July, but you will see more purple and red flowers.

White Marsh Marigolds (similar to a Buttercup) are among the first to bloom

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wherever snow melt accumulates, especially along the shores of small ponds and streams. Nearby, Glacier Lily is often seen pushing its leaf-encased buds up through the snow. At first its head is drooping, but later, its yellow petals bend upward to the sunshine.

Dainty white and pink bells

swing from stalks on various heather species. The dwarf evergreen shrubs have unique scale-like leaves that are so tightly pressed together, the twigs look like green pipe cleaners.

Purply - blue Lupine and various shades of Indian Paintbrush are beginning to dominate the colour scheme

in the meadows. Both of these plants belong to the second wave bloom. Along with the pea-like Lupine flower, comes its sweet smelling odour. Don't forget to smell the flowers! It will complete your flower experience.

When visiting the meadows at Garibaldi Park, please help to preserve them by staying on marked trails and routes. The meadows are an extremely fragile environment. Both the flowers and soil surface are easily damaged by off-trail hiking. And please - leave the flowers as you find them so that others may enjoy them as well. Take only pictures.
