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# Coubrough resigns from School District

James Coubrough, a local man charged with sexual assault involving a 16-year-old male, has resigned as supervisor of maintenance for School District No. 48. In the first of two letters of resignation submitted by Coubrough to the School Board, he stated that he was "forced into resigning by the

Board (which) take away my only source of income, such action based on unproven allegations of wrongdoing, unrelated to my position of employment. "This action in my opinion, was unconscionable, unwarranted, and uncharitable," Coubrough added. According to School Board Chairman Shirley Brown, the Board has accepted Coubrough's second letter of resignation which superseded his original letter of resignation. She said the second letter contained "some changes" from the first letter but declined to elaborate on those changes.


Brown said it was a Board decision to accept Coubrough's resignation, effective Feb. 17. Prior to submitting his resignation, Coubrough has been suspended without pay by the Board. Brown confirmed that the charges against Coubrough were in no way related to his position with the school district, which involved working in schools as well as the maintenance shop doing general repair work. Coubrough had been employed with the school district for over eight years. In addressing the matter, Brown said the Board's first priority was "to make school a safe place for children." She added that the Board felt its second priority was to be a "responsible employer."

At no time, said Brown, did the Board discuss asking for Coubrough's resignation, as Coubrough alleged in his first letter of resignation. "What he's been accused of had nothing to do with his job," she said. Brown said she personally was not well-acquainted with Coubrough, but had received comments from other employees in the school district that Coubrough performed his job well. "He was a very good worker," she said. "People were pleased with how he did his job." She said since the charges were laid she met with Coubrough on several occasions, along with representatives of CUPE (Canadian Union of Public Employees), of which Coubrough was a member. CUPE has declined to comment on Coubrough's resignation from the school district. Coubrough is scheduled to appear in court in June, having appeared Jan. 13 before a Justice of the Peace in Squamish. In the meantime, Brown said the vacated position with the school district will be advertised.

# Squamish to get helicopter service

Squamish council has given support for an application by Vancouver Helicopters Inc. to open a temporary (one year) base of operations in Squamish, pending approval of necessary permits and licensing by Transport Canada.

Council granted approval to the company at the Feb. 17 meeting after receiving a delegation representing the New Westminster-based company.

Council made its decision after considerable discussion, however, over the site chosen by the company for the helipad.

The company is proposing to locate the helipad in the downtown area, near the Pemberton Ave. industrial area. Steven Wright, president of Vancouver Helicopters, told council the downtown site was chosen rather than elsewhere in the community, such as at the airport, in an effort to make the service more accessible and convenient to the users. Wright added that the airport is occasionally plagued by fog and thus prevented it from being an ideal site.

Wright rejected council's suggestion that the company locate in the Industrial Park, saying that there are no buildings there to rent and to build their own would be prohibitive in terms of expense.

He added, however, that should facilities in the Industrial Park become available he would entertain the idea of re-locating there.

Council members remained adamant that the Industrial Park would be a preferable site to the proposed downtown location.

"We have an Industrial Park," Alderman Terrill Patterson said. "It's a far better place for it (helipad)." Patterson further added that the downtown location is not zoned for a helipad and thus would require re-zoning.

Alderman Chuck Harvey expressed some concern over the approach and departure route of the helicopters, and its vicinity to the downtown core.

"I have reservations about the area," Harvey said.

In response to a question by Alderman Robert Ewacha over the potential for dust and debris on the highway as a result of the helicopter operation, Wright assured council that there would be no downwash from the aircraft and thus no hazard to highway traffic.

Alderman Corinne Lonsdale expressed concern over the company's proposal to lease the downtown site for only one year, and questioned the company's intention to remain in business permanently.

Wright said his company did some research in the area of potential customers.

"We felt positive that there would be enough to make it a go," he told council. Wright added that the company that presently services the area would relinquish its

business in Squamish once his company began operation.

"We feel it would be viable," he said.

Vancouver Helicopters has been flying in the Vancouver

area for over five years, according to Squamish Base Manager Michael Neff. The company currently operates four Bell Jetrangers and one Bell Jetranger, and has on staff six pilots.

The company must now seek licensing from Transport Canada, who will first examine the proposed site for the helipad to determine if it meets all the necessary requirements.

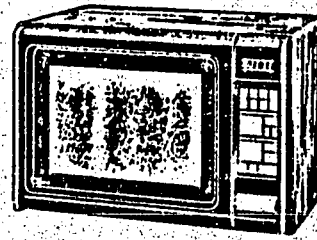

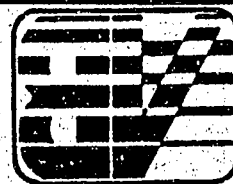

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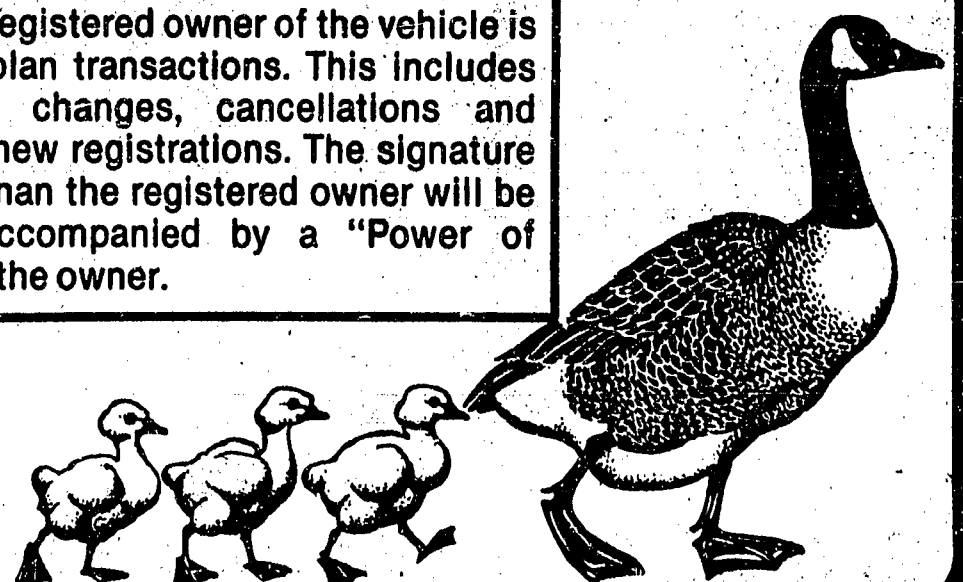

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# Council cracks down on "unsightly" houses

Squamish council has directed the administration to take action against several residents in the community whose premises have been determined "unsightly" by the by-law enforcement officer.

The residents in question will be apprised that they are in violation of municipal By-Law No. 305, the Unsightly Premises by-law, and ordered to clean up their premises.

Under the by-law, residents who do not comply with the clean-up order will have the premises cleaned up by the municipality and billed for the costs incurred. In the event that the resident does not pay the bill, the amount will be added to his property taxes.

According to By-Law No. 305, "no person or persons shall accumulate or permit or cause to accumulate filth, discarded materials, including disused or stripped automobiles and parts, or rubbish of any kind on his or their premises or the premises that he or they occupy."

Although, according to Clerk Bill Bloxham, council has never laid any formal charges against a resident in violation by the by-law, under the terms of the by-law an offender is liable to a fine and penalty of up to \$100 and costs, or in default of payment of that fine, imprisonment of up to 30 days.

"What we normally do is encourage people to clean up the situation," Bloxham said. Council made its decision to take action against violators of the by-law after receiving complaints about two residences, both located on

Britannia Ave., which the by-law enforcement officer found to be in violation of the by-law.

According to Bob Splinter, by-law enforcement officer, both residences had damaged or broken-down vehicles on the site, and one property contained several boats under repair or being stored.

Said Bloxham, in a subsequent report to council: "It is obvious that some action has to be taken to prevent a proliferation of the situation in the least, and perhaps to get rid of some of the items..."

Members of council's works and services committee also toured the residences in question and concurred with Splinter's assessment of the violations.

"We should instigate the necessary procedures to have the site cleaned up," Alderman Garth McCreedy told council.

Said Alderman Ron Barr: "I concur. These are very small lots. Council should take some action."

Alderman Corinne Lonsdale said she noted even more debris on the lots than mentioned in the by-law enforcement officer's report to council.

"I feel we should be taking steps," Lonsdale said.

Alderman Terrill Patterson objected to council's motion to take action against the violators, saying he had talked with one of the residents who informed him of his intention to clean up the property by the end of the month.

Patterson said council should not take action against a citizen who is willing to clean up his property voluntarily.

Further, Patterson pointed to other unsightly premises in the area that have been identified and been allotted time to be cleaned up.

"We're going to have to treat everybody the same," Patterson said, voting against the motion directing the administration to take action against the Britannia Ave. residents.

## Extra security needed, says council

Recent break-ins to the Squamish Public Library and municipal works yard have prompted Squamish council to call for a review of existing security measures to municipal property.

Mayor Egon Tobus told council at the Feb. 17 meeting that Squamish citizens "are not very proud" of their town to allow vandalism of municipal property to take place.

Tobus suggested that council entertain reviewing the current security system in the municipality, particularly at the works yard, in an effort to combat the vandalism.

Alderman Terrill Patterson concurred with Tobus and introduced a motion later passed by council to have wire mesh screen placed over the windows at the library. Similar screen has also been placed on windows at the Dog Pound, also a recent target of vandals.

Alderman Chuck Harvey suggested council consider installing a loud siren to the alarm system in the municipal hall as a deterrent to intruders.

Tobus concurred with a further suggestion by Harvey that a guard dog be kept at the municipal works

yard. "That would certainly put a stop to it," Tobus said, "especially if you buy Dobermans."

Squamish RCMP have charged and 18-year-old man in connection with the break-in at the library. Earlier this month, police also charged five youths—three females and two males—in connection to break-ins at the municipal works yard and the Dog Pound.

## Squamish to undergo audit

The municipality will soon be opening its books and baring all to the auditor.

Squamish council granted a request from Mayor Egon Tobus that an audit of the municipality's finances be performed.

"We all have an opinion on how we should run the municipality," Tobus told council. "It will be money well-spent."

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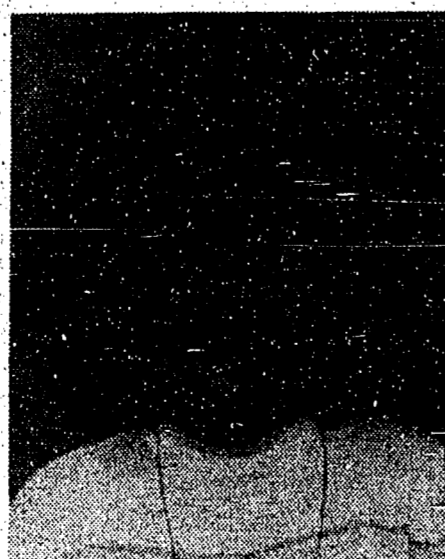

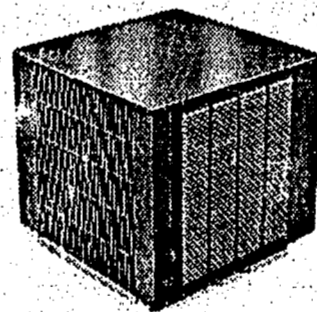

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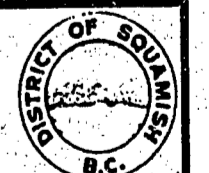

# Andrew pulls through

Little Andrew Wigglesworth may have lost the battle, but he has won the war in his fight against the life-threatening, non-cancerous tumor that had been strangling his muscles and blood vessels.

Early last week, doctors at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., told Andrew's parents, Ron and Philippa, that the tumor in his left leg had spread and the leg would have to be amputated from the pelvis.

But after conducting further tests, the doctors discovered that the tumor had spread from his leg into his abdominal wall, bladder and bowel.

Prior to leaving for the clinic, Philippa expressed her concern, saying "before I was worried about the loss of his leg, but now it's come to the point where I am worried more about the loss of his life."

Last Thursday, after a gruelling 12-hour operation, the eight-year-old Squamish Elementary student was in critical but stable condition in the intensive care unit of St. Mary's Hospital, about 12 blocks from the Mayo Clinic.

Besides having his left leg amputated, Andrew's bladder and bowel were also removed. The five-doctor surgical team believe they have successfully expunged the tumor.

"They almost lost him, last Thursday," said Jane Walker, a friend of the family. "He had lost a lot of blood during the operation, but

that time and that is all local."

But in the midst of Wigglesworth's grief in Rochester, they did receive a piece of good news. It was learned last week that B.C. Medical has agreed to bear the full cost of the operation which could not be performed in B.C.

"Now that the province is going to cover costs, the money in the trust will go to Andrew for his future needs," said Walker.

Andrew's recovery is expected to last another three to four weeks.

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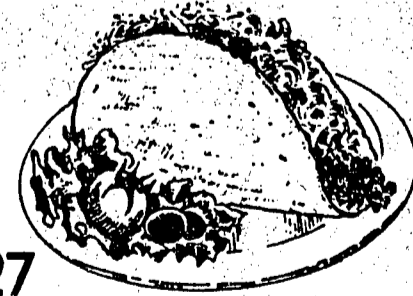

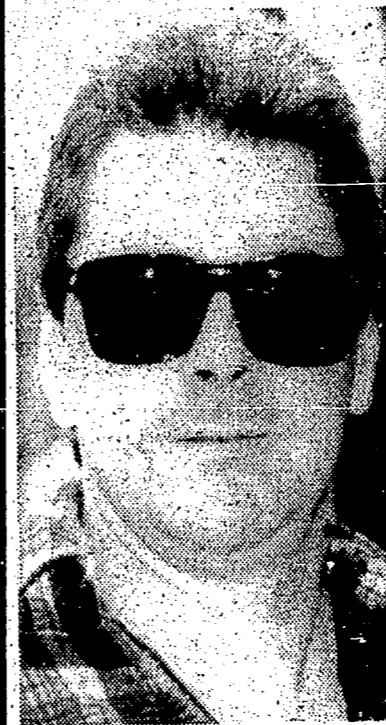
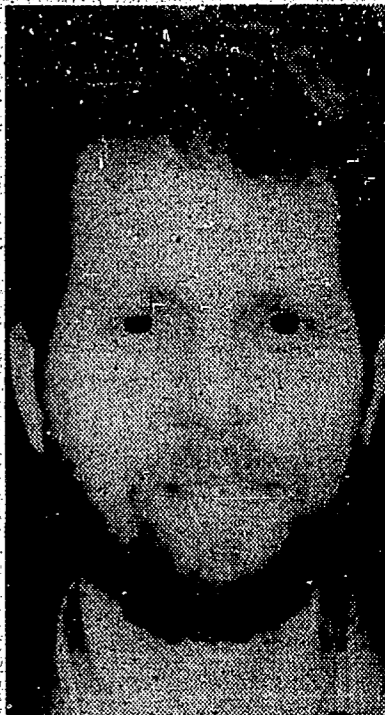

At the same time, the pale yellow stars of the winter jasmine could be seen thickly studding the branches of the climber. The Dutch crocus are also blooming in the back bulb bed along with the winter aconite and there are fat buds on the early iris.

The wisteria is budding and soon its pale green leaves will uncurl to cover the back porch; there are buds on the flowering crabapple and the other trees and bushes are all budding. I am convinced that winter is over and if we do have a streak of cold weather it surely won't last.

There is only one problem when we have such beautiful winter and an early spring. It does seem to bring a lot of bugs in the garden the next year. Maybe it is because we don't have the hard frosts and the cold weather to finish them off.

I think there is another victim to the mild winter. I was planning a holiday in a warmer climate but the weather they way it has been I am wondering if it wouldn't be wiser to put the holiday off and plan to do something I have always wanted to do.

I had thought of Fiji, but had been warned it would be humid. However, people who had been there said the Coral Coast, where all the resorts are, is lovely. But the lady I had hoped to go with won't be able to go and the single supplement of \$800 if I went alone is just too expensive. But it sounded wonderful. A visit to the beach and a Blue Lagoon cruise among the islands for four days were tempting.

Then there was the thought of Thailand. I wanted to go there when I went to Japan but we never managed it. That also promised a beach visit but according to my books it is humid there at this time of year. However the idea of a few days in Hong Kong was awfully tempting.

Of course, I reasoned, I can always go back to Mexico...to Guayamas and San Carlos but the little beach hotel at which I stayed isn't available any longer. They were changing it over into housekeeping units when I last visited San Carlos and I guess they have completed it. At any rate it isn't available any more. I didn't like the idea of the other accommodations and when I looked at Cabo that wasn't too appealing either.

It won't be what I dreamed about when I looked at the pictures of South Africa with the game farms, the beaches on the Indian Ocean, the ostrich farms, the Cape of Good Hope, and Table Mountain wreathed in mist as well as the Persian rug of magic colours painted by the wild flowers of Namaqualand, but it may be all that I can hope to see while it is still there.

So maybe this mild, warm winter will bring me an unexpected bonus: a chance to see something I have always longed to see.

**Alternative energy source proposed for Squamish**

The proposal to bring Natural Gas to Squamish as an alternative source of heating fuel may no longer be feasible according to Energy, Mines and Petroleum Minister Jack Davis.

Instead, the minister suggested the definite possibility of providing Squamish with the opportunity of purchasing electrical energy at natural gas rates.

Gary Turner, chairman of the committee responsible for the initial proposal, met recently with Davis, and at the regular monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, explained the reasons for the minister's suggestion.

"The main reason for allowing us to purchase electricity at the reduced rate is because B.C. has a surplus of electrical energy, and secondly, Vancouver Island has been pushing for a natural gas pipeline and that is a federal situation."

Turner said that the ministry's long range plans are to have natural gas in most areas of the province, but consideration should also be given to the surplus of electricity in the province, together with its much greater accessibility.

"Electrical heat is by far safer and if we could get it at a reduced rate," said Turner, "I think it would be more beneficial to the community."

The price of natural gas, as opposed to electricity, is approximately 50 percent less.

Turner told the members of the chamber, "if you could cut costs in your business or

home by 50 percent, that increases your disposable income."

He warned, however, that people waiting to build should not necessarily build with electricity in mind, because "the decision is still only 80 percent."

The committee also discussed with the minister the possibility of using natural gas in the logging industry.

Turner stated it would be advantageous to use Compressed Natural Gas instead of Liquefied Natural Gas because the liquid form would require refrigeration and the installation of large holding tanks.

The committee expects a final confirmation on the heating fuel proposal by the summer of this year.

**Weldwood to undergo modernization**

The Squamish Lumber Division of Weldwood of Canada Ltd. will undertake a \$3.5 million modernization project in August, according to Manager Tony Ker.

Ker said the capital project, touted as a "productivity improvement project", will involve the installation of a planer mill and a saw mill at the Squamish site.

With the modernization project will be an accompanying elimination of 30 jobs at the mill. Ker said the company is "doing what we can" to re-locate employees whose jobs have been terminated by the program, but added that there will be a termination of employees, to be determined on the basis of seniority.

In order to implement the modernization program, the mill will be shut down in mid-August for two to three weeks, affecting approximately 230 employees.

Ker said the decision to go ahead with the moderniza-

tion project was made after a review of the company's coastal operations which indicated the time was right for such improvement.

"We have a good future now," Ker said.

He added that the last modernization project of similar scale was instituted in 1979 when a modern sorter was introduced to the mill.

Ker said the Squamish mill is currently operating at maximum capacity, and has been since May, 1986.

**Garbage pick-up fee under review**

Squamish homeowners who are getting a reprieve from an increase in garbage collection fees this year, should brace themselves for a possible increase in rates in the future.

Council instructed the administration to submit a study on garbage collection rates in Squamish, including a comparison with rates charged by other municipalities in B.C.

According to Treasurer Charlie Schilberg, the garbage collection fee charged to Squamish residents has not been increased for five years, and represents a cost of about 75 cents per week to the homeowner to have his garbage picked up.

Alderman Terrill Patterson objected to the study into garbage rates, saying homeowners have already been hit with increases in sewer and water rates this year, with a scheduled increase in 1988 as well.

"The rates are going up," Patterson said. "We should stop this nonsense of hiking it up."

Residential consumers currently pay \$180.40 for utilities, which includes water, sewer and garbage services for the year.

In 1987, consumers can expect to see that amount increase to \$237.75, with an additional increase to \$261.15 in 1988. That increase does not reflect an increase in garbage collection fees.

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# Squamish figures in cruise ship marketing program

The newly formed Cruise Industry Association of B.C. has launched its marketing program to promote B.C. ports, possibly to include Squamish, as cruise ship destinations.

According to Bud Coles, Association president, members of the Association met with U.S. industry leaders and the response was encouraging.

The CIABC has a mandate to double the number of cruise ships and passengers visiting B.C. ports by early 1990's. The Association is aiming its primary marketing initiatives at the 1988 season and beyond and has appointed Pacific Congress Projects Corp. of Vancouver to provide marketing services with the primary focus on the U.S. cruise market.

Peter Fraser, vice-president of CIABC, pointed to marketing as the key to a successful cruise industry in B.C. Fraser said the Association hopes to increase sailings and passenger volumes in 1988 by some 25 percent over the 1985 season.

"Our initial objective is to establish an appreciation of Vancouver and B.C. ports

within the industry, to market B.C. as a destination to cruise travel agents, and to work with B.C. communities and suppliers to expand the cruise ship industry here," Fraser said.

In January, the local Chamber of Commerce, a member of the Association, approached Squamish council for endorsement of the proposal to establish Squamish as a port-of-call for cruise ships.

Dr. Laverne Kindree, who appeared before council Jan. 20 on behalf of the Chamber, cited the tourist and "spin-off" potential of subscribing to the cruise ship plan.

At that meeting, Kindree also urged Squamish to start developing tourist attractions, in anticipation of the influx of tourists from the cruise ships. He told council that the average cruise ship passenger could spend as much as \$80 in Squamish in a single day, and with an average of 1,000 passengers aboard a single ship, that could amount to \$80,000 in revenue to the community.

Kindree met with favorable support from council, although some members expressed reservations over the idea.

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## Squamish weather

Do you remember how much it snowed and how cold it was last Feb.? Well for comparison, on Feb. 18 it was -0.3 C and for the same period last year, it was -13.2 C. The high temperature was 10.4 C on Feb. 14 (6.6C in '86).

Last week rainfall totalled 43.4 mm as compared with 10 cm snow last year. The sun only peeked through for 4.2 hours last week, which was much less than the 30.6 hours recorded in '86.

## Parking plagues Wilson Crescent

Residents in the area of Wilson Crescent and McNamee Place are forced to park as much as two blocks away from their homes due to strict "no parking" regulations in the area, according to resident Sheila Winther.

Winther appeared before council Feb. 10 complaining of the lack of parking areas for residents and their visitors in the area, and requested that the "no parking" signs be removed from at least one side of the road to allow for parking.

Winther was advised that the "no parking" signs were originally erected after council received a delegation several years ago requesting the regulations to safeguard children playing in the area.

Clerk Bill Bloxham also advised council that the Fire Department had requested the regulations to allow for fire lane access to the area.

Winther replied that the "no parking" signs could be removed from the slough side of the road, opening up the area for residential parking.

She said there are currently insufficient parking areas for residents and visitors in the area, where several apartment blocks and townhouses are located. She added that she has been forced to instruct her visitors to park nearly two blocks away.

Winther made the decision to appear before council after she received a parking ticket for parking in a no parking spot.

Council is awaiting a report from the works superintendent, fire department, and RCMP before taking any action on the matter.

## Women's Centre moving

The Howe Sound Women's Centre has announced it is moving to a new location at 38051, 2nd Ave. (next to the Paint Stop) at the end of February.

The move is seen as a new beginning for the Centre, which has been active in the Squamish area for more than five years providing support and referral to women.

The Centre will close at the old location on 3rd Ave. on Wednesday, Feb. 25 and will re-open in its new home on Wednesday, March 4.

The Centre looks forward to welcoming both new and old faces to the new premises.

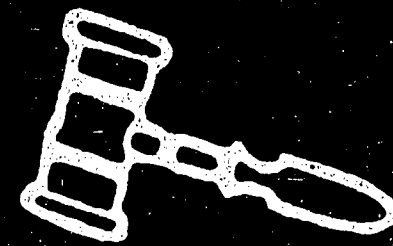

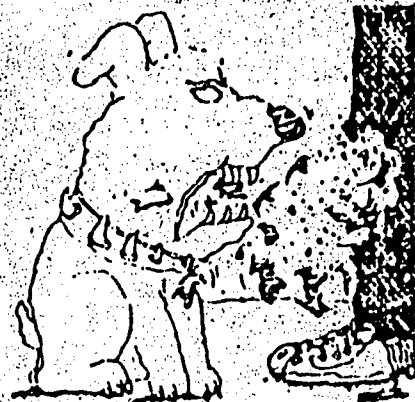
# Local students Soviet-bound

Twenty-two Howe Sound Secondary students will embark Friday, March 13, on a ten-day sightseeing adventure into the Soviet Union. Accompanying the students will be Howe Sound teachers, Patti McLaughlin and Constance Rulka, along with seven adults, including two teachers from Valleycliffe Elementary. "I promised the parents to bring their kids back, proud to be Canadian," said organizer Patti McLaughlin. She said the response from both parents and students has been quite overwhelming, but not without hitch.

"Getting people to adhere to deadlines was the most difficult. The tour company handles the visas, so it was just a matter of having the paperwork processed in time." The group will depart, via Seattle, for Copenhagen, across the Atlantic on board a Scandinavian Airline's (SAS) wide-bodied jet. The group will spend the day being introduced to Copenhagen's most popular attractions, including Hans Christian Andersen's Little Mermaid, and the Changing of the Guard at the Amalienborg Castle. They later

depart the same day for Moscow. Upon arrival in USSR's capital, the group will be met by bilingual Soviet tour director who will accompany them to their hotel and assist with checking-in. "We will spend three nights in Moscow, taking in such sights as the Kremlin, the Red Square, the Mausoleum of Lenin, and the Trinity Monastery in Zagorsk," said McLaughlin. One day in Moscow, the students will have the opportunity to meet with a group of Soviet highschool students and exchange ideas and views on current events and daily life in the USSR and the West. McLaughlin said that Petro-Canada has agreed to donate a number of promotional items and gifts for the Russian students as a goodwill gesture.

After their last dinner in Moscow, the group will board a night train to Leningrad where they will spend another three days visiting the sights in USSR's second largest city.

In Leningrad, the group will see such sights as the Winter Palace, the Museum of the October Revolution, and the Aurora, the warship that fired the shot that signalled the beginning of the flight to overthrow the Russian Provisional Government, in 1917.

After their last day in Leningrad, they will board a flight back home, via Copenhagen, where they will spend their last day, shopping. "We have agreed with the parents that each student should take the same amount of spending money," said McLaughlin. "Besides, Russia isn't the best place for tourist shopping."

The cost of the trip, for each student, is approximately \$1700, but as McLaughlin explained, the price covers everything, including meals, accommodation and internal transportation.

"The only thing the price doesn't include is two lunches in Copenhagen," she said, "but otherwise, it's quite inclusive."

The tour is conducted by the EF Institute, who have agreed to give one free passage for every six paid passages. McLaughlin explained that upon returning, each traveller will receive a rebate of approximately \$300.

She said the students are anxiously awaiting their departure, but admittedly, are a little nervous.

"Some kids have never even been on an airplane," she said.

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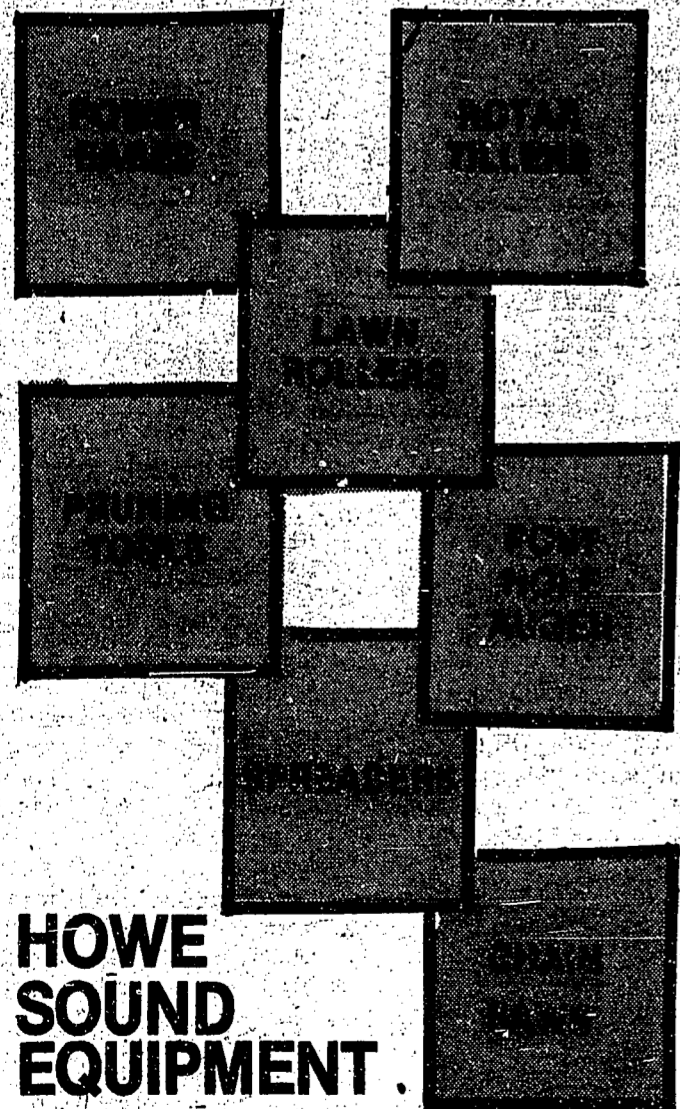

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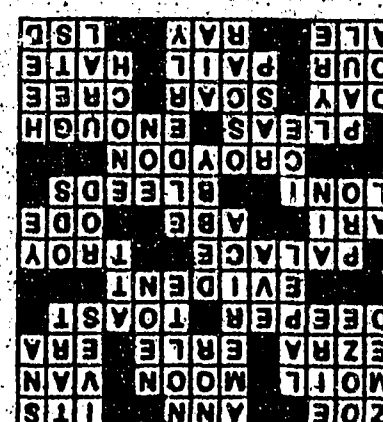

# Local teacher laments student exchange cut

Lack of funding has resulted in another casualty in the education system.

A two-week summer Quebec exchange program, which numerous Squamish students have participated in since 1971, has been axed due to a lack of adequate corporate funding.

And that, says Howe Sound Secondary French teacher Marjorie Meredith, represents yet another cut in the

"fibres" of world peace.

"I was stunned at the destruction of yet another of those delicate fibres which have grown up linking human kind into a state of mutual respect," Meredith says.

The program's demise is the result of the closing of the B.C. regional office of the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews, the

sponsors of the student exchange. Meredith says the B.C. office, which would have celebrated its 30th anniversary this year, is one of six offices across Canada whose purpose has been to foster understanding between people of differing cultural and racial traditions.

One of the means of achieving that goal has been through a student exchange program whereby students from B.C. travel to Quebec and live with a French-Canadian family for two weeks. The French-Canadian student then travels to B.C. in a reciprocal trip.

Meredith says every year Squamish students participate, and some years as many as 12 students, mainly Grade 10's, have gone to Quebec. The bulk of the cost of the trip is borne by the Council, with each student paying a nominal fee of \$100.

"Generations of our Grade 10 students have experienced the unique privilege and challenge of sharing in the very heart of family life in French Canada," Meredith says.

She says the major benefit of the exchange to students was that it allowed a student to see what life is like in another person's home, at an age "when it's good for them to go away from home." She added that students usually return from Quebec with a

"renewed interest" in the French language.

Meredith says there is no other exchange program similar to the Council program for students.

"In a world threatened with the menace of nuclear warfare, we cannot afford to cut back on those agents which are busy fostering brotherhood among human-kind."

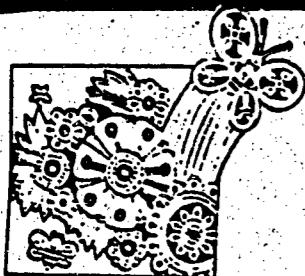
Section reports were read from the Scouts by Gerry Christie, from the Cubs by Jim O'Neill and from the Beavers by Grant Danielson.

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## Pemberton students get "phone-in" counselling

Students at Pemberton Secondary School were among the first eight small secondary schools in B.C. to talk to representatives of the three provincial universities and BCIT by phone about post-secondary educational opportunities.

Using the Knowledge Network's new teleconferencing service, the four institutions took a coordinated approach to counselling and advising large groups of students in distant locations by phone.

"Teleconferencing is a

cost-effective alternative to the traditional on-site visit by university counsellors," said Raelene Rowe, who coordinated the teleconference for the B.C. Secondary School Liaison Committee.

"While on-site visits are preferable, students can still gain much useful needed information through a teleconferencing link with the post-secondary institutions," said Rowe.

The four institutions which took part in the teleconference held Feb. 18 were: University of B.C., Simon Fraser University, University of Victoria, B.C. Insti-

tute of Technology.

Pemberton students joined other students in Hagensborg, Masset, Barriere, Queen Charlotte City, Stewart, Valemount, and Clearwater in receiving the service.

Rowe said the same technology that was able to connect the highschool with the university can be used to link any educational institution, non-profit society, or public agency with any other province.

"We are always looking for innovative ways to reach and serve students," Rowe said.

All applications must be accompanied by copies of the front page of the applicant and spouse's 1986 Income Tax Return and applicable farm operating statement. Farm corporations must provide a copy of their financial statement most relative to 1986 operations.

Farm operators who intend to submit more than one application should mail all forms together. Note: Applications will not be acknowledged as being received. Applications should be sent by registered mail to provide proof of mailing.

The reimbursement level for the 1986 Program is 10.55%. The amount of reimbursement receivable by an applicant will be influenced by "ceiling rates" based on the average rate paid by applicants throughout the Province. The maximum benefit is \$10,000 for each operation.
