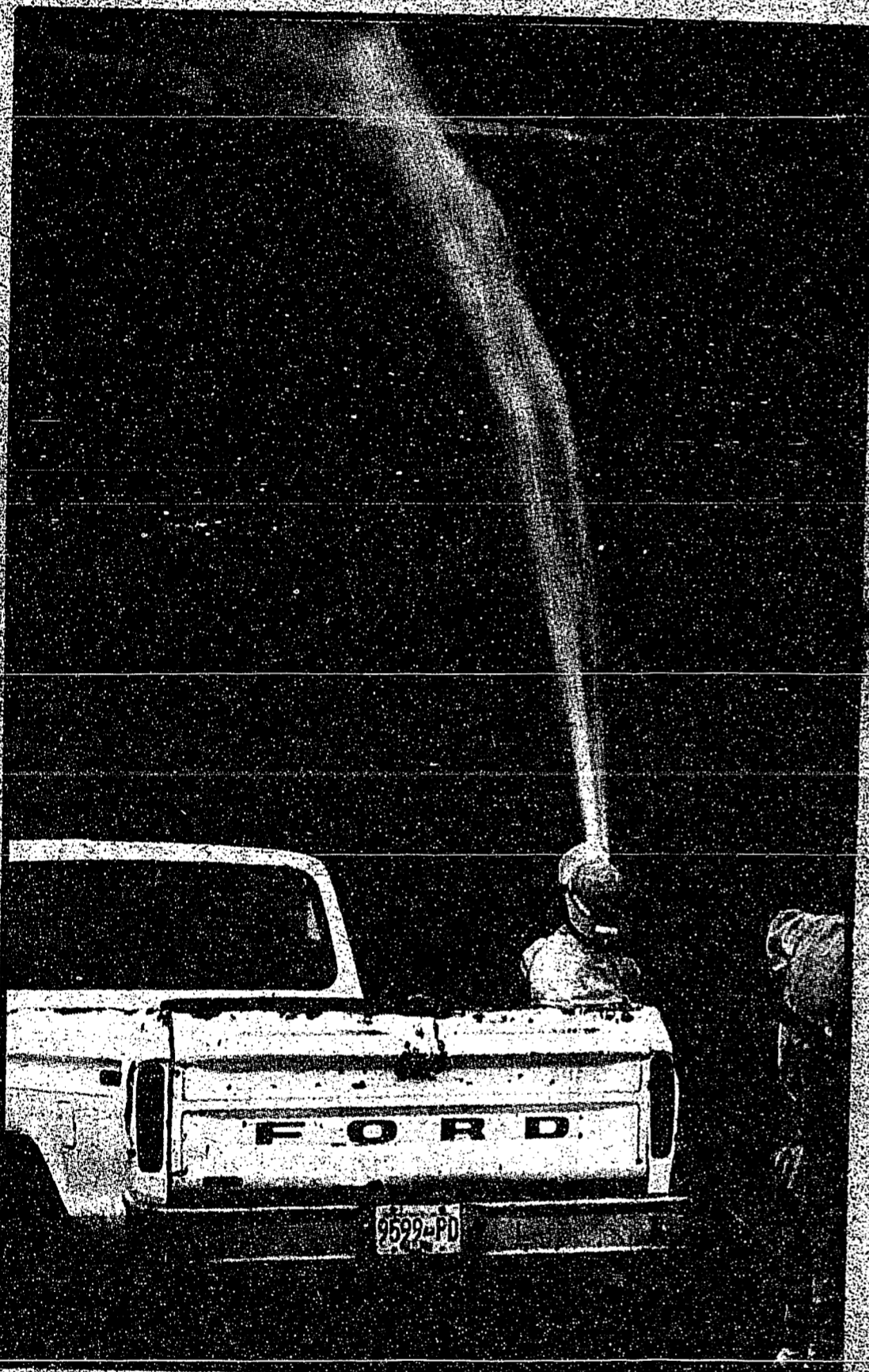

Repairs to damaged system will be completed for grand opening

Mashiter flows Thursday

Damage to the Mashiter Creek water intake system won't cost more than \$15,000 to repair, the District of Squamish's engineering consultant told council last week.

Webber said. Works Superintendent John Payne added that the Stawamus intake requires regular maintenance as well, and must be cleaned out at least twice a year.

The district will also apply to the Provincial Emergency Program to see if a portion of the cost can be recovered.

The rock dam diverting water to the cement intake structure can easily be repaired in a few days, Doug Webber of Web Engineering said.

In a Nov. 13 report following the dam wash-out on the Remembrance Day weekend, Webber said the storm "overwhelmed and washed out a section of the diversion weir", but "apart from a deposit of sediment there was no apparent damage to the gates, screens or concrete" of the diversion structure.

Debris accumulated at the intake constitutes "normal maintenance" for the district,

Ald. Lynn Wilbur questioned whether the Fisheries intake was covered with debris during the storm, but Webber said he believed it was free and clear.

Webber and Payne also downplayed allegations that there could have been property damage during the natural occurrence.

"I can't see how there would be a great surge," Webber said. However, Wilbur said he believed the incident provided "further evidence that the project is not viable."

"This is going to be an ongoing problem," he said.

Repair work on the new water intake should be complete in time for an 11 a.m. dedication ceremony this Thursday at the top of Thunderbird Ridge.

Fire destroys truck shop

A logging truck shop on Scott Crescent across from the Blind Channel Bridge went up in flames Thursday morning.

The building was used as a repair shop for Gas DeCook and Sons Trucking Ltd., owned by Ken and Wes DeCook.

The Squamish Fire Department responded to what was first called a vehicle fire at 10:39 a.m., but Fire Chief Pat Hampson soon declared the blaze a general alarm.

The fire started when Ken DeCook and his son Mike DeCook were working on a pick-up truck in a pit inside the shop. Gasoline had spilled on the floor and when a trouble light was accidentally dropped it exploded into flames. Both men escaped uninjured.

Flames soon engulfed the building along with thick black smoke, and traffic slowed on Highway 99 as people watched.

Hampson commended firefighters for containing a blaze that had "lots of potential for spread."

One firefighter was injured as he tried to extinguish the pick-up's tires, which threatened to reignite flammable liquids on the floor. The firefighter, who luckily was crawling, dislocated his arm when he fell into the work pit.

Temperatures in the blaze were extreme, Hampson said, reaching over 600 C (1100-1200 F). The metal beam used to hoist engines began to buckle in the extreme heat.

A Squamish woman is hoping to collect the names of enough potential bus commuters to convince Maverick Coach Lines to launch an early-morning run to Vancouver.

Marya Hackett is the one-woman commuter registry for those interested in taking the bus to work each week morning, leaving at some time shortly before 7 a.m. so that workers and students may catch connecting transportation in the city. Anyone interested should call her at 892-1023.

When Hackett recently spoke with Maverick president Bud Coles about a possible commuter run, he was agreeable as long as the numbers warrant the service. Sixty people each day, or 30 people per bus one way, would be enough to start up an earlier run. The current schedule has a bus leaving at 7:45 -- too late for most people who begin work in the city at normal hours.

There are many incentives for people to commute by bus to work or school in Vancouver, Hackett said. To begin with, Maverick would offer a cut rate on books of 10 tickets, taking \$1.50 off the regular price.

Currently, she said, her husband drives each day to his job in downtown Vancouver. This costs the family \$200 a month in gas and \$60 a month in bus passes, as he parks in North Vancouver. In addition to this, she said, the family loses out on the use of the vehicle. In turn, the price of insuring and maintaining the vehicle for commuting ups the cost.

The Hackett family would save approximately \$80 a month with the addition of a special commuter bus, she said.

A commuter service between Squamish and Vancouver was tried unsuccessfully in the early 1980s, Hackett said, but

the growth of the community should translate into renewed interest.

During the recent extended road closure, she said, you could literally see people jump into cars on her Valleycliffe street when the radio announced Highway 99 was poised to open. "It was like the Indy 500."

In addition to the cost savings, she said, there are other, more global reasons for taking the bus to work instead of driving alone in one vehicle.

"It's ecologically unsound, it's environmentally dumb, and it doesn't make sense with the road the way it is."

Once a commuter bus is established, Hackett feels it will become "a permanent thing."

"I think there are a lot of people just like us here in Squamish."

Those people planning to call Hackett at her 892-1023 number should think of what departure and return times best suit them, and which local stops are most convenient.



Weldwood mill lays off over 100 workers

Weldwood's Squamish Lumber Division will shut down from this Friday to Jan. 14.

The company blames the shutdown on a combination of a shortage of fir logs following this summer's fire season and "very soft" hemlock-balsam markets.



The mill has been operating for the past three weeks with 117 people. Of those, 62 will be laid off on Friday. The planer mill will run for an additional two weeks, then it too will be shut down, resulting in the balance of the employees being laid off.

Carl Bathburn, Weldwood vice-president of B.C. coastal operations, said he wanted to assure the employees that the company has the logs and orders to restart on Jan. 14.

Wretched weather wreaks havoc throughout corridor

The storm that swept through Thursday and Friday brought record rains and many problems to Sea to Sky Country.

The 123.8 millimeters of rain on Thursday was followed by another 101.6 millimeters on Friday, while winds gusted up to 31 knots or 57.4 kilometers per hour.

"We've had enough rain," complained Gary Tutney at the Squamish Weather Station.

The foul weather closed the highway in three places, made life rough for BC Hydro crews working on the previously damaged 500 kilovolt line south of Pemberton and made basements in Brackendale wet again.

Slides and highwater closed Highway 99 at the Tunnel Point slide site, Function Junction and near Paradise Valley Friday.

A "whole bunch" of "liquidy

mud" came down at the old slide site north of Lions Bay, closing the highway two minutes after noon. The highway had been scheduled to open from noon to 1 p.m. and then again at 3 p.m., but only opened to single-lane traffic at 4:45 p.m.

For those people thinking of getting out of the corridor the other way, the Duffey Lake Road was closed from 10:30 a.m. Friday to 2 p.m. on Saturday. Flooding and avalanches were cited as reasons for that closure.

struck. "It was awful," BC Hydro project coordinator Larry Ratzlaff said yesterday.

The work was being done at the confluence of the Rutherford Creek and Green River. Saturday, the water rose four to five feet between 8 a.m. and noon, he said.

"It was going wild. I would refer to it as a flash flood."

Despite the conditions that ranged from snow to strong gusting winds, Ratzlaff said he was proud none of his 15 to 20 member crew ever had to make use of the on-site first aid attendant. "Not even for a band aid."

Hydro spokesman Peter McMullen said the damaged line had to be shut down leaving only one 500 kilovolt line connecting Vancouver Island to the power generating stations on the mainland.

If the other line had been damaged in Friday's bad weather, blackouts might have resulted on the Island, he said.

"That's one of the very obvious reasons why we've got to reinforce the system."

BC Tel service in Squamish was not affected by the weather except for some lines under trailers, a spokesperson for the company said Sunday.

Later, the road opened to traffic in both directions, but there were intermittent closures throughout the night.

The highway also closed at Function Junction from 4 p.m. to 9 p.m. Friday, however, there was a detour available around the closure through Westside Road.

Then a washout closed the highway near Paradise Valley, 23 kilometers north of Squamish from 3:45 p.m. to 9

The District of Squamish brought out four extra pumps to deal with the four and a half inches of rain that fell Friday.

"We stayed on top of it this time," district works superintendent John Payne said.

The four extra pumps brought a combined extra pumping capacity of 20,000 gallons a minute to the district's standard 45,000 gallon a minute capacity. The extra pumps have cost the district about \$10,000 for the days the month of November.

The storm made life rough for BC Hydro crews working on the damaged 500 kilovolt line south of Pemberton.

The line was damaged Nov. 10 when the Green River rose and took out three transmission line towers. One tower had the foundations washed out from underneath it and when it brought 3,300 feet of line down a second tower was buckled and a third was damaged.

Hydro crews were completing repairs when the second storm

Last month's construction starts in Squamish were down from 1989's boom, but overall this year is looking good from a development perspective, Squamish Council says.

The District of Squamish's building department recorded \$524,000 in the value of permits taken out last month, compared to \$1.3 million in October 1989. Eleven single family dwellings built in that month last year accounted for the higher figure. Permits for

only three single family homes were taken out in October 1990.

However, the value of permits for commercial buildings taken out last month exceeded those recorded in October 1989. Three commercial projects begun last month are valued at \$22,000, while in October 1989, two projects valued together at only \$6,500 were

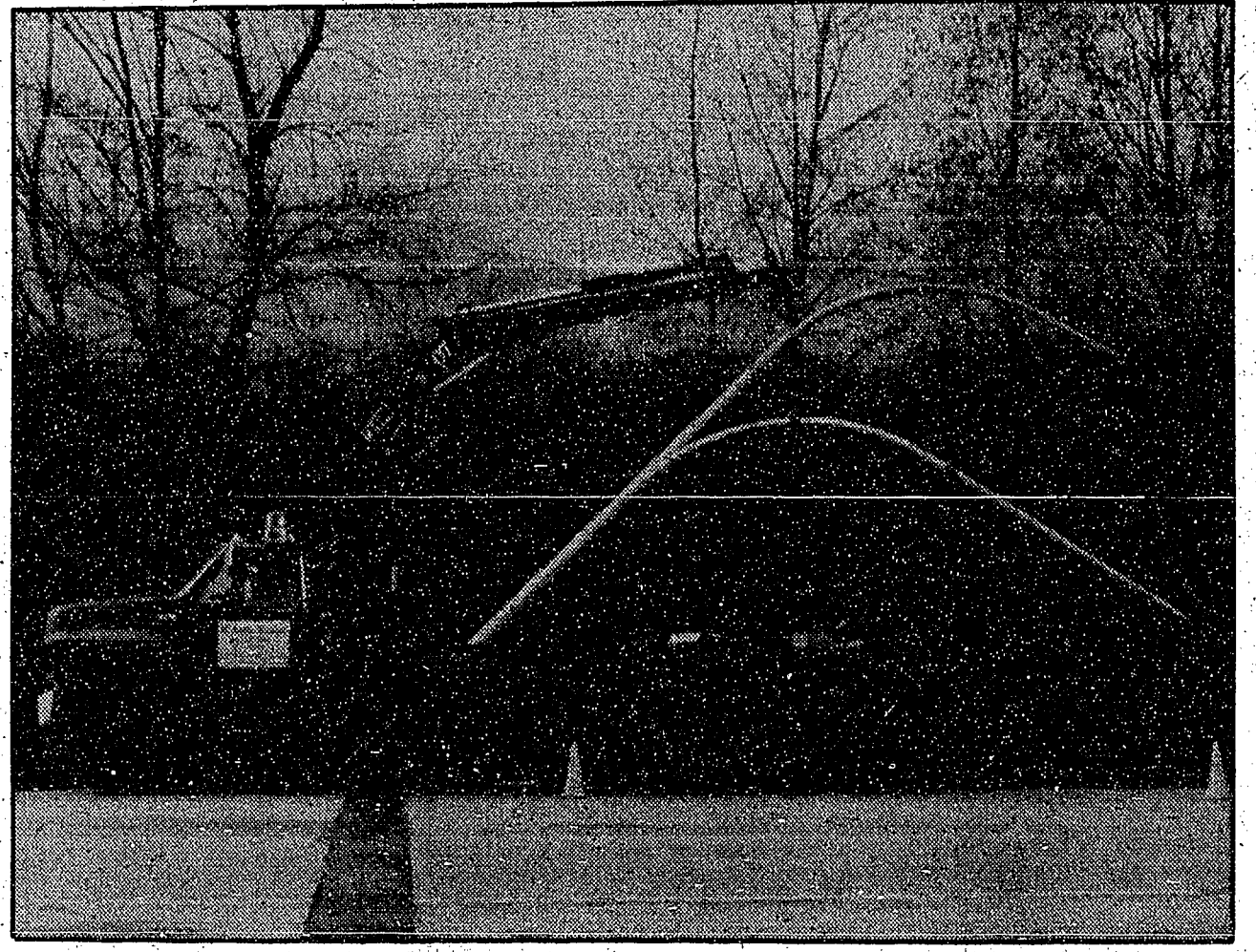
completed.

This year to date the total value of permits has increased \$4.3 million over the same period in 1989. Permits for construction valued at \$17 million have been taken out so far this year, while only \$12.7 million in construction was on the books at this time last year.

Single family dwelling construction is down from 82 per-

mits to October last year, to 60 units so far in 1990.

The number of commercial permits taken out this year has almost doubled over 1989. Seventeen commercial permits with a construction value of \$1.7 million outdo the four commercial permits valued at \$700,000 taken out at this point last year.

Catch a free bus on New Year's Eve

If you've had one too many on New Year's Eve this year, there will be free public transit 'til the wee hours to get you home safely.

Squamish Council voted unanimously to support the free New Year's Eve service, which will operate from 8 p.m. on Dec. 31 to 3:35 a.m. Jan. 1, 1991. The last trip will leave from downtown at 2:20 a.m. The regular daytime route will be covered in this special ser-

vice.

The cost of the additional service is approximately \$300, with the district's share totalling \$160.

In many B.C. communities which offer the free New Year's Eve service, private companies have sponsored all or part of the cost, BC Transit planner Don Boyd said in a letter to the district.

Posters, newspaper and radio ads publicizing the one-night

schedule have contained the names of private sponsors in other New Year's campaigns, Boyd said.

In other transit news, council agreed to arrange for the sale of bus ticket booklets from conveniently-located local businesses and Municipal Hall.


The sale of tickets will be more convenient for regular riders and will result in a small discount.

Boyd said tickets are sold in

books of 20, and most communities offer \$1 off the regular price. Books of 20 would therefore cost \$19 for adults and \$14 for students and seniors. These tickets would be used for the conventional service only, with the handy-DART service continuing on a cash-only basis.

It has been suggested that tickets be sold at the Chieftain Centre and Highlands Mall, as well as Municipal Hall.

Water bottling plant for Britannia Beach

A couple of fully loaded logging trucks rumbled through Britannia Beach Nov. 15, but it wasn't the beginning of a big logging show, Copper Beach Estates says.

The beech trees were cut from a right-of-way being built to facilitate a water-bottling plant in the old town site.

Between three and five truckloads of logs were taken out, and the logging was more a means to an end than a profit seeking operation in itself, Copper Beach property manager Dan Cumming said.

"There was some nice timber, but we didn't want to touch that so we stuck to the weed wood," he said.

The right-of-way is about 600 yards long and 30 feet wide and connects the proposed plant in the old townsite with a new weir being built on Britannia Creek.

"Ultimately, it will also be a water source for the community of Britannia Beach," he said.


The weir will be about six feet high and 25 feet across and made of gabions: pre-formed wire cages filled with

rocks.

It will be located just up stream from the old Tunnel Dam -- the old Britannia Power House -- but not as high up as the Park Lane Dam, which was breached in the summer of 1989.

The dam should be built within a week or two, depending on the weather, Cumming said.

The water-bottling proposal makes use of an existing water licence Copper Beach holds on the creek and is above leachate from the old mine.

Not enough federal beans for trees

Intensive silviculture should no longer be considered a frill. It should be made a regular component of forestry in B.C.

Yet the federal government has shown a discouraging lack of commitment to the practice. The \$100 million is has offered over the next five years will not contribute much to planting trees on the of millions of hectares of NSR (not satisfactorily restocked) land in the province. Even when it is combined with matching provincial funds, it isn't much considering the rate of treating the forests in the Soo TSA could have been doubled with the funding available under the old agreement. The new agreement will be less than half the old one.

At a time when we are identifying more cultivation work to be done and a greater need for it to be done, funding for the work is being cut back. Given the reductions projected for the Soo TSA annual allowable cut, the funding cut backs are adding insult to injury.

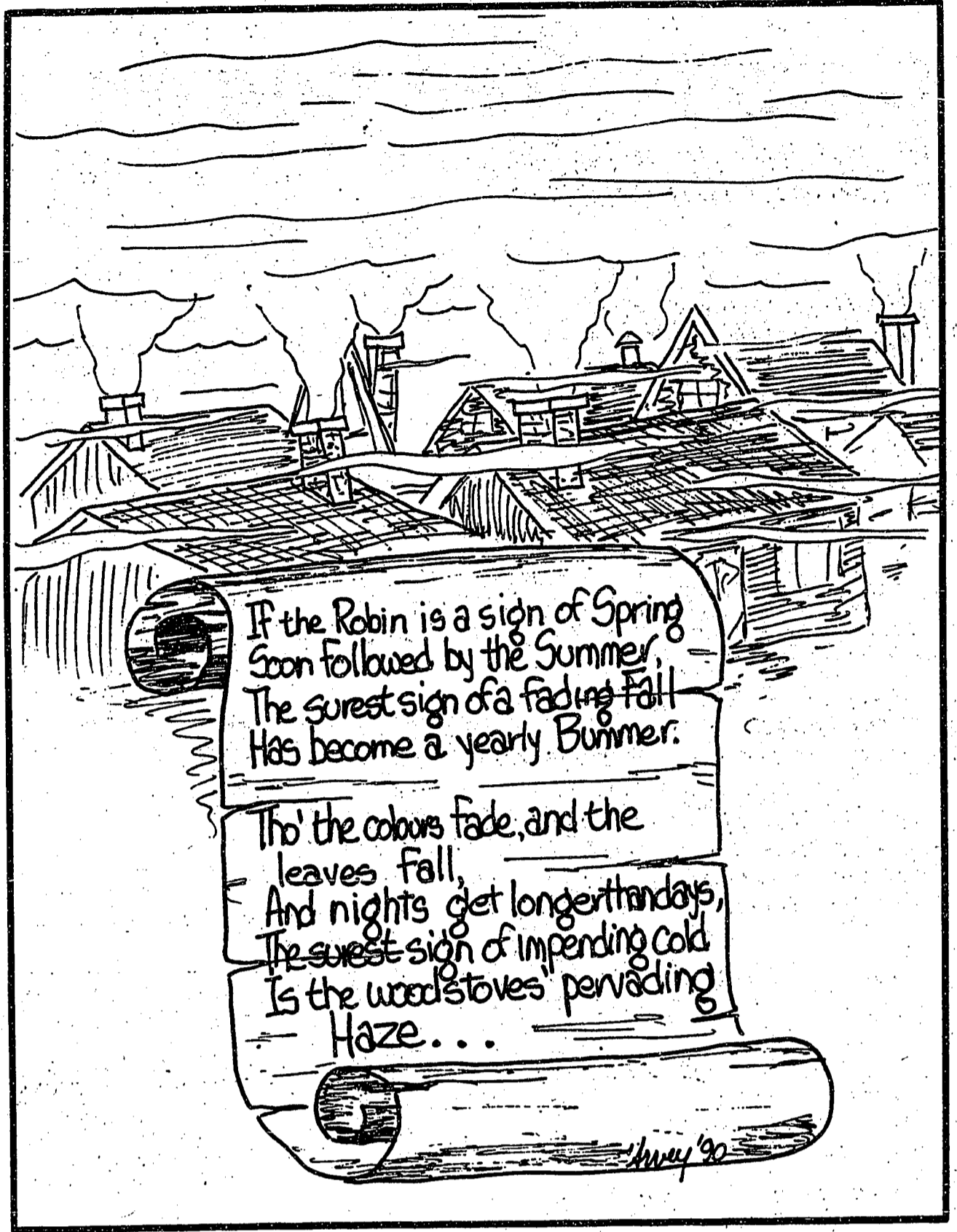
Fortunately, the province is still talking about living up to its half of the commitment and funding an intensive silviculture program of its own up to \$250 million over five years. The provincial program would bring the total funding to

\$450 million, which is still less than the \$500 million invested in the province over the last five years. Despite that investment, the total NSR land in the province is hovering about 3.7 million hectares, including the famous 77,000 hectare clear cut near Prince George. More trees will have to be harvested than are cut for some time yet, for the province to recover from years of resource mismanagement.

The provincial government could go a step further than its financial investment and work intensive silvicultural requirements into tree farm licences and other long-term tenures. While the immediate benefit to the volume-based licencees is not so clear, the benefits to the long-term tenure holders is more obvious -- they will likely harvest the trees they cultivate.

No doubt they will need to be pushed towards such a change just as they had to be prodded into replanting the land in the first place, but it is a change that both the forest industry and the province will benefit from and they should be made to do it.

Diplomacy Key to resolving Persian Gulf crisis

Dear Editor,

We watch fearfully and helplessly as military might, particularly American, builds to offensive concentrations in the Persian Gulf.

We regret that the unparalleled United Nations Security Council consensus on economic sanctions against Iraq has not been given time to effectively undermine the despotic regime of Saddam Hussein.

The Iraqi tyrant must be stopped somehow. His brutal annexation of Kuwait, his taking of innocent hostages, his genocidal treatment of his own people, his potential nuclear and chemical warfare capabilities -- all these must be censored and dramatically punished.

However, the UN's swift decision to opt for a rigorous non-violent solution to this world crisis should be acknowledged as a new and powerful model to be used again in future serious conflicts in this post-Cold War era.

During President George Bush's recent Thanksgiving visit to the U.S. troops, he raised the specter of an Iraqi nuclear threat. Obviously, public opinion required something more than oil and jobs to justify the spilling of young blood in the desert sand.

However, as defensible as a pre-emptive strike on a madman with his hands on an atomic detonator may seem, there are important historical similarities to consider.

When the Soviets invaded Czechoslovakia in 1968, the West did not use military force against them. The East-West conflict that had dominated Europe for four decades was, wisely and mercifully, not militarily resolved.

Eastern Europe agonized for 40 years under the rule of dictators and thugs. There were gross and manifold violations of human rights, long-term suffering of millions of people, blatant denial of self-determination, the illegal annexation of neighbouring states.

The Warsaw Pact countries and N.A.T.O. had devastating nuclear capability just as the U.S.A. and, presumably, Iraq do now. But the military option was never used because of this presence of phenomenal firepower -- nuclear, chemical, conventional -- a fire power that once ignited would have reduced Europe to a charred wasteland.

We seem to be forgetting already the successful resolution

of an already dangerous phase of world history when two major powers, armed extravagantly with every possible destructive device, eyed each other across a wall, fingering defiantly so many times, the nuclear trigger.

But diplomacy, inspired by the wise recognition of the insanity of a military solution in this highly technological world, prevailed.

And now we have the Persian Gulf.

Most certainly there have been nuclear weapons brought into the region since this crisis began. Thousands upon thousands of young men and women are there too and we have to wonder how we can sit by, without any public discourse or informed debate, so that they obediently go forth to die in what will be surely the most wicked and brutal war in the world history.

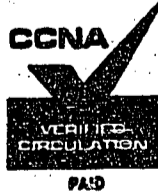

Snow sheds, ferry terminal needed

I believe that for a fraction of the cost the people of Squamish and Whistler could well be looked after by taking a different approach to the problem.

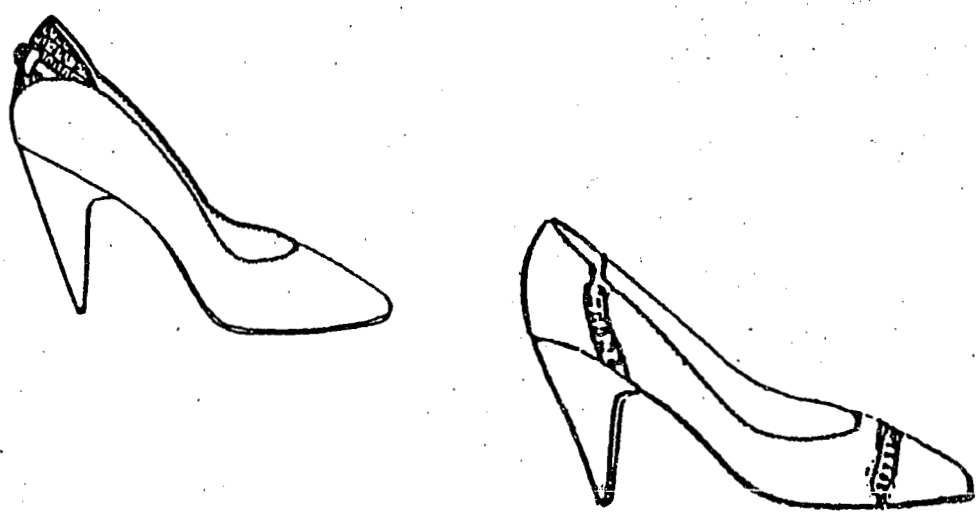
First, improve the existing highway by installing snow sheds in the areas where slides are likely to happen. Second, put a proper ferry terminal in Squamish, a terminal that would accommodate one of our large ferries. This terminal would be used in an emergency (avalanche, fire, road closure, etc.).

The Nanaimo or Sunshine Coast ferry could be diverted in an hour or two. Besides taking people and cars out of Squamish, emergency vehicles could be taken in.

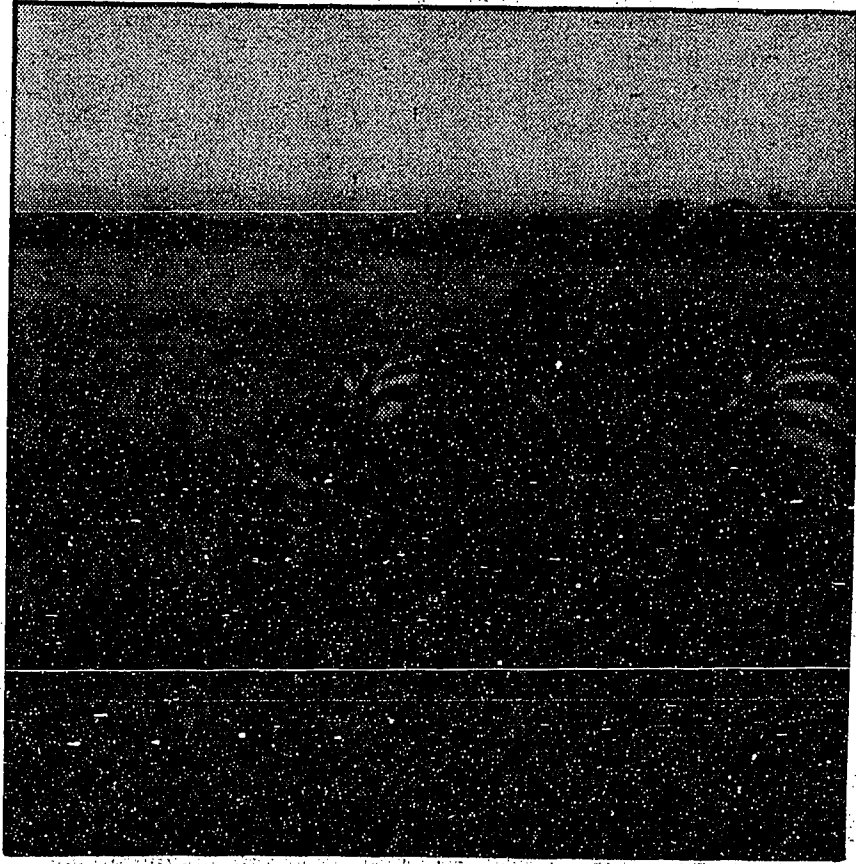

HOWE SOUNDINGS

Of all the national parks we visited in Kenya, my favourite must have been Masai Mara. It was not just for the great variety of animals, although these were spectacular, but it was the fact that this was the Africa I had envisaged -- the wide skies, the endless plains stretching far to the south into Tanzania where they become the famous Serengeti, and the typical landscape with fields of grass dotted with the flat topped acacia trees.

It was also here that we saw the most spectacular sight during our trip: the annual fall migration of the wildebeest and zebra from the plains at Masai Mara to the Serengeti.

In this migration over a million and a half wildebeest or brindled gnus, make their annual trip to the calving grounds in the Serengeti, accompanied by a quarter million zebras.

During this migration they cross the Meru River in Masai Mara and we were privileged to see this mass of herd animals pouring down the banks of the river and crossing to the other side in huge multitude. They milled on the bank before a lead bull made the decision to cross and then the entire group plunged in after him. Some didn't make it and were drowned in the crossing, becoming prey for crocodiles and vultures down river. Lions also lie in wait to catch any which are weakened or injured in the crossing.

The migrating animals cover the plains stretching from horizon to horizon, drifting from the Kenyan plains which they start to leave in September, to the Serengeti, arriving there in November. Here they stay after the rainy season, producing their calves near the end of January when there is plenty of feed for them.

Here the predators, lions, cheetahs, hyenas and jackals are waiting for them. The calves can run almost as soon as they are born and while many fall victim to the carnivores, they are born in such numbers that their species is on the increase.

No one really knows what triggers the migration. Perhaps they can sense the storm clouds building in the south, promising the coming of the rains and the fresh green grass needed to nurture the young. But each year they make the double migration, first from Tanzania, through the oat grass plains to Masai Mara and then back again.

This was the park where we saw the pride of 29 lions, the giraffe kindergarten where one female giraffe was looking after several offspring, and thousands of gazelles and other herd animals.

It was also an impressive place to stay, with the lodge built on a promontory overlooking the plains below and a hippo pool. Some of our group took the spectacular balloon trip which left at daylight and drifted across the plains looking at the herds of animals below.

The peoples of Kenya are fascinating. The three main tribes are the Kikuyu, Masai and the Kambas. The Masai originally came from the north, from the Sudan, drifting down to Kenya and now they are compressed into the southern portion of the country. They live off their herds and you can see them with their cattle stalking across the plains and along the roads. A tall, stately race, they wear brilliant red robes and live in villages. Nearby, their herds compete with the wild game for grass.

The Kikuyu are farmers and many of the foreign holdings were broken up to give them lands on which they grow crops of corn and beans. The Kambas are a fiercer group of natives and many of them have joined the police and the military. They were originally encouraged in this by the British and the practice has continued.

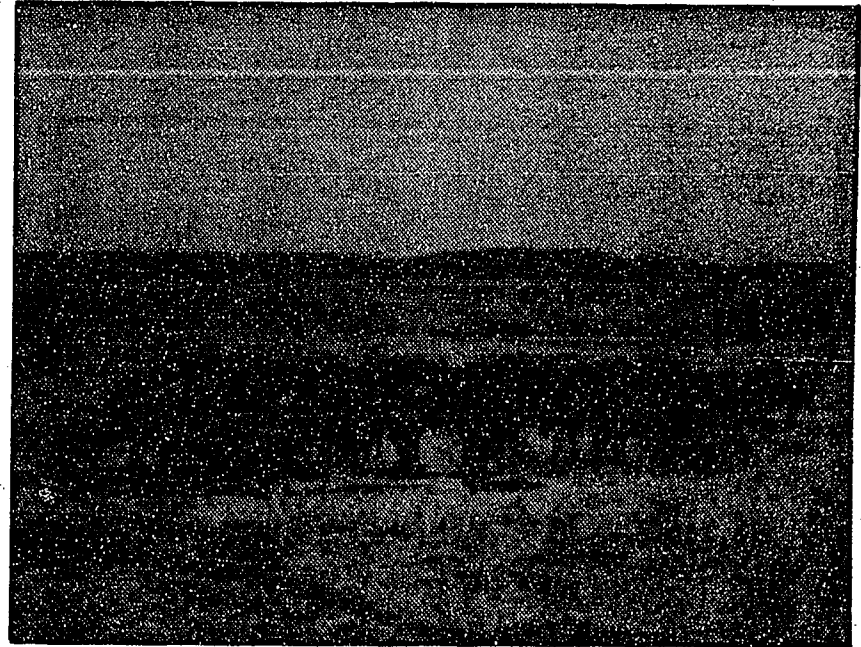
In the early years of the Masai migration from the north, they battled with the Kikuyu for the land, being gradually pushed south. One extinct volcanic crater in the Rift Valley was the scene of one of the battles the Masai fought among themselves. Many were killed in the battle and the dead were thrown down the steep sides of the crater.

The farmers and small land owners lead a fairly simple life with no modern conveniences as we know them. They live in simple homes, with no electricity or modern appliances. They cook their food over charcoal and light their huts with oil lamps. The women work very hard, gathering fuel or carrying water for long distances from the streams and rivers to their settlements. We would see them carrying these supplies, often for miles. The loads of branches and limbs which some of them carried bowed them down. You never saw the men carrying these loads and you rarely saw older men while there were many older women. Perhaps their hard work enabled them to live longer.

Often there were no people around when we stopped beside the road. But in minutes children would appear as if by magic.

The country has no large rivers to produce hydro-electric power, but does use geothermal power from geysers to produce electricity. One rarity in a Kenyan landscape is the power poles which criss-cross our provinces in Canada.

The country's main road system, from the coast to Nairobi and to the borders of the country, has paved highways and some paved sideroads, but much of the over 5,000 kilometre-

tres we put on the vans was spent on dusty sideroads in the country and in the parks. During the game drives we covered the tracks in the plains. And when I say dusty I mean dusty! One night when I had a bath I swear the water

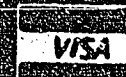

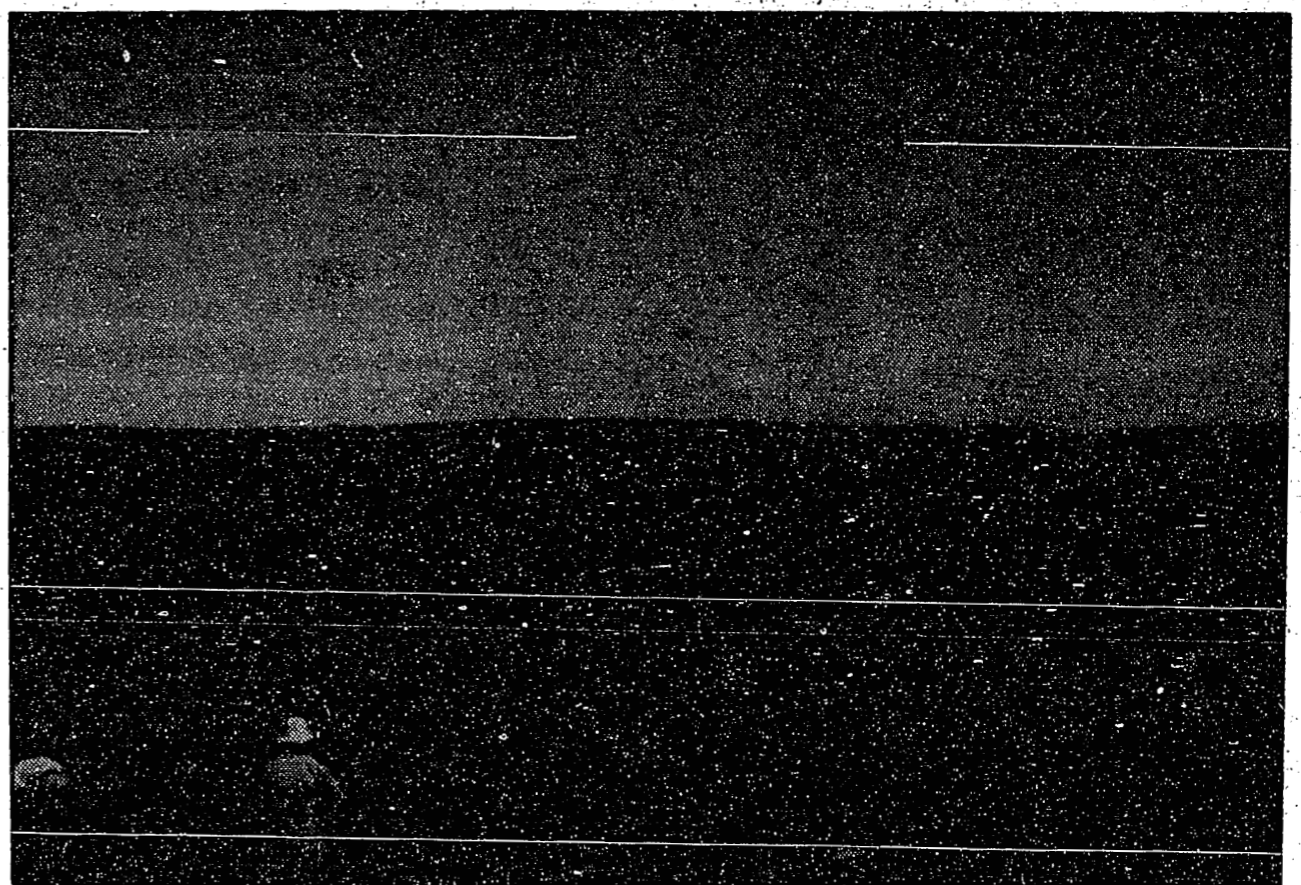

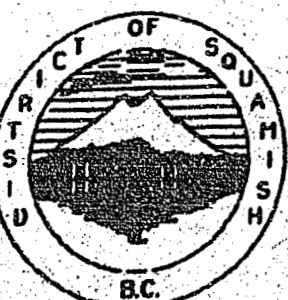

When Squamish voters went to the polls on Saturday, Nov. 17, they voted in former mayor Egon Tobus by a mere 16 votes (to be recounted this week at the request of contender Corinne Lonsdale). He will be joined by only two incumbent aldermen when he takes office in December. We asked you how you think the new council will perform over the next three years.

Norma Gratton, Squamish: "I think that Egon Tobus will be a great mayor. I remember when he was in before and he did a very good job then. It's good that they've given him three years...it's more time for him to do good things (for Squamish)."

Al Lewis, Squamish: "I hope the new council will get more involved in native issues. There are a lot of reserves in the community and their issues are important. (One of these is that) the estuary is disappearing because of industry, waste and sewage. The salmon fry use this area to acclimatize themselves for the salt water."

Brian Head, Squamish: "It's probably best that Egon Tobus got in. He's more for the working person than Phil Turner was. We're a work related town now, but in a few years we'll be more of a bedroom community for Vancouver and Whistler. We should have a choice every two years to elect a mayor."

Two ships bound for Northern Europe are the Star Dover, due in port Dec. 9, and the Star Grindanger, due Dec. 28, while the Star Cebu, due in Squamish Dec. 13, will sail for a port in Southern Europe.

The Star Derby, due in port Dec. 14, and the Arosia, due Dec. 18, will both sail for Mediterranean waters.

A LIKELY STORY

Recently, a pugilist by the name of Buster Douglas did his bit to reduce the incidence of brutality in boxing by bowing out of a heavyweight title fight while some spectators were still checking their coats.

I wonder whether he was related to old John Sholto Douglas, that other crusader for the removal of mayhem in the manly art?

Old J.S. Douglas is better known to history as the 8th Marquess of Queensberry, the one who caused to be drawn up the rules that govern the sport to this day.

Bare-knuckle boxing was too cruel, he ruled. Henceforth, contestants were to wear padded gloves; each round was to consist of three minutes of fighting followed by one minute of rest, and any fighter who went down had to get up unaided within 10 seconds or be declared "knocked out of time."

(There was a lot more, including a prohibition against wearing "shoes or boots with springs," but that was the meat of it.)

The Queensberry rules rang the death-knell for the bare-knuckle era, but did they accomplish their stated purpose and reduce the brutality? Even today you can get a ringing "no" from some experts.

Let's examine the arguments.

Before Queensberry a fighter has an escape clause. If he was taking more of a beating than he could comfortably absorb, he merely slipped to the ground and the round was over. His seconds packed him out and he had 30 seconds respite. Still a bit woozy, old chap? Never mind, just wobble back out there and stretch out again.

He could keep this up indefinitely and frequently did.

The record is believed held by Jim Kelly and Jack Smith who waltzed for six hours and 15 minutes near Melbourne in 1856. Mike Madden and Bill Hays went at it for six hours and three minutes at Edenbridge, Kent, in 1849 during which they ranked up 183 rounds before going home to dinner.

Today, the fighters have to stay in there for three bloody, battering minutes. If one goes down, he must get up alone and unaided or it's game over.

Billy Papke's own sister didn't recognize him after a fight with Stanley Ketchel, so ripped, bruised and swollen was his face from Ketchel's tearing gloves.

Jess Willard's face was ruined in just three rounds under Jack Dempsey's gloves; Dempsey in turn was so badly hammered by Gene Tunney that it was weeks before he regained a normal appearance.

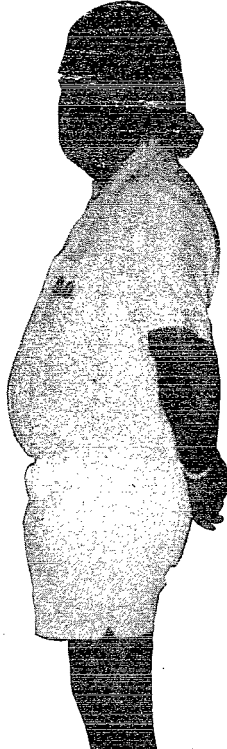
Gloves today are larger and softer, still they do little more than protect the fists, enabling a fighter to punch with all his strength -- blows that can cause the brain to rattle around like the pea in a whistle.

Regardless of where boxing began -- and you can get arguments on that forever -- it was in England nearly 300 years ago that it began its renaissance. Everybody wanted to box, from the most humble to the aristocracy, and that included women.

Almost exactly 100 years ago, John L. Sullivan -- his bare-knuckle title safely tucked away for all time -- met James J. Corbett in New Orleans.

Corbett won, to become the first heavyweight champion of the new "less brutal" era of gloved combat.

BC Hydro challenges corridor to be Powersmart

Squamish, Whistler and Pemberton have been duking it out in a contest of energy thrift.

BC Hydro has challenged the municipalities to show which is the most power smart during the month of November. The one that uses makes the most dramatic energy savings com-

pared to the same time last year will be declared the winner.

In addition to enjoying cheaper energy bills, the victorious community will have its flag flown over the other communities' municipal halls for a month.

"We're trying to get a bit of civic pride going," BC Hydro's Squamish Powersmart representative Mike Tennant said.

Whistler and Pemberton have had energy audits conducted and have adopted energy efficient policies.

Squamish is in the process of

changing the old mercury vapour streetlights to high pressure sodium ones, but has not adopted an energy efficiency policy as such, Tennant said.

While audits are only performed on large energy consumers, residential consumers and small businesses can benefit from switching to energy efficient light bulbs and other appliances. There are grants ranging from \$1 to \$30 for a variety of energy efficient fixtures.

For businesses with several fluorescent light bulbs, a switch to special 34 watt bulbs can result in significant savings while offering "very good" lighting.

If you've got 40 fluorescent bulbs, by changing, you're saving 240 watts an hour. That translates into a savings of \$77 dollars per year if the lights are on 11 hours a day.

Domestically, hot water usage is the greatest contributor to the bottom line on the Hydro bill, with the exception of household heating. Heating water can add up to 60 per cent of the Hydro bill.

Shortening the time spent under hot water in the shower will noticeably reduce the billing at the end of the month, Tennant said.

Special heat retaining covers for hot water tanks are available from the local Hydro office if the building's wiring is up to code.

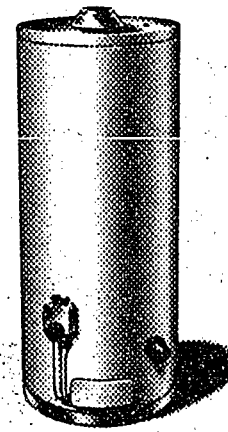

"If you like it spicy, try it again," Leona said.

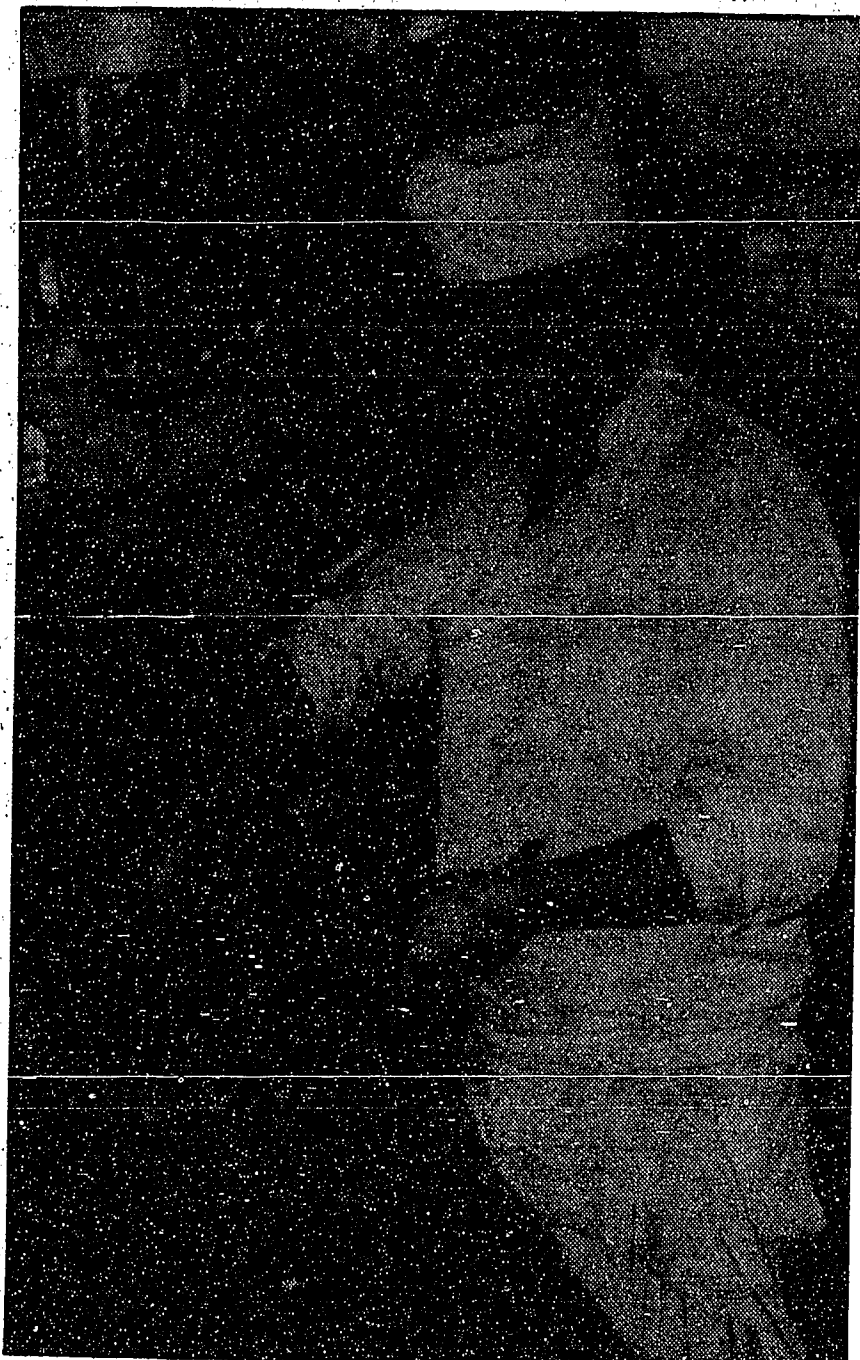
Further into December, the restaurant will begin serving breakfast and lunch, including a "skiers' special."

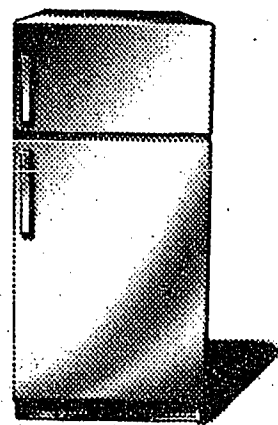



The very fact that a World AIDS Day exists a mere seven years after the virus was found is testimony for the need to radically change behavior for many people.

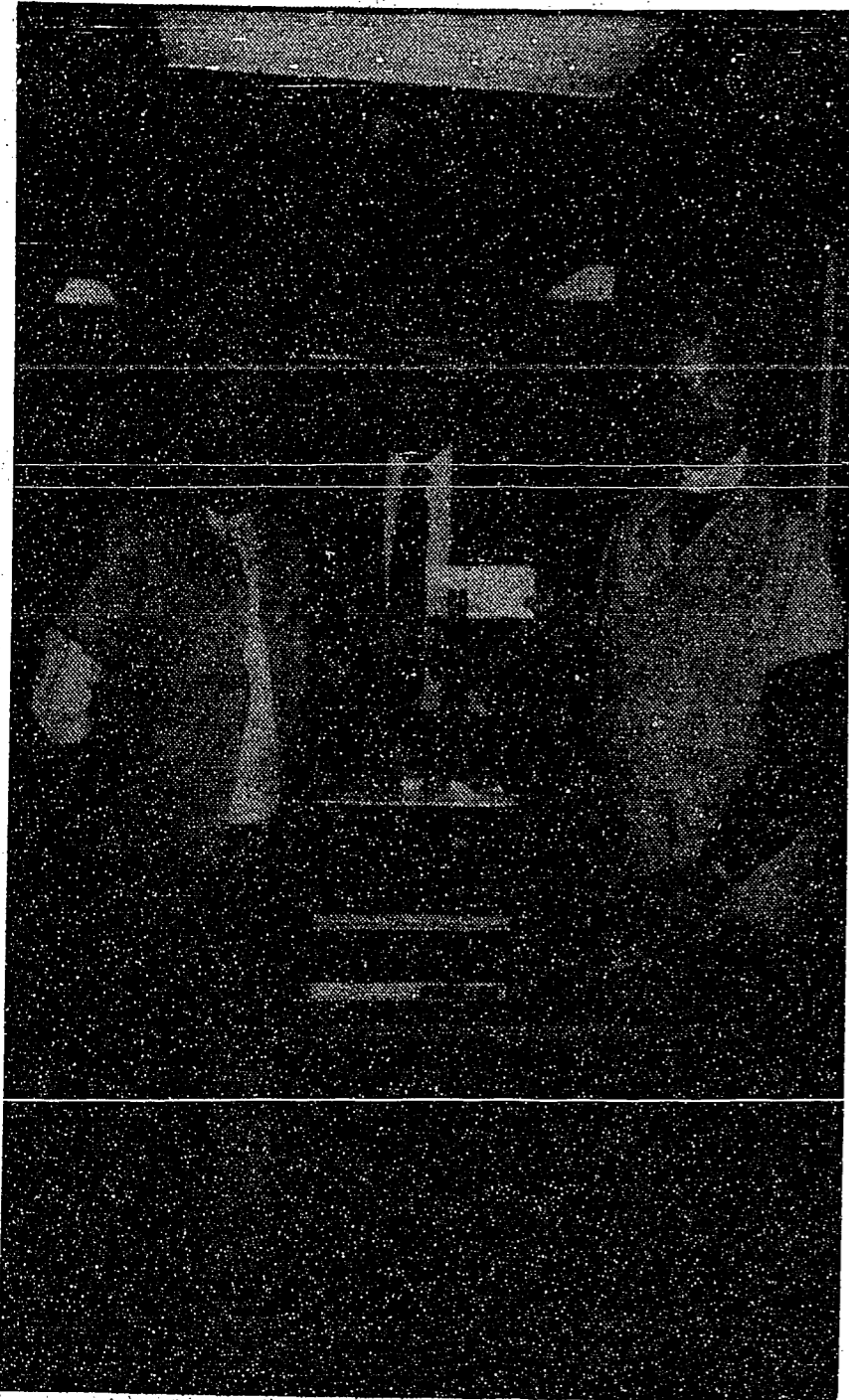
World AIDS Day is a good day to make a commitment to make 1991 a very safe year in your personal behavior.

1991 Autoplan Changes

PREMIUMS

Who pays more? Why?

Based on past experience and projections, ICBC requires 4.5 per cent more premium income in 1991 - 3 per cent to pay for claims and improved Autoplan benefits, plus 1.5 per cent to offset the impact of the federal Goods and Services Tax.

Each year, ICBC determines which coverages, territories and vehicle uses have increased or decreased in relative claims cost.

If your premium is changed more than the average, it is because of the various factors which affect insurance rating: the value, age and use of your vehicle, where you live, what coverage you choose and where you are on the Claim-Rated Scale.

Compulsory Coverage

The largest part of your basic Autoplan insurance is made up of liability coverage (to protect you if claims are brought against you by others) and No-Fault Accident coverage. Premiums for these coverages, including extended liability, are being increased, on a province-wide average, by 4 per cent for claim-free motorists. As we mentioned above, depending upon where you live and the coverage you choose, the change in your premium may differ from the average.

Collision & Comprehensive

Each year about a third of all vehicle models are "aged" and the collision premium is adjusted to reflect decreased value. Collision premium increases may apply to other vehicle models.

Comprehensive coverage premiums are also adjusted to reflect claims experience, vehicle value, use and territory. Sharp increases in windshield, theft and vandalism claims have led ICBC to increase premiums for Comprehensive coverage by an average 15 per cent.

Uninsured Motorist Protection (UMP) will cost \$3 more.

GST Impact

When you buy your Autoplan insurance you will not pay the 7 per cent GST on your 1991 Autoplan premiums. Financial transactions of this nature are exempt.

However, ICBC will be required to pay the GST on many goods and services it purchases.

ANY GOOD NEWS?

Yes. More and more people are participating in carpools and we've made a change that will make carpooling an even better deal. In the past you could drive a vehicle rated for "pleasure only" to and from work on only 4 days in a calendar month. We've increased that to 6 days so that, even in the longer months of the year, four carpool members who own pleasure-rated vehicles can share the driving to and from work without rerating their vehicles, as long as each of them drives to work not more than 6 days in the calendar month. The change to 6 days also applies to some other vehicle use classes. Ask your Autoplan agent to be sure you are rated correctly.

Increased Weekly Benefits

As of January 1, 1991 accident victims who qualify will receive increased compensation for lost wages. ICBC is increasing the maximum weekly indemnity from \$200 to \$300 provided that does not exceed 75 per cent of the victim's gross weekly income at the time of the accident. This will apply to all new claims as well as to all outstanding claims. Payments will not be retroactive but will start at the new level in January 1991.

Short Term Savings

Prior to January 1, 1991 a surcharge of 5 per cent of the annual premium has been charged to people licencing and insuring their vehicles for periods of less than 12 months (short term licence and insurance). This surcharge has been reduced to 4 per cent (minimum \$20) to make the short term option even more affordable.

WHAT ELSE?

Territories

For insurance rating purposes, BC is divided into 14 territories. In the past your Autoplan agent asked where your vehicle was principally operated in determining your premium. Now, for most vehicles, the territory is defined as where the vehicle is "garaged" that is, "primarily located when not in use". In most cases, this would be the vehicle owner's home address. This and other territorial changes have been made to accurately reflect claims experience in different parts of the Province.

Commercial Rate Classes

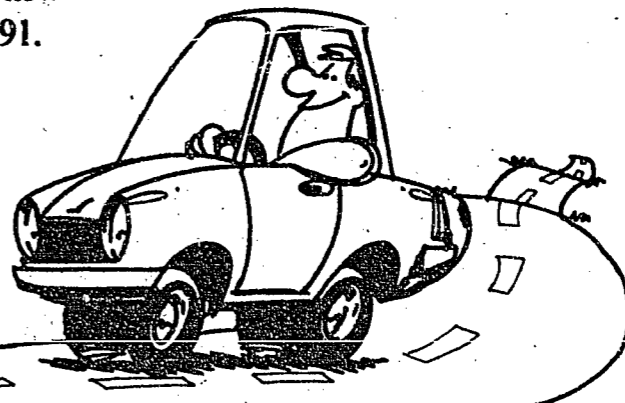
As of January 1, 1991, new value ranges and rate classes apply to commercial vehicles to account for increases in the price of new vehicles and deregulation in the industry.

The dividing line between light and heavy commercial vehicles is now set at 5,000 kilograms and operating distances have been redefined.

Commercial operators need to contact their Autoplan agents to determine how these changes affect them.

By following a few simple guidelines, business managers in the Sea to Sky corridor may well find that their local banker is the best friend they have when it comes to working out financial difficulties. Local

banks and credit unions generally agree there are some definite "dos and don'ts" that will influence the health of the relationship.

Joanne Tetachuk, independent business account manager for the Squamish branch of the Royal Bank, recommends that business managers contact their account manager as soon as financial problems are detected. She stressed that honesty in communications will generate trust and confidence in the relationship.

Communications with your banker is the key, noted Rob Kirkham, manager of the Squamish branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia. Not "hiding from the problems" and not waiting for the bank to come knocking on your door helps maintain credibility and fosters a much better working relationship. Rob noted that lenders are fairly receptive to re-arranging financing in response to a changing business environment.

Bill Brumpton, manager of the Squamish Credit Union emphasized the prevention side of the dilemma, stating that undercapitalization due to poor planning has caused the financial ruin of many businesses. It is more difficult to get additional funding for a business once things start to go astray, than if the proper financing has been arranged initially. Bill agreed on the importance of

notifying the credit union (or bank) before cheques "bounce".

Peter Banman, branch manager of the Bank of Montreal in Squamish encourages business managers to look upon their bank as a source of help in troubled times. By reviewing current financial statements and tax returns, bankers can often find the reasons for problems, which perhaps others may have overlooked. Peter noted that the image of bankers has changed considerably. Increased competition for your bank accounts has resulted in a more receptive, empathetic and customer-oriented bank.

Mel West, senior account manager for the Federal Business Development Bank for the Squamish area, commented that a good relationship with your commercial bank is a product of honest and prompt communication. Whether the news is good or bad, timely communication with your lender may make it possible to find a solution.

Al Barbour, commercial loans officer at the North Shore Credit Union in Whistler stressed the importance of preparation and advance warning. Bankers don't like surprises. When possible, book an appointment and then prepare something in writing which the banker can quickly read to get a current picture of the situation. Another hint: first

arrange your financing -- then spend the money.

In short, it looks like your friendly neighborhood banker could be a vital member of your business management team. The old strategy of "keeping your banker in the dark" doesn't seem to work, nor is it necessary in today's cooperative banking climate. Your lender has a vested interest in helping you make the business work. Take advantage of their skills and expertise. If you haven't already -- get to know your banker.

The Sea to Sky Enterprise Centre team of business counsellors have plenty of additional advice on how to work with the commercial lending community. Rose Moon and Katy McIntosh provide free and confidential counselling to businesses in the Sea to Sky corridor. Robert Fine, economic development officer, can assist by providing timely regional information and statistics and assistance with large scale business development projects. If you suspect that your business is or may be experiencing financial difficulties, take a step in the right direction -- call the centre at 892-5467 to arrange for your business financial fitness test.

iary at Branch 277, serving from 1974-'76 and again from 1981-'82. She is now the zone commander for the North Shore Zone of the Ladies Auxiliary.

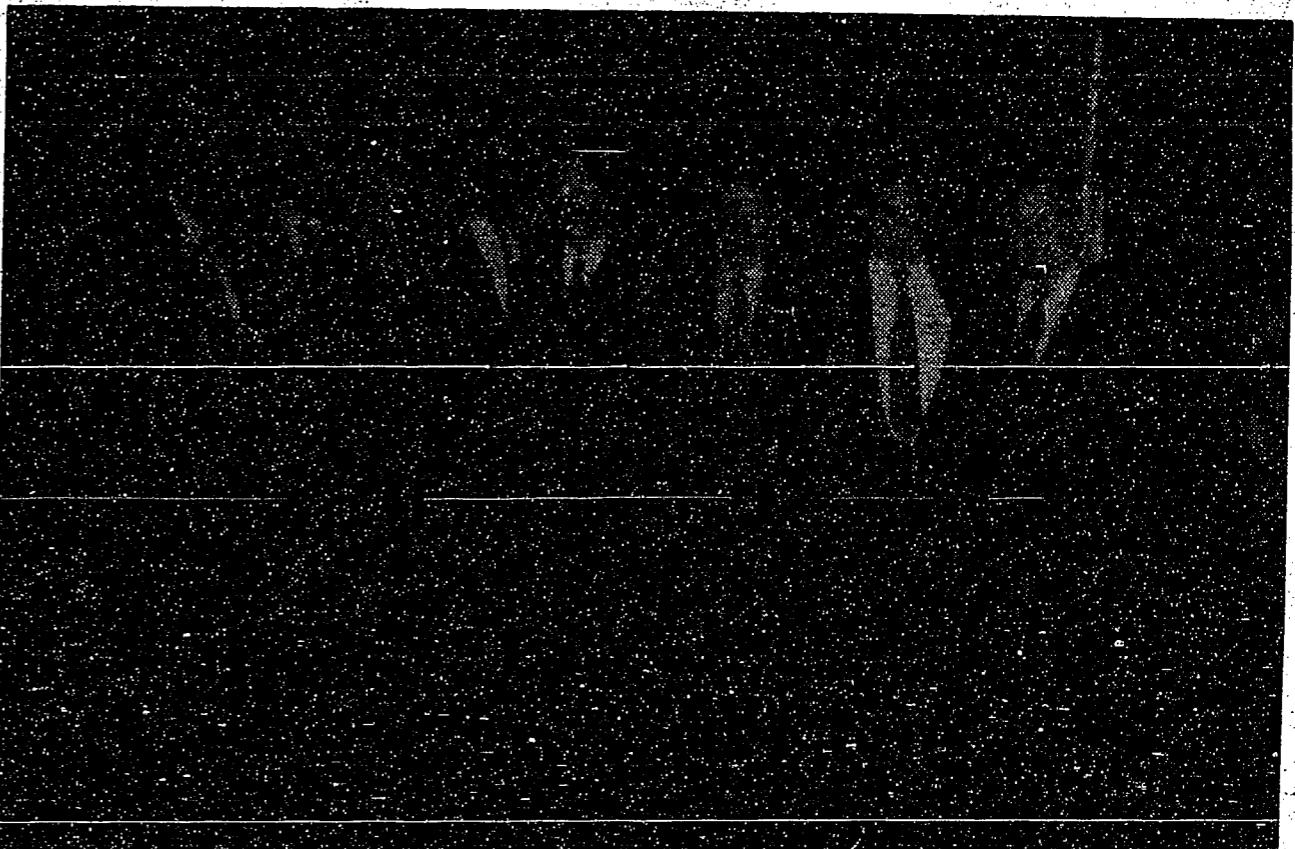

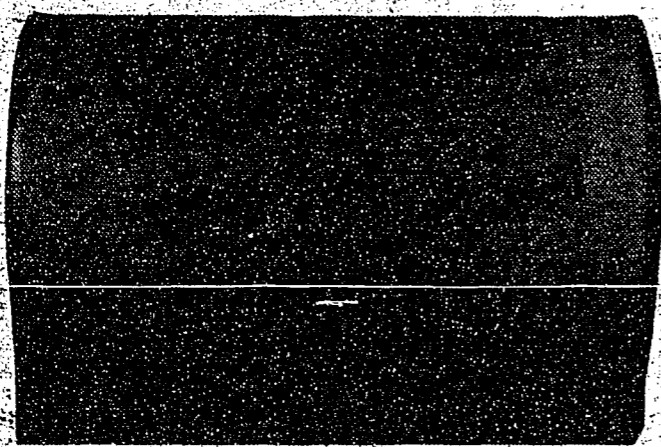

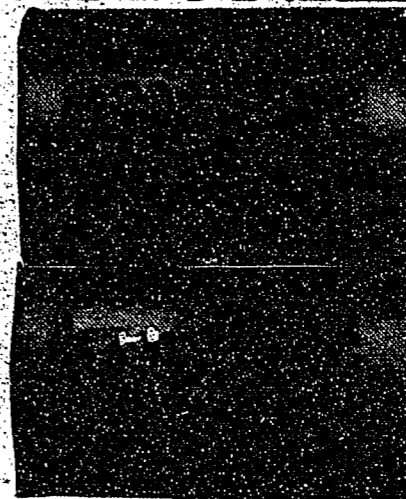

Job creation program combines experience, community service

Based on the success of last year's program, the Squamish Chamber of Commerce will again be facilitating a three-position job creation program. The three positions will in-

clude a business improvement area [BIA] coordinator, an economic profile researcher and a revitalization coordinator. This year's program will commence in December and interested people should apply through the Canada Employment Centre (CEC) in Squamish.

"This is really exciting," chamber manager Wendy Magee said. "Because last year's job creation program was so successful -- of the three people who worked here, two now have full-time jobs -- they've [CEC] offered us [the chamber] an opportunity to do it again this year."

The BIA coordinator position has the longest term, starting Dec. 3 and stretching on for 30 weeks.

The successful applicant will find out which of the property and business owners wish to participate in the BIA and how they would like to participate. Once a solid base of support and a boundary have been established, the coordinator will then take the concept to the municipality so a bylaw can be drawn up and approved by council.

Council will have to approve the creation of a BIA because it involves collecting a levy from all the business owners within the boundary. The levy will support the marketing and event coordination of member businesses.

Special training will be made available to the coordinator and the job could become full-time at the completion of the job program as an administrator to the BIA board.

Based on the work completed under the job program, the board will direct its administrator to prepare an action plan detailing which events could be most successfully marketed and coordinated.

Jack Fowler, Retail Merchants Association chairman, said he was glad the BIA group could work with the Chamber and combine forces.

The coordinator will help the merchants decide what they want to do, but will not be making decisions for them.

"He or she will be gathering information from the merchants, getting it back to the board, then back to the merchants again," Fowler said.

The economic researcher will be updating and refining an economic profile of Sea to Sky Country under the guidance of Economic Development Officer Robert Fine.

"This will provide the information which businesses will need to show whether they should expand or even start up new businesses in the corridor," Magee said.

The successful applicant will familiarize his or herself with the available economic statis-

tics and identify what further statistics are needed to create the most useful information base.

The information will then have to be organized into a presentable form.

The revitalization coordinator will have more of a grab bag of duties.

One of the first duties will be to complete work on the wind art project.

Towards the beginning of summer, the person will work with the Loggers Sports/Squamish Days organizers on promoting the community's major annual event.

"Last year, having someone write letters and contact tour companies was a great help to them [Loggers Sports organizers]," Magee said.

"We take for granted what we have in Loggers Sports, but the volunteers who put that together spend hours and hours making that event the celebration that it is."

The coordinator will complete the term by assisting the BIA coordinator in the final stages of that person's project.

The two coordinators should complement each other, Magee said.

Loggers Sports is the original BIA in Squamish because it attracts people to the area.

"It's also a community event which highlights logging rather than hiding it."

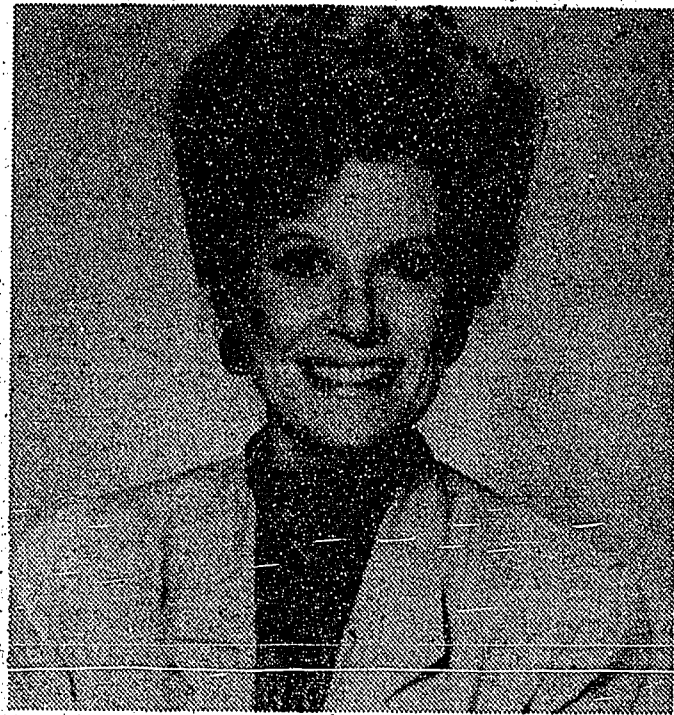

Women's centre to aid Liberian refugees; postage donations wanted

A plea for help for innocent victims of Liberia's civil war will be answered by members of the Howe Sound Women's Centre. In response to a letter from a women's centre in Nigeria, the HSWC will be sending packages of clothing for refugee women and children who have risked their lives travelling for help.

To aid in covering the cost of shipping the packages to Africa, the local women's centre would appreciate donations, member Janet Reid said. "It could cost up to \$100."

The decision to aid the Liberians was made in a recent HSWC steering committee meeting, where a disturbing letter from Hannah Edemikpong in Liberia was read to members. The HSWC had received correspondence from the Liberian centre several times in the last few years.

Although this recent letter is somewhat graphic, we will reprint it here to give you an idea of the atrocities committed during wartime overseas:

*Dear Sisters,
Emergency Assistance is Needed for Liberian Refugees and Rape Victims.*

As you know, we are a women's centre campaigning for the ending of female genital mutilation and all traditional practices that endanger the lives of women, such as force feeding, childhood marriage, polygamy and brutal abuse of wives and children. We also provide direct services for the battered, destitute, elderly and homeless women, and we campaign vigorously against the widespread of AIDS amongst women. Through peer counselling, community

Unfortunately, the civil war in the strife-torn Republic of events, information dissemination, and public information campaigns through radio, tele-

vision and newspaper, we work for the change of attitudes towards violence against women. Liberia in West Africa has further aggravated our already compounded the situation as some women refugees and children have risked their lives travelling in open boat dug-outs made of tree trunks through the Atlantic Ocean to our centre. Amongst these women are five who have been raped, (one with a broken bottle dumped in her vagina) by the rebel soldiers of Charles Taylor's so-called National Patriotic Front, the main rebel group fighting to overthrow President Samuel Doe of Liberia.

According to the women, these atrocities were perpetrated on them because they hailed from the tribe of President Samula Doe, who the rebels are trying to oust from power as a reprisal to the Liberian Government troops' killing of Charles Taylor's tribesmen, who are suspected to be aiding the rebels.

As women, we cannot remain indifferent to the plight of these unfortunate women, and we cannot turn them away from our centre. We have therefore been compelled to use all available funds to provide emergency care and ser-

vices for these our "unexpected strangers" who are suffering from exposure, hunger and disease. This has altered our budgetary plans and increased our financial problems as additional funds are immediately needed to provide continuous services for these refugees, especially medical care for the raped victims. Besides, the situation has also precipitated an immediate need for relief materials such as clothing, shoes and medicaments. In addition, we are facing an acute shortage of accommodation, as our ability to house women has been overstretched to admit more inmates than was originally intended.

In these circumstances, we are earnestly and sincerely appealing to you to come to our immediate help by donating whatever you can afford for the care of these war victims. For we cannot by ourselves meet with this emergency situation since we are a non-governmental feminist organization which depends on gifts and donations for the running of our programs and services. Donations by personal cheques, bank drafts or International Money Order will be graciously accepted and should

be sent by registered mail. Material gifts such as clothing, shoes, medicaments, etc. will also be accepted and their packages should be inscribed

Q: I'm thinking of buying a new car in 1991. How will the proposed GST affect prices?

A: The outgoing Federal Sales Tax (FST) is now part of the price of new cars. So, while they will be fully taxed at 7% in 1991, the expected effect of replacing the FST with the GST on the average \$22,000 mid-size car is a reduction of around \$850.

Q: My son has figured out it will cost \$500 in lumber to build a dock at our cottage if he bought it now. How much will that lumber cost with the proposed GST?

A: You can expect to pay about \$512 for that same amount of lumber for personal use based solely on the changeover from the FST to the GST.

Q: I know the proposed GST won't apply to city bus fares but I take the commuter train to work. Will I have to pay GST?

A: No. Daily commuter trains are considered a municipal transit service, so fares are exempt from GST.

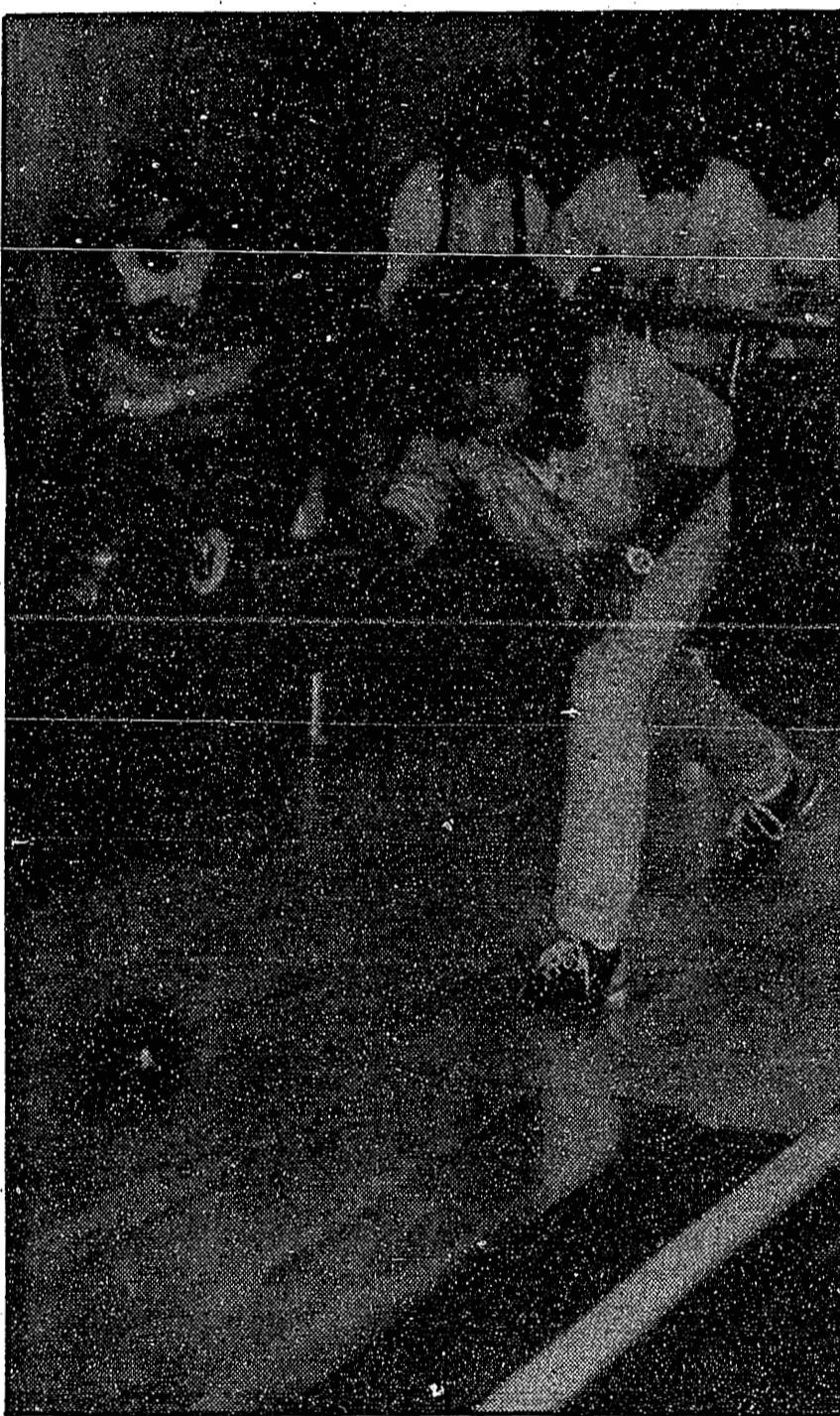

Federal commitment to forestry falls short of expectations

The \$100 million the federal government is offering towards a new Forest Research Development Agreement (FRDA) will come no where near meeting the province's needs, critics charge.

portion of a new agreement so a total of \$700 million could be invested in the province's forests over the next five years. The previous agreement, which expired last year was a 50-50 split of \$500 million over five

ment put more money into forestry overall than the provincial government has over the past five years. "Last year alone, the federal government invested \$75 million in forestry in B.C. and that is not accounted for in the cooperative agreement."

John Reynolds, MLA West Vancouver-Howe Sound, said he could understand the federal government having difficulty raising the funds for all of Canada, but thought Quebec, which has a much smaller forestry, should not be offered the same \$100 million B.C. was.

As 65 per cent of Canada's forest business is done in B.C., a greater share of the federal assistance should accrue to the province as well, he said.

"It's not fair. It's totally unfair."

The provincial government will maintain its commitment to invest \$350 million, although it will contribute only \$100 million to the cooperative agreement. The rest will be put into a special forestry program which will be announced eventually, Reynolds said.

"We will still plant as many trees. We will still put up as much money as we had planned to."

Brinkman said the provincial government was right not to inflate the federal government's contribution, but said the province also needed to do more for silviculture.

"There's no reason for the provincial government to add any glory to the pitiful contribution of the federal government."

On the other hand, Brinkman estimates that only \$20 million a year has been invested in intensive silviculture, forestry methods which deliver more cubic meters of wood at harvest time than merely allowing the stands to grow as they were planted.

Other money contributed

through job creation programs doesn't produce a lot of hectares of timber because it is directed more to making work than getting the job done, he said.

Province-wide, Brinkman would prefer to see a \$250 million intensive silviculture program on top of a backlog forestry program of the same size.

In the Squamish Forest District, \$798,076 dollars were spent on a combination of backlog planting and intensive silviculture.

The bulk of the effort is put into intensive silviculture because there is a minimum of backlog forestry to be done here, said Doug Bacala, Squamish Forest District resource officer, silviculture.

In the Soo Timber Supply Area Options Report, intensive silviculture of about \$800,000 a year was estimated to increase the long range annual allowable cut by 47,000 cubic meters a year or about 1,500 truck loads of logs.

Intensive silviculture directly supplies between 34 and 40 full-time equivalent jobs annually in the Soo TSA.

There is plenty of room for more silvicultural work to be done in the Squamish Forest District, Bacala said.

"Once all the reforested stands have been surveyed, the district could probably double its spacings." Tree spacing is a form of intensive silviculture where lesser grade trees are prematurely harvested so the best ones can have the full advantages of the available nutrients.

"It's bullshit," blurted out Jack Harmston, vice-president IWA Canada Local 1-71.

As an increasing number of jobs depend on each cubic meter of timber cut, programs affecting the volume of timber available will in turn effect the number of jobs.

"Today you won't see an effect, but down the road, jobs will be lost.

"We want more silviculture."

Dirk Brinkman, president of the 85-member Western Silvicultural Contractors' Association, said the federal offer shows a lack of commitment to forestry.

"This agreement is a very bad sign that there is no comprehension of the way our economy works in Ottawa. There's some illusion that we can buy and sell Nintendos and be fine.

"Anyone can see it's worthwhile investing \$1 billion a year to maintain a \$14 billion a year industry."

The federal government has offered to put \$100 million into a new five-year agreement, but it is asking the provincial government to put up \$200 million.

Forests Minister Claude Richmond has only agreed to meet the federal commitment for that program with \$100 million from provincial revenues and said in a press release: "We are not and never have been happy" with the proposed FRDA agreement.
