"Grey area" in industrial zoning concerns downtown retail merchants

The Industrial VII zoning bylaw controlling business in the Squamish Industrial Park has "grey areas" that leave

downtown merchants with an uneasy feeling, Squamish Council was told last week. A delegation from the

Squamish Chamber of Commerce met with council Mar. 26 to discuss the industrial park zoning and the resultant

lack of confidence felt among merchants in the downtown core. Chamber director Jack

Fowler, who is also president of the Downtown Retail Merchants' Association, said now is an excellent time for council to start making plans for the future use of the industrial park.

He said he is concerned with the present zoning, as "you could almost put any type of business in there if you push the grey areas."

A merchant himself, Fowler said he signed a five-year lease for his Chieftain Centre shop

bylaw for Highfield Developments' proposed project that will specify manufacturers' retail outlets only.

Fowler had asked, "How can we be assured that if [the development] comes in as a factory outlet mall, that that's the way it's going to stay?"

While he said the Highfield development "could be the best thing for Squamish" if developed properly, merchants are concerned that they are pro-

last summer, and, along with others, does not feel the security and confidence in the downtown's future that he should.

Ald. Norm Verner, who was elected to council after several retail businesses were granted approval to locate in the industrial park, said he doesn't agree with the idea.

"I personally don't like the way they've gone in there over time."

But Ald. Ron Barr said each business applied individually and was granted approval to move there on its own merits. With the Industrial VII bylaw, he added, it was often a "case of interpretation."

For example, the Three Sheets to the Wind store on Progress Way had expanded from an industrial area of North Vancouver, and company representatives had said they were supplying Whistler's commercial linen needs.

"I didn't realize it was that big a problem for the downtown merchants," he said.

Ald. Tom Bruusgaard said perhaps the industrial park would be better called a "commercial centre," as location there of businesses that need more space is inevitable.

Ald. Garth McCreedy said there has been concern regarding retail businesses in the industrial park since Fleetline located there. But, he said, retail warehousing is "a phenomenon of the day" which shouldn't erode the confidence of downtown merchants.

"Council still feels the downtown is our main centre."

Ald. Ron Barr said the Industrial VII bylaw, along with all other zoning bylaws, is currently being updated by the district's planners, Zocalo Consultants. At the same time, council is working on a zoning

tected by specified zoning.

A strong opinion expressed by Mayor Egon Tobus was that land for any industrial development proposed for Squamish will be made available.

"You bring the industry here and I personally will accommodate them."

Tobus said, however, that the natural growth of Squamish will "lead in the direction of the industrial park" over the next 10-20 years.

Squamish cannot remain a small town, he said, and must do all it can to attract outside visits to the community, as does Whistler to the north.

With a future road connection planned between the Industrial Park and the downtown, passing through Buckley Crossing, the downtown and the businesses in the park will be more closely linked, Tobus said.

Verner said downtown revitalization is not the last step in making improvements to the downtown. By improving parking and possibly removing height restrictions for buildings, the downtown will improve even more, he said.

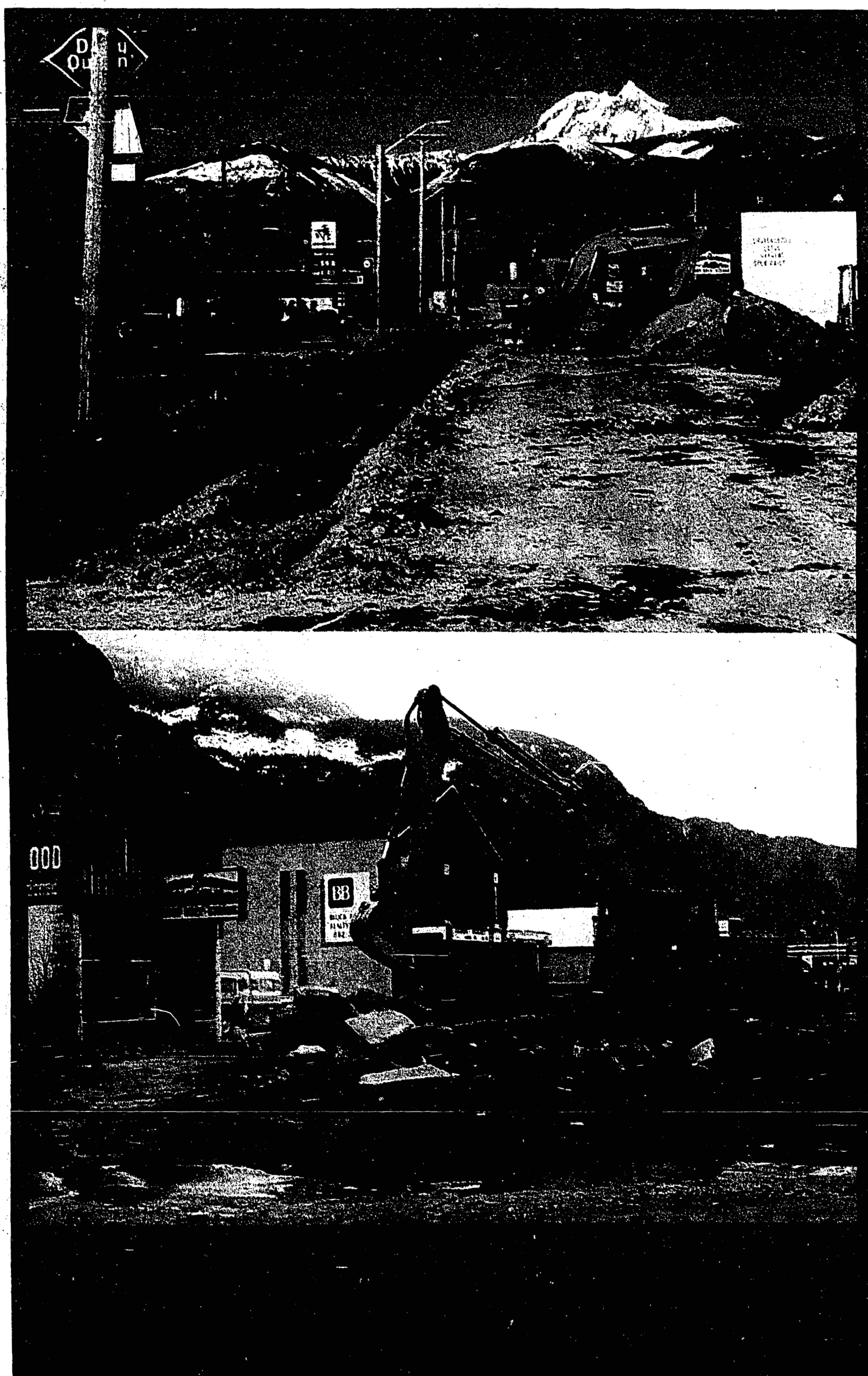
Chamber president Bill Manson said the original vision for the industrial park did not include any retail businesses locating there.

"It's been a thorn in our side for many, many years."

He expressed his concern that it will be difficult to regulate Highfield Developments' project, should it be constructed there.

Ald. Don Ross noted that Highfield's proposal includes two restaurants, which does not comply with present zoning.

Barr said council "realizes there are grey areas" in current zoning for the industrial park and plans to eradicate them in the zoning bylaw review.



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Five-year slope stabilization program begins on Hwy. 99

A five-year slope stabilization program on Highway 99 begins this spring, Highways Minister Rita Johnston and MLA John Reynolds announced Wednesday.

The program begins with a \$372,388 contract awarded to

Cougar Rock Contracting Ltd. of Kamloops for slope stabilization at Brunswick Point, 21 km north of Horseshoe Bay on the Sea to Sky Highway. The major scaling project will be undertaken in the spring and fall of each year.

"Our primary goal is to make the Sea to Sky Highway between Horseshoe Bay and Squamish a route which commuters, commercial traffic and tourists can count on," Johnston said in a Mar. 27 news release. "Our on-going rock monitoring and scaling program has helped stabilize the slopes along the highway. I am confident that this new five-year program will greatly help us keep the vital link between

Vancouver and the communities along the highway open."

Reynolds called the Highways Minister's announcement, along with the announcement several weeks ago of the intention to build an emergency ferry mooring facility at Porteau Cove, "excellent news."


Project work will include rock scaling, bolting and the installation of wire mesh on the slopes at Brunswick Point. Work on this section is scheduled to be completed by the summer of this year. Tenders will be called this fall for the second phase of the slope stabilization program at Porteau Bluffs.

Cougar Rock Contracting Ltd. submitted the lowest of seven tenders for the Brunswick Point work.


During project work, motorists should expect 20-minute delays and/or temporary road closures Monday through Friday. There are no scheduled delays or closures Mar. 29 through Apr. 7 or on Friday afternoons, weekends or statutory holidays.

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Union strikes two-year deal with Carney's

Waste disposal services are back to normal after Carney's Waste Systems agreed Wednesday to union demands for a secure first collective agreement.

"The union received a clear indication from the employer that he wanted to find a solution and resolve the labour dispute," said Brad MacKenzie, International Union of Operating Engineers (IUOE) representative.

MacKenzie said the bargaining committees sat down Wednesday from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. because both sides had concern for the union's ballot challenge.

After the Industrial Relations Council (IRC) was brought in as an independent arbitrator, the 17 Carney employees were granted the opportunity to vote

on the company's written offer. But before the ballots could be counted, the IUOE challenged the eligibility of five of the voting employees to cast ballots. A ruling on the ballot challenge was to be handed down last Wednesday.

Before the hearing could convene negotiations resumed, and after nine hours of bargaining the three demands presented by the union as pivotal to ending strike action were met.

Carney's has agreed to provide employees with a full IUOE pension plan, while the right of management to do union (bargaining unit) work has been limited.

And, the employer has allowed for a union continuation clause to be placed in the collective agreement, enabling the collective agreement to remain

in effect until a strike, lockout, or new agreement is reached.

MacKenzie said the continuation clause allows the union to build on the first collective agreement when the expiry date is reached, rather than asking the employees to begin all over again in securing collective rights.

On the other side of the negotiating table, the company's demand for a two-year contract has been agreed to by the union.

"The union wanted a one-year contract but the company needed the stability of a two-year collective agreement," said Linda Carney, company spokeswoman.

"We feel it was nice to negotiate a contract. And we're pleased an agreement has been reached that both the employ-

ees and the company can live with," Carney said.

MacKenzie said both the employees and the union are extremely happy with the contract as a first collective agreement.

Since August of 1989 the IUOE has been certified to represent the 17 drivers and mechanics employed at Carney's. The union notified the company in mid-February of this year that it would again be seeking a collective agreement for its members.

On Mar. 12 picket lines were raised by striking employees. The collective agreement reached last week will expire Apr. 30, 1993.

"We believe the strike action was necessary to bring this agreement into place," MacKenzie said.

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Downtown Revitalization Update

Work begins on second block of Cleveland Avenue

Work crews were back on Cleveland Avenue immediately following the Easter long weekend, finishing up waterworks on the block between Pemberton and Winnipeg.

There will likely be a few days this week when the entire stretch of Cleveland between Pemberton and Victoria is closed, said Dennis Cofield, Webb Engineering's project

manager. With work finishing off on one end and beginning on the other, the complete closure isn't expected to last long. Stripping of asphalt along the street and sidewalks between Winnipeg and Victoria began on Thursday, he said, and will continue this week to allow workers to install a new storm sewer and water catch basins. All waterworks along this stretch should be completed by the weekend.

Once the main waterworks are complete, Cofield said, tie-ins to individual businesses will be done.

"The actual tie-in doesn't take long, maybe an hour or so."

Sidewalks completed between Highway 99 and Buckley Avenue got lots of use over the weekend by people going to the Kinsmen-sponsored mid-way, and Cofield said the second remaining stretch over the BC Rail right-of-way will be completed after necessary approvals are gained.

One interesting discovery made by excavators along Cleveland last week was the unearthing of some old wooden stave lines, or culverts, Cofield said, probably dating back to the turn of the century.

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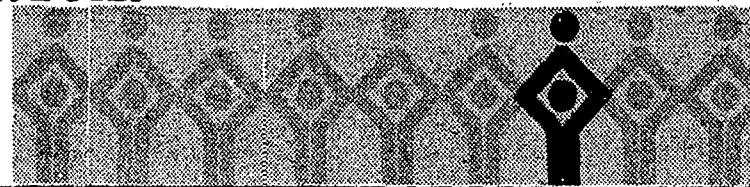
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Squamish SLRD directors urge support for Porteau ferry terminal

The proposed Porteau Cove ferry terminal has regained the regional district's tempered support after both Squamish directors joined the fight for the emergency marine link.

"I don't have a problem with an emergency ferry facility at Porteau Cove. Businesses can't

overturned the move.

The emergency ferry terminal option surfaced from the rubble of last October's slide that closed the Sea to Sky Highway for 13 days.

Traffic was rerouted through the Darrell Bay facility but just two ferries were able to dock,

and he said a terminal in Squamish rather than at Porteau would double that turn-around time.

"I don't think it necessarily needs to be done with a lot of money," said Bruusgaard.

It was Whistler director Thelma Johnstone who spearheaded the drive to quash the board's previous decision.

"Whistler Council sees [the Porteau terminal] as a very important solution in case of an emergency," said Johnstone.

She said October's road closures seriously damaged the resort community's international reputation, and that a Porteau facility would be a very important marketing tool in restoring the resort's image.

"Even a 24-hour closure is too long for the investment that has gone into Whistler," said

Johnstone.

But SLRD Chairman Dan Cumming said the previous decision was based on the lack of consultation and the fear the region would be told that an alternative highway was no longer needed once the emergency dock was in place.

The majority of the board seemed to support an alternative highway route through the Capilano watershed. But Director Shirley Henry asked: "Shouldn't the money be spent on upgrading the existing road?"

The new motion drafted by Verner states that in the absence of any formal information the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District supports an emergency solution, but that it not be confused with the need for an alternate route and a proper highway access.

believe Weldwood and Squamish Valley residents have a lot of concerns with this hydro project," said Squamish Director Norm Verner.

Fairmile Construction Ltd. is applying to build a 350 MW hydroelectric project on the Elaho River that will supply United States Pacific Northwest public utilities in the late 1990s.

Major components of the power project include a 7,000-acre reservoir and a 17.4-km power tunnel to Jervis Inlet, and a 60.8-km, 230,000-volt transmission line.

The company submitted its proposal to the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District for information, and to provide the board with an opportunity to express any concerns it might

have for the project.

SLRD Chairman Dan Cumming said the board requires "a lot more information" on the project than was presented to them.

The regional district decided to oppose the project based on the information received.

The dam with a reservoir of 725,000-acre-feet of live storage would generate two 240,000 h.p. turbines.

Fairmile says the power project will meet the United States Pacific Northwest capacity shortfalls expected at the end of the decade. And the power will be pre-sold on a long-term contract basis.

The project poses a substantial loss of timber supply to Weldwood of Canada Ltd. and will have a dramatic effect on the Squamish Basin fisheries, as well as causing a loss of potential Elaho power to B.C. Hydro.

The SLRD has been given until Apr. 15 to review the prospectus and forward comments before the company submits a detailed preliminary planning report and a draft energy Project Certificate Application.

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Geothermal energy project will turn all eyes to our corner of Canada

Children at Brackendale Elementary School recently wound up a long period of study on the rich culture and diversity found in the Pacific Rim countries. One important aspect of their study must have been to help locate themselves -- their town, and coastal province -- in this unique area of the globe.

Before long the study may be turned around, with all eyes looking upon this small spot on the Pacific Rim of Fire, as it readies to become the first in Canada to tap an important global resource.

The only company to respond to BC Hydro's request for geothermal energy proposals, Canadian Crew Energy Corporation will undoubtedly bring some notoriety to the Sea to Sky corridor. We are already known nation- and indeed world-wide for Whistler's resort municipality and the general beauty of the area, but now we will become known as the home of the first geothermal power project in Canada's history.

The viability of the Meager Creek project, close as it is to the Lower Mainland and its power needs, stems from its location in one of the world's volcanic regions. California to the south is along the same line of "underground activity" and boasts the world's largest -- 2,200 MW -- geothermal energy project at Santa Rosa, which generates a significant portion of San Francisco's energy needs.

Canadian Crew Energy believes the

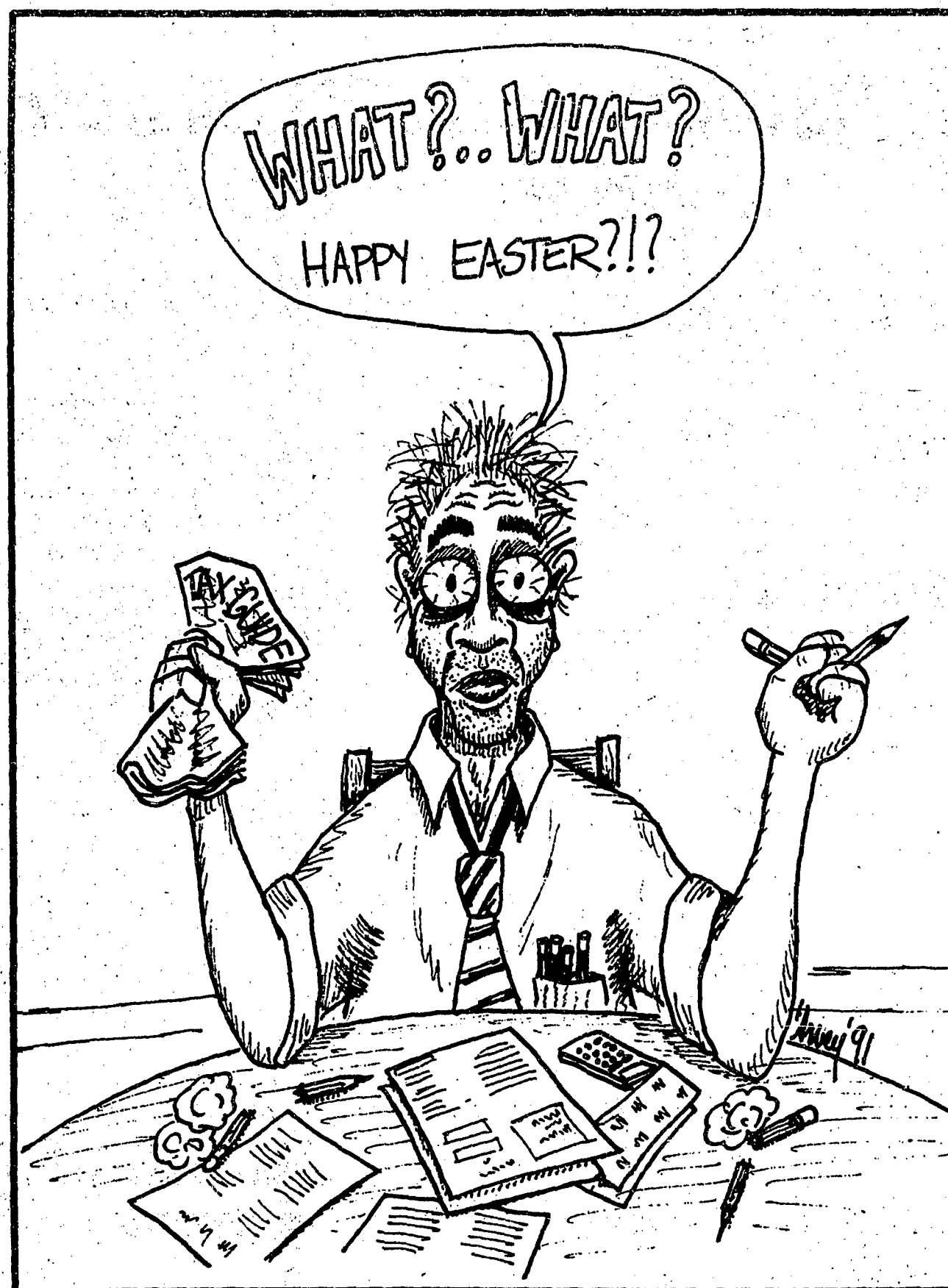
Meager Creek geothermal project will have very little environmental impact, even at its full development capacity. This is a clean, reliable resource, they say, and one which will prove itself to BC Hydro from an economic perspective.

For the people of the corridor, many of whom will meet with Canadian Crew before the project goes ahead, the project will prove itself by contributing to the economy of the corridor, providing jobs for 10 years of construction and up to 200 permanent jobs thereafter.

BC Hydro's interest in developing independent power projects is chiefly to put off developing large and costly hydroelectric facilities, which, in the end, will wound us all in the pocketbook.

There is no doubt that Hydro will accept the latest revision of the pilot project at Meager Creek, especially after 18 years of interest in the area along with a \$30 million plus investment.

In the future, as the power needs of the province increase and push us closer to having to develop "Site C" on the Peace River, Hydro will be hard pressed not to consider others areas of the province for their geothermal potential. Maximizing geothermal energy potential is better than allowing such proposals as that made for the Elaho River to go ahead, taking away valuable timber resources, and raising grave environmental and aesthetic concerns.

Many ironies in this upcoming B.C. election

It is ironic in a number of ways that Social Credit candidate Rodney Glynn-Morris claims that his greatest reason for running for his corrupt, discredited party is that it stands for "free enterprise," as he attempts to split the voting public for the coming election. Irony, first of all, in that there is often little difference in the way that Social Credit and the New Democratic Party approach most issues most of the time.

Most British Columbians believe, after all, in a mixed economy, and both parties reflect that. The NDP did not turn B.C. Tel into a public

company, and the Socreds have yet to privatize ICBC or BC Ferries. It's hard to make much of a judgment on programs such as privatized highway service because the Socreds keep all negative information secret.

his own real estate company, while Socred candidate Dr. Rodney Glynn-Morris is a civil servant, having properly gained his extensive education through a large public subsidy and is now properly making his full income in an NDP-initiated, publicly paid medicare system.

Unless the doctor is actually proposing the destruction of public education and the medicare system if he is lucky enough to be elected to a governing party, his party line mouthings of free enterprise at all costs are hypocritical.

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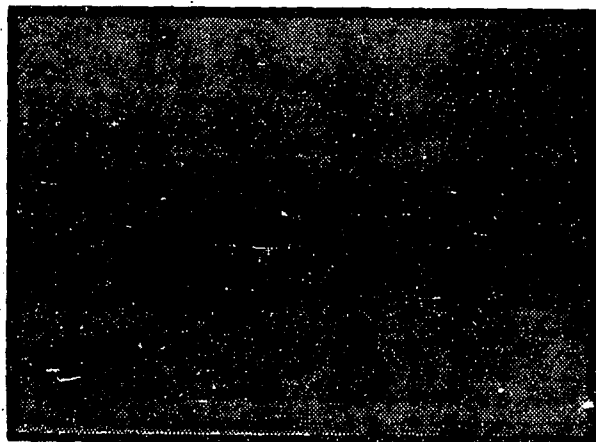
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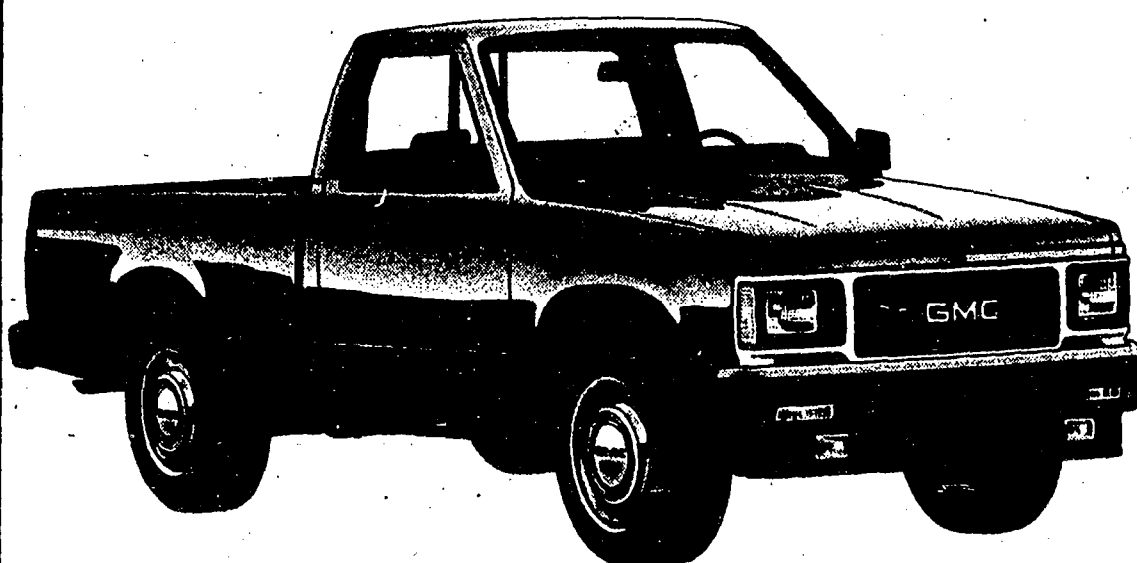
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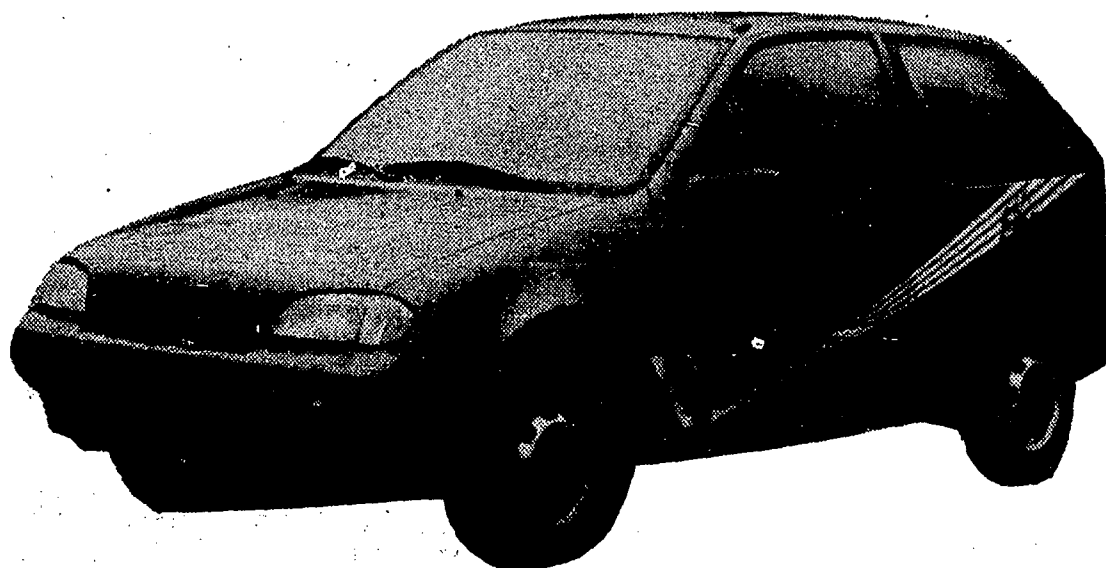

HOWE SOUNDINGS

I looked for the Cat Lovers' Cookbook and found it on the shelves, crowded in between several others, so if you are like me, appalled at the rising cost of pet food, you might find some of these tips and recipes useful. I have tried one or two and the cats seem to like them, so I guess they are as nutritious as the experts claim they are.

I find that the cats are quite finicky and even though they will really devour certain brands of cat food and certain flavours, all of a sudden they decide they don't like that one any longer and won't eat it. When that happens, Chico, the huge Siamese cat from next door, gets the benefit of their fussiness. He's a walking garbage can and will eat anything that's put before him so I never have to worry about getting rid of any leftover food.

Today's cat is a carnivore, locked into his past when he hunted for food. His fondness for animal protein reflects the inability of his liver to regulate the breakdown of amino acids. The cat's diet has always required plenty of protein and he needs vitamins such as retinol and niacin and amino acids such as arginine.

Cats do not thrive on diets designed for dogs, so if you want to cook for cats do it right and make sure that you include the four supplements in the "theme recipe." They are liver, corn oil, bone meal and iodized salt. These provide the majority of the vitamins, minerals and fatty acids that are essential in a cat's diet. Most of these recipes will make up to six portions and they can be refrigerated for up to three days.

The following theme recipe uses ground meat and rice as staples because they are the main sources of energy. The supplements are designed for convenience and to provide all of the essential nutrients not found in the staples.

Theme Recipe

2/3 cup ground meat
1/3 cup dry rice (brown or white)
2 tbsps chopped liver
1 tsp bone meal
2 tps corn oil
1/8 tsp iodized salt
1 cup water

Bring the water to a boil. Add the rice, corn oil and salt and simmer for 20 minutes on low heat. Dredge the meat with the bone meal. Add the meat and liver to the rice mixture, stir and simmer for another 15 minutes. Cool and serve. Yields three servings. Leftovers should be refrigerated or frozen.

The meat usually used in the theme recipe is hamburger with a medium fat content. Meat may be replaced by fish. Cats also love chicken, turkey, goose or duck, which can all replace meat.

Instead of rice you can use barley, potato, canned or frozen corn, or tapioca. But rice is hard to beat for cats because it can be easily digested and blends well with other foods.

Liver is needed every day, or nearly every day to provide necessary trace minerals and vitamins. It may be replaced by other organ meats such as kidney or sweetbreads; but none has the potency of liver.

One way to handle liver and to have it easily available is to freeze it as "liver ice cubes." Chop a pound of liver into

quarter-inch cubes. Divide the pile into 16 equal portions and put one portion into each of the 16 compartments of an ice cube tray. Each portion equals an ounce. Freeze the liver in the tray and pop out the liver ice cubes for defrosting as needed.

Another way to prepare liver for your cat is to cook it and then roll it between two sheets of plastic film so that it resembles a thin pancake. You can then freeze it in the plastic wrap and break off the amount you want as needed.

The easiest way to cook liver is to chop it into very small (kitty bite-size) pieces and then boil it for about 15 minutes. Be sure to drain it well.

Steamed bone meal is available in many health food stores as well as pet stores and is a good source of calcium. It can be replaced by other sources of calcium such as milk or dairy foods or green, leafy vegetables. As part of your cat's diet, calcium is not necessary every day but

should be given to them two or three times a week.

Corn oil provides vitamin E as well as essential fatty acids. It may be replaced by wheat germ oil fortified with vitamin E.

A suggestion to tempt finicky felines is to add a teaspoon or two of chicken fat to his food. Another tip is to add vegetable greens to most cat food recipes. They are high in calcium and should be finely chopped and added to the recipes. Beet greens, swiss chard, kale, mustard greens, spinach and turnip greens can be used.

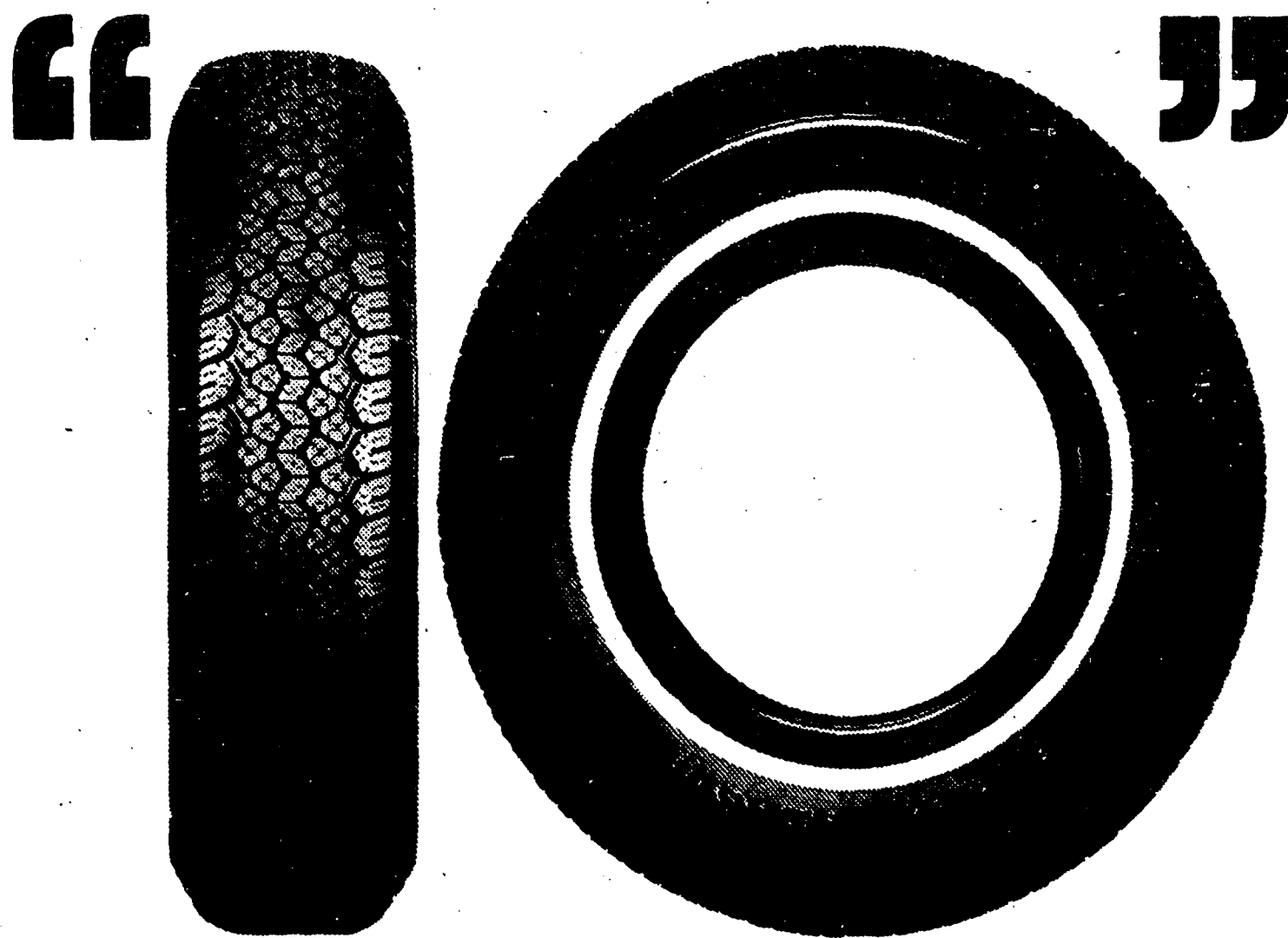
Some more cat recipes are:

Tuna Cakes

6 1/2 oz. can tuna, drained and flaked
1 small onion, finely chopped
4 slices bread, cubed into tiny pieces
1/8 tsp iodized salt
1 tsp brewers' yeast
1 tsp bone meal
2 tbsps margarine
2 eggs

Beat eggs lightly in a bowl. Add tuna, onion, bread cubes, salt, brewers' yeast and bone meal. Mix thoroughly until moistened. Form into small patties. Melt margarine in skillet and fry patties until golden brown. When cool, crumble each patty and serve. Makes 3-5 portions. Store unused portions in an airtight container and keep refrigerated.

was launched in 1989 by the Ministry of Health to provide information, assistance and funding to local groups serving the needs of seniors. It is a component of the Choosing Wellness Program, which focuses on helping seniors maintain their health and independence, and is administered by the non-profit First Seniors' Resources and Research Soci-

ety.

The Squamish Seniors' Health Drop-in is one of 33 localized seniors' health and wellness projects being funded throughout B.C. by the Ministry of Health. Last year Squamish received a grant of \$2,000 to plan, organize and operate the exciting Health Fair to be presented in the Civic Centre auditorium on Saturday, Apr. 16 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.



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Pollution in forest industry target of UBC research

Reducing pollution from pulp and saw mills in the forest industry is the goal of a new industrial chair at the University of British Columbia.

The research is expected to have immediate applications in pollution control in the forest industry, said William Oldham, head of the Department of

Civil Engineering, in a news release.

The chair -- the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council Industrial Chair in Forest Products Waste Management -- will receive \$2.6 million over five years.

The funding allows for a senior chair, two junior faculty

positions, research associates, technicians, graduate students, support staff and new equipment. Oldham said he expected the three academic positions to be filled by September.

Specific research undertaken through the chair could include ways of improving pulp bleaching and reducing the use of chlorine, which could lead to reduced dioxins in mill effluent.

Another research aim is to seek a better understanding about how currently available end-of-pipe wastewater treatment processes can be used to meet changing effluent requirements.

Other areas of research will include the treatment and clean-up procedures, in-house process changes to reduce the production of known pollutants, developing bacteria cultures that degrade specific impurities and the safe disposal of liquid and solid wastes.

The senior chair will be based in the Environmental Engineering Group within Civil Engineering. The group has become one of the largest and most complete research programs in waste management in Canada since its founding 23 years ago.

One of the junior chairs will be based in Chemical Engineering, a department that has a long-standing relationship with the pulp and paper industry. The other junior chair will be in Microbiology, where there is an established interest in applying bacteriology to waste treatment problems.

External funding for the chair will be provided by NSERC, the Council of Forest Industries, the provincial Ministry of Environment and the Science Council of B.C. The university will fund renovations to lab facilities.

Other cooperating agencies are the Wastewater Technology Centre, Environment Canada and PAPRICAN, the Pulp and Research Institute of Canada.

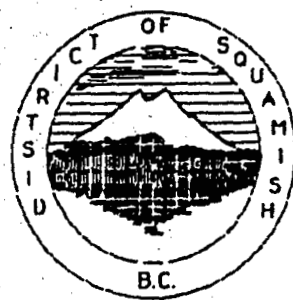

Beef and Bean Saute

1 tbsp corn oil
1 clove garlic, minced
1/2 lb. ground beef
1/3 cup green beans, chopped fine
1/2 tsp iodized salt
1/3 cup cooked rice
1 tsp liver
1/8 tsp bone meal

Heat corn oil in skillet, add garlic and saute quickly, add ground beef and cook till lightly browned. Add chopped green beans, stir and continue cooking until beans are soft. Add salt, rice, liver and bone meal and toss till well mixed. Let cool and serve. Yields 4-6 servings. Store in airtight container and keep refrigerated.

In Brackendale Elementary, during the recent open house, I watched a five-year-old, in Mrs. Bowcock's class, writing out whole sentences with great confidence, and with encouragement from Mrs. Otto. I was amazed at the skill and enthusiasm these very little people showed. In Mr. Galloway's class, the "much more mature" students in grade one were

keeping diaries of their classroom activities -- the entries for each day becoming gradually longer, as their techniques developed.

In Mr. Smith's grade six class in Myrtle Philip, students have been writing their own Haiku poetry and learning to produce it in attractive calligraphy. Some of them will be entering Japan Airlines' Haiku Contest.

On the music scene, Signal Hill will soon be acting as host to a choir from Robert's Creek on the Sunshine Coast. On Apr. 25 and 26 there will be a "Songfest," at which the visiting choir, the Signal Hill choir and the school band will be joined by the Whistler Singers for a memorable musical performance.

Parents who attended the Brackendale Open House and heard the choirs and recorder band entertaining the audience in the gym will recognize how much musical talent we have being developed here.

From culture back to purely academic concerns, it is gratifying that 30 nine-year-olds from Signal Hill will be part of a larger sample of students who will represent B.C. in the 1990-'91 International Assessment of Educational Progress. Some will be tested in math, others in science. Nineteen countries will take part, from four continents, and nine of Canada's ten provinces. The last time this study was done, B.C. came first in science and third in math -- and that makes all of us feel good.

A LIKELY STORY

There is much on the editorial pages these days -- generally couched in terms of bitter outrage -- concerning the state of the world we live in.

And so it was with a wistful backward glance that Frank Whitfield recently shared some memories of a time when it was permissible to leaven outrage with gentle good humour.

These memories are embodied in letters-to-the-editor which Frank has collected from a slower time a slower place.

The first concerns the financial practices of past government:

"My friend Bordeaux over in Saskatchewan received \$1,000 from the Canadian government this year for not raising hogs. So I am going into the not-raising-hogs business this year.

"What I want to know is, in your opinion, what's the best...kind of hogs not to raise? I would prefer not to raise razorbacks but if that's not a good breed not to raise, I will just as gladly not raise Berkshires or Durocs. The hardest work...is going to be keeping an inventory of how many hogs I have not raised.

"My friend Bordeaux...has been raising hogs for 20 years and the best he ever made was \$000 until this year when he got \$1,000 for not raising hogs. If I can get \$1,000 for not raising 50 hogs, then I will get \$2,000 for not raising 100 hogs. I plan to operate on a small scale at first, holding myself down to about 4,000 hogs which means I will have \$80,000.

"Now another thing, these hogs I will not raise will not eat 100,000 bushels of wheat. I understand that you pay farmers for not raising wheat. So will you pay me anything for not raising 100,000 bushels of wheat not to feed the hogs I am raising?

"I want to get started as soon as possible as this seems to be a good time of the year to not raise hogs."

The other letter, a commentary on the vagaries of life, has a farmer lecturing his mule as the two of them plod along the furrows of the North 40:

"Bill -- you are a mule, the son of a jackass and I am a man, made in the image of God; yet here we work hitched up together year in and year out...."

The farmer ruminates on the preparations for planting corn:

"When the crop is harvested, I give one-third to the landlord for being so kind as to let me use this small piece of God's universe, one-third goes to you and the balance is mine.

"You consume all of yours except for the cobs; I divide mine amongst seven children, 50 hens, two ducks and a banker and I ask you is it fair for a mule -- the son of a jackass -- to swindle a man -- the lord of creation -- out of his substance?

"I wonder why you only help to plow and cultivate, while I alone must cut, stook and husk the corn while you look over the pasture fence and hee-haw at me all fall and most of the winter.

"...Bill, when you are dead that's supposed to be the end of you, but me -- the parson tells me that when I die I gotta go to hell forever.

"That is, Bill, if I don't do just as he says and most of

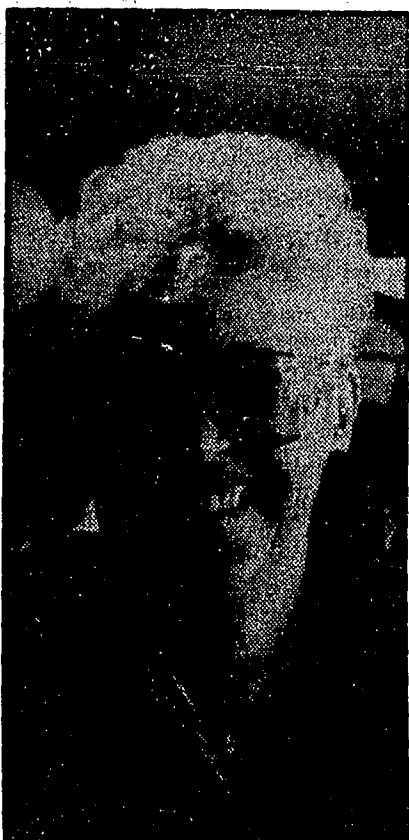

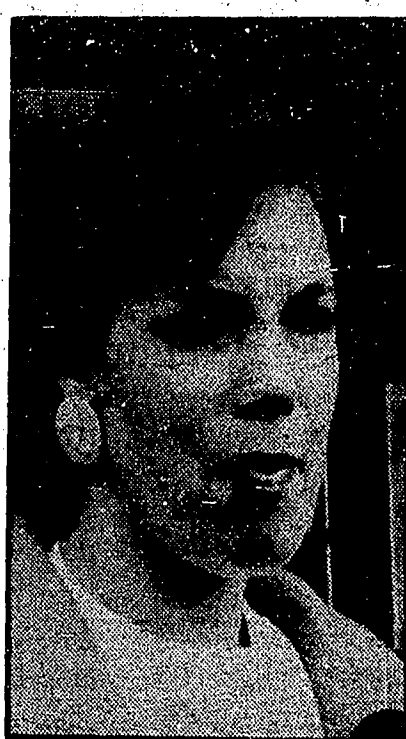
Easter Bunny, Squamish: "I think it's a good thing. But I think the most important thing, is that within himself, he feels he's done the right thing for himself and his family."

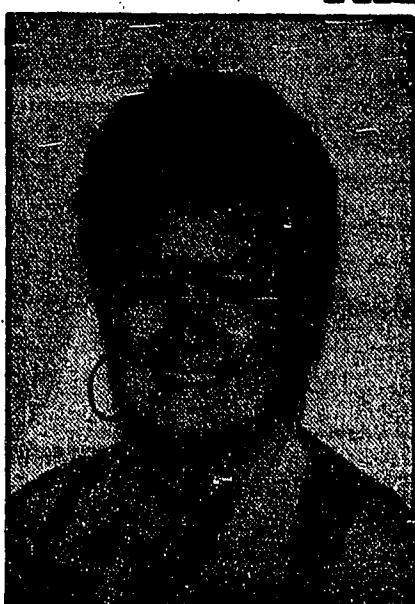

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Meager Creek geothermal energy project proposal resubmitted to BC Hydro

While the heat of the earth continues to bubble molten rock lying far below the surface at Meager Creek, plans to harness this geothermal energy resource grow closer to realization.

Canadian Crew Energy Corporation (CCEC) is in the process of revising its proposal for a geothermal energy pilot project for resubmission to BC

Hydro.

The public company was the only one to answer BC Hydro's call for independent geothermal proposals in November 1990, but its 30 MW demonstration plant, together with two additional 30 MW increments, was beyond Hydro's requirements for a pilot project, CCEC secretary and director Gerald Wright

told The Times Mar. 26.

With the new submission for a scaled-down pilot project

geothermal energy project, with potential to generate 260 MW of electricity -- or enough to supply the energy needs of a

community of 250,000.

The Meager Creek project has been developed to its present stage over the last 18 years, at a cost of \$34 million.

After an extensive inventory in the '70s of geothermal energy potential in the province, Wright said, Meager Creek was identified as the most economically viable site for development.

BC Hydro had succeeded in taking the exploration project to an advanced stage before the recession hit in the early 1980s, but demand for electricity declined, and work was stopped on the project. At the time, BC Hydro and Energy, Mines and Resources Canada had invested some 80,000 feet of diamond drilling, together

The geothermal resource: harnessing the power beneath the earth's crust

Canadian Crew Energy Corporation is preparing to harness the geothermal energy potential beneath the surface at Meager Creek to supply electricity to the Lower Mainland through BC Hydro.

But what is geothermal energy and why is it considered an environmentally benign, economical and renewable source of energy?

Simply stated, geothermal energy is the heat energy trapped in rocks and fluids beneath the earth's crust. Natural steam can be found where reservoirs of water are located in volcanic fractures and porous rock. As water flows underground and comes in close contact with the earth's magma, it is heated to over 200 degrees Celsius. Heated water

then rises to the top of the subsurface reservoir where it can be tapped as natural steam energy. Natural steam is a renewable, reliable resource to the extent that it originates with naturally replenished groundwater.

Hydrothermal is the most abundant of the various types of geothermal resources and may be commercially developed to produce cost-competitive electricity. By drilling boreholes into shallow hydrothermal reservoirs, steam and hot water can be brought to the surface and used to generate electricity.

Worldwide, high-temperature hydrothermal resources are most commonly found in volcanic re-

gions (such as Meager Creek), and major power development has occurred in the United States, Mexico, Central America, the Philippines, New Zealand, Japan, Indonesia and Italy.

In terms of reliability, geothermal power plants are extremely efficient, available for use as much as 95-100 per cent of the time. Geothermal energy is not affected by fluctuations in air temperature or light, which hampers other renewable energy sources.

Best of all, geothermal power emits comparatively few pollutants, and far less carbon per unit of energy produced than the fossil fuels it replaces. Carbon emissions from geothermal operations are minimal.

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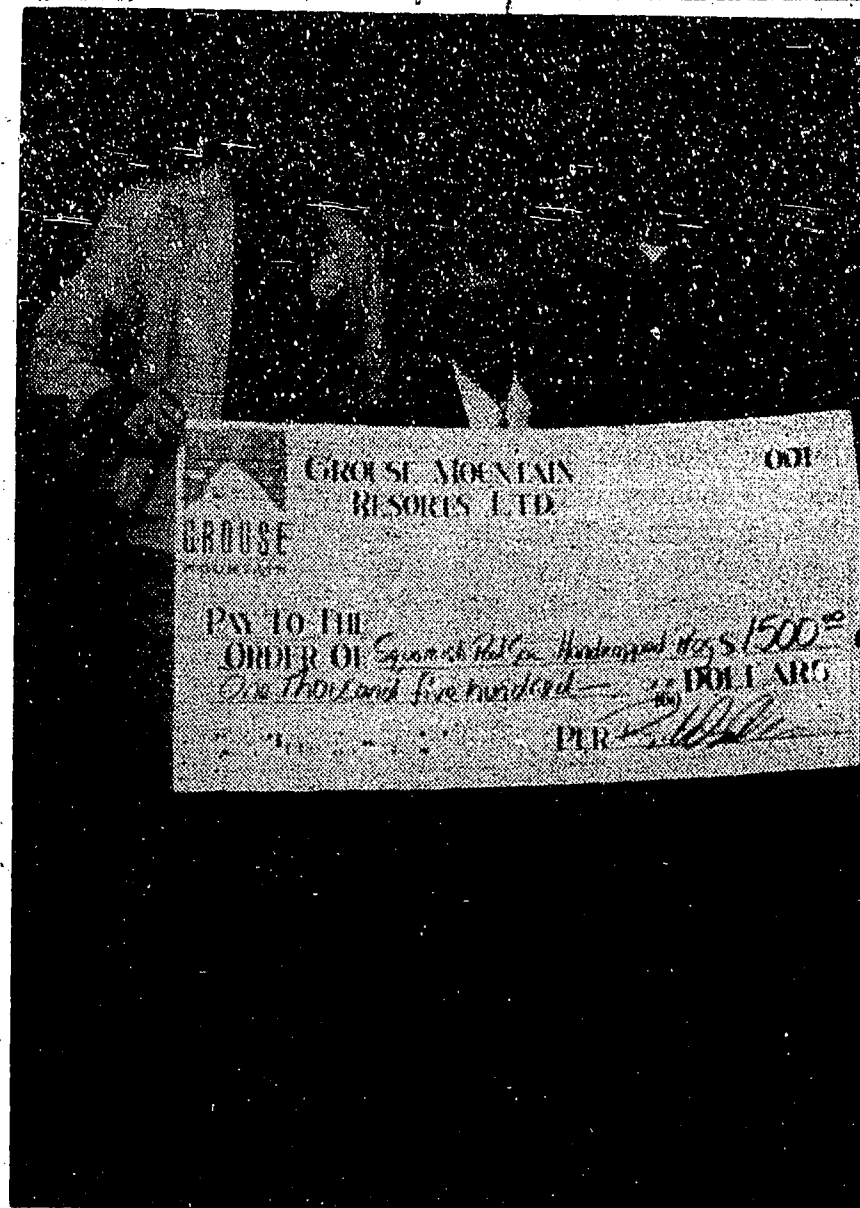
Tug-of-war winners donate \$1,500 to pool

with environmental, geological, fisheries, engineering and other related studies for the project.

In addition, three deep exploration and production wells were drilled to depths of 3,000-3,500 metres, where bottom hole temperatures reach 230-270 degrees Celsius.

Some \$500 million will be required over the next eight years to bring the development up to full operation, Wright said. When the resource is fully developed, gross power sales are expected to exceed \$200 million annually.

Wright said worldwide growth of the geothermal energy industry has been apace with concern for environmental protection. An "environmentally friendly," renewable resource, geothermal energy exacts far less a price in terms of impact on the environment than other sources of energy.

Currently, he said, Canada is the only Pacific Rim country not harnessing its geothermal resource. "We have a tremendous untapped potential."

Although unique in Canada, geothermal energy has been used to generate electricity in many countries throughout the world since 1904, when the first geothermal project commenced in Italy. Worldwide,

electricity is now being generated from geothermal energy at over 230 power plants in 18 countries on six continents.

In the U.S.A. alone, geothermal electrical power capacity has grown from 78 megawatts in 1968 to more than 2,200 megawatts by 1989. These plants, mainly in California, provide enough electricity for three million households.

The Meager Creek project would have a significant impact on the Sea to Sky corridor, Wright said, with a potential to employ up to 200 permanent people with 600 jobs created indirectly.

In addition, the project would require about 1,800 man years of construction employment over a ten-year period.

"If we start this year we anticipate we could be generating

power by the early part of 1995," Wright said.

If Canadian Crew Energy's resubmitted proposal gains Hydro support, he said, the company will work on "final resource definition" at Meager Creek this summer, with drilling of production wells.

Company president John Darch, along with Wright, met with the Whistler Chamber of Commerce recently, and will meet with the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District board before long, Wright said.

"We find there's quite a lot of benefit in talking to people about it."

Wright added he wanted to clear up one concern that people in the corridor have regarding his company's proposal. The project, which would utilize 20-25 acres in the long-term, comes nowhere

near the popular Meager Creek hot springs.

Other than this concern, he said, there has been "very, very little negative comment" on the hydrothermal energy project.

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Empire Logging's five-year plan challenges forest industry's negative image

The toppling of old growth stands two to three hundred years old, and the scabbing and burning of the forest floor are

part of the forest industry's image that critics paint. But the level of planning presently going on at

Weldwood's Empire Logging Division illustrates just how hard the industry is trying to challenge those common perceptions.

"We're not rapers and pillagers of the forests. We're farmers. We just have a longer crop rotation than the fellow growing wheat down the street," said Dave Miller, Empire Logging manager.

The company is presently formalizing its five-year plan that will begin in 1992, based on an annual allowable cut for the license of 263,000 cubic metres -- minus five percent for the Forest Ministry's small business program.

"The process of planning begins a long time before you cut the tree down. We've got working plans that are done for every five years. And we have a 20-year harvesting plan," said Miller.

The Squamish logging company's operations develop from a working plan and then a developing plan. A cutting permit is then required from the ministry before Weldwood can begin felling trees in any

given block.

"We're outlining basic management objectives for five years. This is a commitment we have to the ministries of Forests...Environment,

Fisheries and Oceans...and special interest groups," said Charlie Deminger, operation forester engineer, who has 22 years experience in the industry.

The extensive planning process establishes prescriptions for the harvesting of individual cutting

down to 74 percent of the company's allowable cut in order to meet the five-year quota requirement.

Empire will take 67,000 cubic metres of the timber cut from forests in Thompson Sound, with crews staying at camp in the area for the second summer in a row.

said Dave Guilbride, an Empire Logging engineer.

Guilbride said up until the late 1970s the industry burnt for pre-silviculture preparation in almost every situation but now the company no longer prescribes burning in highly sensitive areas.

Weldwood burns harvested blocks because of the fire hazard posed by debris left in the area, to clear heavy debris for reforestation, and to control disease and bug infestation in very old decadent stands.

Sensitive areas are described as those areas where only a thin layer of duff on top of a rocky terrain exists. There is then a danger that the burn could literally strip the rocks bare, affecting drainage and reforestation potential.

Those blocks situated in areas where there are short growing seasons are also considered sensitive to burning because natural regeneration is counted on for reforestation. Burning the block would destroy the small residual natural trees required for natural regeneration.

"Burns can tend to be a little deeper sometimes, and in some cases, especially rocky areas, you can burn off a little too much of the rooting layer," said Guilbride.

"But we've had good success with spring burns, lately. They can work quite well in the right application," he said.

Miller is quick to point out that properly cared for clearcut blocks can green over fairly quickly despite opposition to the company's forestry methods.

On a satellite photo of the Soo TSA he points out clearcut blocks that are showing signs of reforestation.

Over the last decade forest industry practices have become more and more regulated as operations are increasingly placed under the media spotlight, and under public scrutiny.

Deminger said this year the company must now pay stumpage fees on alder trees and harvesting waste.

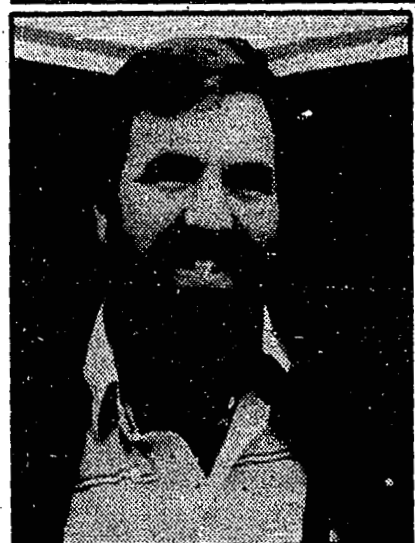

blocks, outlining where and when felling should occur.

Planning is reassessed every year for the next five-year term and is reviewed by the ministry and interested federal agencies -- public input is also accepted.

Through the review process government officials have an opportunity to regulate forestry practices and identify sensitive areas of animal habitat and spawning grounds. And Empire responds by suggesting ways of addressing concerns.

In 1990 Weldwood logged 189,000 cubic metres on 398 hectares. And in 1991, 194,000 cubic metres will be harvested

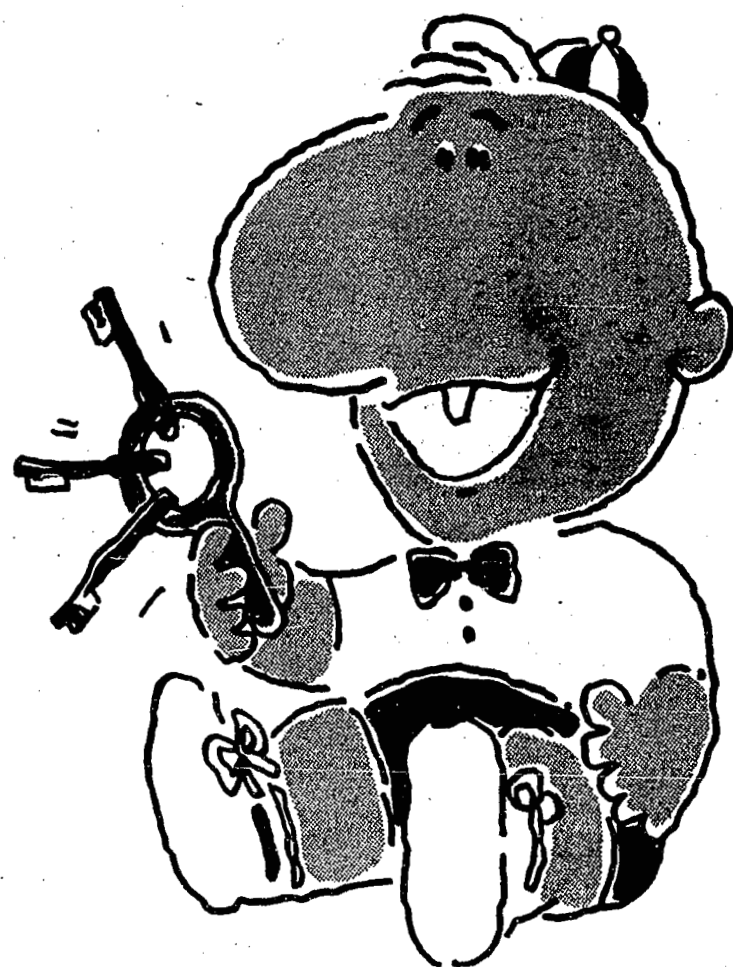
"The Thompson Sound camp works out good for our people because we get to use most of our crews," said Deminger. "Every company tries to get the good workers, so [the Thompson Sound camp] keeps the crews busy with us."

All harvesting methods are established well in advance, as are silviculture operations and site preparation for tree planting.

"At this stage in the planning process we decide whether or not to burn for the pre-silviculture prescription. And in some cases that's amended after we've logged the block,"

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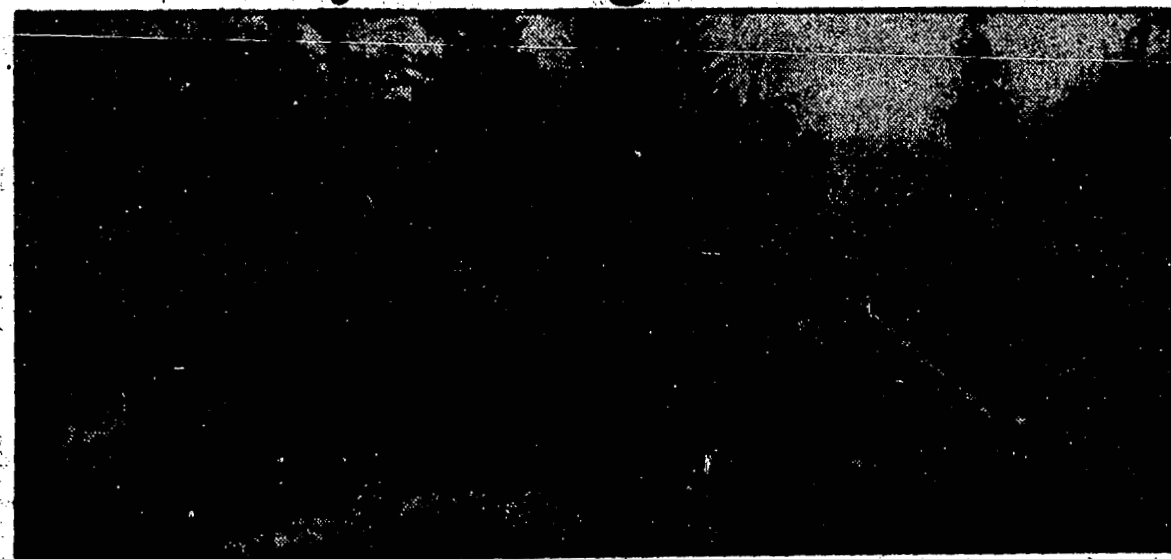


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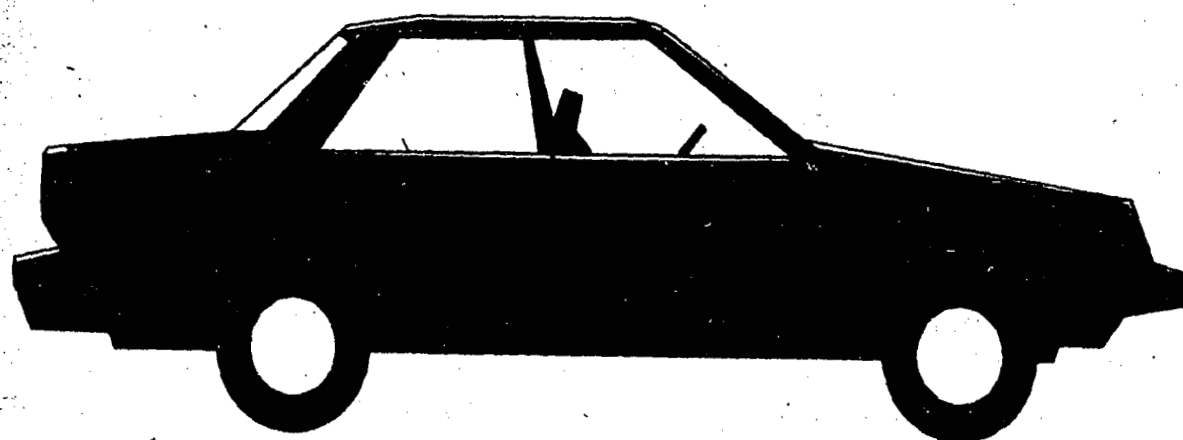

SGH co-workers honour Salinder Biln

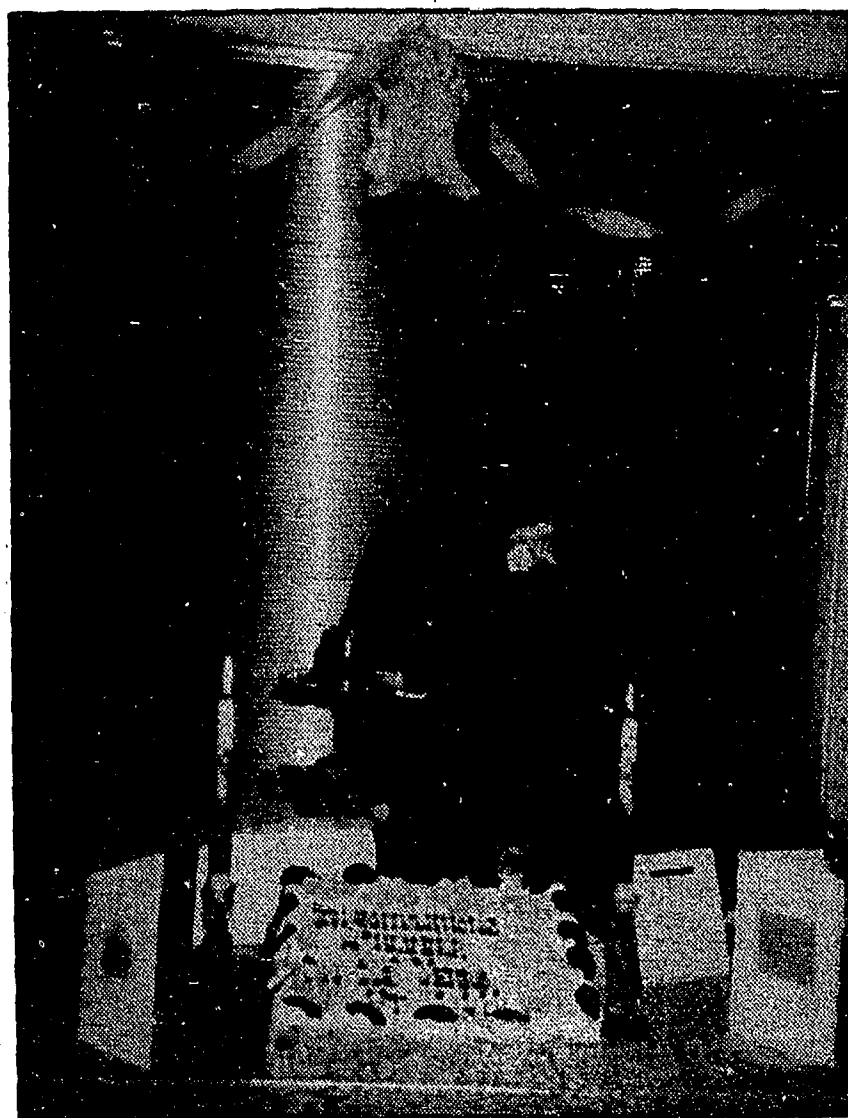

Women in timber

The local chapter of Canadian Women in Timber (CWIT) is becoming involved with local concerns and is looking for input and help from the community.

"We have the option of taking it out of the block or leaving it there. But either way we still have to pay stumpage fees on it," he said.

"We sell them for either pulp

or saw logs but you don't get much money for them. If you're close to a manufacturing plant, or you can log and transport the alder cheaply, then I guess it's worth it," said Deminger.

He said there aren't many

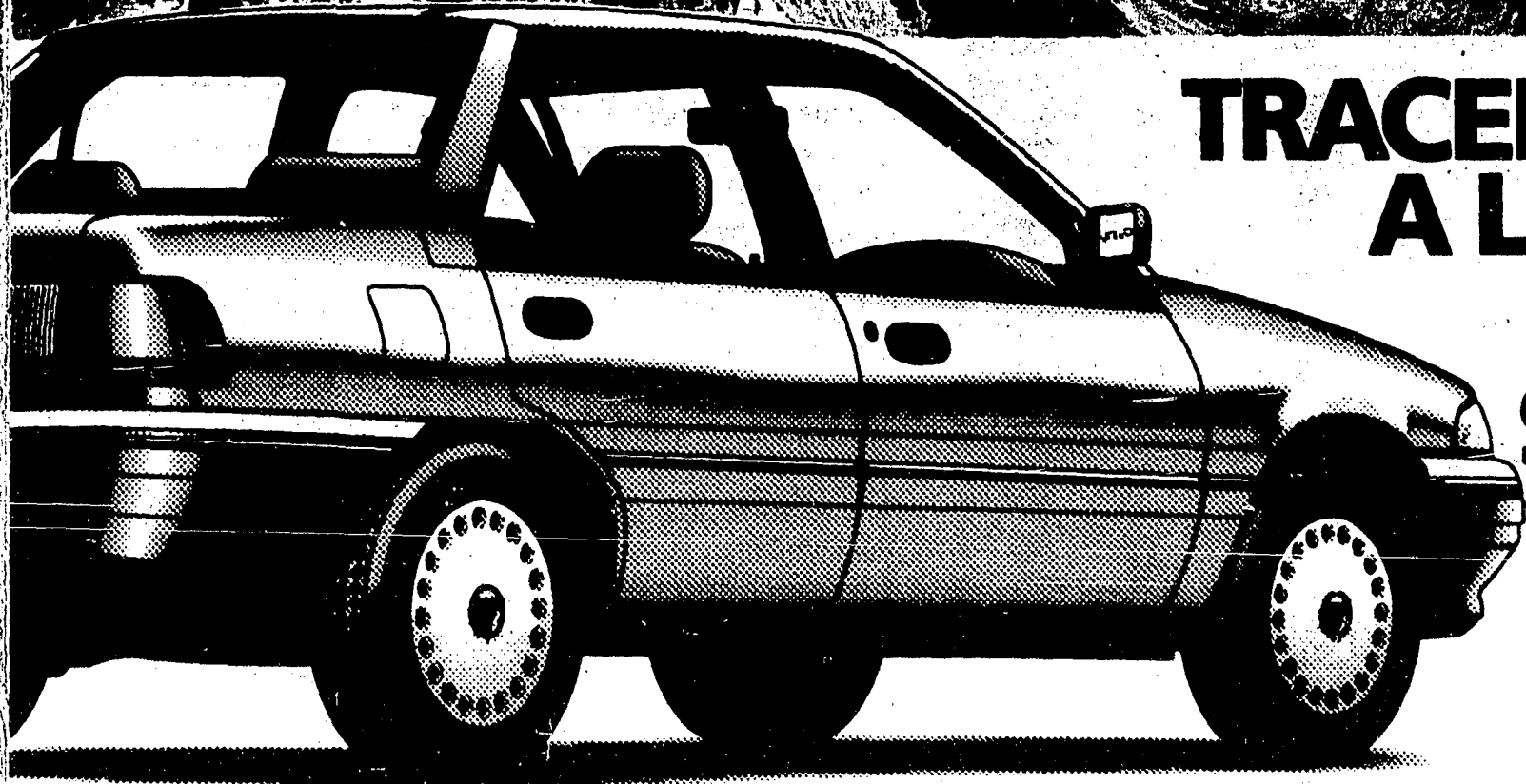
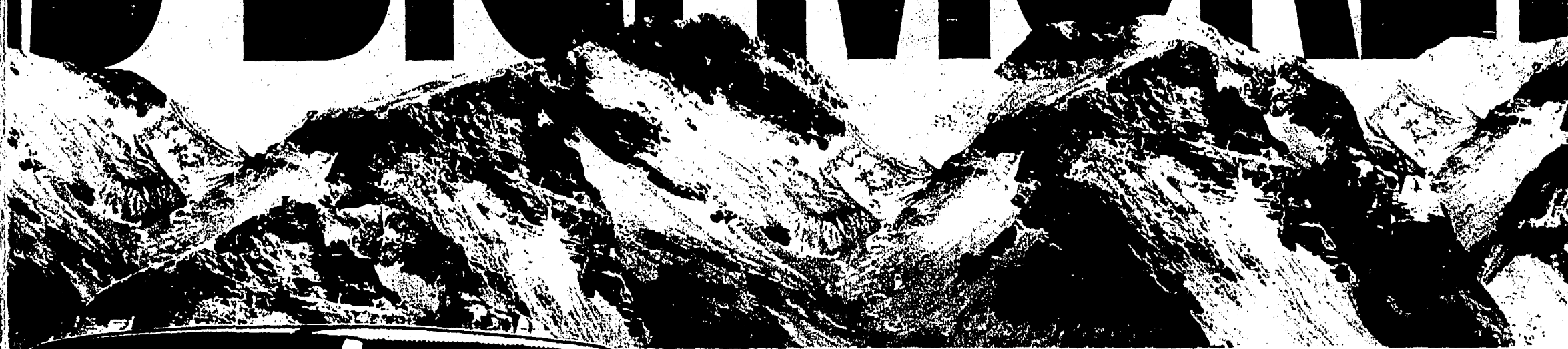
alder trees around and it has to be worth your while to log them and transport them -- enough to fill a boom or a small section of a boom.

A lot of what will eventually go on in a block is established through the planning process

and is reviewed by the ministry of forests.

The final step is the two-year cutting permit application which finally allows the company to go into a strictly defined area and cut.

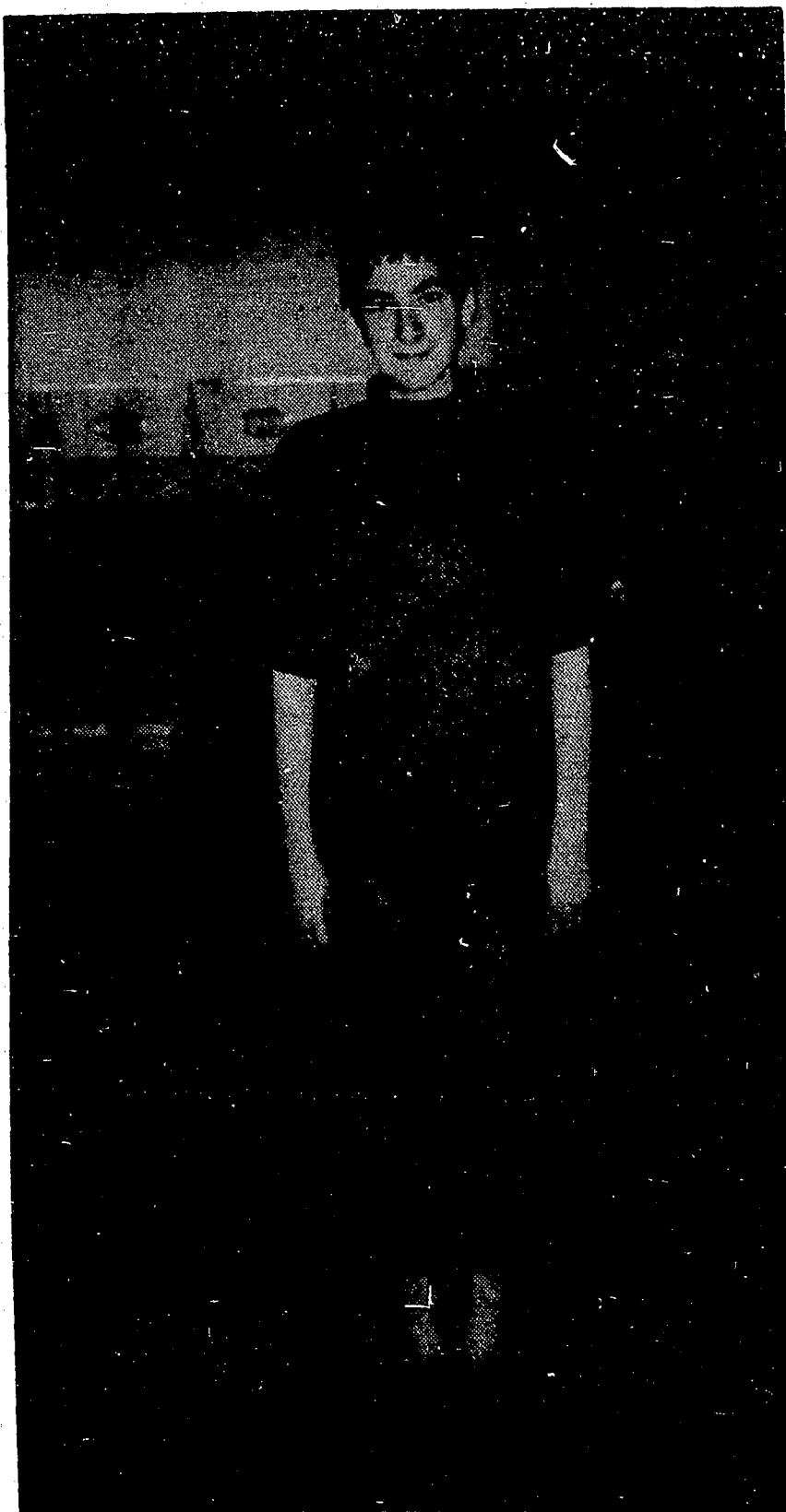

On-water activities will include beginner, intermediate and advanced strokes and rescue and rolling.

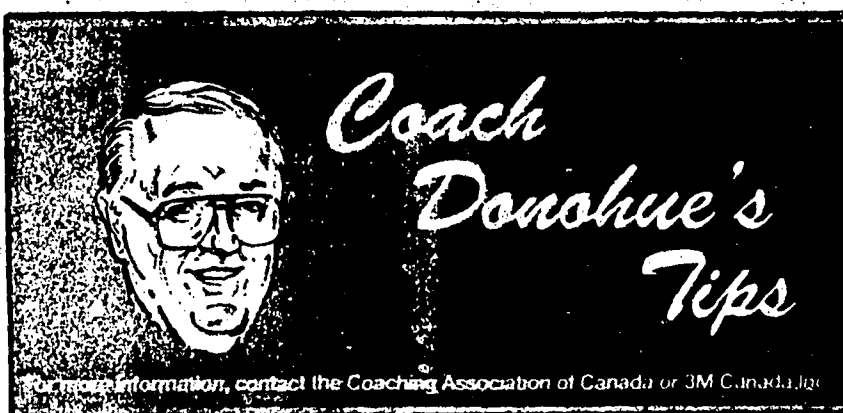
In addition, there will also be "The World's Greatest Cardboard Kayak Race", kayak polo games and an obstacle race, boat try-outs and children's events.

Coach Donahue's Tips

Jack Donahue was the guest speaker at a Rotary fundraiser and coaches' appreciation night over a year ago.

This is the first in a series of articles by Donahue, who was Canada's Olympic basketball coach from 1972-'88, and a nationally recognized expert on coaching.

Fair Play

As a coach, you are one of the most influential persons in a child's life.

When I speak to coaches I tell them, "As a coach, you've got to help young people become all they were created to be. Your job is to produce good athletes, but more importantly, good people."

One of your greatest responsibilities is to develop your athletes' sense of fair play. Fair play embodies the principles of integrity, fairness, respect. Fair Play emphasizes the following:

- * respecting the rules of the game
- * respecting officials and accepting their decisions
- * maintaining dignity under all circumstances
- These principles apply in all circumstances, and they apply to everyone in sport - athletes, coaches, officials, parents, spectators.
- As a coach, your fair play aims should be to:
- * behave the way you want your athletes and the spectators to behave
- * respect both the letter and the spirit of the game
- * help your athletes understand the reasons for rules and appreciate the job that officials do
- * teach your athletes to value opponents, because without them there would be no competition
- * teach your athletes to lose with dignity
- * emphasize that doing one's best is more important than winning
- * help each of your athletes equally
- * keep the fun in sport

The athletic skills your athletes learn from you may be used only for a few years. The attitudes they develop towards themselves and others will last a lifetime.

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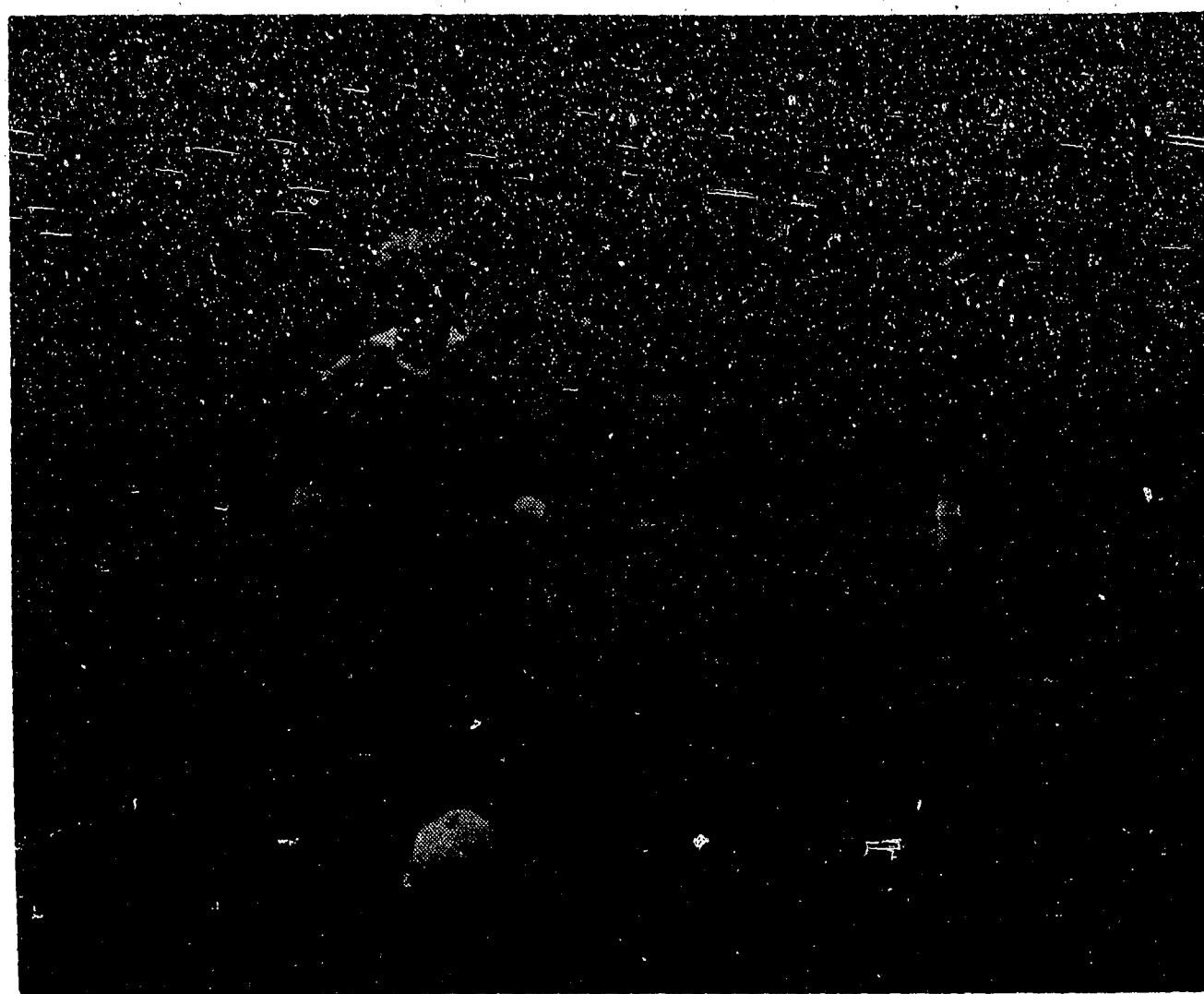

School system needs gender equity policy, report says

Gender equity is lacking in the Howe Sound School District, according to a report released to school board trustees.

According to the findings of the district's gender equity committee, a predominance of males exist in administrative positions.

The report goes on to say, however, that because many gender equity problems are caused by society at large, solutions must be limited to equal opportunity policies that protect people seeking administrative positions.

Committee member Phyllis Pritchard said the committee

would like to see Howe Sound join other school districts in becoming an equal opportunity employer.

The report was commissioned

by school district superintendent Trevor Harris in the fall of 1990.

On Wednesday Harris reminded the board that at the time there was 'tremendous' interest in gender equity and that the issue is an important one.

Recommendations made to the board include ensuring all

hiring committees include males and females, and gender representation be sought in all district planning committees.

The report also identifies gender bias in teaching materials and teaching practices. "Research indicates that these are common sources of bias in almost every school system."

The committee asked the board to form a committee addressing gender bias in teaching practices and resource materials.

School trustees received the report and forwarded the recommendation to the administrator so an action policy can be developed.

Try unusual vegetables in winter dishes

Many people don't use vegetables as much in winter, except for the common types available at this time of year, yet a different vegetable can add an entirely new flavour to an otherwise bland meal. Try red cabbage for a change or sweet red, green and yellow peppers or even some unusual mushrooms and Chinese cabbage. These recipes will add a different taste and texture to your meal.

Pork with Sweet Peppers

1/4 cup all purpose flour
1/4 tsp salt
1/4 tsp dried whole basil
1/8 tsp pepper
1 pound pork medallions
Vegetable cooking spray
1 tsp vegetable cooking oil
Small sweet red pepper, sliced
Small sweet yellow pepper, sliced
Small sweet green pepper, sliced
2 tps minced shallot
1/3 cup dry white vermouth
1 tsp cornstarch
1/2 tsp dried sage

Combine first four ingredients in small bowl, mix well. Dredge pork in flour mixture. Cook in large skillet with cooking spray; add oil and place over medium high heat till hot. Add pork and cook two minutes on each side till brown. Transfer to a serving dish.

Wipe skillet with a paper towel, coat with cooking spray and place over medium heat till hot. Add peppers and shallots, cook, stirring frequently until tender-crisp. Add vermouth, cornstarch and sage to skillet and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and cook just enough till thickened. Spoon over pork.

Dilled Chicken and Red Cabbage

4 cups finely shredded red cabbage
1 tbsp vinegar
Vegetable cooking spray
4 (4-ounce) skinned, boned chicken breast halves
1 tsp margarine
1 cup skim milk
1 tsp cornstarch
*1 tsp minced fresh dillweed
1/2 tsp chicken flavoured bouillon granules
fresh dill sprigs (optional)
(*I have used dried dill in this recipe)

Combine cabbage and vinegar in medium bowl, toss gently to coat. Place in a shallow two-quart casserol coated with cooking spray. Arrange chicken over cabbage with chicken portions at outside of dish. Cover with heavy duty plastic wrap, vent one corner; microwave at high eight minutes giving dish a half turn after four minutes. Let stand five minutes, covered.

Melt margarine in a two-cup glass measure, add milk, cornstarch, dillweed and bouillon granules, stir well. Microwave on high three to four minutes or until thickened, stirring after two minutes. Serve sauce over chicken, garnish with dill sprigs if desired.

Veal and Vegetable Stir Fry

1 pound boneless veal
1/3 cup dry sherry
1/4 cup hoisin sauce
1 tbsp grated ginger root
1 clove garlic, minced
Non-stick spray coating
1/2 pound baby carrots
2 cups fresh pea pods, halved
1 tbsp cooking oil
1 tsp cornstarch
15-oz. can oyster or shitake mushrooms, drained and cut up
2 cups shredded bok choy or cabbage, cut up

Bias slice veal into strips. Combine sherry, 1/2 cup water, hoisin, ginger and garlic, pour over veal in a bowl. Marinate 15 minutes. Cook carrots, covered in boiling water for five minutes. Drain.

Drain veal, reserving marinade. Spray pan or wok with vegetable spray. Pre-heat over high heat. Add carrots, stir fry two minutes. Add pea pods, stir fry two minutes. Remove all vegetables. Add oil to pan. Stir fry veal, half at a time, in hot oil for 2-3 minutes. Return all veal to wok, push from centre. Stir corn starch into marinade, add to centre of pan. Cook and stir till bubbly. Return vegetables to pan; add mushrooms. Cook one minute. Serve over hot rice.

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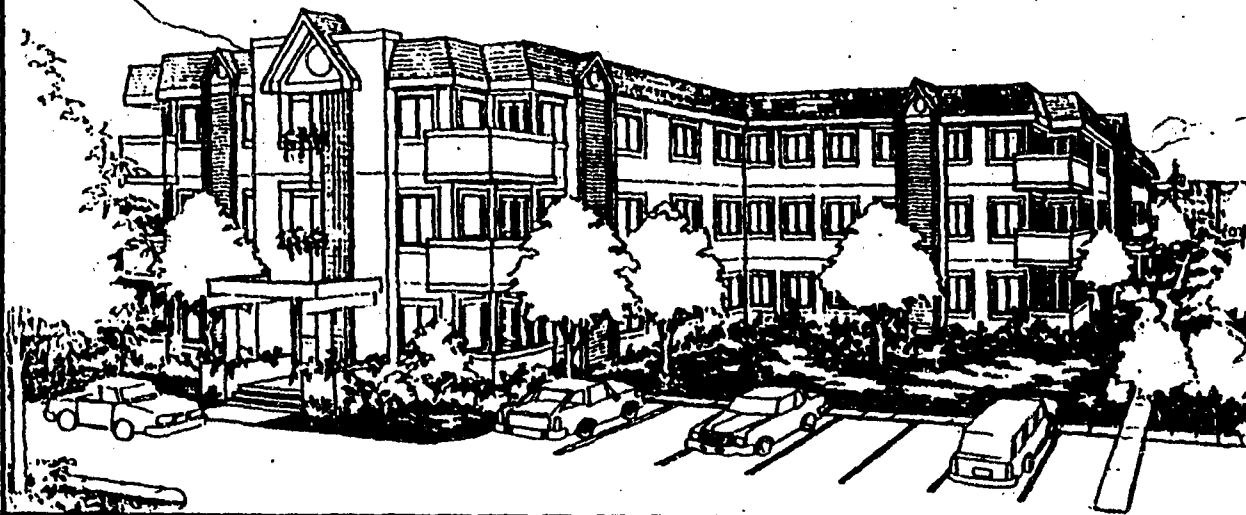

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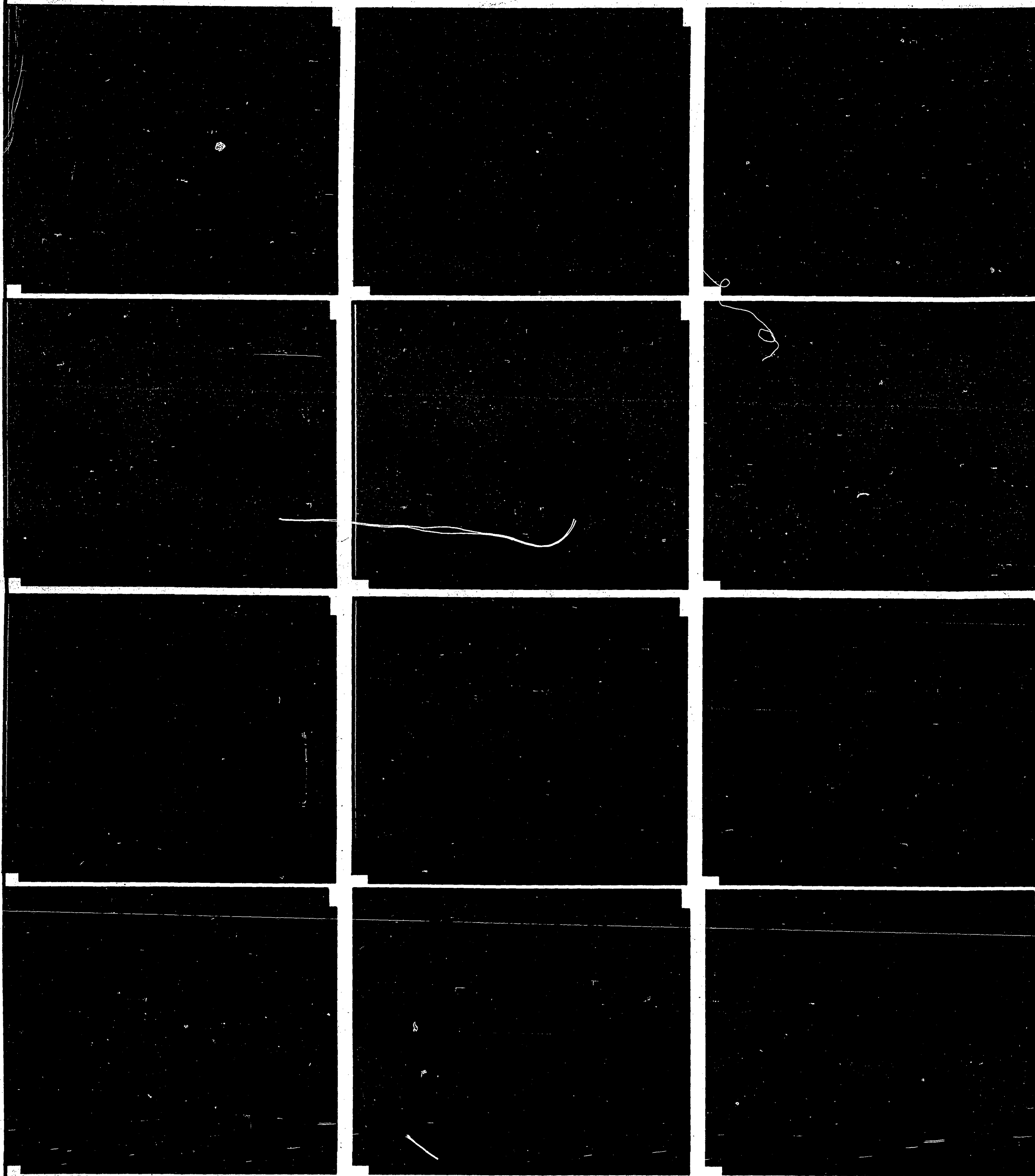
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
