When Squamish voters go to the polls for the provincial general election on Oct. 17, hey wil have a full slate of candidates to choose from In the time period since the last provincial election in 1986 the electoral boundaries have bsen redrawn and Squamish now finds itself in the middle of the new riding of West Van couver-Garibaldi. This new constituency extends noth from 22nd Stucet in West Vancouver to encompass the communities of Whister, Pemberton and Squamish.
With no incumbent MLA running in the riding, at least four parties plan to enter candidates in the race. Two candidates have party affiliation already confirmed while two others will be named or ratified by their respective parties by the end of Seprember.
To atte, the two men vying to become the first MLA for West Vancouver-Garibaldi are Bria Gies, a Squamish realor rumning under the banner of the New Democratic Party and Phillip Millerd, a fish plant manager from Lion's Bay rep resenting the Green Paty.
Giles is no stranger to voters in Squamish after serving as an alderman for the District of Squamish from 1987 to 1990 He is running on a triple " E " platform, promising a stronger economy linked to manufacturing in commumities, a healthier environment through the clean-up of Howe Sound, and a healthy equity developed through fair treatment of heaith and education needs.
A self-described pragmatic idealist, Millerd said the Green Party represents a different approach to politics. "The Greens will do it a different way than the other parties. We have different views than the other parties and we will have a different campaign. The different view is the Green View."
Rodney Glymn-Morris, a West Vancouver doctor, secured the Socisl Credit nomination for the new riding over five contenders at a constituency meeting on Sept. 12, 1990. Under Social Credit Party rules, however, if an election has not be calided must be reconfirmed at a meeting of their respective
consituency association. Fo Glym-Morris, such a meeting will not take place until Sept 30.

Glym-Morris said he is committed to a life in politics and has already taken steps to ward making it a full-time occupation. "I have worked in West Vancouver for about 10 years and for the last six months 1 have purposely worked in Squamish and Pem berton," he said.
II sold my [medical] practice in December because I am se rous about politics and I felt the best way to leam about the riding was to work in differen parts of it."
Buoyed by 1986 election re sults' which show West Van-couver-Garibaldi to have the largest concentration of Liberal voters in B.C. the provincia Liberal party will be fielding a candidate in the riding.

At press time, only one can didate had filed papers seeking the nomination. David Mitchell, a writer from West Vancouver has secured the support of several prominent Liberals and will seek the nomination at a meeting Wednesday night at Hillside Secondary School in West Vancouver.
Should he secure the nomination, Mitchell said he believes Squamish will be a key part of his campaign.
"Squamish is a priority area," Mitchell said. "Squamish has some very identifiable concems which are different from the rest of the riding. I really think a common-sense Liberal approach will have a lot of appeal in Squamish."
All three mainstream parties plan to open campaign offices in Squamish, while the Green Party candidate said his party does not have the resources to open an office here.

## Cold feet for hotel backers

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## Mixed messages at Britannia <br> By Michael Booth

Copper Beach Estates' move of 12 trailers from their current sites alongside Britannia Creek will proceed as planned after an emergency meeting of Britannia Beach residents last Wednesday.
Despite concerns over property values and moving costs, Copper Beach Estates spokesman Hugh MacDonald said the people now accept the move to a new site in a trailer park high above the creek.
"A lot of the differences were taken care of amongst themselves," MacDonald said. They realize that if they stay down there, who would ever buy their property knowing it is situated in a flood plain? We just want to get it done and get people settled in."
MacDonald, a consultant for Copper Beach Estates, said his company would absorb the costs of moving the trailers. He said the company was paying for the moves and would also pay for replacing each trailer's skitting except those who suffered damage in the recent flooding.
People who received money from the Provincial Emergency Program for damage to their trailers would have to pay for new skirting themselves.
MacDonald's message of harmony was not ecloed by everyone in the community.
Ralph Fulber, president of the Britannia Beach Community Association said Copper Beach Estates was negligent in allowing trailers along the north shore of the creek to begin with, and is now moving the trailers to avoid potential litigation in the event of a future flood.
'At least four trailers were moved into the area atter the Thurber Report [1983] was presented, labelling the north shore of the creek as a high risk area to flooding; ${ }^{n}$ Fulber said. "And there will be more debris torrents in the future when the rains come due to logging on the south slope of the creek's watershed."
Although it was feared the current residents of the higher trailer park might resent the presence of the trailers from below, the meeting Wednesday proved that worry may have been unfounded.
At the meeting everyone had pretty much calmed

down, the shock had eased? said Britannia Beach Community Association vice-president Ron Fulber. "We had people who own traiters at the new site welcoming those with railers coming up.
There was concem about property values. All the people in the upper site have new trailers while those down by the creek were mainly older trailers. Some people were afraid property values would decrease with old trailers mixed in with the new:"
At issue for most of the residents of the upper trailer park was not the people from the lower site or their trailers. Instead, most people in the upper site are upset because they paid up to $\$ 10,000$ above market value
for their homes on the grounds that only new trailers be accepted onto the site
While Copper Beach Estates maintains the residents are happy to be movifg to a new site, most appear resigned to their fate.
"I like it down here, it's quiet and I've got good neighbours," said Carl Jensen, owner of a double-wide trailer on the lower site. II don't like the idea of going up there but it was a case of either going where they want us to move or they would evict us."
Four trailers have been moved so far with eight other moves expected to be completed within two weeks.

The Squamish CrimeStoppers program was launched last Tuesday at a luncheon meeting of the Chamber of Commerce.

Bruce McArthur, chaiman of Squamish. CrimeStoppers' board of directors, invited businesspeople gathered at the Wagon Wheel Restaurant to get involved in the program. McArthur said the first step in the local program will be educaling people on how it works.

The CrimeStoppers program got its start in Squamish in 1989 when the District of Squamish formed the Vandalism Attick Committee. This group looked for solutions to the problem of vandalism in the community - which cost taxpayess $\$ 25,000$ in 1989-90. In Pebruary this year a form on CrimeStoppers was held, with speakers from the Gretiter

Vencouver program. A board of directors for the local pro gram was formed soon after. Those attending the forum heard some amazing statistics. Remulting from useful tips to Vancouver CrimeStoppers last year, a total of 1,574 files were sent out to officers; 346 arrests were made; $\$ 2.6$ million in tolen property was recovered and $\$ 1.8$ million in drugs cized; and 676 criminal case cleared.

## Vandalism the first target

With the launch of the program in the community, Squamish CrimeStoppers will present a Crime of the Week, providing details of a case which may aid Squamish RCMP in solving a crime.
This week Crimestoppers urges anyone with information on specific acts of vandalism in the community to call 892-TIPS. Remember, all calls are anonymous and can lead to cash awards once culprits have been arrested or the case otherwise solved.
Corp. Wally Petrysnen of the Squamish RCMP is the police liasion with the CrimeStoppers board of directors. He provides the information for the Crime of the

Week to local media and informs the board if any tips have resulted in arrests or other leads.
One target of vandalism that concerns all taxpayers is municipal property. District works superintendent John Payne urges anyone with information on vandalism to public property to call the 892 -TIPS line.
Frequent targets of vandals include street signs, trees, shrubs and public gardens (particulary on Block 19 by the pavilion), playground equipment and the cemetary. Break-ins have occured at the public works yard end sewage treatment plant, Payne said, and flags have been stolen from atop municipal hall.

An "extraordinary number" of counterfeit Canadian $\$ 100$ bills have been passed in the Lower Mainland and Squamish, the local RCMP say.
All counterfeit $\$ 100$ bills discovered by police have held serial numbers starting with "AJ". More speclically, they bear the following serial numbers: AJD6410597, AJL9129917, AJL9131408, AJLO196449, AJM0225435, AJM0225435, AJM266963.

RCMP Sgt. Rod Derouin said the bills are not easy to detect, but "look a little washed -- the colours are not quite right: .
All of the connterfeit $\$ 100$ bilis resemble those issued before the hologram symbol was added.

## Three-way race

The Liberals were correct in predicting a close three-way race in West-Vancouver Garibaldi, once their candidate is ready to do battle next Wednesday.
The addition of the Liberal candidate to the slate will provide an even more interesting race in the new riding, whose 33,000 people are configured quite differently than the last time British Columbians went to the polls.
The two candidates named over a year ago have had some interesting debates on these pages -- drawn out by the headscratching comments of one of our columnists. They were put on the spot more than once long before the election loomed - and all of them can expect this in an even spicier version over the next three weeks.
The NDP's Brian Giles and Socred's Dr. Rodney Glynn-Morris should by now -- after a year in the spotight -- be familiar with what matters to people in this riding. While the Vancouver Province predicted in is two-inch synopsis that West Van-Garibaldi will find native affairs to be the main course, there are so many other issues.
A safe transporation route connecting all the riding's communities will be right on top. It will be interesting to see who supports an alternate route through the Capilano, since the riding would undoubtedly be split on this. It will be equally interesting to see any candidate --particularly Dr. Glynn-Morris -- explain why how the taxpayers in Squamish will benefit from the emergency ferry terminal at the area's most scenic and
accessible park.
The decline in the forest industry's jobs and the rise of tourism will also have to be addressed. How will liveable wage jobs in an ever increasingly expensive community be exchanged with service and retail jobs? Some imagination and initiative is needed here.
Voters will want to know how their thoughts and ideas will be carried back to Victoria. Will there will some process where their voice counts, or will it just be the same old pre-election lip service to having a govemment accountable to the people?
There won't be many chances before the Nov. 17 election day to put these candidates on the spot. One of these chances will arise on Wednesday, Oct. 9 when an all candidates' meeting will be held at the Civic Centre at 7:30 p.m. But there is time before then. Write a letter to the editor outlining your opinions on the race and the issues. Visit the candidates in their campaign offices and stop them on the street.
And when the debate falls to back-andforth slinging on Socred poor track record and the NDP's less-than-stellar performance in Ontario, bring them back to earth. This is their riding and if elected they are bound to have a very clear picture of its people and its problems.
Mention flooding, rockslides, cuts to the annual allowable cut, pollution in the air and Howe Sound, power lines through the valleys and the problems of becoming a bedroom community.

Peer programmes take hold at high school

Teaching assistants at Howe Sound Secondary keep getting younger thanks to the school peer tutoring programme. The programme is actually composed of two formal courses taught at the school, Peer Tutoring 11 and Peer Tutoring 12. These courses teach students skills which allow them to assist in the classroom.
"The goal is essentially to help these students to help themselves in learning about working with people and the skills needed to work with people," said programme coordinator Dave Manning. "Many of the students in the programme are interested in the helping professions; law, medicine, social work and of course teaching.
"The programme is a good way for them to leam some skills even before they hit university."
Although there are currently 60 sudents enrolled in the classes, Manning said the demand for peer wutors far exceeds the supply. This school year there will be peer tutors working in Howe Sound's sciworking in Howe Sound 's science, physical education and fine arts departments as well as with hearing impaired classes and in nearby elementary
schools.
One offshoot of the programme is a peer counselling programme which Howe Sound first introduced last year. Peer counselling requires students to commit one lunch hour per week for 24 weeks for training. Last year's experiment was so succeessful that the school is planning to introduce peer counselling as a formal credit course for the fall of 1992.
"Kids with problems will talk to someone their own age before they will talk to someone older," Manning said. "You often find out what's going on through peer counseliors. Most things talked about are confidential but the more serious problems are passed on by the peer counsellors."
Manning said the pear counselling programme has an excellent track record. Schools with peer counselling protrammes in place have on ayerage, lower drop-out rates, better morale and overall, he sudent feile and, overail, he attention.
This fall, the public will be given a first-hand look at how the peer tutor programme works. Beginning Oct. 1, two students (Shaun Lawrence and Shannon Moyle) will be assisting staff to open the school's gymnasium early two
days a week.

## Autumn imaginings of the alpine meadows

September is consistently the nicest month of the year in Squamish and this year is no exception. After the poor weather in spring and summer, the warm sunny days of the past few weeks have been wonderful. I always used to take my holidays in September, mainly because the weather was good, the families with children were home again and there were IDNE-SDI DDIN lots of vacancies in motels.
It was also the month when I used to do most of my hiking and climbing in Garibaldi Park. I can remember being up in Black Tuck meadows and waking in the morning to find snow outside the tent. But it soon disappeared and the weather cleared up again.
It was a glorious time to hike and climb. Most of the snow was gone from the mountains and the glaciers. You could see the crevasses and there was no danger. Most of the streams were low because there was very little water to run off and they were easier to cross.
Looking at the mountains today I am amazed at how far back the snow has gone. When we first came to Squamish, the Mamquam Glacier, which was originally called Mont Rosa after the peak in the Alps because it resembled it, was snow and ice covered all year. Now, you can see minainy bate spots and theri is no snow on the shoulders.
While most of the alpine flowers are gone in September, you can still come upon patches of them where the snow has just gone and there's the added bonus of the mountain blueberries, those succulent morsels which grow on low bushes and are best picked by almost creeping along the ground. But the scent and flavour of them cannot be equalled by the cultivated kind.

I can remember when I first went into the park in the early ' 50 's, the ice at the foot of Sentines Glacier and the

Sphinx was much closer to the lake. The ice at the base of Helm Glacier almost cut the present lake in two but the last time I went up there there was no ice near the lake at all.
My sister first visited the park and Black Tusk Meadows in the ' 30 's and she said Desolation Valley was then truly a desolation. The ice had only just left the area and there was nothing but rock and scree. Twenty years later when I first saw it there were patches of turf as well as flowers and some small evergreens had seeded themselves. The last time I was up there we flew over it in a helicopter and those tiny trees were already several feet tall.
While they do not grow as quickly as they do in subalpine areas, it was surprising how fast vegetation came

when the glaciers receded.
When we have these beautiful autumn' days I long to go back there again: to see the lakes at Diamond Head, to watch for the golden foliage of the wild rhododendrons and the tawny grasses touched by the first fingers of frost in the high alpine areas and to see the blueberry bushes turn crimson as the nights get colder.
Unfortunately, I can no longer go there, but in my mind's eye I can still see the meadows glowing in the sunlight and the last few blossoms of heather in some hidden dell.
And, after all, those memories will never fade. But how I would love to be able to see those alpine meadows once again and the clear brilliant beauty of the bluegreen waters of Garibaidi Lake!

## GHE students join in Spicer Commission debate

One result of the much-pubiicized Spicer Commission was a questionnaire sent round to schools to find out how children feel about Canada. The questions were formulated by questions were formulated by the Canadian Teachers Feder-
ation; and Garibaldi Highlands Elementary was one of the schools involved. Each child had to answer 25 questions on a sheet of foolscap.


From the material returned, a book has now been produced, called "Young People Speak." The cover is Canadian flag with a child's hand-print where with a child 's hand-print where the Maple Leaf would normally be; and inside is a summary of what the children right across Canada are thinking on a variety of topics.
On the credit side, there is strong feeling for this country as one entity, and a rejection of racism and prejudice of all kinds. The students show more interest in the environment than in politics; and in answers to a question about bilingualism, express a desire (the writers are from all grades, including Grade 12) to learn a lot of other languages besides the basic two -Italian, Japanese, Spanish and Ojibway being amongst those mentioned.
Feelings about taxes in general, and the GST in particular, were surprisingly strong, undoubtedly reflecting parents' discussions heard by the younger ones, and a pain in the pocket felt by the older ones with part-time jobs.
On the debit side is the analyst's comment that our children showed widespread confusion between the U.S. and Canadian cultures. Three names quoted in the section asking them to identify famous Canadians were: George Washington, Moby Dick and Elvis Presley, although admittedly President Bush was more common! (None of these errors came from Squamish). Something of this kind is only to be expected when we share the same television channels. More disturbing is the remark that students' responses, right across the country, showed a weakness in basic writing skills.
My three favourite quotations from students' answers are: (on the environment) "We should have David Suzuki for Prime Minister"; (on Quebec) "If Quebec leaves Canada, does Mr. Mulroney go with it?"; and (on the student's own region) "The best thing about living on the Prairies is -- no SHARKS!"

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With autocratic rule firmly entrenched, you start with a power plant (coal powered or nuclear, you name your poison here) and then you "zone" land for commercial, industrial or residential use. As the game goes along, you get messages from the people who supposedly live in your city and, like any good politician, you ignore them if their opinions don't suit your goals. As you play the game more, you will learn how to juggle the budget books to give yourself even more money at the expense of public safety -- once again, just like real politicians. You must be careful, however, as the game will randomly permit disasters such as earthquakes and monster attacks to strike your city, after which you have to rebuild anew. The game is even better with accompanying programmes which allow you to build cities in the middle ages or on islands.

Where in time is Carmen San Diego, Computer game. 3T1S. An excellent game for the adolescent set as it -- gasp - makes them learn something aside from the lateral movement of joystick or the magical capacity of a three-legged androgynous hybrid of an elf-gnome. The game sets you up as a kind of timetravelling Dick Tracy who must venture through the mists of time in pursuit of such dastardly characters as Stu Pid. While the graphics are alright and the idea of making the player read a book to get answers for a computer game is somewhat novel, the game can get rather tedious between the 10th and 49th arrests that must occur before Carmen herself puts in a brief appearance.

Writers always have the last word. Bumpersticker. 5S (There are some bad "profession" bumperstickers; hope a "writer" didn't write this one.)

I like the work of Stephen Bochco very much. Certainly HSB will remain his masterpiece: the budget was huge and opportunities for masterful lighting and interesting montage were unlimited. L.A. Law and Doogie are high standard stuff thematically and in quality of script but neither show bothers venture beyond low-budget location, nor is his cutting and technical work meta-conventional. Despite that Bochco probably owns more Grammys than any producer in history. Somebody slapped the frontiersman out of him.

## The fatty oils

You have probably heard you should cut down the amount of fat in your diet and any fat you do choose should be polyunsaturated. This might lead you to wonder whether fat has any purpose in your diet and what a polyunsaturated fat is. Let's take a look at both of these.

First, fats do have important functions for your body:

* They provide essential fatty acids which the body
cannot manufacture.
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* The greatest energy output per gram of any food source is provided by fat.
* Food with some fat is easier to eat and digest.
* Fat carries the fat

Next, polyunsaturated fats are liquid or soft at room temperature. Fats are classified according to which type of fat is present in the largest quantity. For instance, sunflower oil is a polunsaturated fat which contains 67 per cent polyunsaturated fat, 11 per cent saturated fat and 22 per cent monounsaturated fat. These fats are from vegetable products.

Polyunsaturated fats are "good" fats as they are thought to lower the blood cholesterol levels which in tum helps prevent the development of heart disease. An over-abundance of blood cholesterol can lead to filling up your arteries and eventually blocking them Some examples of polyunsaturated fats include oils such as sunflower, safflower, soybean, sesame, com and cottonseed.
When considering the amount of fat in your diet remember half of the fateaten is from invisible sources. This refers to the fat which is part of a food you are eating; for example, the fat in cheese or meat. As well, the total amount of fat in a Canadian's diet is supposed to be no more than 30 per cent daily. This calls for a reduction of the total amount of fat eaten by a lot of Canadians as many consume over 40 per cent daily.

All fats have the same caloric value. It is recommended 10 per cent be polyunsaturated fats and the remaining 20 per cent made up of 10 per cent monoun saturated and 10 per cent saturated. Therefore, aim for cutting down on all fat.

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# Perspectives on a challenge

Their work with four mentally challenged men is almost at an end, but two participants in the Canada World Youth exchange will long remember their time at Newport House on Third Avenue.
Shawn Brunemeyer Toronto and his partner (R.J.) Thala, from the city of Baroda in India's westem province of Gujarat, have spent four days a week on a work project supervised by Squamish Community Services Society. That agency looks after Newport House which opened last year as the new home of four mentally challenged men in their late 20 s to mid 30s.
The two 19 -year-olds on the Indo-Canada exchange have been a part of the integration of the men into the community. They have taken them for daily walks, visited restaurants, and helped with meals and daily activities. They've also joined in on trips to the Vancouver Aquarium, Whistler and local lakes.
Shawn, who has worked at a
summer camp for mentally summer camp for mentally challenged children, believes integration of the Newport House residents into the community is a positive experience for everyone.
He says people have long been accustomed to the negative image of mentally challenged people -- but group lenged people -- but group

Jhala and Shawn have taught their charges to try to eat and drink more slowly. Shawn believes their earlier life in instilieves their earlier iife in insitutions taught them to quickly finish their food and drink before ne
selves.

Earlier days spent in instiuitions were also apparent when the men made their first acquaintance with Newport House doors; they weren't sure how to open them.
"Doors are always locked in institutions," Shawn says, pausing for a moment of thought.
"We should all be able to pass through a door, not just the people with the keys," he adds.
None of the four men are able to talk, though several can communieate with a simple form of sign language. This fact has been perhaps the sole point of frustration for the CWY participants.
"It really requires patience," Shawn says, "especially when it's hard to communicate." These times have arisen out on the daily walks, when one of the men has sat down and refused to go further, or when another might be feeling pain, perhaps a headache, and is unable to communicate the specifics.
But rather than judging their charges by what they can't do Jhala and Shawn have kept their reyes open to all their potencial.

Jhala, who comes from a city of over a million people, says Indian society seems to keep their mentally challenged people behind closed doors in hos

Executive director Nancy Evans and case worker Kathy Winstanley meet each week during their part-ime hours a de new office for the GuamishBBS organiztion quam 1 Bibs ficion located at Mind FM building. the Mountain FM building.
It is Winstanley's job to It is Winstanley's job to process each application from Bigs and Litiles, matching those with similar interests. She goes through an extensive interview with the prospective Big, who then meets with an experienced Big for orientation of the program.
Bigs are required to provide a medical reference an employment referce two personal ment reference,
references and an RCMP references and an
criminal record check. The last step is the final interview with the screen and match committee, a group of volun-
teer professionals in the social services and health fields. Winstanley said there are usually few problems with making a match for a Big who is committed to the idea of spending at least four hours a week with their Little. "You have to enjoy children, that's for sure:"
All information on Bigs and Littles is kept stricly confidential, Winstanely said, not even made available $\mathrm{BB} / \mathrm{BS}$ board members.
There have been quite a few There have been quite a few heartwarming examples of long-lasting. Big-Liule relationships, she said. One Big Sister and her Little have beem matched since 1984 -- during which time the Litule has grown up. "It's a lifelong friendship."
Another Big Sister and Little Sister corresponded for several years after the Little moved away. Now in her 20s, she has moved back to Squamish and taken up where the friendship left off.
"The contact was over a long long time," Winstanley said "This is the ultimate goal that we hope for."

## San Jose latest home for NHL's comedy of errors

A recent issue of Life magazine detailed how humans are killing sharks by the thousands, driving many species to the brink of extinction. Judging by the way the NHL is treating its expansion teamin San Jose, the puck-sharks face just as tougha fight as the sea creatures to which they owe their name.
In the late 1980's, the NHL's braintrust realized they needed teams all over North America if they were to secure a lucrative television deal with a major U.S. network.
 With dollar signs flashing in their eyes, the
NHL's board of governors took prompt action: they shot themselves in the foot.
First of all, the league determined that the one market in which they had to have a successful team was the San Francisco Bay area. Unfortunately, the league had already had one failed team in the area before. The California Golden Seals were a truly horrible hockey team and are probably better remembered for their white skates than their hockey prowess. The Seals eventually moved to Cleveland before ultimately merging with the Minnesota North Stars.
Whether the residents of San Francisco wanted hockey or not, the NHL decided they deserved another chance to watch an expansion team struggle for at least five or six years. In the mindset of the NHL, nothing will make paying customers happier than a perpetually losing hockey team - just look at the Canucks.
To ensure the new team played as poorly as an expansion team is expected, the NHL found the best set of owners available.

The Gund brothers had carefully guided the North Stars from Stanley Cup contenders to NHL laughing stock in justunder five years. After successfully managing to turn the hockey-mad state of Minnesota off on the professional version of the game, the NHL agreed that the Gund brothers were just the men of vision it needed to operate the most important expansion team to enter the league since 1967.
As a condition of their sale of the North Stars, the Gunds demanded the right to raid the Minnesota farm system for players. The NHL said such a division of assets was OK by them. After all, the Gunds had threatened to move the North Stars to San Francisco; might as well let the fans there see what they were missing.
The only penalty imposed on the new franchise for the "advantage" of drafting from the Minnesota farm system was a league stipulation that the Sharks would pick
