


## Floods and debris devestate Britannia and Cheekeye

#### **Creek redirected**

Dozens of people either evacuated or fled homes as torrential rains caused flooding that has devastated communities in Howe Sound.

The most severely hit by the floods were Britannia Beach and the First Nation community at Cheekye where raging rivers burst banks and pounded at least 50 homes. At one point the Cheekye River was monitored travelling at 28 kilometres an hour.

Early estimates of the damage inflicted over the three days that began Thursday night amounted to \$4 million, with estimates for Britannia alone between \$500,000 and \$1 million.

"I've never seen it so bad," said Dan Cumming, area regional district director, and Copper Beach Estates manager, Friday. "The last one about three years ago was bad but this is infinitely worse. Nothing like this has happened here before."

Britannia Beach Fire Department volunteer Ed Gagnon said: "She's pretty bad this time, though. It's

terrible but I guess nature knows what's best."

"We just never know what we're going to come home to but we wouldn't have it any other way. There is never a dull moment."

At approximately 9:30 p.m Thursday, persistent heavy rains and debris slides caught up to Britannia Creek, which bisects the small 300-member community and empties into Howe Sound. As the water began to fill its banks, the evacuation of approximately 30 residences on the south and north sides of the creek began.

At about 10 p.m., just 30 minutes later, the raging creek carrying thousands of tonnes of gravel, sand, log and rock debris thundered over its natural banks and

drowned the lower townsite in five feet of water.

According to several residence and Ministry of Transportation and Highways authorities Friday, the evulsion was caused when a log jam developed on the west side of a feetbridge, backing up the waters until creek broke through its bank 700 metres up.

Heavy flooding Thursday night and all day Friday stretched 800 metres in width along the highway from the Britannia Creek Bridge to the 99er Restaurant, as the BC Rail line acted as a dike and prevented the floodwaters from escaping into Howe Sound.

### Surveying the damage

Friday morning around 8 a.m., as heavy rain continued to fall, equipment was moved in to rip-rap the original creek bed. It was not until 5 p.m. that the creek was redirected to the bed it had occupied prior to Thursday night.

By Saturday morning the floodwaters had subsided but the community still lay under several inches of water as residents began to assess the damage and shovel mud from homes and businesses. Many people had lost virtually everything they owned.


A few hours later the full force of Mother Nature was fully revealed when the last of the water receded. Much of the lower Britannia Beach area lay under several feet of hard-packed sand, gravel and rocks, that appeared to be five feet deep at points.

As Britannia residents continued to shovel mud from buildings and began to tally the damage, Cheekye residents did the same.

Squamish Peacekeeper Steve Baker said: "The whole reserve was flooded in several feet of water. It was quite devastating."

Baker said at approximately 9:30/10 p.m. Thursday -the river began to rise very fast and quickly flooded an
area encompassing 15 residences. The First Nation
graveyard was also wiped out, washing away the majority of grave markers.

"A lot of people worked sand bagging their houses but it was no use. The water was moving too quickly. There should have been a proper diking system. On one side of the river the dike wasn't high enough and the river just went over."

### Fighting for the community

Residents are already looking to the future of this small company town, determined to ensure its existence in the face of redevelopment pressure.

'I don't want to see the landowners use this disaster as an excuse to disintegrate the community," said Zoe Lambert, vice-president of the Britannia Beach Community Association, Saturday.

"People need to be assured that they will have housing. There needs to be ongoing housing for people in our community of Britannia Beach... for the people that live here now."

Copper Beach Estates and the BC Museum of Mines are the two major landowners with BC Rail and the Ministry of Transportation and Highways having right-of-ways along the foreshore.

Lambert said long-term housing options in Squamish are not what the community wants.

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
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### Mashiter Dam taken out by debris

The Mashiter Creek water intake suffered further damage on Friday as rocks, sand and trees filled the dam solid and rendered it inoperable.

"We'll have to wait for the water to recede before we can truly assess the damage but looking at it from the other side, it looks quite [damaging]," said John Payne, district public works superintendent.

The Mashiter Creek Dam has been the center of controversy because of accusation about flawed engineering and disagreements over its cost effectiveness.

The firm WEB Engineering of Vancouver, which designed the water intake, is under investigation by the Association of Professional Engineers of British Columbia following a request by Squamish-based geological engineer Frank Baumann.

The investigation is based on alleged breaches of professional conduct when studying water flow levels in Mashiter Creek during the planning process.

Payne said: "I'm not going to get into that issue right now. I've got more [immediate things] to worry about." It is estimated that 20,000 cubic metres or 50,000 tonnes of debris have clogged the Mashiter.

And it was just last November, three days after its completion, that the dam collapsed, in one of a long line of disasters that have plagued the \$1.6 million project, intended to supply Squamish with an additional water source.

On Sunday Baumann said the overall damage seems worse than last year's and will cost tens of thousands of dollars to clean-up.

"Council should not do anything until an independent engineering report is completed," he said. "Council

may have to take a serious look at the possibility that the whole project needs to be abandoned."

Baumann first pointed out geotechnical concerns present in the Mashiter Creek in a letter to the Ministry of Municipal Affairs in December of 1987.

"Mashiter Creek drains a basin that has been heavily logged. Its upper reaches are underlaid by unstable volcanic debris from Mt. Garibaldi that has produced numerous mudflows in the past and is likely to produce more slides in the future," he states in the letter.

"The unstable soils together with the clear cut logging and poor road building of the past, mean that the Mashiter watershed is much more susceptible to landslides than the Stawamus River basin," Baumann stated in submissions to council just over two months ago.

Baumann writes in a letter to council dated Aug. 30: "I have had to endure a lot of abuse in trying to calmly and professionally carry out my civic duty and bring this matter to the attention of the district.

"Now that the truth of my position is being so dramatically demonstrated, I would hope that council would see fit to rectify past mistakes and unfairness, issue an apology, and help to restore some credibility to my reputation," he writes.

Baumann has asserted that not only is the Mashiter susceptible to debris slides that could destroy the dam but also that for almost two weeks out of the year the creek will be unable to supply the intake with any water at all. On inspection Sunday the Mashiter Dam was so clogged with debris that its intake was only barely glistening with water.

Members of council voted earlier this month not to reconstruct the dam after last November's damage until an independent engineering report has been completed. If it had approved construction completion for Sept. 15, the cement on the new dam would not yet have cured, before last weekends disaster.

#### Settlement reached in pulp and paper dispute

Woodworkers of Canada and the Canadian Paperworkers Union came to terms with

"We do have a tentative agreement between the PPWC, the CPU and the Pulp Bureau which represents all the mills in B.C." said Doug Muir, president of PPWC local three in Squamish. "All the locals at the mills will vote on it and the votes must be in by Sept. 13."

Under the terms of the agreement, the unions and the industry will abide by the industry representatives last terms of the old contract until April 30, 1992. Muir said that

the negotiating caucus is recommending that the union

members accept the agreement. "Wages and benefits do not increase at all but the 10 month extension of the present agreement does put the employer off his agenda which is good for us," he said.

The Pulp Bureau had wanted roll-backs to extensive compensate for losses incurred due to the recession and a general slump in the pulp and

paper market.

"We did it because the employer wanted concessions and we thought this was the only way out given the current market and economy," Muir said. "The members will decide."

The breakthrough in the talks occurred after the union bargaining caucus put forward a proposal on Aug. 22. The

#### Highfield draws competition from Woodwards

Highfield Development claims its proposed factory outlet in Squamish targets a higher-end market than the outlet centre opened last week by Woodward's at the company's downtown Vancouver store.

"It's a lot different than what we are doing," said Ron Lanthier, Highfield president. "They are dealing with liquidators' selection, and spotty low-end lines, while we are going after the Ralph Laurens."

Woodward's announced "B.C.'s first outlet centre" in an advertisement last week that will house 30 manufacturers' outlet centres, offering up to 75 per cent off original retail prices.

Lanthier said: "From our point of view it just reinforces the whole shift in retail... people are less and less interested in paying full retail prices. I don't think it detracts at all from what we are proposing."

Highfield Development is proposing a multi-million dollar manufacturers' factory outlet on 14 acres in the Squamish industrial park. The proposal presently sits at the conditional approval stage of the re-zoning process, despite a heavy lobby against the proposal by downtown merchants.

Jack Fowler, president of the Squamish Merchants Association said he didn't think the Woodward's outlet centre was going to change anybody's mind. "I can't see them abandoning the project now."

Mayor Egon Tobus said: "[Woodward's] could impact it. I don't know. It's a gamble."

"I don't think it will draw clients from the Highfield development because that's a far enough distance away from Squamish," he said. "The secret is to attract clientele that drive by on the highway. You don't find the same attractiveness [of Howe Sound] in downtown Vancouver."

### **BC** Rail just made things worse

BC Rail made a disaster worse Thursday by shoring up rail lines along the Britannia foreshore and preventing the floodwaters from draining into Howe Sound, according to several eye-witness accounts.

"It seems to me they said to hell with the buildings, to hell with the people, to hell with the community, let's save the rail line," said Marilyn Mullen, Museum of Mines executive director.

As floodwaters built up against the elevated BCR right-of-way -- waiting to escape through the naturally made hole blown underneath the tracks near the government wharf - truck and traincar loads of rock and gravel were brought in by BC Rail early Friday to protect its rail line. As a result, the flooding problem became worse as the right-of-way acted as a dike and backed up floodwaters.

"If I built a road like that and didn't build culverts, I'd be sued," said Stan Szostaki, owner of the Britannia Beach Tea Shoppe, situated in one of the buildings nearest the highway.

"They should have cut a deeper trench and let the water go into the Sound, he said. "The amount of extra damage done by holding back on the [bench] was a

He said he had just spent all the money he had on renovations to their restaurant.

But Copper Beach Estates manager and area regional director Dan Cumming said he understood why BC Rail had to secure its rail line. "I can understand that BC Rail did what it had to do."

As BCR gradually completed its operations, floodwaters visibly rose one or two feet across the 400metre-wide flood area.

Floodwaters eventually flowed out over the bridge and into Britannia Creek, and into Howe Sound through the two-metre hole the flooding had blown out of the rail embankment.

### Hero emerges from among flood waters

After years of answering to the nickname Crazy George, the aftermath of the Britannia Beach flood has left Assistant Fire Chief George McLaren with a new

"This man is a hero," said resident Bob Clapp. "He put his life on the line three or four times the other night."

When the waters of Britannia Creek began to rise on Thursday night, the 41-year-old McLaren took charge and orchestrated the evacuation of the buildings lying in the creek's flood-plain.

In the course of his duties, McLaren was knocked down by a floating freezer, bitten by a dog, nearly swept downstream by the raging current, and was confronted by the dangers posed by a propane tank with a broken valve.

"We went around evacuating everyone and then I did a check to make sure every building was empty," McLaren said. "There was one fellow, Carl Jensen, who was supposed to be in hospital for an operation, but when I checked his trailer he was asleep so I got him up."

For Jensen, McLaren's arrival was his first inkling of

"The fireman came through the door and yelled, 'Carl, get your clothes on, you've got a flood in front," Jensen said. "I said, 'Naw,' but I got my clothes on, put on my gum-boots, walked out the door and I couldn't believe what I was looking at."

After evacuating Jensen by four-wheel drive vehicle, McLaren forged ahead through the current and was nearly knocked down into the torrent by a wayward freezer the flood had picked up from its resting place. Shortly thereafter, McLaren evacuated a somewhat less grateful resident.

"There was a dog over by the old hospital and he was trapped, he couldn't get up anywhere. So I reached down to grab him and the damn thing bit me," McLaren said, laughing.

When he returned to the other side of the river, McLaren was confronted with a more serious situation.

"There was a 1000 pound propane tank that they had just filled up that day," he said. "The current moved it 70-feet and it ran into a hydro pole and sheared off a valve. The propane was spewing out all over the area.

"I took my 4x4 car and drove it partway in, but I had to turn back because of the current. So I put on a lifeline belt and waded in, but the current was too strong. I had to get rid of the line and my jacket because they were pulling me under."

Undaunted by his inability to reach the propane tank, McLaren concentrated his efforts on ensuring an explosion did not occur. McLaren swam across the raging waters to the home of John and Joan Fryer, who were waiting out the flood on the top floor of their building.

"I told them to extinguish all their fires because the propane was blowing their way," McLaren said. "Then I took a pole and felt my way through the current and led them through the water. We got everyone out safely and that was my main concern."

McLaren's actions without regard for his own safety are nothing new to the community at Britannia Beach. In years past, McLaren earned the moniker "Crazy George" for his exploits while riding motorcycles.

To hear him tell it, leaping into the swelled waters of Britannia Creek to help evacuate residents is the correct and expected response to the situation.

"It's better that one person go [perish] than a whole bunch," McLaren said. He added, laughing: "There's about two seconds to think about it and then you go and do it. If you stop and think about it, you wouldn't do

#### Warnings of disaster ignored

Government agencies chose to ignore documentation that warned of a floodplain disaster at Britannia Beach, according to a Squamish-based geological engineer.

"Lay-people can't be expected to understand the [danger]," said Frank Baumann at a meeting of Britannia residents Saturday. "That's why we have governments and ministry staff."

He said government agencies took a pro-active approach along Howe Sound to protect against slides and floods but stopped when they came to Britannia, and did nothing.

"Last year \$54 million was spent on floodplain areas in a reactive approach," Baumann said. "Just imagine if they had taken that beforehand and built built protective dikes or moved people away. If they had taken ten per cent of that money, they still would have been 50 per cent ahead [by preventing damage like this in Britannia]."

Baumann said government

representatives have had every opportunity to avert the Britannia flood disaster.

On October 28, 1921, 37 people were killed by the resulting lake outburst from a mudflow that had temporarily blocked the upper part of Britannia Creek, virtually destroying the lower townsite.

In April of 1983 Thurber Engineering of Vancouver completed for the Ministry of Transportation and Highways a major study of floods and landslides along Highway 99. Thurber drafted a detailed floodplain map of the Britannia Creek fan, warning that this was an area prone to a high flood hazard.

Then on June 30, 1991 Baumann sent a letter to the Provincial Emergency Program co-ordinator warning of a large potential avalanche danger in the upper part of the Britannia Beach watershed.

He was concerned this threat of a slide or other landslides of smaller magnitude might block Britannia Creek and cause major flooding in the lower

Baumann included a floodplain map indicating where the potential flooding would be di-

rected. The map basically outlines the area and direction of last weekend's flooding.

In turn, Baumann faced accusation that he was jeopardizing a major business deal for Copper Beach Estates -- one of the main landlords in the area.

In a letter Copper Beach Estates property manager and regional district area director Dan Cumming strongly criticized Baumann for "going public" with the information.

Cumming writes: "To make a catastrophic pronouncement at the time of the completion of a 'due diligence' exercise involving a major investment in the Britannia property is fraught with potential accusations, depending on how events unfold."

On Saturday Baumann said the floods Thursday and Friday were caused by heavy rains and debris slides in the upper portion of Britannia Creek. "Fortunately, the Jane Basin potential rock avalanche did not release; however, this is still a major threat that needs to be addressed."

Cumming said every creek in the province has the potential for flooding and the Britannia Creek is no exception.

### Britannia disaster unorganized response

Britannia Beach has gone per Beach Estates, the B.C. from one disaster to another Museum of Mines, the Minbut what remains amongst all the rubble are the divisions in the community that lead to poor response co-ordination.

"It's been wild," said Zoe Lambert, vice-president of the Britannia Beach Community Association, and Emergency Services co-ordinator, Saturday

afternoon. "I'm still in shock."

Lambert was out of town Thursday night when the flood waters drowned the lower Britannia townsite. But when she arrived Saturday morning there still seemed to be no overall co-ordination of the relief ef-

"There was no organization responsible for co-ordinating all the various people of Cop-

istry of Transportation and Highways, the Provincial Emergency Program until Saturday morning... We didn't even have the RCMP down here directing traffic -- we had kids doing it."

She said: "The Britannia Beach volunteer fire department and individuals hauling out people really saved the day but there was no overall co-ordination of rescue efforts and no outside help. We need more outside support."

Executive director of the BC Museum of Mines agreed that organization was lacking.

"We have all these government agencies but who is organizing it? It seems to me the should have been able to bring in a qualified emergency engi neer," Mullen said. "There should be somebody in here that we all take direction from."

Sally Pollock one of several Lions Bay Emergency Services people on site said: "This is a major disaster for a community of this size. It would be for Lions Bay. It would be for Squamish... but there is no emergency response team in Britannia to organize all the groups.

"Zoe is an ideal person for the job but unfortunately she can't run it 24-hours like it's needed. The people I'm working with are real nice and we're doing the best we can with what we've got."

### Claim centre open

The B.C. government's Provincial Emergency Program has set up a special claims centre to assist people in the Britannia Beach, Squamish, Whistler, and Pemberton areas who have been affected by last week's flooding.

The government has claims adjusters in the area and is planning to hold public meetings in each community with times and locations to be announced at a future

People seeking information about possible claims are asked to phone 938-3016. The line will be open each day from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. until Sept. 9.



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### School busing alternative looked into

An outcry by parents has persuaded the Howe Sound School Board to ask staff to look into alternate busing routes that will allow primary students in Britannia, Stawamus and Klahanie to attend Stawamus Elementary.

"The way we raise our children is that we let them make decisions on what they feel and what they know," said Brian Ward, a parent whose child is affected by the busing proposal. "Our kids are upset because most of their friends attend Stawamus."

Ward said the staffing levels and special needs programs at Stawamus are better than those at Squamish Elementary.


The school board originally proposed to send students from the three areas to Squamish Elementary because it was deemed unsafe for the bus to stop and let passengers disembark on Highway 99. But an alternate proposal from Ward has prompted the board to reconsider the proposed policy.

"We just don't want our children going to Squamish Elementary," Ward said. "We feel they have a right to go to the school they have been going to for the last four years. They are safe and comfortable there. I feel I suggested a safe and alternate route."

### Editorial-

### Those hit hardest deserve it the least

Flood waters wreaked havoc in the Sea to Sky Corridor this weekend but those truly devastated are the two communities most disenfranchised, the two groups that have been shouting the loudest but have been heard the least -- those that need better representation, but will likely never get it, being stuck in society's Catch 22.

Britannia and the Cheekye are home to the two most isolated groups in the Corridor and the two which politicians have ignored the most:

While lands in between and at either end have been secured from torrential rainfalls and mud slides by dikes and concrete creek beds, the Cheekye River and Britannia Creek overran their banks, lined with either no or minimal flood protection in what must be one of the wettest transportation corridors on the planet -- there are so many dikes in this corridor one would think a few more could have been brought in to protect the communities at Cheekye and Britannia.

Time and time again it's the places of tenancy and low incomes that get the least attention and therefore become, even more so, a place where politicians in their five hundred dollar skirts/suits, driving their \$60,000 imports spend very little of their time indeed.

Premier Rita Johnston ('Rita J.' only reenforces the high school rah, rah, rah mentality of Socred electioneering that does little to address real issues) flying in Saturday on a helicopter wearing black leather pants and a clean white sweater did just about as much as she did last October when she flew in surveying the big slide, and pronounced that there was no emergency.

Saturday she promised to help the recent victims of the wild weather-caused disasters at Britannia. But people shouldn't expect more than band-aid solutions.

Last October Johnston and Reynolds

promised the sky in Sea to Sky Country by offering to plow and dynamite a new high-speed highway through the Capilano watershed, a project proposal that is so hot politically it has not even been mentioned in passing -- from one BMW to another.

Short memories perhaps, but when the going gets tough and circumstance has them pinned in a corner, politicians are prone to make promises they cannot (or will not) keep. Once the gravel is shoveled and the floodwaters drained, the promises lose weight and the money barrel empties somewhere else.

Last weekend's floods at Britannia and Cheekye were not just a few wet nights that made life a little uncomfortable. People's lives were turned upside down, homes buried in water and mud, family treasures drowned and hammered to pieces, businesses lost -- dreams shattered.

Losses amounting in the tens of thousands of dollars to one particular business in the Corridor could mean the end of a business the owners have struggled to turn profitable for the last 13 years. And it is because they are still struggling, and not solely dependent on the business as a main source of income, that insurance will not cover the damages and help them start where they had left off before the flood.

Instead, it will be the owners of businesses that have been profitable and on which they can depend as a main source of income who will be compensated.

Clearly, all victims of the flooding require assistance but it is just one more example of the Catch 22 -- those who need the most assistance from government always seem to be the farthest down the line when promises that bear fruit are being handed out.

### Cut off from emergency ferry facility

As flood victims start to get their lives in order and news of the devastation becomes more and more 'stale', let's scratch our heads and figure out just how effective an emergency transportation link at Porteau Cove would have been.

Cut off from the rest of the world Squamish, Whistler and Pemberton became islands unto themselves — Britannia was only part of the sea that became the surrounding wastelands.

During the two days of turmoil that took over life in Britannia, thousands of dollars were spent buzzing politicians and bureaucrats over the small community because it was not only the most dramatic way of entering Sea to Sky, but the only way.

For some reason those stranded last weekend in both Whistler and Squamish have little to look forward to when sometime in November the Ministry of Transportation and Highways completes another band-aid solution, that contributes nothing toward making life more bearable.

The decision to build an emergency water link belies all logic and smells of nothing but power politics: politicians meddling in decisions that should be

made on the basis of common sense instead of taxpayer pence.

The emergency ferry dock should be built in Squamish because that is where the Corridor's population and commercial centres lie. And, tourism oriented Whistler would only benefit from a link farthest north — the quicker the ski bums can get home and make more money to spend, the happier big money will be in Whistler.

As it stood, this weekend Porteau Cove would have serviced communities at Furry Creek, Porteau and points in between. But not only does the ferry link not exist, as of yet the communities do not exist either.

Politicians that put the pressure on bureaucrats to make this decision are likely counting on these new communities to hold the balance of power come election time in the year 2000 — the high disposable income market reads blue Socreds of tomorrow, like little Britannia reads major disaster of today.

For those stranded all points north of Porteau, this Fall may be the last time they have a chance to have any real say in who represents them in Victoria.

### Patching and filling will leave us susceptible to disaster

Dear Editor,

John Reynolds seems to have caught Premier Johnston's bad habit of spending public funds for re-election purposes. Mrs. Johnston had her train trip on BC Rail and her election campaign advisor in Whistler paid for by the taxpayers.

Mr. Reynolds in turn has sent out a mailer at enormous expense recently.

The slick "MLA Report" talks about Social Credit management in B.C. but ends up talking more about Ontario. I wonder if John realized what province elected him?

The con game involved in boasting about the lowest "direct debt" works by not including over \$4 billion in recent Crown corporation spending. This indirect debt is still guaranteed by B.C., affects our credit rating and has increased our total indebtedness from \$4 billion in 1975 to \$20 billion in 16 years of Socred mismanagement.

And don't try to fool us on the increases in educational expenditures. That lovely blue line is based on the inevitable rebound from tremendous cuts to education that the Socreds made several years ago. And the top end of the blue line, the 1991 budget estimate, should never have been included. It includes an election promise of \$650 million in school building to replace the hundreds and hundreds of portables throughout B.C.. But it hasn't been delivered.

All in all it's a shell game, a desperate attempt by a desperate government to shore up their fortunes as they sink slowly into an ocean of red ink. The Social Credit deficit this

year of \$1.2 billion is the largest in B.C. history and shows a government out of control, paying for doctors pensions and raises to political aides while hospital beds are closed

In the process of spending government money they should have finished off the job of cleaning up the debris flow channels along Highway 99. The Britannia Beach flood danger was something that highway engineers were aware of when the whole area was reviewed after M Creek in the early 80s. John Reynolds and then Highways minister Rita Johnston stood by and gambled with the safety and security of a populated area by doing nothing.

And that goes for the diking and maintenance of dikes in this riding. As an alderman I had a Ministry of Environment official look at a crumbling 10-foot portion of low bank separating the raging Cheakamus River from a brand new route. The rain was pelting down around us, disaster was imminent and he said: "Wait till it breaks through and then apply for Provincial Emergency funding (PEP). We don't have the budget."

We've got to get these guys living in the real world. Flood control measures should be thorough, comprehensive and one right, once. This patching and filling will continue to leave us with disastrous breakthroughs, as has happened at Cheekye and Pemberton.

Our area has been the subject of too many headlines and news stories talking about floods and killer highways,

particularly in Squamish and points north. Somewhere the representation from this area has not been getting through and as far as I can see, the buck stops at John Reynolds' desk. If he took the money spent on that mailer and rented some trucks and loaders to do the job, we'd all be better off.



### Law Society gives Clark the go-ahead

The B.C. Law Society ruled that controversial native rights lawyer Bruce Clark can represent members of the Lil'wat Peoples Movement in a four-hour meeting held on Monday.

Clark had been denied the right to practice law on behalf of the Lil'wat Peoples Movement because he is not a member of the B.C. Law Society. The Ontario lawyer asked to be named "a friend of the court" in Squamish Provincial Court on August, 8. His application was denied and a scuffle ensued.

"They couldn't tell us the name of another person that was either more qualified or as qualified as Dr. Clark. There is no one in B.C. with the qualifications that he has." John said.

However, Bryan Ralph, secretary of the B.C. Law Society said, "It's correct to say that we did not name a lawyer as opposed to we couldn't name one." He added that it was clear that Clark was the only lawyer the Lil'wat Peoples Movement wanted.

Ralph said that while Clark could represent the Lil'wat Peoples Movement in cases that are being processed by the courts at the present time, he would have to reapply to represent them in any new cases.



### Birds passing wet summer in Blind Channel

I notice there has been a lot of activity among the birds in this past week. The little finches must find it hard going to get seeds in the rain and wet weather because they are really busy at the feeder these days. All six of the perches have been in use most of the time and there are usually two or three waiting on the windowsill or the eaves for some of the others to leave. It keeps one hopping to make sure the feeder is filled and there is lots of seed there for them.

The red winged blackbirds are regular visitors at the feeder and I am beginning to think that maybe I should put up another one as there are so many birds patronizing it.

When the swamp at the intersection was filled several years ago and Macdonalds was built, the bulrushes which were the favorite haunt of the red winged blackbirds, were destroyed and for a time there was only one pair which remained. They used to come to the feeder and I was so delighted when the first pair arrived.

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

They nested in the brush between the neighbors and my place and last year they would put the run on me if I weeded the herb bed and definitely dive-bombed the cats if they came too close to the fence. In fact, one day they even chased the cats under the truck when I visited her house.


But now I am sure they have brought all the family back with them as I have seen up to eight or ten males and as many females in the crabapple trees along the river bank and on the eaves of the house waiting for their turn at the feeder. But there will still be a number of smaller birds and I hope they will continue to come to the feeder and brighten the cold winter days with the flash of their wings.

I notice that the heron who haunts the Blind Channel must have a family as I often see four of them fly over the house towards the cliffs. There may be a rockery over there in the tall trees at the base of the rocky slopes. But I have seen a pair of them in the shallows when the tide is out, stalking the shores of the Blind Channel and looking for small fish.


They are such stately birds and seem to be able to stand for hours, almost immobile, watching for their food

### RCMP nets handful of stolen vehicles

Squamish RCMP recovered three stolen vehicles and are searching for a fourth after their highway patrol unit received an unexpected bonus while conducting an anti-speeding campaign at 3:15 p.m. on Aug. 25. Three of the vehicles were stolen from Vancouver while the fourth went missing from Squamish. Five North Vancouver juveniles — three males and two females — were apprehended.

Vandalism to a 1980 Toyota Tercel parked at the base of the Chief was reported Aug. 22 at 5:48 p.m.. The rear window of the vehicle was shattered with a rock.

On the 23 of Aug. at 2:55 p.m. two persons at the Catholic Thrift Shop on Cleveland Avenue stole \$40 from the cash register after sending the store keeper to the back of the shop. Suspects were apprehended by the RCMP and the stolen money returned to the rightful owner. Charges are pending.

At 1:30 p.m. on Aug. 23 a television and money box were reported stolen from a boat docked at the Britannia Beach marina on which a resident permanently resides. RCMP have suspects and the investigation continues.

On the 23 of Aug. between 8:50 p.m. and 9:37 p.m. two red Richtey 18-speed mountain bikes were stolen from a 1987 GMC pick-up truck parked at the Highlander Hotel.

A white 1983 Mazda parked at the base of the Chief was broken into sometime between 9:30 a.m. and 8:30 p.m. on Aug. 26. A wallet containing \$100 and a Visa card were reported stolen by the owner of the car, a Vancouver resident.


### Con game shut down



### Whiskey, women and men don't mix

Author Bruce Ramsey, resting from exhaustive research into yet another scholarly tome, dropped by recently and reminiscences flew like silver bullets.

These were newspapering reminiscences, of course,

because Ramsey and (shudder) about 50 years

And what touched us off this time were some library clippings he had unearthed concerning the Rum Tum Tum club.

This loose organization came into being during the darkest days of the great depression when

reporters carried their press cards in their hatbands and actually used words such as "scoop," and "tear out the front page" and "hello, sweetheart - get me rewrite."

The father of the RTT club was ace reporter Torchy Anderson, who is quoted in the aforementioned clip-

"A very well-known provincial politician came to see me one day and said: 'Torchy, I want to buy you a couple of bottles of rum."

Torchy, of course, couldn't be bought but he WAS thirsty so he invited the politician to bring his bottles down to the Province newsroom, there to share them with the entire staff.

Charter member Norm Hacking takes up the story of the club's begging:

"Only males were admitted to membership and they had to be on the Province editorial staff. One of the rules was that only rum could be drunk and that the rum had to be given to us. It had to be a gift from politicians like Gordon Wismer or Jimmy sinclair; the CPR was very generous too, through Trav Coleman."

This happy state of affairs went on for years. When two or three bottles of rum accumulated, a mysterious sign when tup on the editorial notice board.

"RTT," it stated, and people began drifting toward either the morgue (library) or the photo lab.

What began in light-hearted fashion grew into a

"I remember on one occasion the liquor board announced the price of rum was going up from, say, \$2.50 to \$2.59," Hacking recalled.

"There was a great uproar. We sent a telegram to the attorney-general protesting the increase. Within a week, it was back to the old price. That's the truth."

In time, the RTT club established a subsidiary — the SOB club — and to qualify a prominent citizen such as a judge or a politician had to be so utterly nasty as to earn a black ball from every member of the paper's editorial department.

Unhappily, the minutes of the SOB club — meticulously kept — have been lost. There would have been a book in there.


The great years of the RTT club were from 1936 to 1938 but it went on for years after that. It was still going on when Ramsey and Levett toddled up during the '40s.

However, as the notes Ramsey found make clear: "They took to drinking whisky. And some of the women members of the staff demanded admittance and, of course, as soon as you got a woman in there it ruined the whole ribald atmosphere."

The Rum Tum Tum club became degenerate with the influence of women and whisky."

Chauvinist? Sure — but that's the way it was.

### New Squamish stooges movie: no master of disaster

We can only hope that things turn out as we wish.

Voice of a Professional coming over the scanner.

August 30, 1991: Heavy rain blew away virtually every transportation and communications link between Lillooet and Vancouver.

Some new precipitation records were set, but this is rain country. And we have had to deal with natural disasters effected by much less rain.

This corridor has experienced many emergency cir-

cumstances—not all as tragic as the Lion's Bay slide of 1983—and one would think that a government with any insight might spend a little money on emergency organization.

Instead, one frame of idiocy after another, in the ongoing frustrating film:

Like:

The people of Cheakamus, Upper Squamish, and Squamish just finished dukeing

it out with the Whistlerians who proposed a situation for the Squamish River that if one swam it in it, he could only go through the "movements".

After the trial by toilet comes the water torture. Again. The flooding has happened so many times in Squamish and environs that none has a count of the number of times.

I spent the day racing from one disaster site to the next, drowning cameras, and staying glued to the scanner plugged into the cigarette lighter, aerial wagging on top of my cheep jeep.

And listening to the tired and disgusted voices of people watching the water flood or threaten their homes, and isolate Whistler, Squamish, Britannia and almost Pemberton (the flood thwarted by sandbaggers).

Where was our government coordinator of emergency efforts. Where the hell was our M.L.A.?

This was a rerun of a movie everyone has seen entirely too many times.

Let's wind the reel back to last fall.

In October I was writing a book review with the scanner squawking in the wee hours when a standing mountain slumped into a sitting position across the road and rail-bed.

The great Tunnel Point slide.

A guy who lived on the West Van side almost bought it in a front-end loader. He got out. On the Squamish side. It was evident on the ratio he was fairly exercised about this close call.

His supervisor on the West Van side asked him whether he had unloaded his underwear yet.

The days which followed were filled with radio confusion. Wars between Capilano Highway Services and B.C. Rail, our local rent-a-cops, local government, and Victoria (they send nerds in helicopters, but never get dirty nor wet; they were up there in the choppers today buzzing Fergie's and clicking their compassionate tongues).

The only people with any common-sense who took straight-ahead finite action were our own resident volunteers. A volunteer fireman friend took annual leave time to help out and stayed awake for days.

It was clear that the road could have been open by a fat margin earlier, had B.C. Rail (with their big Victoria leverage) not pulled out a bigger hammer and demanded that the slide debris not be pushed over the edge. The money had to get through. To hell with those who commute. The peasants: Let them eat cake, take helicopters, planes, ride the Harbour Ferries tubs, whatever.

This forced highways people to go begging for places

to dump the debris as fill.


Ten months later, rain. Britannia is drowning. B.C. Rail, like Ford, has a better idea. Just as efforts to get the Britannia Creek bed back under control are coming together, B.C. Rail shows up with tons of rock to shore up their bed, dumps it, and up goes the water level and people on higher ground have to head for highest ground.

The scanner goes nuts with highways people and others grinding their teeth to the gums.

For eons we put up with the bailey bridges at Cuilliton

Flash: This guy here at the site doesn't want to take his equipment down on the eroding bank at Cuilliton. What'll I do?



### The fine art of doing it the hard way

For most rock climbers, an overhanging ledge or a sheer surface represents the end of the line, the point where you turn back.

But sport climbers are not most rock climbers.

A competitive offshoot of rock climbing, sport climbing is a fast growing sport for those who want to push their abilities to the limit.

"Most people here are into climbing in a recreational sense," said Jim Sandford, a Squamish resident and member of Canada's World Cup Sport Climbing team. "A lot of people go out climbing for recreation and to enjoy the outdoors. We are pursuing it as an athletic sport."

Sandford and his wife Jola are ranked among the top five sport climbers in Canada, Jim fourth among men and Jola first for women.

Although most people associate areas such as Squamish's own Smoke Bluffs or the Chief as prime training areas for aspiring climbers. For sport climbers, however, the nature of the competitions creates different demands.

"There are two ways to pursue climbing as an athletic endeavor," Jim Sandford said. "One way is through competition and training on artificial walls.

"The other way is by pushing standards of difficulty on natural rock by attempting climbs of increasing difficulty."

Jola Sandford added: "A rock climber would try different routes within their level while sport climbers will push themselves to do harder climbs."

Since most sport climbing competitions are held using artificial walls, the Sandfords are at a distinct disadvantage due to the dearth of such surfaces in B.C.

"There is an artificial wall in Vancouver but it is too small for us," Jola Sandford said. "An international climbing wall is 15-metres high but the wall in Vancouver is only six-metres high. We train at home; we have a special board and we do pull ups and work on our finger strength there."

The hot-bed for sport climbing in Canada is the Calgary-Banff area. A profusion of artificial walls as well as challenging natural terrain in the region has lead to a small boom in the sports popularity.

One spin-off of this Rocky Mountain fascination with sport climbing is a Canadian World Cup team with only three members from outside of Alberta -- the Sandfords and a climber from Ontario.

Another handicap facing this country's elite climbers is the incredible costs of competing on an international



rope and Canadian climbers must pay their own expenses if they wish to compete against the world's best. The Canadian team is selected by the national sport climbing committee of the Alpine Club of Canada. Be-

climbing committee of the Alpine Club of Canada. Because the sport is still relatively new to Canada, the national team does not receive federal funds to help pay travel costs.

Despite the drawbacks, the Sandfords enjoy their sport and accept the challenge of two sets of trails in the Squamish area.

"Right now I can count the number of sport climbers in the area on one hand but the interest is growing," Jim Sandford said. "For now, we push standards on natural rock because that's what we have here. We establish new routes at a high standard and that's our method of training."

### Squamish volleyball player among B.C.'s best

This year's edition of the B.C. Summer Games has turned out to be more than just a free weekend in Vancouver for one Squamish athlete.

For Shannon Moyle, a 16-year-old volleyball player, the Coquitlam sporting event was an important stepping stone in his development as an athlete. At the conclusion of this year's summer games, Moyle was selected to try-out for the B.C. under 16 select team in Penticton.

He parlayed that invitation into the starting setter position on the province's top squad and ended up competing in the Western Canadian Elite Championships in mid-August.

"I tried out for the Zone team for the B.C. Summer Games and they picked players based on their performance in Zone play," Moyle said. "They announced the selections at the end of the Summer Games and we had to leave for Penticton the next day. We had no rest really, I went home that night and had to go again the next day."

After arriving in Penticton, Moyle and the other athletes were put through a battery of tests on the first day before training began in earnest on day two.

After one week of intense work-outs, Moyle was surprised to learn that he had earned a spot on the "gold tearn," a unit composed of the best players in the province for his age group.

"I was very surprised," Moyle said. "There was a lot of good players at the camp but supposedly the coach [Porf Verde] said that I was the best setter in camp."

If Moyle was able to get very little rest after the Summer Games, he got none at all on the trip to Grande Prairie, Alberta, site of the Western Canadian Elite Championships.

"It was a 26 hour bus ride and I got no sleep on the trip," he said. "They crammed both the boy's and the girl's teams onto one bus. There were people sleeping in the aisles."

Things did not get much better once they arrived in Alberta as the B.C. teams were forced to sit for six hours in a hotel lobby waiting for their rooms to be made up.

once play commenced Moyle's team acquitted itself well, placing fifth after losing to the eventual champions from Saskatchewan in the tournament's quarter-finals.

For Moyle, the experience was invaluable.

"I think I played my personal best," he said. "I proved myself more than I thought I was going to."


Now that his appetite for top level volleyball has been whetted, Moyle looks forward to improving his game. He plans to try-out for the provincial juvenile team (19-years and under) at a special camp to be held at UBC during the Christmas break.

This new-found commitment to volleyball will be at the expense of Moyle's usual winter pastime, hockey.

"I'm dropping hockey for this year at least," he said. "The juvenile camp at Christmas would get in the way if I stayed in hockey so I think I'll concentrate on volleyball."

In the long term, Moyle's goal is to play at the university level, preferably for UBC.

get close enough to have a better look but it was definitely not a gull.

There are a number of other birds around but the humming birds seem to have disappeared. They never visited the feeder, possibly because the other bird feeder was too close to it, but I have seen them at the fuschsias in the baskets. Friends have had hundreds of them in their feeders but the hummers seem to disappear in July and August.

Bird experts have told me that they go up to the mountain meadow in the summer when the alpine flowers bloom and there is lots of food for them. That might account for their disappearance when there are still lots of flowers here for them.

The wildfowl will soon be migrating and we can expect to see ducks, geese and swans around. They often stop off in the Blind Channel on their way south and are always a welcome sight.



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
