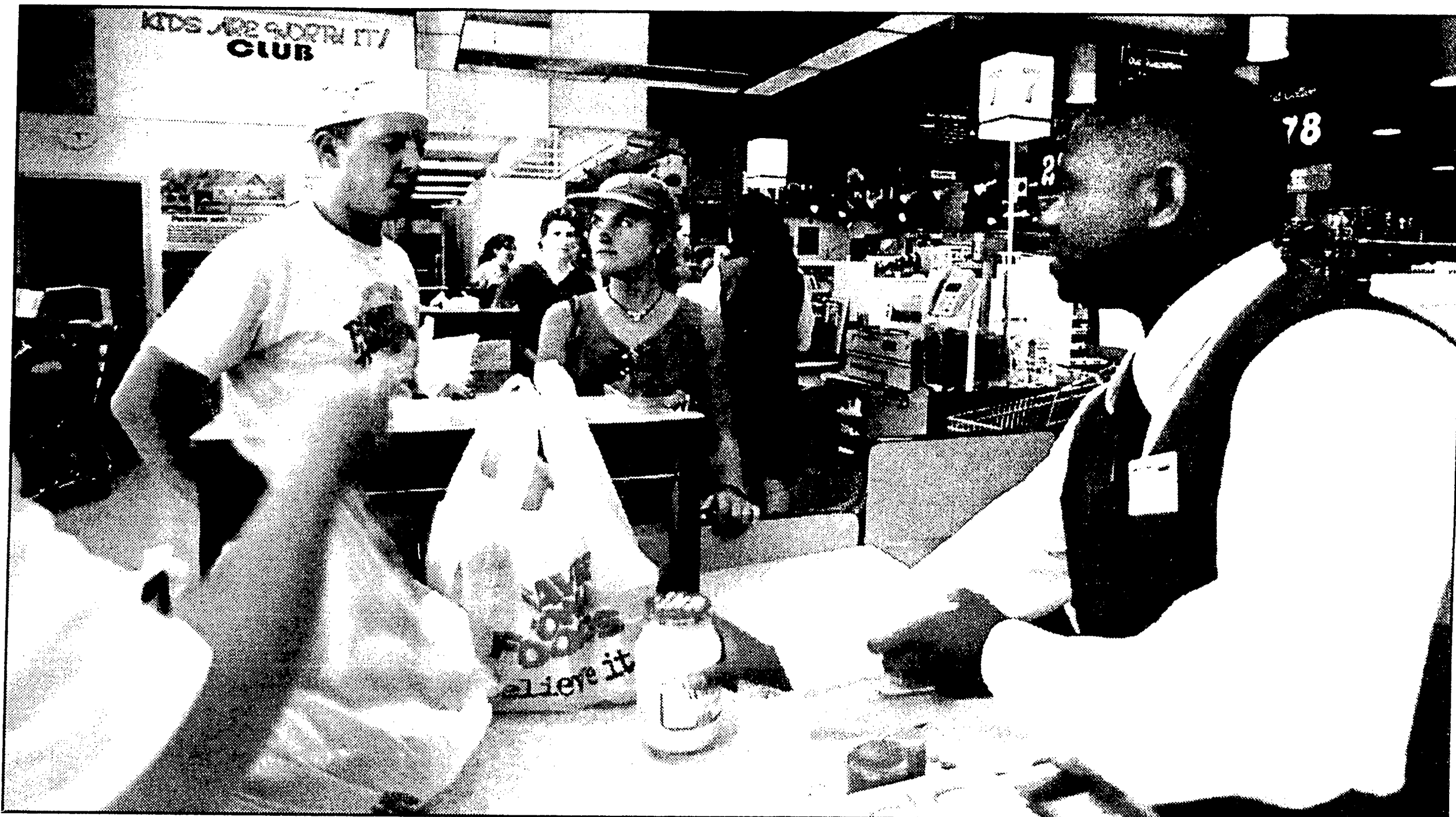

# Gulf Pacific proposes large Zellers instead of numerous smaller stores

## Council requests new development plan for Garibaldi Plaza

Council is intending to rescind bylaws next Tuesday that would have allowed Gulf Pacific Investments to build a 140,000-square-foot shopping centre on Hwy. 99 at Mamquam Road in order to allow the same development to proceed with modified plans that include an 80,000-square-foot Zellers store and a 40,000-square-foot Extra Foods store on the property.

Gulf Pacific Investments vice-president of development Ken Harris on Monday said after meetings between Gulf Pacific and District of Squamish staff, council has indicated it would prefer Gulf Pacific to submit a new development plan instead of amending its existing plan for the proposed Garibaldi Plaza. Council last year gave the third of four readings of bylaws that would consolidate several parcels of property to allow the shopping centre to be built as a integrated development rather than on a piecemeal basis.

With the development by BCR Properties of the Squamish Station shopping centre on Hwy. 99 at Cleveland Avenue, competition from smaller downtown Squamish stores and a somewhat spiralling economy, Gulf Pacific was forced to change its approach to the Garibaldi Plaza project.

"We were concerned about being able to build the number of small stores that we had on our plan, so we added and came up with a strategy of going and approaching another large user," Harris said.

In essence, Gulf Pacific would be replacing 80,000 square feet of small store users with an 80,000 square foot Zellers. As well, there is proposed to be about 10,000 square feet of small stores and restaurants and a new 8,000-square-foot space for the Diamond Head branch of the Royal Canadian Legion. (A theatre that had been proposed originally is not included in the new proposal.)

Harris said the concerns of some Squamish residents and business owners that smaller Squamish stores would suffer are addressed by the new plan. In fact, having a Zellers in Squamish would be economically profitable for Squamish because it would remove some of the current market leakage to the North Shore and provide hundreds of jobs and thousands of tax dollars, Harris said.

The new proposal would be allowed under the zoning that council had approved of thus far and would not require an amendment to the official community plan.

Harris said District of Squamish staff has told him council is concerned about Zellers being "too big and too much" for Squamish at this time. He said he believes that council has decided that Gulf Pacific should apply for a new development permit rather than amending its existing development permit because it believes the public should know about what is happening. He said Gulf Pacific would have preferred to amend the existing development plan.

Squamish Mayor Corinne Lonsdale, after announcing at last week's council meeting that council intended to

rescind the bylaws, refused to say why council made that decision.

Council discussed the issue at an in camera (closed to the public) meeting, just prior to the regular council meeting July 2.

Harris said Gulf Pacific was going public with its plans because of the strong opposition of some Squamish residents and business owners to its original proposal. But he noted the support of a "non-vocal majority" and the support of a predominantly pro-development council, including two new councillors — Coun. Bill McNeney and Coun. Paul Lalli, elected in two byelections in the last 14 months — who have said they support the proposed development.

Lonsdale, in an interview on Thursday, said the reason council was intending to rescind the bylaws is because Gulf Pacific and provincial Ministry of Transportation and Highways could not come to terms on highway improvements in the vicinity of the proposed shopping centre. However, both Harris and Gulf Pacific president Bruce Russell said that an agreement has been reached with the Transportation and Highways Ministry, albeit one in which Gulf Pacific will have to pay a greater share for the improvements than they believe they should.

As well, Harris said the safety concerns regarding children travelling from Garibaldi Estates to Mamquam Elementary School has been addressed to the satisfaction of the RCMP.

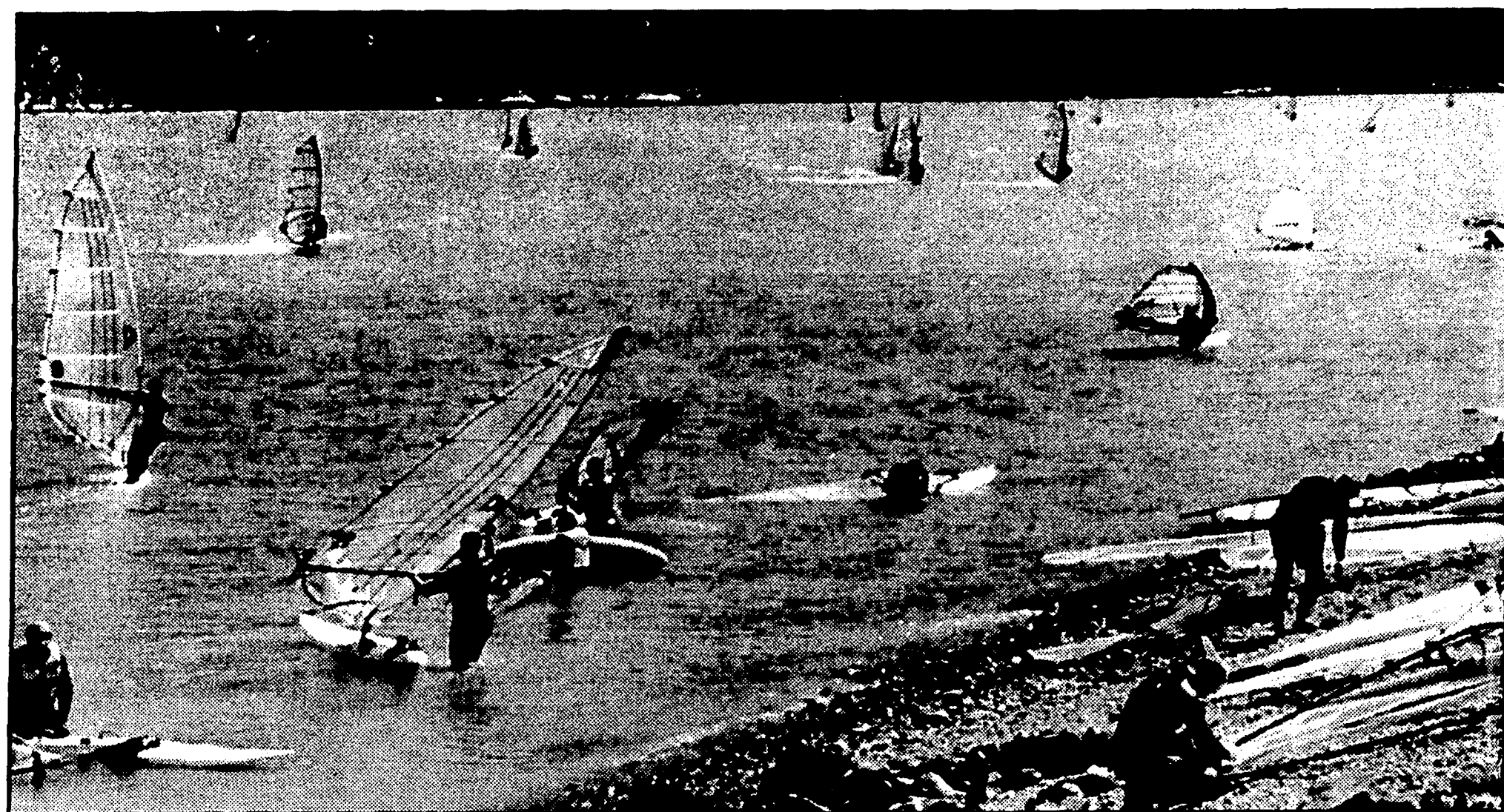

## Budget reversal panned by MLA

The provincial government's turnaround on its projected budget surplus for 1995/96 has drawn fire from West Vancouver-Garibaldi MLA Ted Nebbeling.

Prior to the May election, the Ministry of Finance was predicting a \$16-million surplus for last year. But last week, Finance Minister Andrew Petter released a revised forecast projecting a \$235-million deficit for the period.

He claimed the reason for the deficit was largely due to a shortfall of \$255 million in forestry revenue from the revised April forecast.

As Liberal forestry critic, Nebbeling did not dispute Petter's claim that lower forestry revenues were the main cause of the deficit, given the recent drop in pulp-fibre and timber prices. But he blasted the

NDP's flip-flop and accused the government of manipulating the books to create a rosy pre-election financial picture.

He said it's standard practice for forest industry revenue numbers to be calculated quarterly and those poor figures would have been available to the Ministry in April.

"The question is, why did they not reveal that information before the election?" Nebbeling said. "I think the focus has to be more on the NDP government misleading the people of this province and beguiling them into believing things that after the election just could not be made true. There are so many questions that the Minister can't answer."

Nebbeling said the Liberals have called for Petter's resignation, but Premier Glen Clark has given the Finance Minister his endorsement. In addition, a call for a more work-

able legislative process to all Saanich North voters to recall Petter was also denied, to Nebbeling's disappointment.

"When you cannot trust a man at that position, we are in deep, deep trouble," he said.

The Ministry of Finance claimed that the numbers are preliminary and could change when calculations are made final this fall. Nebbeling predicted any change would likely be for the worse, and that the \$235-million figure may well be optimistic.

He also blamed the government's Forest Practices Code, which restricted the number of logging permits issued, with the loss of forest industry jobs in Squamish.

Petter pledged that the 1996 budget will achieve a surplus, Nebbeling said he doubts the promise given last week's events.

## Safety issues not addressed, says McKay

Mamquam Elementary School parents' advisory council president Trudy McKay said that at a meeting with the Ministry of Transportation and Highways in February, the parents' advisory council was assured that the ministry would not grant final approval unless the parents' advisory council had been consulted and its concerns about safety addressed. She said that had been confirmed as recently as last week and added that Gulf Pacific has not even talked to the parents' advisory council since February.

"In Gulf Pacific's minds, (the safety issues) may have been addressed, but I can tell you, as president of the PAC, the safety concerns have not been resolved in any

way. I'm furious."

McKay said it is in the favor of the parents' advisory council that another public hearing will be required before the proposed shopping centre can proceed. "It can be certain we will be there."

It is not guaranteed that council will rescind the existing third readings of the bylaws, which were passed with support from Mayor Corinne Lonsdale and councillors Tom Bruusgaard, Ted Craddock, and Don McNeney. Voting against were councillors Ron B. Don Ross and former councillor Meg Fellowes.

Delegations by proponents or opponents will not be allowed to address council on the issue at Tuesday's meeting, which begins at 7 p.m.

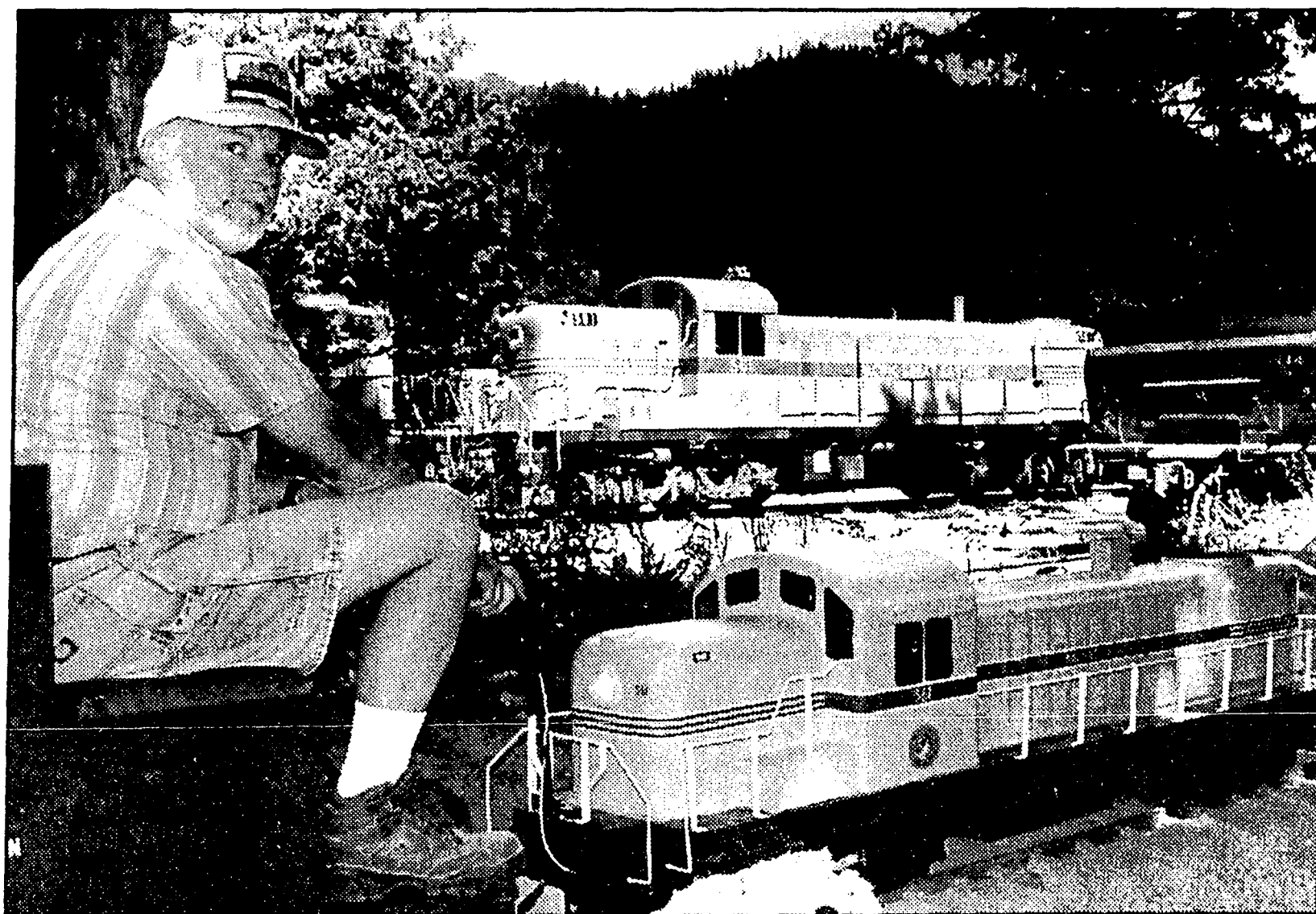

Ombudsman investigating councillor's  
alleged conflict of interest over hotel

The developers of a proposed hotel in the industrial park are expecting by the middle of this month a decision by the provincial Ombudsman on whether or not a councillor who voted against their proposal was in a conflict of interest.

Turn-Keh Investments partners Bruce Kehler and Paul Turner about two months ago asked the Ombudsman to investigate Coun. Ted Craddock, who at the time of the vote at the April 2 council meeting was and still is the real estate agent for the for-sale Klahanie resort. Kehler said that because Klahanie would be a potentially competing business with Turn-Keh's proposed hotel, Craddock should not have voted when the hotel issue was dealt with.

Craddock, however, says he received letters from both the Klahanie owners and a party that was making an offer on the property giving him permission to go ahead and vote on the proposed hotel. He added that after meetings with the Sanguinetti and Company legal firm, a lawyer also indicated to him that there was no conflict of interest.

The vote in question had to do with a proposed amendment to the official community plan to allow hotel devel-

opment in the area on highway frontage. The Municipal Act states that a majority of council — in Squamish's case, four votes — is required to vote in favor of the bylaw, regardless of how many members of council are present at the time.

With a vacant council seat at the time, the tie vote — which was opposed by Craddock and councillors Ron Barr and Don Ross — quashed the proposed bylaw. Voting in favor were Mayor Corinne Lonsdale and councillors Tom Bruusgaard and Bill McNeney. (The remaining seat had been held by Meg Fellowes, who had resigned from council.)

Kehler said he realizes that if Craddock is found by the Ombudsman to have been in a conflict, the vote will remain unaffected. "What we do want is we feel that Craddock needs to clearly understand where the boundaries are in how he conducts himself. And we want a clear definition of it. We believe that there is a conflict — that's what the Ombudsman is there for.

"If he's found to be conflict, well then he's just going to have to mind his Ps and Qs..." Kehler said, adding that in any event, another council member must be convinced to support his proposal in order for the hotel project to proceed.

"If we don't get it out of this council, I think we are going to get it out of the next council. It's a project that the town wants — it needs it, it wants it and I do believe that common sense will prevail."

Craddock said he was not the only person who voted against the project, and added that he believes he is being singled out.

"(Kehler) likes to lay it on one person, but may be better take a look and see that council also approved that there would not be changes to phase one (of the industrial park)," Craddock said, noting that council approved of an economic development committee recommendation that zoning in the southern phase of the industrial park should not be changed to allow hotel development. However, a few hundred metres away, in the northern part of the industrial park, it is allowable for a hotel to be built on highway frontage.

"You can thrash one person as much as you want, but the majority of council voted in favor of not changing the zoning.

"Even if I hadn't voted...it still wouldn't have passed. He (Kehler) can beat me to death all he wants. He's got a personal vendetta against me — that's fine. That's what you have to take as a politician."

Election  
candidates  
to be listed  
alphabetically

Council will continue to use an alphabetical listing of candidates on the election ballot for the November general municipal election.

District clerk Joe Barry did a random sample survey of 17 British Columbia municipalities and found that 10 listed candidates names in alphabetical order and seven listed the candidates names randomly. Mayor Corinne Lonsdale and Coun. Don Ross voted against continuing to list names alphabetically.

Council investigated the issue as a result of a request by Squamish resident and perennial council candidate Terrill Patterson, who is opposed to the alphabetical listing of names, saying it is unfair. Also on the election ballot will be included the phrase "vote for up to six candidates," in an effort to imply to voters that a person can vote for less than six candidates if desired.

Council has appointed deputy clerk Trudy Coates as chief election officer and clerk Joe Barry as deputy chief election officer for the November election.

## District served with court petition

The District of Squamish on Thursday was served with a B.C. Supreme Court petition made by two Brackendale residents who have applied to the court to quash the Squamish official community plan amendment bylaw adopted June 4, which allows for development and expansion of the municipal airport.

Upon service of the petition, the District of Squamish — if it wishes to be heard at the hearing of the petition or wishes to be notified of any further proceedings — has seven days to give notice of its

intention by filing an appearance in Supreme Court and delivering a copy of the appearance to the petitioners. The petition was made by Leonard Goldsmith and Thor Froslev. If the district fails to file an appearance form at the Supreme Court within the allotted seven days, the petitioners may continue their application without further notice.

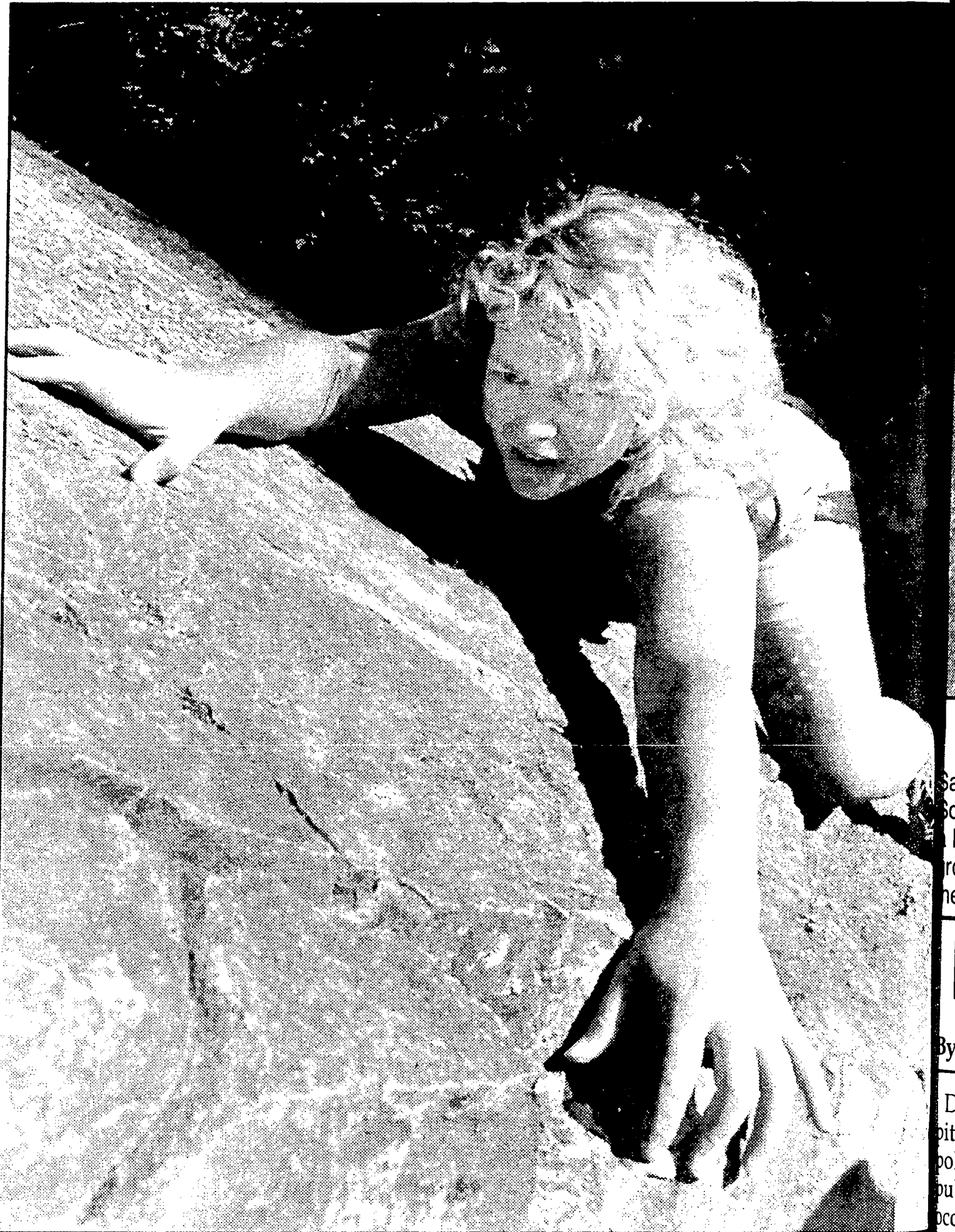
District administrator Bob Miles on Monday said the district's legal people are reviewing the document. He added that the district will be filing an appearance within the specified time frame.

The grounds upon which the

application by the petitioners for the orders sought is brought, are listed in the petition as:

- In amending its official community plan, the District of Squamish failed to provide proper disclosure of documents for the purpose of conducting a public hearing as required by the Municipal Act.

- In amending its official community plan, the District of Squamish exceeded its jurisdiction in that it has no expectation of acquiring the funds necessary to upgrade the Squamish municipal airport in order to effect the airport's expansion as contemplated in the official community plan amendment bylaw.

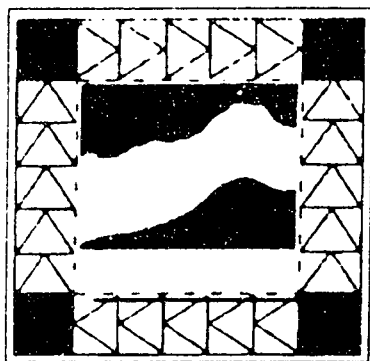

Forest Renewal B.C. launches program  
to assist small, medium-sized businesses

Forest Renewal B.C. has launched a community business program and has announced a new research program.

The provincial Crown corporation — created to reinvest funds into the forest — will provide financing and business planning assistance to small- and medium-sized forest sector businesses and will invest \$34.5 million in its first full year of research program activities throughout the province. Forest Renewal B.C.'s funds are obtained from increased stumpage that forest companies pay for the right to harvest timber of Crown lands.

As part of the community business program, community development corporations throughout the province are matching Forest Renewal B.C.'s \$5.6-million investment.

Credit unions in B.C. will also provide loans to forest sector businesses in the province, backed by a \$2-million Forest Renewal B.C. credit enhancement fund.

"Through this program, businesses will be able to access loans that were previously unavailable because financial institutions were cautious about approving loans to smaller forest sector businesses," said Forest Renewal B.C. chair Roger Stanyer.

Loans valued up to \$75,000 will be available on commercial terms to eligible businesses through the forest community loan fund. As well, the credit enhancement fund — which provides the B.C. Central Credit Unit with a \$2-million reserve fund — will lever up to \$5 million in lending by participating credit unions to support the provision of new loans, up to \$250,000 to small- and medium-sized forest sector businesses.

In 1996, Forest Renewal B.C.'s research program funding 447 research projects in six areas: land resources, environment, value-added, communities, workforce and extension (transferring research knowledge to people in the forest sector). The projects support Forest Renewal B.C.'s investment priorities, which are renewing the forests, protecting the environment, creating jobs, investing in training and strengthening forest communities.

Forest Renewal B.C. is working in partnership with the Science Council of British Columbia, which is administering the application and review processes.

With the first full round of funding allocations complete, Forest Renewal B.C. is assessing the 1997 funding priorities for research. The next call for proposals will be issued in the fall of 1996.

## Police will patrol slo-pitch

Drinking of alcoholic beverages at slo-pitch games in Squamish is a concern to police because of complaints from the public and impaired driving that may occur after games.

Sgt. Dwain Wetteland said the Squamish RCMP detachment has received, via the Howe Sound school board, complaints made by parents with children who have been playing on school grounds that drinking at slo-pitch games is taking place.

The school board has a policy that liquor is not to be consumed on its property. Many slo-pitch games occur on school board property.

"Other users of the grounds have been complaining," Wetteland said, adding that complaints have first been registered at the school and that the school district has then informed the police.

Wetteland said there have been children playing on school grounds in the vicinity of slo-pitch games seeing adults drinking and carrying on.

"Most of these people playing ball and having a beer after are also the people complaining about youths drinking in public. As far as I'm concerned, they're not setting any example for youths."

As well, anytime people have been drinking and then driving, there is a concern, Wetteland said. He said impaired driving — which is illegal — should not be confused with drunk driving. "Impairment is as soon as your normal body movements alter in any way."

Police, while aware of the drinking going on at slo-pitch games, are often on patrol on more pressing matters but will make patrols of the games when possible, Wetteland said. A fine of \$75 can be issued to a person for having open liquor in public.

## Blind Channel death accidental

Accidental drowning is being attributed as the cause of a death of a Squamish man whose body was found in Mamquam Blind Channel more than one week ago.

An autopsy last week determined that Christopher Todd Ryle, 34, died

as a result of drowning.

Police have classified his death as accidental.

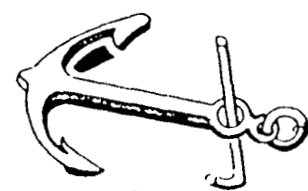
The B.C. Coroners Service will continue the investigation into the sudden death.

The results of an autopsy in another death on the Canada Day long week-

end are not yet available. George Edward Crawford, 36, of Vancouver, was found dead in a vehicle overturned in a metre of water in the creek at the Jack Webster bridge on Paradise Valley road in the Upper Cheakamus area by a passing motorist.

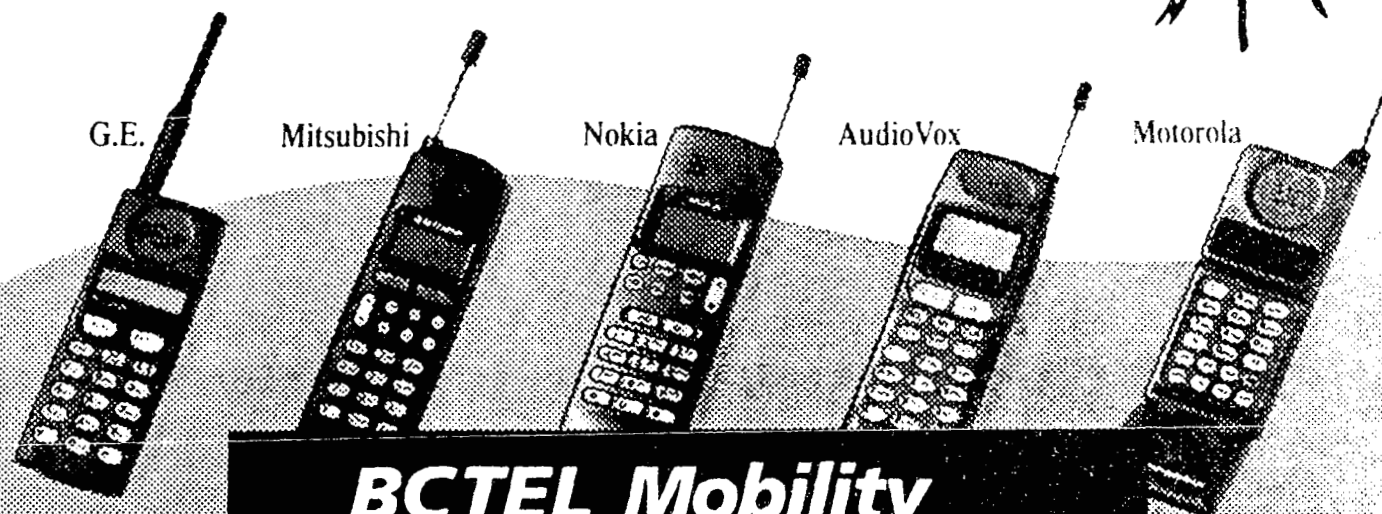

## A poor example

**P**oking back a couple of tall cool ones — or even short cool ones if they contain alcohol — will quickly become a thing of the past at slo-pitch games in Squamish. As you can read in a story elsewhere in this week's edition, if the league itself doesn't take action, the RCMP will. They have had several complaints about team members drinking at games on the school grounds, and we have also had some calls on the same subject here at The Chief.

There are three aspects to this issue. It is against the law to have open liquor in a public place, and there is no place considered to be more public than a school playing field. A few beers during or after a game could also lead to impairment, and all the tragic consequences which can go with that condition should the person then decide to drive home. It is also a really poor example to youngsters, who play regularly on the school grounds.

We're not saying slo-pitch promotes drinking, or that hordes of drunken slo-pitch louts are rampaging through the community on any given day. And this should not reflect on the slo-pitch tournaments and teams at Centennial field, or the beer gardens run at any tournaments, which are well run and obey the laws. But once again, a few rogues make it most difficult for the majority who abide by the rules.

There is probably no sport more benign than slo-pitch. It is competitive, but not savagely so. Players cheer when their opponents make good plays, rewarding the skill, balance or strength involved in the play regardless of who made it. Most of the teams have played against each other for years, and the camaraderie is a big part of the game. It is a fun game played by good people.

But the fact remains that at some league games, the beer drinking starts even before the game, and carries on well past the final fuzzy verbal replay. It is neither legal nor smart.

If it isn't stopped, there is little which can sober you up more quickly than a \$75 ticket. Police are prepared to do that, whether it's after, before or during a game, if it is taking place at a school field.

This should also serve as a warning to the other sports leagues in the community.

## A few find ways to beat the traffic

**J**ust when we say something nice about a major improvement to traffic flow on the highway, a few zipperheads come along and find ways to abuse the system.

Last week we commented on the new intersection at the industrial park and how it is a benefit to all drivers. Obviously a few don't see it that way.

In the past week we have noticed several instances in which drivers, behind a long line of traffic, will pull into the outside, non-turning lane. When the light goes green, they roar through the intersection into what is supposed to be the merge lane from traffic turning onto the highway from the industrial park or the new connector to Finch Drive, and use it as a passing lane.

Considering the general flow of traffic, this tactic might get a driver to his or her destination two or three minutes faster than if they had stayed where they were. But activities such as this add to the angst of other drivers, which is already high enough on this highway. It seems no matter what is done to improve things, there will be a few bozos in every crowd.

Perhaps in time, technology will be developed that will allow such drivers to be instantly vaporized off the road, to materialize again on a bumpy, gravel road 200 kilometres east of Williams Lake with four flat tires.

In the meantime, legislation against being a zipperhead is in order.

## NDP credibility unbalanced

**W**hat are we to make of the provincial government's balanced budget, which amazingly turned into a deficit of \$235 million mere weeks after the election was over?

On one hand, I am always suspicious of any balanced budget claims made by any politician, especially in an election campaign. Financially, the NDP has proven to be every bit as acrobatic as the former Social Credit governments of Bill Vander Zalm and Bill Bennett when it comes to hiding spending and borrowing so it doesn't appear in the general ledger.

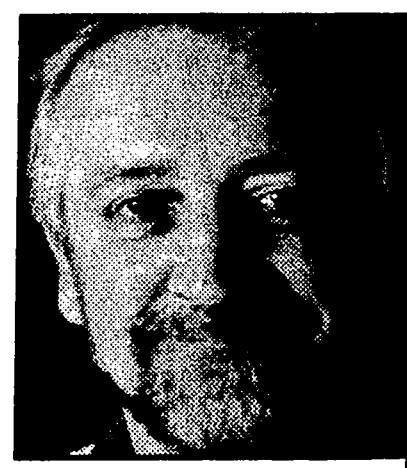
First Petter blamed the rev-

# Partying teenagers endanger horses

I am writing this letter to express my frustration and disappointment in a group of local youths.

For a few years now I have known about a group of teenagers partying in an area I believe they call First Beach. I have kept an eye on them but have left them alone because they really hadn't bothered the horses we keep in that area. However, last Tuesday night (June 25) they went too far.

When I arrived at my barn to feed my horses at about 8:20 p.m. I noticed a huge bonfire at the top end of my property. On further investigation I realized that a bunch of teens were having quite a party there. Not only were they willfully trespassing, they had littered the area with beer cans and broken beer bottles which could have really done damage to my horses' legs. As if that wasn't bad enough, they had also pulled up a fence post that was placed about four feet into the ground and taken down the fence, putting the lives of my horses in danger. The fence is there to keep my horses in. Occasionally by accident they do get out, but to deliberately take down the fence and smash beer bottles everywhere when it is known that horses are kept in the field is irresponsible and inexcusable.

I have always sympathized with a lot of the teens who live here. I have posted your letters in this paper about how "responsible" you really are. Well, I'm sorry, but none of that was evident Tuesday night.

I had to call the RCMP, who brought in the fire department to put out both fires these people had blazing.

I dread to think what would have happened if I had not gone to the barn when I did. Would my own horses, one of whom has been with me for 22 years and one of whom is just a youngster, have been okay? It isn't just the monetary value of these animals that has to be considered. These horses are beloved members of my family and have been raised with love and have a remarkable trusting nature in humans. To think that that trust could have been lost in one night of partying is unbearable.

I took out two bags of beer cans and broken glass and the party was just starting. I refuse to allow this type of thing to happen on my property. I was a teen too, but never did I willfully trespass or damage someone else's property. That basic respect was drilled into me from a very young age and it never entered my head to dispute it.

I would like to thank the RCMP and the fire department for responding so quickly and diffusing the situation.

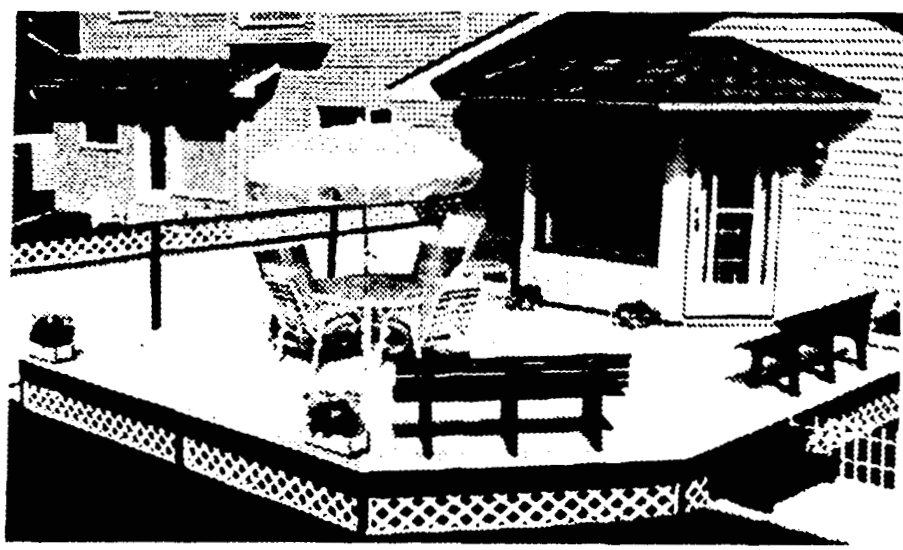

# Eagles must be protected

Editor,

Will the Squamish airport development have a detrimental effect on the world-record wintering bald eagle populations?

The airport is situated approximately a half-mile from the location where the eagles gather in their highest concentrations. Once the airport has been certified, it will be open for business.

It is absurd to assume that the only business that will result will be Cascadia's. Cascadia itself, in its proposal, forecasts that airport certification will generate \$150 million in economic activity over the first five years.

Will Cascadia's mere four flights per day (carrying passengers who are primarily if not exclusively destined for Whistler), generate that kind of economic activity for Squamish? The airport is located at the north end of Squamish, and

therefore Whistler-bound passengers will not pass through any of Squamish's existing commercial establishments while en route. Numerous public statements by Mayor Lonsdale and members of council clearly show the intention to establish a commercial airport at Brackendale, and that Cascadia's proposal is merely incidental to that.

It is equally absurd to assume that it is only Dash-7 aircraft that will use the airport.

As the federal government is no longer funding operating expenses for municipal airports, it will be necessary for Squamish to operate in a businesslike manner. Dash-7 aircraft are no longer manufactured and there are not very many of them still in use. Are we going to turn away business because the operator isn't using Dash-7s?

Any evaluation of the potential impact on the eagles that is restrict-

ed to the wishes of Cascadia and use of Dash-7 aircraft alone would be very short-sighted and incomplete. To ensure that the eagles are adequately protected, the issue must be viewed in terms of maximum use of the airport over the long term. The issue must also be viewed in terms of maximum potential use of the entire site which has now been designated for industrial use.

This world has witnessed countless environmental disasters that could have been prevented if the long-term effect of development had been considered at the onset. Hopefully, the powers that ultimately determine the fate of the Brackendale airport will keep this mind and ensure that the eagles are protected over the long term so that we can share them with future generations.

## Zero tolerance or testing machines

We read virtually every day of tragedies caused by drinking drivers. Our society condemns drunk driving, sets a legal blood alcohol limit, but at the same time encourages social drinking without providing a mechanism for the average person to test whether they are legally impaired.

If anything, current laws and customs create confusion, usually making it impossible for anyone to know whether they are legally impaired or not.

Beer commercials compete unabashedly with drinking driving counterattack ads. Servers routinely offer alcoholic beverages as part of a normal meal. Pubs make money by encouraging their patrons to increase blood alcohol levels. But those same establishments provide no way for customers to test their blood alcohol levels.

It is like a hopelessly unfair math question: what is blood alcohol level if I start with a beer, then have glass or two of wine with my meal, and end an hour later with a coffee and liqueur? Am I legally impaired? I consume one beer immediately (exact alcoholic content unknown), then follow that somewhat randomly with another three beers in two hours before driving home. To rectify this situation, we must either enforce a zero alcohol limit for drivers or require testing machines at the door of every place that serves liquor.

Pilots flying the open skies are not allowed to have measurable alcohol. Why should drivers on densely populated roads be allowed to observe a lower standard of care?

I would humbly suggest that the Squamish nation, elders, chief and council hold veto power over any proposed changes to such an environmentally sensitive area.

I would also suggest that the airport committee be formed by those people who have made written or verbal submissions at the public hearings, and that they be selected

by placing their names in a hat, being publicly and randomly selected, and not selected by political appointment. No in camera meetings.

We must adopt the traditional custodial attitudes towards Squamish territories (when Rome, do as the Romans do) and vigorously protect this unique the-world eagle phenomenon in the threatened environment we in. For our children's children.

**Between Shifts Wins Provincial Award**

Between Shifts Theatre won the Darrell Phillips Award for the best showcase production for its play *Leaving Home* at the provincial drama festival in Kamloops over the weekend. The production was staged twice, once in its original presentation, and again after the crew had worked with David Ross, artistic director of Western Canada Theatre in Kamloops. *Leaving Home* was competing against seven other productions from around the province chosen to workshop with professionals.

## District to improve conditions for cyclists

The District of Squamish will sign a cost-sharing agreement with the provincial cycling network program to provide 300 metres of shoulder bikeway on the east side of Buckley Avenue between Squamish Elementary School and Carson Place. The district applied for the grant last year at the insistence of Squamish resident Terrill Patterson. The district had also applied for a similar provincial grant for a shared shoulder bikeway in Brackendale, but was turned down. The district intends to reapply for a grant for the Brackendale project, said public works director Mike Darbyshire. Even without receiving the grant, Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said the Brackendale item could be included in next year's budget discussions.

Council will spend about \$2,500 on installing a culvert and placing fill where a trail linking the industrial park and the old highway crosses a ditch. Currently, there are two narrow boards that span the ditch. The path is used by cyclists and walkers and is intended to be part of the Squamish trail network. Council addressed the issue as a result of a request by Squamish resident Terrill Patterson — who regularly rides his bike along the trail — to make the improvement to the existing trail.

The district is moving ahead with installing a ground water test production well near the confluence of Mamquam River and Mashiter Creek. Council awarded the tender to install the well to Columbia Water Wells for \$31,150, plus taxes. There is \$100,000 identified for the project, however hydro service must still be provided and a pump must be purchased. The district has been involved in ground water exploration as an additional source of water to the municipality, which currently relies upon surface water from Stawamus River and Mashiter Creek. The district is exploring ground water sources because: there is a possibility of the future imposition of surface water treatment regulations, which usually must be met by installing costly water treatment plants; the district

has been exceeding during hot spells its water licence on Stawamus River; there is increasing pressure from government regulatory bodies to ensure there are adequate water flows for fisheries values downstream from intakes.

### Council Briefs

Council authorized several expenditures by Squamish Fire Rescue. The fire department will spend about \$13,000 for a new radio repeater system. Currently, the fire department experiences reception and transmission problems while using portable to mobile communication with its two-way radios. Sometimes important messages must be delayed, which have a material effect on operations, according to a memorandum from fire chief Pat Hampson to council.

As well, about \$18,000 will be spent for four new breathing apparatus units for firefighters. Breathing equipment has a finite life of 10 to 15 years and must be discarded for safety reasons, Hampson said.

And about \$4,800 will be spent on the purchase of two computers for the fire department from Bandyman Computer Services, which submitted the low bid to supply the two computers.

In another memorandum from fire chief Pat Hampson to council, it was recommended that the district purchase a triple combination pumper with a 23-metre ladder and a full complement of ground ladders for a total price of \$562,150. However, council did not deal with the item that was included in its agenda. Hampson said the item will be dealt with at a later date.

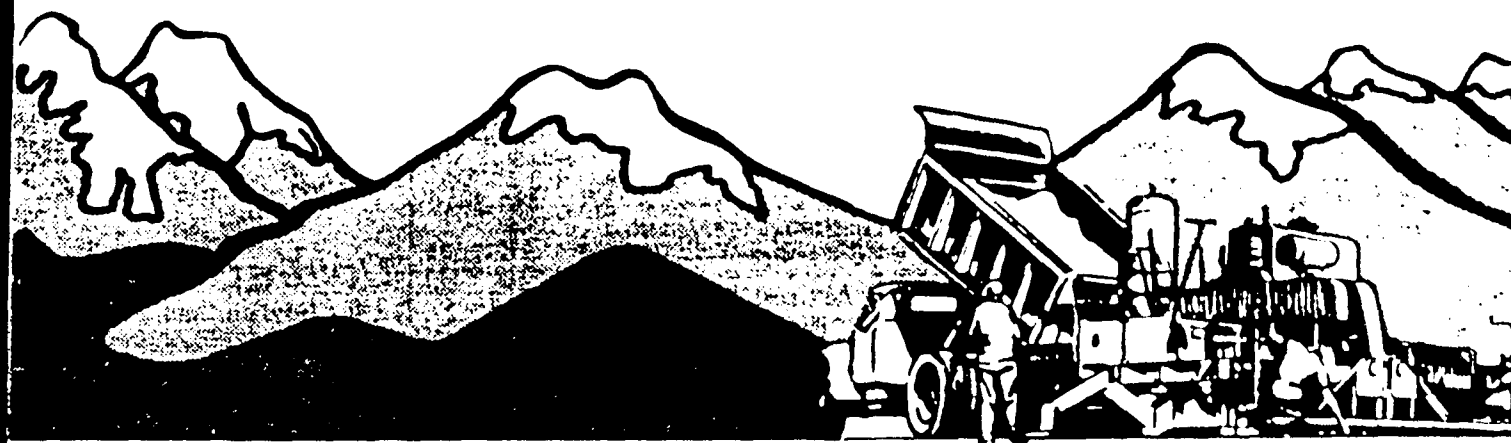
The memorandum says the fire department has demonstrated there are safety concerns regarding firefighter injury when using 12-metre ground ladders to access existing residential and commercial construction.

The current trend in construction shows that commercial buildings are exceeding the reach of the 12-metre ladders. As well, there is a trend to build multi-family structures well beyond the reach of even the longest ladder available, which is 15 metres.

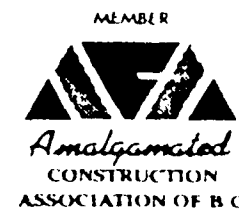

# Most school projects completed before freeze

Howe Sound school officials are breathing a sigh of relief that several major capital construction projects were completed over the past few years, given the provincial government's recent decision to

freeze spending on all capital projects — including new schools and renovations.

"We're fortunate to have gotten the approvals for all of the construction we've had in the last three or four years, because that gives us good base to start (dealing with the district's growth)," said

district superintendent Doug Courtice. "Some of the districts, such as Richmond and Surrey, are screaming ... they're really up against it."

If funding for projects such as Whistler secondary, Pemberton secondary and Brackendale elementary schools had been delayed a year or two, those projects would have fallen under the freeze and created similar overcrowding problems in the Howe Sound district, he said.

Only one district project is currently affected by the funding freeze — planning money estimated at about \$800,000 for the expansion to Brackendale secondary school is now sitting on ice.

"Without the planning dollars we can't do anything," said Courtice.

However, with the district's current load of portables and the opening of a new high school in Whistler this September, space for students in the Howe Sound district for the 1996/97 school year should be adequate, he said.

"We've got some space problems, but I think we have enough portables and enough spaces to be able to facilitate what we need." What will happen in future years is still up for debate, though. Courtice said the Ministry of Education will be reviewing all capital projects in the province and may release some of the freezes. But that process is expected to take up to six months.

"We're going to have housing for all of our students for the coming school year and hopefully they will let us continue on with our capital plan."

Future projects that could be affected include the expansion of the new Whistler secondary and the planning and construction of a new Whistler elementary school. When it opens in September, Whistler Secondary — A Community School will already exceed its maximum capacity by 100 students.

As of last week the high school already

had 311 students registered, prompting district officials to add four portables to the school grounds for September.

Projected enrolment figures for the school are estimated to hit 573 students by the year 2005. But even that figure may be low, as current projections for this year were estimated at 206 students.

Whether Whistler secondary will expand to include even more portables in its second year will depend on how many students turn up in classrooms in September, Courtice said.

"We'll be in a better position to know what will happen in the following year once we get actual bodies in the school this year," he said, adding the school is currently staffed for only 260 students.

Myrtle Philip community school is also expected to be bursting at the seams in the coming years, as enrolment for 1996/97 is about the same as last year — even though the school's Grade 7 classes are moving to Whistler secondary.

Figures for Myrtle Philip show the Whistler elementary school population almost doubling in the next decade to more than 700 students.

"We're concerned, but there's not much we can do until (the ministry) tells us what their plan is and what we'll be working with," Courtice said.

As growth is anticipated throughout Howe Sound, all of the district's portables are currently assigned to schools.

"We try to use them where they are needed," he said. However, if some schools show more growth than others, portables may be relocated to compensate.

Howe Sound school officials are currently working on revisions to the district's capital plan and will be reviewing the district's projected population growth with Education Ministry officials and representatives from local governments this summer.

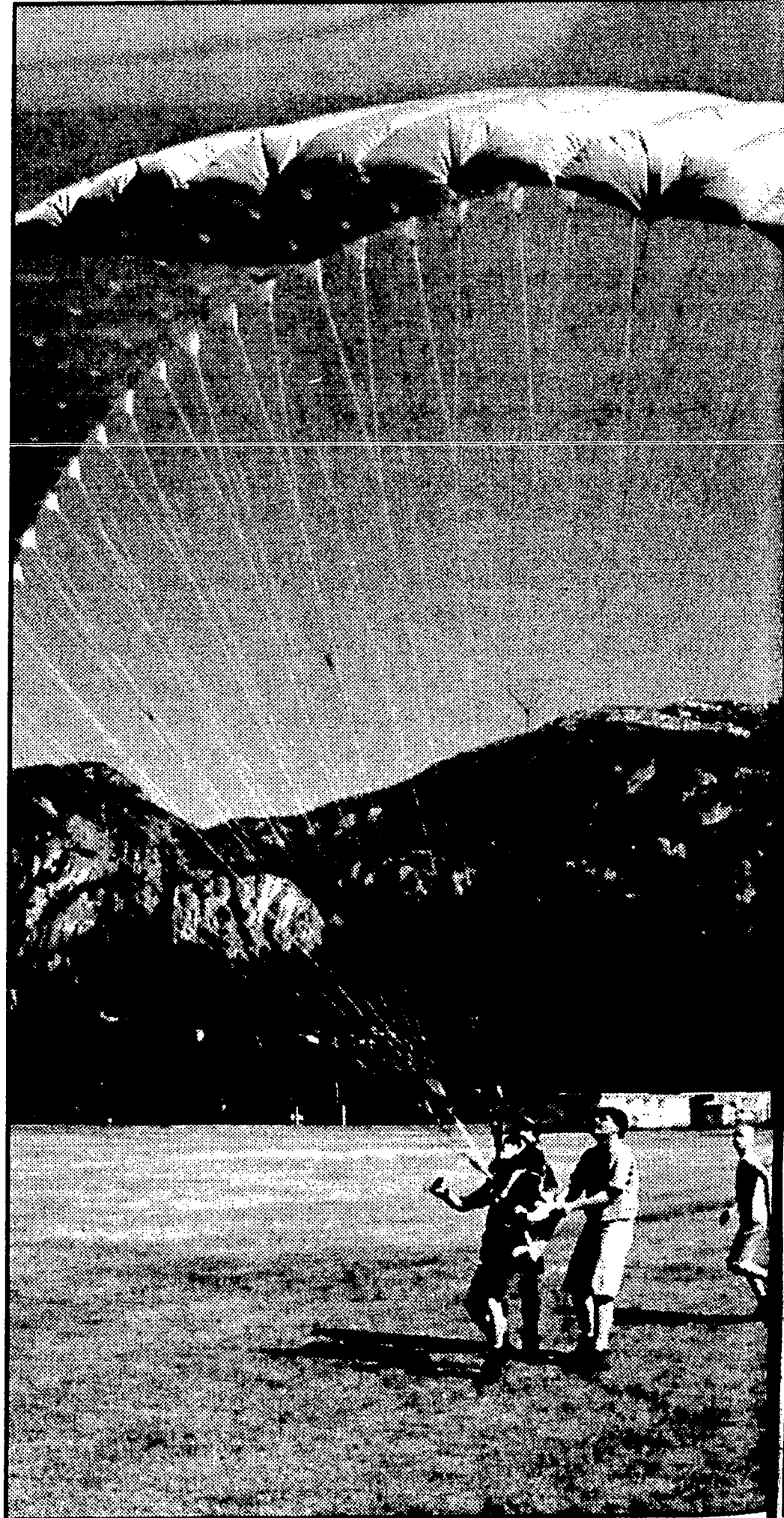

# Britannia Beach man jumps into area of submerged rocks

An 18-year-old Britannia Beach man sustained back injuries after jumping from cliffs into Brohm Lake in an area where there are submerged rocks. B.C. Ambulance Service, Squamish Fire Rescue, RCMP and Squamish Search and Rescue members helped rescue the man, who had been helped to shore by other people in the area. The search and rescue jet boat was used to transport the man to the ambulance. Const. Fran Bethell said people should be reminded about the dangers of cliff jumping and the difficulty in seeing submerged rocks. There have been numerous injuries at Brohm Lake. A few years ago a man died after jumping from a cliff and landing on rocks submerged in the water.

## Council will assist Legion's property tax woes

Council will provide a grant-in-aid of \$3,250.63 to assist the Diamond Head branch of The Royal Canadian Legion in paying property taxes that have increased as a result of assessment reclassification.

The Legion and the property's

prospective purchaser, Gulf Pacific Group, successfully appealed the property values with the British Columbia Assessment Authority in 1995. However, the assessment appeal board reclassified a portion of the assessment from recreation non-profit to business. The result of the change was an increase in taxes

because the tax rates for business are considerably more than recreation non-profit rates.

Council agreed to provide the grant-in-aid with verbal assurance from Legion representatives that if the property was sold before the end of the year, it would return a prorated portion of the money. Legion treasurer June Gardner said that she did not believe the Legion membership would expect the district to aid a developer's tax payment.

Council, however, did announce at the meeting that it intends to rescind bylaws which would have allowed Gulf Pacific to develop a shopping centre and build a new facility for the Legion on the site. The Legion is attempting to sell a major portion of its property in an attempt to improve its poor financial situation.

The Legion's 1995 revised property assessment is \$994,000. The Legion's 1995 revised property tax bill amounted to more than \$21,000.

## Students seek more language courses

An increasing interest in foreign languages is causing Howe Sound Secondary School to consider adding to its course offerings.

Enough students have shown an interest in Spanish and Japanese to allow the school to go ahead with plans to offer new language courses at the Grade 11 level during the 1996-97 school year.

And when school resumes in fall, students will be asked to complete a survey to determine if there is enough interest to offer Punjabi and German as well, school principal Marg Pallot said.

"We have quite an eclectic group in the school," Pallot said in reference to the variety of languages in which students are inter-

ested. "It's good to see that in this day and age."

Pallot and Squamish Coun. Paul Lalli in early June attended, along with representatives from five other school districts and the Ministry of Education, a workshop in Surrey about offering Punjabi as part of the school curriculum. There is already a basic foundation for a Punjabi course in place.

About seven per cent of both the populations of the District of Squamish and of Howe Sound Secondary are made up of people who are Indo-Canadian.

The greatest difficulty in offering additional language courses at the school is not in generating student interest but rather in finding qualified teachers. Teachers for the proposed language courses

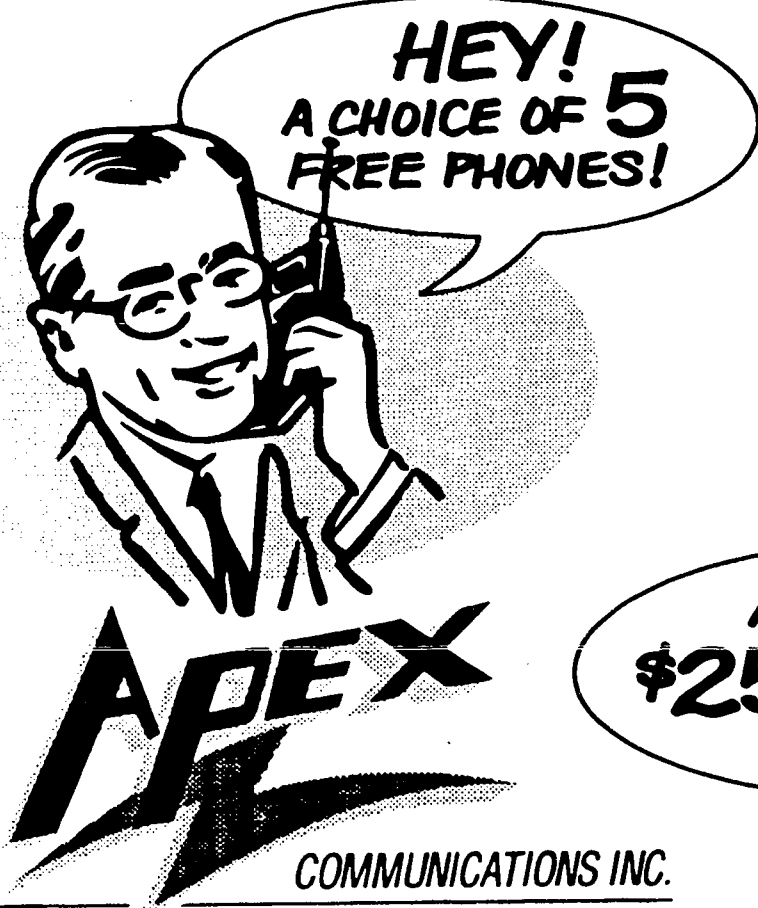
must possess a valid British Columbia teaching certificate.

The school has offered and will continue with a course of the traditional language of the Squamish Nation. Of course, French is also a mainstay at the school.

Thirty-eight students have expressed an interest in studying Spanish, which Pallot attributes to an increase in Mexican tourists travelling to Canada and an interest in students to travel to Mexico and America.

A total of 26 students would like to study Japanese, which is a valuable language to know. The Sea to Sky corridor, with the large number of Japanese tourists travelling to this area, is a good reason to offer the course. Teachers for the proposed language courses

# Employers and students benefit from career programs

*More than 100 companies and government agencies honored for their efforts*

Companies throughout the Sea to Sky corridor have responded with enthusiasm to the Howe Sound school district's career programs. The more than 100 companies and government agencies were honored for their efforts at an employer appreciation luncheon at Howe Sound Secondary School June 25.

With 29,000 students per year graduating from secondary schools in British Columbia and 16,000 of those going on to post-secondary studies, the fate of the remaining 13,000 lies in the career programs that are now mandatory for high school graduation, Ministry of Skills, Training and Labor representative Frank Pavan said at the luncheon.

To graduate, students must complete a 30-hour work experience program. However, many students go further and become involved in cooperative work placements, career preparation programs, job shadowing or trade apprenticeship programs. The first apprenticeship program in the secondary school system in the province was started at Howe Sound Secondary, and two graduating students — Alex McLeod and Jordan Baker — have received awards to continue their studies in the mechanics trade at British Columbia Institute of Technology.

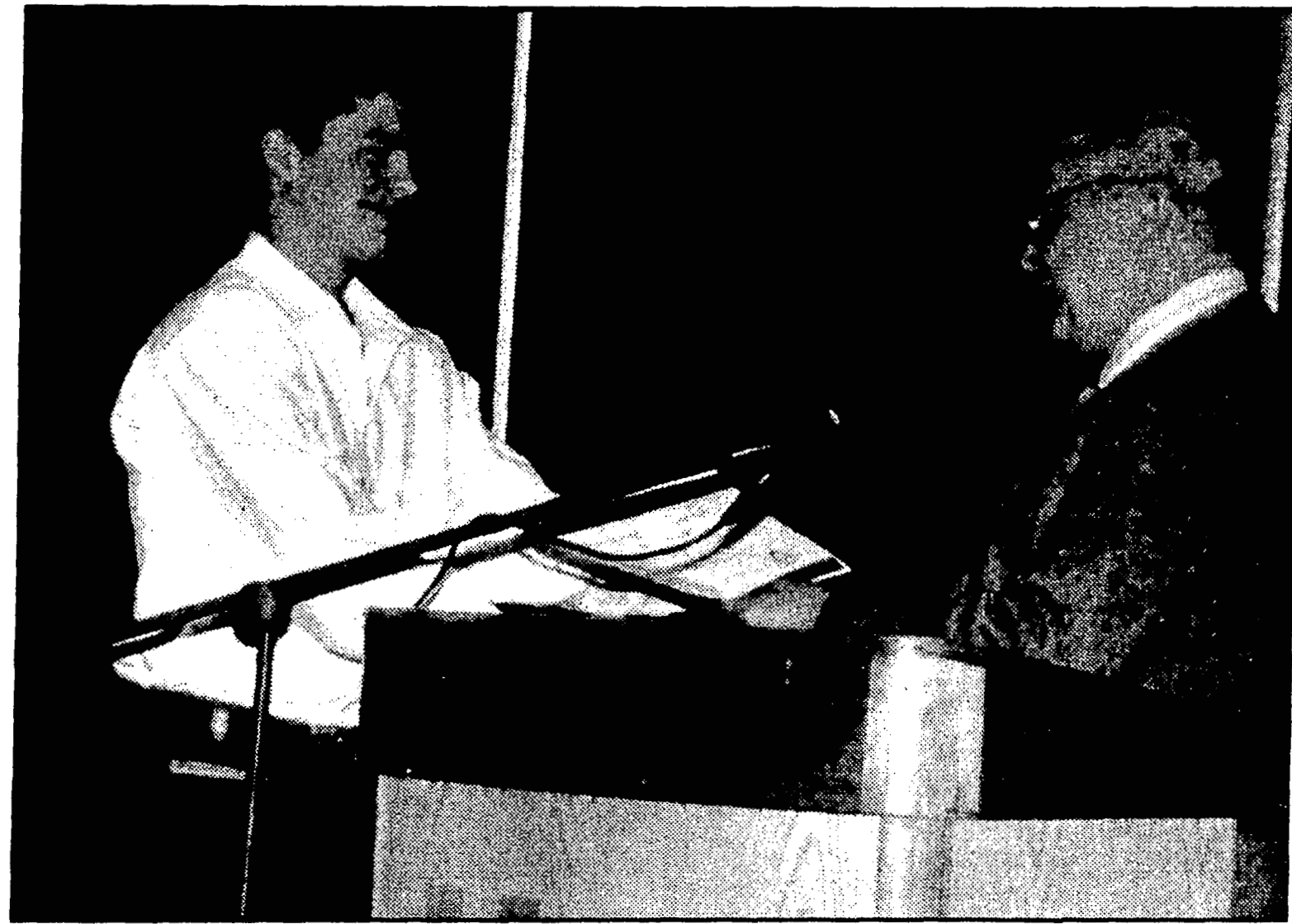

Howe Sound School District CEO Doug Courtice lauded participating employers as well as school staff and students in making the career programs a success.

Howe Sound Secondary principal Marg Pallot said the career programs "really make a difference" in the lives of students, in their futures and how they feel about themselves.

"It helps them develop skills they can't develop in the school. They get one to one contact with employers. Teachers and parents can talk to students, but when (students) get out

there working with adults and seeing what it takes for a career, then they start really taking an interest."

Graduating student Jodi Lewis, who obtained work experience in a Grade 1 class at Squamish Elementary School, said she had been considering

studying education, but was not quite sure if that was the path she should follow.

"I learned lessons and what it took to be a teacher. It was hands-on training. I learned the most important skill is patience." Lewis will enter the education faculty at the University of Victoria in fall.

Danae Johnson, employee relations coordinator for Whistler Mountain, said the 12 "ambitious and energetic" students who took part in the program at Whistler Mountain "are our future" and were a breath of fresh air for staff.

She said Whistler Mountain's commitment to the career programs was its "opportunity to provide an opportunity to hone the skills students are so thirsty for."

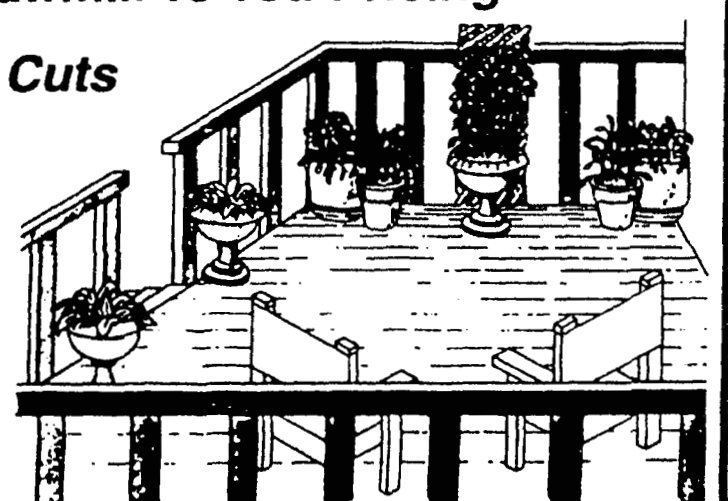

# Questions and answers on the OCP review process

This is the first in a series of articles on the District of Squamish official community plan and planning in general. As an introduction to the official community plan update, the following is a list of questions many people want to know about, but may be afraid to ask.

**What is an official community plan?**

An official community plan is a "general statement of broad community objectives and policies of the local government respecting the form and character of existing and proposed land use and servicing requirements" for the District of Squamish. should be. The OCP is a document containing text, maps, and charts, which provides direction for establishing various municipal regulations

## OCP Update

(zoning, subdivision, development permits, and developer's applications). The OCP is used when assessing development applications.

**What is wrong with the existing OCP?**

The current Squamish OCP was adopted in 1989. Ideally an OCP is updated every five years and it has been seven years since the current plan was adopted by council. The OCP is being reviewed at this time to:

- Obtain public input from all residents, including new residents since 1989. The population of Squamish has increased by 38 per cent over the last 10 years (from 10,167 in 1986 to 14,000 in 1996).

- Acknowledge and incorporate the physical changes and community growth since 1989.

- Examine the findings of a number of major studies including the Cheekye fan terrain hazard and land use study, commercial needs assessment

study, Squamish trails enhancement study, tourism master plan, drainage studies and others.

- Review of the applicability and effectiveness of existing OCP.

- Address new issues and concerns since 1989 including stream stewardship, economic development, dike maintenance and upgrade, growth of tourism, greenways initiatives, growth management, and affordable housing.

- New legislation effecting municipal planning has been passed by the provincial government. This affects affordable and special needs housing, planning of school facilities, social planning and heritage conservation.

**How does the OCP affect me?**

The OCP affects everyone in Squamish as it is the document which establishes how Squamish

will grow and evolve in the future. If you have any plans to develop property in Squamish it must be in accordance with the OCP. It is the mechanism where the community can retain, provide and protect community values.

**How can I get involved?**

An OCP will only be successful if it has the support of the community. That is why your public involvement is so essential. Your views are important.

Opportunities for public input include the following:

- Questionnaire. A one-page questionnaire was mailed to all residences and businesses at the end of June. Additional copies are available at Municipal Hall.

- A citizens' advisory committee will monitor the OCP review and offer advice to council throughout the process. If you are interested in serving on this committee, please send your name and a brief description about yourself to Mayor Corinne Lonsdale at Municipal Hall by July 15.

- A visioning workshop will be held early in September to develop vision for the Squamish OCP. Details regarding place and time will be announced in The Squamish Chief.

- Neighborhood meetings will be held throughout Squamish in late September through October to record your views on issues important to your neighborhood and the community in general. Meeting dates and locations will be announced in The Squamish Chief.

- Open houses and meetings will be scheduled. These are anticipated to take place in January 1997.

- When a final plan has been considered as a bylaw, a public hearing will be held as required under the Municipal Act.

Do you have any more questions? If so, please contact the planning department at Municipal Hall.

The purpose of this OCP update is to encourage a provocative thought on issues regarding the OCP review. In the next edition I will discuss the questionnaire results and address the OCP update. 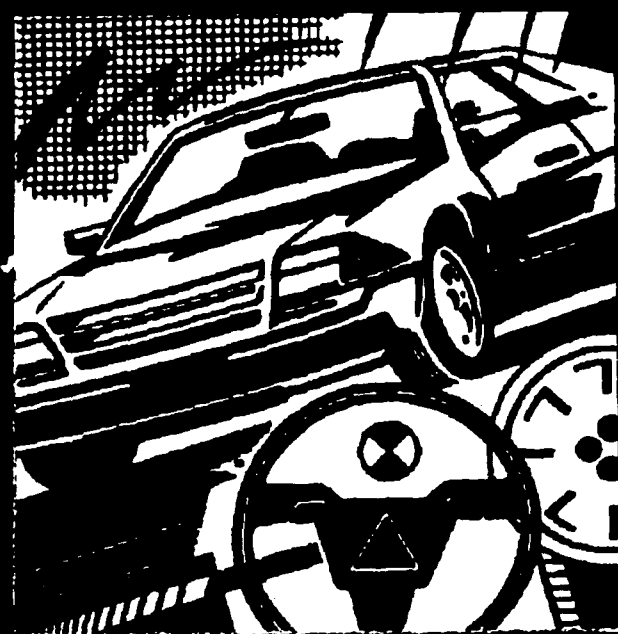

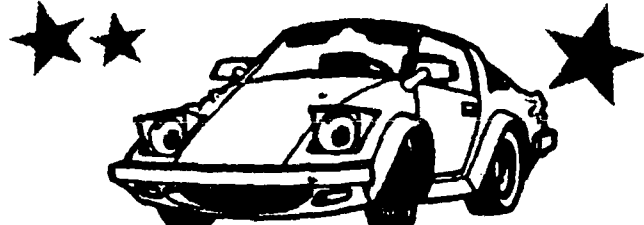

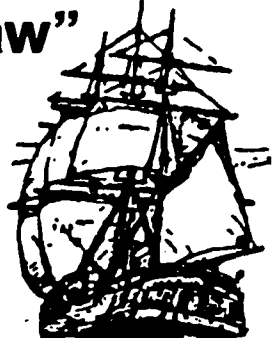

## Dearth of arts due to the great outdoors

**H**ave you ever taken a good look around and noticed how much there is to do around here? I don't mean just in Squamish — I'm talking about the southwestern British Columbia coast. It truly is one huge outdoor playground with activities that continue year-round.

There really is no off-season with the variety of recreational opportunities and the mild — albeit sometimes wet — weather summer and winter. It's not like the Prairies, where you have to overdose on outdoor experiences to carry you through the long, cold, dark winters when curled up beside a fireplace with a good book is the preferred activity.

But one of the fruits of the sharply contrasting Prairie seasons is a plethora of cultural institutions and a vibrant arts community. And vice-versa, one of the reasons for relative dearth of cultural and arts activity on the West Coast is a preoccupation with the great outdoors.

For a city that has the gall to itself world-class — that strives to place itself in the league of the bright lights of New York, London or Paris — Vancouver looks remarkably dim when one looks past its spectacular setting. Most certainly, it blows away these other megapolises when it comes to outdoor recreation opportunities, but it is lacking in many other respects. One need only look to Georgia Street and the Vancouver Art Gallery, which is really a pitiful excuse for the representative art gallery of a world-class city. Sure, the Emily Carr collection is beautiful. And yes, the gallery is one of only three Canadian cities to host this year's Group of Seven exhibition. Just down the road is the Vancouver Public Library. Designed by Moshe Safdie, it is at least architecturally interesting, especially when compared to the box across the street that is the outwardly uninspiring Ford Centre for the Performing Arts. Upon entering the library complex, I got the feeling of being very alone and abandoned in a coldly cavernous and unwelcome space. Elsewhere in Vancouver, developers continue to destroy heritage homes and buildings in favor of the generic West Coast green

glass, steel and concrete image that is so popular.

Let's face it — people are too worried about getting out — and looking good at the same time — onto the ski slopes, hiking trails, rivers and oceans to be concerned with lowly distractions like the arts. Vancouverites must make up one of the most outdoor recreation-crazed populations in the world.

In places like Winnipeg, Edmonton, Regina and Saskatoon, the need to endure seemingly endless winters actually appears to stimulate the creative soul. At the least, it ensures there is adequate time to compose and play music, write books and plays, produce films and theatre — or enjoy the performances of those who

are doing these things. What else is there to do when it's -35 C? Skiers are more concerned with avoiding frostbite than actually skiing, winter camping could be better termed winter survival and only a few brave souls dare ride their bicycles anytime between November and April. It is no wonder that some great writers have emerged from these frigid climes. It is not surprising that these smaller cities have burgeoning arts communities.

And it is far from shocking that the supposed world-class city like Vancouver is so lacking a world-class art and cultural scene. At least we have world-class sailing, windsurfing, climbing, hiking, skiing...well, you know, the list goes on and on. People don't live here for artistic stimulation, but rather for natural inspiration — and for that, this area is world-class.

## Youth Action Teams launched in Lower Mainland

Sasha Vracarevic, a 21-year-old Vancouver resident, has been selected as Lower Mainland regional youth worker for the provincewide Youth Action Team initiative, Attorney General Ujjal Dosanjh announced last week.

"We set up this initiative to ensure young people play a lead role in tackling youth violence and crime, and are part of the solution," said Dosanjh. "Sasha has a tremendous amount of experience that will help youth in the lower mainland develop and put into action crime prevention programs for themselves and their communities."

The action team initiative was announced in April by Dosanjh and Premier Glen Clark, who is also minister responsible for youth. More than 60 communities across the province are participating in the initiative to address local issues relating to violence and crime and focusing on safe communities. A youth meeting to get the action team rolling in Squamish will be held later in the year.

"I've said many times since I became premier there's no greater responsibility our generation has than to provide hope to the next one," said Clark. "The action team initiative is an investment in our young people, a way of ensuring young British Columbians can use their enthusiasm and creative ideas to contribute to their communities and build a better future."

Vracarevic and six other regional youth workers across B.C. will consult with youth to develop the action teams. They will also provide support and training to help the teams plan and organize activities relating to: crime and violence prevention; peer mentorship and positive role modelling; conflict resolution and problem solving; leadership development; and community

improvement.

The action teams will work closely with members of the B.C. Youth Police Network, and with other youth, community agencies, crime prevention programs and parent groups. In 23 communities the action teams will also lead the Nights Alive initiative. Nights Alive, announced by the provincial government earlier this spring, provides positive recreational alternatives to youth crime, utilizing schools and recreation centres after hours for sports, arts, music and other activities.

Vracarevic has been working in the field of youth violence and crime prevention for the last three years. He has been a member of 841-KOZ, the acclaimed youth crime prevention drama group; he has developed youth-led violence prevention projects and workshops; and he has collaborated on and acted in two crime and violence-prevention videos. He has also done work with young offenders.

## Upscale Mexican food and drink

Fajitas, a variety of taco, are a fairly recent addition to the Mexican food scene. They were born of necessity in the huge agricultural fields of the southern States, where migrant Mexican laborers could leave the toughest, cheapest cuts of beef to marinate all day while they worked. Come evening, the meat would be grilled over the fire before being sliced thinly and eaten in a soft tortilla. Whatever fresh produce, be it onions, peppers and tomatoes would garnish the meat and round out the meal. Many southern dishes were created under conditions of grinding poverty, only to be "discovered" later by mainstream cooks. For upscale chefs, their palates inspired by the rich and exotic, simple by overlooked ingredients are inspirational. Fajitas do this upwardly mobile tradition justice by providing the deep elemental flavors of good food.

The best cut of beef to use for fajitas is flank steak, marinated then grilled on the barbecue for a smoky taste. Without a barbecue, use a cast iron skillet to brown the meat well, leaving the inside pink and juicy. To serve four people you will need:  
2 large flour tortillas  
sour cream  
guacamole  
salsa

## Beef Fajitas

1/2 to 2 lb. flank steak  
Marinated in:  
1/2 cup dry red wine  
1/4 cup fresh lime juice  
4 large cloves garlic, pressed  
dried or fresh hot red pepper  
few grinds black pepper  
Place the steak in a bowl with the marinade. Cover and refrigerate overnight. When ready to cook, remove the steak and pat dry.  
1 Tbsp. oil  
Onions, sliced  
green peppers, sliced  
Heat the oil in a large skillet. Fry the onions and pep-

pers on medium heat until soft and lightly browned, about 15 minutes. Pour in a few spoonfuls of marinade part way through frying. Let it boil away.

While the vegetables cook, either grill the meat on a barbecue, or heat a cast iron skillet until smoking hot. Pour in 2 Tbsp. oil and sear the meat on each side. Reduce heat to medium and fry the steak until medium rare. Remove the meat to a cutting board and slice across the grain into thin slices. Add the meat slices and juices from the cutting board to the cooked vegetables. Season with salt and pepper.

Heat the tortillas. Bring the skillet of meat to a sizzle. Serve at once at the table from the cast iron skillet. Place a spoonful of meat in each tortilla, top with guacamole, sour cream and salsa. Roll up and eat.

Serve with icy cold Mexican beer, Corona or Dos Equis. Or better yet, Sangria.

## Strawberry Sangria

1 — 750 ml bottle dry red wine  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 — 50 ml (miniature bottle size) brandy (or 3 Tbsp.)  
1 — 50 ml bottle Grand Marnier (or 3 Tbsp. orange liqueur)  
2 cups fresh sliced strawberries  
2 oranges  
juice of a large lemon — about 3-4 Tbsp.  
1 litre chilled soda water  
ice

In a large glass jug, stir together the wine and sugar. Add the brandy and Grand Marnier. Stir to dissolve sugar. Thinly slice one half of an orange. Add the orange slices and strawberries to the wine. Cover and let steep several hours or overnight in the fridge. Before serving, juice the remaining one and one half oranges. Stir the orange and lemon juice into the wine mixture. Taste for balance of flavors. Adjust if necessary. Serve from a pitcher or punch bowl. Add the ice and soda. You may not want to use the full litre of soda water. Taste to judge. To keep all the sparkle in the drink, pour into tall glasses over ice and dilute each serving with soda water.

## Squamish soccer players will be going somewhere with new travel team

Squamish soccer players who are serious about developing their skills and reaching higher levels in the sport are getting the chance with the formation of a new travel team playing in the Vancouver Tri City Soccer League.

Local soccer fathers Bob Mahnger and Les Pongracz had been working on the idea of forming a team to play in Vancouver to get exposure to a higher calibre of soccer. When Richard Dawson moved to Squamish in December, too late to enrol his kids in Howe Sound youth soccer, Mahnger and Pongracz approached him and they put together the idea of forming travel teams of under-13 and under-14 players. The three will divide the coaching duties; all are registered in upcoming national coaching clinics and Dawson has completed level 1 and level 2 of the Canadian National Coaching Certification Program at Langara College and has achieved his class 3 referee status.

With the blessing of the Howe Sound Youth Soccer Association, open tryouts were held in June to determine the level of interest local players would have in joining this type of team. Not enough under 14 players turned out for a full team, however, and the organizers are still trying to determine how interested players in that age group can participate. Dawson says not as many of the older kids are as interested because of all the other sports available in Squamish, dividing the athlete's participation time.

"In a place like Squamish there are so many opportunities for kids to get involved in sports it's difficult for them to commit time and energy to just one."

Dawson says this team will be for kids who are more inclined to play soccer than any other sport and are committed to a team effort, a minority of sorts in North America, where soccer isn't as popular as other sports. He says in North America when soccer players reach ages 12-13, 85 per cent of them drop out, whereas in Europe and South America, 87 per cent of players continue to play.

"It's a way of life there. If I rolled a soccer ball down a street I'd have 15 kids playing on it before it got to the end. Here we have hockey" as the major sport of interest. But with hockey being "quite expensive and the limited time kids have on the ice, I always thought soccer was a much easier alternative for kids to get into."

The kids who will be playing on the travel team have been weeded out from among 50 trying out in a four-week period. From the beginning the coaches let them know what they would be in for — which accounted for a significant number of drop-outs. "We didn't pull any punches," Dawson says. "We have a more disciplined physical training program — not just show up and run around the field and play on the weekend for fun. It's a little more disciplined and structured than that and not all kids are able to adapt themselves to that."

Dawson is hoping some of the older kids who are keen on playing but didn't have enough players to form their own team will be able to play on the same team as the younger players. He says the skill level of these players doesn't vary with the age differences, only their physical size and strength. "I've seen kids born in '85 who are better with the ball than kids born in '83."

Playing in the Tri City league will benefit these Squamish players in the development of their skills. The calibre of competition will be a step above; the players in this league are true aficionados, Dawson says. These are the kids who want to push their abilities beyond the recreational league level, are dedicated to getting better and are willing to put in the extra time. All the organization is done by the players and their parents — fundraising, tournaments, practices and coaching.

The question of whether Squamish players are good enough to compete in this league is moot — Dawson

doesn't believe in judging players on technical proficiency but on the effort they put into playing. The players chosen for the travel team were the ones who "have the heart and desire and ability to take instructions and be able to learn as opposed to imitate." He says Squamish players will do well because of the interest from both players and parents.

There are many different levels of play in the Tri City league: bronze, silver and gold, with different divisions within each level. Squamish will enter in the silver level and play until December, when it will be decided if they're good enough to move up, not good enough and move down, or stay where they are. The season runs from September to May with some games to be played in Squamish when weather and field schedules permit. Having a travel team also opens up year-round opportunities to play in out-of-town tournaments as far away as Prince George, Seattle and even Mexico.

Dawson worked with a Mexican travel team at a Terrace soccer clinic last summer, which greatly influenced his philosophy of coaching. "I was moved to see how close the coach was to the players. He didn't have to yell, he would just talk and they would listen. There was a lot of respect and admiration on both sides — it was a beautiful thing to see."

The coaches have systems of monitoring players' progress to determine exactly how much they improve with more structured practicing and playing at a higher level. A skill level checklist based on percentage increases for a specific skill will accurately track a player's improvements. A drill such as dribbling or passing will be initially introduced in a practice and players will be recorded on how well and fast they complete it. At approximately one-month intervals, they will be recorded on the same drills and the results will determine the level of improvement. The players will also be taught skills such as monitoring their own heart rates and relaxation techniques which will teach them how to become mentally focused and alert — actual techniques as opposed to the coaches just telling them to be that way. They will be able to incorporate this into their practice structure and see the results for

themselves. With all the aerobic and physical exercise combined with these practice skills, it may sound like the coaches are being tough but the kids on this team are the ones who want it that way.

"It's our responsibility as coaches to make sure learning takes place in an environment where they are to get some satisfaction out of doing it," Dawson says.

The coaches will also be strict about player attitude. "If you don't come to practices, you don't play. If you don't participate in fund-raising, you don't play. If a coach sees players who like to clown around and cause trouble, they will be spoken to and if their behavior doesn't change, they won't play."

"We just want the kids to have a good time and use their soccer skills to a level they want to take it to."

Doug Allin pitched all three victories for Gardner GM while pickup player Craig Pidcock took both wins against Williams Lake. Allin was voted most valuable player of the tournament, pitching three wins, zero losses and batting .525.

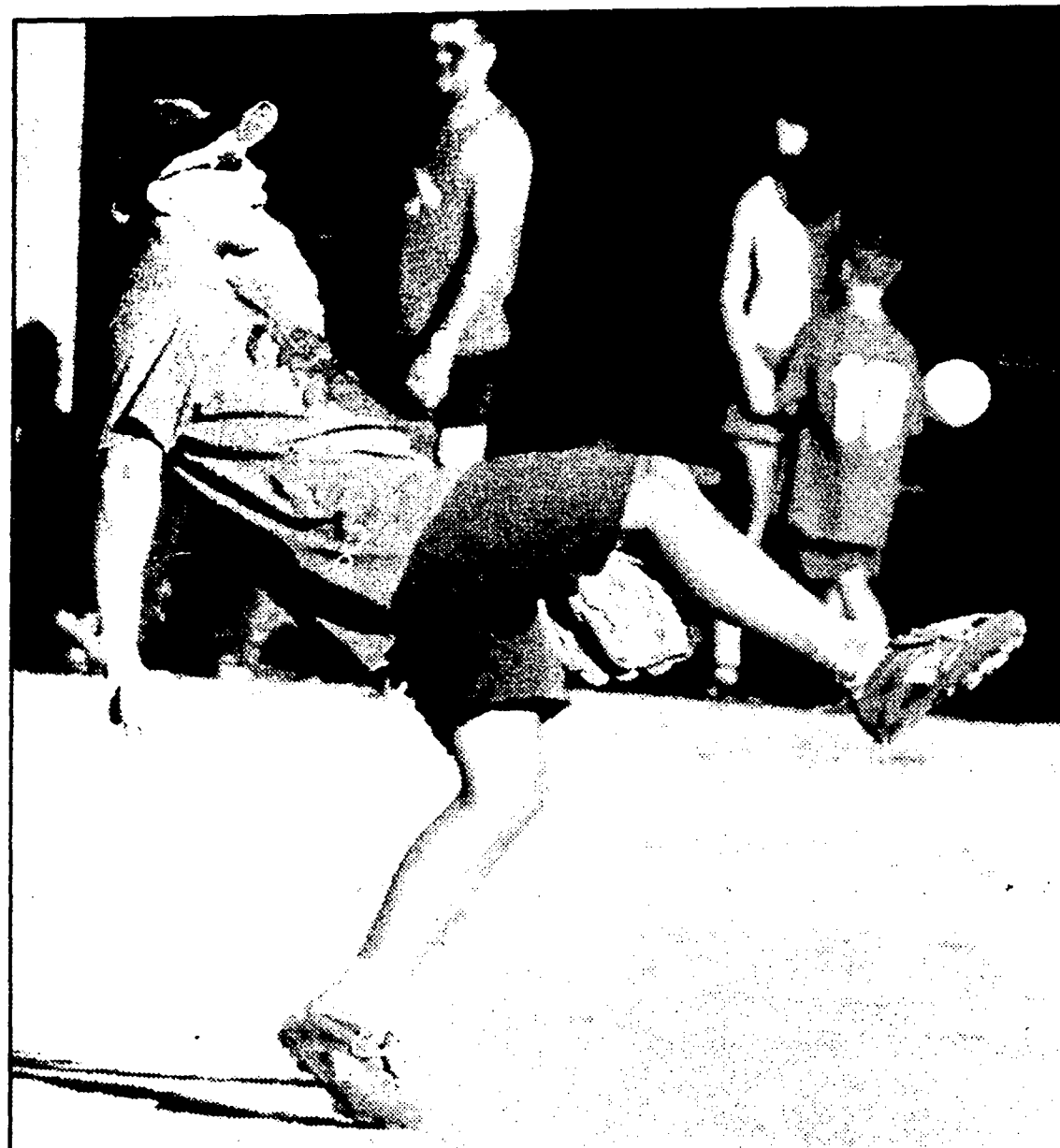
