## CMP seeking witnesses from 1964

Squamish RCMP investigators are seeking the location of all the witnesses interviewed by police in 1964 in the murder of Judith Howey. The 29-year-old Squamish man in custody in Vancouver is charged with first degree murder in the case, but lead investigator Cpl. Hugh [Name] needs to contact all previous witnesses in the

Efforts are being made to contact witnesses on this case, but are hampered by the passage of time, marriages, subsequent name changes and sons moving to other parts of British Columbia," said Sgt. Wayne Leatherdale of the Homicide Unit in a press release.

Recent efforts to contact witnesses have brought investigators in touch with many local residents who have been directly affected by this tragedy and continue to feel the effects today," said Leatherdale. "There has been a great outpouring of cooperation from members of the community."


He said the fact people have moved in the area in the past 34 years has created problems. "It is time consuming when it is of the essence."

Leatherdale asked that anyone knowing the whereabouts of witnesses, or relatives giving of name changes or locations of people who were interviewed by police in 1964 contact the Squamish RCMP at 898-9611.

The Squamish detachment would like to thank all of the individuals who have stepped forward and have been of such great assistance to the investigators to date," said Leatherdale.

The suspect is scheduled to appear in a brief court appearance in North Vancouver on Friday, March 31, to set a date for trial, though Squamish Crown counsel Riddle said actually setting a trial date may be delayed. She said she hopes the trial will take place in Squamish Provincial Court when the time comes.

Riddle also clarified information provided to The Chief last week by North Vancouver court officials, who said the suspect had been denied bail. The only way he can appeal that is to appeal to the Court of Appeal," said Riddle.

## Minister rejects highway four-laning

Upgrading Hwy. 99 to four lanes is unlikely in the near future because the project would cost taxpayers more than \$500 million. The message from the Minister of Transportation and Highways was sent in response to a petition which Gwyer Webber recently sent to the minister showing corridor residents' support for four-laning the highway from Horseshoe Bay to Whistler and installing interchanges along the way.

Webber sent the petition in January to then highways minister Lois Boone, now the minister of children and families, with 1,691 signatures supporting the upgrades. Webber said he was disappointed by the government's reluctance to commit to the suggested improvements.

"They need to start spending some proper money in this area," he said.

Boone's letter states the ministry's highway construction budget for the entire province this year is about \$260 million.

"Your efforts have certainly increased my awareness of this issue and its importance to residents in your region," said Boone.

The ministry is planning to do some major work on the highway in the near future. The B.C. Transportation Financing Authority has approved planning and design work to widen and realign nearly six kilometres of Hwy. 99 north of Squamish from Culliton Creek to Cheakamus Canyon. The ministry plans to start consultations for the project this year with stakeholders in Squamish and Whistler.

Webber said this highway work would be a start to the upgrades he envisions and he plans to continue lobbying the government. Webber submitted the petition to Squamish council in February but council members decided not to give formal support to the idea.

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
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

##### From the archives of The Chief

Laid off employees at Squamish General Hospital could get their jobs back under a new long-term accord between labor and management in B.C. hospitals.

#### Ten years ago this week

Hwy. 99 was closed to traffic for about seven hours March 22, just after a slab of rockface fell onto the road. The rockslide, which occurred about 11:30 p.m., blocked both lanes. The highway was reopened to traffic at 7 a.m. the following morning after crews worked through the night to clear debris.

Southpark Apartments has been declared a "nuisance" by district council, enabling the district, within 60 days, to select to dispose of or secure the building. The move came after fire chief Doug Orser called the property a disgrace.

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

#### Coalition elects



## Provincial government makes late school district funding announcement

After a month-long delay, the provincial government announced specific operating budget allocations to school districts across the province Friday.

The Howe Sound School District, and other school districts across the province, have been waiting to hear the Ministry of Education's funding announcement since Feb. 28.

Two weeks ago, the ministry announced a \$105 million education funding boost, but boards did not know how much they would be getting for the 1998/99 school year.

The lift in core funding for next year is to allow for the hiring of 400 new teachers and nearly 300

teacher aids and other teaching staff, including counsellors and librarians, across the province. This brings total per-pupil funding to \$5,849, an increase of about \$93 per pupil compared to last year.

Nancy Edwards, the board's secretary-treasurer said the funding announcement delay made it difficult for any planning to take place. The board was supposed to hear an announcement Feb. 28. The district will now have until May 12 to submit its budget to the provincial government.

"It's going to make the timelines extremely difficult," said Edwards last week.

She said the announcement delay has also made it difficult for school principals to plan budgets for their schools under the new decentralization process. Under this system, principals are supposed

to submit their budgetary plans to the district by April 1 but that deadline will now likely be extended.

The ministry announced last week 45 of the province's 59 school districts will see an increase in operating funding this year. The remaining districts are facing slight decreases in their operating budget allocations due largely to declining enrolments or to the expiration of special grants associated with amalgamation.

The provincial government is expected to announce more details on its capital funding strategy for school districts in the next few weeks.

School board staff were not available for further comment on the announcement before press time Monday.

## RCMP make final request for new building

Squamish RCMP are still waiting to hear from the municipality about short and long-term solutions to alleviate the police department's space crisis. RCMP have been asking the district for a new building for the past few years due to crowded conditions.

The RCMP's commanding officer in Vancouver Division recently sent a letter to Mayor Corinne Lonsdale as a third formal notice to the district stressing the urgency of the need for improved police accommodations.

The division sent two letters to the district in 1995 and 1996 pointing out

deficiencies of the existing public safety building, located on Tantalus Road. Council did not address the issue March 17 and decided to receive and file the letter.

Staff Sgt. Rex Henry said he was hoping council members would discuss the problem and what actions the district may be taking.

Henry said while RCMP staff numbers have grown, the space in which to operate has not increased which hampers the department's daily operations.

"I think it's a very important issue," he said.

The RCMP will wait as long as one year to see what action the municipal-

ity takes towards improving the detachment's space. Under the Municipal Police Unit Agreement, if the commanding officer division is not satisfied with the district's action, the RCMP may make improvements or build a new facility themselves and bill full costs to the District of Squamish.

"It would make more economical sense to have the municipality find its own contractors," said Henry.

Kim Anema, treasurer and acting administrator, said the district is still planning to install portable units at the detachment to give the RCMP more room but the units may not be those currently used by the public works

department which had been the original plan. Anema said council and district staff will likely determine during upcoming budget meetings what possible strategies might be taken.

The district's budget must be adopted by May 15.

"We are committed to finding interim measures and are still working on long-term solutions."

Anema said a 1995 referendum regarding a new public safety building showed a lack of public support for construction of a facility to house the RCMP, Squamish Fire Rescue and the Squamish Emergency Program.

He said it may be time for another referendum on the issue.

## Trailer park residents concerned about proposed townhouses

Several residents living in Timbertown Estate Trailer Court and Angelo's Trailer Court are worried a proposed nearby 75-unit townhouse development could take away from the existing neighborhood, disturb wildlife and encroach on residents' privacy.

About 30 people attended a public information meeting Feb. 25 at the Royal Canadian Legion to find out more about the plan and to voice their opinions. The site of the proposed development is on land owned by B.C. Rail on the south side of Mamquam Road, between the trailer courts, and extends south to the Mamquam River dike.

Patrick Frewer spoke on behalf of Delta-base Railroads Development Group, the proponent of the project, outlining the plan and answering questions. The developers would like to start construction this fall and be open for occupancy next spring.

Frewer said the development is to provide affordable townhouse units in a site plan which also features park elements. Each unit would have an enclosed parking space to fit two vehicles underneath every townhouse.


"We want to contribute to the neighborhood," said Frewer. "We have to try to balance the interests."

Jeff Lewis, one of the more vocal residents at the meeting, said the site is too small for what is proposed and he is worried the development will disrupt other residents and wildlife.

"People move to Squamish because they don't want to be crowded," said Lewis.

Some present spoke in favor of the development, saying there is a need for more housing in the community.

The project, which would have a railway heritage theme, includes a public pedestrian trail which would follow an

existing greenbelt and extend the full north-south length of the site from Mamquam Road to the dike. The plan also includes leaving a buffer of trees between neighboring trailer parks and townhouses. A child's play area is also proposed in the northwest corner of the site.

"We hope to provide access but also to encourage people to be respectful," said Frewer.

Design and development of the trail would involve input from existing residents, the Squamish Trails Society, and cooperation between the district's parks and recreation department, the developers, B.C. Rail and local service groups.

Some residents at the meeting expressed concern their privacy would be invaded by people walking along the trail and looking into their homes and backyards.

The developers have submitted an application for rezoning to the district's planning department and a public hearing will likely take place this spring.

Approvals will be necessary from the district, the Ministry of Transportation and Highways, B.C. Environment, and the Department of Fisheries and Oceans.

The proposed development was discussed briefly by council March 17. Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said council members will consider the concerns.

## School board needs future school site

A second school site will soon be needed in the area of Garibaldi Highlands whether or not the land owned by Merrill and Ring Timber and Land Management is developed in the future. This is the message Howe Sound School District staff gave to Squamish council during a March 24 committee of the whole meeting. School district staff and trustees met with council members, municipal staff and Donald Corson, Merrill and Ring's vice-president of planning and development, to discuss the Washington-based company's proposal to donate a school site, about four hectares in size. Corson is trying to get council's support for the company's plan to apply to the Forest Land Reserve Commission to have two lots of land removed from the Forest Land Reserve (FLR) for future development.

School district treasurer Nancy Edwards said the board currently has one site reserved for a future school near the proposed Newport Ridge development in Garibaldi Estates, but at least one more site will be needed. Planning for schools is based on student enrolment projections and planned developments in the community are considered. Edwards said considering current trends, the school district will need to more elementary school sites by the year 2004.

"We're the fastest growing school district in the province," said Edwards after the meeting. Trustees passed a motion during an in-camera meeting last October to support the land being removed from the FLR to provide a suitable school site as long as there is no cost to the board.

Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said the proposed Newport Ridge project would have to be developed before Merrill and Ring lands to enable

cost-effective servicing of the area. Lonsdale also said she is concerned about preserving good working forest land which is currently located on Merrill and Ring's property, but she predicts the land will likely be developed for housing in the future.

"Let's time the development of the Merrill and Ring land," said Lonsdale.

On March 17, Corson appeared before council to ask for support in planning the site and urged council to designate the land residential in the official community plan which is currently in its third draft.

Corson said the Merrill and Ring lands represent about 25 per cent of the district's future residential reserve.

"We're here to lobby a planning process."

Merrill and Ring's property, which has been logged over many years, has been identified for urban growth in the community's OCP since 1958. In the revised OCP now being drafted, the land is slated to be designated limited use. As long as the lots remain in the FLR, only commercial forestry is allowed.

Corson said if the lots are removed from the FLR the district would have control over future use of the site regarding planning and zoning issues.

After discussing the issue with the school board and Corson, a motion was made to designate the land for residential use, but that motion failed. Council members then directed district staff to look into the legal implications of policy considerations attached to limited use designation of the land.

Margaret Thornton, community planning director, said council members want to designate the land for limited use because it will not need to be developed for several years, but they also want long-term policies put in place to allow for flexibility in the future when development could become necessary.

## District requests impact studies for proposed Brohm Ridge resort

The District of Squamish is working to ensure major issues which could impact the community are addressed during the environmental assessment review process currently under way for the proposed Garibaldi at Squamish all-season mountain resort.

Council passed a number of motions March 3 supporting terms of reference for a fiscal impact study and additional studies which council members and district staff would like to see conducted during the process.

"We want to create a partnership so the economic benefits are there for the District of Squamish whether we annex or not," said Kim Anema, treasurer and acting administrator, during a recent committee of the whole meeting.

The fiscal impact study is needed to help council determine whether or not to expand its boundaries to annex the site and provide services to the proposed resort. The development's site is located on Crown land on Brohm Ridge. It is currently outside of the municipality's boundaries and is part of the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District.

This study, which is to be paid by Garibaldi Alpen Resorts Ltd., will examine the cost impact of development without

annexation, effects of Squamish Nation land claims on the development, project risks, economic viability, and ski hill capital maintenance risks. District costs and benefits are to be outlined based on two scenarios; expanding district boundaries to include the land, or keeping it out of the district.

If Garibaldi at Squamish remains outside of the district, it would either be governed by the SLRD or would form its own resort municipality. The Ministry of Municipal Affairs would ultimately make the decision about the resort's governance.

The district also wants to see an economic viability study, a report specifying linkages to the district regarding employment and benefits, more information on feasibility and cost implications concerning water, sewer, drainage and roads and implications on the district's budget.

The municipality has also requested more details about recreation partnerships and impacts, a possible independent review of the proposal to identify and address deficiencies of socio-economic impact information provided by Garibaldi Alpen, and a geo-technical assessment to show where hazards are located.

Garibaldi Alpen is conducting a variety of impact studies in the areas of traffic, archaeology, traditional use, local governance, and the environment. The developer is also working on further financial analysis of the plan.

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

## Reed sentence upheld in B.C. Court of Appeal

The B.C. Court of Appeal on Friday declined to overturn a B.C. Supreme Court decision on the sentencing of Ryan Robert Reed, who was sentenced to jail time after being found guilty of three counts of dangerous driving causing the death of three Squamish men in 1994.

Reed, a 27-year-old Coquitlam resident, was not given a jail sentence for being found guilty last January of three counts of dangerous driving causing death. Justice Peter Fraser gave Reed an 18-month conditional sentence, banned him from driving for five years and ordered him to do 240 hours of community service work. Reed, who must report to a probation officer, was also prohibited from travelling on Hwy. 99 for the next 18 months.

"The Appeal Court judges didn't change the conditional sentence or the conditions, except he has to spend the rest of his sentence at home," said Pennie McNutt, mother of Devon Hedin, one of the young men killed by Reed. On Sept. 17, 1994, Hedin, 21, Jason Wulff, 20, and Dale Ethier, 22, were travelling northbound in a 1977 Volkswagen Rabbit when a southbound truck driven by Reed crossed the centre line near the Cheakamus Canyon. Reed

had been drinking with a friend for several hours before the accident.

"The judges thought it was a fair sentence," said McNutt. "I think they're full of s---. I think it gives people the right to drink and drive."

McNutt said the Appeal Court judges could only have altered the sentence if the initial judge had erred in law.

"We found out he spent his community service at a seniors centre making reindeer at Christmas," said McNutt. "I would rather have seen him spend his community service at a morgue, or the emergency department of Vancouver General Hospital."

She said having to live at home, Reed will only be allowed out for work, church and emergencies.

"This means he can't play soccer Sunday afternoon or drink beer and play pool Wednesday night, and he still can't drive the highway north of Britannia Beach," said McNutt.

"One of the people I'd like to thank is Const. Dave Ritchie of Squamish RCMP. He has been there in court every single day, even his days off. He's been so supportive. He's fabulous."

Reed's appeal of his conviction will be heard by the Supreme Court of Canada starting April 29 in Ottawa.

### Driver faces four charges following brief chase

The driver of a car observed driving erratically in the Brackendale area at 8:30 p.m. March 25 led Squamish RCMP on a short chase along Government Road before trying to hide by parking in a driveway on Depot Road. Cpl. Gary Brine said the 31-year-old Squamish man arrested at the scene was found to be a prohibited driver, who refused to provide a breath sample and had taken the car without the owner's consent. He was held overnight by police to appear in court Thursday charged with dangerous driving, driving while prohibited, refusing to provide a breath sample, and theft of auto without the owner's consent.

Brine said the man told police he had just taken his girlfriend's car to go to the corner store. The car was impounded for a mandatory 30 days, however the owner can appeal to have it released earlier and Brine said the appeal would be heard fairly quickly.

Two pairs of running shoes and a flashlight were stolen from a car parked in the lot of the Diamond Head area at Garibaldi Provincial Park. There was no indication of forced entry.

Police stopped a vehicle at 10:56 p.m. March 20 on Hwy. 99 after it had been observed weaving over the road. The driver was charged with impaired driving. And on March 22 at 7 p.m., as a result of a citizen's complaint, police checked a car in the downtown area and the female driver was found to have been drinking. She also did not have a driver's licence and refused to provide a breath sample. The woman was also in breach of a court-ordered curfew. She will be appearing in court on several charges.

After receiving several calls about 1:40 p.m. March 20, reporting a car speeding and passing on double solid lines between Britannia Beach and Squamish, Police located the car and found the Vancouver driver to be unlicensed. He was charged under the Motor Vehicle Act and the car was impounded for 30 days.

At about 2:15 a.m. March 21, police spoke with several intoxicated people who were arguing on Second Avenue. All parties assured officers they would not be driving, considering their current state. While patrolling in the Dentville area some 30 minutes later, an officer spotted one of the females from the argument driving. She was pulled over, brought back to the detachment, and her breath sample indicated she was 2 1/2 times over the legal limit of .08. She has been charged with impaired driving.

Police are still investigating a break, enter and theft overnight March 20-21 at a trailer on Enterprise Way. The thief stole a generator, cutting torches and a battery charger.

Police checking the licence plates of a pickup truck in the main Stawamus Chief parking lot after midnight March 22 found the vehicle had been reported stolen in Sherwood Park, Alta. Police arrested a young Alberta man in the vehicle and charged him with possession of stolen property. He appeared in court last week and has been remanded in custody.

At 9:50 p.m. March 25, a Squamish resident discovered a car had been stolen sometime in the last 24 hours. Coincidentally, Vancouver police stopped the car a short time later and arrested five young people in the vehicle. The case is still under investigation.

Squamish RCMP hope to have clear photos later this week of suspects in two recent robberies at Pharmasave. Brine said several still pictures will be produced from an in-store video surveillance camera, which will be published in The Chief. "We're looking for public assistance in identifying the suspects," said Brine.

## Roadchecks stop more than three million vehicles

ties and more enforcement hours.

"Our goal is to move toward year-round, provincewide roadcheck enforcement," said Mike Farnworth, minister responsible for ICBC. "We will also introduce graduated licensing in 1998 which starts new drivers off on the right foot by requiring that they drink no alcohol at all before driving."

As a result of the 1997 roadchecks, about 9,400 drivers were pulled off the road by way of an impaired driving charge or a 24-hour roadside suspension. The 1997 holiday season campaign was the most intense in recent years. Police checked more than 700,000 drivers. They charged 180 motorists with impaired driving and gave suspensions to another 2,167.

"Drivers must be fully alert at all times - they're a hazard to themselves and all other road users if they drink and impair their judgment and ability to react," Dosanjh said.

Police put more than three million vehicles through Drinking Driving CounterAttack 24 hour roadchecks throughout British Columbia in a short time last year, Attorney General Ujjal Dosanjh said last week.

Police officers spent a total of 75,000 hours operating more than 5,000 roadchecks last year, Dosanjh said. "It is likely that some drivers may have encountered more than one roadcheck. This sends a strong message that drinking and driving, one of the leading causes of fatal crashes on B.C. roads, will not be tolerated."

The Ministry of Attorney General and Insurance Corporation of British Columbia are launching B.C.'s 1998 Drinking Driving Attack campaign which will involve more communi-

## Once is too often

Teachers and parents of students at Squamish Elementary School might want to have a chat with the young ones about an incident which was reported to us a couple of weeks ago.

A Squamish man who regularly walks Buckley Avenue from the North Yards said he was in the area around the school one afternoon when school got out. At the same time, a B.C. Rail freight train was shunting on the tracks, and had stopped blocking the path which leads to the downtown area. The man said the youngsters waited for the train to move for a few moments, then started getting impatient, as kids will do. One youngster made a dash for the other side under one of the freight cars, and soon the others followed suit.

We have no reason to disbelieve this man's story. He was visibly shaken, and still shaking, when he reached our office. There is little B.C. Rail can do. To avoid all crossings when school gets out is impossible. Erecting barriers with flashing lights and bells, as they do for vehicle crossings, is expensive and probably impractical. The kids are high spirited, and would likely walk around any barriers. Cutting off the path entirely would punish everyone else heading for the downtown area.

But talks about safety, at the school and at home, might have the desired effect. What these kids did was extremely dangerous. They need to be told just how dangerous it is, and why, before tragedy strikes. This sort of foolish action likely doesn't happen often. But once is once too often.

## Justice taking far too long

A court case originally heard in Squamish is now before the Supreme Court in Ottawa. It involves Henry Cuerrier, who had unprotected sex with two area women when he was HIV positive.


At the time, Cuerrier was advised by health nurse Jan McLaughlin not to have unprotected sex with anyone, and advise them of his HIV status, which is believed to lead to AIDS.

"If I tell one person in this little town, I'll never have a sex life again. I can't do that," Cuerrier replied. He was issued a formal order by the medical health officer, but ignored it. McLaughlin conducted an awareness campaign against Cuerrier in the community, and in 1995 he was charged with two counts of aggravated assault. He was acquitted, with the judge ruling there was no assault because the sex was consensual. The B.C. Court of Appeal upheld that judgment, saying the assault charge did not cover Cuerrier's activities, with Madam Justice Jo-Ann Prowse saying Parliament was the best vehicle to "strike the appropriate balance between the competing interests of promoting public health initiatives to control the spread of HIV, deterring harm-risking conduct and protecting individual autonomy."

The Supreme Court must now decide whether Cuerrier is a criminal, and who should extend the law to cover unusual situations such as this — the courts or the legislators.

Ultimately, it is the legislators who must find a solution to this dilemma. But they are notoriously slow. Several U.S. States have AIDS-specific legislation, and former Justice Minister Alan Rock said in 1995 the government was considering legislation to amend the Criminal Code to make it an offence to knowingly transmit HIV. No law was ever enacted, and several related private members' bills have been ignored.

Meanwhile, victims, mostly women, are still being subjected to the terrifying ordeal which Henry Cuerrier imposed on two local women. If the Supreme Court doesn't take action, god only knows how long it might take Parliament to deal with this deadly problem.



## Change will preserve forest jobs

Over the last 50 years, Sea-to-Sky Country has enjoyed a rich forestry history. During the last decade, however, forestry has seen significant change in its profile, the amount of harvest, technology, and its relationship and importance to other forest uses. Forestry provides approximately 1,450 direct jobs in Sea-to-Sky Country. This represents about 15 percent of the total work force. The number of forestry jobs has only slightly declined since 1992, although the employment season has shortened.

Employment has remained relatively constant despite reductions in both the harvest rate, and size of the forest land base. Since 1992, the annual harvest rate in the Soo Timber Supply Area has been reduced twice, from 705,000 cubic meters (approximately 21,400 truck-loads) to the current 506,000 cubic meters (approximately 15,300 truck loads). Within Tree Farm Licence 38, operated by International Forest Products, the harvest rate has been maintained at 263,000 cubic meters (approximately 8,000 truck loads). Both land bases are close to a sustainable rate of harvest.

Greater environmental awareness and changing social values have also resulted in a more constrained timber supply. With the protected areas decision in October 1996, we now have 22 per cent of the total land base protected as parks. In June 1995, the government announced a plan to manage the endangered northern spotted owl by maintaining mature forests for owl

habitat. These and other resource pressures and priorities such as tourism, recreation, fish and wildlife, native heritage, and mushrooms for example, have resulted in more constraints on the timber supply.

Evolution of forest management practices to address these issues have been significant. In June 1995, British Columbia adopted a new "world class" Forest Practices Code (FPC) which made B.C.'s forest practices comparable to the best in the world. The FPC has resulted in direct inclusion of public and community input into forest management decisions and resulted in significant changes to cutblock sizes, riparian (wetland) management reserves, establishment of forest ecosystem networks and biodiversity, alternate silviculture systems (selective harvesting), and provisions for visual quality and adjacency (placement of cutblocks next to previously harvested areas).

Since 1994, the forest industry in Sea-to-Sky Country is required to harvest a minimum of 10 per cent of its cut using selection logging techniques. This type of logging is extremely labor intensive and almost doubles the amount of time taken to log an area. The use of helicopters in logging has increased dramatically, especially in environmentally sensitive situations. Anywhere from 10-25 per cent of logging now employs helicopters.

Since the inception of Forest Renewal B.C. (FRBC), funding has been made available for watershed restoration and incre-

mental silviculture activities. Each year, anywhere from \$3 million-\$7 million is invested in the Squamish Forest District for activities such as deactivating logging roads, rehabilitating fish streams, and incremental silviculture including juvenile spacing, pruning and fertilization.

With continued emphasis on selection logging, more integrated forest stewardship practices, and increased value-added manufacturing, I believe that we can maintain 1,450 direct jobs in forestry.

Yes, government agencies and the forest industry must continue to adjust if forestry is to remain compatible with other resource values such as the endangered spotted owl. Yes, we have to streamline some of the bureaucracy of the FPC without impacting environmental standards. And yes, we have to be sensitive to market swings and help the industry to remain viable and prosperous during difficult times.

By meeting the many challenges, Sea-to-Sky Country's forestry industry will remain as one of our most important industries for decades to come.

## Garibaldi at Squamish raises concerns

It would seem that everybody in town is thrilled about the prospect of Garibaldi at Squamish except me. Yikes. I hate saying it, because I understand that unpopular opinions are met with hostility.

I am not against the idea of Garibaldi at Squamish. It sounds terrific, with jobs, money, economic revitalization. However, I am concerned about small details that nobody seems to be addressing.

When the project was first spoken of, it was to be a small hill, an affordable ski destination for locals with a small town feel. Last I heard, however, their projections are based on 19,000 skiers a day. Not exactly, a quaint ski destination.

But I needed to put it into some perspective; apparently Whistler/Blackcomb's combined best day is 26,000.

So, I wondered to myself where all the new skiers will be coming from. Local skiers will certainly not fulfill the projections. Perhaps everyone currently skiing the interior will drive out. Or, maybe we will capitalize on foreign skiers. Perhaps, but I wonder if I was travelling a distance to ski, would I settle for a developing mountain, or would I choose to go to Whistler, where I know I will find nightlife, restaurants and excitement.

Another concern of mine is the available water

supply on Brohm Ridge. I don't believe that there is a river running through it, as there is with Whistler, and Whistler has water availability problems. Of course, we could always pipe Garibaldi some of ours, right? Perhaps, but if we have such an abundance why are we not allowed to water our lawns after the first week of sunshine. And assuming we find an abundant water source, remember what goes up must come down, in one form or another, meaning septic.

I have huge concerns about the highway. Currently, it is barely suitable for the traffic load, but if this project is successful the traffic flow could double. Do these investors have the deep pockets necessary to pay for the upgrades and changes to the highway access? It is apparent that the B.C. economy does not.

My last big concern is the suitability of the site. It is gorgeous, the view is breathtaking and it is close to Squamish. However, it is my understanding that on more than one occasion studies have shown this location is not the most suitable ski destination because it lacks appropriate snowpack and vertical drop. The top has several bowls, which are ideal for snowmobiling, hiking and other pursuits, but not necessarily a skier's dream.

A recent letter to this paper suggested that teens

would be proud of Squamish if they had better recreational activities. Am I crazy, or is Squamish not already overflowing with recreation? The truth is we could build Disneyland at Brennan Park, and some teens would still say this place sucked. The cost of skiing will remain prohibitive to many who should be skiing rather than creating mayhem.

One thing is for sure, resort destinations (especially successful ones) bring with them a whole host of problems such as lack of affordable housing, drugs, transient populations and more. None of these issues have been addressed.

The news has reported that house prices and house sales will rise if the project goes forward, and that is exciting for someone who plans to sell their house and leave. I was born in Squamish, and potentially could die here. It doesn't matter how much money I will make if I sell because I'm not selling.

My point is, it would be wonderful if Garibaldi at Squamish was developed and everyone lived happily ever after, but are we considering the other possibilities? I am against progress for progress's sake, or for a quick buck. Do we need another ski mountain, or could Brohm Ridge be developed as a complement rather than a competitor to Whistler?

## Young activist selected to work on projects in South America

**M**arki Sellers will soon embark on the experience of a lifetime to help improve life in Guyana and also to foster her own development as a responsible citizen of the world.

Sellers will be heading to the South American country in June as a participant with Youth Challenge International, a non-profit Toronto-based organization which has been working to promote international cooperation and understanding since 1989.

"I have a really strong interest in global issues," she said.

Sellers will join a group of participants who will work on specific projects for 10 weeks in three selected communities.

Sellers is currently in her second year at the University of Northern British Columbia in Prince George where she is studying political sci-

ence and environmental studies. She has been raising funds to gather the \$3,950 necessary to pay for the trip.

"A lot of my studies have to do with environmental issues. It's really important to get a practical understanding of how people live in other countries."

Sellers, a Squamish resident for the past two years, plans to return to this community in May to continue fundraising efforts here.

Challengers live and work with a small team of volunteers from other countries to complete projects in the areas of health, education and scientific research. Teams help with health surveys, renovate schools, clinics and community buildings, and conduct various types of research. Participants are from Canada, Guyana, Costa Rica and Australia.

"I know I'm going to be gaining team-building skills."

After she graduates from university, Sellers said she would ideally like to become a "community activist"

focusing on social justice and environmental issues.

Anyone between the ages of 18 and 25 is able to apply to Youth

Challenge. Candidates placed on a short list are invited to participate in a rigorous outdoor selection weekend which tests their resourcefulness, compatibility and commitment.

Participants prepare for their adventure six months in advance by learning first aid, getting language training, do research on the country in which they will work and embark on fundraising campaigns. International field projects involve demanding work schedules and simple living conditions.

When they return to their own communities, the hope is participants have a sense of accomplishment, newly-formed friendships and valuable work skills. Their final challenge is to transform their experiences into positive civic and social action in their home towns.

Participants complete 100 hours of service in Canada by launching or assisting programs in existing organizations or in their sponsoring communities.

## Valleycliffe students experience the cycle of life

**I**t happens every spring, but nobody would say that made it monotonous. Dustin took me over to the aquarium in a sheltered corner of the classroom at Valleycliffe to see the new salmon fry which are beginning to appear. So far, they are just brief flashes of silver in the water above the rocks, but everybody is excited to watch their progress.

Pictures of salmon at various stages, an assortment of books about fish, and the children's own watercolors surround the living exhibition, and it all prepares the way for trips to the hatchery or to the estuary later in the year.

Ms. Platz's Grade 1 students are following "The egg-citing development of an embryo" in their classroom. An incubator stands on the counter, and there were 15 eggs in it originally. That was 14 days ago. All the children know that another seven days are left before chicks will hatch out of the 12 eggs which have proved to be fertile. They know this because each of them is keeping an egg journal, and recording the stages through which the embryos are passing.

Every few days Ms. Platz holds an egg in front of the strong light of a projector, and the students go up in turn to note the changes taking place. They are watching for the "tooth" that will help the chick peck its way out of the shell, and they already know all about the yolk and nutrients, and have mastered that difficult word "albumen."

I must say I felt some sympathy, though, for the little boy who asked what would happen if you opened your boiled egg and found a partly-developed chicken inside.

Ms. Platz reassured him that such a thing is most unlikely to happen.

**Biology**

Mr. Colwell's Grade 11 biology class at HSSS is also dealing with the same kind of curiosity about nature, at a somewhat higher level. When I visited, they were doing an experiment with small goldfish to record the effects of water temperature on a fish's breathing.

Each group of students had one beaker full of water, with a goldfish swimming around in it and another beaker full of crushed ice. The students were closely observing the fish's rate of breathing, timing it and making notes, then recording the changes that occurred when small slivers of ice were added to the water, where a thermometer measured the drip.

**Earth Day Project**

This will be the fourth year that Valleycliffe has participated in the Earth Day Garbage Project. Ms. Paterson is going to get brown grocery bags with some message suitable to Earth Day. The bags will then be returned to stores so that they can be given to customers on Earth Day to remind them about caring for our planet.

The day itself will be celebrated in the school with another lively assembly in the school gym, at which students will share skits, songs, poems, artwork and any other ideas they may have on this topic.

Volunteer hosts from the leadership class will likely act as MCs and carry out other organizational roles, the way they did at the last assembly.





## Careless showing slides of environmental quests

Touring Canada since last November, environmental activist and author Ric Careless has been presenting a slide show and discussion of his environmental quests in wilderness areas such as the Tatshenshini, Spatsizi and Nitinat areas, to communities across the country.

Careless will present his slideshow at the Squamish Public Library on Thursday, April 2 at 7:30 p.m. While in Sea to Sky country, he is also planning to meet with Squamish council to discuss the environment/jobs protection strategy. "There are two aspects to what I am

doing, one is the slideshow, and then the other part is I'm spending a lot of time talking to town councils on our jobs and environment strategy, to protect nature and at the same time being able to create jobs in the community."

Careless said communities in B.C. need to learn how to take better care of the land while also discovering new ways of creating jobs.


"We can get four to five times the number of jobs out of a tree if we take it for furniture and cabinets. That will compensate for the reduction in employment that is necessary to bring our forest into the balance," he said. Part of the answer, said Careless, is tourism.

"B.C. now employs probably twice as many people in the tourism industry as we do in the forest industry," he said.

That economic shift to tourism, said Careless, is just the beginning.

"The primary resource sector will always play a key role if we look at the land properly and we can stabilize it and protect nature for all those generations to come after us and then we can add to our economy.

"The hi-tech industry employs 50,000 people in B.C. and we are adding 10,000 jobs a year. It will be larger than the forest industry within five years with an annual growth rate of 20 per cent. We have all kinds of things we can do."



## Women's centre provides many supports for corridor women

The Howe Sound Women's Centre offers a variety of services to live up to its motto of "women supporting women". Situated in an accessible downtown location on Second Avenue, the centre provides information, referrals and support by telephone and on a drop-in basis. It also features a library of books, pamphlets, newsletters and videos concerning women's issues, as well as an opportunity to meet and share ideas with a network of women from diverse backgrounds and provides advocacy services regarding legal, welfare, disability and human rights issues.

Dianne Faux, coordinator of both the women's centre and Pearl's Place Transition House, said the Howe Sound Women's Centre Society is currently going through a self-evaluation process, as are other women's centres in the province, to determine how to improve services and to recognize the organization's successes.

"We are aware the community has changed over the years and we'd like to meet the needs of the community," said Faux.

The self-evaluation includes gathering feedback from women through surveys and a strategic planning process will follow once all input is collected. Faux said she and other women's centre staff and volunteers will meet with

an outside consultant in April to discuss developing a strategy. The centre began collecting confidential opinion surveys from women and community organizations in January. The society is also planning to conduct a telephone survey in the near future.

"We want to see what happens out of the evaluation and find out where to go from here," said Faux.

The society sponsored the Castle Rock housing cooperative, a big achievement as it tries to improve housing for women who are single parents and living on low incomes. But Faux said much more needs to be done.

"There is not enough affordable housing for women on low incomes and their children."

Part of the society's mandate is to try to stop the cycle of violence against women in the community and Pearl's Place Transition House was established to provide a safe refuge for women leaving abusive relationships. The society also works to find ways to improve the lives of women living in poverty, mainly who are elderly women with fixed incomes, single mothers and women with disabilities.

The society also joined a number of other community members to establish the Squamish Healthy Sexuality Clinic to help women and men plan for parenthood and live healthier sex lives.

The centre, a registered non-profit society and charitable organization, was incorporated in 1981. A children who witness abuse program which provides individual or group counseling for children and adolescents who have experienced serious family conflicts is also offered at the centre.

A steering committee, consisting of nine women, meet monthly to help steer the centre in various directions and special committees are struck to work on specific issues. Both the women's centre and transition house are staffed by two full-time employees and relief staff and volunteers help out at both locations.

The centre offers a number of programs for women including free Internet training, income tax workshops, and information sessions to help women plan their budgets. A newsletter is also published and made available four times a year.

The centre is funded through donations from individuals, organizations and businesses and by the Ministry of Women's Equality and Status of Women Canada. The society is also an affiliate member of United Way. The Mini-Flea Market in Squamish accepts donations of furniture and other household goods on behalf of the centre.

The women's centre is open for drop-in visits Monday to Friday from noon-4 p.m.

# Experience and education formed the life of Squamish Nation elder

As an elder, educator and former Squamish Nation councillor, Gwen Harry has made numerous contributions to her community over the years and continues to be an active member today.

Originally from the Capilano and Alert Bay areas, Harry moved to Squamish in 1954. She spent most of her childhood in a residential school in Alert Bay. At the age of 13, Harry contracted tuberculosis and fortunately recovered by the time she turned 17.

"I've learned by experience," she said.

As a young woman, Harry began working as a maid in the hospital in Alert Bay and Squamish General Hospital. In 1955, she married Ernie Harry and today she is a proud 66-year-old mother of seven children and grandmother of 12, most of whom live in the Squamish area.

Around 1966, Harry and other Squamish Nation women formed a group and decided to design an educational system for their children with the help of May Harris, a non-native woman who acted as a liaison. Part of the process involved opening Totem Nursery School on the Stawamus reserve.

"The school was our biggest success," said Harry. "We started with 19 children and now have about 30."

The nursery school opened as a part-time facility in 1967 and is now a full-time operation serving the entire community. Harry worked at the school from the beginning until 1974.

Prior to her struggle with tuberculosis, Harry was able to complete Grade 8 before entering the workforce and becoming a mother. She later

decided to return to school and in 1976, graduated from Grade 12. After reaching this milestone, Harry continued to work at the nursery school for a couple of years and then was hired as Howe Sound School District's home-school coordinator for native students in the Squamish area. She was the first native woman to hold the position and was employed with the school board for seven years.

"It was hard for me because it was new," she said. "I didn't have the same education as other teachers."

Her job involved working in Squamish schools and native students' homes.

"A lot of the kids I knew from the nursery school."

She also earned a diploma in early childhood education through a Douglas College correspondence program while working for the school district.

Harry said she really enjoyed going back to school.

"You never stop learning, as long as you open your mind and your heart to learn. I've learned from youths and elders and I've learned from children."

In 1985, at the age of 55, Harry decided to run for Squamish Nation council. She was elected and gave up her home-school coordinator position to dedicate her time to politics and improving the lives of a larger number of people. Harry spent 12 years as a councillor, but did not run in the last election. Her portfolio included education and social services.

In the past, Zander was a teacher's assistant for three years at Squamish elementary, where she worked with children with disabilities. She said she would


still be there "if there had not been cut-backs", but she thinks that "in the long run things worked out".

# Late-blooming swimmer goes for the gold

Winning a gold medal in swimming at the 1997 B.C. Seniors Games was a big surprise for Dorothy Buchanan. She said she was not expecting it mainly because she only started swimming on a regular basis three years ago.

Buchanan, a Squamish resident for the past 31 years, took up swimming when she found out she needed to have her right knee replaced due to arthritis in her joints. Her doctor also told her she should exercise more to develop her leg muscles for the operation, so she decided to take up swimming. She only formally started taking lessons about one year ago.

"I became very fond of swimming so I started going daily," she said. "It gets into your blood."

Buchanan had her knee replaced two years ago and she has been swimming daily even though her body has shown signs of rejecting the replacement.

Last April, Buchanan participated in swimming trials at Percy Norman Pool in Vancouver to see if she would qualify as a contender in the B.C. Seniors Games held last August in New Westminster. Three women and three men from the Lower Mainland zone were chosen to represent the 75-79 age group during the trials, but Buchanan did not qualify.

When she returned to Squamish, she later received a phone call inviting her to compete in the games because a selected woman dropped out due to injuries. Buchanan gladly

accepted the offer and competed in the games, following the other woman's program of distance swimming. It was through this experience that she realized she is not suited for short-distance, sprint swimming which she did during the trials.

"I discovered I'm a distance swimmer," she said. "It's never too late to start anything. My knee replacement didn't hold me back."

Buchanan, mother of five and grandmother of 11 children, placed first in her age category for the women's 400-metre freestyle and proudly returned to Squamish with a gold

medal. She said she was amazed to be named the best in the province in her category because other competitors had been swimming since they were children.

She said she plans to enter trials in April for this year's games and this time she will choose her own program. The B.C. Seniors Games kick off August 27 in Port Alberni.

Buchanan said she owes thanks to lifeguards at the Brennan Park Leisure Centre for always making her feel welcome and encouraging her to swim. She said before she started going to the pool on a daily basis, she was not a strong swimmer.

"I could stay afloat but that was about it. Now I have a daily ritual."

Buchanan said she plans to keep swimming, whether she qualifies for the games or not, simply for exercise and the peace of mind it gives her.

Giese is also a director on the Squamish Hospital Foundation Board.


She said when she retires from her position at SGH, she plans to continue working as a nurse for short time periods on cruise ships and take on other special projects.

# Encouraging students to pursue their dreams part of the fun at HSSS

For Howe Sound Secondary School principal Marg Pallot, working in the education field in Squamish was a natural. She had spent most of her 22-year teaching and counselling career in five different schools in Surrey, but spent most weekends in Whistler, skiing. When she saw a posting 4 1/2 years ago in a newspaper for a career program district coordinator for the Howe Sound School District, she said "That's me."

Ironically enough, since coming to work in the district (Pallot lives in Whistler) she has had far less time for skiing than when she lived in Surrey.

"The re-possibilities of the job have multiplied exponentially, so until Spring Break I had only been up maybe four times this winter."

She did manage some time on the slopes in the sunshine during the break, but also had to spend time in her office with a mountain of paperwork.

After heading the career program for a couple of years, the principal's job came open and Pallot applied.

"I got a lot of encouragement from staff and others in the community, including parents. I was a bit surprised to be chosen."

Pallot said she realized becoming the senior administrator at HSSS would be very challenging.

"I decided I was willing to learn the job, and hoped I would be a good match for the school. I enjoyed the staff and the students, and really felt the school was under appreciated. I really felt good in this school, and felt it was one of the better ones I've ever been in. I think the public perception didn't realize the strengths in the school, the strength of the teaching staff and variety of programming.

"We have had to cut numerous classes because we don't have the funding, whereas in previous years we could offer classes with smaller numbers," Pallot said. It seems to be a sign of the '90s. You hear of everyone doing the jobs of two or three people now, and the demands in education have certainly risen as well."


Despite the added burdens, Pallot said she doesn't have any problems recommending teaching careers to some of her students who express an interest.

"I really like encouraging the students, no matter what they want to do. Some I can see would be really suited to that career."


Pallot said her gender has never been an issue with her work. As one of three female administrators in the district, she has had nothing but good experiences.





## Nothing like quiche for the fools

Tomorrow is April Fools' Day. Once known as All Fools' Day, it falls half a calendar away from All Saints' Day, Nov. 1. If the sanctified souls of history's martyrs can have a day set aside for them, we may as well celebrate the living fools in our midst with their own day.

What to serve at a feast of fools? How about quiche. Its name fools folks into thinking it's French. Like French fries that are really Belgian, Creme Anglais that is American, Swiss steak that is English and sauerkraut that is Chinese, quiche is more German than its French name leads us to believe.

It all started centuries ago in the formerly independent duchy of Lothringia, now French Lorraine. The Lothringens borrowed the German "kuche" or cake and transformed it into the French tart, filling its buttery crust with bits of bacon, some sautéed onions, and cheese. Topped off with egg-enriched cream and baked until the custard set, they had — voila — quiche Lorraine.

When the French later annexed the duchy, they annexed quiche Lorraine along with other German and Austrian specialties we've come to assume are French. The entire region, including neighboring Alsace, has bounced between either French or German rule several times over the past few hundred years. Alsace has its own version of quiche, onion tart. I'd gladly serve it to a fool.

### Onion Quiche

- 4 slices bacon (be sure to use good quality, smoky bacon, none of that sugar or maple cured packaged stuff)
- 2 medium onions, sliced
- 3 large eggs

- 1 1/2 cups light cream
- 1/2 cup shredded Gruyere or Cheddar cheese
- 1 — 10 inch deep dish pie crust

Heat oven to 450 degrees. Set a cookie sheet on a middle rack. Set the pie crust on the sheet and bake for 10 minutes, until lightly browned. Remove from oven. Reduce heat to 375 degrees. If there's any cracks in the crust, fill them in with unbaked pie dough to stop leaks.

Fry the bacon until crisp. Drain off all but 1 or 2 Tbsp. fat. Add the onions and gently fry until very soft and golden, about 10 minutes. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Chop the bacon into pieces. Spread the cooked onions in the bottom of the cooked pie crust. Top with bacon and cheese. Beat the cream and eggs together. Pour into the pastry. Bake about 30 minutes, until the custard is set. Cool briefly, or serve warm.

Considering wines and foods of a region are made for each other, there's no finer partner for onion quiche than Sylvaner Hugel (about \$14). Few whites are so food-friendly. Overlooked as a common variety, Sylvaner is the workhorse of Germany's vineyards. Gentil Hugel 1996 (about \$16) is uncompromisingly brisk and lemony, as good a match for oysters as Chablis. Pinot Blanc Alsace Willm 1995 (about \$15) is deliciously delicate, floral-scented with subtle fruit that suggests nectarines. A snappy crispness balances the round texture.

## Rock Boxers in dire need of community support

Saturday afternoon I had the pleasure of spending several hours watching the Gloves of Granite II, a boxing show put on by the Squamish Rock Boxing Club. Although the crowd was a bit scarce, the evening was excellent and the refereeing fair and professional. I saw boxing at all levels, from Christopher Valeria in the Junior B Novice category, to Wayne Jackson, a top ranked, amateur in a senior exhibition bout. All boxers wear protective headgear, and injuries are extremely infrequent. While I was there, a young woman turned in a chair to face me and wondered, aloud, "Would you bring their kids to such an event, even let them step into the ring, for that matter?" Boxing, I explained patiently, is one of the few working class escapes. Two athletes at the peak of physical perfection trying to outdo one another in the ring of honor. She shrugged and turned away.

Well, I guess maybe not everyone gets the attraction some of us have to the sport. I suppose that might also explain the relatively poor turn out to the event, but it doesn't excuse it. Boxing is much like any other sport in that not only is it a great way to stay fit, but has many other advantages as well. Discipline is important for youth to learn and appreciate, and boxing certainly teaches discipline. The ability to concentrate and focus while under stress is also taught. Respect plays a large part, too. Respect for your opponent, the referee and the rules. Sounds like pretty good stuff to teach kids, right? Well, the option of sending your kids to the Rock Boxing Club to glean some of those benefits may not be available much longer. The club is in real jeopardy, mostly due to a lack of funds but certainly not for lack of trying. The fact is that if we, the residents of

Squamish, sit idly by and watch the club close, we will be doing a great disservice to the community. Particularly to the youths who go to the club three times a week to be put through the paces and learn those valuable skills we talked about earlier. It's time for the silent supporters of the Squamish Rock Boxing Club to step out of the shadows and into the light. Without the support of the community, young, talented boxers like Steve Featherston (who has a good possibility at becoming next year's national champion for his weight class), or Shusei Kushida and Curtis Rascher (both of whom have a shot at the provincials) will be turned out into the cold, or worse yet, exported to Vancouver. Call me crazy but I think it's a good thing to support local athletes in their efforts, even if it does mean digging out the odd loonie and donating it to the cause. The Rock Boxers are currently trying to build a new ring for the club. A new ring

costs about \$10,000. That's a lot of loonies, I know, but the payoff in benefits for the athletes who use the facility would be priceless. Wayne Jackson, the coach at the club and an outstanding boxer himself, would like to hear from anyone who would like to help the club out. I would, and I bet a more people would as well, if they went out to the club and checked it out.
