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Walk, rally organized to promote positive youth

Many Squamish people are fed up with violence in community from a small core of people who use to live in peaceful coexistence with the rest of the community, and are tired of Squamish being painted as a violent and racist town by the Vancouver media. About 50 people, including 30 young people, gathered at the Best Western Sea to Sky Hotel on Wednesday night to do something to counteract the negative image Squamish is gaining and promote the positive effects of the majority of young people.

"I'm here in response to the violence that occurred in our community the past six months. The weekend incident at Cat Lake left me with a feeling of despair, hopelessness and frustration," said meeting organizer Shelley Smith. "We need to do something positive. Many people are feeling that way. Youth in community are feeling frustrated and angry. We need to feel good about the community, where we live and who we live with."

"I don't think Squamish is any different than other communities, but at some point you have to say it's unacceptable. Our silence condones their behavior."

Smith said the primary focus was to find ways of raising money to help compensate the victims of the incident at Cat Lake on May 29, which resulted in three Burnaby youths injured and one Squamish man charged with assault causing bodily harm.

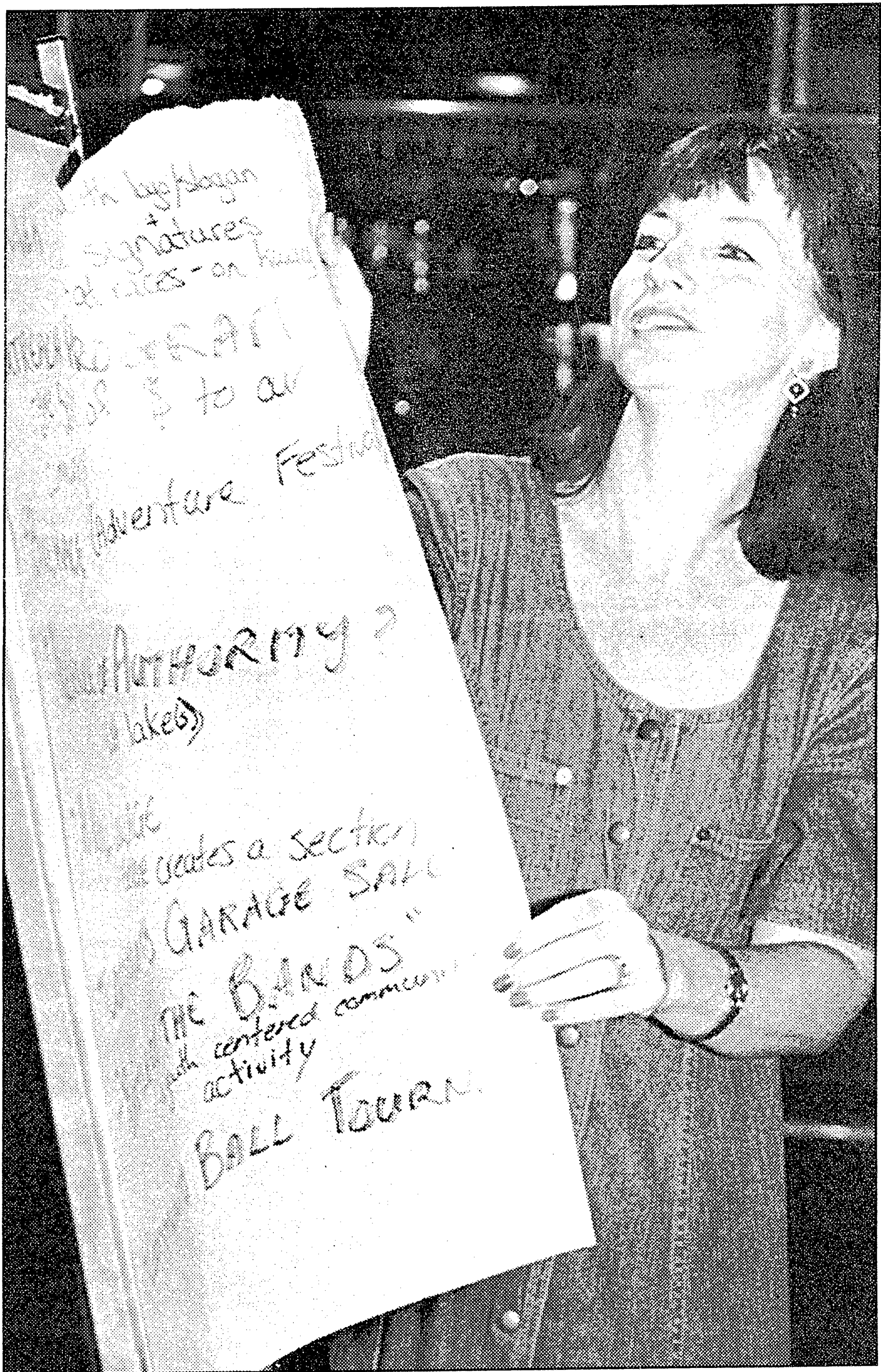
"If we do fund-raising now and compensate the victims monetarily, what happens six months from now if a kid gets a broken arm?" asked Marianne Ison. John French suggested a community gathering and panel discussion featuring experts on youth violence and violence in general, aimed at helping people get along as a community.

"A lot of youth in Squamish Partnership in Youth (SPY) are incensed they are all being painted with the same brush," said Kristi Fairholm, a youth outreach worker with Skyward Outreach Services. "Some of our members have suggested a rally, a dance, or some sort of event to celebrate the positive things the youth of Squamish are doing."

One young man said he was angered by reports that this year's grad class was involved in the fight, when it wasn't grads at all. Sgt. Dwain Wetteland agreed, saying:

the Squamish Pavilion, the destination of the walk, at about 3 p.m.

Proceeds from the event will be split evenly, with 50 per cent going to Squamish youth programs and facilities, and 50 per cent to charities in their own communities chosen by the victims from Cat Lake.

Brackendale Secondary School principal Tom Croft got a huge ovation when he announced that in anticipation of some positive event to showcase

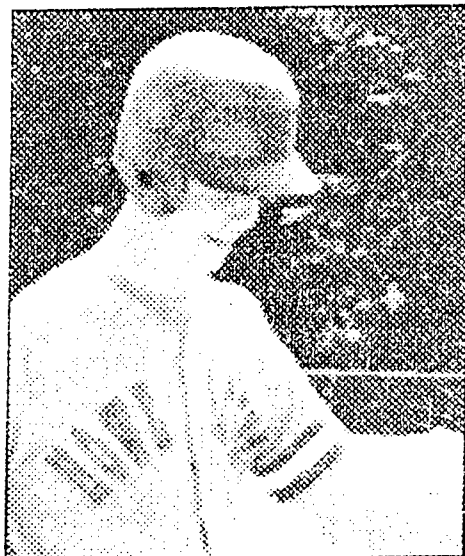

Two Squamish boys were arrested Thursday, June 3, after a high speed joy ride in a stolen truck. West Vancouver police alerted Squamish RCMP at 1:03 a.m. that a blue 1981 Ford pickup had been stolen in Horseshoe Bay by two teens, and was headed north on Hwy. 99. The 13-year-old driver and his 17-year-old passenger reached speeds of up to 140 kilometres per hour as they raced along the highway. RCMP used a spike belt to puncture all four of the truck's tires, bringing it to an immediate stop near Darrell Bay.

Canada and coastal B.C. are no longer low-cost producers of pulp and paper. This means domestic producers will have to fight harder for their traditional share of the world market.

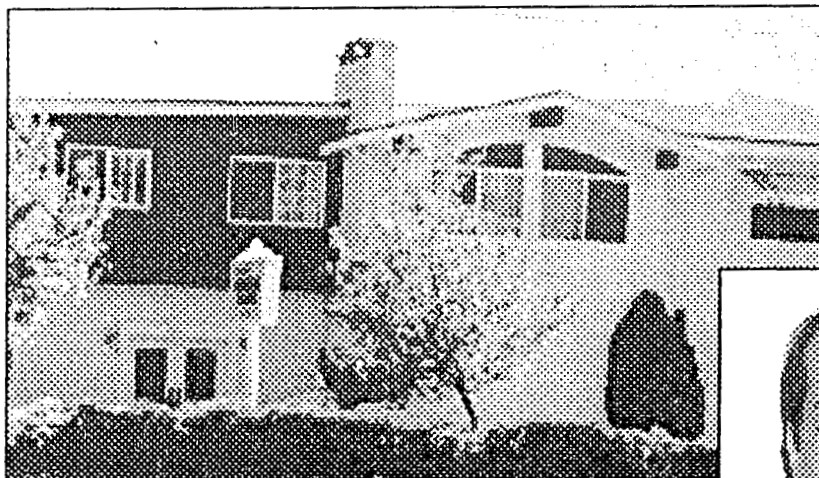

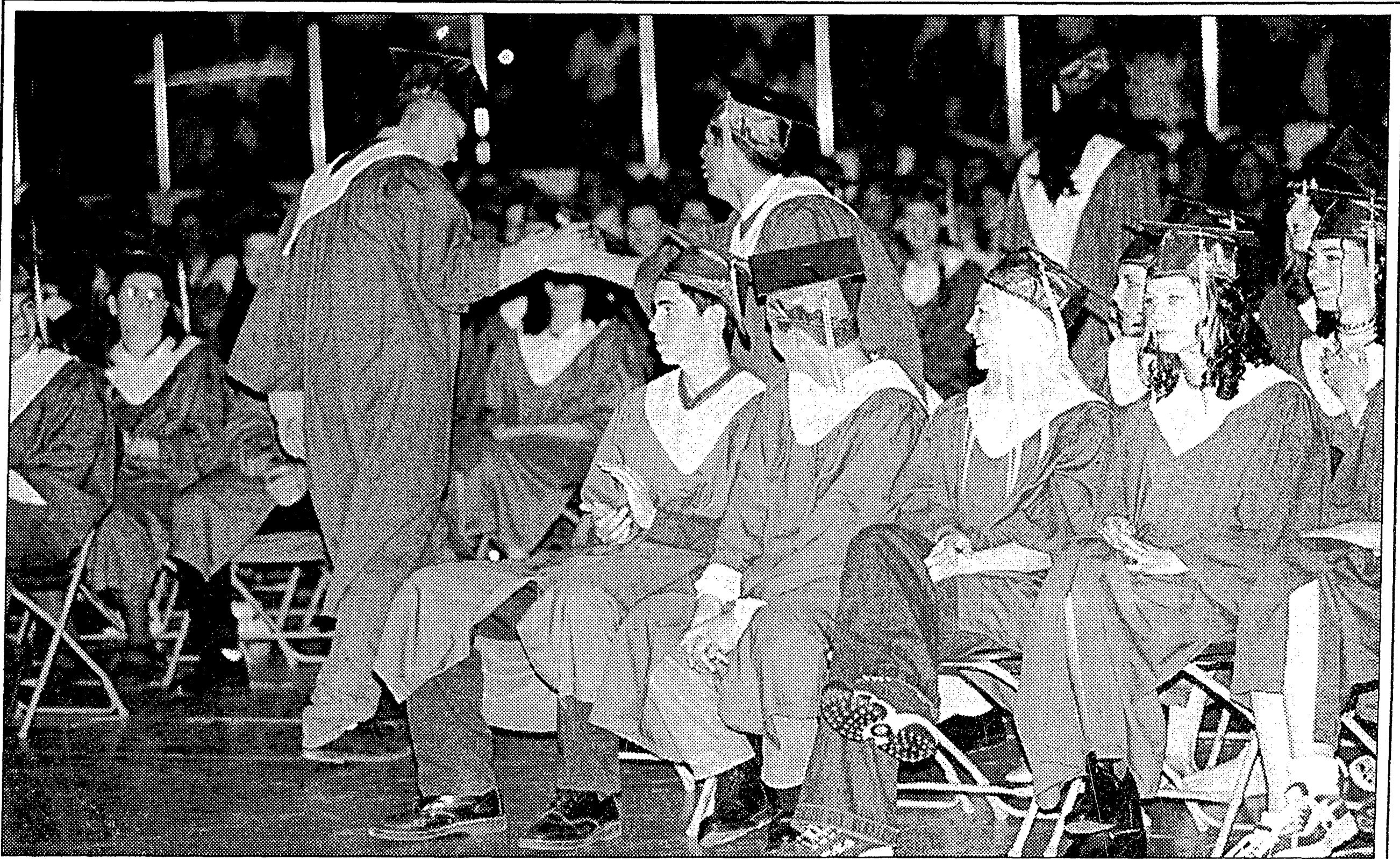

Cat Lake off limits to party animals

Gate moved, forcing campers to hike in to the popular site

Party animals are no longer welcome at Cat Lake. Following an incident May 29 in which four people were hospitalized and a Squamish man charged with assault, the Squamish Forest District has moved the gate to Cat Lake and is taking steps to return the area to the peaceful family campsite it was a few years ago.

John Crooks, recreation and range officer for the Squamish Forest District, said Friday that the gate had been moved one kilometre down the

road, forcing anyone intent on camping or picnicking at Cat Lake to pack in their gear.

"It is now a walk-in, backpacking destination," said Crooks. "Hopefully this will deter those hooligans determined to ruin it for everyone else."

Camping is still allowed, but Crooks said if there are any more problems, the site might be shut down completely.

"We are hopeful that by forcing the less desirable people to walk in, they will go elsewhere," said Crooks. Cat Lake has been a party spot for young people from the Lower Mainland for many years, and there have been disturbances on numerous occasions.

In 1994, a Surrey man was charged with aggravated assault and assault with a weapon after a Squamish man was stabbed in a dispute about a

motorcycle being tipped over. A couple of years ago, a group of gay people were attacked. It was also the site of a rave for several years, until police closed it down.

"It is well known they can come up here and party their faces off fairly free of scrutiny. It's not a free-for-all anymore. We are contacting some of the better known schools and making it clear this is a different experience now," said Crooks. "If they come up here to party, they are not welcome."

Crooks said the maintenance contractor at Cat Lake packed out more than 100 dozen beer cans and bottles, most of them broken, after last weekend's fiasco.

There was also excessive garbage but, as has happened in the past, a few Squamish young people went out after the weekend and helped clean up.

"They were concerned with what the bad kids have done, and cleaned up after them," said Crooks. They have gone to a lot of effort and we really appreciate it."

Crooks said after the most recent incident at Cat Lake, some of the party-goers were kicked out.

They then headed north on the highway to Cal Cheak campsite, closer to Whistler.

"That resulted in the in the RCMP being called in to deal with vandalism and fights, with about 200 kids, 60 vehicles and lots of garbage," Crooks said.

"We've had lots of support for moving the gate and leaving it there. People are happy that families can do what they used to do, enjoy themselves without being fearful for their safety."

Council approves relaxed standards for BSS addition

Squamish Council gave the Howe Sound School District a boost Tuesday when it agreed to relax some of its standards for the much needed addition to Brackendale secondary School.

An addition to BSS has been the top priority of the school board for some time, but construction funding by the province was not approved for this fiscal year. School board secretary-treasurer Nancy Edwards appeared before council Tuesday seeking help in cutting the costs of the addition, making it more likely to be funded next year.

"The board currently has planning funds for this project and part of the planning involves going through a value analysis with the Ministry of Education," Edwards said. "The process is intended to ensure that dollars on school construction are spent in a cost effective manner." She said with a

current enrollment of 200 students in the main building and portables, the addition will accommodate up to 600 students."

Edwards asked for relaxation of the requirements for concrete sidewalks on Government Road, a piped storm sewer abutting the site on Ross Road, and curb, gutter and other sidewalks on Ross Road.

In a report to council on the request, public works director Mohammad Afsar said the board's justification in seeking the relaxation is that students on Government Road will use an internal pathway from Brackendale Elementary School and wouldn't use a sidewalk,

Government Road will be widened to accommodate cyclists, no future driveways are anticipated on Ross Road to warrant piped storm sewer, and sidewalks on Ross Road would serve no useful purpose.

"In the opinion of the staff, the justification offered by the school district is legitimate and makes practical sense," Afsar said.

The school district will be providing off site works valued at \$213,000, and the requested relaxations will reduce the costs by about \$112,000 with little or no impact in terms of the required amenities in the area.

"Conversely, the project will create economic benefits for the local construction economy while satisfying critical needs in the local school system," Afsar said.

Council gave unanimous approval to the request. Edwards said indications from the Ministry of Education are that the project will go ahead within the next 10 months.

Olympic bid committee prepares for COA visit

Chairman Arthur Griffiths and the members of the Vancouver/Whistler 2010 bid society are preparing themselves for a very special visit this summer.

Members of the Canadian Olympic Association site review committee will be visiting Vancouver and Whistler from Aug. 9-11. Following the Vancouver/Whistler stop, the group, expected to include nine of the 77 voting members of the COA, will head to Calgary and Quebec City — the two other destinations vying for the COA's 2010 nomination.

For the Vancouver/Whistler 2010 bid society, the COA visit is an important milestone in the bid process.

"The society has to present a bid book and they have to answer a set of questions that has been provided to them. The site review committee is really there to help provide some guidance and make sure that they are well on their way, that sort of thing. They spend a couple of days with the chairperson and give them a good overview of what to expect," said Dina Bell-Laroche, media relations and communications officer with the COA.

"I think what is important here is that the COA is the third party, the neutral body here that is trying to ensure that the best bid goes forward. So what we want to do is ensure that all three cities have the same kind of information, the same access to that information and are provided with guidance based on the knowledge of the site review committee," said Bell-Laroche.

Each city vying for the COA's nomination must present its bid book to the COA board of directors on Oct. 15. The board then has about a month to review the book and on Nov. 21 in Toronto, presentations will be made and the COA board of directors will vote on which city, if any, will go forward to the

international round.

Mike Chambers, who is on the executive of the COA, is chair of the site review committee that will be visiting Whistler and Vancouver.

"I wouldn't say that the process has been hardened yet," Chambers said. "We are going there to hear from the committee what its bid proposals are with respect to infrastructure issues, financing issues, and actual placement of venue issues. What process they will use to provide us with that information is in their hands."

Chambers said the visit will also include some site examination, to the extent that potential sites can be examined more than a decade before the actual event would take place.

"Remember that this is 12 years away from the Games themselves, if a Canadian city is successful. So there are probably sites that are proposed places of sport venues that may right now be just a side of a mountain," he said.

Tara Milburn, manager of communications for the Vancouver/Whistler society, said the group is busy preparing for the COA's summer visit.

"We have to have a lot of our work done in time for the visit," she said. "We are currently working on short-listing venue sites."

Milburn said part of the community process will include a presentation with members of the bid society at an upcoming Whistler Chamber of Commerce meeting, tentatively scheduled for mid-July, as well as a possible Whistler town meeting regarding the bid.

"A town meeting is something that we are looking at doing so that everyone gets informed about it and knows what we are doing," she said.

The IOC will decide the host of the 2010 Winter Olympic Games in the year 2003.

New ticket bylaw given third reading

Teachers vote to accept deal

School board trustees advised to reject proposed agreement

Teachers throughout the province voted to accept a tentative agreement between the B.C. Teachers' Federation and the provincial government, but it could be back to the drawing board for all parties involved if school boards need the advice of the public school employers' association.

Teachers throughout the province voted between May 11 and 15 on a tentative collective agreement, which was recommended for ratification by the BCTF. Locally, Howe Sound teachers voted May 11.

Alex Miller, president of the Howe Sound Teachers' Association, said there is strong support for the agreement among teachers throughout the district.

The existing agreement expires at the end of June 1998. A new agreement would be in place until June 2001.

The agreement calls for a two-per-cent wage increase for teachers, effective April 1, 2000 with no increase for this year or next, and Miller said that while he regrets the poor wage increase he hoped teachers, in voting on the agreement, would realize its overall benefits to public education, which include a reduction in class size and the addition of 1,200 teachers. The \$150 million increased funding included in the agreement will bring lower class sizes in Kindergarten to Grade 3 and guarantee support levels of counselling, library, ESL and special education services.

Results of the provincewide vote, which cannot be broken down among individual districts, were released by BCTF President Kit Hotpoint, Krieger at a news conference May 29. He reported that 73.5 per cent of the 25,153 ballots cast were in favor of the three-year agreement.

Krieger said the result is testimony to the professionalism and commitment of teachers, who know that this contract will bring about great benefits for students, particularly the youngest and those needing specialized services.

"It's a wonderful legacy for the teachers and the children of B.C.," he said.

The agreement provides \$150 million for

more than 1,200 new teachers over the next three years. The funding is in addition to \$105 million already committed to cover the cost of increased enrollment.

"In this decade of budgetary restraint and deep cuts to our education system, we are proud of the success we have had in reversing some of the damage that has been done to public education," Krieger said.

"This agreement lays a solid foundation for our school system and sets new standards of quality and equality of service to students. I believe that our efforts will have lasting implications into the next generation and the next century."

But school board trustees must also vote on the agreement. And while Krieger said he is hopeful that trustees will focus on the "substantial benefits to students, the additional resources coming into the system and the promise of stability offered by the deal," it could be an uphill battle.

Trustees are being urged by the B.C. Public School Employers' Association to reject the deal.

The board of directors of the BCPSEA voted May 21 to reject the agreement negotiated by the provincial government and the BCTF.

BCPSEA chairman Charles Hingston said the board recommended rejection of the tentative agreement because of increased inflexibility in contract language and the "refusal by government to provide BCPSEA with a guarantee that it would fully fund the collective agreement."

He said the recommendation to reject the tentative agreement came after a thorough analysis by BCPSEA of the implications and costs of the agreement signed by the government and the BCTF on April 17, 1998.

Of particular concern to public school employers, said Hingston, is the government's refusal to guarantee full funding of the collective agreement.

"The government is trying to buy a settlement by providing more jobs for teachers," Hingston said in a news release. "The contract would commit school boards to spending millions of dollars without any assurance they will receive full funding."

Boards will vote on the agreement June 8 to 15 with the results of the balloting expected June 18.

The BCPSEA is the accredited bargaining agent for B.C.'s 60 public school boards. BCPSEA and the BCTF have been negotiating since September 1997 for a new provincial agreement for the province's 44,000 teachers.

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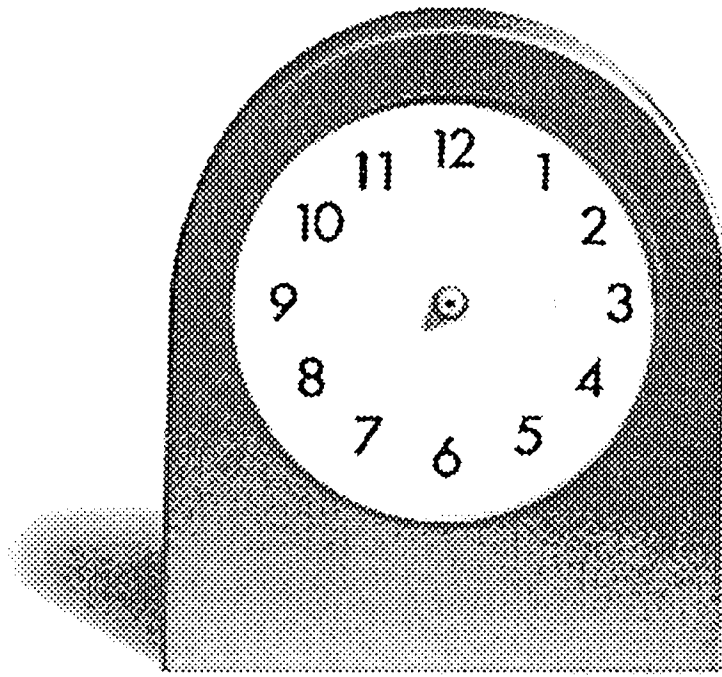
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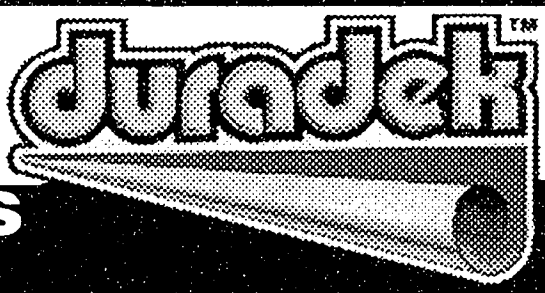

New temporary quarters approved for RCMP

With no new permanent building planned in the near future, extremely cramped RCMP officers and staff will be getting some relief as council agreed Tuesday to purchase portable office space and lease property for it adjacent to the Public Safety Building on Tantalus Way. But the move angered council critic Terrill Patterson.

In a report to council, treasurer Kim Anema said three quotations were received for a 40'x72' portable space for the RCMP, with the best price being \$145,600 quoted by Norco Trailer Manufacturing of Aldergrove, which includes installation. The original plan and budget was based on the possibility of moving a public works structure to the land owned by Mountain Holdings Ltd. for use by the RCMP, Anema said, but the public works department requires continued use of its facility at Municipal Hall.

"The RCMP investigated various used structures as a temporary solution to their space needs," said Anema. "Three used structures were found, however, after an inspection of these units the staff sergeant concluded that none of these was suitable on a cost effective basis. They were too run down and required additional investment to make them suitable for office use."

Rental of a portable unit was also considered,

but Anema said that would cost more than purchase of a new unit, particularly if the rent continued in excess of 41 months.

Anema also said the new portable would have a resale value of about \$60,000 after three years. The lease with Mountain Holdings Ltd. on the former Garibaldi Building Supplies property is \$4,500 per month.

"Spending one-quarter of a million dollars for two years of temporary use to house the RCMP isn't planning," said Patterson. "You have sufficient land to put up a sufficient building which is modular and can be expanded."

Funding announced to improve salmon access into estuary

Salmon will soon be able to better access the Squamish River estuary due to a recent funding announcement by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans.

Minister of Fisheries and Oceans David Anderson visited Squamish May 20 to announce \$99,950 in funding for a project being planned by the Squamish River Watershed Committee.

The committee wants to install a culvert to improve salmon access from the Squamish River to habitat in the estuary where a dike has restricted water flow.

The committee includes representatives from

This purchase should not be authorized. You should have been putting funds into a proper facility, rather than having this large expenditure of public funds on something temporary in nature. The public is not being well served."

Acting Mayor Dave Young said the purchase and lease will alleviate space problems for the RCMP. In the current facility, washrooms are being used for file storage, and officers and staff are in extremely cramped quarters.

"I don't believe we could have waited any longer," said Young.

Staff Sgt. Rex Henry said he is pleased with

council's decision to go ahead with the temporary facilities.

"We're very pleased to have this under our belt. We've been working with council for time and this is a real positive step for members and staff. We're in a crisis for and this will make our situation much better."

Henry said the new facility will be composed of six 40-foot pieces and trucked to the site to be assembled on site.

"We'll give them a personal escort to the highway," Henry said. He expects to be in the new building in eight weeks.

the Squamish Nation, industry, government and community groups.

Matt Foy, DFO's Lower Mainland restoration biologist, said the committee will plan the work with the federal government's assistance and Squamish residents will be employed to install the culvert.

"We're trying to provide access for fish to get into the estuary without having to go all the way around the training dike," said Foy. "The committee keeps us in tune with local issues."

Anderson also spent the day touring watershed restoration sites in the area and projects currently under way at the North Vancouver Outdoor School.

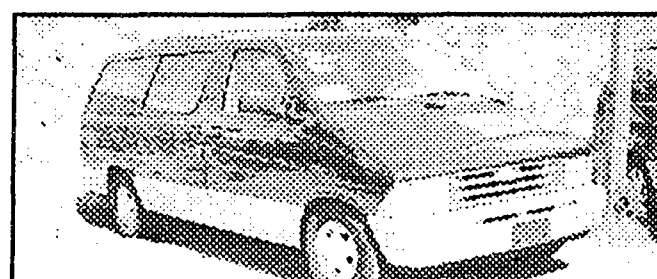
He also had a look at an Ashlu Creek side channel project which is a joint initiative of the

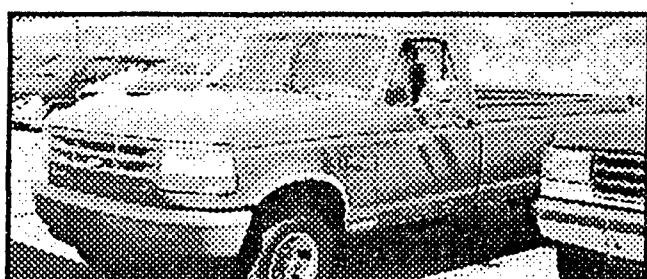
Funding for the committee's salmon project was one of 51 community projects which will receive financial support from the South Coast and Vancouver Island.

A total of \$3.46 million in funding from the federal \$15 million habitat restoration salmon enhancement program was announced. The projects are designed to rebuild salmon stocks, restore habitat and improve watershed stewardship.

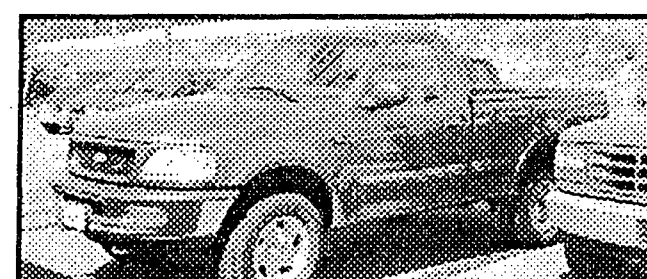
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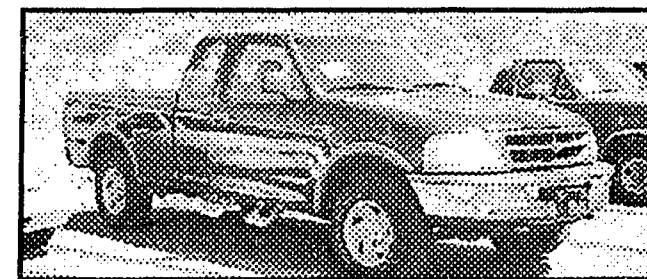
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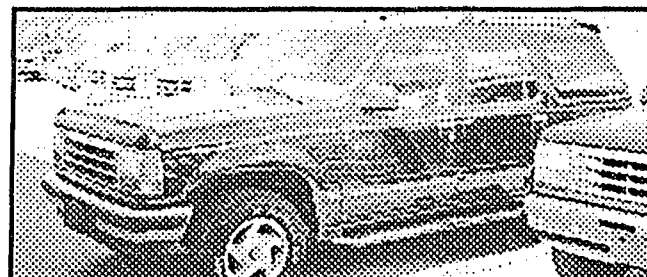
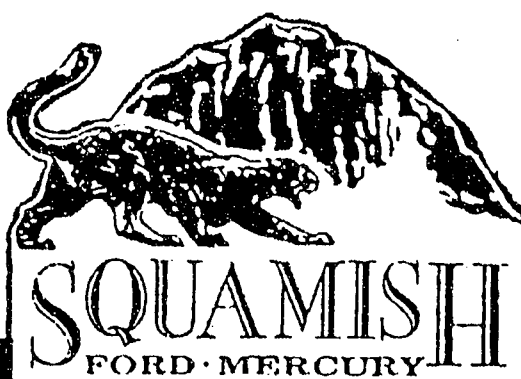

The criteria for the community category in which Manson will be honored recognizes broad-based community initiatives or solutions to challenges resulting from changes in the forest industry. From each of nine categories: forest management, environment, value-added, tourism, community, education, communications and media, forest service and youth, one recipient was selected.

Since 1946, Manson has devoted his life to the social and economic role of the forests to the people of Squamish.

This passionate interest and concern has manifested itself in local business, economic development, political, land use planning, educational, and research ventures.

Over the past four decades while operating a contract logging and road building business and continuing to be actively involved in community organizations, Manson has found the time and motivation to serve and express his interest and concern for people and communities throughout British Columbia whose livelihoods and well-being depend on the forests. While not all of his visions have been fulfilled or his advice heeded in the management and utilization of our forest resources, his contributions have advanced and inspired the community of Squamish and many people within the forest industry of B.C.

Some of Manson's contributions to forestry economic development and employment creation in Squamish are:

- In the 1960s he was a member of the Alice Lake Provincial Park Advisory Committee.
- In the early 1970s he organized and supervised a major diking construction project employing laid-off and unemployed forestry workers and logging equipment contractors.
- In the mid-1970s he employed laid-off forestry workers in house construction.
- 1980s concept development, design and promotion of waterfront redevelopment plan for Squamish including the creation of a major dryland sort — water, dewatering facility.
- 1989-91 he was a member of the advisory committee to establish the Brohm Lake Demonstration Forest.
- 1990-91 he was a small business represen-

tative and financial supporter of the Tin Wis Coalition Forest Stewardship Act Committee.

- 1995 - present initiator of current District of Squamish Community Forest Initiative.
 - June 1996 he was the co-organizer of Cowichan-Chemainus Valleys Community Forests Study Tour by a Squamish delegation.
 - He has chaired the Chamber of Commerce Serving Squamish, Britannia Beach and Furry Creek forestry committee since 1986 and is a chamber Senator.
 - He is a member of the Squamish Mayor's Forestry Advisory Committee.
- Manson's contribution to the legal status and economic stability of the B.C. logging contracting sector are;
- 1984-88 he was the secretary-manager of the Truck Loggers' Association of B.C.
 - Mid-1980s commissioned Hopwood Report, investigating credits against stumpage appraisal and payment to logging contractors.
 - 1986 he played a leadership role in negotiations to end a 41/2 month IWA strike.
 - 1988 initiated lobbying to have the Select Standing Committee on Forests and Lands examine timber harvesting contracts which eventually led to the enactment of Bill 13.
 - 1988 initiated B.C.'s first ever exhibition of small scale forestry technology, the Truck Loggers' Convention.

As well, Manson is an active promoter of B.C.'s forest heritage.

Manson will receive his award on June 24, in Victoria at a special luncheon to be hosted at Government House.

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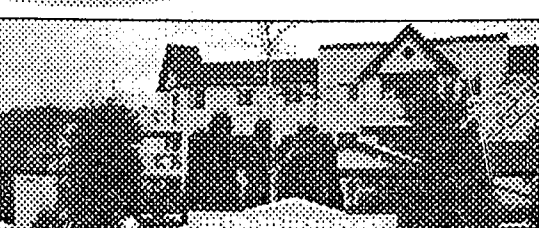
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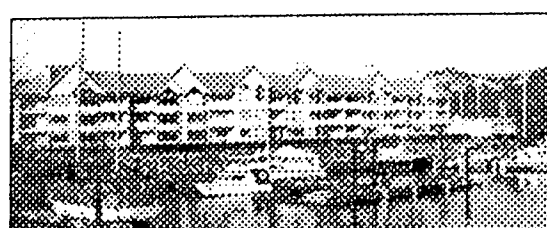
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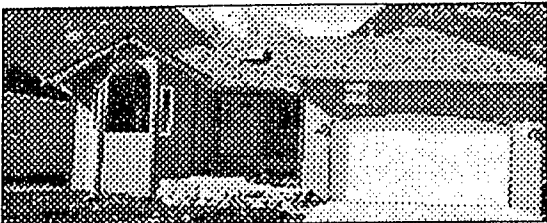
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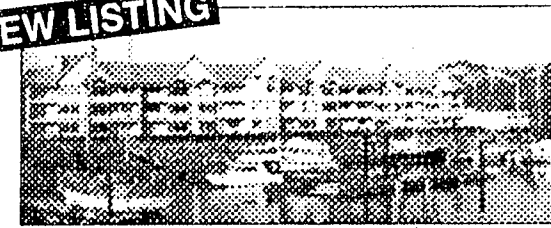

Prank calls reveal source

Late in the evening May 30 and early in the morning May 31, the Squamish RCMP detachment received three phone calls about different crimes in progress. One concerned glass being smashed at Garibaldi Highlands Elementary School, and another reported a bomb going off. An investigation by officers determined all three calls were pranks, but they did manage to get the cell phone number from which the calls originated.

Sgt. Dwain Wetteland said the owner of the cell phone will be approached, and B.C. Tel or B.C. Tel Mobility will be contacted as to whether that person should be allowed to have a cell phone.

"These were just stupid calls but our members had to go out on them," said Wetteland.

About \$3,000 worth of tools were stolen in a break-in at the B.C. Museum of Mining in Britannia Beach. Police said the theft took place between 6 p.m. May 30 and 11:15 a.m. May 31, when a shop was entered at the mine. There was some damage to the building and an old powder magazine had its lock cut off, but there was nothing in the magazine to be stolen.

At 6:35 p.m. May 29, a Vancouver resident was stopped by police and was found to be a prohibited driver. The 32-year-old male was charged with driving while prohibited, and his car was impounded for 30 days.

A quantity of cash was taken during a residential break-in on June 1 on Carmel Place. Police said the culprits gained entry through a rear door. They have no suspects in the case.

Police were called to an accident May 29 at 7:30 p.m. on Hwy. 99 by the Blind Channel Bridge. A 67-year-old Squamish man has been charged with impaired driving. There were no injuries.

Between May 28 and June 3, the RCMP CounterAttack team checked 1,000 vehicles in Squamish, Whistler and Pemberton. A total of six 24-hour suspensions were issued, one impaired driver charged, 24 warnings were issued, 12 tickets were served under the Motor Vehicle Act, one drug seizure of cocaine was made, one person was arrested on an outstanding warrant, one vehicle was towed for MVA infractions and four notices of repairs were made.

The increased roadchecks are part of a stepped-up CounterAttack initiative throughout the province, which will remain in place all summer.

"I think they're working," said Wetteland. "We will be out there anytime, anyplace."

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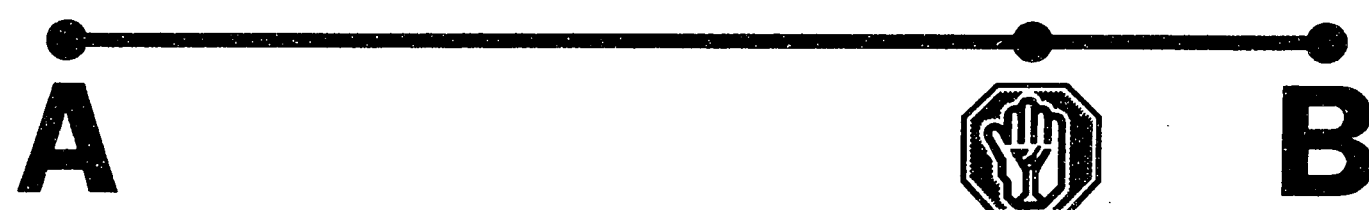

Up With People seeking host families...with or without saunas

The international experimental learning group Up With People is coming to Squamish to present its latest program, The Festival, to residents. Two members of the group are already here as an advance team, laying out the groundwork for the performance. Crates and Jessica Peshek are event coordinators for Up With People and will be spending the three weeks prior to the arrival of the group working on promoting the show, arranging for host families for cast members, organizing ticket outlets and arranging to have tickets and posters printed locally.

"We just want to get to know the community. We want to affect the community in a positive way," said Peshek.

Crates and Peshek will be meeting with service clubs, youth organizations and schools to explain what Up With People is all about, and get some input from Squamish residents about what they would like to see the group accomplish locally.

"It's a good time for us to be here," noted Crates.

Up With People are unique. We're not as easy and idealistic as our message might seem. We can make a difference and deal with the challenges as they come up. We can make things happen.

One of the challenges the advance team will be to overcome is finding 150 host families for the cast. Families are welcome to host more than one cast member and all they need to provide is a place to sleep, some local trans-

portation and a few meals. In return host families will receive two tickets to the performance.

The cast will arrive Thursday, June 25 and leave Squamish Sunday, June 28.

The experience of staying with host families is one that the cast members find as enjoyable as performing.

"Most of the cast members would say that the host families are their favorite part of the tour," said Crates.

"This is the end of their world tour. They'll have stayed with about 80 families in five different countries. It's a chance to share with another culture. We can learn from them, and they can learn from us," said Peshek.

The cast that will descend on Squamish has toured Denmark, Sweden, Germany, the U.S. and other parts of Canada.

"When you stay in a hotel, everywhere you go you get the same view. When you stay with a family, you experience reality," said Peshek.

Staying with families in foreign countries can often mean interesting experiences. Crates said that some of her fondest memories were living with a Navajo family on a reserve in New Mexico, living on a sailboat in California for a week and spending a Christmas in Finland.

Peshek related a story about a cast member staying in Finland who was asked by his host family if he would like to experience a real Finnish sauna.

The young man went to his room in the host family's house, changed into his shorts and went out to the sauna. Opening the door he was confronted with the sight of the entire

Finnish family sitting naked, as is Finnish custom, in the sauna. Slightly unnerved by the experience, but no worse for wear, the young man was asked again the following day if he would like to join the family for another sauna. Swallowing his pride and deciding that he should be open to new cultural experiences, the young man doffed his shorts and opened

the sauna door, only to be greeted by the Finnish family all wearing shorts so as to not offend their guest.

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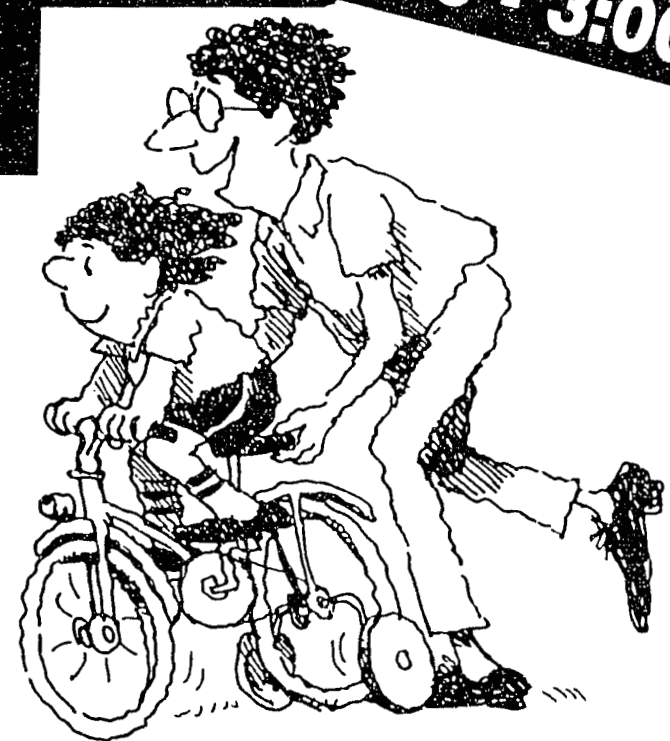
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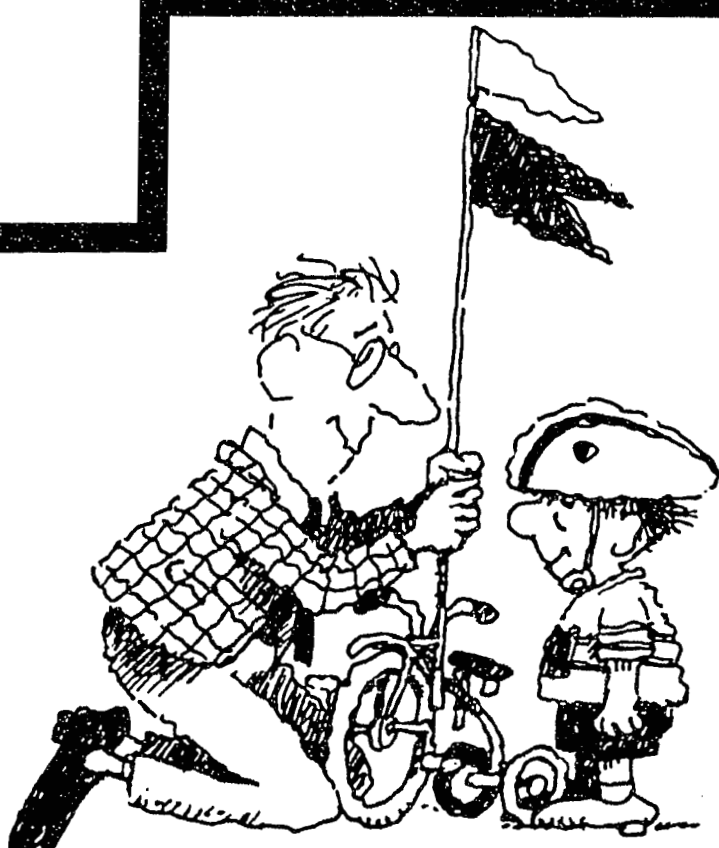
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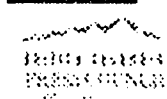

Squamish not defined by violence

Full marks to Shelley and Dave Smith for organizing a meeting Wednesday of concerned citizens wanting to do something about the reputation Squamish is gaining in the rest of the province. On extremely short notice they pulled in more than 40 people, with well over half being young people, who are tired of being tarred with the same brush for the violent actions of a few.

The meeting, which lasted about three hours, was a fascinating process of like-minded people getting together to exchange ideas, with the original anguish quickly evolving into action, positive action.

A flurry of terrific ideas were brought forward. With the limited time and resources available, it was decided to hold a walk and rally on Saturday, June 13, to raise money and raise voices, against violence and for the vast majority of terrific young people we have here in Squamish.

A walk and a rally might not seem like much, but it is a great first step, with the goal of raising \$1 for every person in Squamish, half to go to local youth programs and the other half to similar programs in the communities where the Cat Lake victims live.

We encourage everyone who possibly can to show up at Howe Sound Secondary School at 1:30 p.m. Saturday and join in the walk and rally. Considering the coverage by Lower Mainland media in the last week, they will all likely be there, so a show of community strength is needed.

As for the apology, we're sure everyone feels sorry for the injured victims. But we don't know the details of what went on there, and may never know. Once again, people aren't talking, or are presenting totally different pictures. But what we do know is that in any altercation, it takes two to tango.

The Lower Mainland media picked up on the story because of the name of the man charged with assault, Jamie Cudmore. They knew the name from their coverage of the Bob McIntosh murder, which took place at a party Cudmore hosted. The Cudmore name now sends a red flag flying in newsrooms throughout the province. Considering past incidents at Cat Lake, this would not have been a story for the provincial media had Jamie Cudmore not been involved.

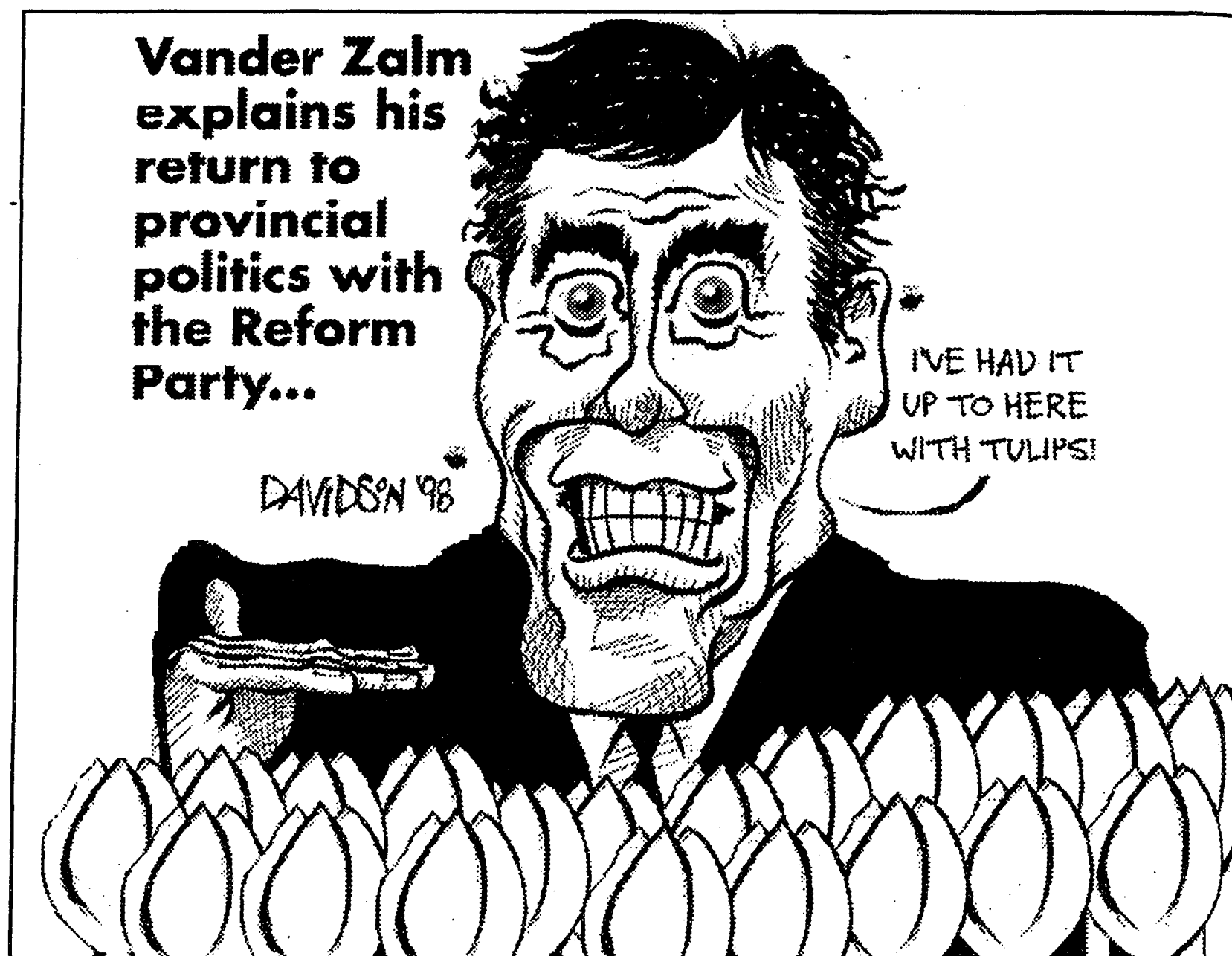
But Squamish cannot allow itself to be defined by the likes of Jamie Cudmore, which is what the major media, particularly the Province newspaper, have done. Accuracy isn't so critical as they don't have to face their readers or listeners as we do every day at The Chief and Mountain FM. They drop in to Squamish to cover one incident, get the news, the reaction, then leave. Squamish is much more than that.

Squamish is defined by the likes of the Squamish Off-Road Cycling Association raising enough money in one fun event to buy special bikes for two handicapped children. It is the 16 Howe Sound Secondary School graduates last year who won major provincial scholarships. It is the community participation in the blockade of environmentalists. It is David Slik winning gold medals in international science fairs. It is the 15 young people conquering their nerves to compete Thursday on stage at the Eagle Eye Theatre in the Star Search competition. It is the thousands of volunteer hours put in at the Tantalus Seniors Centre, Hilltop House, the Test of Metal and the new kite festival, Loggers Sports and so much more. Those stories make the headline news in The Chief and on Mountain FM, but the major media could care less because they don't sell papers or boost ratings.

There is no denying that Squamish has its problems. Spousal assaults are far too frequent, and adults don't always set a good example for our young people. In this case, blaming the RCMP for conspiring against an individual or group is a cop out, when the quality of parenting is what's most at issue. But Squamish has a great deal more to be proud of than to apologize for.

Joining the walk and rally on Saturday will be a good start. From the ideas which came out at Wednesday's meeting, there are lots more fun ways to raise money for youth programs, and lots of creative people to carry them through. That would be the best apology the community could make, taking steps to ensure our young people have positive and fun things to do so they don't go off track, and letting the small handful of social misfits know their act is no longer welcome in this town.

Film commission pot stirred

Sea to Sky Film Committee chair Jane McCarthy went up one side of me and down the other, and then up the first side again for good measure. She explained that it was simply a business decision.

From all reports, those interested participants from Squamish who went up the hill to Whistler were really impressed, not only by the quality of the speakers and panel, but the volunteer organizers as well. Coun. Meg Fellowes said at the council meeting Tuesday she was extremely impressed, and hoped something similar could be arranged for Squamish in the future.

Perhaps the biggest problem with the film forums was that they planned two in the first place. I doubt anyone in Squamish would have blinked at going to Whistler, as they obviously did, if there hadn't been a session planned for Squamish. But taking ours away, 10 days before the event, raised a few hackles.

In my column I pointed out that Squamish people are notoriously late in signing up for anything. Perhaps this is a good lesson for us to get off the mark a

little quicker, but old habits are hard to break.

As you can see from his letter below, Wolfgang Richter, who was the first B.C. Film Commissioner, is keen on a Squamish Film Committee. I don't discount that as a possibility, but am no longer convinced it is the best idea...just yet.

Each community has its strong points, which can be complementary to each other. A strong and unified commission can make the corridor more than the sum of its parts. Part of that unity is respecting each community's quirks. And not biting off more than you can chew.

Whistler film forum well organized, but...

The forum was well organized and the professionalism of the panelists was impressive. I would also like to commend our Adriane Polo for her contribution to its success and making us proud of having our very own film producer recognized by successful people from the big city companies.

However, it wasn't long into the forum before I was reminded that when an event like this happens in a community, it is as if the people of that community are touched with a magic wand. This only underlined how unfortunate it was that this opportunity was not extended to Squamish, especially now, when jobs and diversification of economic opportunities are such important issues.

It was also interesting to note that the forum included representatives of not only the regional film

agencies, such as the B.C. Film Commission and Sea to Sky Film Committee, but also the Victoria and Campbell River film commissions.

After listening to the Campbell River commissioner relay the success of having landed a major Distefeat last year, and how that stimulated the economy of her community, I asked the panel how important it was to have a local network of talent, location and resources organized if one wanted to secure such an opportunity. After all, beyond how entertaining and stimulating the film industry may be, it's really about cold hard cash, and the first community to bank wins. Everyone seemed to agree.

In discussions with Adriane, we hope she will follow up and try to organize something similar to the Whistler event for Squamish as part of the film festival she is staging in September.

Given the discussions I have had about this with the many interested people in Squamish, as suggested in your editorial, perhaps it is time for Squamish to have its own film commission so that a film forum in our community in late summer might become an occasion to both rally our resources and even celebrate some of the successes of the establishment of the Squamish Film Commission.

Change can only begin at home

Editor,

Over the past week, Shelley Smith and I have had many conversations and I know the views I express here are hers as well.

It was with a great deal of mixed emotions that we received the news on Monday of the weekend incident at Cat Lake involving several Squamish youth and young adults, resulting in charges being laid against Jamie Cudmore with charges against others a possibility yet to come. Sadness, anger, fear and powerlessness bubbled to the surface as if in a tangled ball of yarn one despairs at ever being able to unwind. For so many of us, the death of Bob McIntosh remains an open wound, our hearts not able to find a way to heal and move on. This is all too soon. Yet here it is and we both know that these incidents are part of a larger, more complex story that will unfold in time and with the wisdom time brings.

It was Shelley who realized that despair immobilizes and keeps us unable to respond in constructive, life-affirming ways. Wanting to move past despair, she set out to find people of like mind who wanted to be involved in a public demonstration of our belief in ourselves, our youth and our community.

For many people, Squamish is a wonderful place to raise our children and live our lives. It has been deeply troubling to us to have been portrayed in such negative ways in the various media this past few months and in particular this past week. This is not who we are and how we define ourselves. Racism, violence and hatred are not our values.

Shelley organized a meeting of interested people with 24-hour notice. Many came, and out of that meeting in an amazingly short time was launched the Pride In Youth Walk and celebration scheduled for this coming Saturday. The hope is that we will raise \$1 per person in Squamish in support of youth initiatives here and in the community where those affected by the Cat Lake incident live.

The money itself is only one way to show ourselves and those who live outside of Squamish that we as a community are not supportive of violence and we will not stand for it. Beyond the money is a greater motivation, to mobilize people past despair, to acknowledge our anger and find ways to move beyond it. The potential for deeper community is before us. We are trying to build a creative, fulfilling future out of the chaos of the present moment.

We, as a community, are a microcosm of a macro-

cosm. What we are experiencing here is being experienced in varying degrees by communities everywhere. The world itself is in turmoil on so many levels as we humans discover our ways of being on the earth are destructive; our isolation from each other and from community the cause of so much suffering.

This does not mean that we can say we are no different than anywhere else and we need do nothing. Change only begins at home. Never somewhere else. We have the potential to give other communities who struggle a great gift, a road map through the chaos, one that we have travelled ourselves and we know well.

It was Chief Seattle who called the Earth community a web of life, we are each strands in that web. Our community is a web of life. What we each do matters a great deal to the whole. We are important in each other's lives. The actions of a few in our community have affected us all. Now we, the many, have the opportunity to move beyond this present painful place to a future where we have been made stronger, wiser and more connected to each other.

Forum highlights importance of working together

Editor,

The Sea to Sky Film Committee would like to thank the 150 people from throughout the Sea to Sky corridor and beyond who attended the Community Film Forum on May 30.

The great turn out on a sunny Saturday, receiving an overall rating of 8.5 on the forum evaluation form and extremely positive feedback from everyone in attendance, was gratifying. However your editorial of May 26 implied the decision to cancel the Squamish event was unjustified and an affront to the citizens of Squamish.

This was not the case, rather the decision to combine the two events was made for business reasons:

We planned the event with the pro-

viso that if, as of the "drop dead" date, advance registration was low in either Whistler or Squamish, the two forums would be combined, or canceled if low in both sites. As of the deadline we had received only 17 registrations in Squamish which included several people who had registered for both forums, while Whistler had 45. Fortunately, many of the Squamish pre-registrants were able to attend the Whistler event.

In spite of promoting the event through the Squamish Chamber of Commerce, only two businesses had advance registered, while the majority of Whistler registrants were businesses. This fact refutes your comment that a Saturday event would be difficult for businesses to attend.

Several of our speakers informed us that they were unable to commit to doing both forums, meaning the Squamish forum would not have the full slate of speakers. Registration in Squamish would have benefited from the Chief's positive advance editorial support, especially given your involvement as a sponsor.

The purpose of the forum was to present an introductory overview of the industry and the opportunities which exist within the various areas of the industry.

With the incentive we face increased competition from other locations in B.C., therefore it will be even more important than ever to work together to promote this area and all it has to offer.

If there was one underlying theme or message communicated by all the forum speakers it was the importance of working together towards common goals.

Our committee of volunteers has an equal mix of Squamish/Whistler representatives (we're still seeking a Pemberton representative). We

would invite residents throughout the corridor who are willing to work hard, have sufficient time and business does not present a conflict of interest to meet with us and present a united effort in promoting this area to the film industry. We can be reached at (604)938-2775.

In closing we would like to announce that Joan Miller of the Campbell River Film and Broadcast Commission who spoke at the forum has agreed to return to speak on their town's experience in filming of Disney's production Eaters of the Dead. We hope to have this very informative public meeting in Squamish some time this summer.

'Friendship' is no excuse for remaining silent on McIntosh murder

Editor,

A few months ago I wrote a letter that caused a lot of outrage for a lot of people. My major incentive was to stand up for someone I believed was innocent, or at least had remorse for what had happened. I did not know at that time the autopsy reports would say it had to have been more than one punch, and I did not know then that maybe it was somebody else.

I am writing now, in hopes that everybody or anybody who was at that party or knows anything at all, will figure out what is more important to them. You and I both know that somebody or some people are guilty of the murder of Bob McIntosh. You and I both know that somebody out there knows something, somebody out there holds a key that could bring this case to an end, and we both know that the people who took Bob's last breath are walking around free, still smiling, still partying. Don't you find that the least bit disturbing?

Mr. McIntosh was taken from this world in a senseless and brutal manner. His children are now without a father, his wife without a husband. Now she is left to deal with explaining this to her children, and to deal with being strong for the sake of her children. There will never be closure for Katy and her two children until we get to the bottom of this.

When you wake up in the morning, take a good look at yourself in the mirror, and ask yourself this: "Can I live with myself knowing what I know or what I've heard?" While Father's Day is approaching, think to yourself how you might be feeling if your father were murdered. When you call your dad or give him a big happy Father's Day hug, think of Sam and Emma who only have pictures and memories, and then think of Katy whose heart is broken.

Why is it that you choose to be silent? Is it a friendship thing or did you all make a pact?

What are you afraid of? That everyone will turn against you, look down on you because you're doing the right thing? Who are they? Your friends? If that's the way it's going to be, they were never your friends to begin with. I had a lot of friends during high school and I know what it's like to want to stick with your friends. But as I got a little older, a little more mature, I lost touch with them and found that the few friend I had left are my true friends. You obviously don't know what friendship is.

I saw Mr. McIntosh walk in that night. All he was doing was checking on us, maybe to make sure things like this never happened. How on earth can you take someone's life in such a brutal and disgusting way? You showed no mercy. What gives you the right to take another's life? Does that give us the right to take yours? Because I'm sure that a lot of people feel that way. But that is no solution. Wake up. These people, whether or not it was an acci-

dent, have taken someone's life and they deserve to be walking.

This will all come out sooner than you think because what you don't realize is that people are coming forward, and more people know who is at fault. The more you drag on, the harsher the penalty. As the old saying states: "What goes around, comes around." You may run, but the longer you hide, the truth will eat you up inside.

Let's be honest with each other. If this was you and your family, you would be hating these people down on a mad rampage, and you would be damn sure the whole world would know exactly who did it. Be honest with your family and true friends will stand behind you. We are sincerely supportive of the McIntosh family.

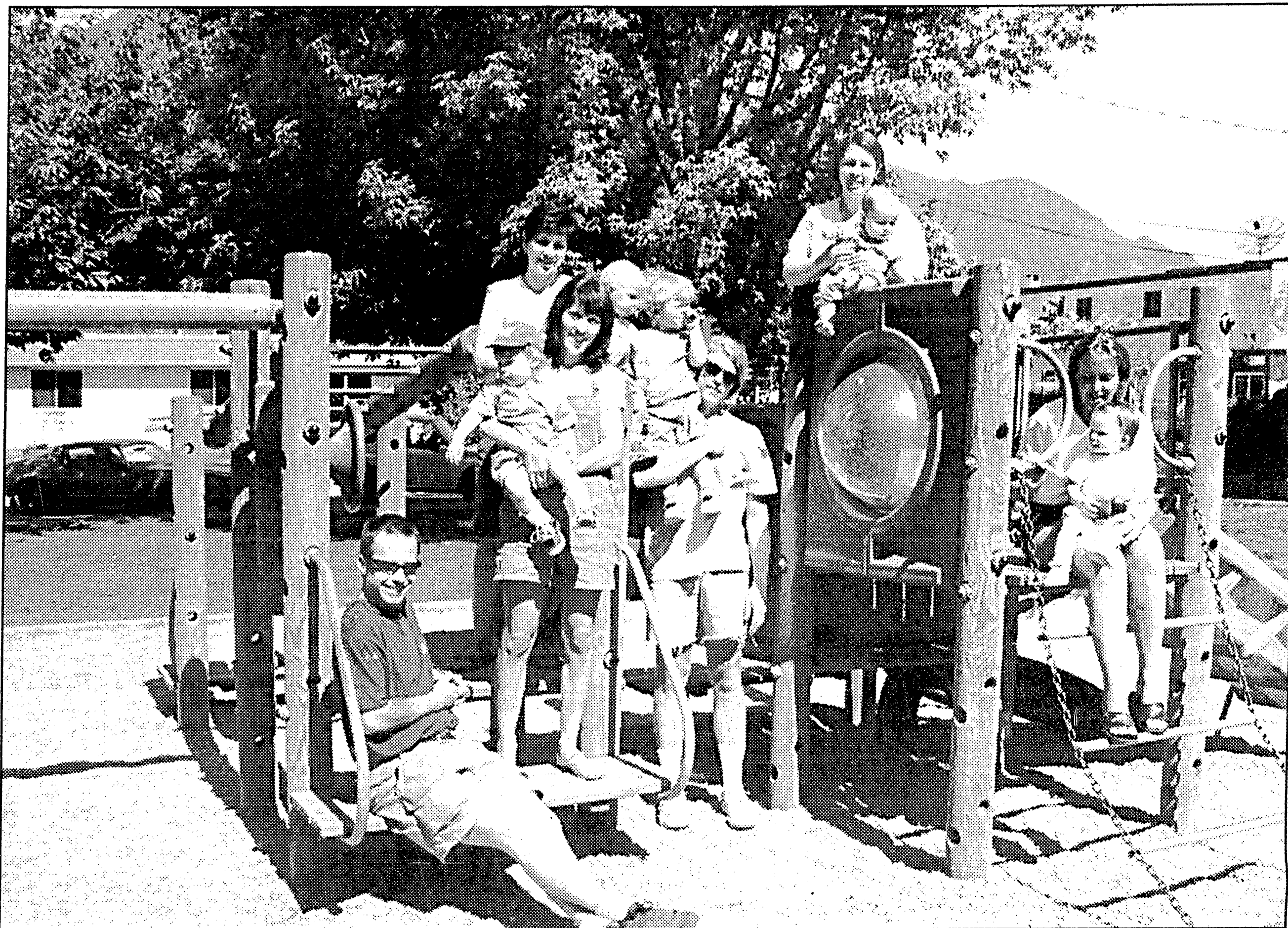

The department has published a 1998 British Columbia Tidal Waters Sport Fishing Guide, which is available through DFO and at the 600+ vendors throughout the province.
Important regulations for anglers are outlined in the booklet and are updated on the Internet version, as well as on the recorded telephone information line.

Meat products called safe

The Coast-Garibaldi Health Unit advises that Venetian Meat and Salami Ltd. has initiated a voluntary recall of all dry fermented meat products under the Venetian Brand name, product codes 300 to 3 and 004 to 047 (products produced before Feb. 1998). These products may be contaminated with coli 0157:H7, and may be linked to a recent outbreak in Niagara, Hamilton and Brant counties.
Coli 0157:H7 can cause serious and potentially life threatening illness. These products have been distributed in Ontario, British Columbia and the U.S.

The committee members have dreams of what it could become. They would like to see teenagers getting involved and children of different ages working together. Eventually, they hope to have activities for adults such as gardening, photography and crafts.

Canada World Youth's exchange program with Estonia is coming to Squamish. From the end of August through to late November, a group of young people aged 17-21, nine from Estonia and nine from across Canada, will immerse themselves in the life and work of Squamish. 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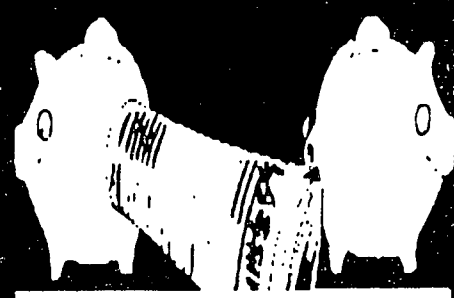

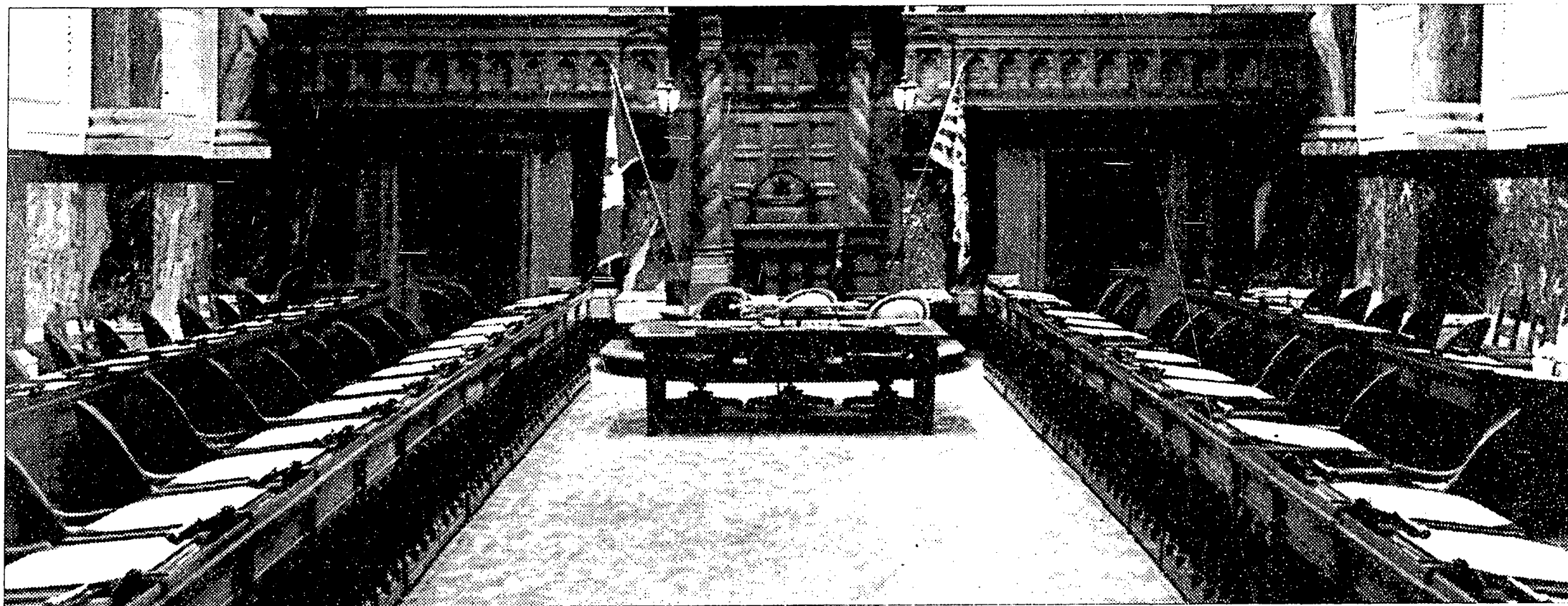

AN EXAMPLE OF THE NDP HEALTH CARE GRAB

Quality of oil determines quality of homemade mayo

Homemade mayonnaise and salad dressing are dependable constants in an uncertain world. They always work (at least when you use a blender) and always taste good. Now that the price of lettuce has dropped, and new potatoes are hitting the markets, we're into salad days. All that's missing is the mayo.

The quality of the oil used in the mayo will determine the quality of the finished mayonnaise. Use a bland vegetable oil that's absolutely fresh. Olive oil is generally too heavy in body and taste. My preference has always been cold-pressed safflower oil.

I also use a dash of Aromat, an MSG seasoning made by Knorr. It brings up the flavors of the other ingredients above the taste of the oil. MSG is a naturally occurring amino acid present in most protein. This explains the singularly bland taste of vegetable oil and its deadening effect on other ingredients. Most foods do not need MSG.

This sweet and tangy mayonnaise makes great potato salad. Make it a bit thinner for salad dressing.

Creamy Honey Mayo

1 egg
2 Tbsp. vinegar

2 tsp. honey
dash of salt
1/4 tsp.

Aromat

lots of freshly ground black pepper

about 3/4 cup vegetable oil (or more)

Break the egg into a blender jar. Add the vinegar, honey and seasonings. Turn on the blender, and slowly add the oil in a thin stream until the mayonnaise is thick and smooth. Taste for seasonings and adjust to taste.

Use this thick mayo for new potato salad. Add lots of chopped dill pickles to add a tangy counterpoint to the sweet dressing.

To make a truly divine potato salad, add barely cooked little peas, fresh from the garden.

There's a great mayonnaise trick for salmon fillets. Place the fillets skin side down on a foil or parchment lined baking sheet. Spread a thin layer of homemade mayonnaise over the

surface. Bake in a 450 degree oven for 10 to 15 minutes, depending on the thickness of the fish. Figure on about 10 minutes per inch of thickness. Season the mayonnaise with fresh herbs — dill or tarragon is delicious with fish.

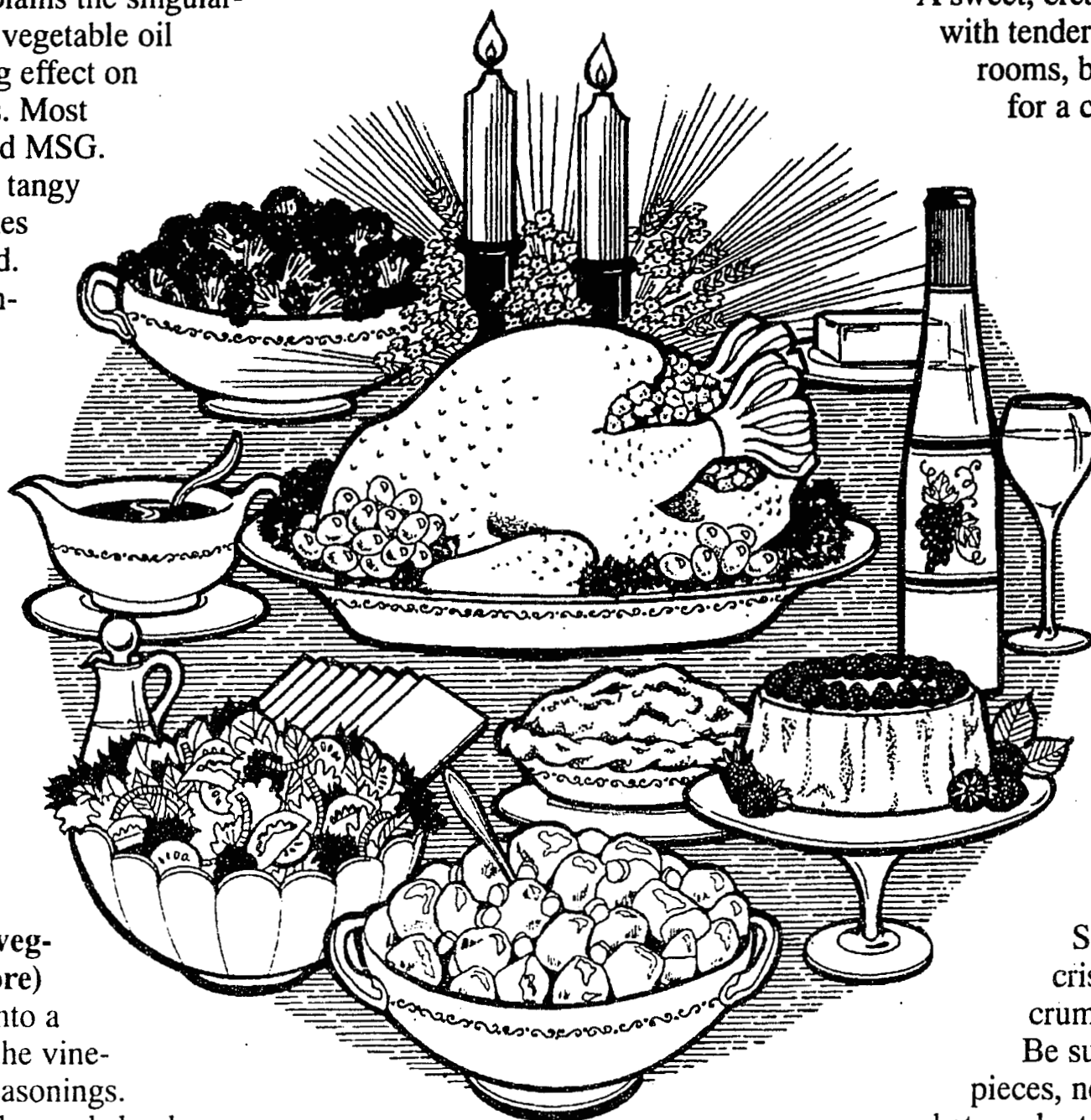
To make this mayo into a thinner salad dressing, only use about 1/2 cup oil in the recipe, adding only enough to make a dressing that can be poured. If too thick, thin with a bit more vinegar. If too sharp tasting, add more honey. For a simple and classy salad, drizzle this dressing over quarters of baby butter lettuce.

A sweet, creamy dressing like this is lovely with tender spinach salad. Add mushrooms, bacon bits and toasted walnuts for a complete meal.

1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms

4 slices bacon

1/2 cup walnut pieces
honey mayonnaise
salad dressing

Prepare the spinach — discard wilted leaves, remove stems. Wash in a basin full of cold water. Drain well and spin dry in a lettuce spinner. Wipe the mushrooms clean. Use only solid button type mushrooms which are pale and unopened. Slice thinly. Fry the bacon until crisp. Drain on paper towels and crumble into bits.

Be sure to buy very fresh walnut pieces, not stale ones. Many people hate walnuts because they've only ever eaten bitter tasting rancid ones. Buy them

from a health food store where they've been stored in the fridge, or from a store where the turnover of nuts is high.

To toast the walnuts — stir them around in a heavy frying pan over medium heat for about five minutes, until they smell fragrant. Chop them coarsely.

Tear the spinach into bite-sized pieces. Toss with the sliced mushrooms and enough dressing to coat completely. Pile onto two plates or shallow bowls, sprinkle with crumbled bacon and walnuts.

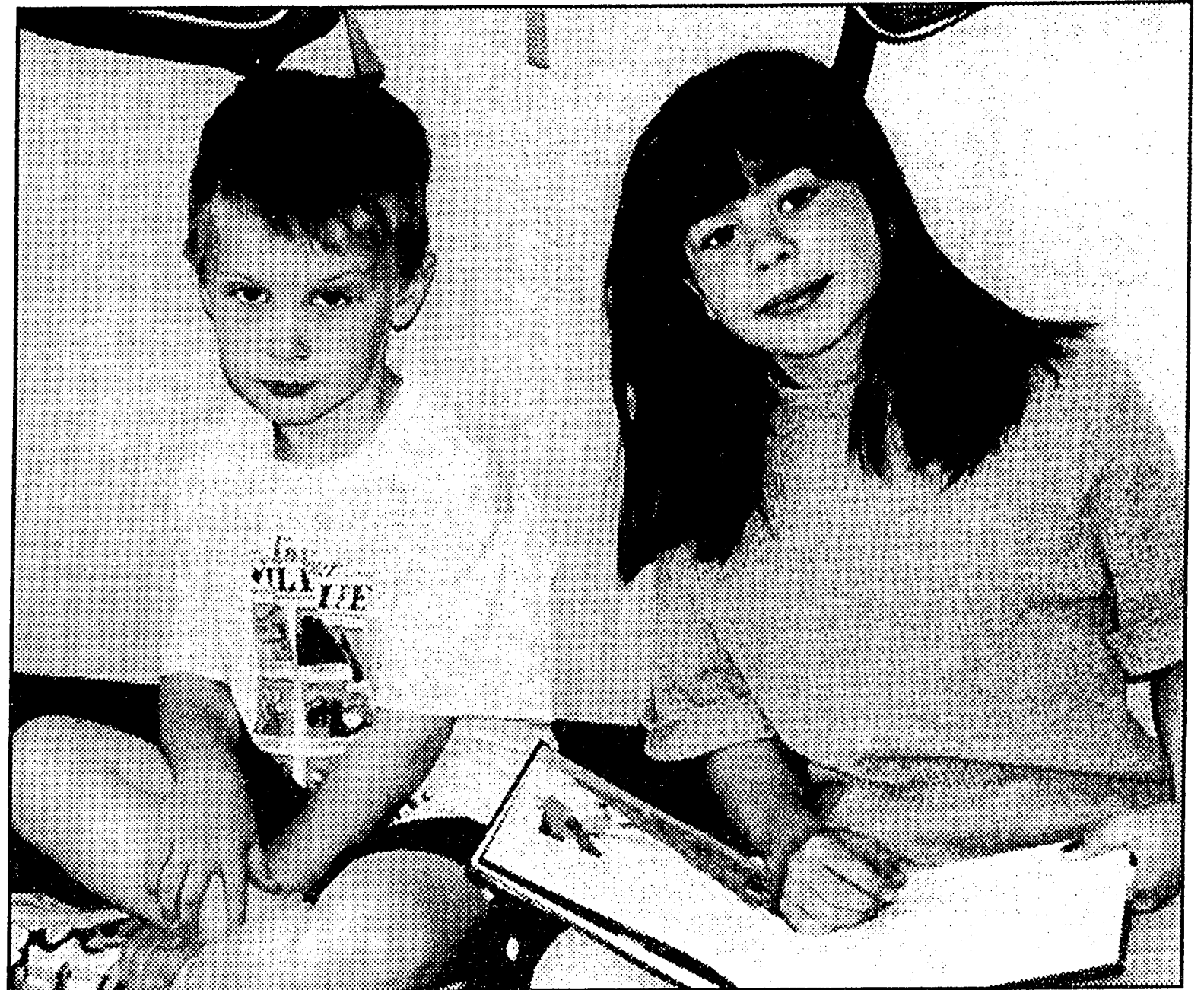

The gate at 2.0 km has been permanently gated. Recreational users of the Cat Lake Recreation Site will be required to walk into camp sites.

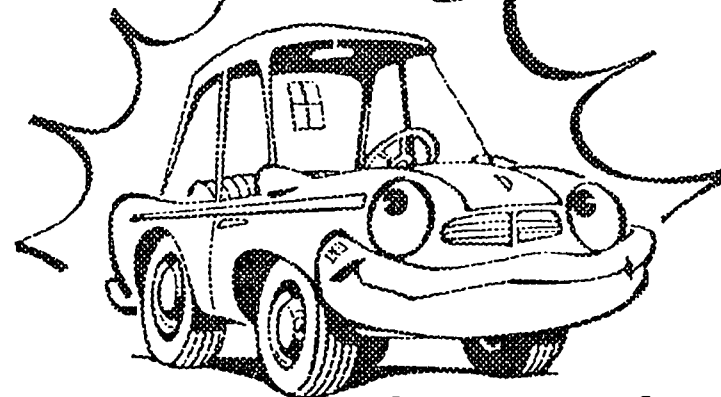

Operate portable gas heaters safely outside

The Ministry of Municipal Affairs urges all British Columbians to camp on the safe side, specifically to use caution when using portable propane appliances for heating and cooking.

While camping is a great way to enjoy B.C.'s incredible wilderness and natural beauty, a camping experience can be marred by improper use of propane appliances. To ensure a safe camping experience with propane:

- Consult the manufacturer's instructions before using a portable propane appliance.
- Use appliances fired by propane gas outside in freely ventilated areas.

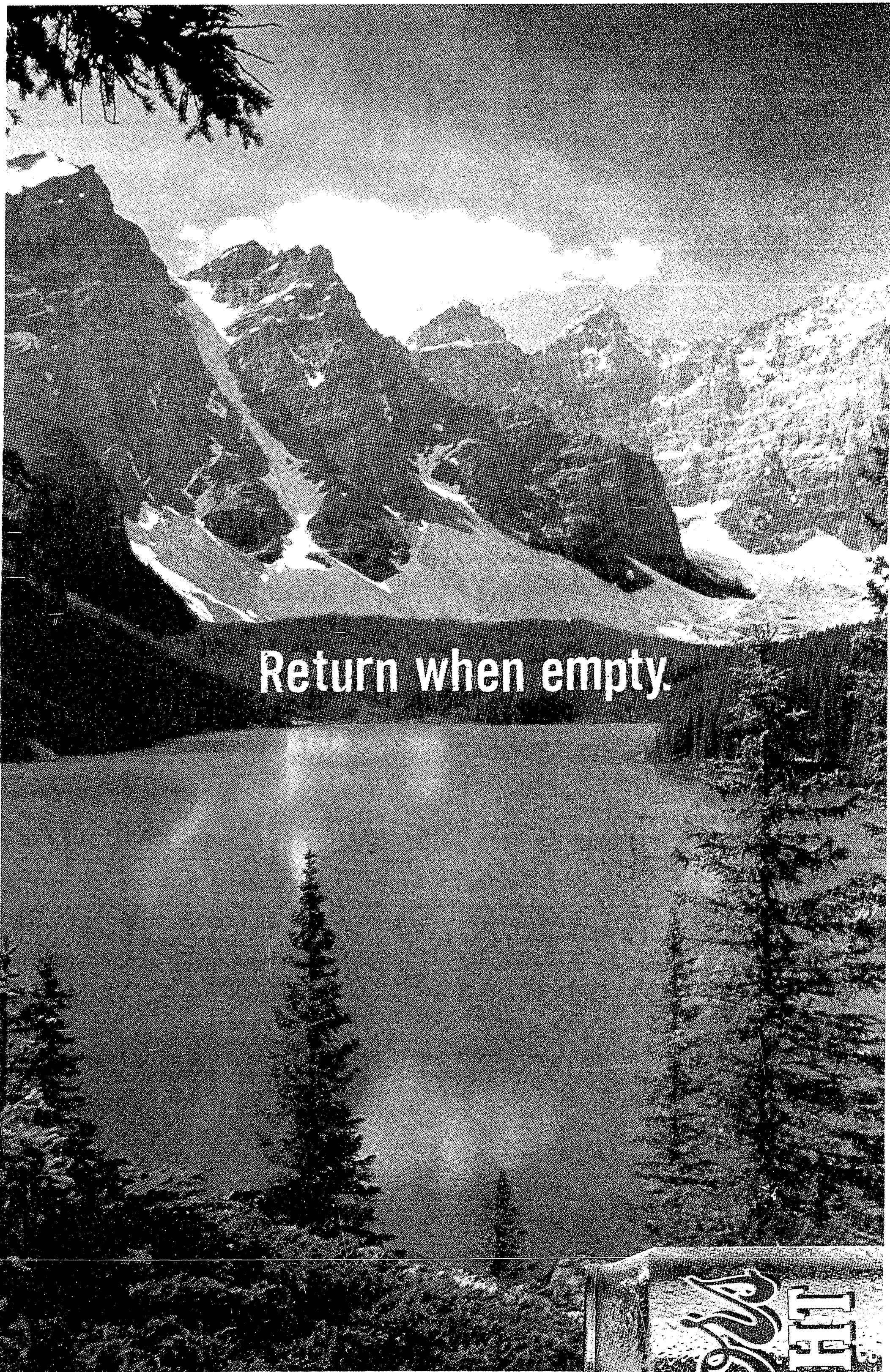
- Never use these appliances in a tent or vehicle.
- Do not sleep in a tent, camper or recreational vehicle with a portable gas heater inside even if a window is open.

Using a propane appliance in an enclosed area puts you at risk of carbon monoxide poisoning, which could be fatal. Be aware of the indications of carbon monoxide poisoning:

- Headache, drowsiness, dizziness.
- Nausea, vomiting, extreme sleepiness.
- Heart flutter, shortness of breath.

If someone shows signs of carbon monoxide poisoning:

- Get them to fresh air.
- If they are not breathing, give mouth-to-mouth resuscitation.
- Get medical help.

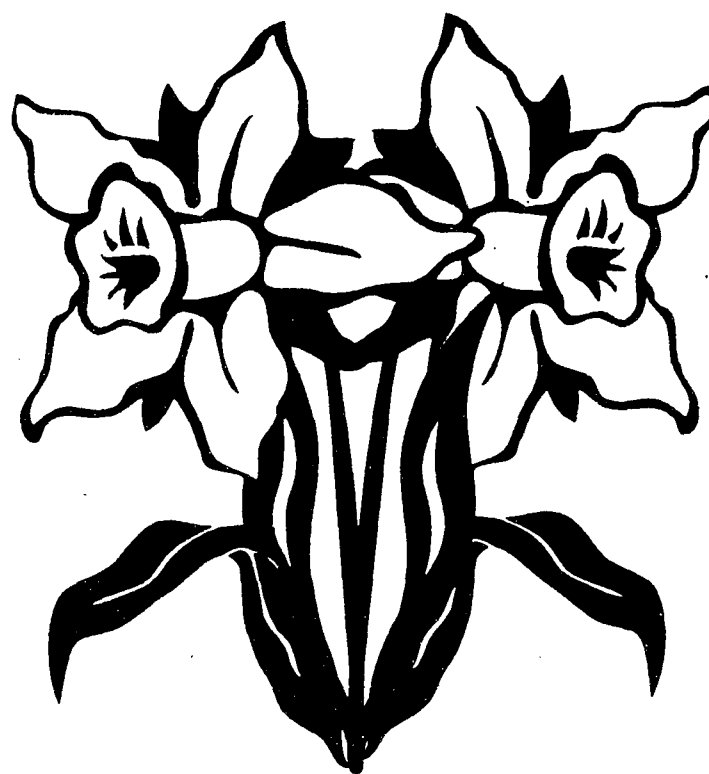

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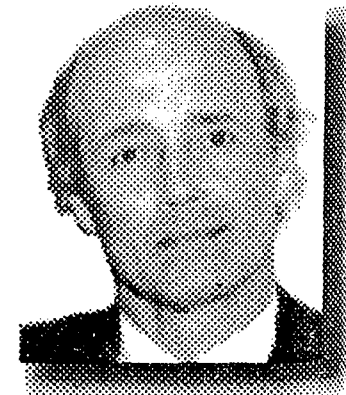

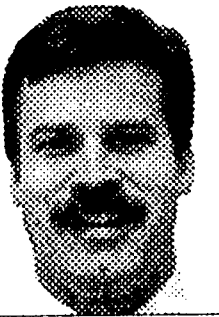

Council supports bid to host provincial conference of fire prevention officers

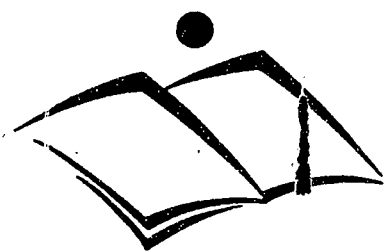

Council has thrown its support behind a bid by Squamish Fire Rescue to host the Fire Prevention Officers of B.C. annual conference in the fall of 2000. Fire chief Pat Hampson said the four-day conference will bring a minimum of 83 delegates, about 20 spouses and up to 20 speak-

"It is an opportunity for members of Squamish Fire Rescue to benefit from exposure to new ideas, and it enables us to promote our community," said Hampson.

"A conservative calculation suggests that we may expect to generate \$36,000 of accommodation revenue, \$13,000 in food alone, with many other spin-offs available."

"We feel this is a really important step for us," said Hampson. Council agreed to supply a letter of support.

Squamish Health Care Society offers free installation for Lifeline personal response service this month

In the summer season rapidly approaching, caregivers responsible for parents and relatives living independently become even more concerned — vacation periods often create a greater need for the ability to communicate in case of emergency.

In fact, said Sally Nichol, Lifeline Program Manager at the Squamish Health Care Society, the need for emergency response is so important that, in recognition of Seniors Week, the installation cost of a Lifeline personal response service has been waived in the month

of June. Lifeline, provided through a network of independent community-based programs, is designed to provide reassurance while enhancing subscribers' ability to communicate and obtain help in case of emergency.

When subscribers need to call for help, they simply push a button, which is worn as a discrete pendant or wristband. This activates a simple-to-use communications system installed in their home. The system is connected by telephone lines to a local hospital or monitoring facility, such as Squamish Health Care, where a trained professional will answer subscribers' calls.

"Summer is vacation time and people travel,

often to places distant from their homes," said Nichol. "Sometimes caregivers are out of reach of an easy telephone call, especially when camping, hiking or at lakefront or seaside cottages. There is great motivation to make sure loved ones at home can obtain help if needed.


"With Lifeline, families are reassured that their loved ones can summon help with the push of a button at any time. Lifeline immediately informs you of any change in a loved ones condition, thus providing you with peace of mind even though you may be miles away on vacation."

Nichol said the ability to get help when nec-

essary is a key determinant of whether seniors or persons with disabilities can continue to live in their own familiar surroundings. Families are recognizing that, with Lifeline service, continued independent living in a familiar home, containing many memories, is not only possible for their loved ones but healthier.

"Independent living for loved ones is very important," said Nichol. "Lifeline has made a big difference in Squamish and we hope that caregivers will take advantage of the no-cost installation this June, in honor of Seniors Week. This summer can then be worry-free for seniors, those with disabilities and their families.

NOTICE OF WCB INFORMATION SESSIONS ON THE NEW OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH AND SAFETY REGULATION

To help provide safer and healthier workplaces, The Workers' Compensation Board has introduced new health and safety standards.

The new *Occupational Health and Safety Regulation* took effect on April 15, 1998, with a one year graduated compliance period. The standards under the Regulation will provide a solid foundation for achieving safer, healthier workplaces and further reducing the number of workers injured or killed on the job in British Columbia.

The new Regulation contains legal requirements for employers on the protection of workers from occupational injury and disease. It applies to all work sites around the province and primarily reflects changes in industry, technology and work practices.

The WCB will be hosting free general and industry specific information sessions to provide an overview of the Regulation. Small business owners and operators, and employers in high-risk industries are invited to learn why new health and safety standards are required. New key sections of the Regulation will also be reviewed, along with changes to existing requirements, both of which will impact business and industry.

All participants will receive a copy of the *Occupational Health and Safety Regulation*, along with an easy-to-read guide highlighting key sections, changes and new additions.

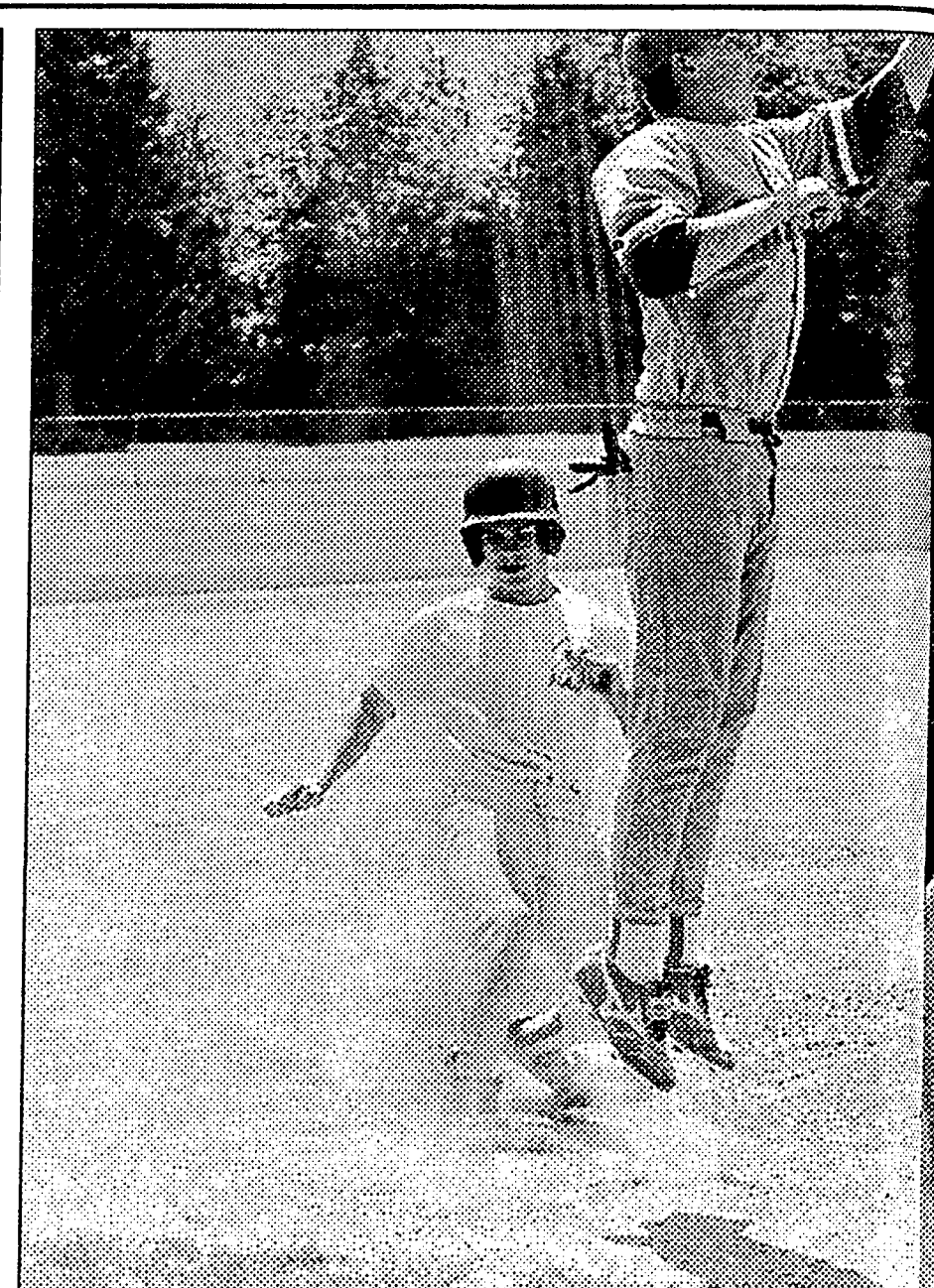
