

Economic action needed now, say residents at strategy open house

teve Nicol of Crane Management nsultants, who gave a formal pretation on the strategy, said resints should not expect instant job ation from the plan and should see nore as a guide to lead the municiity's economic development office to better plan for the future.

le urged people to make a long-term mmitment to the strategy. "There no miracle cures in terms of what h be done with economic developnt," said Nicol.

one of the plan's biggest recommenions is to move the town's economdevelopment officer out of unicipal Hall and into a more indendent location. Nicol, one of three nsultants who worked on the strate-, said the EDO's current budget is

insufficient and the district needs to either scale back on activities or increase funding for the position. He said the EDO should not function as part of municipal government and should be more accessible to the business community.

Nicol said funding could come from other government agencies or from the private sector. The 1999 budget for the EDO and other municipal functions has not been finalized.

"I don't think any more money has to come from the municipality," he said. While EDO Mitchell Edgar was present at the meeting, he did not give formal statements to the public.

The strategy stresses a need for Squamish to further diversify its economy and build stability.

"There is a lot of concern locally about the lack of diversification," said Nicol.

The strategy also attempts to increase opportunities for sustainable development and employment for residents. It is also designed to help Squamish develop its sense of community and improve its quality of life.

One of the document's major conclusions is that some of Squamish's mature industries, mainly forestry, are losing their competitive edge.

Nicol said Squamish has many

unique characteristics and is better positioned than many B.C. communities to build a strong local economy, but more vision and initiative is needed to attract new development. He said the entire community needs to get involved to implement recommendations outlined in the plan.

Residents gave their own presentations after hearing Nicol. Several people showed their support for the strategy and expressed a need to move ahead with an action plan. Others voiced their opposition or took the opportunity to talk about what they think Squamish needs to improve its economy.

The topics ranged from plans for a university in Squamish, forestry and the value-added wood sector, the environment, technology, jobs and other issues.

David Lassmann, who ran for council in last fall's byelection, said he agrees the economic development office should be outside of Municipal Hall, but he said it is "naive" to think the EDO will then be free of political interference.

Lassmann said the strategy should include suggestions on how to attract money for businesses and development.

"People want jobs and to me that

means attracting capital," he said.

Resident and businessman Wilf Dowad said Squamish needs both short-term and long-term solutions to help boost its economy. Dowad said he has faith in the future of the wood industry, but the district needs to improve development opportunities in the Squamish Industrial Park and downtown. He said the tourism industry also needs to be built up by providing more hospitality to visitors.

"One of the biggest problems is people don't feel welcome here," said Dowad.

Mayor Corinne Lonsdale urged residents to let council know what they think about the strategy. "Without the support of the business community, it won't go anywhere," she said.

Council members and municipal staff are scheduled to discuss where the strategy should go from here during a committee of the whole meeting today at around 1 p.m. The meeting, which takes place at Municipal Hall, is open to the public.



Letters from people around the world showing support for or opposition to a proposed 500,000-hectare national park near Whistler will no longer be on Squamish council's agendas during regular meet-

Council unanimously passed a motion Feb. 2 to have all letters regarding the Stoltmann Wilderness National Park dropped off in individual councillors' mailboxes and not included in council meeting agendas which are accessible to the public.

Vancouver-based Western Canada Wilderness Committee is currently campaigning for public support for the proposed park.

The site is located in Tree Farm Licence 38, an active logging area.





Committee urges sign-off on estuary plan

The latest draft of the Squamish Estuary Management Plan is not perfect, but it needs to be finalized and implemented soon, says the chairperson of the committee that drafted the plan.

Members of the Squamish **Estuary** Coordinating Committee met with council members and district staff Feb. 2 to discuss details of the draft plan and asked for council's support in principle. The coordinating committee is made up of provincial and federal government representatives and other stakeholders.

Chairperson Bruce Cox said the committee has been working on amendments to the draft plan, which was first introduced in 1982, and it is ready to be finalized and put into action by April.

"We feel as a committee that we're at the threshold right now," he said. "We feel there is a window of opportunity to move ahead with the plan."

Cox said B.C. Rail and the provincial government have been negotiating with the Squamish Nation for a land swap in the estuary and are getting close to reaching an agreement.

The latest draft includes a habitat loss compensation conservation.

The plan includes a proposed removal of a dry land sort operation which would eliminate industrial activity in

Squamish Management Plan is an excellent plan," said Cox. "It proportion of the estuary and it accommodates future economic activity."

Cox asked council members to let the committee know if there are any "show stoppers" which could delay the plan further and asked for input.



But Coun. Lyle Fenton said council previously agreed not to get involved with these negotiations. Fenton said

there are no major show stoppers, but the plan still needs fine-tuning.

Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said plan details still need to be worked out before it is signed off and public input is needed. A public information meeting will likely be held in March.

Council will consider three motions concerning the plan and log handling in the estuary on Feb. 16.

Members of the Squamish **Estuary Conservation Society** have voiced concerns about previous drafts and they are not satisfied with the latest draft. Society members are concerned about a proposed 60-metre wide transportation corridor for future road and rail infrastructure which could wipe out some wildlife habi-

The Soo Coalition for Sustainable Forests has also expressed concern that the plan does not accommodate the forest industry.

The plan recommends 579 hectares of the estuary be protected as part of a 591-hectare wildlife management area, while 350 hectares be designated for development and eight more hectares undergo further planning and analysis.

Heliport plan grounded in closed-door vote

Helicopter companies waiting for the District of Squamish to approve a location for a community heliport will likely have to wait until after next fall's municipal election before any action takes flight.

Council voted Feb. 2 to rescind a motion passed last spring to set aside land for a community heliport at the Squamish Municipal Airport. The vote, taken during a closed-door session before council's regular meeting, passed 4-3, with Mayor Corinne Lonsdale and councillors Paul Lalli and Ted Craddock opposed.

The proposed heliport would accommodate Black Tusk Helicopter Inc. and other helicopter and heli-logging companies which are looking for landing pads and a place to set up hangars for their aircraft.

Lonsdale announced the in-camera motion during council's regular meeting last week. She said the issue was dealt with behind closed doors because there were "potential legal consequences" surrounding last year's decision to set aside land for a heliport at the airport. In-camera meetings, which are closed to the public, are held to allow council and municipal staff to deal with issues involving legal, land and labor matters.

"It was potentially a situation that could have placed the district in a position of liability," said Lonsdale after the meeting.

The mayor would not comment further on the subject.

Council passed a motion with a 3-2 vote last April to designate a site at the airport for a heliport. Council had been considering a community heliport on a woodlot between Hwy. 99 and Landfill Road, but this plan came to a halt after council found out the site is used by wintering bald eagles.

Council also approved a motion last April to identify and evaluate other sites for a heliport. Sites which were supposed to be considered include Cat Lake, Watt's Point and the Squamish Industrial Park. In 1997, council changed land use at the airport from industrial to limited, which restricted

any further development.

Lonsdale, who supports a heliport at the airport, said the district has taken no significant action to find an appropriate site for a heliport. "It's an issue that we have to address," she said. "What are these operators going to

The heliport and larger airport issue will likely "go on the back burner" until after the next election, said Lonsdale. "I'm not confident this council will address it."

Airport development was the main election issue in 1996 and it may become a subject of debate this fall.

Coun. Meg Fellowes, who supported a heliport at the airport last spring, voted in favor of rescinding that decision. Fellowes said she wants to see an independent, comprehensive evaluation of alternate sites for a heliport. She said she would only support a referendum on airport development after the public is provided with detailed information about the issue.

"How do we win the trust of neighborhoods when we look at development?" she said.

Airport development "inevitably" become an election issue this fall, said Fellowes.

Coun. Paul Lalli said he has always supported a heliport at the airport and is disappointed with council's motion. "It's a very political decision and it's one I disagree with," he said.

Lalli said he wants a referendum on airport development to be held and he wants to see a long-term planning strategy for the site.

"I think it's going to become an election issue in November."

Jennell Saindon, Black Tusk Helicopter's operations manager, said she was not surprised by council's motion. Saindon said while the company uses a hangar at the airport, it does not provide enough space.

"The hangar is the main issue," she

Saindon said she wants council to take action to improve the situation for helicopter companies, but in the meantime it's business as usual at the airport. "Nothing has changed. We still fly in and out and still carry out our business."

SLRD sign bylaw gets third reading

Squamish-Lillooet Regional District Briefs from Jan. 26

Some do, some don't. That's the verdict on whether signs along Hwy. 99 comply with the SLRD's proposed sign bylaw. The Squamish-Lillooet Regional District give third reading to the draft bylaw at its regular meeting in Pemberton Jan. 26.

Director Corinne Lonsdale (District of Squamish) told the meeting, "There has to be a way that we can do these things and allow the businesses to advertise. I can't support the bylaw in its present form."

Director Dave Lawson (Electoral Area B) said while he supports having a sign bylaw, he does not support this one because of concerns about fairness.

According to an inventory of significant existing signs along Hwy. 99 prepared by SLRD staff, many signs south of Squamish are not in compliance with the proposed bylaw, while many signs south of Whistler and northeast of the Village of Pemberton are.

The bylaw would affect signage within 400 metres of Hwy. 99. Signs the bylaw would prohibit include: billboards (off-site signage); signs larger than eight square metres or taller than five metres; revolving signs, banners, pennants, flags, balloons; signs on roofs, canopies or balconies; flashing, animated or moving signs; temporary free-standing, vehicle mounted, changeable copy and video signs.

Bob MacPherson, SLRD manager of planning and development, told the meeting an enforcement policy would have to be established to deal with existing signage.

He said such a policy may include a period allowing owners to remove or obtain variance permits for existing

"It's an awkward position to find ourselves in because we are reacting."

Director Hugh O'Reilly (Resort Municipality of Whistler) told the meeting: "We have to begin our enforcement somewhere. If we don't control the future, it'll control us."

The SLRD's proposed sign bylaw has generated comments from several organizations.

Howard Kelly, president of the Chamber of Commerce serving Squamish, Britannia Beach and Furry Creek, attended the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District's meeting as a delegate.

He expressed concern about how the draft bylaw may affect the chamber's three information signs along Hwy. 99. According to the proposed bylaw prepared by SLRD staff, those signs would not be in compliance.

Kelly said although the chamber agrees a bylaw controlling signage along the highway should be in place, the organization is concerned about how it may affect the chamber's signs as they are "one of our best fund-raisers."

The signs, which received the necessary approvals before being erected, carry advertising for businesses.

"There needs to be some way for businesses to offer what they have and also for people that are travelling" to see what is available. "I just think you should consider the customer."

The regional district has also received letters from BCR Properties, United Properties, Tanac Land Development Corp. and Pattison Outdoor expressing concern over the proposed

The SLRD's financial systems are set for year 2000 (Y2K) compatibility.

In his 1998 annual activity report to the SLRD board, administrator Rick Beauchamp said the regional district began replacing obsolete hardware and upgrading software for year 2000 compliance early last year.

As well, the SLRD converted much of the old financial data to a form that could be used by the software.

Bob MacPherson, SLRD manager of planning and development, said last week just minor work has to be completed to ensure all the regional district's systems are Y2K compliant.

"We are way ahead of the game in the municipal world" in terms of Y2K compliance, MacPherson said. "We've gone through our office and all of our systems, and one by one made sure everything is going to work."

He said the SLRD owes much of its preparedness for Y2K compliance to its software supplier, which has worked with the regional district in making the compli-

ance happen.

It was a busy year for the SLRD. In his report, administrator Rick Beauchamp listed projects completed or initiated by the regional district last year. Those projects included cre-


ating value, vision and mission statements for the SLRD; establishing a work plan for initiating the regional growth strategy; participating in In-N'Quat'qua SHUCK-ch treaty negotiations; Year 2000 compliance for SLRD computers; introducing an SLRD information base on the Internet; establishing key goals and objectives for the organization and a customer service program; implementing a mapping program; continuing to negotiate with the Ministry of Transportation and Highways regarding the terms of reference for the Hwy. 99 transportation study; reviewing the regional district's building inspection service; and working towards establishing a sign bylaw.

Beauchamp's report also listed projects completed or initiated for specific areas of the SLRD.

The Squamish-Lillooet Regional District is opposed to a current B.C. Rail application for Pesticide Use Permit. At its Jan. 26 regular board meeting, the SLRD supported resolutions sending letters to the Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks and to the

posed spray area. Those municipalities include Lions Bay, West North Vancouver and Vancouver.

University talks continue

Discussions between members of a university planning group and District of Squamish officials are ongoing and a site for Canada's first private non-profit university will be selected in the Squamish area within the next couple of months.

University planners held their second meeting with the district on Jan. 22 and a third meeting was held Friday to continue working out details for the proposal and agreements involving the municipality.

During a recent telephone interview, Dr. David Strangway said his university planning team and municipal officials are still working on developing a written memorandum of understanding before a location is chosen. The university's latest opening date is scheduled for September 2002.

Strangway, former president of the University of British Columbia, said the planned institution would be unique for a number of reasons.

He said it would offer students flexibility through short yet intensive semesters and the opportunity to accelerate their post-secondary education. The school would have an international flavor and

classes would be offered in several different languages.

"We think it will enable us to attract people from across Canada and the outside," he said. "We're looking at an internationally-mixed student body and faculty."

Strangway, president of the Ottawa-based Canada Foundation for Innovation, said while the university would be "academically elite", the goal is to not exclude anyone due to financial reasons. Tuition would be about \$25,000, but students would be able to apply for scholarships.

One of the major focuses of the university plan is to prepare students to be connected to the global village.

"The thought is students who graduate will have a good understanding of the world around them," said Strangway.

Steve Crombie, a member of the university team, said a formal agreement with the district will likely be reached by the end of February.

"Everything seems to be on track," he said.

Crombie said while the current plan is to try to secure about 100 acres for the site, this amount may change slightly depending on property values.

The university, which would offer a broad range of liberal arts and science programs,


includes plans for a 400-seat theatre and 48,000 square feet of recreational space and facilities.

The university would accommodate between 800 and 1,200 in-residence students.

University planners are also hoping to recruit a high-level academic advisory board and a community advisory committee.

Once all approvals are in place, three key appointments will be made — a university academic leader, a project development manager and a communications manager.

The district is planning to hire a university project manager once a formal agreement is reached.

Youth program seeks more youth

Several Squamish youth are expanding their options by participating in a provincially-funded program designed to give them work experience while preparing for post-secondary education, and there is room for more to get involved.

Brian Whieldon and Janet Vanderhor are working on various projects based out of Squamish's Youth Resource Centre on Loggers Lane while they earn educational credits. Whieldon, 19, is organizing a fundraiser to help gather money to renovate the old RCMP station on Carson Place which is slated to be converted into a longer-term resource centre for youth. He is planning to fix up a donated vehicle and raffle it off to raise funds.

Whieldon, who has worked part-time at the youth centre since mid-January, also helped out with the Skyreaching Mosaic Project in Stan Clarke Park and aided with roof repairs for the planned youth centre. He said he plans to use tuition credits earned through the program to study autobody repair at the B.C. Institute of Technology.

Whieldon hopes his combination of experience will help him find a job. "Before I started with the Mosaic Project, I had no connections with the community," he said. "It's not what you know, it's who you know."

Youth outreach worker Mark Kelly said the vehicle raffle will likely be held in June. "Summertime is a good time to raffle off a sweet ride," he said.

Vanderhor, 18, is busy working at the resource centre helping with various administrative functions. She designed the Squamish Partnership of Youth's brochure, works on the youth newsletter On the Edge, does some accounting work and helps organize various youth events. Vanderhor plans to help promote the vehicle raffle. She is also working on a project to match youth up with seniors to do various activities together which would help improve communications between the different generations.

Vanderhor has been volunteering at the youth centre since it opened last January. She continued to work there through Howe Sound Secondary School's career preparation program and is now working through the Youth

Community Action program. Vanderhor said she plans to study marketing management at BCIT. She said she enjoys learning "a little bit of everything."

Whieldon and Vanderhor are two out of 13 youth participating in the Youth Community Action program by working with non-profit organizations in Squamish. More than 1,500 youth have been placed with organizations across the province, including about 12 in Whistler and Pemberton.

Youth community action coordinator Alexandra De Vries said she is looking for youth to work at the West Coast Railway Heritage Park this spring. She said other nonprofit and publicly-funded organizations may still apply to get involved with the program. Organizations do not pay youth. Instead they offer youth a chance to learn new skills.

Youth between the ages of 15 and 24 are eligible to participate. For each hour of work, they earn \$8 in tuition credits up to a maximum of 300 hours. This can help students reduce the need for student loans.

The program, a pilot project, is run through YWCA of Vancouver. It is funded by the Ministry of Advanced Education, Training and Technology.







No agreement yet for Interfor workers

International Forest Products Ltd. is still investigating different options to revive its inactive Squamish sawmill, including plans for a co-operative operation.

Fred Lowenberger of Interfor said the company has been meeting with the sawmill's employee committee to talk about options. Interfor had planned to call about 26 laid off sawmill workers back to work for about one month during a second whole-log chipping project at the company's

Squamish site, but Lowenberger said time may have run out for this option.

The company recently received an offer from Canadian Forest Products Ltd. to do a chipping job at the site.

"We're still talking to Canfor and we're still hopeful they will be interested in what's going on there, but it's taking longer than we thought," Lowenberger said.

Interfor is still keeping the door open to entering into a longer-term joint endeavor with Canfor at the mill site. This would involve log merchandising, whole-log chip-

ping, unloading rail cars carrying wood chips from B.C.'s interior, barge loading of chips and a wood chipping storage facility.

Lowenberger said the company is also considering a cooperative effort which may not include chipping, but he would not discuss details. "The options we put to [employees] are going to need some review," he said. "It's still a work in progress."

Twenty-six employees were called back to work in October in an attempt to set up a temporary wood chipping operation, but workers were laid off again in mid-

November due to a low demand for wood chips on the coast. About 185 workers were put in limbo last July when Interfor announced a temporary closure due to weak market conditions. Interfor is still examining setting up a manufactured housing plant on the site.

Harry Bains, third vicepresident of IWA Canada's local 2171, said getting 26 employees back to work is not good enough. "We need a long-term solution."

While most of the 185 employees remain without work, Bains said some have found other forestry jobs.

A BCR Properties' proposal install a new downtown trance sign to promote uamish businesses will ve to wait until the District Squamish hires a sign conltant before it is considered. lim Cox, president of BCR operties, made a presentaon to council Feb. 2 asking r permission to place a billbard along Hwy. 99 to BCR-owned lvertise uamish Station Shopping entre, the Chamber of ommerce and other busi-

nesses. Cox said BCR Properties would pay the majority of the sign's cost which is estimated to be about \$30,000.

"We think it can be done tastefully," said Cox.

Coun. Paul Lalli said he would like to see more businesses advertised on the sign and another sign should be placed at the north end of the district along the highway to attract motorists heading south from Whistler.

Coun. Meg Fellowes said she would not support a billboard sign at this time, but council needs to find a way to

allow businesses to advertise with signs.

Coun. Ted Craddock said it is a "fine-looking sign" based on a drawing supplied to council.

"This is what we should have had instead of the one we have now."

Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said the sign proposal should be referred to a sign consultant. Council has not yet hired a consultant, but Lonsdale said hiring one to help with a sign bylaw rewrite and a signage design manual review is planned.

Council approved a motion

earlier that day to direct municipal staff to draw up a draft request for proposals to hire a consultant.

All signs in the district are regulated by a sign bylaw and must conform to development permit guidelines in the official community plan when placed along the highway or downtown. Signs along Hwy. 99 are also regulated by the Ministry of Transportation and Highways.

The district adopted its sign bylaw in 1983 and it has been amended five times since then to allow for certain kinds of signs.

Tourists need a reason to stop and stay in Squamish for a day or more. Only by capitalizing on our assets can we expect to realize returns.







Strategy must survive EDO confusion

The timing couldn't be more interesting. Now all we need to know is what exactly happened at Municipal Hall on Friday.

The details are still hazy at this point, but it appears that economic development officer Mitchell Edgar's job may be in question only days after the public got its first long look at a new economic development strategy for the district which happens to include a much different role for the EDO outside of Municipal Hall.

The whole situation is worrisome for the future strategy. As the report by Crane Management Consultants points out, one key to success is positive relations between the EDO and the district administration and planners. Any conflicts between municipal staff and the EDO must be resolved before a vision for economic development can be carried forward.

And carry forward it must. If Edgar leaves and his departure leads to the abandonment of the strategy, the district's reputation as a bad place to do business will sink even lower than before. Worse still, public interest, so evident at last week's open house on the strategy, will be crushed again. More than one speaker Wednesday complained that so many district plans and strategies had come to nothing in the past that it was hard to believe this one would work.

It's up to council, the district and the EDO to prove them wrong. Here's hoping they do.

Open house turned into town meeting

peaking of the economic development strategy: we're not sure anyone warned Steve Nicol what to expect from the crowd at last week's open house.

Nicol, the mild-mannered management consultant who put the strategy report together, was probably prepared for a quiet discussion with a few members of the public and a cross-section of the business community, many of whom had been involved in the focus groups planning the strategy — in other words, an in-house affair.

Instead he got a sometimes-raucous town meeting with person after person stepping forward to talk — not about the economic development strategy, but about District council and administration's bureaucratic stalling on current development projects, the merits of the university project and the state of the forest industry, among other topics.

In fact, whenever the topic turned to the strategy itself, there was little dissent — except from certain (perhaps predictable) quarters.


Perhaps EDO Mitchell Edgar, Mayor Lonsdale and councillors should have been up at the front rather than on the sidelines to field more of the heat from this crowd — especially since so many of the issues raised had little to do with Nicol or the strategy he created and much to do with the district. But that said, a crowd of over 100 people, crammed into a room with 60 seats and capacity for maybe 80 people, is a good sign: it's indicative of the community interest in the economic development process. But it's also an indicator of the frustration people in this town feel with the current level of bureacracy.

We hope that the people to whom it's directed were listening, both to the crowd and to the strategy, which calls for the creation of a positive business climate as one of the main elements needed for economic development in Squamish. Over to you, councillors...

Step right up...

The stories on the first nine pages of this week's Chief could be a preview of this fall's election campaign. **L** Economic development, the Squamish Estuary Management Plan, the airport, the signage, it's all there.

All that's missing are the candidates. Right now, with incumbent Corinne Lonsdale the only publicly-declared contender, it's hard to have a debate on the issues while they're happening. We think it's time those who are thinking about their own run at the mayor's chair or council this fall think about coming forward to start debate now on the issues while they're in the public eye.

Two points about the new economic development report:

'Hola' from Squamish artist in Mexico

(Editor's note: Carolina Simmie is a Squamish artist study and pursuing her art in Mexico.)

Hola Amigos...

I'm living in a desert climate, which has many temperature changes through the day. Early morning when I rise it could be cold, so I light my small metal wood stove to ward off the chill. At about 10 a.m., I can move out to my deck, situated high above San Miguel, where the sun has warmed the brick floor. By noon it's very hot! Sometimes a breeze comes up. I have a round table and umbrella I put up for some shade while I work at writing or painting. My casita is surrounded by trees to provide a feeling of privacy and greenery. If I venture down the cobblestone streets to El Centro, I wear a dress for coolness and a hat to protect me from too much

At about 6 p.m., as afternoon moves to evening, the sun disappears fast below the

horizon. Sunsets are fabulous glowing red-orange circles of colours, gone within 15 minutes. With this comes cool evenings, sweater, pants, hat, plus a vest to keep me warm. At night the sky is clear navy blue, full of bright stars. Another perfect desert day in Colonial Palmita la Danza #6.

I've been in San Miguel three months. It's high up in the foothills of the Sierra Madres in the interior of Mexico, four hours northwest via bus from Mexico City. In my quest for an artist's retreat I searched and asked other adventurous souls where I might find a special place and found San Miguel with its lovely Mexican people. I have come to be awed by their ability to accept and love me with just a smile.

The colonial style of cobblestone streets, sometimes steep, sometimes narrow and small, makes walking a delight. I always find a new way to the Jardin. Buildings grow in that slow Mexican

style. I've witnessed a pile of sand on the side of a *calle* go slowly bucket-by-bucket up plank ramps to disappear behind a door, gone like an army of ants takes food to an anthill.

My own casita can be described as a penthouse. Enclosed behind a brick wall are five other adventure seekers, each in their own casita, plus the landlord — an American Buddhist married to a Mexican senorita, two children and a mother-in-law - all live in comfort and quiet way above the city.

My casita, a small dwelling, is resting on a huge brick deck with an outdoor bano where I enjoy afternoon showers in the privacy and warmth of the sun. A small walk-through kitchen, like a camp with bare necessitates, is attached to a larger room in which I have a bed, closet, desk and wood stove.

On market day I gather a backpack, some pesos and set out. All foods are bought at

separate stalls. I mostly eat fruits and vegetables plus some cheese and dairy products. Fresh foods need to be soaked 20 minutes to sterilize before eating. I allow time for this. All drinking water is bought in bottles. Tap water is used for showers and dishes where I add bleach to sterilize against bacteria. Getting used to buying and preparing food takes a good chunk of the day. The idea of a supermarket takes away from personal contact and I learn more about the locals. Living in a community with Spanish as the language and Mexican customs and traditions continues to stimulate me. I see another way in the world not just the Canadian way. I also see what a happy and gentle people the Mexicans are and that delights me. I continue to enjoy my stay here and look

Zukermania hits Squamish

Tt's been a long time between trips to Squamish ▲ for George Zukerman. No, the world-renowned bassoon soloist hasn't brought his "Evening of Zukermania" to town before. But he has been through the Sea to Sky corridor — about 25 years ago, according to Joanna Schwarz of the Howe Sound Performing Arts Association, which is bringing him to the Eagle Eye Community Theatre this Friday night at 8 p.m.

Back then he was in charge of the "Overtures" classical music series brought here by the Squamish Valley Music Society, the forerunner to the HSPAA, "so some people will remember him," Schwarz said.

But this evening will be different — in fact, any evening with Zukerman is bound to be a little different. It's not just anyone who can take the bassoon — a "symphonic

piece of plumbing," as he refers to it — from the back ranks of the orchestra to the honored position of soloist.

That's what Zukerman has done for the last four decades, unearthing an extensive repertoire of bassoon works from the 18th and 19th century and encouraging modern composers to write works for the instrument.

His quest to bring glory to the bassoon has taken him to countries in five continents, where he's earned a reputation for off-the-wall and witty concert presentations.

In addition to 33 European tours and regular trips to Australia, South Africa and the former Soviet Union, he has given bassoon recitals in exotic locales from Tuktayaktuk in the Northwest Territories to Zomba, Malawi and Kabul, Afghanistan — where he says the audience was "300 plus two camels."

His programme for Friday's concert with pianist Leslie Janos features "A Musical Banquet" including a

baroque appetizer, a main course of Mozart, a Soufflé by Robert Schumann and a special dessert — a piece written especially for Zukerman by UBC music professor emeritus Elliot Weisgarber on the occasion of Zukerman's first Japanese tour.

"It's not just a classical concert with a strange instrument," Schwarz promises. "It's an entertaining evening."

The evening gets entertaining even before Zukerman takes the stage at 8 p.m. The doors will open at 7 p.m. and a group of nearly 20 young local performers will entertain the crowd for an hour before the show and during the intermission in the theatre lobby with vocal and instrumental music and dance.

"That way people can grab their seats, return to the lobby and enjoy some entertainment before the show," Schwarz said.

The pre-show has been arranged by HSPAA director Michael Plowman.



L.C. (Minch) Minchin is well known in the Squamish area for his work with the Squamish branch of the Royal Canadian Legion. Gardner pointed out that the application must be approved by the Legion, Pacific Command and Dominion Command. "It's going to be a big deal," said Gardner. 6 cups cubed French bread

6 ounces (about 160 grams) semi-sweet chocolate, chopped

1/3 cup dark raisins
2 large eggs
1/3 cup sugar

Spread the bread cubes out to dry overnight. Heat the cream, stir in the chocolate and raisins. Remove from heat and let stand until chocolate melts. Stir to blend. Beat the eggs and sugar in a large bowl. Beat in the cooled chocolate mixture. Stir in the bread cubes. Let stand for 30 minutes, until bread is well saturated.

Education News

Students start early on university

aybe Grade 3 or 4 is not too young to Lhave an eye on postsecondary education and its rising costs. Those piggybanks could be just what is needed.

Whistler Secondary, a community school, will most likely be taking advantage of the program called UBC Connect. It runs during the last week in June each year and is intended to give Grade 10s and 11s the opportunity to experience life on the campus for a week. These high school students live in residence, meet some professors from various faculties, and generally get the feel of what life at the university is like. This is a good time to have such information, since it may affect those big decisions that will soon have to be made.

Howe Sound Secondary is participating in a similar program, but at the Grade 12 level. It is called the Student Shadowing Program, and gives the senior high school student a valuable chance to taste the daily routine of a UBC undergraduate.

The student, on registering for it, is paired up with a UBC student in the faculty of his/her choice, and then spends half a day going to classes with activities. This particular program takes place in February and March.

Park to be a multi-purpose facility

ast month in my column, I talked about our dreams for the Heritage Park in 1999. There are some exciting things on the horizon, and 1999 will be the year that we make some major steps towards the next critical development step for the project. But this month let's step even beyond that and look into the vision for the Heritage Park as a multi-purpose community facility.

The West Coast Railway Heritage Park started off in

its initial concept as a railway museum, and indeed that's what many still see it as. The design, however, calls for something much broader that of a multi-purpose attraction facility designed around a rail heritage theme. Our goal is not just a narrow niche market of railway heritage enthusiasts, but rather a broad attraction with cultural tourism and family appeal. Indeed, our growth to date and guest visits indicate that this design is successful —

less than 10 per cent of our 21,000 guests last year were traditional railway enthusiasts. The Heritage Park's design for uses includes the following markets:

• A major cultural tourism/heritage/entertainment attraction for British Columbia;

• A great site for holding community events;

• First class education and research facilities related to railway heritage;

• A great filming location

with a small community based on the railway.

It is this design that, over time, will make the project self-sustainable as well as a major contributor to the Squamish economy. We've got lots of building to do yet, but the plan is on track. Success will see us create another 300 person-years of employment and attract approximately \$12 million in new investment over the next ten years. Results will be the direct employment of some

RRSP season sends investors scurrying to the banks to start or top up their investments in time for the tax season.

But there's another way to go. Independent financial advisors can offer freedom and flexibility with the same kind of growth potential and security available to the largest financial institutions, according to John Stathers, one of three fulltime advisors at The Investment Centre on Second Avenue Squamish.

Independent financial advisors are unique in that they aren't required to offer a particular company's funds, but can

"Many Canadians don't realize that under certain circumstances most company pensions are transferable," Stathers explains.

That's useful for people nearing retirement who want more control over their investments and retirement income, as well as for people caught in corporate downsizing

who are unsure what to do with accrued pensions. An independent financial advisor can help people move company pensions to another investment vehicle and manage lump-sum severance packages for tax-efficient use.

Stathers recommends that people start exploring their options at least 10 years before retirement.

An advisor helps by finding out what your target retirement income is and helps you determine the best path to get there.

"It comes back to what the client needs and wants," says Stathers.



Thoughts on RRSP investing

Information provided by Scotiabank 1. Think (& plan) long-term:

As we saw in 1998, the stock market can be volatile in the short term. In fact, over the last 50 years Canadian stock markets have produced negative returns approximately one year out of every five. However, over that same time period they have averaged returns of about 10 per cent annually. 

Canadians are taking increasing control of their financial utures, especially when it comes to retirement planning. Featherston was selected to B.C.'s boxing team by defeating the siver medalist of Canada at this year's Provincial Championships.


Featherston has accomplished a great deal in boxing and has only been active in the sport for two years.
