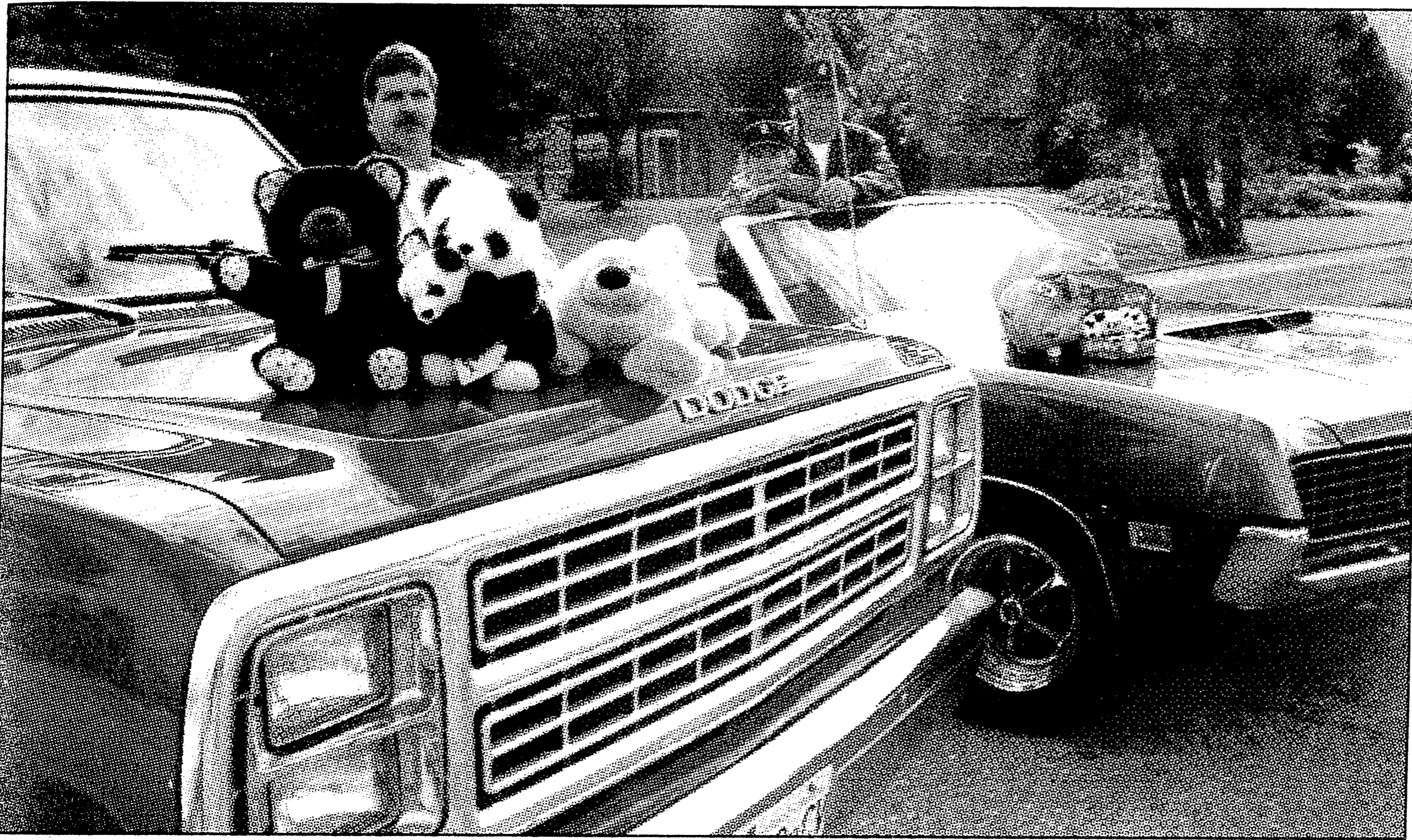

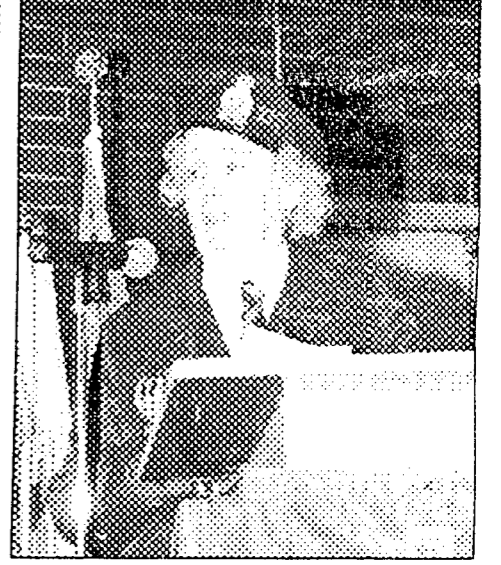

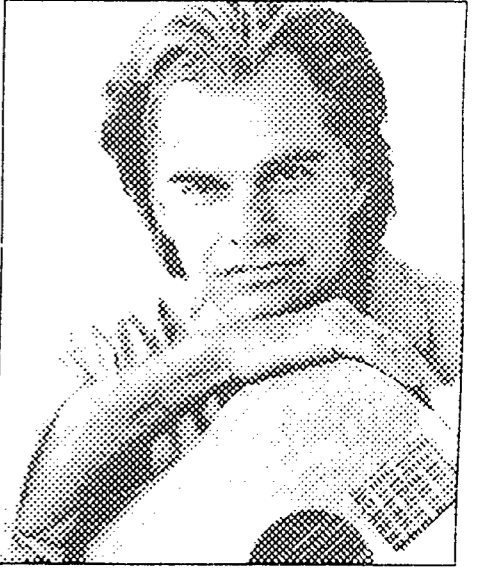

Mall expansion angers merchants

Over strenuous objections from Mayor Corinne Lonsdale and Tantalus Road business owners, council approved 4-1 a development permit for an expansion of the Highlands Mall Oct. 5.

Coun. Paul Lalli declared a conflict because he is employed by the neighboring Best Western Sea to Sky Hotel.

The 218 square metre northern addition is primarily to accommodate a larger Extra Foods store.

The renovation will include closing the Tantalus Road entrance and creating a false front along that side of the building. A new loading bay at the southwest end will be built and the western side of the mall will receive a canopy and upgraded exterior finish. The walkway between the mall and the Best Western Sea to Sky Hotel to the south will also have lighting installed.

This development is going to cost us jobs," Lonsdale said

at a committee of the whole meeting that morning. "What is the rush in giving him [mall owner Ebbe Syberg-Olsen] a development permit when he can't do a thing without a building permit?"

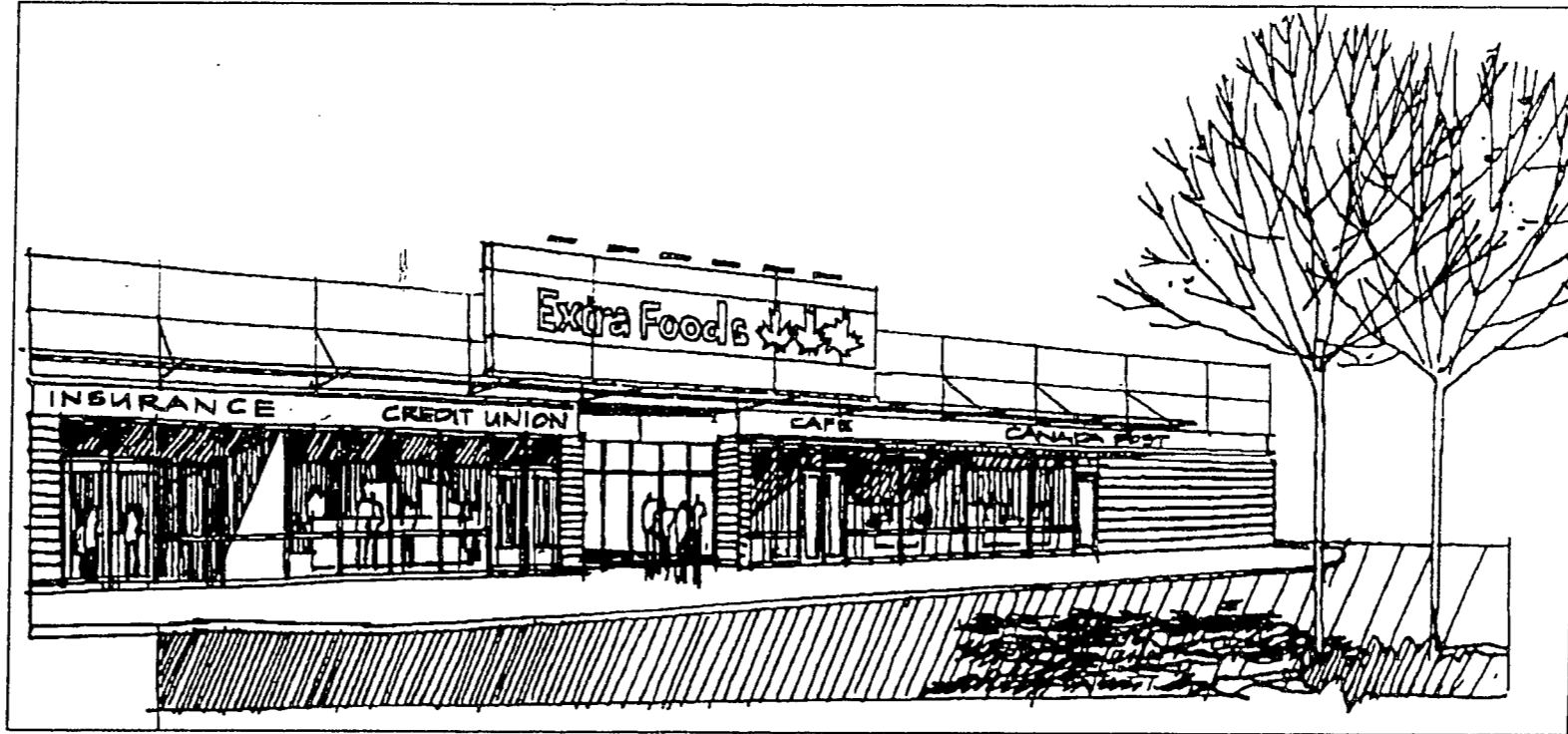
"You're worried about the economic effect of the demands we're making on Mr. Syberg-Olsen. What about the economic effect on those businesses we're now locating on a back alley? I'm worried about them," Lonsdale said.

A number of Tantalus Road merchants were present for the meeting.

Dr. Tom Honey, owner of KDM Veterinary Hospital, disputed Syberg-Olsen's statement that Tantalus businesses, being destination businesses, will be unaffected by the closure of the eastern entrance.

"If there's no flow of traffic, these businesses won't be destinations because nobody will know where they are," Honey said.

He also said if council approved the development permit, they should consider

making Tantalus a two-way street to encourage traffic flow. Council asked staff to examine the idea, though Lonsdale said the improvements included in the mall redevelopment will make Tantalus too narrow.

"I firmly believe if this development does not go through you [Tantalus businesses] will be looking at an empty building across from you," said Coun. Dave Young.

"It certainly is not an ideal solution to everyone's problems, but it is a good project

and we should go forward with it," said Coun. Meg Fellowes.

"Mr. Syberg-Olsen seems to be going to great expense to accommodate one tenant in his mall at the expense of the other businesses in the mall and on Tantalus Road," said W. R. Pepin, representing the Silverspoon restaurant.

When questioned by Lonsdale about the effect on four stores by the proposed realignment of the mall to have all stores facing Hwy. 99, Syberg-Olsen said there

would be room for one or maybe two.

Parm Johal, owner of IDA Pharmacy, one of the stores affected, said he hasn't been contacted about the expansion.

"We don't know anything yet and no one's come and talked to us and they would have to because we have contractual obligations," he said Saturday. Tenants' lease conditions would have to be fulfilled before the expansion could go ahead, he said.

Raiser says election is popularity contest

Although it's doubtful many in Squamish have heard of Bryan "Hammock" Raiser, he's actually been a declared council candidate for about a year.

Raiser published a pamphlet last year establishing his platform: hammocks.

"Every office, every home, every brothel will have at least one hammock, and if

they be so bold, even a hammock room," he wrote.

"As a member of council I will not stray from the important issues. I plan to tackle all the biggies, like jobs," Raiser wrote.

With the mill still down at the time, he suggested reopening it to manufacture hammocks. He also said the sign on the highway should be removed and replaced with a hammock.

The political bug really bit

him on voting day in the last civic election, when only 27 per cent of Squamish voters came out to vote, Raiser said.

"And if you don't vote for me, please don't vote for a corrupt wanker just cuz (sic) you think they're going to win. Make this ... system

work for change and vote for who you believe in."

Raiser has lived in Squamish for three and a half years.

When asked why he's running, he replied, "Why not? It's free, it's council, it's popularity contest."

"I want to see how popular I am."

"I think it's going to be fun," he said. A letter from Raiser declaring his candidacy is on page 6.

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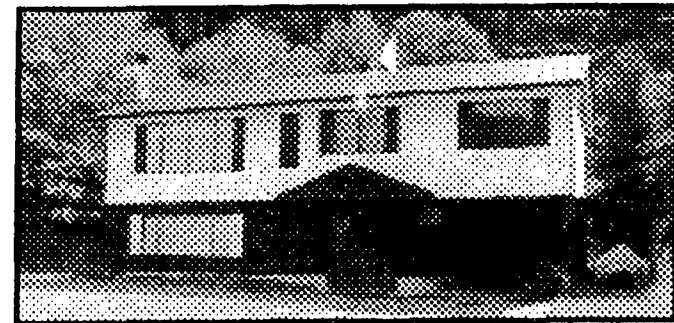
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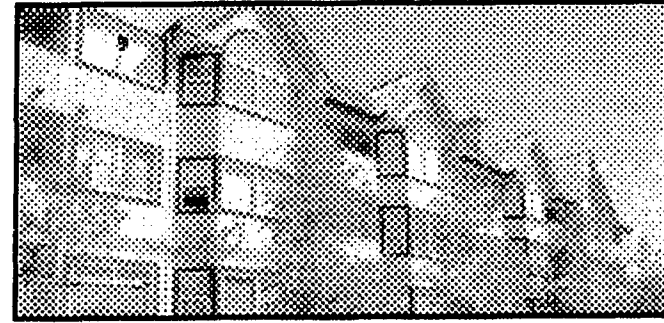

**Man injured in

Squamish RCMP are investigating an assault that happened in the parking lot of 711 Garibaldi Way early Monday morning.

Council calls for input on Legion land deal

A request to allow general retail stores and three drive-through restaurants in the Garibaldi Village mall/motel development led councillors to ask for a public information meeting.

Robert Weston, vice-president of development for Canadian Development Properties Ltd. (CDP) attended an early morning committee of the whole meeting Oct. 5 to discuss concerns he had raised with the draft rezoning bylaw.

Councillors Paul Lalli and Lyle Fenton declared conflicts and left the chambers.

In a Sept. 24 letter Weston said: "It is our intent to create as much factory outlet type uses as we can ... but we recognize that other more traditional retail commercial users will want to be located here. We have been approached by retail clients from Whistler ... these businesses do not currently exist in Squamish and would not locate off the highway."

However, Weston's letter said a large food store will not be developed at the Hwy. 99 and Mamquam Road site, which includes the current location of the Squamish branch of the Royal Canadian Legion.

Weston told councillors the factory outlets are new to western Canada and an outlet-only restriction makes attracting tenants problematic.

"You came to us saying you had people desperate to get into this [factory outlet] use and now I'd like to know where they went or if they were there in the first place," replied Coun. Dave Young.

"We went from a destination mall that may or may not have been suitable for Squamish to a strip mall with three drive-through restaurants that our community said no to four years ago."

"If we do allow a wider use as requested we will get a

much greater reaction from the downtown merchants," said Coun. Meg Fellowes.

"Three drive-through windows will not get approval from any sector of the community," said Mayor Corinne Lonsdale.

Weston previously asked for only one drive-through.

"Clearly retail zoning applied to the [CDP] site will compete with downtown. Quality retail development at the site is a hollow victory if it renders the downtown uneconomic," said economic development officer Brent Leigh.

The size of the motel and time-share units was also discussed. CDP wants the 120

motel rooms as large as 650 square feet and the 55 tourist oriented time-share units up to 1,200 square feet.

Weston said this comes from experience with an Invermere development, adding the covenant in the rezoning disallows permanent residences.

"The market we see is overflow from Whistler. Whistler has limited development capacity," said Weston.

"I'm concerned about this becoming housing for single moms and others on lower incomes without all the amenities," Lonsdale said.

A time and place for the public hearing are yet to be determined.

Friday is deadline for local politicians to get names on the ballot

Six names had been registered for the Nov. 20 ballot when Municipal Hall closed its doors Friday evening.

Bill Howard, running for a council seat, was the first can-

didate to complete his nomination papers and submit them to chief electoral officer Trudy Coates.

Other official nominees include incumbent Paul Lalli, Raj Khalon, owner/operator of Raj True Value Hardware, and Shady Tree Neigh-

bourhood Pub owner Eivind Tormes.

Seven other Squamish residents have said they will run for council, including all the incumbents except for Coun. Meg Fellowes, who is seeking election as mayor.

Fellowes is the only person

so far to be officially nominated for the mayor's position. Mayor Corinne Lonsdale, seeking re-election, is the only other declared candidate.

Amy Shoup, currently vice-chair of the Howe Sound board of school trustees, and Don Ross, trustee for Area D,

are also seeking re-election. Constance Rulka, the other Squamish representative on the school board, has said she will run for her fourth term but has not yet filed her nomination forms.

Nominations close 4 p.m. Friday.

Evdokimoff new youth worker

Starting today, Squamish's youth resource centre again has two youth workers.

The hiring of John Evdokimoff by the district was approved by the Healthy Communities Committee (HCC) Oct. 4, but the choice wasn't made by the committee members, said youth worker Tamara Finkleman.

"The actual decision to hire him was 100 per cent based on youth. It was their decision yes or no," she said Thursday.

Evdokimoff was among several prospective youth workers interviewed by Squamish Partnership of Youth (SPY), but was the

only one invited back for a second meeting with the group.

SPY members then discussed Evdokimoff with Finkleman, who took their recommendation to the HCC.

Evdokimoff is employed directly by the district, which recently took over youth services after discontinuing a contract with Skyward Outreach Services Society (SOSS).

Evdokimoff's job is to maintain and develop programs provided through the youth resource centre.

Evdokimoff, 33, has lived in Squamish for 10 years and is the father of two young children.

The cancellation of the district's contract with SOSS

has caused some confusion over the fate of the corridor's mobile career centre operated by Todd Ogryzlo.

Although Ogryzlo's contract from Human Resources Development Canada was run through SOSS, he is still in the resource centre, Finkleman said. The contract is now funneled through Sea to Sky Community Services, she said.

Ogryzlo is in Squamish two days out of the week.

Tomorrow, SPY is doing a clean-up around the Mamquam River bridge at Government Road. Anybody who's interested in helping can show up at the dog pound at 3:30 p.m. for the one-hour clean-up. Gloves and

garbage bags will be provided.

SPY is hosting two all-ages live band shows at Brennan Park Leisure Centre.

The Nov. 5 and Dec. 17 shows will include several bands each covering a variety of music.

Proceeds from the Nov. 5 show will go to SPY. The Dec. 17 dance will be to collect money and toys for needy families in Squamish.

Between the Huge End of the Millennium Garage Sale held Oct. 2 at the Howe Sound Inn and Brewing Company and the pre-teen dance late that week, SPY raised over \$1,000, \$100 of which went to the food bank.

Immunization rates declining in corridor

Immunization rates in the Sea to Sky corridor are on the decline according to Paul Martiquet, Coast Garibaldi medical health officer.

Martiquet appeared as a delegation to the Sea to Sky Community Health Council's Sept. 16 meeting in Pemberton to present information from the Provincial Health Officer's 1998 annual report, which was released in April.

He said immunization was the topic chosen for the report as "it far and above exceeds any health care intervention that we have in

the 20th century." Martiquet said vaccination has added 30 years to the life expectancies of people who live in the Sea to Sky corridor.

He said that although the report shows that 92 per cent of Grade 9 students were fully immunized in 1998, so far this year, just 86 per cent have been immunized. For kindergarten children in the Coast Garibaldi Health Region, immunization rates, at about 92 per cent for MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) and about 91 per cent for polio, were among the lowest in the province for 1998. The targeted national rate for those immunizations is 99

per cent. (In British Columbia, children are not required to be immunized in order to attend school.) Martiquet said the drop in vaccination rates is cause for concern.

Martiquet said parents' awareness needs to be increased, that children can "suffer serious complications from these childhood illnesses or die from them." He said increasing knowledge about the importance of immunization is the key to improving immunization rates.

For two-year-olds, the goal is to see a 95 per cent vaccination rate for DPT (diphtheria, pertussis and polio) in the corridor. Figures for

1998 show that about 86 per cent of two-year-olds received the DPT immunization.

The CHC's annual meetings of residents have been scheduled for Oct. 19 at the Pemberton Health Centre, Oct. 20 at the Whistler Health Centre and Oct. 21 at Squamish General Hospital. All meetings begin at 7 p.m. The council's annual report will be presented at these meetings.

The next regular meeting of the Sea to Sky Community Health Council is scheduled for Oct. 21 at 7 p.m. at Squamish General Hospital.

High schools asked to justify course fees

Howe Sound superintendent Mike Fitzpatrick is asking his high school principals to justify the course fees they're charging their students, fees that in some cases quintuple between schools for the same course.

B.C.'s School Act allows schools to charge students fees for materials used in goods that are intended for the student to take home, rental of a musical instrument or expenses associated with field trips.

Fees may not be charged for materials required to complete a course.

The board requires the schools to establish a schedule of course fees prior the beginning of the school year. The lists of fees presented to the board by Howe Sound schools are incomplete and show discrepancies between the same courses at different schools.

The matter is being discussed at this week's principal meeting. "I think what we've done is ask them [principals] to come up with a rationale for

why their [fees] are different," Fitzpatrick said.

"If you have an art teacher who's doing drawings, and another who's doing clay, the clay is going to cost more. It really depends on the teacher," he said.

"[Fees] in a general sense are based on what students take home with them," Howe Sound Secondary School principal Peter Hotson said. Hotson said the discrepan-

cies led Fitzpatrick to ask the principals to defend their fee schedules. Hotson added he has gone through the list with his departments again to ensure it is complete, accurate and justifiable.

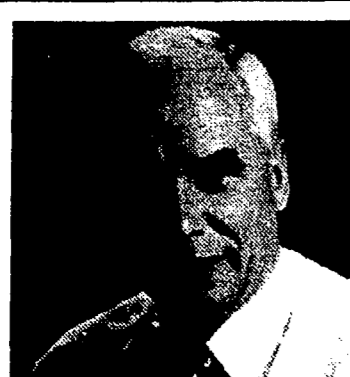
Fitzpatrick also emphasized the limitations on course fees and financial hardship is considered.

"You can't charge fees for courses kids have to take to graduate," he said, though activities not critical to graduation or the course may cost extra.

"Schools really go out of their way to see a student isn't punished by not being able to take a course because of a fee," he said.

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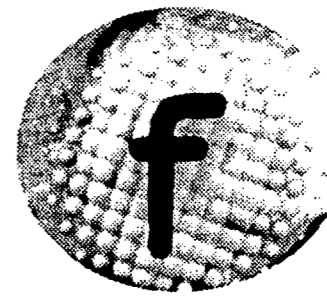

Police lay charges in stabbing

Shane Antone, 21, of Squamish has been charged with one count of robbery.

He made his first appearance in court on Sept. 28 and was released on bail with conditions.

When school officials arrived for work on Friday morning they noticed that a pipe had burst sending water down a path adjacent to the school.

"We had no running water and when I checked things out there was a fair amount of water near the school," said principal Rick Price.

"Maintenance said it would probably take quite a while to get it repaired, so we made the call to cancel classes." Price said he got on the

radio to make an announcement just after 8 a.m. and got the assistance from the Parent Advisory Council (PAC) to make contact with all the students.

Not only was it a fun evening of music by local talented artists and Black's own charm and wit, it was wonderful to see some 200 people — a sellout by Thursday afternoon — come out to help the library raise money for future projects.

What's more, the immediate benefits of Black's visit to Squamish could be heard nationally on CBC Radio this Saturday morning, as the host of Basic Black waxed poetic about his great experience here — with the promise of more segments this season on the undiscovered jewel of B.C. recreation.

While Black's facts may have been slightly off — for the record, it's about 16,000 people who live here, not 6,000 — the main message was an enthusiastic boost for Squamish on a national stage, and it's more than welcome as we set ourselves up to be Canada's recreation capital.

But it's not only the shot in the arm for the library and a warm media spotlight that made Books and Beer a success. It's proof that we don't have to leave town to find unique, high-quality cultural and recreational activities.

We've said it before and we'll say it again now, cultural recreation can be just as big a draw as outdoor natural recreation — one look at Whistler's successful art and music scene is proof of that.

Of course, we're not Whistler and have no desire to be, but adding literature, music and the arts to our list of attractions can be done in a way that reflects this community — say, a beer tasting instead of wine.

Hats off to the organizers of this great event for helping their cause and their community in more ways than one.

Justice walks away

Need more proof of Canada's utterly wrong-headed system of justice? Look no further than Mission, where double-murderer Gary Fitzgerald walked away from the minimum-security Ferndale institution this weekend.

After killing a gas station attendant and a police officer in 1981, after being described as a psychotic and describing to psychiatrists how he would "enjoy shooting faces off," Fitzgerald managed to get transferred to Ferndale — a "country-club" prison with a golf course and houses for inmates that has managed to lose four inmates in the past nine months.

Now escaped, police are describing him as extremely dangerous and warning people not to approach him. This begs the obvious question: what on earth was a dangerous double-murderer doing in a posh jail with a habit of losing its prisoners?

When cop killers can be allowed to stay in country-club style prisons — and walk away from them seemingly at will — maybe it's the justice system, not criminals, that needs to be examined for psychosis.

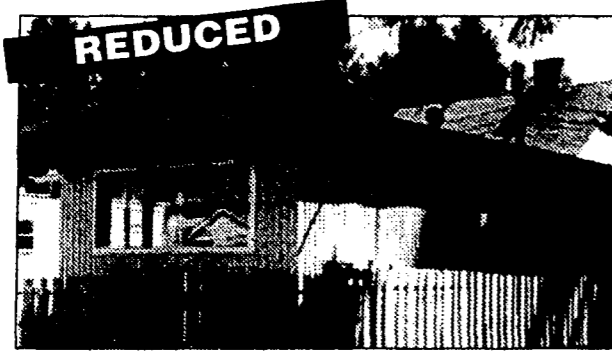
been here. This is what makes a community healthy.

Council approves funding for all candidates meeting

Council approved a \$180,000 grant-in-aid to the Chamber of Commerce to fund an all-candidates meeting to be held on Oct. 4 at 7 p.m. at Brennan Park Leisure Centre.

Council gave the grant at its Oct. 5 meeting to cover the cost of renting the civic centre.

All candidates will be notified at the meeting when they submit their nomination forms.

Chamber manager Karen Hodson said Wednesday the meeting had seating for 400.

"There's a lot of people running this year and there's a lot of contentious stuff so we expect it to be well attended," Hodson said.

The meeting is for council and mayoral candidates only, Hodson said. With only the candidates declared at this

time, a decision whether an all candidates meeting is needed for school board trustees will wait until nominations close Friday.

She also said she is seeking television coverage from Rogers.

However, Rogers has decided to provide election-night only coverage this year.

"I believe this is a major blow to democracy — Rogers has an implicit ... obligation to provide community coverage," Colin Stark, vice-president of Canadians for Direct Democracy, said Wednesday. "This unfairly favors incumbents, especially when the electoral system already favors them in so many ways."

Soo TSA sustainable for 200 years

An annual allowable cut of 100,000 cubic metres is sustainable in the Soo timber supply area for 200 years, not 10 years estimated in 1994.

This conclusion comes out of the 1999 timber supply analysis for the 826,000 hectare Soo supply area, released Aug. 31. The public consultation process until Oct. 29 to comment on the review before the chief forester determines a new annual allowable cut (AAC).

Squamish Forest District manager Paul Kuster and planning officer Antti Makitalo presented the plan to council Oct. 5 as part of the public consultation process.

The increased sustainability is mainly due to a larger harvestable area, Makitalo said Oct. 2.

Imaginary lines are drawn on the supply area, defining logging companies' upper ability to log economically, Makitalo said. Helicopter logging techniques now allow harvesting above the lines drawn in 1994.

The result is while the harvesting land base is down to 96,942 hectares from 107,297, the total harvestable area is up 14,627 hectares to 123,392 from 108,765.

However, Makitalo said, "two different analyses aren't really comparable because the factors are all changing."

"That's why we have to do one every five years."

1994's projections were also based on different types of trees and older harvest ages, Makitalo said.

"There's tremendous pressure on us to stop logging old-growth and that means cutting second-growth," which in turn

requires allowing harvesting of younger trees, Kuster told councillors.

Councillors passed a motion from Mayor Corinne Lonsdale to ask the chief forester to ensure that the AAC be sustainable with the least impact on jobs.

Other factors that came into existence since 1994 include the Forest Practices Code, the Spotted Owl Management Plan and the protected areas strategy, which resulted in several new parks.

When the chief forester sets the AAC, he will go through the entire report and assess any uncertainties and new concerns, Makitalo said.

These would include the uncertainty over the size of the riparian management zone, the implications of the spotted owl plan and underestimated yields on old trees, he said.

"It was an exceptional presentation, but I was disappointed by the turnout," Tobe said.

Stolen banner replaced by Interfor

A replacement for the loggers' banner that disappeared last weekend went up at the entrance to Tree Farm Licence 38 on Friday, again covered in the signatures of International Forest Products (Interfor) employees and contractors.

The new banner is a near identical copy of the first, reading "Welcome to our tree farm. We, the workers, pledge to work safely, peacefully and responsibly in your forest" with an addition that says this is the second such banner, and that the first one was stolen.

The original banner was apparently ripped down. The ropes it had been suspended from were still tied to their trees and little bits of the 7.6-metre long, \$750 banner were still attached to the opposite

ends. Interfor reported the missing banner to police Oct. 5.

"I knew that would happen," Interfor operations manager Dave Miller said. "I can't understand why anybody would want to take down a banner welcoming people up there and pledging to work peacefully and responsibly."

Miller said Sept. 24, prior to the first banner being erected, he fully expected Interfor's detractors would take the banner down.

Neither People's Action for Threatened Habitat (PATH) nor the Forest Action Network (FAN), both of whom have been staging an anti-logging protest in the upper Elaho Valley since early August, could be reached for comment by press time. PATH and FAN are part of a movement to turn the upper

Elaho and much of TFL 38 into a 500,000 hectare national park.

The protest camp in the Elaho, complete with banners of its own, was destroyed in a Sept. 15 confrontation between environmentalists and loggers.

Squamish RCMP Const. Dan Seward said police had no information on the disappearance of the banner, and the investigation into the Sept. 15 incident is on-going, as is the investigation of vandalism of Interfor equipment.

Seward added police collected the names of 71 people involved with the forest industry on-site Sept. 15, but have not requested a list of loggers working that day.

He also said the RCMP need the victims of the alleged assaults to come forward and look at photos obtained by police relating to the incident.

Pearl's Place reaches out to corridor

For years Pearl's Place Transition House has been a place for women to go to seek shelter from violence.

Now Pearl's Place is seeking out women and men from the whole Sea to Sky corridor in an effort to stamp out violence against women.

Pearl's Place has planned an 18-month outreach project to educate residents of the Sea to Sky corridor from Lions Bay to D'Arcy about violence against women.

Pearl's Place opened in Squamish in 1993. It was named after Pearl Souster, a volunteer at the Howe Sound Women's Centre who opened her own home up to abused women.

The centre, now run by the Women's Centre, has helped hundreds of women and children in trouble over the years. But Melany Crowston, staff co-ordinator at Pearl's Place, said most people aren't even aware of the services that are available in the corridor — or of the underlying factors that can lead to violence against women.

"There's a lot of women that still believe what's happening to them [abuse] is OK," she said.

According to statistics from Pearl's Place, 2.65 million women in Canada have been assaulted by a marital partner at some time, including 98,000 incidents of spousal assault in B.C. in 1997.

The outreach project will create presentational and education kits (PEKs) to target women's groups, men's groups, police, churches, schools, First Nations and the Indo-Canadian community, among others.

It's meant to be a pro-active response to violence against women rather than reacting to violence when it happens, Crowston said.

"The beginning is changing the attitudes," she said. "Our ultimate goal is a violence-free zone."

Organizers are seeking funding for the project from the National Crime Prevention Centre's Safer Communities Initiative, and if successful, they will hire staff and start in October.

The first six months will be spent researching and preparing kits, then there will be a year's worth of presentations in all communities in the corridor and working with stakeholders.

The project is meant to be a pilot project that could end up with a regional strategy for the corridor.

"We want to make sure a woman seeking help in D'Arcy has the same resources available to her as she does in Squamish," Crowston said.

Pearl's Place is also improving outreach with a new toll-free line for women to call. Women can call Pearl's Place in Squamish on their 24-hour emergency line at 892-5711 or toll-free at 1-877-890-5711.

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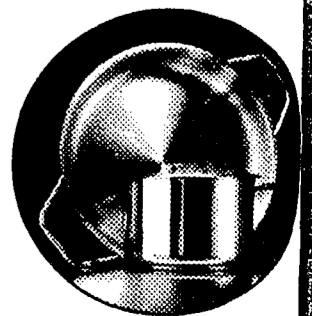

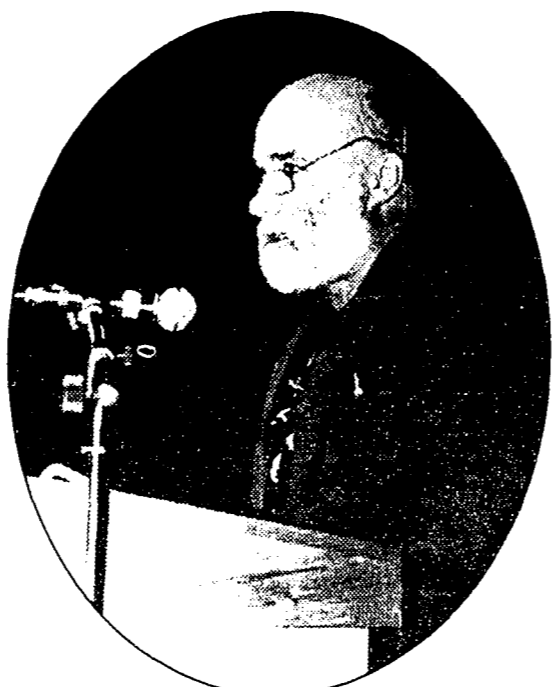
But besides the great beer, the highlight of the evening for most people was Arthur Black.

Stop-smoking program aimed at youth

A provincial anti-smoking program that does not harp on quitting is coming to the Sea to Sky corridor.

Kick the Nic 2000 is being brought forward by the health ministry in response to a recommendation from the province's Teen Tobacco Team that B.C. develop a stop-smoking program specifically for youth.

The program is unique because it advocates quitting in progressive stages, encourages the involvement of peer support and helps youth learn from setbacks," Minister of Health Penny Priddy said* Sept. 27.

Marilyn McIvor, tobacco reduction co-ordinator for Coast Garibaldi Health Unit

and Heather Donaldson of Sea to Sky Community Services attended a training session in Vancouver to become "master trainers."

They will now train others, including teachers, how to deliver the program locally.

"The program is unique because it advocates quitting in progressive stages, encourages the involvement of peer support and helps youth learn from setbacks,"

Donaldson said Friday she and McIvor are encouraging schools to do the program in-class to avoid con-

flicts with students' other priorities.

"We're hoping teachers and youth will get together and run this program," she said.

In addition to the usual smoking-cessation program, materials are presented in a manner that will best appeal to teens, Donaldson said. They deal with issues like side-effects of withdrawal — weight gain and stress — and handling withdrawal symptoms.

Donaldson added McIvor is tentatively planning to introduce the program locally during Drug Awareness Week in November.

Every year 7,300 children and teens start smoking. It is estimated half of all smokers die from causes related to their addiction.

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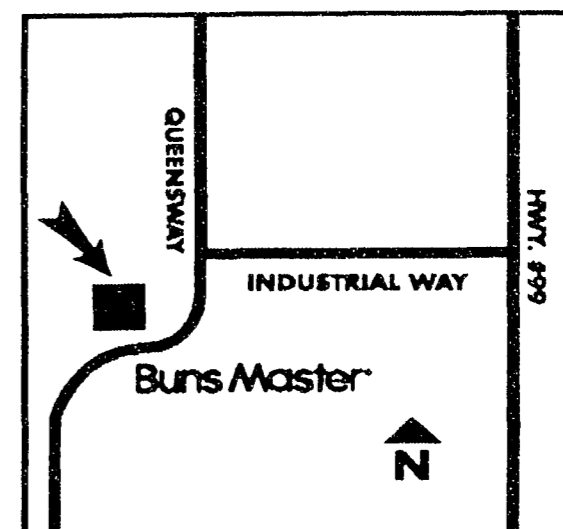

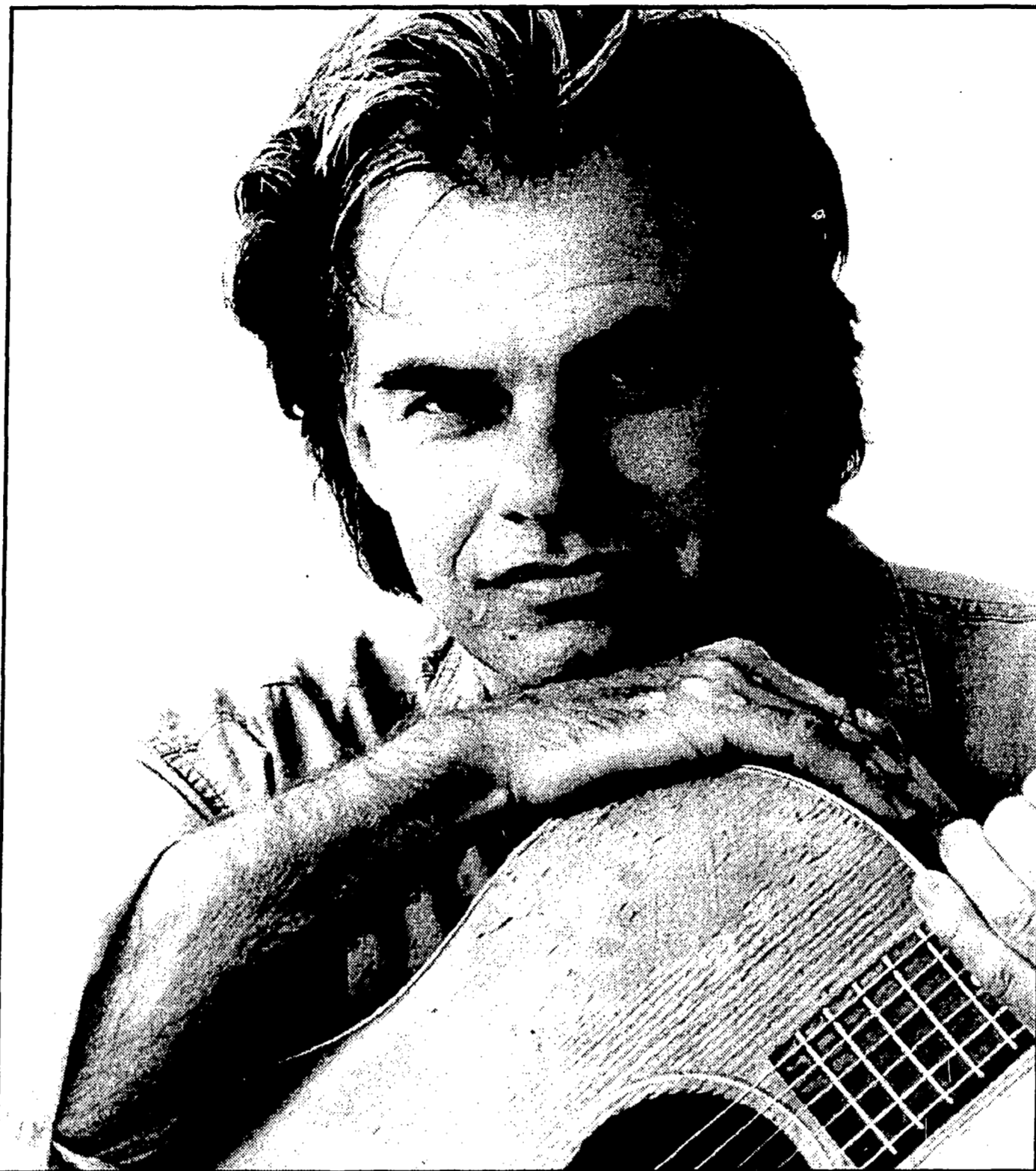

home side. Steve Underwood rounded out the scoring.

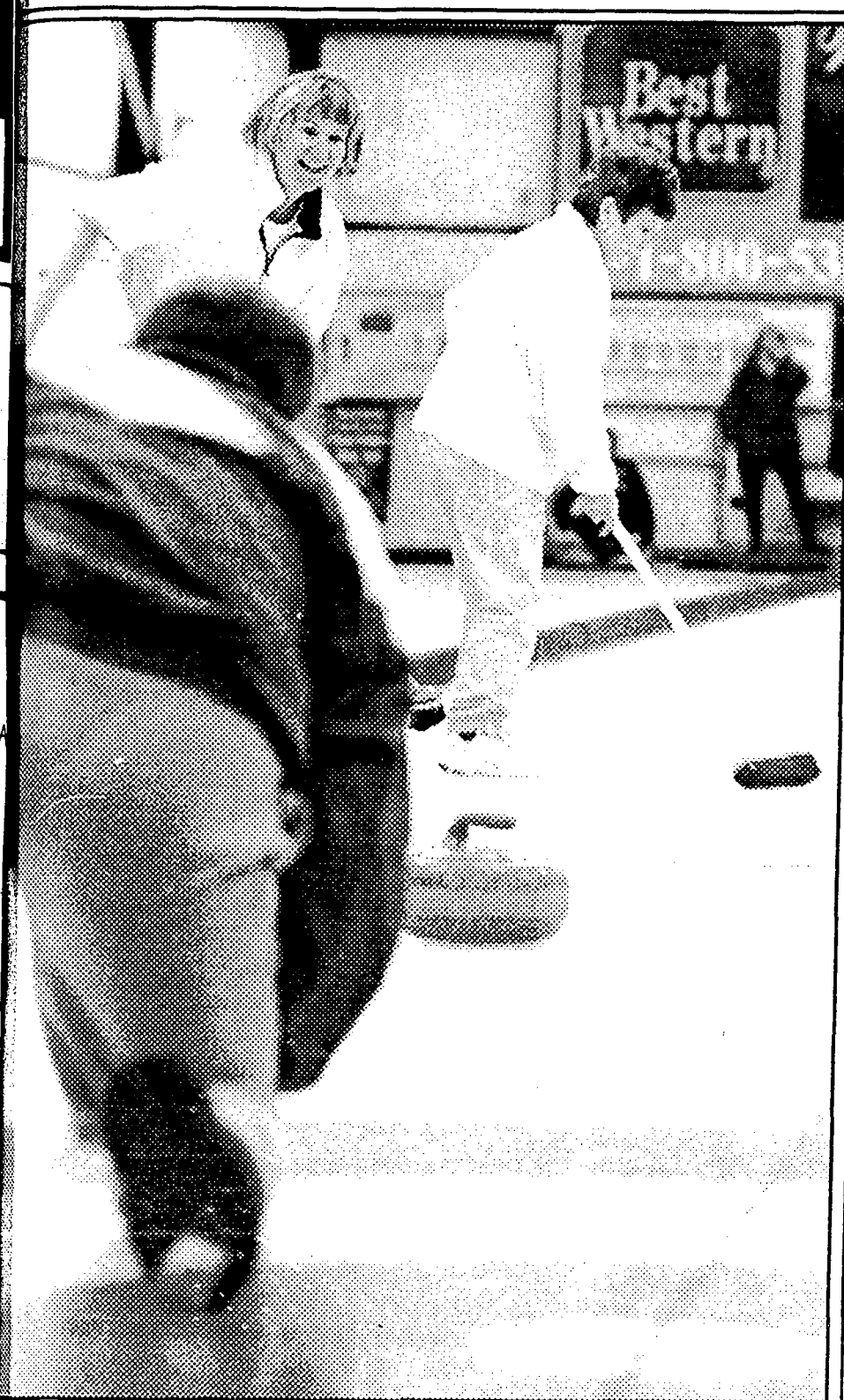

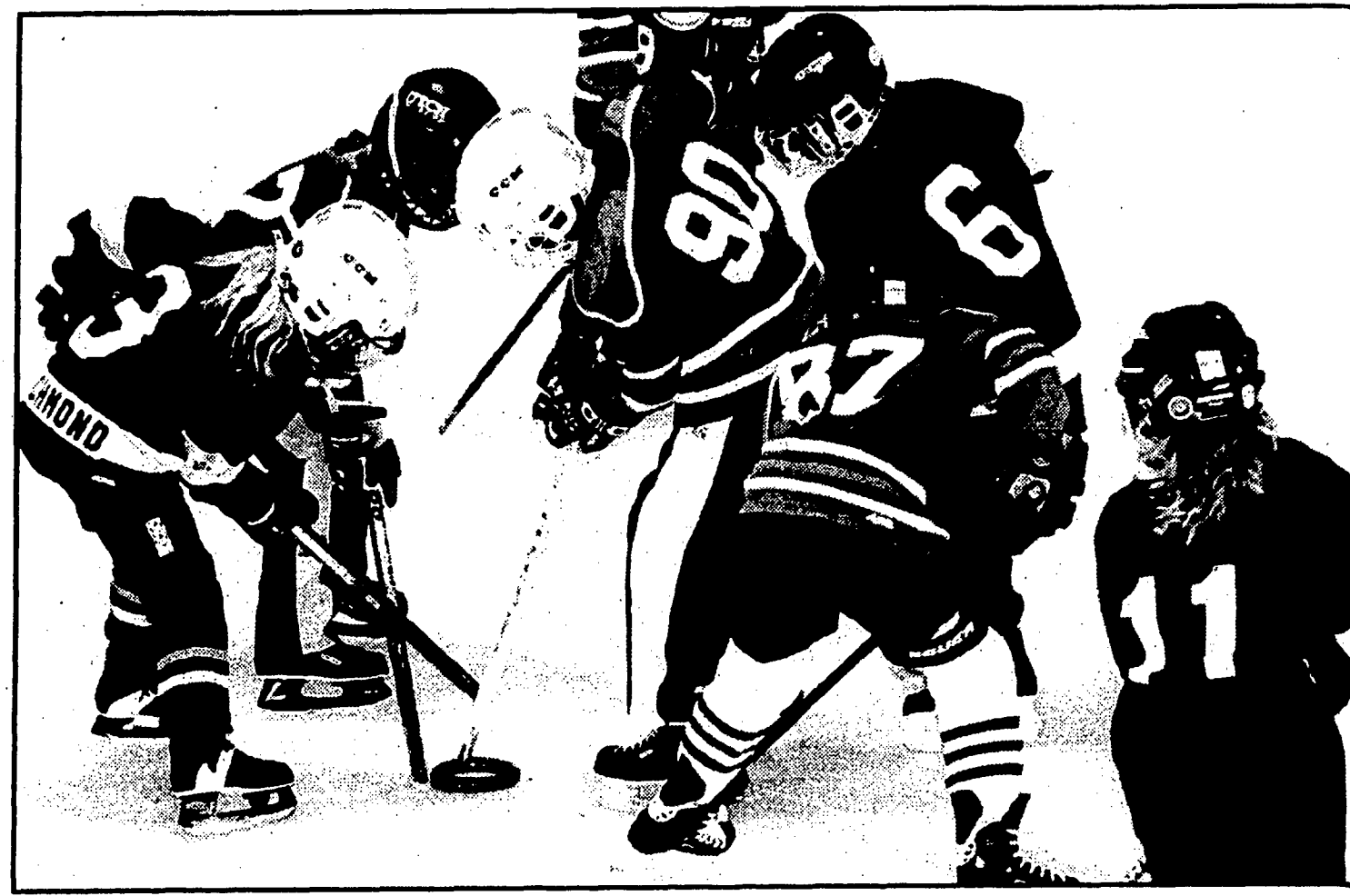

David was making it very clear he hadn't gone to work today.

Sitting at his dining room table, David was clearly impatient and anxious to complete the interview and continue on his rounds, delivering mail between various community service offices.

The 41-year-old, who is developmentally disabled, has lived in Squamish since 1990 with three other men. All three moved to Squamish from Woodlands, an institution in New Westminster. Their move is symbolic of the one many developmentally-disabled people have made into the mainstream of society over the last few years.

With October being Community Living Month, more than 35 B.C. communities are celebrating the contributions made to society by people with development disabilities.

In Squamish, this will take place at Happy Times Children's Centre, next to municipal hall, on Oct. 24 from 2-4 p.m. Events will include a proclamation from Mayor Corinne Lonsdale, a cake-cutting ceremony, "hand-print garden," and bulb planting by community members.

David can be seen making his contribution each day as he walks his route in the downtown. This takes him

from his home on Third Avenue to Happy Times Children's Centre, on to Coast Garibaldi Health Unit's public and mental health offices, then to the health ministry or Sea to Sky Community Services (SSCS) offices and then back again.

It takes him about two hours to do the route, said Pam Erskine.

Erskine, of SSCS, supervises Newport House, Squamish's only residential group home, where Dave and his roommates live.

"When people hear the words group home, the community gets a different understanding than just four guys living together," said Diana Stevenly, who works with Erskine at

Newport House.

"[David] seems to be such a vital link between these agencies," said Stevenly.

"He does get paid for this job, through the human resources ministry," said Erskine. "If he wasn't doing at least 20 hours a month of volunteer work he wouldn't get paid."

When David isn't deliver-

ing mail, he's working in the garden or doing artwork in a SSCS program.

He, along with his roommates Paul, Bryan and Gordon, all took part in the Terry Fox Run this year.

"The beauty of it is we keep giving them more opportunities to grow and become more a part of the community," said Stevenly.

A barber who is much too close to his razors and a meat-pie madame lead off in a musical that is deep, dark, surprising and often uproariously funny.

The Steven Sondheim musical has connections to Squamish from whence comes ensemble member Laura Dorosh, to London, where it is set and to Broadway where it premiered in 1979.

Perfectly timed for the Halloween season, Sweeney Todd, The Demon Barber of Fleet Street, is playing

at the Stanley Theatre until Oct. 29.

Todd, played by George Masswohl, was once Benjamin Barker, a barber who was deported to Australia's penal colony by a vile judge who desired Barker's beautiful wife.

Todd, allied with meat-pie seller Mrs. Lovett, is now bent on revenge, while providing Lovett with a steady source of filling for her pies.

Depending on one's mood, Sweeney Todd is drama, horror, a moral lesson, a love story, or simply a dark comedy. Happily, the company is successful at arous-

ing whatever emotion is needed to best enjoy a particular scene.

Though the plot is as twisted as Sweeney Todd himself, and the characters are truly likable, despicable or amusing as appropriate, what sticks in the mind is the musical score.

The tongue-twister The Worst Pies in London, sung by Corrine Koslo as Mrs. Lovett, and the discussion between Todd and Lovett of what could be cooking in A Little Priest had the audience laughing loudly enough to drown out the six-member orchestra stationed on the upper level of the

minimalist set.

The two younger characters, Rebecca Codling's Johanna and Ryan Silverman's Anthony, form a stark contrast to the world-weary souls around them. Codling's soprano and Silverman's tenor combine in Kiss Me to reinforce the sense of pure, old-fashioned love in opposition to the ghoulish circumstances they find themselves in.

Directed by B.C. native Morris Panych, Sweeney Todd is the largest ever production by the Arts Club Theatre Company in 36 seasons.

The president of the British Columbia Teachers Federation was present at the ceremony and could see how our First Nations students are learning to preserve their own history.

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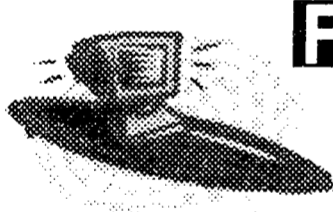


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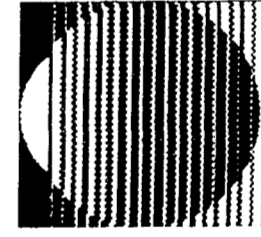
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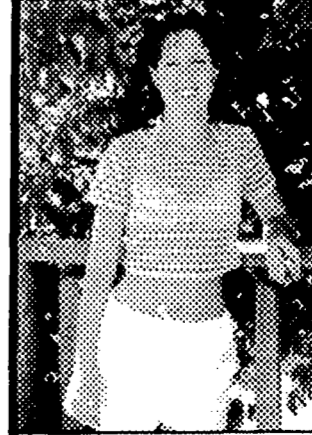
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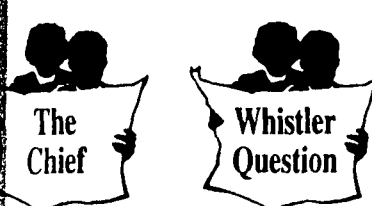

Report from the Chair and Chief Executive Officer

We are pleased to present this second annual report to the Sea to Sky Community.

The Sea to Sky Community Health Council is guided by its goals of:

- Providing better health services;
- Enabling greater public participation and responsibility;
- Bringing health services closer to home;
- Effectively managing health resources;
- Respecting the care provider;
- Recognizing and respecting the client; and
- Providing quality care and services.

The past year has been very challenging for the council. We have seen significant changes in the delivery of health services, including enhancement of our palliative care, cancer care, and surgical programs to ensure that optimal services are provided in the most cost effective manner closer to home. We take pride in initiatives such as contracted home care nursing, providing seamless access to this service to the residents of Pemberton. We are also pleased to have retained a second surgeon on staff at SGH, Dr. Robert Patterson, enabling 24-hour on-call coverage for post-operative surveillance and handling of significant emergencies. Squamish General Hospital has seen dramatic increases in numbers of surgeries performed and newborn deliveries.

One of the greatest on-going challenges to our Community Health Council has been in the area of funding. The Ministry of Health's funding formula presently is slow to recognize shifts in referral patterns and population increases. As services are enhanced and brought closer to home, and as the population of the Sea to Sky Corridor continues to grow dramatically, the negative impact on this health authority is profound. We continue to work closely with the Ministry of Health to rectify our fiscal situation. We are thankful for \$400,000 of one-time additional funding received at the end of the last fiscal year, and are optimistic that increased funding will be realized in future base budgets. A new funding formula from the Ministry of Health that is sensitive to changing populations and referral patterns would enable Council to respond more quickly to changing health care needs throughout the Corridor.

In recent months, the CHC has partnered with the Regional Hospital District, the three Corridor Health Care Foundations, and the CHSS to develop a comprehensive plan for health services and capital budgeting requirements for the next 3-10 years. An external contractor has been engaged to assist in developing a 3-year health services plan and identify future facility and space requirements

in facilities in Squamish, Whistler and Pemberton. The draft health services plan portion of the project should be completed by mid-October, with the capital budgeting plan being completed by year end.

The Sea to Sky Community Health Council is fortunate to have the wealth of expertise, compassion and commitment in its staff, physicians, and board members. Despite ever-increasing workload and demands, their competence and grace in continuing to provide exceptional care inspires us. Our staff epitomizes care and compassion as they work in our facilities, and many are known to voluntarily commit time outside of working hours to further care for clients, patients and the community at large. Their unrelenting vision for excellence is truly awesome and gives us great pride.

We are grateful for the on-going support received by the Regional Hospital District, our Foundations, Auxiliary, and our many volunteers, as well. Without their continued support we would not be able to provide the level of services that are presently provided nor could we consider improving access to other services.

We would be remiss not to acknowledge the tremendous contribution made by the councillors of the initial CHC. Their vision and dedication established a strong foundation upon which we strive to build. Our gratitude goes to past councillors:

The 1998/99 fiscal year was a challenging one for the Community Health Council trying to balance the operating budget with increased workloads in almost all areas. The Council ended the year with an operating deficit of \$160,714 after additional year-end funding of \$400,000 from the Ministry of Health. This additional funding recognized the increased activity experienced and the need for funding. However this increase did not carry forward to the 1999/2000 year.

The Council was able to purchase \$696,592 worth of equipment to replace aging equipment and upgrade equipment to provide necessary services. Major pieces of equipment include the replacement of the X-ray suite in Pemberton, ultrasound unit at Squamish, heart monitors and surgical equipment. This was made possible by funding from the Ministry of Health, the Regional Hospital District and the Healthcare Foundations in our communities.

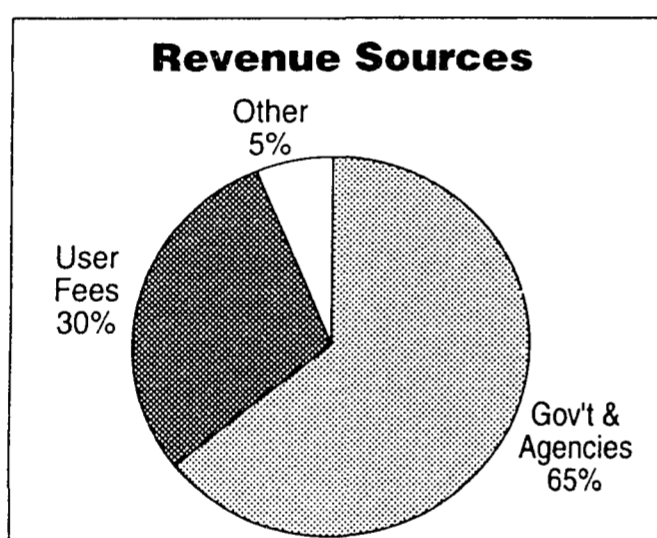
The increasing population in the corridor coupled with the influx of tourists continues to put pressure on the health services provided. Staff constantly strive for greater efficiencies and new ways to perform functions while still providing services "Closer to Home."

The accompanying graphs portray some of the activities and growth. Notably:

- Emergency visits have increased 4149 or 12% in two years.
- Surgical cases have increased 411 or 345%.
- Inpatient admissions have increased 150 or 10%.
- The average length of stay for inpatients has decreased 17%.

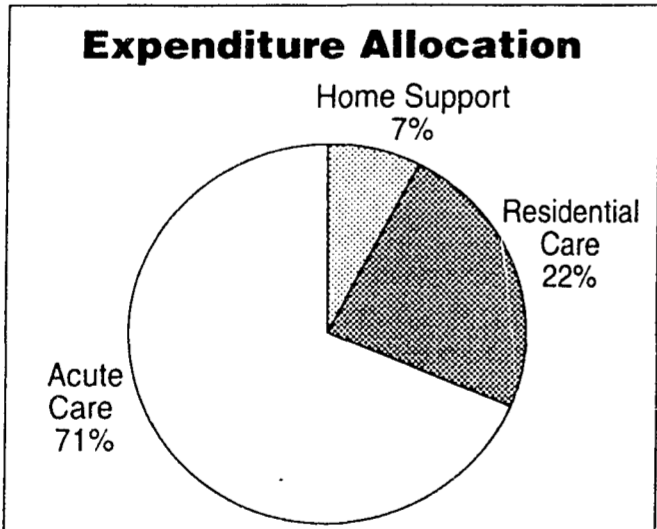
The first six months of the current year show the trend of increased activity is continuing, emphasizing the residents and visitors preference to receive their care in this community. The Sea to Sky Community Health Council is working with the Ministry of Health to continue to provide the necessary services to our Community.

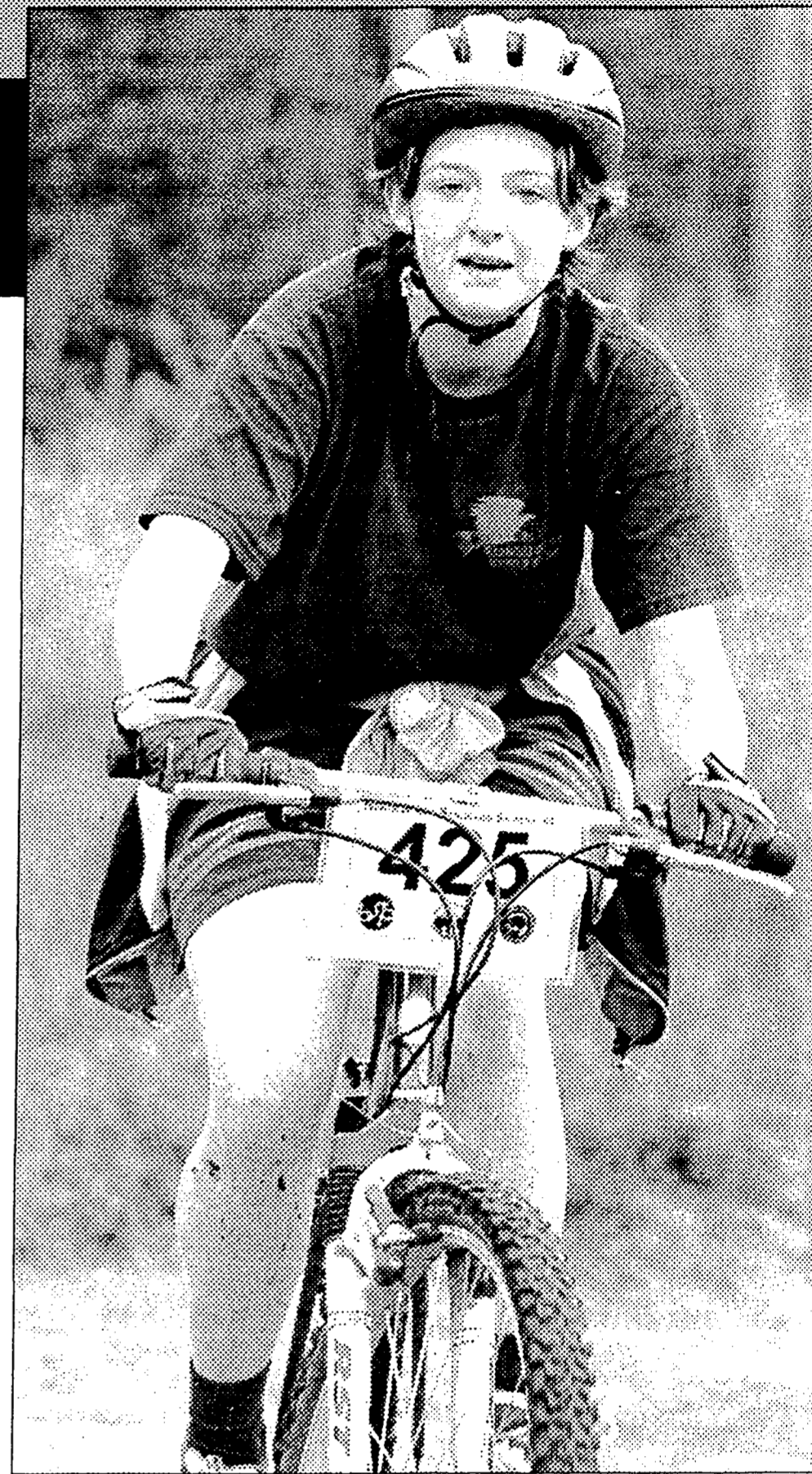
Deficiency of Revenue Over Expenditure from Operations, before additional funding: -560,714

Whistler Health Centre

The Whistler Health Care Centre has evolved from its humble beginnings when it first opened as a clinic in a trailer 15 years ago.

Russell Hemingson, Health Services Co-ordinator for the Whistler Health Centre, says the present facility on Lorimer Road is classified as a diagnostic and treatment centre and was opened in 1994. It now holds 16 beds to deal with patient volumes.

At one time, it was also housed in the basement of the municipal hall.

Hemingson says there are nine active physicians working in the emergency department in the Whistler Health Centre. Plus specialists in areas such as orthopedic surgery, plastic surgery, pediatrics, ophthalmology, cardiology, gynecology, radiology, pathology, sports medicine and neurology come to Whistler on a regular basis to provide health care to those in need.

In 1998-99, there were 28,964 admissions to the Health Centre. Of those, 21,150 were admitted to the emergency department. Outpatient visits to lab and X-ray made up the remainder of the admissions.

About 30 per cent of all admissions to emergency are orthopedic-related, while 25 per cent



are for medical reasons such as gastrointestinal or respiratory ailments. Other examples of admissions include minor surgery, wounds, eyes, ears, nose and throat disorders.

In June, 1998, the Canadian Council on Health Service accreditation awarded the Sea to Sky Health Council the highest award of a three-year accreditation. In its report, it concluded "your participation demonstrates your commitment to the provision of quality care and service in your community."

This year, in May, the employees and physicians at the Whistler Health Care Centre received the "Award of Distinction - Customer Focus" from the Quality Council of B.C.

The Sea to Sky Community Health Council has been working on a massive planning initiative, due to be completed in December, which will be used to lay

the foundation for capital expenditures and growth for the next three to 10 years and Hemingson says that the Whistler Health Centre is ready to expand.

"We are reaching maximum capacity during peak periods," he says. Hemingson points out that the Health Centre functions as a community centre.

Upstairs, Coast Garibaldi Health provides services such as adult mental health, community health nursing, home care nursing, environmental health and speech and language therapy. Support groups such as AA also operate at the Health Centre.

The Whistler Health Care Centre is part of Sea to Sky Community Health Council together with Squamish General Hospital, Hilltop House Home Support and the Pemberton Health Centre.

The Whistler Centre open seven days a week from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Squamish General Hospital

Squamish General Hospital sits perched on a bed of granite above the ribbon of highway known as the Sea to Sky which runs from Vancouver to Whistler and needless to say, it is an extremely busy facility for an extremely dynamic and growing population.

Health Services Co-ordinator Gloria Healy says it is bursting at the seams. Rooms that were formerly used for single services such as physiotherapy have become "multi-use" spaces to house patients using the multitude of programs and services now available in Squamish.

"It's been a little chess game of moving people around to accomplish the service," Healy says.

"Because of the increased utilization of services, physical space is very cramped."

A major capital and growth plan is currently underway and should wrap-up in December. The intent of the study is to provide focus and direction to meet the health needs of people in the Sea To Sky corridor for the next 10 years.

"The primary purpose of this effort is to develop and translate the area's vision for future health care delivery into a capital plan which identifies the need for new space, renovated

space and major equipment acquisition..." according to Richard Wadsworth, Director of Planning and Evaluation.

Squamish Hospital is an acute care health centre with 25 acute care beds, an accredited laboratory, a diagnostic imaging service which takes x-rays and is the only hospital in the region to provide ultra-sound testing. Healy says there are also plans to expand to include a permanent mammography department. Currently mammography screening is provided by the provincial screening program.

The workload in the laboratory and x-ray departments have tripled since regionalization began in 1997.

Before the health care delivery system was regionalized, much of the corridor lab work now done in Squamish went down to Lions Gate Hospital.

A chemotherapy program now exists at Squamish monitored by Dr. Doyle and the board only just announced a few weeks ago that a new surgeon will begin working here on Oct. 4. which means there is cesarean sections back-up for the obstetrical department.

There are three General Practitioners in

the area who give epidurals.

Another service provided is the Diabetic Daycare program, which operates weekly. People living with diabetes can get group or individual instruction that includes glucose monitoring and diet information.

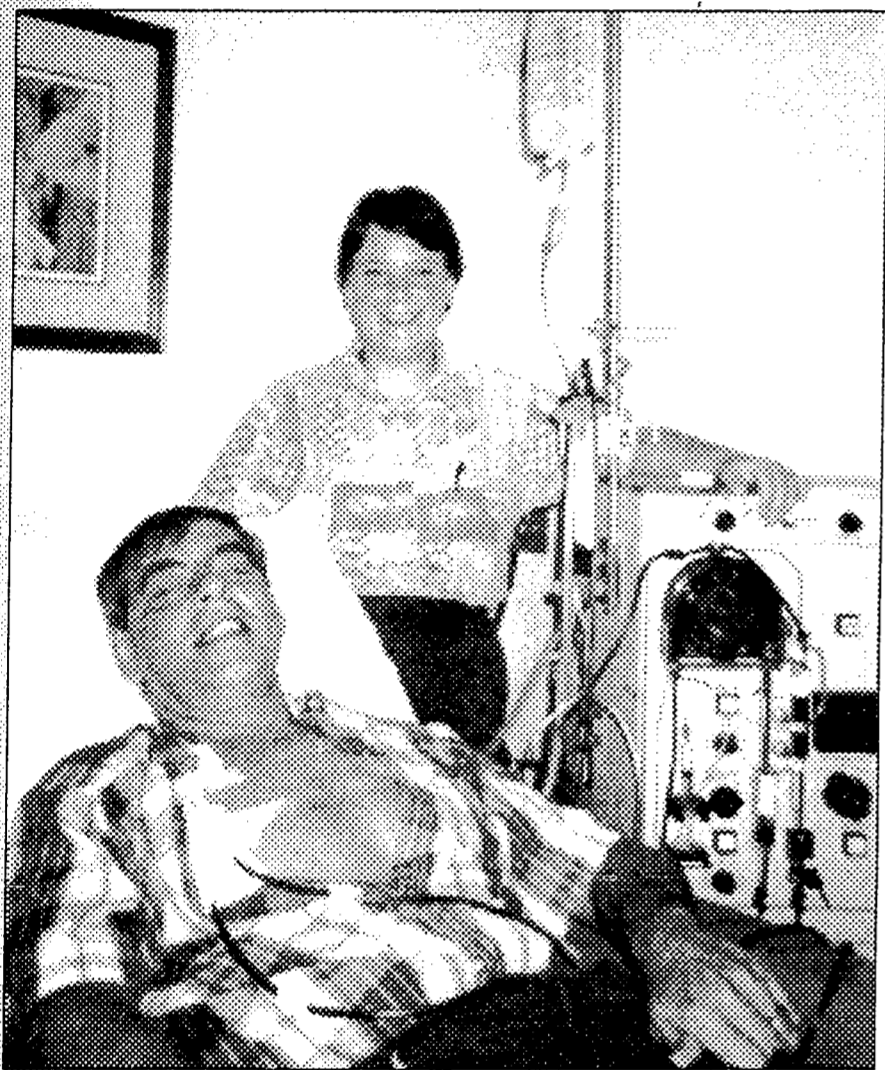
There is also a palliative care unit set-up for the terminally ill. This unit includes a suite where the family can stay with the patient.

The suite was made possible with donated funds by different community groups. The Hospital Ladies Auxilliary and Squamish Healthcare Foundation Society are major contributors to capital projects locally.

Their tremendous support as well as that of other service groups and individuals in the community provide much of the equipment needed to deliver care and service to residents of the corridor.

Healy says that currently three people are using the renal dialysis equipment three days weekly. Plans are underway to upgrade the cardiac monitoring equipment and the operating room will need more equipment.

Fourteen General Practitioners work in the Squamish area and have hospital privileges.

Hilltop House

As the aging population in Canada grows by leaps and bounds, unfortunately there comes a day when the elderly can no longer care for themselves.

In Squamish, there is Hilltop House to turn to.

There are 20 extended care beds, 30 intermediate care beds and 10 special needs beds reserved for those with psycho-geriatric needs such as Alzheimer's or dementia, says Gloria Healy, health services co-ordinator.

The Activity Program and Continuing Care's Adult Daycare Program have been combined to better utilize resources, she says. Activities and residents are divided to more clearly reflect their abilities according to cognitive levels. A part-time occupational therapist assists with the activity programs.

Hilltop House has a very pro-active Support Society which raised enough money to purchase a van and supplies the manpower to chauffeur residents around town whether it be to church on Sunday or an outing for lunch. The Support Society's constant and ongoing support is crucial to enhanced programs at Hilltop House.

Hilltop sits up the hill from Squamish General Hospital and can be reached from the hospital by a one-storey elevator and then down a long hallway. It was built in 1984 and over the years some additions were constructed as the town and the facility grew.

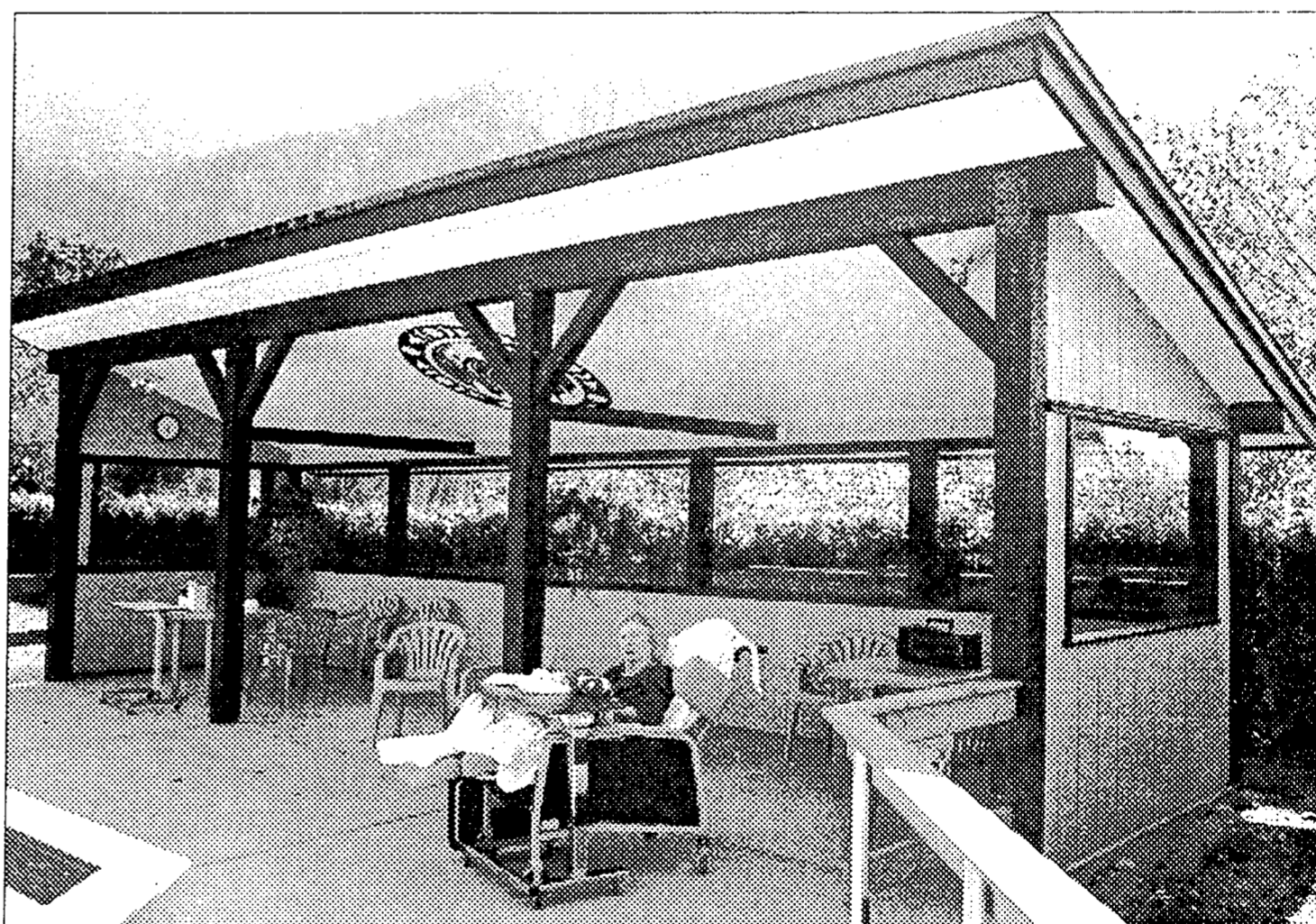
Two beds have also been designated as respite beds for intermediate and extended care and can be booked for up to a month's stay at a time through Marion Biln, the Continuing Care Assessor. These beds are seldom empty.

Healy says the quick and easy definition for the dividing line between intermediate and extended care is whether a person is able to transfer independently.

Four full-time and five part-time registered nurses are employed by Hilltop. The nurses work in conjunction with long-term care aides.

Currently there are 35 people on the waiting list which translates to about an 18-month wait for intermediate care and three years for extended care.

The list is done on strictly a first-come, first-served basis. There are no queue-jumpers who may want to move-up the list. Patients simply must go to another facility, in all likelihood in

Vancouver, until a bed comes open here in Squamish. These are provincial regulations over which there is no local control.

Like the Squamish General Hospital, Hilltop needs to expand. "The need is going to get greater," she says.

More walkers and more wheelchairs take-up more space which leads to further overcrowding, she says.

Staff and management are also

waiting for the results of a major planning study due in December for some solutions and suggestions to all the crowding.

A Workers' Compensation Board ruling prohibiting smoking in all workplaces by the year 2000 will have a major impact on capital projects at Hilltop. Healy says automatic doors and protected facilities of some sort must be built to accommodate those seniors who smoke.

Pemberton Health Care Centre

The Pemberton Health Care Centre has been operating 22 years in the valley.

It was opened in 1977 by the Pemberton and District Hospital Society when a group of concerned citizens rallied together to remedy what they saw was a real need in the community. Before that time, physicians and the community did not have a proper health care facility at their disposal.

"Over the years it evolved to provide excellent primary medical and diagnostic services," said acting Health Services Co-ordinator Richard Wadsworth.

The Pemberton Health Centre is a diagnostic and treatment centre and provides emergency urgent health care, X-ray and laboratory services plus some part-time outpatient care such as physiotherapy.

Last year the facility saw about 4,000 patients through the ER department, Wadsworth said. The staff has dealt with medical situations ranging from motor vehicle collision injuries to chronic care to palliative care for the terminally ill.

The centre is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday to Friday but a registered nurse is on duty from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Nurses also provide a first response after hours.

As well, a number of related government agencies have offices in the health centre. Wadsworth said the Coast Garibaldi Health Unit has an office plus Mental Health and

the Ministry of Children and Families provide some counselling.

"It is a bit of a hub," says Wadsworth. "The people in Pemberton really take pride in the health centre."

There are three emergency stretchers and a treatment room at the centre, he said.

As a primary medical facility, the purpose is to stabilize the patients and either send them home or transport them to a larger facility in Squamish or Vancouver by ambulance or medivac,

Wadsworth said.

In addition, patients are referred to their family physician or specialists for additional treatments, follow-up, tests, etc.

"Basically, we are the primary point of entry to health services for the people of Pemberton and area," he said. "We provide primary medical care."

Lab services are open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday to Friday and basic x-ray services are available from Monday to Saturday 1-5 p.m.

Howe Sound Home Support

The Sea to Sky Community Health Council provides home support services through Howe Sound Home Support.

The home support program assists individuals to function independently in their homes. Services provided by home support assist the family member or caregiver to help the individual function as independently as possible in his home.

Home support workers do a multitude of tasks, ranging from meal preparation to personal hygiene to house-cleaning to shopping and respite for the primary caregivers who tend to be family members.

The benefits are many. The client can maintain a high level of independence and

families get "peace of mind," Hemingson says.

Each individual is assessed as to need and then a worker is assigned to help him based on the assessed need and the available resources.

The majority of service hours provided by Home Support are contracted through the Continuing Care branch of the Ministry of Health.

The remainder of the hours are contracted with the Ministry of Children and Families, Insurance Corporation of B.C., the Workers' Compensation Board, the Department of Veterans Affairs or private pay and home care nursing.

That translates to between 120 and 130 clients currently

using the Home Support program, he says. Between 12 to 15 live in the Whistler/Pemberton/D'Arcy area and the remaining 110 to 115 reside around Britannia and Squamish.

Many of the clients require long-term care however many other clients use the

Home Support program for a shorter duration, he says.

In Squamish, Howe Sound Home Support is located at Hilltop House, the long-term care facility. There is a sub-office in Pemberton, Hemingson says.
