Mall gets concessions

oncerns expressed by Tantalus Road merants didn't stop councillors from recomnding Ebbe Syberg-Olsen be given the ee variances he requested for the expansion the Highlands Mall Sept. 21.

he 218-square-metre southern addition is marily to accommodate a larger Extra ods store.

he renovation will close the east entrance of mall and create a false front along that side the building. A new loading bay at the Ithwest end will be built and the western e of the mall will receive a continuous zed canopy and with upgraded exterior fines. The walkway between the mall and the st Western Sea to Sky Hotel to the south ll also have lighting installed.

The closure of the east entrance, cutting off all traffic from merchants on Tantalus Road, is the greatest concern expressed. A 13me petition against the closure was submitto council from affected businesses.

byberg-Olsen said the mall must be oriented the parking lot, which additional paving is preasing to 230 stalls.

"I'm not unsympathetic to the concerns of the Tantalus Road merchants," he said.

"The businesses back there are destination shops, not gift shops relying on impulse buy-

Syberg-Olsen also said parking on Tantalus would be improved and the relocated loading bay will keep the trailers from blocking the

Mall stores facing Tantalus will be moved to the side facing Hwy. 99, he said.

"It just makes planning sense and economic sense to have them on that side," said Syberg-

The variances are to eliminate the setback between the mall property and the Best Western and to allow Syberg-Olsen to re-erect his sign, taken down when Garibaldi Way was widened because it was too close to the road.

The 7.6-metre high sign will have a 19 square metre face, making it the largest sign highway sign in Squamish.

"What I am concerned with is the image we present to the travelling public," Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said.


"That property has been the biggest disgrace in the municipality for the last 10 years," she said, casting the only vote against.

University VP named

Squamish's future university has named its first academic appointment.

Dr. David Strangway, head of the group bringing Canada's first private non-profit university to Squamish, announced Friday that Dr. Peter C. Emberley will be the vice-president (academic) of the university effective Jan. 1, 2000.



Emberley, 43, is a graduate of UBC and is currently a professor of political science at Carleton University in Ottawa. In his 15 years at Carleton he has published four books and several articles and reviews and has served as assistant chair of the department of political science and in the University Senate.

He also helped create and was the founding director of Carleton's College of the Humanities and has taught at Cornell College and Colorado College in the United States.

Strangway said Friday he was pleased to bring Emberley on board.

"He shares my vision of what we want to do right down the line," he said.

Strangway said besides Emberley's appointment, plans for the university are advancing quickly behind the scenes. "Some people have been a little concerned that not very much has been going on, but in fact there's been quite a lot," he said.

The Howe Sound Educational Foundation (HSEF), the group created in April to receive 1,000 acres of land donated by the Tiampo family to build the university and sell market housing to finance it, recently received charitable status.

That will allow the HSEF to start financing the project and also receive donations for an eventual endowment fund to provide scholarships for students, including locals, Strangway said.

The business plan is still waiting on the official signing of a memorandum of agreement between the District of Squamish and the HSEF, which should be complete in the next few weeks. according to Strangway.

He is still hopeful for an official land transfer and groundbreaking for New Year's Eve 1999 as he mentioned in April.

The university would be open for its first class of 200 to 250 students in September 2003, and campus buildings would be complete by 2006, the year the university will hit its cap of 1,100 students.

The university's draft academic plan is also largely complete. A copy provided to The Chief by Strangway outlines its academic principles, proposed courses and a plan for hiring faculty. Strangway said the ratio of students to faculty will be 10 to 1 or better, meaning at least 110 faculty will be hired, about half of who will be full-time.

The university will be the first in Canada to organize its academic year on a block plan, meaning that rather than taking five courses concurrently, students will take one course at a time indepth, with each course running three and a half weeks.

The university will run year-round so students can take up to 12 courses per year and finish a degree in as little as 30 months, and the block plan will allow the university to hire special lecturers in specialty fields on a short-term basis, Strangway pointed out. "We think this will be an attraction to bring in some very interesting people as instructors."

An advisory board for the university will also be named in the next few weeks with its first meeting scheduled in January. Strangway said the board will have at least one representative from Squamish.

Eivind Tornes has joined the growing ranks of people who plan to run for council in this fall's municipal elections.

Tornes, who owns the Shady Tree Neighborhood Pub in Brackendale and also works as a forest contractor, declared his candidacy to The Chief Thursday in a letter to the editor.

Tornes, who came to Squamish six years ago, says the community needs to rekindle its optimism and spirit by welcoming investment and creating a healthy economy.

He cites Alberta premier Ralph Klein's call to get government off the backs of people. "It seems to work for Alberta and Ontario, and there is no reason why it should not work for Squamish," he says.







Camp rebuilt, Interfor 'opens' forest

Forest International Products (Interfor) employees are being taught how to avoid the confrontations sure to follow the re-establishment of an environmental protest camp in the Elaho Valley Saturday.

Apart from teaching loggers how protesters work and how to avoid confrontations and defuse potentially dangerous situations, Interfor erected a banner near the entrance to Tree Farm Licence (TFL) 38 Monday.

It reads: "Welcome to our Tree Farm. We the workers pledge to work safely, peacefully and responsibly in your forest."

Interfor workers and contractors signed the banner on their way into work Monday morning.

The banner, Interfor's workshop, and the Sept. 19 protest outside Sauder's home in Vancouver are all in response to an incident in the Elaho Sept. 15 that saw an anti-logging protest camp dismantled.

Protesters and a conservationist doing research in the Elaho who was injured in the incident say at least 100 loggers attacked the camp, first destroying all camera equipment and then assaulting environmentalists at the camp before burning it to the ground.

"We don't condone what happened, but we certainly won't apologize for what

happened out there," IWA Canada representative Sonny Rioux said at Interfor's seminar Friday.

"These people aren't fighting for the TFL, they're fighting for their families. their children, their jobs."

IWA local 2171 president Darrel Wong said Sunday the union "looks forward to a thorough police investigation of all the events and circumstances of what happened in the Elaho Valley."

He claimed that protesters have been regularly vandalizing equipment, assaulted police in an arrest attempt at the camp Sept. 5 and even

attempted to assault the son of an Interfor staff member with a hammer.

Interfor president Duncan Davies has called for a cooling-off period and said a high-priority review of possible resolutions to the situation has been set in motion.

"We will hold off logging in a 25-acre area ... that has a concentration of about 60 very old Douglas firs," Davies said.

"We have requested UBC forest ecologists to undertake a study to determine the age, distribution and condition of these trees."

Interfor chief forester Ric

Slaco said Friday the area was not being logged, and the road building will not be affected by Davies' pledge.

"No one was working there; the message was that these trees aren't in immediate danger," he said.

Slaco also said while UBC had been contacted a couple weeks ago, before the incident, it is uncertain what would happen if environmentalist claims of these trees being Canada's oldest are confirmed.

Interfor management has said the incident was sparked by the report of a tree-sitter blocking road construction

north of Lava Creek. Thirteen people have been arrested for breaking a court injunction not to interfere with the work.

The tree-sitter, an SFU stucalling himself Guillermo, said Sept. 19 rocks were thrown at him for three hours by Interfor work-

He also said the tree he was in was partly cut, and two trees were felled nearby, one hitting an Interfor truck.

"Because they had already destroyed my camera and no one was videotaping them, I truly believed they were going to kill me," he said.

Dog adopted from pound turns vicious

A trip to the Squamish dog pound to adopt a new pet turned into a huge headache for a local resident.

Dog owner Amy Huska said she recently adopted a threeyear-old shepherd and was told by the dog pound staff that the dog has an excellent temperament and was never aggressive.

"I took her home and the

next thing you know she was attacking my four-month-old puppy," Huska said. "When I went to put a leash on her, she tried to bite my face."

Huska said the next day she took the dog back to the pound, wanted the dog taken back and her money refunded.

"I was refused the money that I paid for her," Huska said.

"I had the dog for 48 hours and that was not worth what I went through with that dog."

Huska added that the dogs at the pound deserve a chance and a good home, but to not be told about a dog's temperament is unsafe and disgusting.

"I'm not very happy with the pound," Huska said. "It's the first dog I've adopted from the pound, and I don't know if I'll go back."

Trudy Coates, Manager of Administrative Services for the District of Squamish, said it's not in the pound staff's benefit not to disclose information about what the dog's temperament is like.

"If we know the past history of the dog, then the owner should be told," Coates said. "We're aware of this particular incident and it's unfortunate that this happened."

Coates said pet owners wishing to adopt have to sign a waiver before taking the animal home.

It reads "I understand that the District of Squamish Control Officer Animal

accepts no responsibility for the present or future condition of the animal or any action of the animal."

Coates said when adopting a pet, she would like to remind people to seriously consider the choice before adopting.

"People should spend time with the pet and make sure," Coates said. "To my knowledge these people did. It was just a bad case and by no means should this incident alarm people."

FRBC money to build trails at Loggers Creek, Rose Park

Loggers Creek and Rose Park trails will be constructed with \$50,000 in aid from Forest Renewal B.C. (FRBC),

district staff hope.

The appeal for FRBC will come in the 244 man-days of labor it will provide to displaced forest workers. They would construct 3.15 kilometres of public trail south of Finch Drive between Hwy. 99 and Loggers Lane.

The trail would split after crossing

Loggers Creek, one branch following the creek's east bank, the other circling almost all the way to Loggers Lane. The trails would meet up at the Mamquam Blind Channel and follow its bank to the Hwy. 99 bridge.

"This will be built to a standard Squamish will be proud of," economic development officer Brent Leigh told council Sept. 21.

"This trail has been a dream for at least five years," Coun. Meg Fellowes

The district's share will be \$15,000

cash and \$15,000 worth of staff time. Public works, economic development and the environmental co-ordinator will each contribute \$5,000 from their budgets to cover the cash cost.

The remaining \$18,000 of the project cost has been contributed by community members.

There is some urgency to the application; FRBC will be ending its funding for recreation projects next March.


Council approved making the application, though Coun. Paul Lalli was concerned the trail could impact on

future development totals, including proposals for a BMX park or a pitch and putt.

"When we move forward three or four years, when people walk down those trails, will they recognize that forest industry money went into those trails?" asked Mayor Corinne Lonsdale.

Leigh said FRBC would be recog-

nized on signs at the trail heads. Though the trails will be very low maintenance, a budget would have to be established, he added.

Raccoon poisoning kills cats

People know a fed bear is a dead bear - but did you know a fed raccoon can mean a dead cat?

Recurring raccoon problems in Timbertown and Spiral trailer courts are leading some people to take matters into their own hands and leave out antifreeze to poison the animals, said conservation officer Dan Le-Grandeur.

But the poisoned water left out to kill raccoons also

attracts domestic animals, and led to the death of one cat in Timbertown Sept. 20.

Raccoons have been a problem in the trailer courts for years because some individuals feed them, LeGrandeur said. While it's not an offence under the Wildlife Act to feed them, it leads to large numbers in the area burrowing into trailers and causing property damage. This summer, one raccoon was reported going into a trailer and attacking a cat.

residents Timbertown are frustrated

and they have good cause to be," LeGrandeur said.

Live-trapping the animals is the only way to legally remove them, and is difficult because as soon as some are removed, others move in.

But poisoning isn't the way to get rid of them, LeGrandeur said.

"It's a very cruel way. The animal dies very painfully, and it'll also kill domestic animals. This is not the proper way to go about it."

It's also an offence under the Wildlife Act and is punishable by fines of up to \$50,000, six months in jail or both.

So far, LeGrandeur has no suspects in last week's poisoning.

LeGrandeur is urging residents to take preventative steps to keep the raccoons away, such as removing outdoor food sources such as pet dishes, properly storing garbage and above all, not feeding the raccoons.

Recreation patrols on in corridor

Two provincial agencies are teaming up to begin regulating recreation areas in Sea to Sky Country.

The B.C. Assets and Land Corporation (BCAL) and the Ministry of Environment Lands and Parks are working in partnership to patrol the

According to Sandy Poggemiller, communications advisor for BCAL, the program started in 1995 when the ministry commissioned a study in the corridor at the urging of various stakeholders and recreation operators.

"The study was completed

in 1996 and it showed a wide range of commercial recreation opportunities in the area," Poggemiller said Sept. 12. The study also identified potential conflicts for public recreation and commercial opportunities such as organized mountain climbing, river rafting or hiking tours.

Poggemiller said the study identified these areas and commercial operators were then asked to start applying for tenure to operate legally in

Conservation officers from the ministry began using allterrain vehicles to criss-cross through the back-country in an area that encompasses Squamish, Whistler and the

Pemberton Valley. The officers look for commercial recreation operations that are doing business without permission to operate on Crown

"The officers are aware of who has tenure and who doesn't," Poggemiller said.

They give out written material and if they find groups that are operating without tenure, they advise them of the program.

Poggemiller said lots of interest was shown in the program, but due to government restructuring it was put on hold until May of last year.

"We're in a planning process right now," Poggemiller said. Phase One is a fact-finding

mission that allows BCAL to find out where the commercial areas are, create maps, talk to user groups, First Nations and any other interested parties.

"Phase Two is now underway and the focus of this is to identify appropriate areas of recreational commercial activities so it has minimal with others," conflict Poggemiller said.

Because the planning process is underway all applications are on hold, but BCAL expects commercial recreation operations to make applications for tenure.

"If they don't establish themselves, they are in violation of the Lands Act."



Non-profit housing plan still possible

With Squamish's sawmill back in operation with two full shifts, the plan to bring a manufactured housing factory to Squamish is dead.

But the Squamish Non-Profit Housing Association (SNPHA), which hopes to build low-cost housing on Crown land in the Cheekye Fan, still hopes to profit from a variation in the plan.

Last winter, with Squamish's sawmill closed, Interfor officials and SNPHA project manager Wil Croxall were talking with Fleetwood Homes to convince them to build a factory on the sawmill site to service B.C.

The SNPHA has made a proposal to the B.C. Housing Management Commission to build up to 3,000 homes on 600 acres of government-owned land in the Cheekye Fan.

Croxall said the group also has an agreement with Fleetwood to provide the homes at cost, meaning locals could own 1,200-square-foot homes for as little as \$51,000 plus \$200 per month in land rent if the company sets up a

factory here in B.C.

Fleetwood decided against setting up a factory in Squamish this spring, but is actively considering a site in Abbotsford, said Croxall, who visited Fleetwood head office in January.

Provincial officials are currently organizing a visit to Fleetwood by Employment and Investment Minister Mike Farnworth this fall to solidify that deal.

If Fleetwood agrees, Croxall said, the SNPHA will be the closest it's been to getting affordable housing in Squamish since it formed 10 years ago.

But once the factory is in place, the SNPHA still can't build in the area until protective dikes are built. Ron Hansen of the B.C. Housing Management Commission said the group's proposal has been received but won't receive approval until the diking issue is resolved.

Neil Peters of the Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks said the provincial government and the District of Squamish have a policy in place not to release any new Crown land or subdivide private land for building until diking is completed.

Peters couldn't say how much such a dike would cost, but said it would be up to the municipality to spearhead the project and apply for funding through the provincial flood protection program. "There are all kinds of issues to be solved," he said.

Croxall said the province is refusing to build new dikes because the District of Squamish opposes paying for maintenance on existing dikes. "They won't be realistic," said Croxall.

The SNHPA is trying to arrange a meeting with new provincial Environment Ministry Joan Sawicki to put pressure on the province to install dikes and allow the project to go forward, as is the local Church of Jesus Christ Latter Day Saints, whose temple sits on unprotected land in the Fan, to push for diking, Croxall said.

The SNPHA has also sent information on its project to prospective candidates for the NDP leadership and to the Squamish Nation, Croxall said. It has also set up an committee to interview candidates in this fall's municipal elections.





An Arizona man was charged with failing to obey a traffic light after he ran threw a red light and caused a twocar accident on Sept. 19.







Rail crossing fix approved

BC Rail's offer to pay for a quarter of repairs to rail crossings at Cleveland Avenue and Loggers Lane and finance the district's share is a good one, council decided Sept. 21.

Council voted 4-2 to accept BC Rail's offer to fund the entire \$102,000 repair in 1999. The district's \$77,000 share will not be due until 2000.

Mayor Corinne Lonsdale and Coun. Paul Lalli were opposed, wanting to see if a better deal could be negotiated when Lonsdale meets with BC Rail management Oct. 8.

BC Rail has a history of paying for some or all of repairs to these crossings, though it is not required to pay anything.

"The junior party to the crossing is obligated for the maintenance and repair of the crossing [under the rail safety code]," Doug Carabetta, BC Rail's manager of engineering services, said Sept. 14.

"In this case the District of Squamish is junior to the

crossing at Cleveland and Loggers Lane."

BC Rail's offer to Squamish is without precedent, he said.

"We certainly don't want to get into a situation where every municipality expects the railway to provide partial funding or interim financing," Carabetta said.

Coun. Lyle Fenton said if council decided to renegotiate the deal, BC Rail could withdraw their offer.

The \$102,000 estimate is based on replacing the rubber mats with asphalt, Carabetta said. The "deluxe"

treatment" of laying a concrete pad under the rails is costlier and still unproven, though a two-year-old trial pad is showing no wear under similar conditions.

Fire prevention bylaw goes ahead

Council gave first three readings Sept. 21 to amendments to the fire prevention bylaw sparked by complaints from Garibaldi Highlands residents about a legal open-air burn last year.

Class A burn permits will have additional conditions, including the material must be cured at least six months prior to light-up, material must be arranged in windrows at most 100 metres long and eight metres wide and separated by at least 15 metres, a water source of at least 13,640 litres must be on site and blowers developing 139 cubic metres per minute must be used throughout the burn to accelerate the fire.

Other changes will allow selling of fireworks on occasions other than Halloween. Deputy fire chief Ray Saurette said Sept. 14 the celebrations of New Year's 2000 were in mind when the change was proposed.

Certification for chimney sweepers is also being deleted. Saurette said when it was first passed there were two or three certified companies in town and a number of uncertified ones doing inadequate cleaning. He said as those certified companies are no longer in business in Squamish, certification is

too onerous a requirement, as homeowners must bring in an outside company.

Vehicle cost fees, which Saurette said are almost twice that of the Lower Mainland, are being lowered.

An aerial truck will now cost \$250 an hour, a pumper truck \$150, a rescue vehicle \$100, and small vehicles \$60. All but the small vehicles classification include a minimum two-hour charge.



EDITORIAL

Double meaning

The battle of the Elaho Valley is back to being a war of words — but the fever pitch remains — and so, it seems, does the hypocrisy.

Amongst the pages of press releases flying back and forth, one quote from Colleen McCrory of the Valhalla Wilderness Society, one of the groups jumping in to make hay out of the loggers' unfortunate attack on the protest camp Sept. 15, jumped out and begged for attention.

"We can't have a vigilante group taking the law into their own hands," she stated in calling for a full RCMP investiga-

One question: is she referring to the loggers who attacked the camp or the protesters who have been willfully breaking the law for over a month now by defying the orders of the B.C. Supreme Court's injunction — not to mention the ongoing vandalism to Interfor equipment in the area and the threats of violence by some of the tree-sitters when faced with arrest?

Obviously she's referring to the loggers — but when you think about it, it's just as appropriate when applied to the protesters. Rather than lobbying the provincial government or Interfor's head office for changes, they're out there in the faces of the people trying to do their jobs, not the people paid to make the decisions the environmentalists want made. And they're breaking the law.

Joe Foy of the Western Canada Wilderness Committee is guilty of the same type of selective vision. Last month in this paper Foy called the protesters in the PATH camp "Canadian heroes" for their non-violent civil disobedience, while emphasizing the WCWC's policy on staying within the boundaries of the law. But WCWC's association with PATH — and a WCWC member's presence at the protest camp at the time of the attack — speak louder than Foy's words.

Conservation groups who cry non-violence and legal tactics are sadly all too willing to turn a blind eye to the tactics of the extremists on their own side of the issue — but let a logger or an RCMP officer step over the line and it's abominable.

In the end, that argument won't wash. Illegal activity is either condoned or it isn't — and association of "legal" protest groups with those who break the law will tar both with the same brush. The contention that environmentalists can flaunt the law and the loggers can only sit there and take it is a "heads-I-win, tails-you-lose" argument.

This is by no means a justification of what that group of loggers did in the Upper Elaho two weeks ago — as we noted last week, not only were their actions morally and legally wrong, they also created more sympathetic press for their opponents in a few hours than a month and a half of tree-sitting had accomplished.

But some of the complaints from the "good" environmentalists, for lack of a better term, smack of hypocrisy.

Part-time minister, full-time campaigner


ike many in the workforce, Gordon Wilson is moving from full-time work to part-time work. The problem is, ✓ the part-time job is being B.C.'s Minister of Education, a job he traded with Paul Ramsey for Finance last week as the NDP clears the decks for a long, drawn-out leadership campaign.

Voters might be surprised and/or offended to see Education being treated as a ministry that can be run by a minister whose highest priority is campaigning to become premier, while Finance is deserving of full-time attention.

Of course, Wilson's trading Finance for Education wouldn't have anything to do with the fact that some of the government's biggest embarrassments have to do with bungles like the provincial deficit and the "fudge-it" budgets of the past.

That's if it was, indeed, his choice rather than a demotion orchestrated by those opposing his leadership bid as is suspected. Either way, campaigning is getting in the way of governing this province.

In the end, though, it won't make much difference which portfolio Wilson takes on; nobody in the NDP is likely to be doing much governing between now and February. Maybe that's just as well, given their track record.



fale of the tapes

If words are weapons, then the video camera is the big gun in Lthe 1990s. The proliferation of inexpensive, portable recorders means just about anybody can tell — and show — a story more clearly and with more-impact than ever before.

That's especially true in the struggle between loggers and protesters in the Elaho Valley. Every time a logger or a police officer has faced a protester since this began there's been a camcorder pointed back at them — and it's no coincidence that the first things the loggers went after Sept. 15 were the cameras.

But the lack of video evidence works both ways: the loggers I've spoken to say that environmentalists' claims of savage beatings and even attempted rape are huge exaggerations of what actually happened on that day.

But even when it's there the camera is still as subjective an eye as any, and "impartial" videos can be used to spin one side or the other.

That's clear from the tape

dropped off at our office last week by the Western Canada Wilderness Committee. The Greenpeace-produced 14-minute tape interviews those assaulted in the Sept. 15 incident, interspersed with audio clips of protesters being arrested and sweeping helicopter shots of the valley.

The spin is clear from the moment that the narrator tells you the protest camp "had been there for years" until the Sept. 15 attack — this is no impartial documentary; this is a video press release.

It's been said recently that the environmentalists have been much more media-savvy than the loggers in this recent conflict but that's changing. Yesterday I was invited up to Interfor's shop at Mile 22 to take pictures of their "Welcome to our Tree Farm" banner — and met a cameraman filming footage for Interfor.

Dal Shemko, who organized the shoot, freely admits the loggers are behind in the spin struggle: "They've documented every

never wanted to die in a hospi-- he had worked in one for over years. He loved his family dearly, open space of his farm, and the uty of nature. A husband of 49 rs, a father of five boys, and a ndfather of four children, he died 81 years of age, while receiving best care possible in a small nmunity hospital.

ntil last week, when I witnessed passing of my father-in-law in a pital in a rural town one hour theast of Toronto, I never realized

the unique services and quality of care available in a small community hospital. Previously my belief was that larger city hospitals, with high technology equipment and specialized services, were where I would receive better health care — yet I now know that this is not necessarily so. After sleeping on a cot alongside of my husband and his dying father in room 106, my eyes opened to more clearly see the unique services and quality of care provided to families and communities by these

smaller local hospitals. The Port Perry Community Memorial Hospital, which boasts of strong community support, embraced our family as we sought to create a "home away from home" for our dying father.

Over the course of 13 days, 13 members of the immediate family routinely frequented room 106 and were active participants with the health care professionals in delivering compassionate and top quality care during the final days and hours. The hospital garden offered healing moments and tables for our numerous family picnics.

The medical library became our living room, bedroom and office as we sought to support our father and

each other as we prepared for his death. I learned a lot about my husband's family, about love, life and dying, about compassion and quality nursing care.

During the continuous process of health care rationalization and budget reductions, of facilities and services are mandatory as we (through our government) focus on better care in a more cost-effective manner. In so doing I now wonder and encourage you to consider if our community hospital is at risk?

A "community hospital" has a new meaning to me, and I wish to extend my gratitude to all the staff and

health care professionals at the Port Perry Community Memorial Hospital. I also now believe, with greater wisdom and experience, in the value of our community hospital, and in the contribution of the staff and health care professionals who work to provide us with quality care.

I encourage everyone to support our community hospital in whatever way you can, to enable Squamish General Hospital to be the best it can be — to continue to provide local health care services to our community.

One of the reasons that people like myself were not using the bus to Brennan Park Leisure Centre was because the time of the programs available at the centre seldom coincided with the bus schedule. So we had to rely on our friends or family to get a ride. Sometimes we enrolled in a program and then hoped that someone who lives close to us is taking the same thing and we can catch a ride with them.

Instead of fixing and improving the problem and encouraging people to take the bus by having more direct buses from downtown to the Leisure Centre and back, they eliminate what is available. Whose logic was that? Do you know how many programs get cancelled because there are not enough registered? Why do you think that is? Only people who have a vehicle are able to take advantage of the programs. The funny thing is that they sell the bus passes and have the Rider's Guide available at Brennan Park. What for or who for?

I have a four-year-old and enrolled him in a couple of programs. Now I have to catch the bus from Dentville, go all the way to the Highlands and back to be dropped off by

Centennial and the highway, then try to run across the highway because the overpass is not passable. I don't know how much money we are saving, but even one child's safety is more important than any amount of money.

All of this bus adventure would take at least three to four hours because we will get there early and have to wait a couple of hours to catch the bus back home. Do you think my son would want to go back after such a tiring day? Seniors go to Brennan Park for different activities as well and there are few of them who have to rely on the bus. What are we doing to make it more accessible for them?

I can go on and talk about the problems with the current bus schedule, but I decided to do something about it. I am starting a petition to ask council not only to put the Leisure Centre back on the bus route, but also to make the trip more frequently. After all, we have only one Leisure Centre in Squamish and it is the place that the election will take place. So it only makes sense to make it more accessible to the pubic, unless we prefer fewer voters.




Kyle Grandy: "Yes. I sometimes take the bus downtown and it would be great if it went to the pool."

Yes, we can create a healthy economy, lower taxes, and build our infrastructure and recreation facilities without going fur-



It seems to work for Alberta and Ontario, and there is no reason why it should not work for Squamish. If they can do it, so can we!


I see no conflict between having a healthy forestry and fully explore our recreation potentials, or welcoming new development and still keep the community identity.

Breaking into the big time

The sweet sounds of Squamish songstress Laura Dorosh will echo through the halls of the Stanley Theatre for the next month.

Dorosh is one of seven members of the chorus in the Stanley Theatre's production of Sweeney Todd, the Demon Barber of Fleet Street.

The production starts its run with previews on Sept. 30 and Oct. 1 with the production ending on Oct. 30.

"It's an amazing thing to be a part of," Dorosh said. "I'm really excited about the play and I'm getting the chance to work with one of the best directors in Canada in Morris Panych and musical director Bruce Kellett.

"It's been a lot of work, but It's going to be all worth it once the curtain rises on opening night."

Dorosh, who had her debut solo recital on a Squamish stage at the Eagle Eye Community Theatre in May, auditioned for the part in Sweeney Todd in the summer.

"I got the audition through Capilano College where I'm in an acting program," she said. "I had to sing 16 bars of music and I picked one of my best. A few days later they called me back and I had to sing one of the pieces from the musical and I got the part."

This is Dorosh's first major paid theatre production with the hopes of this just being the start of something big. "I hope that this is a stepping stone for me," she said. "I'm waiting for a callback on another audition and

I'm thinking about auditioning for Fiddler on the Roof later on in the year."

The storyline of the musical follows the return of a convict and former barber (Todd) to his home in Victorian London after being unjustly imprisoned in exile.

When he returns home and finds out that his wife is dead and his daughter is a virtual prisoner of the judge who passed sentence on him, he plots schemes against his collaborators with Mrs. Lovett, a baker and former friend.

"It's not for the faint of heart," Dorosh said. "It's a horror story and some of the schemes that are cooked up between the two are pretty wild."

Dorosh said her character in the play doesn't have a name, but she will be very recognizable on stage.

"It's all singing. I have no speaking parts in the production," she said. "The seven members of the chorus are city folk in London and we sort of help to tell the story through the music and when we're on stage through our actions and our expressions in the background of the scenes.

"The music is very opera-like singing, but trust me, no one will be bored. It's very entertaining." Dorosh said tickets for Sweeney

Todd are selling out fast. "We're setting record numbers as

far as ticket sales go so far," Dorosh said. "Opening night has been sold out for a long time."


The event to raise funds for future projects at the library starts at 7 p.m. and features samples of beverages from

It's all hosted by the charming, effervescent Black, who also plans a reading from his soon-to-be published eighth book Black Tie and Tales.

Like his previous books, Black Tie and Tales is a compilation of Black's musings from his radio show and his syndicated newspaper column, which runs in community newspapers across Canada.

"Every couple of years I look back at the stuff I've written and pick out the bits that are still funny and sling them together into a book," he said.

It must be working: one of his previous works, Black in The Saddle Again, was funny enough to win the 1997 Stephen Leacock Medal for humor.

While he's up here, Black will also be recording some segments highlighting Squamish for the nationally-

broadcast show, including a segment with local guide and rock-climber Kevin McLane — "I hope we're not actually climbing rocks, because I'm getting on a little for that," Black laughs — and another at the West Coast Railway Heritage Park.

Those and other snippets of life in Sea to Sky Country will be appearing on Black's show as segments during the coming radio season — and they're one of Black's favorite parts of the job, since they let him out of the studio.

"We do these whenever we get the chance," he said. "Having a weekly show ties you down, but when something like this comes along we jump at the chance."

Squamish has been a drivethrough for Black up until

now, but he's been looking forward to finding out more about Sea to Sky Country since moving to Salt Spring Island from Toronto five years ago.

"I've always been fascinated by that incredible piece of rock you've got up there. I've nearly driven off the road four times before just looking at it.

"I'm looking forward to finding out more about it."





Besides Tae Kwon Do, Julie is also very active in track and field, basketball and swimming.



Decentralization strategy positive, says school board superintendent's report

Twistees received their first report on decentralization at its meeting Sept. 15—and overall the report is positive.

All the schools ended the year with surpluses ranging from 0.5 per cent to 6.5 percent, a district total of about \$675,000. The report from Superintendent Mike Fitzpatrick and Secretary-

Treasurer Nancy Edwards stated principals indicated they were particularly frugal as they were unsure of their ongoing financial status.

A new accounting system was required to provide site specific reports, which impacted dramatically on central office staff, the report said. Staff time was also needed to meet the reporting requirements of the newly-introduced Provincial Agreement in Committee. This provided more targeted

funding, but reduced flexibility, which decentralization is attempting to increase.

Principals said, however, the flexibility in decision-making at the school level, the ability to address needs at their schools quickly, being able to introduce new, school-specific programs and involving staff and parents in actual spending for specific school needs were all positive developments.

Some are still concerned about equal allocation of

funds between the schools, and have suggested revising the distribution formula.

Recommendations for the coming year include identifying specific information required by the district in order to provide accurate cost reports to schools, ensuring authority is commensurate with responsibility and accountability, and deciding if Education Ministry budgetary targets and caps should be passed onto the schools.

DONT LET GETTING BACK TO SCHOOL BECOME "BACK BREAKING"

Backpacks are a much better way to carry life's necessities than a briefcase or shoulder bag, especially for long periods of time - but there are concerns too.

Backpacks that are too heavy or improperly worn can harm joints, muscles and nerves - especially in young people. What can you do...?? The American Chiropractic Association and its council on occupational health offers the following tips: 1. Make sure that the backpacks are NOT too heavy. Elementary students should not carry more than 10% of their body weight - older students should not carry more than 15%. 2. Backpacks with individual compartments help position its contents so that pointy or bulky objects don't rest on your child's back, which could create painful blisters. 3. Wear both straps. Slinging a backpack over one shoulder can cause

your child to lean to one side to compensate for the uneven weight. Over time, this can create muscle imbalances which may be associated with lower and upper back pain, sore shoulders or neck, aching knees and possibly headaches.

4. Backpacks with wide straps are better than ones with narrow straps. The narrow straps can dig painfully into shoulders as well as hinder circulation causing numbness in your arms, which over time may lead to weakness in your hands. The latest backpacks with one strap that runs across your body may be fashionable, but they are not really functional because one

shoulder still bears the weight of the bag.

5. Encourage young people to make stops at their lockers to avoid carrying all their books at once, and leave non-essentials at home.

6. Talk to your children about the proper use of backpacks and explain why ergonomic issues are important. A child who is educated early in life on these issues can apply this knowledge later in life...and as a result you have a child that is healthier and happier.


The Cliffside Pub in Valleycliffe keeps rolling on with daily specials
