Protesters Sue Interfor

International Forest Products (Interfor), two local logging companies and 11 Squamish residents named in a civil suit filed by protesters in B.C. Supreme Court Oct. 26.

The suit stems from an incident Sept. 15 when an anti-logging protest camp was destroyed in the Fraser Valley. Some 60 protesters were arrested after weeks of protests that disrupted work and forced Interfor to apply for a court injunction.

Following the incident, Interfor arranged for four workshops for its employees to avoid confrontations and defuse potentially explosive situations.

The plaintiffs in the suit are Joyce Gilroy-Scott and Maria Mustatia, who were part of the protest camp, and Les Jamieson, a trail rider with the conservative group Western Canada Wilderness Committee, who was storing his car at the camp because of Interfor's injunction.

The suit alleges Jamieson, Gilroy-Scott and Mustatia were punched, kicked and threatened with death by employees of Interfor, Elaho Logging and B. R. Adams.

Jamieson allegedly suffered torn cartilage and muscle tissue in his left hand. Mustatia was allegedly threatened with rape.

The suit also claims \$100,000 worth of communications, photographic and other equipment was destroyed along with evidence of the assaults.

Among the defendants are Interfor operations manager Les Miller, camp manager

Derek Sayle, area engineer Dave Haffey, Frank Roche and John Lonsdale. Bernie Adams and Donald Kulak of B. R. Adams Ltd. are also named, as are an unspecified number of John Does.

"I think it's a very strong case," plaintiff's lawyer Tannis Braithwaite said Friday. "They clearly were assaulted and they clearly were injured in the assault."

"The issue will be if the employees were acting within the course of their employment," she said. "If it's found they were acting in the course of their employment, the employer can be found liable. It's called vicarious liability."

The suit alleges the companies were negligent in not preventing the assaults and in allowing the use of company vehicles and equipment during the incident.

A call to Elaho Logging was met with a "No comment from this office."

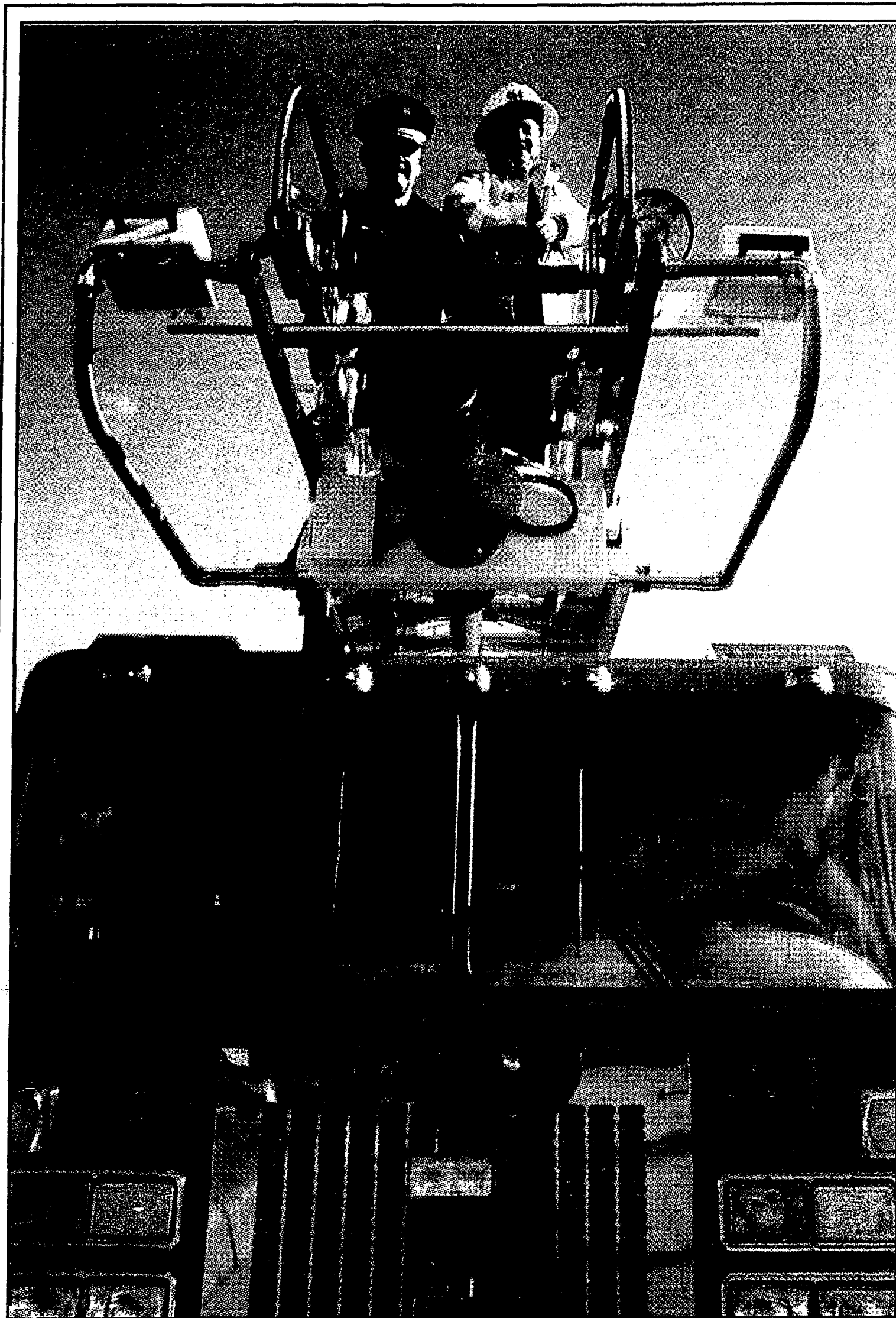
Neither Bill McNaughton, who represented Interfor when applying for the injunction, nor Interfor CEO and chairman Bill Sauder returned calls by press time. B. R. Adams could not be reached.

"It will probably be some time before a court date is even set," Braithwaite said. "Civil suits usually take a long time, two or three years."

On Oct. 25, Gord Prescott, Interfor project forester, and Dal Shemko appeared before the board of the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District.

"We know we've made some mistakes in the past," Prescott said. "We're making an effort to correct them."

On his application to appear, Prescott wrote: "The actions of Sept. 15 were regrettable and a mistake on the part of the individuals involved. We are very sorry it happened."

University agreement signed

The memorandum of understanding (MOU) for the private university, signed at an in-camera council meeting Oct. 26, will be revealed to the public at the beginning of today's council meeting.

"We believe it's extremely important that when the media and the public get it we go through it clause by clause so nobody will be unclear on any of it," Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said Wednesday. "If it was sent out and somebody

misinterprets a clause or takes one out of context, it would not be in our best interests."

She estimated it would take between 30 minutes and an hour to present. The MOU is scheduled for 3 p.m.

The MOU lays out the relationship between the Howe Sound Educational Foundation and the District of Squamish over the development of the non-profit university planned for the area west of the Garibaldi Highlands.

The agreement signed was drawn from the fifth draft of the MOU, said Lonsdale.

"I honestly believe the public will be comfortable with what we have agreed to," she said.

Development of the university, expected to serve around 1,100 students at capacity, will be funded through the donation of over 1,000 acres of land by the Tiampo family.

The signing of the MOU does not mean the land transfer is complete, cautioned Lonsdale.

"What the university is doing with the Tiampas has nothing to do with this MOU," Lonsdale said.

On council's agenda this week

Upcoming issues for the Nov. 2 meeting of council at 3 p.m. in council chambers at Municipal Hall:

Council will present the memorandum of understanding between the District of Squamish and Howe Sound Educational Foundation.

Candidate's signs vandalized

Election signs from Brackendale to Valleycliffe were ripped down, cut up and defaced sometime between 10 p.m. Friday and 7:30 a.m. Saturday — but only those belonging to Wendy Magee.

Other candidates' election signs were left undisturbed by the vandals, who apparently used a knife to slice up Magee's signs and left the pieces at the scene.

On five of her seven signs, her face was actually sliced out of the poster.

Those signs in well-lit or high-traffic areas were the least damaged. Others, like the one at the entrance to Valleycliffe, were destroyed.

"It's just my signs. Nobody else's were touched," Magee said Saturday.

Magee and her campaign manager Bill Manson dismissed the idea it was a Halloween prank, citing the time it had to occur, the heavy rain that night, the distances between the signs and the fact Halloween was two days away.

"I don't believe for a minute it was young people," said Magee. "If it had happened Halloween night, they would have been all tarred with the same brush."

"It doesn't have the marking of a Halloween prank by children," said Manson. "It would be interesting talking to the people [police] on duty last night."

Magee reported the vandalism to police, but at press time the matter was still under investigation.

Magee also said there were two calls to

her house that night, somebody spouting gibberish and then hanging up.

She and husband Keith are working on resurrecting some of the less damaged signs, mounting the pieces on plywood.

"They're expensive. It's a lot of money," she said.

"It kind of takes away from the real work," said Coun. Paul Lalli, whose cam-

paign signs for the 1996 byelection were vandalized and burned.

"You can't take it personally. You've got to concentrate on the election and the work at hand."

He said when his signs were vandalized it just made him determined to prove he was not going to be bothered by such childish acts.

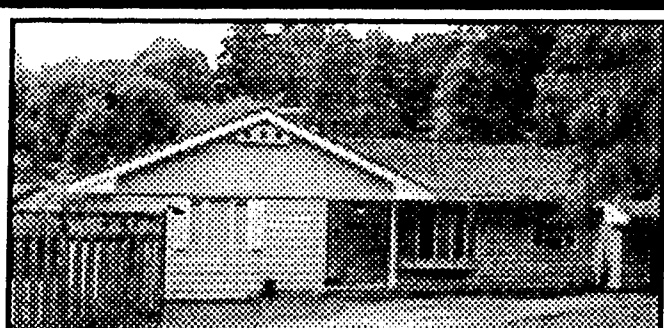

Furry Creek appeals Britannia plan

Tanac Land Development Corp. wants to keep the proposed Britannia Mine remediation plan away from Furry Creek, while Copper Beach Estates Ltd. (CBEL) wants to see Furry Creek added to the clean-up order.

CBEL's remediation plan involves a water treatment plant, to remove heavy metals from the water draining out of Britannia Mine and polluting Howe Sound, and an industrial landfill in the mine

to finance the plant.

The landfill would accept heavy-metal contaminated soil — similar to but less polluted than the mine's ore — not accepted at any other B.C. landfill. The tipping fees would pay to construct and operate the plant.

The environment ministry granted conditional permits Sept. 8 to CBEL for the treatment plant and landfill, but at the same time issued a clean-up order requiring the plant be in operation by Aug. 31, 2000.

Tanac registered an appeal

with the Environmental Appeals Board (EAB) Oct. 8. Its application says the permit fails to address adequately or at all the environmental impact and prevention of pollution from the works and structures related to the landfill.

Tanac is seeking a stay of the permit until a hearing of the appeal by the EAB.

CBEL, which filed its appeal Oct. 6, wants Furry Creek and the Makin property included in the clean-up order. This could have implications on who is identified

as a financially responsible party.

"The appeals have been filed but no hearing has been set," the EAB's Diane Collier said Thursday. The length of the hearing, expected to be about a week, makes finding a date difficult, she said.

"A hearing probably isn't going forward for a few months, I would guess," Collier said.

Established in 1981, the EAB is an independent, quasi-judicial agency for the public and industry to appeal environmental administrative

decision. The board's 20 members are appointed by cabinet for two-year terms.

The appeal will be heard by a three-member panel of the board, Collier said. The regional waste manager will appear to defend the order and permit. The panel will ask questions, and involved parties will have a chance to do cross-examinations.

"It's not a public hearing in that people can stand up and speak," said Collier, but it is open to the public to listen.

The EAB will issue a written decision on the appeals.

Council applies for funds to fix up airport

A refurbished runway could be in the municipal airport's future if a grant application to the B.C. Transportation Financing Authority (BCTFA) is approved.

Council voted at a special meeting Oct. 26 to apply for \$120,000 to repair 2,500 square metres of asphalt runway surface.

In a report to council, district

Director of Operations Jim Greenwood said: "The current condition of the runway surface requires that significant repair work be undertaken as soon as practical. The severe cracking that has occurred is allowing the growth of vegetation and permits moisture to penetrate the runway foundation, which will only hasten further deterioration."

"What we have to deal with now is a liability issue with dollars in front of us," said district administrator Grant

McRadu, who added the application had been brought forth because of time constraints on when it could be made.

"This is long overdue," said Coun. Paul Lalli. "A number of [airport] users have criticized the maintenance out there and I think this is just the first step in addressing their concerns."

Coun. Dave Young pointed out the applications only say "up to 100 per cent," and that Squamish could receive 20 per cent funding.

Greenwood also said there is a need

for fencing of the airport to deter vandalism and wildlife, as well as a centralized fuel storage and dispensing facility because of safety concerns.

These two projects would qualify for a maximum of 75 per cent funding. Combined, the two projects would cost \$141,000, of which the district would pay at least \$35,250.

Greenwood acknowledged the fuel facility is not part of the Official Community Plan and would require discussion between stakeholders.

No charges against school chaperone in alleged sexual assault

Crown Counsel has decided to not lay any charges against a male chaperone in connection with an alleged assault during a Brackendale Secondary School field trip in late May.

Squamish RCMP said after careful consideration, Crown Counsel felt that the charge approval standard had not been met, therefore a criminal charge could not be laid in these circumstances.

"This decision in no way reflected on the credibility of the complainants or witnesses," said Cpl.

Don Orthner. "But rather on the particular circumstances of this occurrence and the difficulties to prove the requisite elements of the offence."

Squamish RCMP started an investigation after a complaint by a female student that she was allegedly sexually touched during a BSS field trip at Keats Island.

Orthner said after extensive interviews of the complainants, witnesses and the alleged suspect, a report was submitted to Crown Counsel for their review and decision.

"Unless further pertinent information becomes available, the police investigation into this matter has been concluded," Orthner said.

Election '99

Council candidates go into the wood

This week's question: WHAT IS COUNCIL'S ROLE IN THE FUTURE OF THE FOREST INDUSTRY?

(Editor's note: due to space constraints, candidates have been asked to keep their submissions to 50 words per question. In some cases The Chief has edited for brevity.)

Cheryle Bass: Council should actively support the traditional forest industry and encourage and aid value-added industries.

Sandra Bauer: Respect the role forestry has played, economically and culturally. But can't ignore the changing economy. Over reliance means vulnerability to uncertain global commodity prices. Sawmill tax relief, an appropriate response to that set of circumstances. But provincial government should have invoked the appurtenance clause and explored tenure reform.

Lyle Fenton: Accommodate the operation and function of the existing industry, promote the develop of additional value-added industry to increase the number of jobs in relation to the amount of timber cut, and promote the fact that there are more values to a forest than fibre extraction.

Dale Harry: Council should take a proactive role. Need to include special interest groups and especially First Nations. Build bridges rather than set up barricades. Decisions on the forest industry should be made at a community level rather than in Ottawa or Victoria.

Chuck Harvey: Council should

fully support the forest industry as well as our loggers, truckers, pulp and woodworkers. We should never forget our heritage and the contribution logging, lumber and the railway has made to our community. Forestry is a renewable resource industry that can work hand and hand with tourism for a win/win.

Bill Howard: We have to do everything in our power to keep the forest industry a viable entity in Squamish as this is part of our heritage and helps keep Squamish's business community alive and I hope in the very near future booming. The sawmill must be kept open, as this is a must.

Raj Kahlon: As a councillor my role would be to facilitate the forest industry by lobbying the provincial government to get a value-added industry in our community. Log and sawmill products could be processed locally and the forest industry would not have to depend on the interna-

tional market all the time.

Rick King: Squamish council should continue to support the forest industry and multiple use in the entire Soo TSA. It continues to provide excellent employment opportunities even though the number of jobs has dramatically been reduced over the last 20 years. A demonstration forest could be set up to educate the public on a working-living forest.

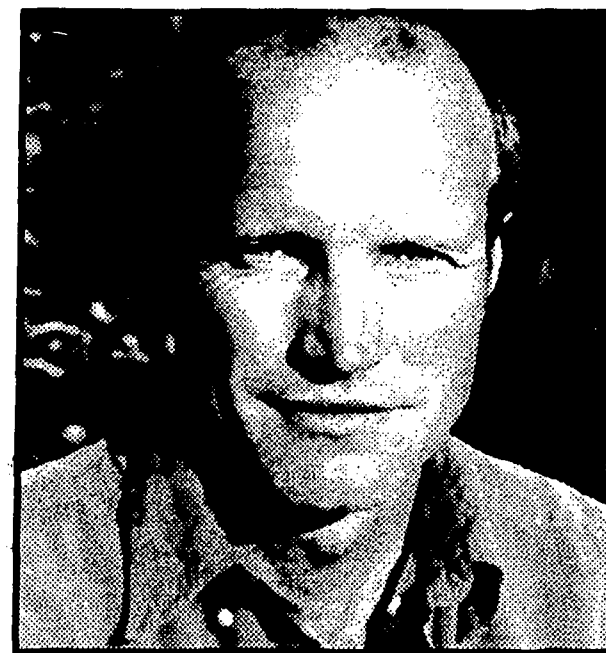
Paul Lalli: Council has to play a major role because 35 per cent of our tax base comes from major industry that depends on this sector. Without it we as residents can either pay more taxes or do without some of the services. Council should strike a resource board that advises council and educates the public on forestry issues.

David Lassmann: Council should seize any opportunity for a community forest project that might arise, and promote local industrial use of our forest harvest, especially in the creation of diverse small operations. Adjustments will have to be made as the downtown area evolves. Some sorting operations will have to be located.

Wendy Magee: Support it. I applaud Mayor Lonsdale and Bill Manson for their recent efforts that were instrumental in having the Squamish Mill reopen. Council must be vocal in Victoria to protect the forest workers right to work. The recent Job Commission Report is a blueprint that must be completed.

Terrill Patterson: None.

Bryan Hammock Raiser: Continue healthy growth, become fiscally responsible and utilize as

many cliché political catch phrases as possible.

Shelley Smith: Council's role should be: To be in regular dialogue (not currently occurring) with the major employers in Squamish, to lobby on behalf of the small forest industry businesses to ensure access to local timber, and to consider the possibility of a community forest to ensure timber supply to the value-added sector here and attract new enterprises.

Eivind Tornes: To accommodate and integrate the forest industry with other development in Squamish. Stand firmly up against illegal groups and have peace in the workplace. Encourage new wood based manufacturing businesses to set up shop in Squamish.

Dave Young: Council's role is to protect and sustain the forest jobs we have through good forest practices. We need to ensure the industry is allowed to take its place in the Squamish economy.

Meg Fellowes: Creating manufactured goods (e.g. furniture houses...) rather than simple commodities (e.g. 2x4s and pulp) strong commitment to planned, action-oriented development. While the forest industry transition, councils will deal with crisis situations, mill closures, as they arise.

Corinne Lonsdale: Council encourage and advocate for forestry, retention of jobs in woods and the mills, initiate value-added, enhanced relationship between the forest industry and tourism and continue to let more community input into local resources are managed.

Darren Moore: I don't think council has much control over international corporations. All that we can voice our community's opinion.

Downtown consultant chosen

The people's choice and politicality won the Aplin Martin team the \$65,000 downtown development strat-
contract.
Council approved staff's recommendation at a special council meeting Oct. 26. The choice was the same as majority of the people filled out a questionnaire on the three competing consultant teams presented preliminary designs to public Oct. 14.
According to that survey, 58 per cent of the 69 respondents preferred the Aplin and Martin team, 28 per cent The

and 10 per cent the AXESS Research team. Four per cent did not specify a preferred firm.

"We were fortunate the popular choice and the staff choice were easily aligned," economic development officer Brent Leigh said Friday. "One of our main objectives is to actually build it. This consultant focused on six precincts and said this is what you need to do."

The team consisting of Aplin and Martin Consultants Ltd., Hotson Bakker Urban Design, Coriolis Consulting Corp. and Creative Transportation Solutions Ltd. laid out distinct precincts in the downtown: the gateway, the core, the Channel, Loggers

Lane, a civic centre and an artisan village. Each included specific elements and actions necessary. The team was the only one not to include a bridge across the Mamquam Blind Channel.

"The consultants plan had the schedule, the budgets, the action plan all worked out," said Leigh.

"There were a number of things that you could do in each of the sections that could be implemented without too much budget impact," Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said Friday.

The final study and designs should be finished by the end of January. A 13-member steering committee will be oversee the study.

Victim Services seeks volunteers

Police Victim Services in Squamish is looking for a few new recruits.

Established some ten years ago, the program is made up of volunteers who work under the direction of a coordinator.

It is these volunteers who are responsible for the actual delivery of the services to the victims of crime.

Victim Services' mandate is to provide a much needed person for victims to talk to, assist with a victim's application for criminal injury compensation, legal aid referrals, restraining orders/peace bond application and restitution for

lost/damages property. Assistant program coordinator Glen Watson said the program currently has nine volunteers, but ideally he would like to see that number double.

"We have some fabulous people working in the program, but the needs of the community are increasing," Watson said.

He said due to the nature of the work, volunteers must be of a high calibre and as a result all potential volunteers are required to complete a detailed application.

"If the applicant is successful we conduct an interview as well as a criminal background check," Watson said. "We have people in our program

that are from all walks of life. These people have to be effective listeners, be good with people and want to make a difference in someone's life."

He said all successful applicants will receive training and will be required to attend monthly staff meetings.

Police Victim Services was created by the Squamish RCMP in cooperation with the District of Squamish and the Provincial Ministry of the Solicitor General in order to meet the needs of crime victims and witnesses in the community.

Getting educated on trustee candidates

Three women are vying for the mandate to shape our children's education for the next three years.

Michele Mulholland, Constance Rulka and Amy Shoup are trying to win one of the two Squamish seats on the Howe Sound School District's board of trustees.

Mulholland, a first-time candidate, has recently been working on behalf of the Learning Disabilities Association of B.C. in regards to Howe Sound's special education policies.

Rulka is seeking her fourth term. In the 1996 general election, she garnered more votes than any other Squamish candidate for school board or council. Shoup, currently vice-chair of the school board, is going for her second term.

"I have a vested interest to see schools work for everyone," said Shoup. "I have two children myself and I want to see every child in the district get a quality education."

"The school district is a very different place than it was three years ago," she added. "I think in the next three years we have the opportunity to really enhance what we've done and move forward."

"I started school on my fifth birthday," said Rulka. "I took six months away from school to have a son a good while later and I've been involved in school all my life and I feel I want to give something back."

"Most people say it's just to keep me off the streets and out of mischief," she added.

"People wanted me to run," said Mulholland. "And I can remember being bored out of my skull, staring out the window, trying to assimilate information that meant nothing to me. It

makes more of a difference in the community if the kids get a quality education than if there's a movie theatre."

Mulholland wants to get graduation rates, dropout rates and similar statistics to be better than Surrey's, involve trustees in making accreditation a chance to improve, address inequities in schools and get parents and teachers working together instead of pointing fingers. "I'd like to see education get back to being about kids instead of adults," she said.

Rulka said she wants children to be free in four ways: from hunger, fear, addiction and exploitation. She said she won't be part of a rubber-stamp board, will not pass anything without careful consideration, and said her age makes her useful as a safety brake on reckless change. "I'm often accused of being anti-computers and anti-technology," Rulka said, but pointed out she was using computers in 1956. "I want children to grow up with a balance between the human and machine elements."

Shoup wants to see capital project like the expansion of Brackendale Secondary School, the new Whistler elementary school and the replacement of Signal Hill Community School come to fruition. She also wants to work on ensuring equity for all students within the system, and on utilizing the board's entrepreneurial opportunities like international students.

"We can't rely just on the government to fund education to the level it should be," she said.

New youth centre opens

Five days prior to its grand opening today, council was invited to tour the new youth resource centre behind Howe Sound Secondary School.

On Thursday morning, Mayor Corinne Lonsdale, project co-ordinator Bill McNeney, RCMP Const. Wael Audi, manager of recreation services Bruce Goldsworthy and Lois Wynne of Sea to Sky Community Services were given a tour of the refurbished RCMP headquarters.

The building is being renovated in three phases. Today's ceremony will mark completion of Phase 1, the offices, games room, and planned concession.

At the time the tour was conducted, the floors were yet

untiled, interior windows were glassless, and doors unhung.

All of which will be completed by today, Al Brown said. Brown, the owner of On Side Restorations, is the single biggest donor to the youth centre via the renovation work his company has done on the formerly decrepit building.

"When we started, we were just going to do something to make it livable," said McNeney.

Instead, through community effort and donations, the new resource centre will be more than livable — it will be attractive to youth.

Erected in 1969, the building has been nicknamed the Bunker by youth, a reference to its very visible history of housing prisoners.

The grand opening will last from 3 to 5 p.m., but the cere-

monies will start at 3:30 p.m., said youth worker Tamara Finkleman, who will work out of the centre.

The ceremonies will involve a cake, two youth emcees and a pad of wet cement for hand prints.

Instead of the usual ribbon-cutting, a "Phase 1 Finish Line" ribbon will be strung, to be broken by a group rush, symbolizing the community effort behind the resource centre.

The opening will also include a plaque recognizing those who helped bring the project to fruition and speeches from the mayor, Brown, and two youth.

"It's about youth leading youth," said Finkleman. "I don't have anything really to say — when I asked 'Who wants to speak?' 10 people put their hands up."

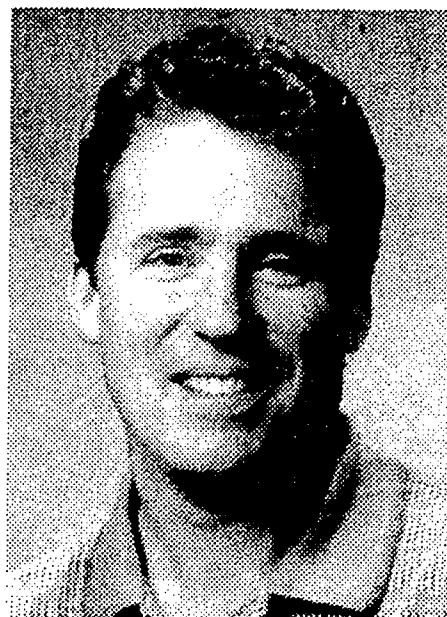

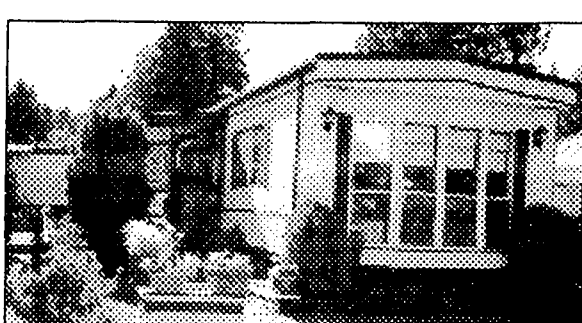

EDITORIAL

Put them on the spot

Three weeks ago, we asked Squamish residents to tell us what they think are the top three issues facing our community as we prepare to elect a new mayor and council.

You've responded — not in huge numbers, but the response is there — and as promised, we'll share the answers with you.

The economy, in a variety of forms, is at the top of the list. From economic diversity to eco-tourism development to the delays in approving the Garibaldi Village development to one respondent who simply wrote "Jobs, jobs, jobs" in each of the three spaces on the questionnaire, it's clear that Squamish residents want to talk about the economy.

That won't be a great surprise to readers or, hopefully, to the 19 people running for mayor and council positions. Last week we asked them their thoughts on economic development and had no problem filling half a page — indeed, we were forced to cut back several responses just to make sure we got everybody in.

Also strongly represented in our survey are those who want a functional local government — one that enforces its bylaws consistently and solicits and heeds public opinion on planning issues.

But by and large, it seems the economy is, as ever, on the lips and minds of those voting — and consequently, of those seeking votes.

As a result, it seems economic development is the new "motherhood" issue — one that everybody supports in vague, general terms without really going into depth.

Even among the candidates, the same phrases keep coming up: "diversify," "assist," "create opportunity," "positive environment." While in some sense it's comforting to know that everybody agrees economic development is good and desirable, it doesn't help people to pick six people out of 16 on election day.

Economic development may be too general a term for the choice that has to be made Nov. 20. For people to truly make up their minds, perhaps we need to ask tougher questions of our would-be councillors and mayors, such as exactly how far are you prepared to go for economic development? There are limits, obviously — impact on neighborhoods, downtown development versus highway — but to what degree are councillors willing to go for development? What about specific examples, like the Garibaldi Village project at Mamquam Road and Hwy. 99 or expansion of Highlands Mall? Where will the seven men and women we elect come down on these concrete questions?

The place to ask these questions is, of course, this Thursday at Brennan Park Leisure Centre at the all-candidates' forum. We hope it's a well-attended meeting full of tough questions — not to put the candidates down, but certainly to put them on the spot. In their responses — and the manner in which they respond — will be the information you need to make the right choices.

You've spoken. Now make sure they've listened. Be at the Leisure Centre this Thursday.

School race just as important

While we're on the subject, thanks and praise go to the Chamber of Commerce for adding school trustee candidates to its all-candidates' forum this Thursday at Brennan Park Leisure Centre.

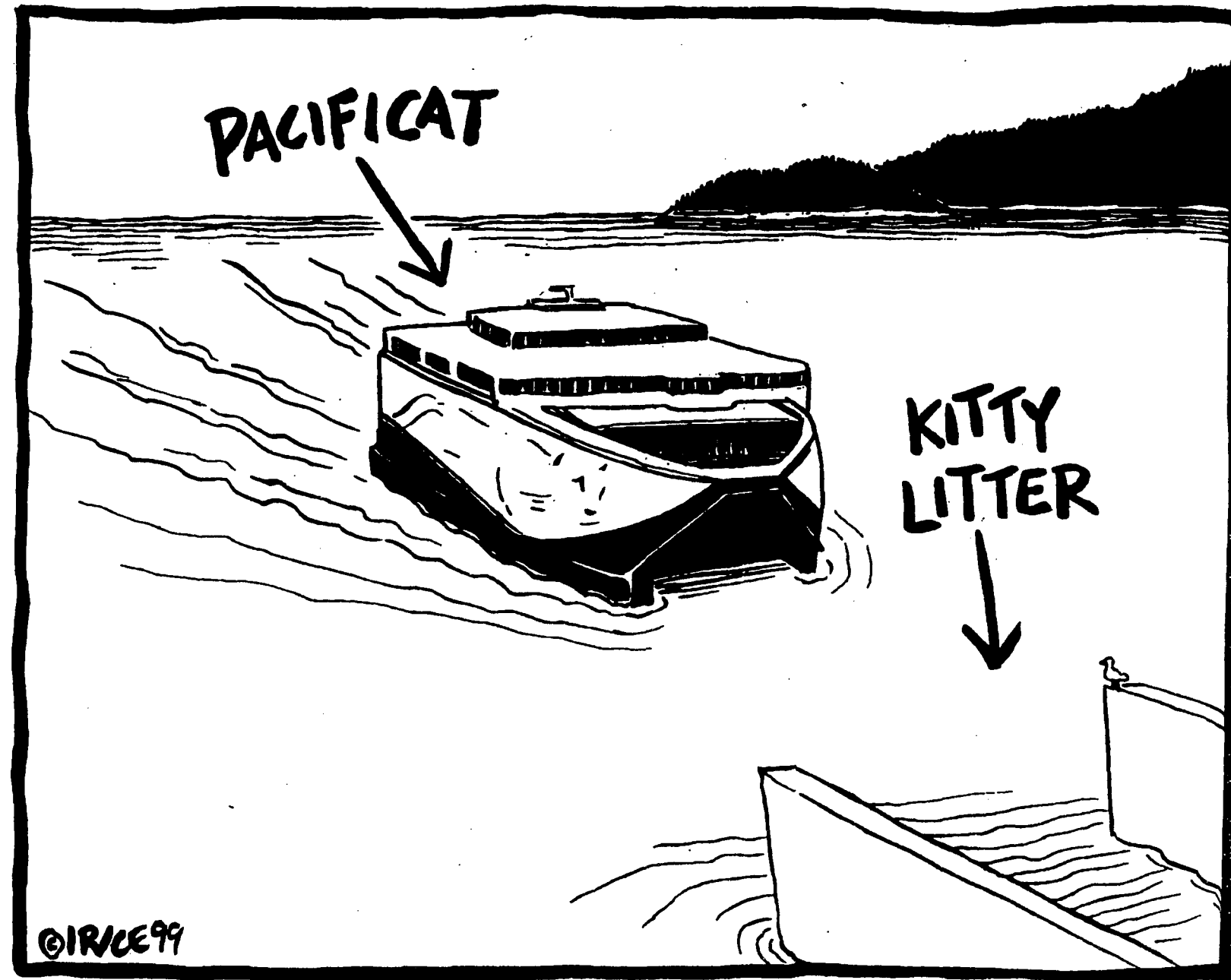
The initial lack of a school trustee forum was very disturbing to us, to the point where we at The Chief were looking at setting one up on very short notice.

While trustees may not enjoy the media spotlight to the same degree as their colleagues on municipal councils — perhaps because of the relative lack of controversy at school board level — they are elected officials and just as important, if not more so, than those chosen to be on council.

It's equally important that the public get an opportunity to find out who these people are, why they want to look after your children's education — and why you should let them.

So if you do make the all-candidates' forum — and you should — try to come early for the school trustees meeting at 6:30 p.m.

It's your children's future.

Age and car lead to police harassment?

The other day I stopped by the bank on my way home from school in my ugly but well-tuned 1977 automobile. I did my banking and returned to my car. Being a good driver I put on my seat belt, and started my car. I put it in reverse, checked my blind spots and as I checked my passenger side rear view mirror, I saw an officer walking towards me.

He said to me that my exhaust tips protrude just outside of my rear bumper and that is illegal as written in the Motor Vehicle Act regulations. Being polite and having respect, I apologized and said I was unaware of this regulation. He told me that next time I will be given an inspection notice. Fair enough.

Having great faith in our police force, I set out to the mechanics to get this fixed (a costly repair at that) and was informed that I should look up this law before I did anything. I did. Merve Wilkinson, a forester
has for 50 years pulled off
what most corporate B.C.
foresters claim is impossible:
making a profit by selective
logging the same 56 hectares
of forest decade after decade.
His park-like forest with its
ancient trees contained 1.5
million board feet of lumber at
the time, he still has an inven-
tory of 1.5 million board feet
and he has never planted a
tree.

A tree that is cut on the
woodlot, milled locally, sold
to a local furniture maker or a
manufacturer of unique world
class products, whose prod-
ucts are purchased locally,
nationally and internationally
makes more economic sense
than a tree that is cut or pulped
and shipped out of the coun-
try, our home is mainly built
with wood, the wood floor,

windows and doors came
from outside of B.C.

These industries produce
over four times the employ-
ment than a sawmill. Log
home construction, for exam-
ple, extracts maximum dollar
and employment value from
our forests. Selective logging
apparently requires less
machinery and more workers
and has been embraced in
some B.C. community-con-
trolled forests and private
woodlot owners. Revelstoke
has gained its tree farm
license, Sweden and Finland
have over 1/2 million woodlot
owners.

In short, less volume, less
impact to the ecosystem and
animal habitat, more forestry
related jobs in a community
controlled forest and local
based wood manufactures. It
embraces more of a balance to
the local logging companies,
concerned environmentalists,
tourism opportunities and
offers to secure a more stable

future. The Squamish Forest
Service web site estimates
TFL 38 has a total area of
218,616 hectares, inventory
data shows the ancient forest
is estimated at 24,818 hectares
(almost 12 per cent) and that
is subject to a number of
uncertainties not including
fire or disease. This unprotect-
ed ancient forest is being
logged daily.

We humans impact the
Earth's eco-system more than
any other creature and through
greed, we have pushed nature
too hard, the signs are every-
where, the East and West

Coast fish stocks are severely
depleted, the whales in Howe
Sound are long gone, grizzly
bear habitat which once
ranged as far south as Mexico
is now mainly concentrated in
B.C., black bears whose habi-
tat continually shrinks are
roaming into towns in increas-
ing numbers in search of food
are being killed.

Also consider that over 40
per cent of prescription drugs
come from nature, many cures
are yet to be discovered in our
forests. The Pacific yew tree is
used to produce Taxol, a drug
used in the treatment of breast

cancer and also other diseases.

All the unique living com-
munity that depends on the
characteristics of these ancient
forests have a purpose and we
are learning more through
study, mistakes have been
made and sadly, many plant
and wildlife species are gone
forever and we will never
know their purpose or what
possible cures they may have
given us. It is the responsibil-
ity of each generation to pro-
tect nature, where through its
bio-diversity creation unfolds.



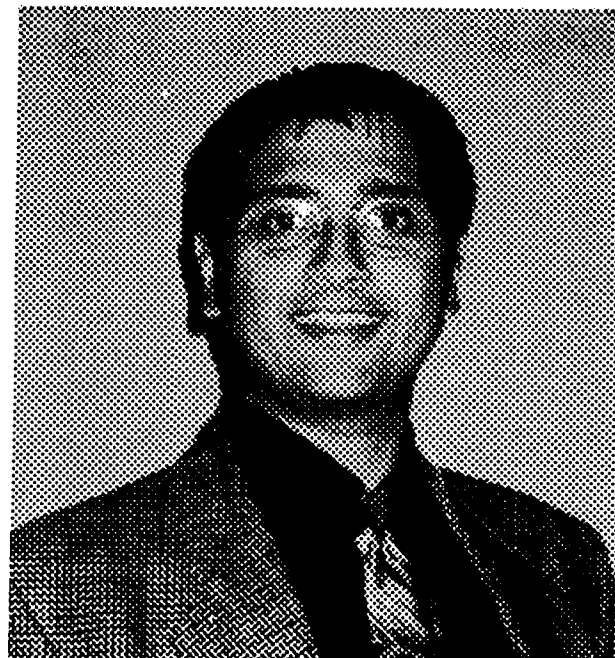

Buses are easier to get into

Easier to get into, easier to maneuver, and easier on the environment, two new low-floor Dennis Dart buses arrived in Squamish yesterday.

"We've been eagerly anticipating the arrival of the Darts," Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said Friday. "With no steps, low-floor buses make boarding easier for all passengers, especially children and seniors and anyone with mobility difficulties."

The U.K.-built buses will replace Squamish's current 10.7-metre long Orion buses, which are within a year of their retirement age. The Darts are heavy-duty, mid-size buses that seat 28 and carry a maximum of 49.

Each bus costs \$380,000. First announced in May along with the new route schedules implemented in August, the Darts are nine metres long and at 2.4 metres are slightly narrower than the Orions. They are built without steps, their floor within a foot of the ground, and have a kneeling feature that lowers the bus floor to sidewalk level.

The accessibility of the Darts should help take some of the load off the handyDART system, which is nearing capacity at peak hours.

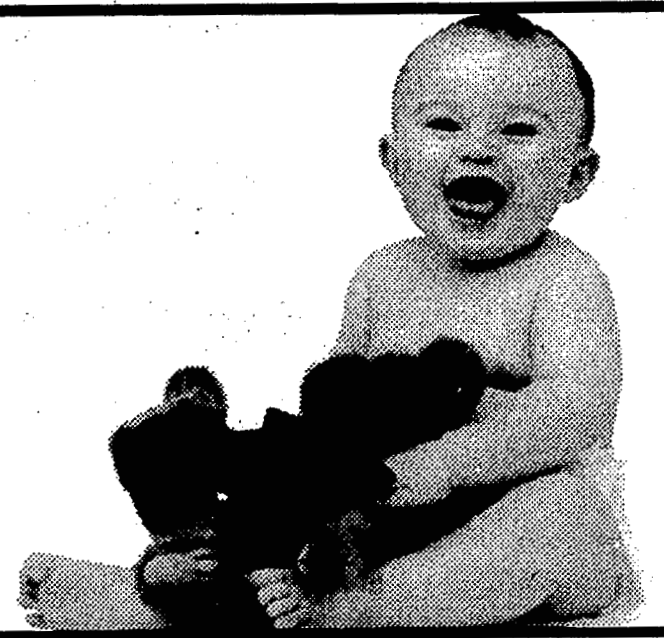
Council tightens grant rules

Council has laid out criteria for grants-in-aid and will be enforcing tighter guidelines on applications coming outside of budget time. The issue was discussed at the Oct. 26 committee of the whole meeting. The guidelines, which district staff will use to draw up a new policy, were based upon a list of suggested criteria from Coun. Sandra Bauer.

Criteria include:

- grants-in-aid should not be given to groups or individuals outside the community;
- for-profit groups should be excluded;
- both a budget and a financial statement should accompany all applications;
- a budget deadline should be set, and applications outside the deadline must be of an emergent, urgent or unforeseeable nature;
- extra consideration will be given to applications benefiting youth, seniors and the disadvantaged;
- it should not be assumed grants will be given in successive years;
- grants may not be considered if for third-party fundraising.

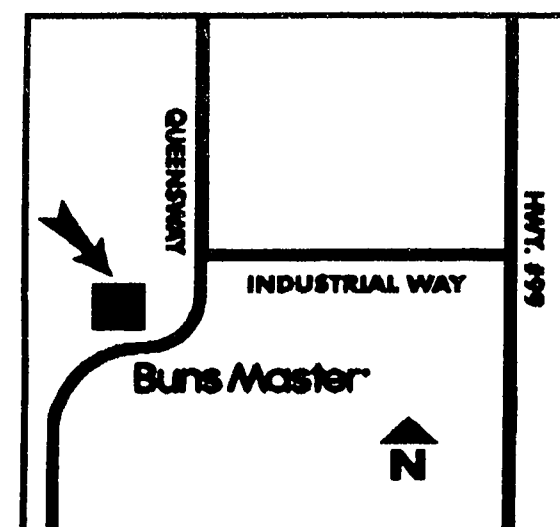

Organizers say no booze or drugs are allowed at the event and once you're in the doors, no ins and outs will be allowed.

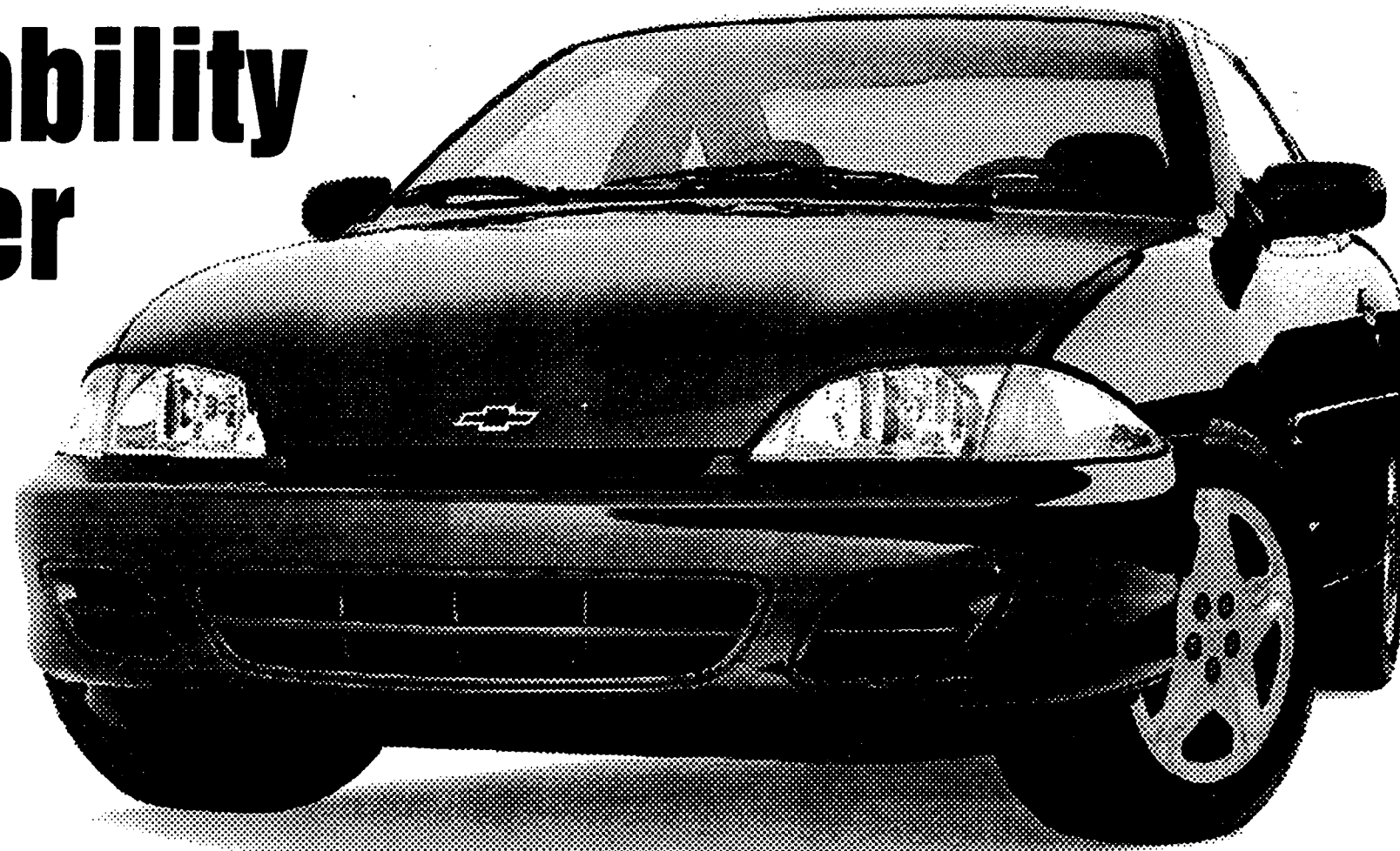

Kindree name set in stone

An unofficial name was set in stone Thursday as the Squamish Medical Clinic was renamed in honor of Dr. Laverne Kindree, its first resident doctor.

"It's only appropriate," said Dr. Ken Schellenberg just before the new sign was revealed. "Everybody's always called this the Kindree clinic and everybody always will."

The new sign is made of orange granite and reads "Kindree Professional Bldg."

Around 30 people attended the unveiling, mainly friends and family of the Kindrees.

Kindree and his wife Norma, thinking they were going to the post office and dinner, were delivered to the ceremony by relatives.

Schellenberg teased Kindree he'd hoped by surprising Kindree, he'd catch him not wearing a tie. Kindree, typically, was wearing a full suit and tie. "I'm speechless," said Kindree.

"I wasn't expecting this to happen until I was in a pine box in the ground."

"My heart's still with the clinic and with you people

and you can bury me under it [the sign]," he said.

"Me too," said a smiling Norma.

Kindree, 78, is not only the first resident doctor of the clinic, but is also the first doctor in Sea to Sky Country — and for many years after his arrival in 1939, he was the only doctor between Britannia Beach

and Mount Currie, with regular visits to Pemberton and Mount Currie for the first 25 years of his practice, as well as trips to the clinic at Britannia mine.

In an interview with The Chief for his 75th birthday celebration in 1996, Kindree estimated that he has delivered somewhere between 2,500 and 3,000 babies in

the corridor in his career.

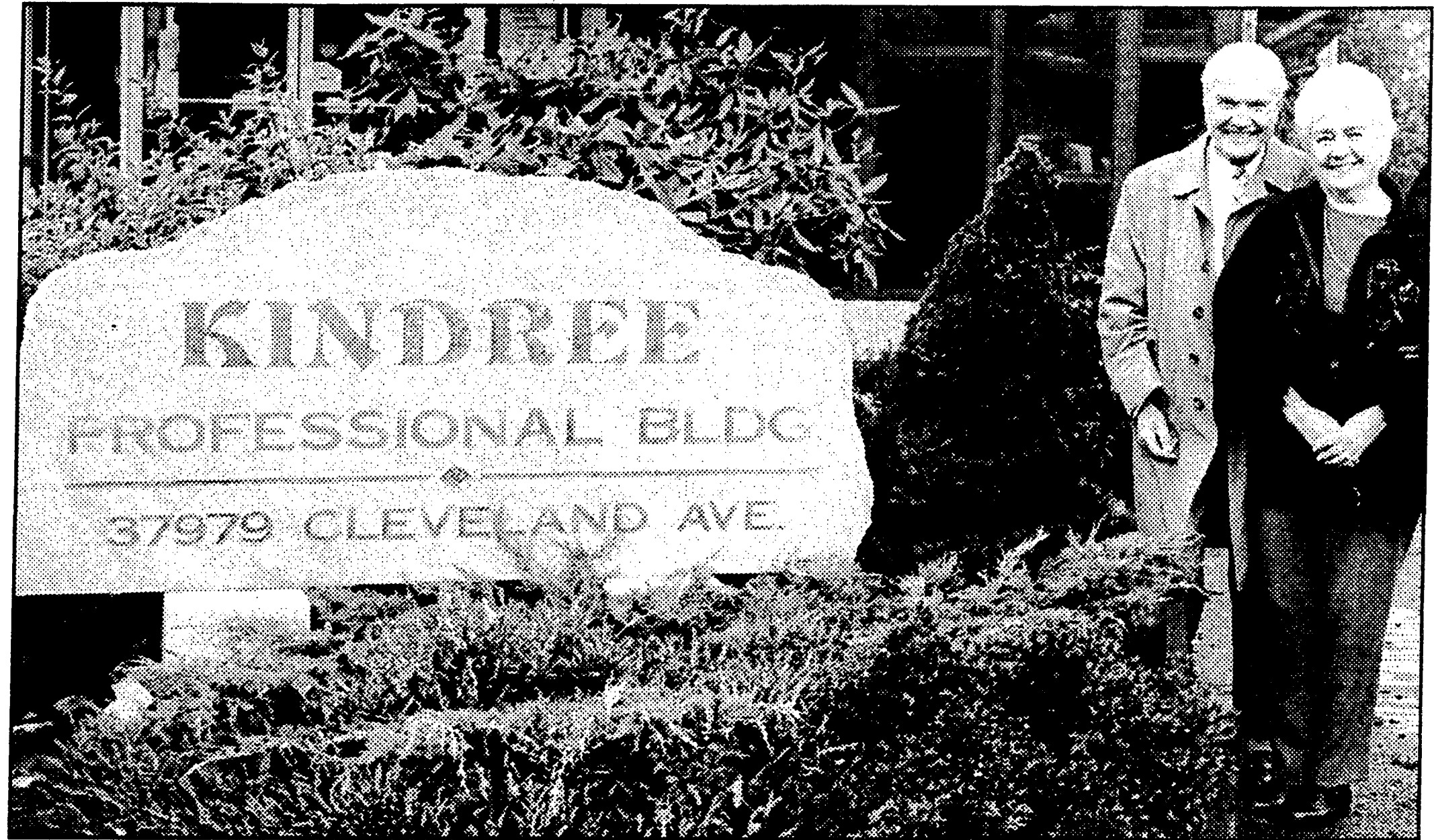
Kindree was also instrumental in having the first hospital built in Squamish in 1952 — just in time for the polio epidemic of the 1950s.

He also was the driving force behind the construction of Hilltop House, an intermediate care facility for seniors, as well as

Squamish's new acute-care hospital.

Besides maintaining an active medical practice, Kindree is also serving on the Sea to Sky Community Health Council, the governing body for health care facilities for Squamish, Whistler and Pemberton.

Look back in time

News from years gone by in Squamish, compiled by Darren Gallagher from the archives of the Squamish Times at the Squamish Public Library and The Chief

Five years ago this week

Three Squamish youth died when their sport-utility vehicle went over a 90-metre bank between Shannon Falls and the Stawamus Chief.

Sean Watson, Greg Fedorak and Oliver Shulte, all 21, died when they were thrown from the truck. Samantha Houle and David Biggin-Pound survived the fall, but Biggin-Pound was left immobile.

Houle walked about six kilometres to find help for the injured Biggin-Pound.

Ten years ago this week

Organizer Charles Groom and his father were the only protesters to show up at the Squamish Forest District office, despite advertising using posters and community television in Whistler.

"[This] is to pressure the government to have more community involvement in cuts, pesticides and herbicides," said Groom.

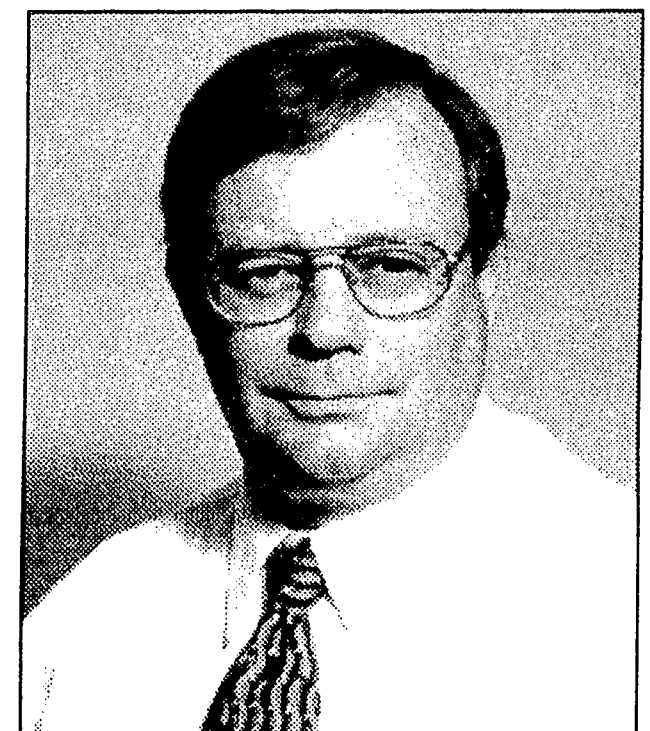

...acts, figures and some bad taste

Our major partner in securing funding is Western Economic Diversification (WED); a federal government ministry whose mandate is to help communities diversify their economic local and regional economies. WED recently finished a document entitled Small Business Profile 99: a file of Small Business Growth and Employment in 1998.

Fact the B.C. Ministry of Small Business, Tourism and Culture, B.C. Stats and the Ministry of Finance and Corporate Relations were involved in the collection and analysis of the data. The office spends a considerable amount of time talking to small business individuals and numerous statistics that encompass the incredible growth that has accompanied small business in the past few years.

I'd like to utilize this WED-sponsored docu-

ment to share some of the more intriguing findings with you.

For openers, it's important to understand that by "small business" we are referring to businesses with less than 50 employees and businesses operated by a person who is self-employed but has no paid employees.

From 1990 to 1998 the number of small businesses in B.C. has grown by 65 per cent with over 50 per cent of this growth occurring since 1995. Over the past decade unincorporated businesses with no paid workers are responsible for almost three-quarters of the growth in small business.

From 1990 to 1998 across Canada small businesses grew at an average of 4.1 per cent annually. BC led all provinces with a rate of 6.5 per cent.

It is important to note that the overwhelming majority of small businesses in B.C. are micro-businesses, i.e. businesses with less than five

employees. These also happen to be the majority of the types of businesses Community Futures assists through our community lending initiatives.

Seventy-two per cent of B.C.'s small businesses operate in the "service sector" while the other 28 per cent operate in the "goods sector."

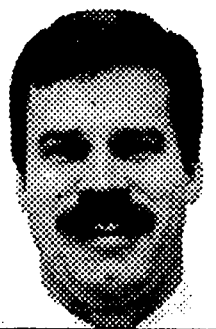
Half of the jobs created in B.C. in 1998 were in small business.

Today 21 per cent of us work for ourselves, four years ago that number was 16 per cent. On average, people who work for themselves make 28 per cent less than those who work for others do.

Growth in the high technology sector has exceeded the overall economy every year in the 1990s.

In a nutshell, those are some of the key figures contained in this fascinating report. I've excluded any commentary from the figures because of the fact that most figures can be "spun" any

way a writer wishes to do so. Instead, I've presented them as they appeared in this report, hoping that each of you can draw your own conclusions.

That being said, it is virtually impossible to ignore the growth in entrepreneurship that is taking place both globally and in our backyard.

District looks at starting 'buy local' purchasing policy

More than a year after it was raised, council is taking steps to introduce a buy-local preference into its purchasing policy.

On Oct. 6, 1998, council elected staff to bring forward a amendment to the policy to include a preference for local suppliers. Last week, staff

presented council with the results of a survey of the purchasing policies of 19 municipalities and Howe Sound School District.

Twelve respondents had a buy/shop local policy in place, six, including the school district, indicated they did not, and two did not reply.

"I can't understand for the life of me understand any council not wanting a local

purchasing policy," said Coun. Dave Young. "It's good for the community."

The municipalities differed widely over their definitions of "local area," how much preference is given to a local supplier, and limitations on how big the purchase can be.

"The devil's in the details," replied district administrator Grant McRadu. "We could do the Canadian compromise and

find the average [of the other municipalities]."

Staff were subsequently directed to bring forward recommendations on a local purchasing policy for the Nov. 9 committee of the whole.

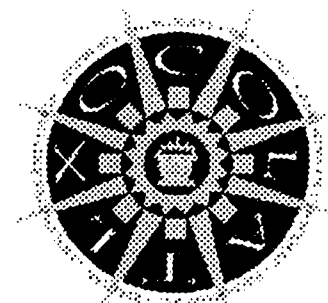

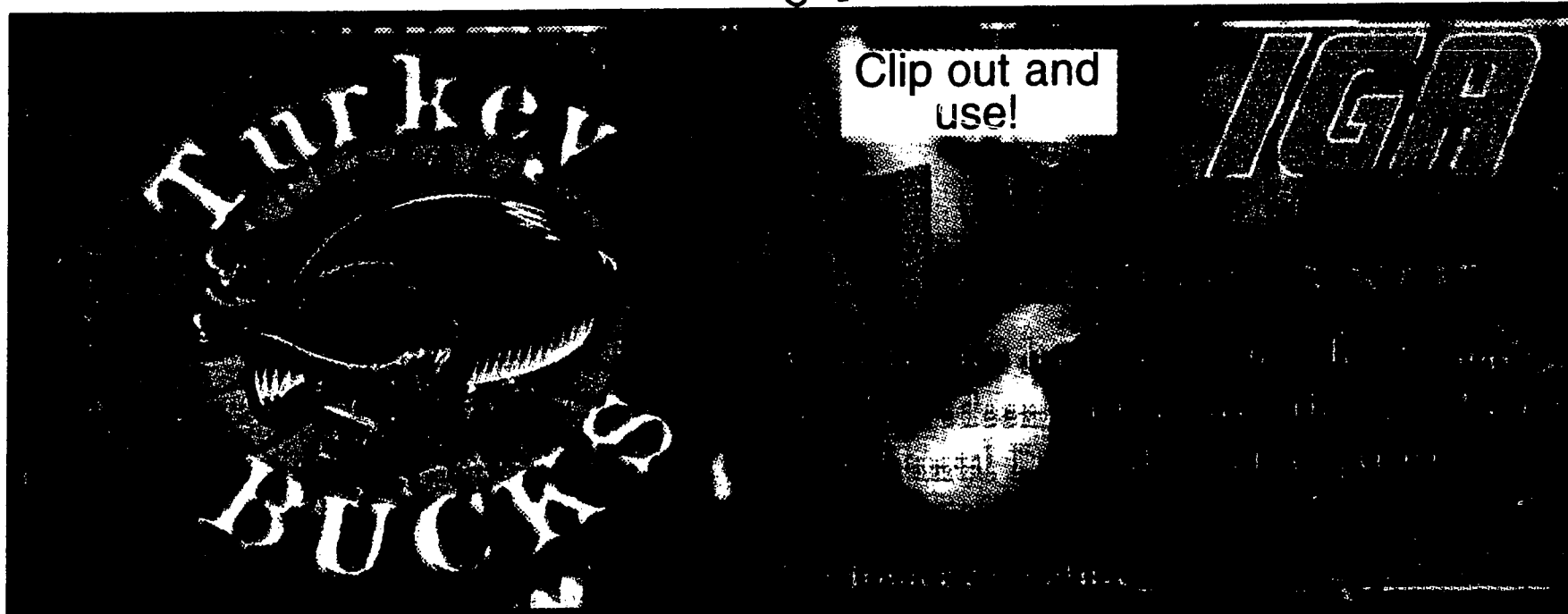

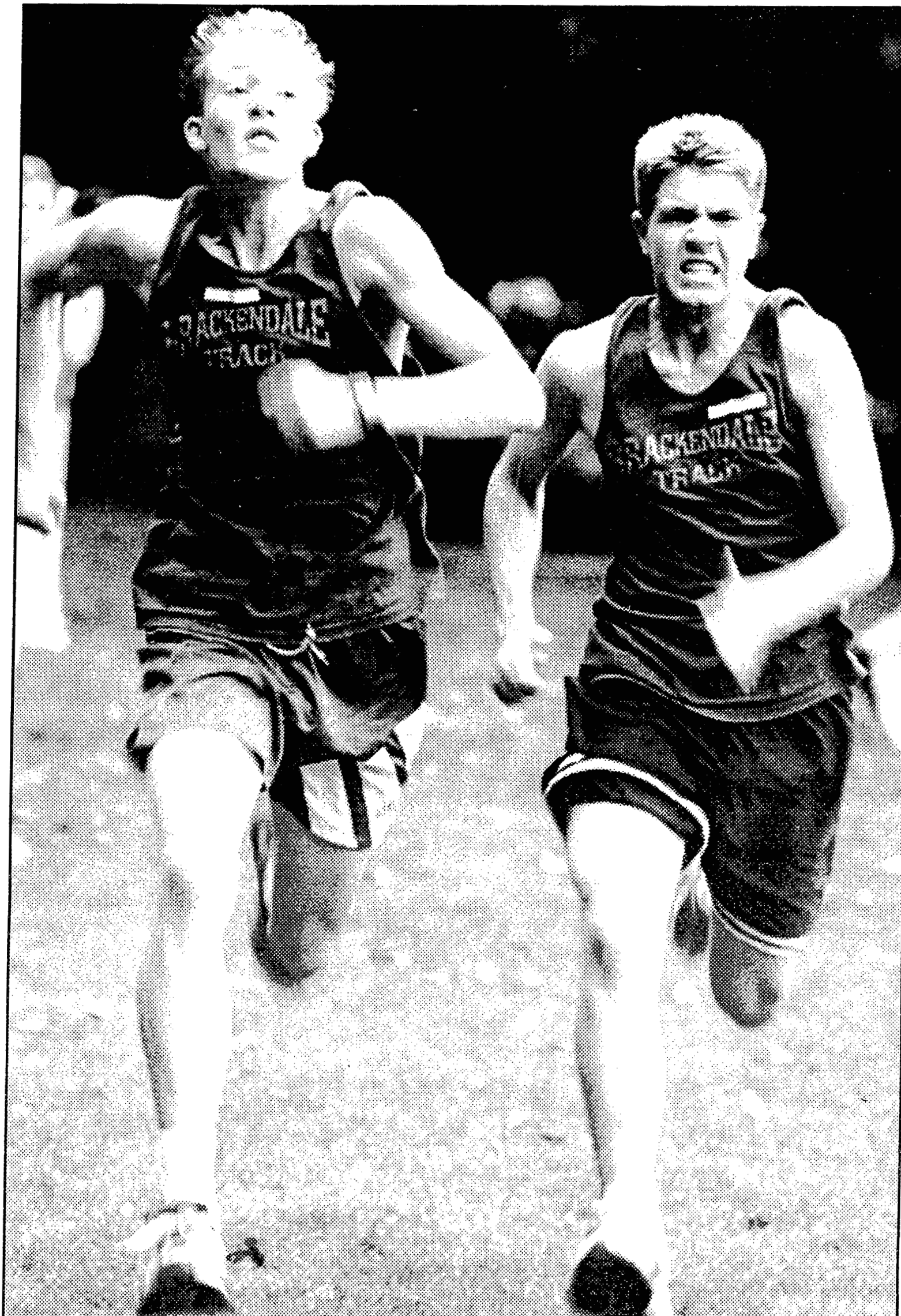

A Flood Communication Plan is in place for the Cheakamus River. It is updated regularly by members of the community in conjunction with BC Hydro.



Great day for 10 k

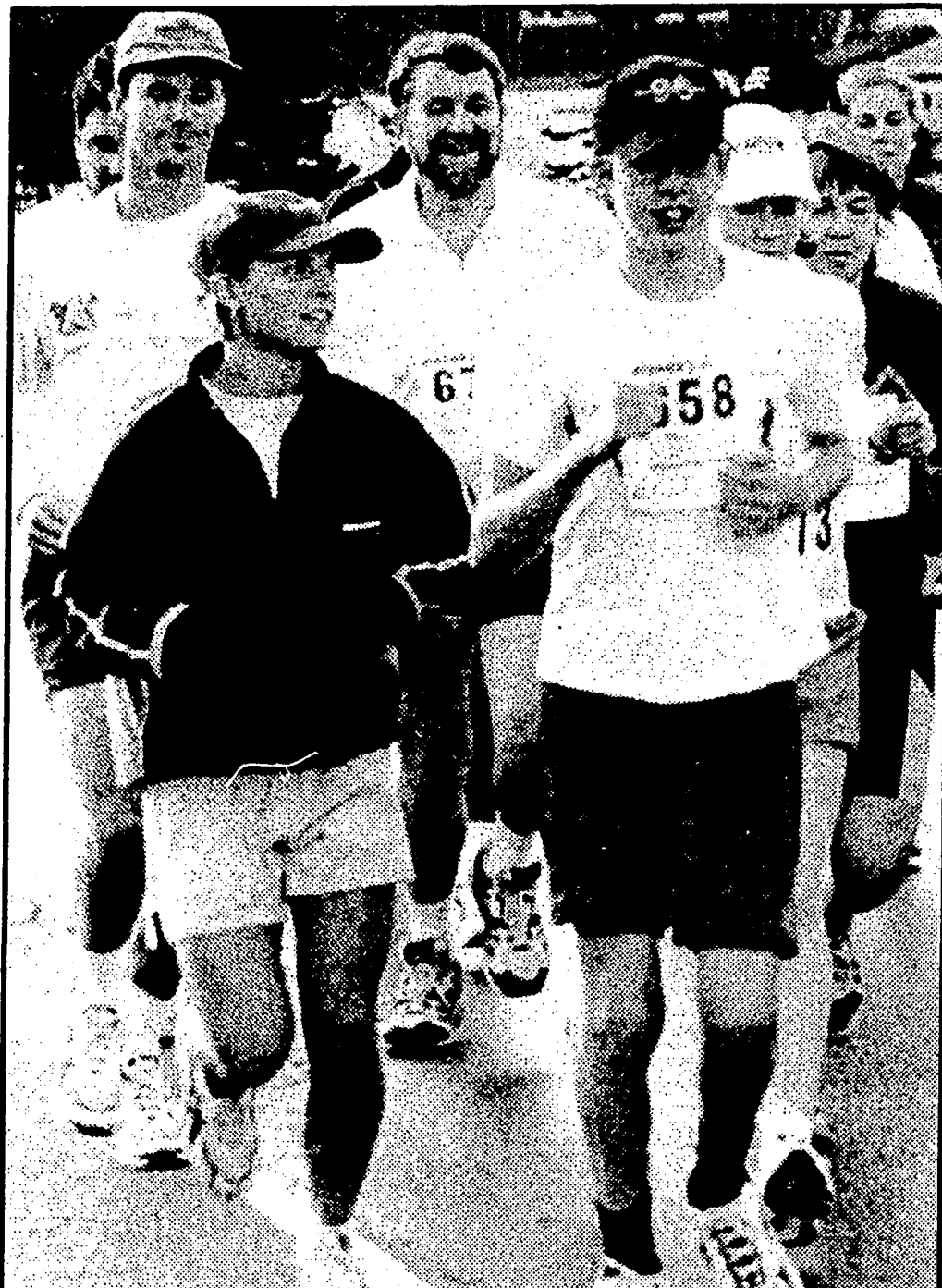

SQUAMISH - LILLOOET REGIONAL DISTRICT

Information for Electors

Persons entitled to vote in the forthcoming election within the electoral areas of the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District will be required to register as electors at the time of voting. Elector qualifications and registration requirements are as follows:

RESIDENT ELECTOR

Qualifications:

- age 18 or older on November 20, 1999;
- a Canadian citizen;
- a resident of British Columbia for at least 6 months before the day of registration;
- a resident of the electoral area in which registration is sought for at least 30 days;
- not disqualified by any enactment from voting in an election or otherwise disqualified by law.

Registration Requirements:

- full name of the applicant;
- residential address, and mailing address if this is different from residence;
- either the applicant's birth date or the last 6 digits of the social insurance number.

NON-RESIDENT PROPERTY ELECTOR

In order to vote a non-resident property elector must obtain a certificate either at the Regional District offices or at the place of voting.

Qualifications:

- must not be entitled to register as a resident elector of the electoral area in which the property is situated;
- age 18 or older on November 20, 1999;
- a Canadian citizen;
- a resident of British Columbia for at least 6 months before the day of registration;
- a registered owner of real property in the electoral area in which registration is sought for at least 30 days;
- not disqualified by any enactment from voting in an election or otherwise disqualified by law;
- may register for only one property within the electoral area;
- If there is more than one registered owner of the property, only one of the owners may register;
- the person registering must have the written consent of a majority of the owners

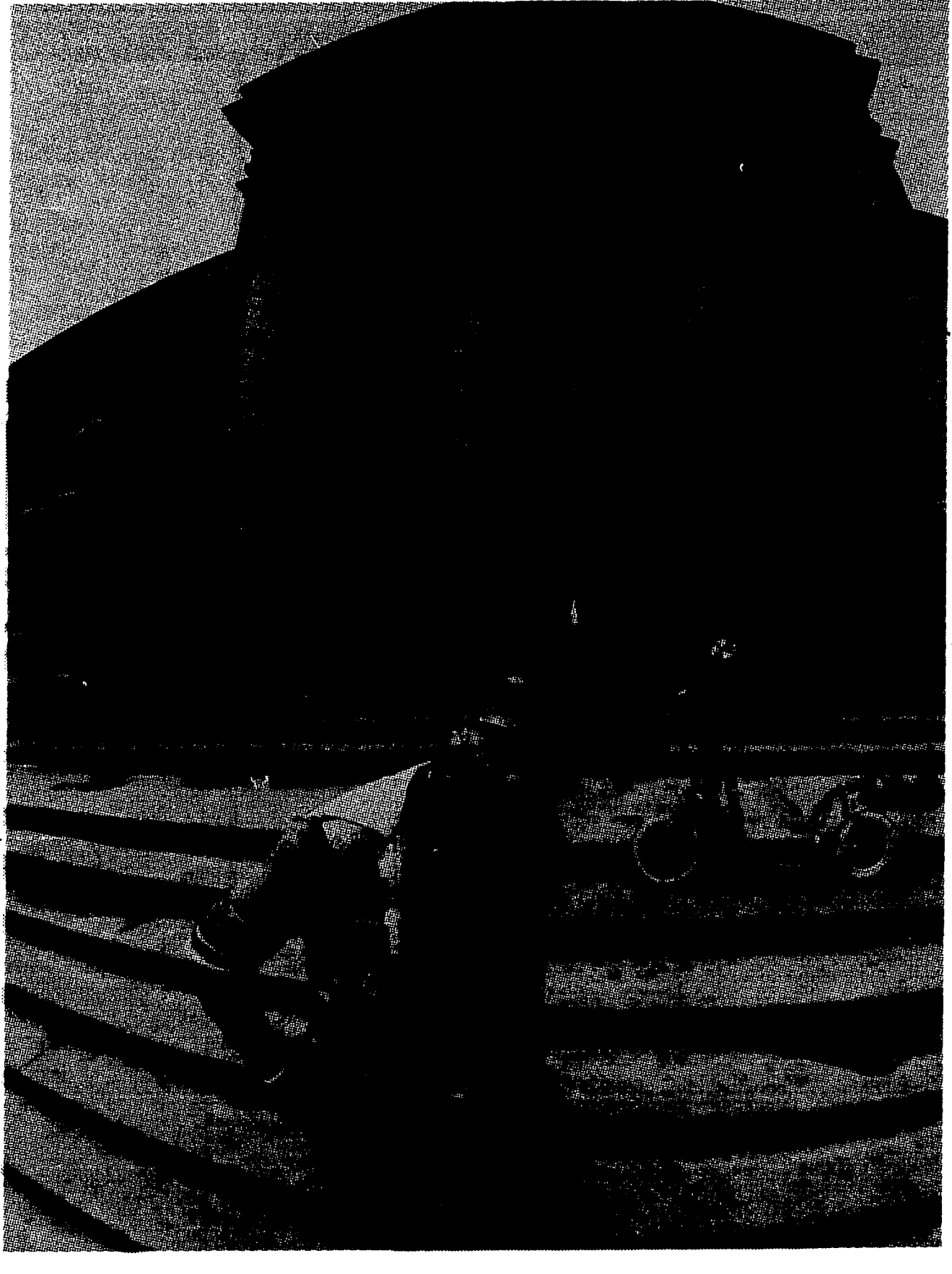
Registration Requirements:

- Full name of the applicant and mailing address;
- Address or legal description of the property;
- Either the applicant's birth date or last 6 digits of social insurance number;
- Identification will be required and if registration is not made at the regional district offices, proof of property ownership will be required at the voting place

The foregoing is an abbreviated summary provided for information only. Requirements of the Municipal Act shall take precedence.
