Strangway said the Tiampos' offer was selected because it initially had very simple conditions: confidentiality until they agreed to publicity, and naming the library after the family.

"This remains a good vision. It doesn't need the Amon lands," Strangway said.

Other land offers that were considered for the university site included Washington-based Merrill and Ring Timber and Land Management lands north of Garibaldi Highlands, the Makin Lands in Britannia Beach and Garibaldi Alpen Resorts Ltd.

A letter to the community from Strangway is on page A8 of this week's Chief.

Reached for comment Monday, Mayor Corinne Lonsdale said: "Obviously we're somewhat disappointed but still are very positive about the university. Dr. Strangway has made it very clear in recent weeks that regardless of the property that the university will be here in Squamish."

Lonsdale said representatives of the Tiampos family will be meeting with council in a closed-door session tomorrow.

Squamish BCR worker dies near Pemberton

Pemberton RCMP and BC Rail Police are still investigating a tragic accident that took the life of a Squamish-based BC Rail employee Friday night.

Robert Troy Church, 37, was working with a derailment crew to repair and remove derailed train cars that had gone off the tracks in Pemberton early Friday morning when he was accidentally crushed by one of the train cars.

Church, a father of three, was a 16-year veteran of BC Rail with the engineer-

ing department. He was married with three children.

"The investigation into the accident is ongoing," Alan Dever, director of communications and public affairs for BC Rail, said Sunday. "Our employee services and grief counselors arrived on scene after the accident to aid the other workers. It's an unfortunate situation for all concerned."

Pemberton RCMP along with Emergency Health Services (EHS) and the Coroner's Service arrived at the scene around midnight to investigate the accident.

Since then, RCMP said, Ministry of Transportation

officials, BC Rail and the Workers Compensation Board have also become involved.

Dever said the 21-car derailment of the south-bound freight train occurred just north of the 95.5 mile mark on the Squamish subdivision. No one was injured, and the incident is still under investigation.

"We got our derailment crews on scene and they were working around the clock to repair the line and get the cars upright," Dever said. The repair was partially shut down after the accident, but work continued through the weekend.

Million raised for university

\$15 million but \$20 million has already been allocated for the private university planned for Squamish, David Strangway confirmed Thursday.

Between a presentation to council Monday afternoon and one at the Howe Sound Inn that evening, Strangway learned one of the groups who have donated money to cover the university's initial operating costs had increased their offer by \$5 million.

Now has two letters pledging \$10 million. "Things are moving forward very quickly now," Strangway said. "There's a real commitment from one of the foundations for another \$600,000." The money, spread out over four or five years, will fund the university operation until funding from the province is sufficient to cover the rest.

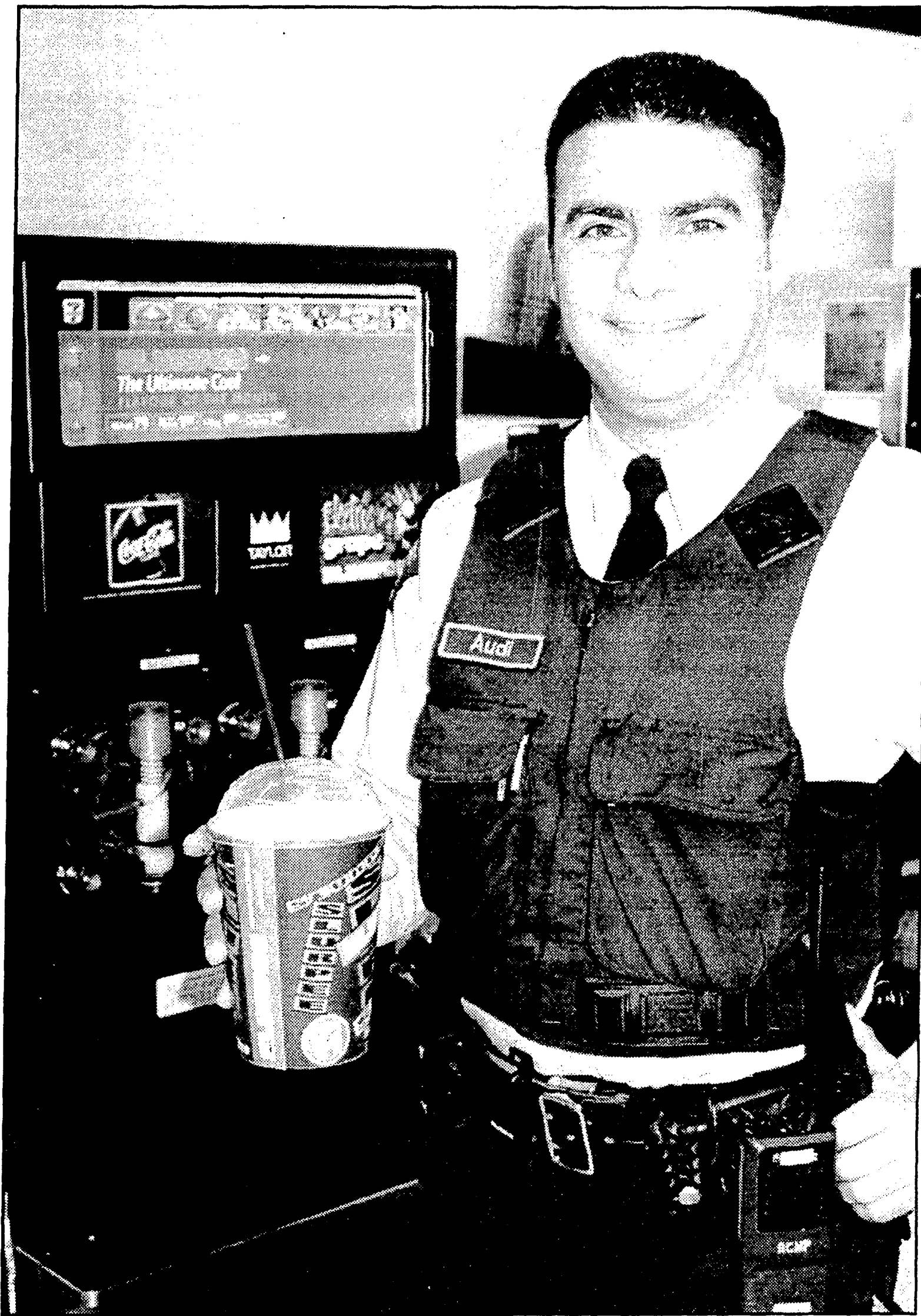

The Squamish RCMP and 7-Eleven are teaming up for youth in the community.

Operation Chill is a youth-oriented, police interaction concept where uniformed members provide a police-logged free slurpee coupon to youth that do the right thing in the community.

Const. Dan Seward, who is helping to facilitate the program, said doing the right thing would include picking up trash on the street, crossing at a crosswalk, wearing a

bike helmet and participating in community activities.

Operation Chill was kicked off in the Lower Mainland in late August of this year and is now being expanded to include other municipalities around the province.

"The goal of Operation Chill is to create positive interaction that will establish rapport and build trust between youth and police," Seward said. "This concept has been very successful in the United States. There is a lot of good deeds and we all know how much positive reinforcement helps."

An example of this positive reinforcement was shown on Nov. 15 when Cpl. Joe Schofield stopped a young man on his way to Stawamus Elementary School.

The youth's teacher, Sheila Kirkpatrick, sent a letter to the police commending Schofield for presenting a coupon to her student because he was wearing his bike helmet while riding his bike.

Seward said each officer with the detachment has been given a coupon booklet and members have been encouraged to use them.

Rockslide closes 99

Hwy. 99 near Horseshoe Bay was shut down for almost three hours Saturday morning after an early morning rockslide.

A Capilano Highways spokesperson said Sunday that the rock and mud slide occurred about one km north of Horseshoe Bay just before 5 a.m.

The slide blocked both lanes of traffic until 7:40 a.m. when one lane of alternating traffic was re-opened.

The Ministry of Transportation and Highways brought in rock scalers to survey the area around 8 a.m. and the highway was fully re-opened just after 1 p.m.

No injuries were reported as a result of the slide although two vehicles were said to have been damaged.

Investigation into the cause of the slide is still ongoing.

Lower fee period extended for secondary suites

Council gave secondary suite owners six more months to register for \$55 — instead of \$220 — so concerns they have with the suites bylaw can be resolved.

Marianne Wilson of the 200-member owner group Suite Neighbours appeared before council Dec. 7, asking to extend the reduced suite registration fee to Dec. 31, 2000, from Dec. 31, 1999.

"We feel that there are too many issues unresolved at this point," she said. "There are only 16 suites registered out of an estimated 400-600 suites out there."

She cited technical requirements, owner occupancy, business licensing and the cost of registration and permits as barriers to owners legalizing their suites.

Coun. Shelley Smith's motion to extend the deadline to June 30, 2000 was passed unanimously.

Coun. Wendy Magee, who has said she wants to tackle the secondary suites issue immediately, asked if the shorter extension would pose a hardship to owners. Wilson

said it would not if council was open to another extension if the issue was still unresolved. Councillors indicated they were willing to consider that.

To operate a suite, the bylaw, passed Nov. 18, 1998, requires owners to obtain an annual business licence, provide off-street parking, pay double utility charges and meet the technical requirements for suites laid out in the B.C. Building Code.

The technical requirements, which in some cases demand suites undergo extensive renovation to comply, are the largest outstanding issue.

"The previous council created a bylaw that wasn't realistic and nobody could conform to it," Wilson said Wednesday.

"It was too costly."

Suite Neighbours wants to find a middle ground, said Wilson, which means "taking the existing bylaw and making it workable for the general public without costing them an arm and a leg."

"We feel this council will work in an expedient manner and we will probably have this all resolved within six months."

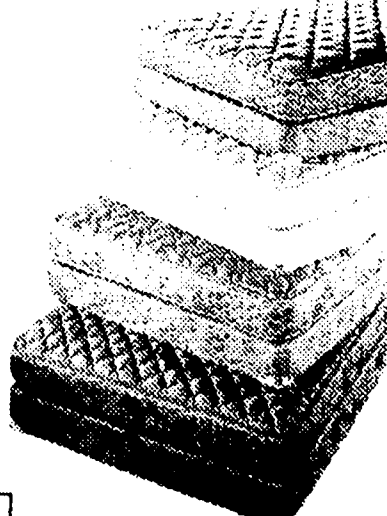

Union, Interfor back sued workers

Forestry workers sued by environmentalists are being backed up both by Inter-national Forest Products (Interfor) and the International Workers' Association (IWA).

The suit names Interfor, Elaho Logging and B. R. Adams Ltd. along with Interfor operations manager Dave Miller, camp manager Derek Sayle, area engineer Dave Haffey, John Lonsdale and Frank Roche. Bernie Adams and Donald Kulak of B. R. Adams are also named, as are an unspecified number of John Does.

Interfor vice-president Fred Lowenberger said Nov. 30 the firm of Ladner Downs will represent Interfor, Miller, Haffey and Sayle.

"We're gathering information to defend ourselves. What might be in that information I can't say right now," he said. "We'll be supporting the individuals too — at least emotionally and probably some financial help as well."

IWA Local 2171 has retained Miriam Gropper to represent Kulak, Lonsdale and Roche.

"Our understanding is the members that are named are not guilty of anything," president Darrell Wong said.

"Basically the plaintiffs have to prove every aspect of their case," said Gropper.

The defendants will require the plaintiffs to not only prove the identity of the alleged per-

petrators, but their presence and even that the event took place, she said.

"The plaintiffs bear the burden of proof."

Filed in B.C. Supreme Court Oct. 26, the suit stems from an incident Sept. 15 when an anti-logging protest camp deep in the Elaho Valley was destroyed by between 60 and 100 loggers. The incident followed six weeks of protests that stopped work and forced Interfor to apply for a court injunction.

The suit alleges the companies were negligent in not preventing the assaults and allowing use of company vehicles and equipment during the incident.

The plaintiffs are protesters Bryce Gilroy-Scott and Sharai Mustatia and James Jamieson, a trail builder with the conservationist group Western Canada Wilderness Committee, who stored his van at the camp because of Interfor's injunction. All three were sent to hospital with various injuries after the incident.

The plaintiffs' lawyer, Tannis Braithwaite, said Nov. 25 most of the defendants were served with the suit Nov. 21.

Small turnout for CDP

Information meeting Thursday on the mall/condo proposal for Mamquam Road Hwy. 99 drew a small crowd and raised few concerns.

The previous council requested the meeting after opponents Canadian Development Properties (CDP) asked for several changes to the site's draft land use law, including allowing fill use. Previously, CDP said the mall portion of the development would be for factory outlet stores targeting highway travellers.

"We're still focusing on the destination shopping, the factory outlet, but we need the flexibility to include retail shops," said Robert Weston, CDP's vice-president of development.

After this public information session, it's our hope to go back to council with your input and start work on an amendment to the land use," Weston told the audience.

When complete, Garibaldi Village's two buildings would include 14,734 square metres of ground-level com-

mercial space and 110 tourist accommodation condominiums and 120 motel units on the upper two floors. An indoor climbing wall, miniature golf course and three- or four-screen movie theatre are also planned.

Weston said CDP is not seeking drive-through windows for the three planned restaurants, but does want to remove the 1,860 square-metre store size restriction.

Concerns were expressed over the impact on downtown and on traffic in the area.

"You [Weston] say this will bring in opportunities for downtown merchants," said Jane Iverson, a downtown merchant. "I say this is a direct threat to my business."

"We watched when Squamish Station came in [and] businesses relocated from the Chieftain Mall or downtown — what guarantees can you give us these businesses won't locate right out of downtown?" asked one audience member.

"The road network here isn't designed for commercial development. It's primarily residential," said former councillor Lyle Fenton.

"It's a typical example of

how Squamish is developed, with a lack of planning and opportunistic development."

When on council Fenton declared a conflict of interest because his property borders the site. Coun. Paul Lalli has declared a conflict because of his occupation as a hotelier. Both received legal advice before making their decision.

Coun. Wendy Magee, manager of the Super 8 Motel, said Friday she will not declare a conflict on the issue, though she said she doesn't have all the information yet.

"If they [council] don't approve this ... there's a lot of pressure," said Terrill Patterson. "They're going to approve anything and everything because they have to prove they're open for business and it's going to end up putting existing businesses out of business, and it was these people who elected them in the first place. Isn't it ironic?"

"Sixty-two per cent of your population lives [north of Mamquam] and that's where your future growth is going to be and they need some service retail too," said CDP's Mark Giovanetto.

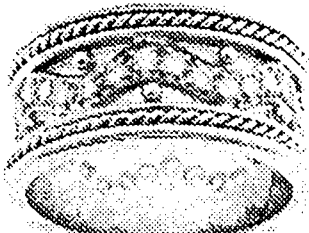
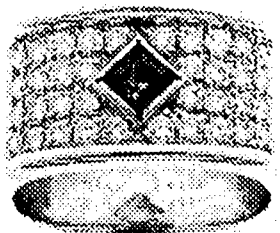

Parks and Rec plan ready

The Parks and Recreation Master Plan is set to take flight.

Landscape architect Andrew Gibbs of Urban Systems, the consultant group hired to complete the plan, made a formal presentation to commission members at Monday's Parks and Rec Commission meeting.

Gibbs outlined the final draft of the 200-plus page document that is ready to go to council on Jan. 11.

"Through comments from staff, the public, commission members and council we have come up with what we feel is an excellent document," Gibbs told the commission.

"Council has this document

now and will discuss it on Jan. 11 and we're hoping to see it start to be implemented not long after that."

The master plan contains some 180 recommendations that cover a wide range of parks and rec issues such as programs, facilities, partnerships and special focus areas for the coming years in Squamish.

Each of these recommendations have been laid out into six categories (immediate, one to three years, three to five years, five to 10 years, 10 to 20 years and none of the above) to determine which issues are the most important in the short-term and long-term plans for the district.

Some of the immediate plans that have been highlighted by Gibbs and the con-

sultant group include council adopting the Master Plan document itself, tackling neighborhood park deficiencies, trail planning and development and the youth centre.

Highlights under the one-to-three-year category include all-season playing fields, estuary trails, ball diamonds at Brennan Park, Rose Park development and dikes and river access.

"None of this is written in stone," said Bruce Goldsworthy, manager of recreation services. "Staff didn't prepare this document and it will be up to council to determine what changes if any need to be made."

"Council has the right to reposition any of these things and move them into other categories if they wish."

"Our job is to give them advice and their job is to take that advice and make the best decisions for the betterment of the community," added Joe Webber, commission chair.

"I feel the commission has had a lot of input in this process and I think we can work with council to see these visions come true."

Goldsworthy said he's thrilled with the document and is looking forward to hearing council's input.

"Andrew and his staff have done an amazing job of putting together all of the issues in a useful manner," he said.

"There is a lot of exciting information here and it will serve as a great use for the direction of this community for the years to come."

RCMP looking for break-in suspects

Squamish RCMP are seeking the public's help for information about two weekend break-ins in downtown Squamish.

The first one happened last Saturday evening between 6:55 and 7 p.m. at Vision Hair Salon on Cleveland Avenue.

Const. Steve Dubreuil said suspect(s) entered by the back door, which leads to the alley between Cleveland and Second Avenue, before leaving the same way with a small amount of money.

The second incident occurred sometime between Friday evening and Sunday afternoon at Silver Foot Active Wear on Cleveland Avenue. Suspect(s) entered through the locked front door and left through the back door, which leads onto Loggers Lane. A computer and boxes

of clothing were among the items stolen.

Anyone with information about these two incidents is asked to call Squamish RCMP at 898-9611 or Crime Stoppers at 892-TIPS(8477).

Police have identified the man who was struck by a BC Rail train last week.

The victim is Richard Wayne Armitage of no fixed address and police said the man is in serious, but stable condition at Vancouver General Hospital.

Shortly after 3 a.m. on Saturday morning, police caught up with a very intoxicated man walking southbound on Hwy. 99. Sgt. Gary Brine said the man had carried off a large A&W Root Bear sign from the front of the

restaurant.

Brine said the man was arrested and spent several hours sobering up in the detachment cells. He said the Root Bear was returned, uninjured, to his spot at the restaurant.

Sometime over the weekend someone stole a 14-foot aluminum boat from the day area at Cat Lake Forestry campsite. Brine is asking that anyone in the area that may have been a witness are asked to call the detachment of Crime Stoppers.

Police said sometime over the weekend of Nov. 26 to 28 vandals stole the protective covers and bulbs from light posts along the walkway outside St. Joseph's Catholic Church on The Boulevard in

Garibaldi Highlands.

The stolen items were valued at \$1,500.

On the morning of Dec. 7, employees arriving at Diamond Head Yamaha in the Industrial Park discovered that thieves had broken into the compound and stolen two snowmobiles.

Brine said later that morning a cyclist called the police to report that they had observed two young males riding snow-

mobiles in the area of the dike and Mamquam Road.

"This seemed out of place as there was a definite lack of snow in the area," Brine said. "But thanks to the caller, police were able to cordon off the area and with the aid of a police dog and the Peacekeepers recovered the snowmobiles and the two youths, who had fled the immediate area."

Brine said an 18-year-old and 15-year-old Squamish

males will be facing charges of possession of stolen property.

A worker at a Progress Way business made an interesting discovery when he checked the contents of two large garbage bags left in the parking lot of the business.

Brine said both bags contained marijuana plants (75) in total.

The plants were valued at roughly \$2,500.

Get ready for CounterAttack

While mixing up that festive Christmas nog make sure to also mix up a plan for a safe drive home this month.

It's roadcheck season again on the Sea to Sky Corridor as the holiday Drinking Driving CounterAttack program wings into gear Dec. 8 to Jan. 3. "Drivers can expect to see stepped-up enforcement of the road checks around Squamish and along Hwy. 99," said Cpl. Joe Schofield of the Squamish RCMP Highway Patrol.

Since the start of this year's CounterAttack campaign in April, impaired driving charges are down 20 per cent compared with 1998 and 24-hour suspensions are also down about four per cent.

In Squamish from April until Nov. 30, there have been a total of 19,568 vehicles that have gone through roadchecks resulting in one impaired charge, 42 24-hour suspensions, one administrative driving prohibition, seven administrative vehicle

impoundments, 109 violation tickets and five other charges.

"I do believe people are much more aware, but there are others that don't seem to be getting the message," Schofield said.

"We're encouraging people to plan ahead before you start drinking and while you still have a clear mind. There are no quick fixes when you have been drinking and no amount of coffee or walks will lessen the effects of alcohol — time is the only cure."

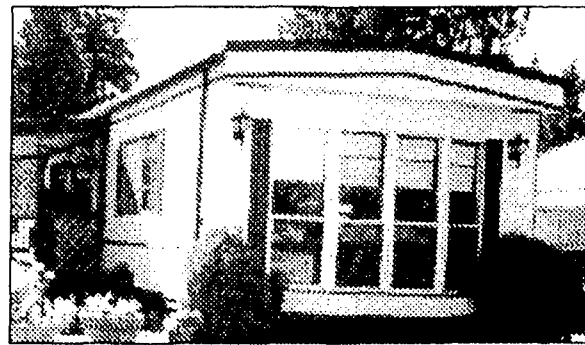

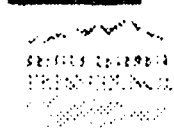

Strangway has more homework

Are Squamish's hopes of being the home of Canada's first private non-profit university about to get "dean's vacation?"

Squamish residents can't help but get that feeling of doom that usually accompanies a final exam or a term paper after this weekend's news that the Tiampo family has withdrawn its offer of 1,000 acres of land for Dr. David Strangway's proposed private non-profit university. In recent weeks some residents have been quietly expressing concerns about the viability of the university project in the local media.

The location of the campus in an identified flood debris hazard zone, the chances of selling hundreds of new market home lots to finance the campus construction in Squamish's depressed housing market, and the drifting opening date (from 2001 at the time the university was announced to 2002 this April to 2003 just last week) — they've all had people wondering in the back of their minds about the latest project to save Squamish.

Friday's announcement will give the nay-sayers a chance to come into the open and say "I told you so" — and really, they can't be completely blamed. After years of Squamish being "just about" to boom and seeing development after development rise and fade away, a little skepticism or even cynicism has to be expected.

But before we give in to negativism we have to ask: what is the next step? Are the other land offers that were on the table last December when Strangway announced the university was coming here still available? Are there others that might want to offer a deal to the university developers? What happens to the university's opening date?

Dr. Strangway has some more homework ahead of him. Not only does he have to find a new site for his campus — and a new way to finance its construction — he also has to convince the public as well as the private sector that his university isn't just an ivory tower in the sky.

His letter on this page is a start — but we look forward to hearing more from him as this story plays out. Having brought the hopes of the community so high a year ago this week, it's only fair that we stay informed through the difficult times ahead.

It's not over yet, Squamish. Stay tuned.

No road rage in rockslide

Highways tend to be something we only notice when something goes wrong with them — like, for instance, Saturday's rockslide on Hwy. 99 north of Horseshoe Bay.

When we heard the news on Saturday morning of an earthquake causing a rockslide on Hwy. 99 north of Horseshoe Bay, our first thought was "oh no, not again." Miles of blocked traffic on both sides of the highway and wrecked holiday shopping plans were sure to be in store for Squamish residents this weekend.

Rockslides on the unpredictable Sea to Sky Highway are expected — but the amazingly quick response from highway crews wasn't. Getting traffic moving within two hours of the slide and completely open by early afternoon on a busy weekend morning was an exercise in efficiency and performance under pressure.

Kudos to Capilano Highways for an amazing job in getting the road back in service in record time.

And that may not be the only good news out of Saturday's slide. Maybe this latest near-disaster will convince the provincial government that upgrades to Hwy. 99 aren't just an item buried miles deep on a wish list, but a real priority — particularly if the Vancouver/Whistler 2010 Olympic Winter Games bid is taken into account.

But for now, we'll just say thanks for a job well — and quickly — done.

'Regret and surprise'

Editor,

It is with regret and surprise that I inform the town that the Tiampo family has withdrawn its offer of land for the creation of the planned university in Squamish.

The regret is clear. The offer without significant conditions was a truly philanthropic gesture as the offer was made with no expectation that there would be any direct financial return to the family. Regret because our team has done a large amount of work in a few very short months on a project of unique significance, not only to the town of Squamish but to the creation of a new kind of university that would be of truly international class and a first in Canada.

Surprise because, as we reported last week in the paper and to the new council, the project has now been proven to be academically viable as well as financially viable.

Academic viability is demonstrated by the remarkable group of universities around the world willing to join hands with us sharing this vision. It is demonstrated by the remarkable group of people from B.C., Canada and the

world willing to advise us in our start-up phases.

It is demonstrated by those members of my team that are working with me and who will join us on our initial payroll in January. It is demonstrated by studies showing that students would be attracted to this university from Canada and abroad as well as outstanding faculty.

Financial viability has been demonstrated in several ways:

a) We have \$20 million in pledges in addition to the land donation.

b) Reports from two consultants: CB Richard Ellis and Urbanics Consultants demonstrate that there will be at least \$185 million in net income in one model and \$311 million in the other over the next 25 years. This will readily finance the construction and create an endowment.

c) Two contractor/developer consortia led by Vanbots and by PCL have proposed to build the campus in stages using land sales and market housing for the financing.

These proposals address all the conditions that have been raised by the family.

The project is both academically and financially feasible, as we have been able to demonstrate the past few months since the Tiampo family's offer was initially made to us.

This is a large and complex project that has been made feasible by the initial invitation to us the town. On this invitation selected the town of Squamish and we were later approached the family with the land offer. The project has been made feasible the memorandum of understanding signed with the town. We several offers of land to consider at that time.

Fortunately, the dream of great, small university remains intact. Fortunately most of work we have done in this project of concept stage is transferable other sites. We remain committed to the concept and we will explore other options with our partners, the district of Squamish.

We may not be able to build ground at the turn of the millenium as we had planned, but we will develop a great university.

by cutting down and hauling the old growth out of Garibaldi Provincial Park.

Perhaps, in the spirit of promoting the health of our forest industry at all costs, we should gather at Municipal Hall to hang and burn "Recycleman" in effigy to show our disgust at his ongoing efforts to put forestry workers out of work by reducing our pulp and paper needs.

All I'm really trying to say is let's get our heads out of the sand, remember the past without letting it dictate our future, and when it comes time to make decision to consider not only our standard of living, but our quality of life.

who lives there," said Silvius of the exchange.

As for what he's learned, Silvius said: "First and foremost is patience. When you're dealing with a completely different culture you encounter a great deal of differences when you go to do things as a group."

"They're [Canadians] really kind and smiling all the time and want to help everywhere," said Soomets. "They come up in the street and say hello and I'm like 'Wow'."

Another thing that impressed Soomets were the mountains. "I thought it was so big. I thought it was all big cities and not so much the nature," she said of her first

impression of local scenery and how it wasn't what she expected.

Silvius, from Brandon, Man., notices a difference in local concerns. "Your coffee-shop talk here is different from Brandon," he said. "There's certain issues and concerns here, like fishing and forestry, that are a part of everybody's makeup."

However, Soomets has found some things that are a little too different from Estonia. The greeting "How are you?" is something Canadians say all the time, unlike Estonians. "You don't have to explain all the time how you're feeling and what you think," she said.

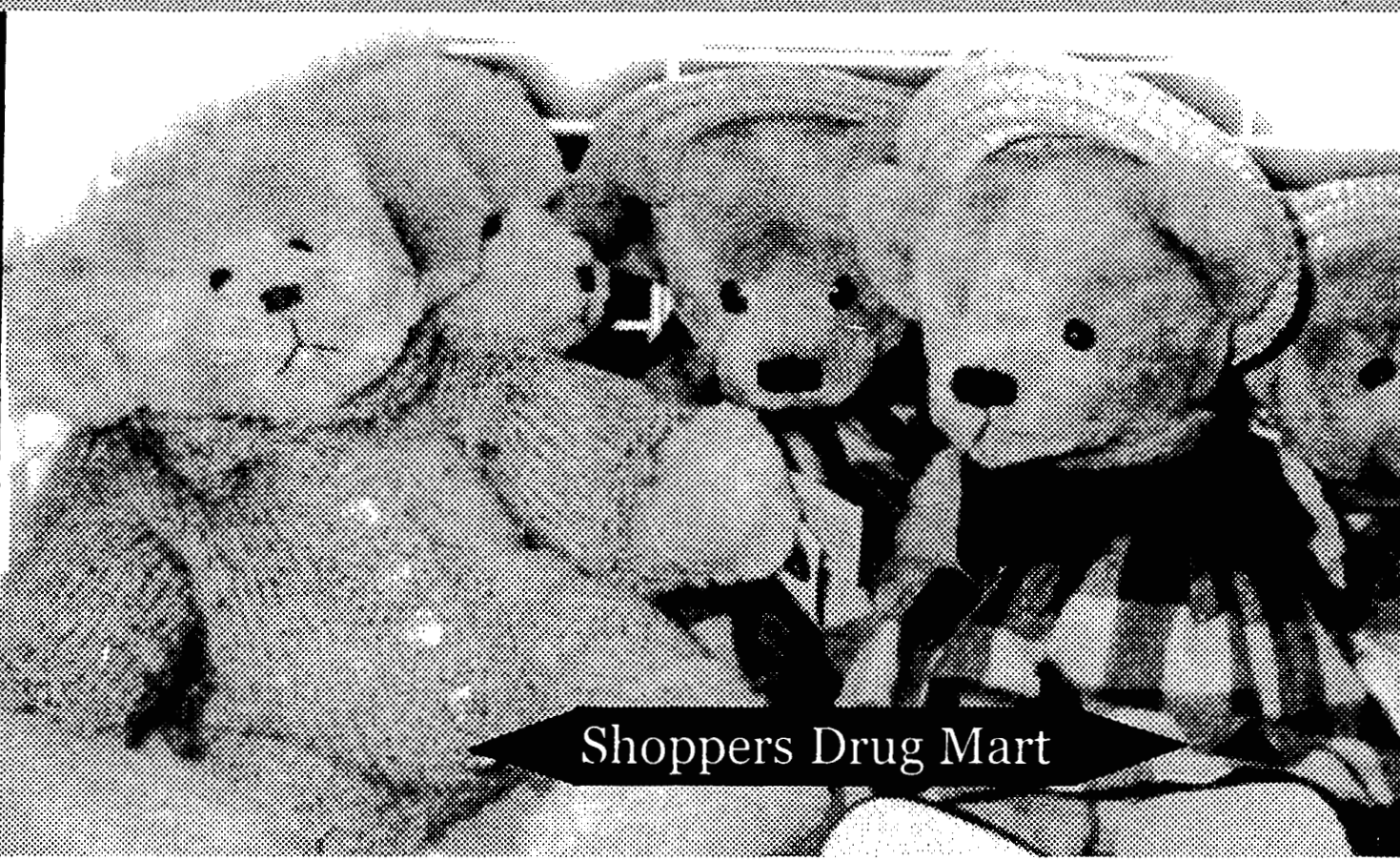

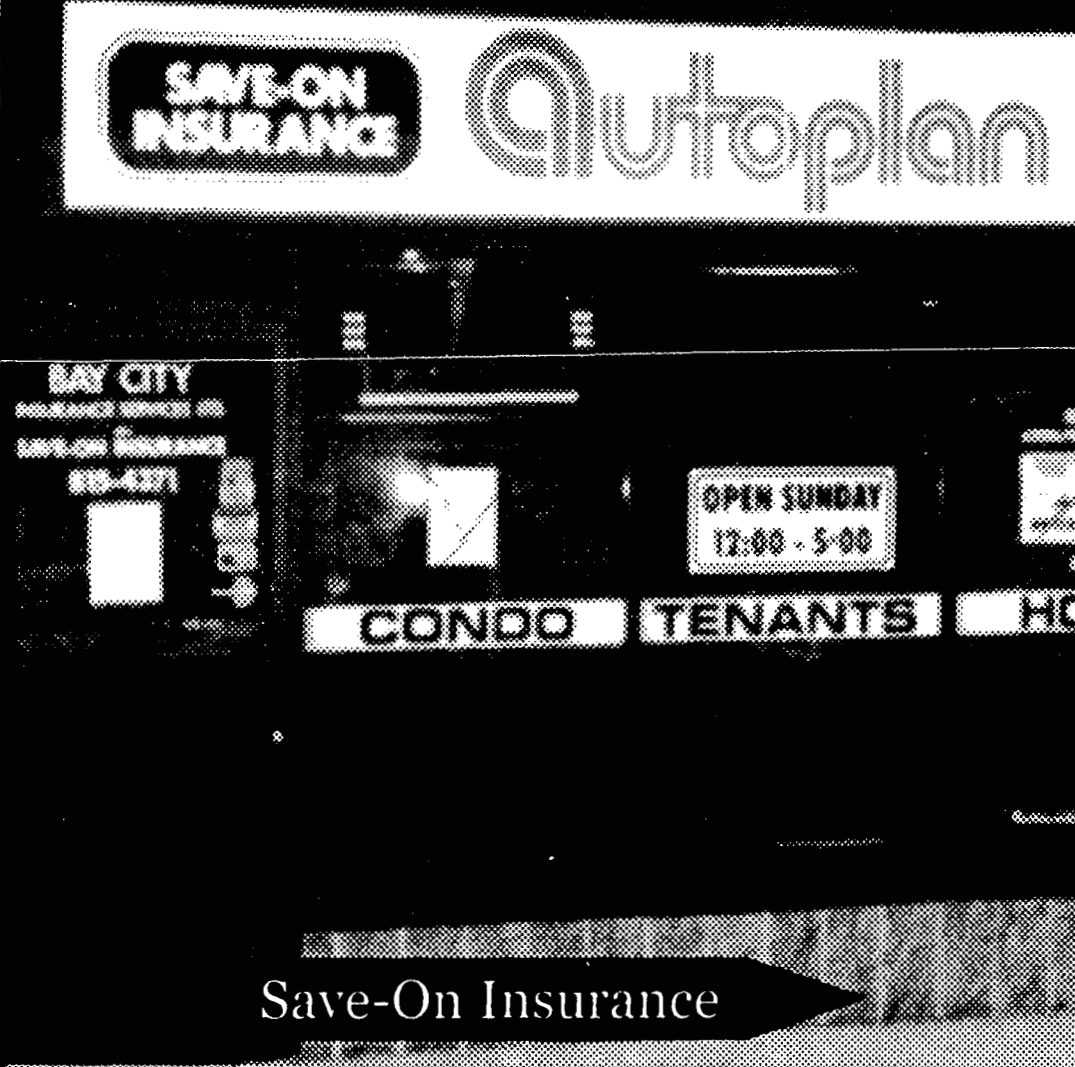

Christmas Messages from Squamish's Ministers

St. John the Divine Anglican Church

What for you is the essence of life? What can be found right at the centre of your life that, for you, holds the key to who you are?

I think if you were to ask the average person what they want out of life, what they see as top priority, they would probably reply, "All I want is to be happy."

This makes sense. All of us want to find happiness in our life and hold onto it. We buy books, attend classes, change our lifestyles, some even try (with devastating results) drugs and alcohol in an ongoing effort to find that elusive quality, happiness.

But despite all of this effort, Harold Kushner reminds us, most people most of the time

do not feel happy. Oscar Wilde once wrote, "In this world there are only two tragedies. One is not getting what one wants, and the other is getting it."

No matter how hard we work for success, success is not going to satisfy us. Even money and power do not satisfy that unnamable hunger in the soul.

We desire a sense of peace, a sense of calm, a sense that our lives do matter, sense of contentment with who we are and what we have, a sense of happiness. This is a spiritual quest, a spiritual desire, even if we don't see it that way.

Throughout time human beings have been searching in exactly this way for the ultimate purpose. As a Christian, I believe this is what the first Christmas was all about and

what our faith in God through the centuries has been all about as well. For at that time a child was born who has changed our world and who continues to change our world, by suggesting, among other things, that our priorities are wrong. Our lives are about relationships not competitiveness. At that first Christmas, God's Son came to us to demonstrate God's desire for a relationship with us and God did so by sending a child into a family.

What has this got to do with us? Well at Christmas families desire, it seems to me, more than anything else, to be together. And so on Dec. 25 families make huge efforts to be together and to care for one another and to demonstrate most especially on this day, love and a sense of family.

Somewhat this celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ still draws us together to realize, if even just for this day, that our real priorities in life are love and relationships.

As I said earlier this is a spiritual quest for it is in this love that we get a glimpse of the one who gave us love, we get a glimpse of the one who sent His Son Jesus Christ to come amongst us to show us the true life, we get a glimpse of God's desire for our lives, we get a glimpse of the true priorities for us human beings.

And so when you get all caught up in the stress of this season, ponder the reason for your stress. What are you doing it for? What is the real goal? If it is to seek something that is shallow and empty like a desire for more, or control of more, or to possess more then

St. Joseph's Catholic Church: Jubilee Year in 2000

"Soon it will be Christmas time." The airways are filled with the happy songs of Christmas. Could it be otherwise?

After all, we have as much reason to rejoice as did the angels who sang on that first Christmas night. Christmas (the commemoration of the birth of Christ) always brings us joy and renews our hope: Christ Jesus: Emanuel, God-with-us.

This year all Christians, and the whole world as well, will be given the once-in-a-life-

time privilege to share in the profound event of the 2,000th anniversary of the birth of Christ as we approach the new millennium.

For Catholics, this Christmas carries a little extra meaning. On Dec. 24, Pope John Paul II will proclaim the beginning of a Holy Year, "a year of favor from the Lord."

He will begin the celebration in ceremonies at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome by opening the "Holy Year Door." (This is an entrance to St. Peter's that is sealed from one Holy Year to the next.) Then, crossing the threshold,

he will enter into the church and commence the Great Jubilee of the Year 2000 by celebrating midnight Mass.

The Holy Door will remain open until Epiphany on Jan. 6, 2001. It symbolizes one's passage from sin to new life in Christ: a point of conversion.

The idea is that all who subsequently pass through that door (or any replica of it) will turn to the Lord with open minds and hearts and allow Him to transform them into the persons He wants them to be. Hence the theme: "Open Wide the Doors to Christ," a take-off from the Book of

Revelation: "Lo, I stand at the door and knock." (Rev. 3:20)

The year of Jubilee is a peak moment in the history and life of the church. It has its roots in Jewish religious history. (Leviticus 25:8).

A Jubilee calls not only for conversion, but for freedom for captives, forgiveness of debts, for celebrating, feasting, song, etc. I think that the singing, feasting, celebrating will be plentiful!

But how would you like to wake up one morning to discover that Revenue Canada has cancelled your debts? Or that your employer has given

you an extra (paid) week off for vacation?

Even if that does not seem likely, I am happy to know that there are people out there who have caught the "spirit of Jubilee." I refer to those many individuals who for years have been urging the wealthy "G-8" nations to cancel the debts of the poorest nations.

As Christmas approaches and as we enter the Great Jubilee, I like to remember that Christ, whose birthday we commemorate, lived the Jubilee (Luke. 4:16-21). He put his life on the line for it.

Olympic hopes still alive

Squamish boxer Wayne Jackson took one on the chin last week in Campbell River.

Jackson lost his semifinal bout at the Canadian Amateur Boxing Championships in his bid to qualify for the next step to next year's Olympic games in Australia.

But despite losing, Jackson still has a chance to qualify for Australia.

The champion from each of the 12 weight classes from the Campbell River event automatically goes to the Olympic qualifier later next year, but the next four get another shot at a challenger box-off in January in Ontario.

With Jackson finishing in the top three, he is eligible to go to the box-off and move further up the ladder.

"It's really up in the air whether or not I'm going to go to the box-off yet," Jackson said. "It's a huge commitment both in terms of time and financially. My friends and family are encouraging me to go, but going into Campbell River I was confident that I would make the final and when I didn't, my feeling is it might be time to hang up the gloves at the competitive level."

Things started off well for Jackson in Campbell River as he won his first bout in the heavyweight division in decisive fashion over William Davis.

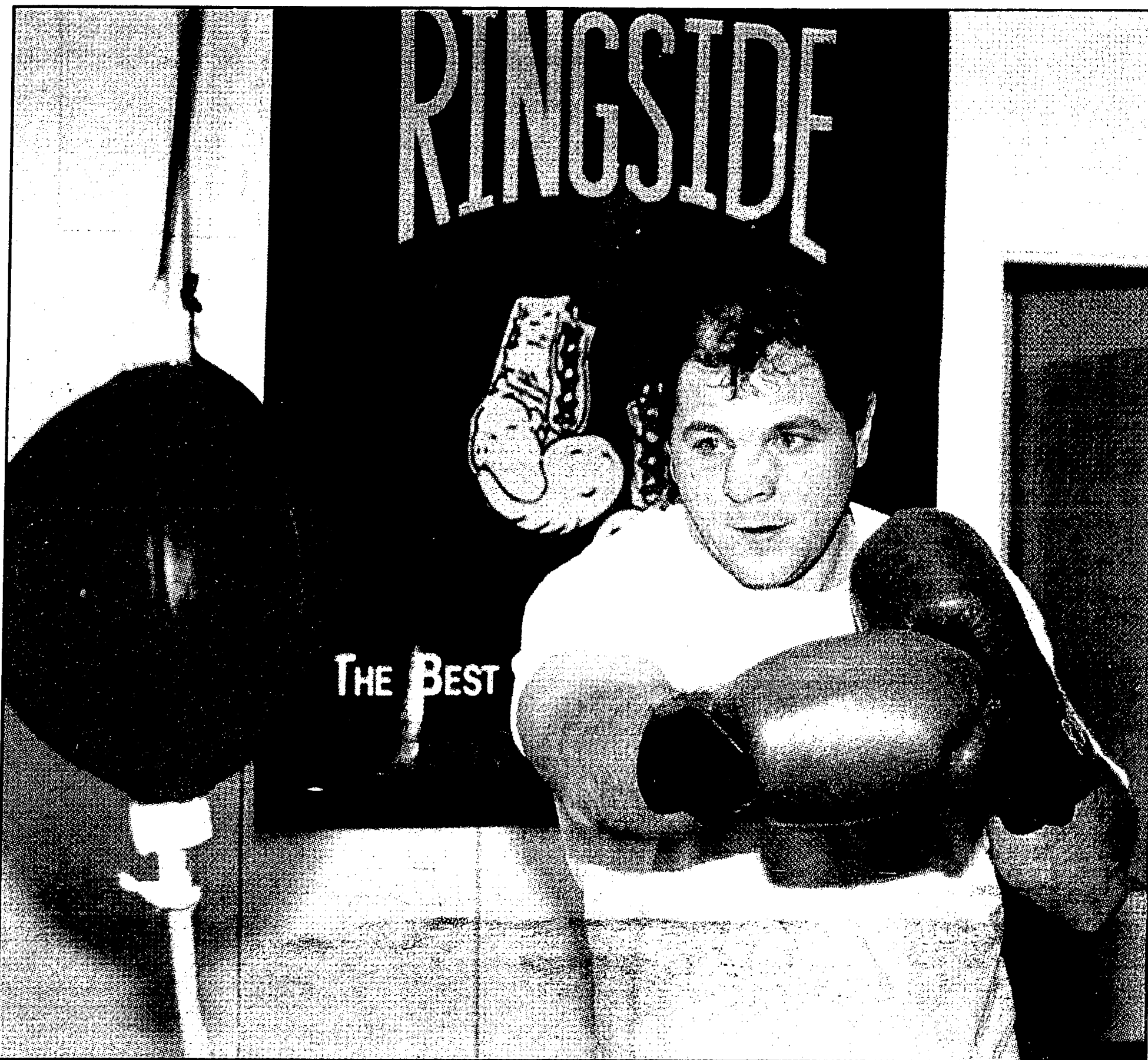
Next up for Jackson was Sheldon Brown of Alberta in the semis.

"Sheldon is an old nemesis of mine," Jackson said. "His brother and I traded horns in 1995 during the Canadian finals and he fouled me. The rivalry has continued with Sheldon and we had quite a battle."

Jackson said the fight started out well, but as the bout wore on, Jackson's frustration started to show.

"He was really defensive in there. I lost my focus," Jackson said. "I started fighting rather than boxing a technical bout like I usually do and it came in the scoring."

Jackson picked up his third bronze medal to go along with a silver after

the Campbell River event, but that's little consolation at this point.

Jackson was the lone entry from Squamish and the Squamish Rock Boxing Club that went to Campbell River, although Squamish's Steve Featherston was eligible to go and compete.

"Steve stepped aside to allow an older competitor to go and then that competitor dropped out because he failed his weight class," Jackson said.

As for the rest of the club, Jackson

said things are really starting to take off.

"Although we're slightly smaller than our previous location at the Industrial Park, the new facility is very convenient and much more affordable," he said. "Since opening in mid-September, the club has put more than 70 athletes, predominately youth between the ages of 14 and 18 through intense, non-contact boxing fitness regimes."

Jackson said more than half of those

who have tasted the sweat of these workouts have now become full-time members.

"Although all members endure the rigorous training, only a fraction choose to take their training one step further by competing," Jackson said.

The Squamish Rock Boxing Club is located at 38490 Buckley Avenue and is open Monday through Thursday from 3 to 9 p.m. For more information about joining stop by the club during training hours.

Title dreams stamped out

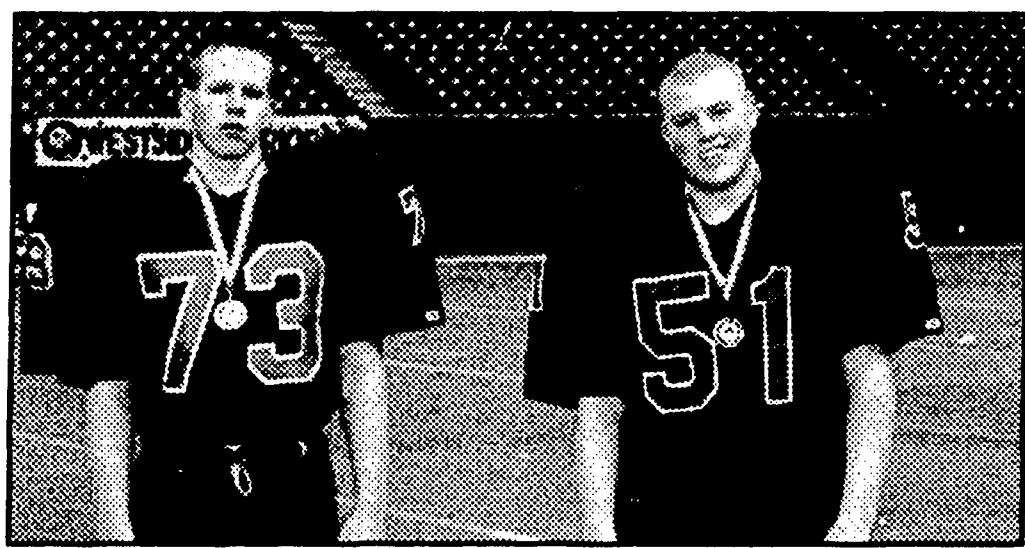
