An announcement on the private university proposed for Squamish is expected this week, though the university proponents are releasing no details.

Peter Ufford, the project eader for the private university, called The Chief Aug. 22, but did not provide specifics on what the announcement might be. He is unavailable until Aug. 29.

Ufford was on a contract to he Howe Sound Educational Foundation (HSEF) to the end of June, when a decision on a ocation for the university's ampus was expected.

Ten locations, including one orth of the downtown, are inder consideration.

It was also learned this week eter Emberley, the university's academic project manager, is returning to Carleton University in Ottawa this fall teach.


Emberley said Thursday he ecided to cancel his planned eave of absence from arleton when the HSEF dvised him in March they would be not be in a position of cover his salary.

Stolen truck joyride ends in death

"It was a high-

speed, horrific

collision."

A joyride in a stolen vehicle ended in tragedy after a fiery accident last Tuesday morning.

John Robert Vinson, 21, of Squamish died when the 1986 Nissan pick-up truck he was driving smashed into a dump truck just before 7 a.m. on Government Road, south of the Squamish Airport.

The vehicle had previously been reported stolen.

Initial investigation by Squamish RCMP indicates that the pickup failed to negotiate a right hand curve, causing it to cross the centre line into the southbound lane.

A 1992 Kenworth dump truck, pulling a pup trailer, was travelling southbound at the time and saw the truck in his lane, but a collision was unavoidable.

"The driver of the dump truck attempted to avoid a collision, but was unable to and

"From what I've been told, it was a high speed, horrific collision."

Vinson was seriously injured in the accident and died later in Squamish General Hospital as a result of his injuries, while a passenger in the vehicle is still in serious condition at Vancouver General

Hospital. The driver of the dump truck was shaken up, but not injured.

"The Nissan hit the dump truck with so much impact that it was knocked back almost 13 feet

and the Nissan spun out and ended up in the middle of the road, "Orthner said.

The force of impact ruptured the fuel tank on the dump truck and the fuel spilled out onto the road. When the first officer arrived, Const. Pat Lussier, the Nissan was on fire and she used her extinguisher to put out the flames.

"Had she not arrived that quickly, we might have had

more than one fatality."

The roadway between Mt. Garibaldi cemetery and Ross Road was closed for more than eight hours as emergency crews and RCMP cleared the scene. Chemicals had to be used to mop up the fuel spill and an investigation team was called in.

RCMP are still investigating to determine if any charges will be laid against the passenger. "It's very difficult to lay charges in a case like this," said Orthner.

In an interview with The Chief Monday, Vinson's father Fred praised the efforts of police, paramedics and hospital staff involved.

"I hope the young people in Squamish will recognize that speed was a factor in this," he said.

Blockade goes up as police end 24-hour presence in Elaho

Protesters returned to blockade a logging road in the Elaho Valley Monday, less than 48 hours after RCMP ended their 24-hour presence in the area.

International Forest Products (Interfor) employees

found the Elaho Main logging road blocked at Mile 39 by a lone male hanging 50 feet above the ground in a tripod at 6:30 a.m. yesterday morning.

The tripod was surrounded by a "large blockade" of logs and barbed wire, according to a man identifying himself as Jonah from the group Friends of the Elaho. Police on their way to Lava Creek for a regular patrol arrived at 7:30 a.m. and placed the man under arrest for a criminal charge mischief.

Police had maintained 24hour presence in the Lava Creek area near Mile 65 since the last protest blockade in the Elaho was dismantled Aug. 2. They suspended their fullp.m. and went to random patrols.

Keith Rush of Interfor said about 50 employees and contractors were sent home due to the blockade.

Police were preparing to extract the man from the tripod as of press time Monday afternoon.

As schools prepare to open for the 2000-2001 school year next Tuesday, several renovations and upgrades could have local students dodging ladders, though the results should be more than worth the bother.

At Brackendale Secondary School, students will spend the first half of the year dealing with the renovation of most of their 21-year-old school.

"The biggest disruption is of course at Brackendale Secondary, because it's both a renovation project as well as an addition," Nancy Edwards, district secretary-treasurer, said Friday.

"It really requires the cooperation of everyone."

The 3,596 square metres of additions will mostly be complete when students return to classes; the 1,600 square metres of renovations should be finished before January 2001.

Mamquam Elementary School students will also see a renovation, though far less drastic.

Some \$36,000 will be devoted to improving the washrooms at MES, last upgraded in the 1970s.

Other capital works are the continuing health and safety improvements at Stawamus, Squamish and Mamquam elementary schools.

Edwards said, however, most of the work should be done after school, so students will experience minimal disruptions at most.

tion of six new classrooms and an elevator, but Edwards said this is only a possibility at this point.

total of 39 portables will remain unchanged, though one was moved from Howe Sound Secondary School to Pemberton over the summer.

2001-02 will bring a significant change to the portable situation, as BSS' expansion will eliminate not only its own six portables, but likely four of the five at HSSS.



Canadian Tire plans delayed

Store could still open next spring with approvals

A proposed spring opening for anchor tenant Canadian Tire is not in danger by a delayed submission of final plans for the Garibaldi Village mall/condo development, say proponents.

The last time Robert Weston, vice-president of development for Calgarybased Canadian Destination Properties Inc., met with Squamish council he said the final designs would be in to the District of Squamish by mid-August.

This could have allowed staff to process the application for a comprehensive development zone (CDZ) at Mamquam Road and Hwy. 99 in time for the Sept. 5 meeting of council.

Instead, the zoning application process will not begin until council's Sept. 19 meeting.

"There's a phenomenal amount of work required for that submission," Weston said Friday. "It's taking a little longer than we expected. We've revised our submission schedule to the first week of September."

A CDZ application requires the developer to provide final plans on almost every detail,

from building design to material type to plant species in the landscaping.

This application will deal only with the first phase of Garibaldi Village, which comprises 2,300 square metres of retail space in addition to the Canadian Tire outlet's 3,540.

The submission was delayed in July when council and staff objected to Canadian Tire's flat roof, a violation of Squamish's design guidelines. The proponents came back Aug. 1 with an canopied design to partially disguise the roofline.

CDP has promised the rest of the development will include plenty of pitched roofs as per Squamish's requirements.

"They [council and staff] haven't seen our final drawings yet, but we're preparing them to address the issues the district has brought forward," Weston said.

If the CDZ is given first and second reading Sept. 19, the requirement for a public hearing and two weeks' advertisement of such would still mean adoption could not happen until the second week of October, even if council holds a special meeting.

Weston said, however, the delay should not impact on the spring opening of Canadian Tire or the rest of Phase 1 construction.

Groundbreaking is planned for November and council would be advised of any changes, a Canadian Tire official said Friday.

Squamish players assaulted in Vancouver soccer league play

Squamish United '97 FC saw its summer soccer season come to a crashing halt Aug. 19 — but it wasn't for lack of effort on the field.

Several Squamish players were injured in a brawl allegedly instigated by the Vietnamese club, their opponents in the Vancouver Summer Soccer League

According to team sources, fans came on to the pitch waving socks "loaded" with objects as weapons and players on the field stripped their jerseys off to not be identi-

Vietnamese players grabbed the corner posts used to mark off the out-of-bounds area and hit Squamish player Dave

Gaudin over the head. Gaudin required 28 stitches to close the wound.

Another Squamish player was allegedly jumped by three or four Vietnamese players.

Vancouver police were called in and they eventually restored order.

"It was a very sad day so far as we were concerned," said team spokesman Bob Smith. "This was a league for us to train in and give these young kids experience, not to bash each other up."

Squamish coach Jose Oreamuno said the league has decided to cancel the rest of the playoffs and suspend operations.

"It's very unfortunate, because we were the top team and the team to beat," he said.

Oreamuno was unsure whether the league would press charges.

"As far as we're concerned, we just want to forget about the whole thing."

League officials were unavailable for comment when contacted by The Chief.

GBA suit against paper awaits trial



A libel suit against the Vancouver Sun newspaper over the wood chip handling facility being developed on Cattermole Slough is awaiting a trial date.

The suit, filed by facility proponents GBA Logging Ltd. over an article printed May 1, claims damages against Pacific Press, the Vancouver Sun and Brian Morton, the journalist who wrote the article, for allegedly trivializing the quality and monetary value of the facili-

GBA filed the suit May 3; the defendants have since filed their statement of defence. A trial date is still to be set.

In the meantime, both sides of the debate over the facility wait for a decision on a separate suit against the development permit granted to GBA. Citizens for a Healthy,

Progressive Innovative, Squamish (CHIPS) went to court asking to overturn Squamish council's May 2 decision to approve the per-

mit on zoning issues.

Arguments concluded July 7, but no decision has been rendered.

When contacted Friday,

GBA President Greg Richmond declined to comment on the suits or how construction of the facility is progressing.

Attorney General, Crown may reconsider civil disobedience policy

The province's policy on civil disobedience that has effectively forced forestry companies to get injunctions to work around protesters is under review.

Squamish's forestry task force met last month with Austin Cullen, the assistant deputy attorney general, and regional Crown Counsel Michael Hicks.

The task force was struck in June to raise the media profile of the forestry side of the debate over the upper Elaho Valley, involve the community

and lobby the province.

It includes representatives of council, IWA, Soo Coalition Sustainable Forests. Squamish Nation and International Forest Products' (Interfor) Squamish Lumber and Empire Logging divisions, as well as the company's public relations firm.

Squamish RCMP detachment commander S/Sgt. Cliff Doherty also attended the meeting, though he is not a member of the task force.

A meeting with Forests Minister Jim Doyle July 6 was to include a representative of the attorney general, but one never showed up.

Cullen explained the policy of preferring to not charge people criminally for acts of civil disobedience came about in 1989. A trial of 70 anti-mining protesters took about a year and a half and resulted in 95 per cent acquittals.

"It [civil disobedience] is clearly misbehaviour, we're not arguing that," he said. "The question becomes what is the most effective method of dealing with it.

Cullen said a charge of contempt of court, based on violation of an injunction, is easier to prove and allows for group trials. However, Cullen

acknowledged recent judicial decisions regarding injunctions against logging protests have criticized that policy.

"I think we legitimately have to take a look at our policy," he said.

"I'm very pleased to see the AG and the Crown [Counsel] are reviewing the policy and hope to see improvement," said Doherty. "We're not dealing with hundreds of people, we're dealing with a small group that is causing a great deal of grief for this community ... that can be dealt with quite easily under the Criminal Code."



Health Unit plugs 'doit-yourself' HIV tests

Sea to Sky infection rate double provincial average

Despite the best efforts of educators, various groups and agencies, the rate of infection for HIV/AIDS in the Sea to Sky corridor is not going down.

That has public health officials worried, and in response, Coast Garibaldi Health Unit (CGHU) is tackling the probem head-on with a new "Dot-yourself" test campaign to each every at-risk person in he corridor.

The campaign will include a new brochure called the "D-I-Y HIV Test" and a poster litz.

At risk according to CGHU s anyone who engages in inprotected sex, shares neelles or who has received lood transfusions.

According to statistics, Greater Vancouver may have he highest rate of infection, ut Sea to Sky comes in secnd and that infection rate is pproximately double that of he remainder of the province. "In 1999, 56 people were iving with HIV and there vere 16 deaths due to AIDS in he Coast Garibaldi Region," aid Marilyn McIvor, public ealth nursing manager. Since disease, such as this ne, is not reportable, these umbers most likely represent

a significant underestimation of the actual number in the region.

"It's not the numbers that are shocking — it's the rate."

Another concern arose recently as health authorities became aware of an HIV-positive predator who was knowingly transmitting the virus to his partners.

Medical health officer Dr. Paul Martiquet confirmed Thursday that the man is living on the Sunshine Coast and the matter has been dealt with.

"Essentially the man was issued an order by myself to not have sexual relations without protection and he must inform his partners beforehand," Martiquet said. "We have been monitoring the situation and he has been complying with the orders fully. Anyone can become infected and our concern is for those people who do not believe they are at risk."

The incident on the Sunshine Coast is somewhat similar to that of former Squamish resident Henry Gerard Cuerrier, who was charged with two counts of aggravated assault in 1995 after he allegedly had unprotected sex with two women while knowing he was HIV-positive. The case went to the Supreme Court, which overturned Cuerrier's acquittal by the lower courts and ordered a new trial in September 1998.

In June of last year, Crown counsel decided to not proceed with another trial.

"The message we're trying to get out there is to be self-aware," Martiquet said.



Man airlifted from Garibaldi Park

A 46-year-old Coquitlam man was shaken up, but otherwise uninjured after he had to be airlifted from Garibaldi Provincial Park while on a hike Saturday.

Squamish Search and Rescue (SAR) crews, BC Ambulance paramedies, BC

Parks and a Blackcomb helicopter responded to the call shortly before noon.

The man was hiking down from Black Tusk towards Taylor Meadows with his family when he suffered and apparent heart attack and collapsed on the trail.

His family immediately called 911 on their cell phone and a BC Parks officer hiked up to the area as SAR crews were dispatched.

"Having that constant, firsthand communication from someone on the scene really helped us," said municipal coordinator emergency Nathan Dubeck. "Just like last week, we worked really well with BC Ambulance and BC Parks and fortunately, the subiect turned out to be okay."

The man was airlifted to a landing area just off Industrial Way in Squamish where awaiting medical crews took him to Squamish General Hospital for observation.

"From what I understand from the paramedics, our subject was feeling much better when they arrived," Dubeck said. "He was sitting up in the helicopter."




Police once again want to remind the public to not leave anything in their vehicles when parking at or near recreation sites.





EDITORIAL

Last gasp in the Elaho?

igns of the impending end of summer: the shortening of the days, the rush of back-to-school shopping and, in Squamish, the annual late-season assault by protesters on the Elaho Valley.

Silly season is just about over, and it looks to have been largely a bust from the protesters' perspective. The predictions by environmental groups of 1,000 arrests in the valley have fallen flat, and the public (read Vancouver) imagination has been more preoccupied with who would be voted off the island in Survivor than with who's in the trees in TFL 38.

But as protesters return to the Elaho this week for what appears to be one final gasp for recognition before the snow flies (and school goes back into session), at least we'll get to see if the provincial Attorney General and Crown counsel will walk their talk and make sure more criminal charges stick against the protesters.

The first protesters charged with criminal charges of mischief, intimidation and obstruction appear in Squamish provincial court today (Aug. 29), and their fate before the courts may determine whether late summer in the Elaho stays peaceful or becomes the storm that follows the calm.

Punishment is supposed to deter the wrongdoer from misbehaviour. But arrests for violating International Forest Products' civil injunction have done little more than give the protesters a soapbox to preach from — even when they're nailed with stiff sentences, as several protesters were earlier this summer.

The criminal charges pressed against tree-sitters who came down Aug. 2 and 24-hour patrols by RCMP seem to have cooled the protesters' ardour. Earlier this year, protest groups were crowing over the possibility of 1,000 arrests in the Elaho Valley. But that was talking about arrests for violating a "bubble zone" injunction in the Upper Elaho, not criminal charges. A charge of contempt of court is like a badge of honour in the environmental movement; an attraction rather than a deterrent.

A criminal charge of obstructing a road, on the other hand, is a more serious matter. It stays on the offender's criminal record, making it harder to travel internationally or find work later in life.

The willingness of the Attorney General and Crown counsel to use the tools at their command — and the court's decision when those criminally charged come to trial today — is now critical.

If the charges fail, it will mean another tense fall in the Elaho. But if they stand, the threat of real punishment may take the wind of the already flagging sails of the protesters — and calm the storm in the Elaho.

pub to demand they put the show on the big screen.







ATV tours planned for TFL 38

An ATV tour featuring the beauty of Tree Farm Licence 38 is in the works for two Squamish couples.

Sea to Sky Eco Tours Ltd. has applied to the B.C. Assets and Lands Corporation (BCAL) for a licence of occupation to run all-terrain vehicle tours on the logging roads of the TFL.

The business is a venture between Tom and Shawn Franklin and David and Jill Gourlay. Jill Gourlay is the president of Sea to Sky Eco Tours.

"The nice thing about it is it's a locally-based company owned and operated by local people," David Gourlay said Saturday.

Approximately \$100,000 is needed to start up the tours, and it would be spent here, he said.

Though they haven't nailed down the specifics yet, Gourlay said the tours would be half-day or four-hour tours that include lunch or an evening meal, depending on the time of day. They would be conducted by operators who not only know how to ride ATVs, but about the area they are in. The operations of advertising, which includes an active tree farm as well as old-growth and second-

growth forests would be a major component of that knowledge.







They're the law on the water

Editor's note: This is the first in a five-part series on Squamish's river and watershed environments. This week we look at the role of Fishery Officers in enforcement and education on Squamish's waterways.

The RCMP keep the peace on land, but it's L up to a different police force to lay down the law on the water.

The federal Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO) has its own force here in Squamish: a trio of trained — and armed — peace officers.

And just like the police, enforcing the rules and regulations is only part of the job.

munity police officers, it's just that we do a lot of work on the water as well," said Fishery Officer

Murray Gilchrist. "We

have partnerships with many groups and enforcement for us is a last resort option. Ideally, the best day for us is when we're out on the water, seeing people having a great time fishing, but within all the rules."

Gilchrist and his fellow officers, David Loop and Rob Harris, are stepping up their public education campaign, with a planned new program called River Watch (see story this page) and a higher public profile.

"Public education and awareness of the rules and what we do is very important for the public to see and understand."

Three officers might sound like a lot until you take a look at the patrol area — all of Howe Sound, the Squamish River and tributaries and into the Lillooet River.

"It's a vast area to keep track of," Gilchrist said. "We have a lot of people who live and fish here and then once the fall hits, peo-



ple flock here from the Lower Mainland and the rest of the province to fish. It takes a lot to keep things under control."

When it comes to river patrol, the officers check to make sure the fishing nets are in compliance with the rules, are marked correctly and trying to establish a presence in the water.

They are also checking water qualities, pollution levels and habitat stocks.

"A lot of times it's just ignorance on the part of the people," Harris said. "We


you get your licence. We aren't the bad guys here. If people just take the time to do their homework, there wouldn't be any problems, but unfortunately that's not always the case."

When there are problems, they're ready. Fisheries officers are fully armed with a sidearm, handcuffs, baton, and even body armour.

"It might sound like we're going to war, but it's a risky business out there on the water," Gilchrist said. "We train with the RCMP and have all the tools of the trade, just like a police officer. At times were the only ones out there to uphold the laws on the water.

"Federal enforcement is a risky job sometimes," Harris added. "Almost everyone has a knife and 75 per cent of the fisherman have a rifle. You don't know what their backgrounds are or what is going to happen.

"There are lots of cases where officers have been attacked on the water."

Tishery officers are looking for a few extra pairs • of eyes to keep watch on Squamish's waterways. River Watch is a new community-based program designed to raise the profile of Squamish's rivers.

Fishery Officer Murray Gilchrist is hoping to model the program after similar programs tried around the province.

"There is no real set formula; all you need is to get together people who are keen on the river system," Gilchrist said.

Fisheries currently works

with a number of groups in the community and they want to channel that energy into a more organized plan of action.

"We have a positive relationship with RCMP, Search and Rescue and with the Squamish Nation and I would like to see that increase," he said. "I also think there are a lot of community-minded people out there that care about the river and what goes on in Squamish. They just don't know how to get involved or up until now have the means to get involved."

"I think there is a definite need for something like this in Squamish.

Monthly bird count set for Sunday

Even though the 43 bird species observed on the Squamish Estuary monthly count of Aug. 6 was below average, the six participants were treated to some fine sightings of "good birds." Three Northern Goshawks

were viewed over a 45minute period by the east-side party, while the west-siders had a Red-tailed Hawk and a Northern Harrier. There were two Lesser Yellowlegs and 20 Least Sandpipers in the East Marsh and two Cliff

Swallows flying with the 100 Swallows Barn Squamish Terminals.

Two Peregrine Falcons were seen on Aug. 7 and again Aug. 14. One of them on the 7th was eating one of the Lesser Yellowlegs!

Four ruffed grouse were observed in the Site A forest on Aug. 12 and 14.

Also seen there on Aug. 14 was a Barn Owl, the first record for that species in the estuary, qualifying it as the "Bird of the Month" and bringing the Squan Estuary bird checklist total 217 species.

1. "Squamish-Lillooet Regional District Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw No. 692, 1999":

The purpose of Bylaw 692 is to incorporate amendments to the Whistler South Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 495 based on a statutory 5 year review of the plan. The amendment includes renaming the plan as the "Electoral Area D Official Community Plan". Bylaw 692 also establishes a framework for future planning at the "sub area" level within Electoral Area D that will provide greater detail about the scale, density, form and character of future development in Area D. Bylaw 692 recommends that sub area plans be considered for Howe Sound East, Upper Squamish Valley, Pinecrest/Black Tusk and the remainder of Area D including Callaghan Valley and Garibaldi at Squamish.

Since the first public hearing in March, 2000, Bylaw No. 692 has been amended to clarify planning principles for sub areas. Reference to "urban" development in Howe Sound East has been deleted. Bylaw 692 recognizes the significant development potential of Howe Sound East and indicates that the overall scale of development and future character of each community (Britannia, Furry Creek and Porteau Cove) will be determined by the sub-area plan. The Howe Sound East Sub Area Plan is to be guided by 12 principles relating to provision of parks/open space, community facilities, a range of housing types and densities, affordable housing in Britannia Beach, commercial development opportunities, infrastructure delivery, consultation with First Nations and environmental protection. The Upper Squamish Sub Area plan is to focus on basic land use issues that reflect the rural values of the community and recognize the limitations to development due to flood hazard and the ALR. Pinecrest/Black Tusk Sub Area planning will make provision for future development that respects the character and scale of the existing community and recognizes the constraints imposed by the Garibaldi Civil Defense Zone hazard.

The sedan race is made up of ex-street cars urned race cars and range from Trans Ams and Camaros to Jaguars and Fieros.




In game three, Gardner's


them, because you'll need them."






